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Bullet Train rep shares details

Those who attended Friday's Granbury Chamber of Commerce luncheon got to hear about the planned Bullet Train that will transport passengers between Dallas and Houston in a fraction of the time.

David Arbuckle, vice president of external affairs for Texas Central Partners (TCP), provided details about the project, which is currently in the environmental impact phase and going through "regulatory hurdles.'

TCP is the project developer. The train system, Arbuckle said, will not be funded through federal grants or taxpayer money. Instead, funding will come from investors.

Funding will be in place, he said, before the project gets underway - possibly within the next four years.

"We're not going to hand anybody a half-baked cake," Arbuckle said.

Here are some of details stated by Arbuckle during the luncheon, which was held at Pecan Plantation:

■ The project will connect North Texas and Houston, with a travel time of less than 90

■ The project will be more

From Dallas to Houston in less than 90 minutes

than \$10 billion, but "more likely" \$12 billion;

■ It will have a \$36 billion "direct economic impact" during its first 25 years of operation;

■ There will be 15 trains "to start with"; ■ It will be an electric, Japa-

nese train that is the widest and "the safest in the world," with no accident-related deaths or injuries;

■ It will be wheelchair accessible;

■ Wi-Fi, as well as food and drinks, will be available to pas-

■ It will provide about 1,000 full-time jobs once tickets are being sold;

■ There will be variable pricing, similar to airline tickets; ■ Initially, about 25,000 passengers will be transported per

■ Eighty percent of Texans surveyed said they would consider riding the train, and two-thirds of travelers said they would "definitely" or "probably" take the train;

The train will go over or under roads, but will not cross any roads between Dallas and

The Granbury Pirate swimmers carved their way through district competition Thursday, reaching the highest combined team score, women's score and men's score at the meet.

In total, 25 swimmers qualified to move on to the Region 2-5A competition, said head coach Jason Pullano.

"This season has been all around a step forward for our program," he said. "We capped off an undefeated dual meet season by winning district for the boys and girls for the fourth season in a row.

come some early adversity to score 127 points to beat the next closest competitor, Aledo, by 30 points. Our girls were led by senior captain Kaylee Brawner who took home individual champion honors in the 50- and 100-yard freestyle and was also named swimmer of

the meet." The boys team excelled from the start, he said, racking up 200 points, 63 points more than next closest team, Burleson Centennial.

"The boys had several individual champions including sophomore Jaxon Castillo in the 200- and 100-yard-free-

style, sophomore Jonah Delaney in the 200-yard-medley and 500-yard-freestyle, and Anthony Castillo in the 100-vard-breaststroke," Pullano said.

At the district swim meet, the 34 Granbury swimmers combined for 44 lifetime best times, he said, bringing the total number of lifetime bests for the season to 435.

Community support and a great practice facility have been critical to the team's achievements this year, he

"Having the new YMCA as our home has been a blessing that programs all around the state would be happy to

have. The support from the community has been amazing as so many have advocated for honoring our swimmers with a quality practice location that will allow the swimmers to thrive as a whole." he explained.

With a UIL rule change that allows first- and second-place swimmers to advance the state contest, Pullano has high hopes for this year's team.

"Our goal has been to take between two and nine swimmers down to Austin come state championships, and our team is in a great position to reach that goal," he said.

Birdwell files bills, co-authors others

With the new legislative session underway, state Sen. Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) has filed nine pieces of legislation and expects to file more before the March 10 deadline.

There are six bills that Birdwell considers "key bills," according to his Capitol Update newsletter.

Here is a summary of those bills:

SB 522 - County Clerk & Judges Religious Liberty Bill.

This bill prevents officials such as county clerks and magistrates from having to perform weddings or sign marriage certificates if doing so goes against their religious beliefs.

SB 523 - Correctional Facility Protection Bill.

This act would make it illegal to operate an unmanned aircraft, such as a drone, over a correctional facility.

SB 524 - Abuse of a Corpse Felony Bill.

This would increase to a state jail felony the penalty for the offense of abuse of a corpse or human remains in a mortuary

SB 525 - District Court Inventory Bill.

Requires the Sunset Commission to review the laws of the state to identify each statute and state agency rule that requires an action or proceeding to be brought or considered in Travis County, a Travis County district or statutory county court, or the Court of Appeals, for the Third Court of Appeals District and to make recommendations on whether the location of the action or proceed-



or state agency rule identified serves a legitimate state purpose, other than the convenience of the state agency.

SB 527 - Defendants Payment of Costs Bill.

This bill enables a court to order a defendant to pay all or part of the cost of legal services at any time during the defendant's confinement, placement on community supervision, or period of deferred adjudication, and allows local governments to recover the cost of legal services provided if a defendant acquires sufficient financial resources subsequent to sentencing.

SB 21/SJR 2, Convention of States.

This is a way to curb what some view as the federal government acting outside the scope of its authority.

According to Birdwell, more details on the Convention of States legislation will be coming in a future issue of his Capitol Update.

Thus far this session, Birdwell has also co-authored eight pieces of legislation.

The bills include ending the practice of "sanctuary cities" by requiring local governments to comply with federal immigration laws, safeguarding religious liberty by shielding written copies and digital audio or video copies of sermons from subpoena power and giving adult adoptees the ability to obtain a copy of their original birth certificate without a court order.

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

Lang files first bill as representative

New state Rep. Mike Lang (R-Granbury) has filed his first bill - and it's rooted in Hood County politics.

The bill pertains to closing primary elections to registered party members only.

The purpose of the bill, which was filed last week, is to deter non-affiliated individuals from voting in party elections.

"In my 2016 primary election, the Hood County Democrat Party privately circulated an email calling for registered Democrats to vote in the Republican primary in order to assist a liberal

aligned closer to their values," Lang said in a statement released by his office.

"While the email eventually came

to light, it is my intent to prevent unfortunate and dishonest meddling from ever occurring again.'

The email to which Lang referring was sent by Democratic Party Chair Robert Vick to a man who opposed him as party chair.

Theirs was the only local

candidate that Democratic race.

Though Vick said he disagrees with the way the email has been characterized, it seemed to suggest that the man to drop out. Otherwise, Democrats would "feel obligated to vote Democrat," which would "deprive moderate candidates hundreds of votes.

During the controversy, Hood County Tea Party President Jim Logan denounced the tactic of cross-over voting in primaries, which he said is done by both major parties.

He called the practice "political sabotage" and "political deception.

Lang, who now represents

District 60, said in the prepared

"The reason it is crucial to have closed primary elections is because each individual party has its own set of core values and principles.

"Due to the current system with crossover voting, I do not believe the parties are able to efficiently choose a nominee."

WHAT WOULD IT COST?

In response to questions from the HCN about how the plan would be funded since it would require that all of the county's voters re-register, Lang said that there would be "minimal to no cost" since citizens can register online at Texas.gov.

He added that since "the majority of changes in registrations are done on a paper registration form at this time," there will be a significant media campaign to encourage online registration if the bill passes.

Lang stated that filing according to party affiliation would include "Libertarian, Green and any other party."

COPYCATS?

Vick stated that another representative, Matt Rinaldi (R-Farmers Branch), filed a bill identical to Lang's.

"They do this just to appease their base, and they're so far

apart (geographically) they think nobody will notice," he

Lang said, though, that what happened is not unusual.

"We actually filed our bills minutes from each other because we were both unaware at the time that we both planned on (filing) the bill," he stated in an email to the Hood County News sent by his chief of staff, Zach Maxwell.

"There are other Representatives that also plan on filing similar bills as well... When good policy is at play, I don't care who gets the credit as long as it passes.'





Precision also earned awards for best engineered car, fastest car, innovative thinking, research and development, as well as sponsorship and marketing.

In second place was Atlas Racing with students Kyle

Call, Kasey Ludwig, Jack Miller and Jackson Winters.

Titan Racing won third with members Tucker Cole, Michael Horne, Cameron Loveless, Nautica Owens and Caleb Wood.

"I am extremely proud of our three teams and all the new members we have in the F1 program," coach Todd Gibson said. "Our Precision Racing team has something that only three other teams in the world have ever done by breaking the one-second barrier."

In 2015, Affinity won the national championship and advanced to the world finals in Singapore. A year earlier, the team won second place at nationals and traveled to Abu

A GHS squad also competed at the world finals in 2013, when the United States hosted the contest in Austin, which will also hold the 2017 national

F1 in Schools is a multi-disciplinary challenge in which teams of students aged 9 to 19 deploy CAD/CAM software to collaborate, design, analyze, manufacture, test, and then race miniature gas-powered balsa wood F1 cars.

The challenge inspires students to use technology to learn about physics, aerodynamics, design, manufacture, branding, graphics, sponsorship, marketing, leadership/ teamwork, media skills and financial strategy, and apply them in a practical, imaginative, competitive and exciting

"The students are already preparing for the national finals by tweaking original designs and taking judges' suggestions for their competition components," Gibson commented. "I expect great things at the national event when we travel back to Austin."







he law enforcement and the military tributes at Memorial Lane Park could be ready for dedication on Memorial Day weekend in Granbury. Or Fourth of July at the latest.

The two new memorials will be constructed adjacent to the Jim Burks Firefighters Memorial Park, 550 N. Travis St., alongside the Moments in Time Hike and Bike Trail.

The Memorial Lane Project in Granbury is going to be like none other across the country.

Design team members say the project is unique with its memorials for military, law enforcement and firefighters all at one site.

Since its inception last year, local businesses, service groups and individuals have been getting on board with the project.

"The community support has been awesome," said chairwoman Julia Pannell, who is spearheading the fund drive for the project.

DREAM BIG

Doug Pruitt, assistant chairman, said he recalls the day when Pannell told him about her vision for the park.

"She said, 'I have this thought for a veterans memorial and a law enforcement memorial,' Pruitt said. "She said we could honor those who have fallen, and those who are still serving."

Pruitt, who is chaplain with the Sheriff's Office, Fire Marshal's office and with Texas State Chaplains, praised the community support for the

project. "It is so neat to see everyone get behind this special thing. I love that my son is growing up in this community," Pruitt beamed.

Pruitt explained that the memorials will honor "those with a servant's heart."

He said that many who serve in the military end up working as first responders, law enforcement and firefighters.

"They all have a servant's heart. They want to serve others in our community and in our nation," Pruitt stated.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Pannell reports that fundraising is right on target. "We expect to fund the project with \$150,000 to \$175,000," she stated.

"As always our community has responded to this great project with lots of enthusiasm. Once they understand how powerful the results will be, they open their wallets," Pannell said.

"We cannot do it without our citizens, clubs and businesses buying into the program," she noted.

The Auction in Box brought in \$12,000 last year.

The Christmas Remembrance for our Heroes VIP dinner and show raised some \$35,000 in December.

The Heroes Red Hot Concert 2 is planned as the final fundraiser May 26 at the Granbury Resort Conference Center. Tickets range from open seating for \$25, up to \$500 for a table.

The sale of Remembrance and Honor pavers is ongoing. The pavers are \$50 and can be engraved to honor or remember an individual or group with three lines, 18 characters per line.

Veteran valor

Pecan ready to support Operation Finally Home family

"We think the government will take care of our veteran families," Dan Wallrath told those attending the Breakfast Club meeting last week in Pecan Plantation.

"But they don't," Wallrath said.

"So we have to step up." Wallrath established the nonprofit Operation Finally Home in 2005 to provide custombuilt, mortgage-free homes for military heroes and their families. The organization has built 120 mortgage free homes for veterans, and is in the process of building another 100.

In Pecan, Operation Finally Home is working with Anthony Estate Homes to construct a new home for Army veteran Diana Vasquez of De Leon, her husband Marco Paderos and their son Calab, 9.

HEROES NEED HELP

Wallrath said he was first introduced to the plight facing many of the country's injured veterans back when he was a home builder in Houston.

"My friend was telling me about a family who wanted to bring their injured son back to their home," he explained.

They were offered \$5,500 through the VA to make the needed modifications to their home. It wasn't enough.

"God had a plan," Walruth said. "We did a \$100,000 remodel on that house and it didn't cost a dime." People stepped up.

CHANCE MEETING?

Wallrath said he first met some members of the Anthony family about 40 years ago when

The two began talking about the nonprofit and April said she wanted to be involved.

Wallrath said some may call his relationship with the Anthony family a chance encoun-

"I call it a God thing," he smiled and said.

Fast forward to a whirlwind business trip last fall, Wallrath said he was sitting in Telluride, Colorado when he received a phone call from Diana Vasquez.

"She told me she was a disabled veteran, and had been through 26 surgeries. Diana said she and her family were living in a camper," Wallrath

"She said she wasn't looking for a new home. She just needed help to get water at their camper."

He noted the irony that while he was in such a beautiful location, he was talking on the phone to a veteran who needed something so vital.

Wallrath sighed and said, "My heart was broken."

He contacted his sister-in-law Patti Locke in Stephenville, and asked if her church could help the family get water.

The next day he met with

Mark and April Anthony in Dallas. And the ball began to roll.

Diana and her family were given an apartment in Granbury, courtesy of the Anthonys.

The Anthony family donated a lot in Pecan, and Anthony Estate Homes offered to build a new home for the family.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Before gathering at the construction site for the ground breaking ceremony, Wallrath said he hopes to get the whole community involved with the build for Diana and her family.

"You can offer a daily prayer

for this family, you can offer services like cooking a meal, babysitting, mowing their yard," he suggested. "Or maybe you can help financially. They are going to need furniture, linens and other household items."

Kids aren't the only ones guilty of comparing themselves to others. We adults can also fall into that trap. It's there in that bit of pride we feel when our child scores more points in the game than anyone else. It's lurking in the twinge of envy that comes when we

see our neighbor, who seems to have it all, drive down the street in her brand new car. We often don't even realize what we're doing.

Measuring our success by comparing ourselves to others can even spill over into church life. How tempting it is to pause in the midst of our activities and service to the Lord to turn our heads to see what the church down the street is doing. Are they gaining ground on us? What are they doing differently? Maybe we should consider changing our strategy so we won't fall behind. In 2 Corinthians 10:12, the apostle Paul, in referring to some of the Christians at Corinth, writes, "they measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves with themselves...." He admonishes that such behavior is unwise and refuses to respond in kind.

The problem is that using a flawed standard yields faulty results. To receive an accurate measure of success in life, we must use God's vardstick of excellence rather than compare ourselves to the imperfect people prototype by which we should pattern

So let's stay in the race by keeping our eyes on Him and resisting the temptation to compare our progress with those around us. Only then will we reach the finish line to be crowned as a winner.

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




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
