The original plan submitted by Magee and the Library Expansion Committee was for a

two-story, 10,600-square-foot addition to be added to the east side of the library. That plan includes everything wanted by library advocates, including two meeting rooms on the lower floor.

Some of the discussion on Thursday was about paring down those plans so that the expansion is less costly.

Nancy Sutherland, director of the Library Advisory Board, told Magee she would like to know what it would cost for a second story "shell" - in other words. building the second story, but finishing it out later when more

Conaway to lead probe into Russian meddling

Congressman Mike Conaway, R-Midland, will now preside over the House Intelligence Committee's investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 presidential election.

The announcement by Speaker Paul Ryan came after Chairman Rep. Devin Nunes, R-California, said he will be stepping away from the Russia probe.



Conaway, whose sprawling West Texas district includes Hood County, is a seven-term congressman and the second-ranking Republican on the commit-

He also chairs the House Committee on Agriculture and is a member of the Armed Services Committee.

"I have been a member of the House Intelligence Committee for over eight years now, and it is a responsibility I take with the utmost seriousness," Conaway said. "My profession as a CPA and auditor has taught me to be objective and methodical, and that is how I intend to help lead this investigation.

"I am confident that Ranking Member Schiff and I will be able to work together to conduct an effective, bipartisan investiga-

Council okays FIA, final plat for duplex lots

The Granbury City Council has approved a Facilities Improvement Agreement (FIA) and final plat for 49 duplex lots on almost 11 acres.

It is in the Hilltop Village Addition on Old Granbury Road, west of Gemstone Estates.

The FIA between the city and Tri-County Development is for the construction of: almost 3,000 linear feet of waterline; 2,134 linear feet of sanitary sewer line; about 6,500 square yards of street improvements; and 715 feet linear feet of storm drainage.

The approximate cost of the construction is \$827,469.

Senior citizens teach fourth-graders English, life lessons

A group of fourth-graders and a cluster of senior citizens eyeballed one other from opposite ends of the Waterview senior living front lobby.

Gradually, the students and seniors began to point to each other, wave and move closer to exchange hugs and greetings. The Granbury school district

technology department helped team nine bilingual students at John and Lyn Brawner Intermediate School with retirees at Waterview.

The students, who speak Spanish and are learning English, video chatted with their partner once a week.

Topics include talking about their lives, reading books or telling jokes.

At the start of the program in the fall, the senior citizens traveled to Brawner. On Wednesday, the students traveled to Waterview for the first time to see where their senior mentors lived.

Carroll Voigts, an 85-yearold resident, said his partner Ricardo Garcia always wants to hear a joke.

"Why can't the bicycle stand up by itself?" Ricardo asked, recalling one of his favorites. "It was too tired!"

All of the jokes and fun are

having a big impact on learn-

ing, bilingual teacher Gwen Newton said. "They benefit not just from the community of a grandparent figure in their life, but their English has improved when

they speak, write and read," Newton explained. Menielle Donahoo, instructional technology specialist for the district, was instrumental in implementing the program in Granbury, technology direc-

The technology is fairly straightforward. The district

loaned five laptops to Waterview and set up Google Hang Outs for the students and seniors to chat.

The project started in fourth grade because that is the year that state tests focus on writing and communication, Wood explained.

The seniors also get an extra spark on the days they are scheduled to talk to their student, Waterview lifestyles director Laura Bush said. The seniors volunteered for the year-long project, she said.

"The residents come to life. They are almost giddy some of the time," Bush said, adding that studies have shown interacting with children stimulates memory and emotional wellbeing in seniors.

Phyllis Guthrie, 92, and her partner Jesus Hernandez chatted about the books he read.

NOT 'ESSENTIAL'

It was stated that the library is not an "essential service," and that the county is facing significant expenses for things that are essential services.

For instance, 10 aging fire department tanker trucks need to be replaced. Also, the county will soon be forced to either build a new jail or add on to the current one.

"This will be a question of competing priorities," County Auditor Stan McBroom told commissioners.

County Judge Darrell Cockerham stated: "I think it should go to the voters. This is not something that we are mandated to

Attendees Don Poe and Dave Eagle agreed.

The county currently has about \$18 million in debt, the auditor stated, adding that more than half of the principal is scheduled to be retired in five years.

He said that the county currently has a AA+ credit rating with "a stable outlook."

McBroom stated that the county "can't borrow more than \$10 million for any calendar year" and that, to keep its good credit rating, the county must "remain a small issuer.'

In addressing what she said are "misconceptions" about the expansion, Inge stated that the committee believes: the project does not have to cost \$5 million; the library does not have to move or close during construction; and parking for patrons will not be "a nightmare" if construction vehicles can be parked at the city-owned American Town Hall next door.

She also stated that the expansion is not driven by the need to maintain the library's

Accreditation is an issue, and maintaining it is tied to a formula that correlates the number of library materials to a community's population.

Accreditation saves the county money and enables the library to apply for grants.

However, Inge stated that the expansion is driven primarily by "a need for more space." The facility, she said, is "simply out of room."

Inge provided details about how many groups compete for the library's only meeting room. More meeting rooms are needed, she said, as well as study rooms.

Scott, with the chamber, agreed that there is a need for meeting rooms within the community.

'We're constantly looking for places to have meetings," he said.

TICKING CLOCK

If the expansion question is put on the November ballot, Elections Administrator Jenise "Crickett" Miller will need to know by August.

That's four months away, but there are many issues to be worked out in the meantime. Also, the Attorney General's office has to sign off on the ballot language. With about \$1 million already

Elections official: Aging voting machines need replacing

The county has a long list of expenses and replacing its 102 voting machines is among them.

Elections Administrator Jenise "Crickett" Miller is asking the Commissioners Court to consider setting aside money in the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget - or at least the 2018-2019 fiscal year budget - to replace the county's outdated voting machines.

"The life expectancy is 10 years, and it's now 12," she said, referring to the age of the county's machines.

She said that, as yet, she does not have an estimate on what it will cost to replace them.

Miller made a presentation to court members during a specially called budget meeting held Thursday at the Emergency Operations Center to discuss

capital projects.

The budget for the upcom-

ing fiscal year will be developed over the summer and adopted in September. It will take effect in October.

Miller said she has arranged for both companies that are certified to sell voting equipment in the state of Texas - ES&S (Election Systems and Software) and Hart InterCivic - to do demonstrations for county officials and interested members of the public on Monday, April 17.

The demonstration by ES&S will be at 9 a.m.; the one by Hart will be at 1 p.m.

Both demonstrations will take place in the meeting room at Annex 1, 1410 W. Pearl St.

ES&S has a machine that provides a paper print-out of individual ballots, Miller said.

However, the Legislature would need to pass Senate Bill 506 in order for that machine to be used in counties that have Vote Centers, she stated.

Hood County switched to Vote Centers in 2015 because that system enables residents to vote at the location of their choice, rather than having to vote in their precinct.

There are 10 Vote Center loca-

tions throughout the county. SB 506 relates to voting system equipment in the countywide polling place program.

Miller said the machines "really need" to be in place before 2020, which is when the next presidential election will be held.

She also said it is "nervewracking" to debut new equipment during a primary year, but added that each of the companies provide on-site support.

As for the aging equipment currently being used by the county, Miller said that parts such as zip drives and flash cards are "getting harder and harder" to find.

"It's outdated equipment," she said. "And the state government's not going to fund it, and the federal government's not going to fund it, so it's a county problem."

Two teens survived a fiery car crash on Sunday.

The 2005 Ford Mustang was traveling west on Cleburne Highway near Massey Road east of Granbury, said Texas Highway Patrol Staff Sergeant Dub

"The driver's front right tire left the pavement," he said. "The driver tried to correct the action and lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle traveled south and then back north into the barrow ditch and struck a tree." The vehicle caught fire, Gil-





Grow a living wall with succulents

rowing succulents in containers is a gardening trend that has yet to fade.

Most prefer dry conditions; they will die if allowed to sit in a soggy site. They prefer growing in bright light, but suffer in intense sun. Popular selections for potting include sedum, sempervivum, crassula, euphorbia, cacti and echeveria.

If you can imagine gardening in a box, you can envision the latest twist in succulent gardening - living walls. To create "the look," buy or build a vertical garden frame that resembles a shadow box. For example, to build a one-foot square frame, cut four 12-inch lengths GARDEN PATCH



The Lady Pirates were aggressive on the basepaths, but Cleburne kept them in check. Granbury was caught stealing once, and two runners were picked off after taking too big





Show courtesy on the lake

Every season about this time of the year, many more folks come out to enjoy the weather and the water, and each year I believe it is important to discuss this subject.

Many people are experienced boaters, but many are novices. A little courtesy from each one of us will make everyone's life a little easier.

First, let's discuss a little boat ramp etiquette. The boat ramp is not a place to get your boat ready for the water. This should be done prior to backing your boat on the ramp.

When you are ready to launch, then you should back your boat down to the water. Even if the ramp is not busy, it is a good practice to ready your boat before you back down, as someone may pull up that may be more ready than

Another point to address on a multiple lane boat launch is to use only one lane. Many of us understand that backing the boat can be a chore, and getting it aligned correctly for the novice is a little work.

This past weekend, a person launching a boat had all three launching lanes blocked while trying to back and launch. A

little patience from both parties while loading and launching is recommended.

When on the water, it gets even more complicated, especially on a busy day. The best policy is to go slow through heavy traffic. If you approach another boater, you are supposed to stay to the right. If you are unsure of their path, slow down and honk if neces-

It is Texas law that you maintain 50 feet from other boaters on most reservoirs. On the Brazos, however, the requirement is 100 feet based on the Brazos River Authority requirements.

If you are boating near a launching or loading dock, do not create wakes near this area. Those wakes can cause damage to boats and equipment when the waves drive the boat(s) into the dock.

In Texas, it is common to wave to other boaters. This friendly gesture goes a long

Water temperatures on Granbury continue to hover above the 70 degree mark. Granbury stripers and sand bass are fair to good on slabs and live shad on the lower ends. Sand bass are returning from their spawning grounds. Some big crappie catches have also been reported in the backs of sloughs near brush. Black bass fishing continues to be good to excellent, with numerous fish between 4 and 8 pounds being caught on a variety of soft plastics. Granbury catfish are good on hotdogs and cut shad on jug lines.

Squaw Creek black bass continue to be caught in numbers on soft plastics. Tilapia reports have been getting better. Channel catfish continue to be good on cut shad and prepared baits.

Whitney striper limits are possible everyday with some big fish to 18 pounds. Possum Kingdom sand bass and stripers are good midlake near Broadway and the Peanut Patch.





CASA volunteers come from all walks of life and do not need any special background or education. Volunteers must be at least 21 years old, able to pass criminal and CPS background checks, willing to commit to at least one year of advocacy, be effective communicators, orally and in writing, and be willing to participate in an in-depth training program that we provide.

Remember how it felt to look up from the football field, recital or band concert to see that familiar face in the stands? That's how a foster child feels when he looks out over the sea of ever changing faces in the foster care system and see his CASA.





Gravy: Remove meat loaf to platter. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons of drippings. Brown 2 tablespoons of flour in drippings. Add 1 beef bouillon cube and 1 to 2 cups of water. Heat. Taste and correct seasoning as needed.

I crumble some of the leftover meat loaf and mix with Italian seasoning, diced tomatoes and tomato sauce to make spaghetti sauce.
