## County moving toward jail construction

As the county gears up to expand the current jail or build a new one, Commissioner Butch Barton and Sheriff Roger Deeds are researching other counties' lockups to learn the best way to go about it.

Deeds has been doing that for a while, but not long ago he and Barton went together to Johnson County, where officials recently built a fifth building as part of a jail complex.

The Texas State Jail Commission has been in communication with Hood County officials about requirements to enlarge the jail due to overcrowding.

"It's going to be a 'when'; it's no longer an 'if,'" said Barton, who represents Precinct 2.

The current jail has 192 beds. Male prisoners are housed there, but some have to be housed at other jail facilities.

Females are also housed at other facilities - mostly at the Somervell County Jail.

County officials are looking at doubling the jail's capacity,

bringing it to about 400.

It is likely that the impound yard next to the Law Enforcement Center (LEC) will be utilized for the project.

Sheriff's Office staff are located at the LEC, and the current jail is there as well.

Barton said he has met with a number of architects who have designed jails, and has phoned other counties where jails have been renovated or new ones built.

He said that in Johnson County, he and Deeds were met by the architect of the new building and representatives of the company that runs the jail.

"We're trying to get in front of it," Barton said of the looming state mandate.

He said that the new or expanded facility is expected to take 24-30 months to complete once the project is green-lighted by the Commissioners Court.

As yet, there has been no formal action taken on the matter by the Commissioners Court, nor has a cost analysis been done.

## County plans repairs for courthouse

The courthouse is going to get a little TLC.

The county judge and commissioners plan to fix the acoustics problem in the second-floor courtroom.

The problem exists because of cost-cutting measures that were taken when restoration work was done on the courthouse several years ago.

The sound quality in the courtroom is so poor that Commissioners Court meetings have continued to be held at the Hood County Justice Center in-

stead of the courthouse.

County Maintenance Director Tim Flower said it will cost between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to fix the problem.

The money will come from the capital expense budget.

The courthouse is also going to get a new roof.

The entire cost will be covered by insurance because of hail damage, according to County Judge Darrell Cockerham.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Steve Berry said he wants to look at possibly doing some touch-up paint work on the courthouse at the same time.

He said that he is scheduled

to meet today with Scott Young, president of the Historic Granbury Merchants Association (HGMA), to discuss the best time for shop owners for the work to be done.

However, he said he believes the work will have little impact on parking.

Berry also stated that, in his opinion, the best time to do the work would be while construction is going on for the Downtown Streetscape Project.

That work is currently underway and is expected to be finished by September.

## Assault charges filed in Brawley case

Shonda Powell has gotten a measure of justice, even though the charges brought against two young men are for an assault unrelated to her son's death.

She still suspects that her boy, Brendon Brawley, was the victim of another assault just before he died a few months ago.

County Attorney Matt Mills has filed Class A misdemeanor charges against the young men, who are accused of punching and kicking Brawley on or about May 17 of last year.

The Hood County News typically does not name defendants in misdemeanor cases.

In prosecuting the two men, Mills will have somewhat of a challenge due to the fact that the victim in the case is

deceased. Brawley died Jan. 27 of an apparent overdose of "caps" - capsules that contain powerful and potentially lethal combinations of such drugs as heroine or Fentanyl.

Powell believes there are signs indicting that foul play may have been involved.

A preliminary autopsy report revealed that Brawley had a concussion. After his death, a black eye mysteriously appeared, according to Powell.

Another concern for Powell is what she views as suspicious circumstances under which her son was found.

Brawley was discovered unresponsive in his car on North Stockton Street at about 11:30 p.m.

Although he always had his car radio on, it was not on when he was found, his mother said.

urette syndromes, tic and motor disorders, TBI/Cerebral Palsy, communication and speech language disorders, Down Syndrome, Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention-deficit/Hyperactive Disorder.

The evening show will be a modified, interactive performance that will be "outburst and movement friendly" and will encourage responses from the audience, Hildebrand said. She added that "fidget toys"

will be provided.

Tickets for the matinee range from \$20-\$30. Those who are hearing impaired should select ASL seating in order to be near interpreters.

Hildebrand said that all seating for the 6 p.m. performance will be \$15.

# Rescuers find missing Tolar man, 82, safe

An 82-year-old Tolar area man apparently became disoriented while hunting on his ranch and hunkered down in the woods all night.

Rescuers on horseback found the man safe in thick brush Saturday afternoon after an all-night search, Sheriff Roger Deeds said.

Thomas Lawrence, 82, took off Friday in his pickup to hunt on his 700-acre ranch off Coleman Ranch Road in southwestern Hood County.

His wife called authorities when he failed to return home. Firefighters and others spent all

night searching for the man. Rescuers found his pickup Saturday morning on the ranch, but Lawrence was not seen.

Shortly after noon, a sheriff's posse member and a volunteer, also on horseback, heard the man hollering from dense brush, Deeds said. The man hollered because he heard the posse member talking, Deeds said the posse member has hearing loss and talks loud.

Lawrence was taken by ground ambulance and treated at Lake Granbury Medical Center for dehydration.

"He's really in good shape seeing what he has been through," the sheriff said.

# County okays \$1 million in wish lists

County commissioners have approved almost \$1.2 million in departmental wish lists.

The money will come from the capital expense fund, which will still have about \$2 million left in it.

Part of the reason the court approved the requests is because county officials and department heads have saved money in other areas, putting money back in county coffers.

Money saved totalled about \$1.21 million.

Still hanging without action as yet from the court is the request of Elections Administrator Jenise "Cricket" Miller to replace the county's 102 voting machines.

Her life expectancy is 10 years, she said, but the machines are now 12 years old.

The reason the court didn't take action on that issue is because Miller has scheduled demonstrations by two companies that are certified by the state to sell voting equipment.

Those demonstrations will take place Monday - one at 9 a.m., the other at 1 p.m. - in the

meeting room at Annex 1, 1410 W. Pearl St. The public can attend.

One of the companies, Hart InterCivic, has submitted a bid totalling \$687,000, Miller said.

The other requests - minus the voting machines - came to

\$1,195,460.

They include:

- bulletproof vests for the Sheriff's Office;
- five Tahoes, including equipment and radios, for the Sheriff's Office;
- \$40,000 in truck replace-

ment costs for the Fire Marshal's office;

- \$60,000 in firefighting equipment and personal protective equipment for firefighters;

- almost \$278,000 for IT for such things as network infrastructure equipment, certified data destruction, video surveillance equipment and three departmental vehicles;

- a full-size half-ton crew cab pickup truck for Environmental Health; and

- about \$470,000 for a new, one-ton truck, new Broce Road Broom and new XL3100 Gradall for Road Operations to replace

aging equipment.

Road Ops Director Donald Linney sells older equipment that has been replaced, and the money goes back to the county.

In making the motion to approve the requests, Precinct 4 Commissioner Steve Berry noted of the Road Ops equipment: "We put in a lot of culverts, and we put in a lot of ditches."

Discussion of the requests, which was followed by the court's decision to grant them, took place at a special capital budget meeting held last week.

## Second library workshop set

The next public workshop to discuss possible expansion of the Hood County Library will be at 10 a.m. on Thursday, April 20.

The meeting will take place in the jury selection room at the Hood County Justice Center, located at 1200 W. Pearl St.

The Commissioners Court has not yet voted on whether to expand the library, or how the expansion would be funded.

About \$1 million - most of which came from a trust - has thus far been set aside for the project. There are plans, as well, for fund-raising campaigns.

Also not yet decided is whether the expansion should be decided by voters if it involves a tax rate increase.

## Extension to offer well water screenings

Time for a well check.

Not with your doctor, but rather with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the Leadership Advisory Board.

They will be offering private well water screenings on Monday.

The screenings will inform private water well owners and users about the condition of their well water.

Participants will be made aware of any possible contamination from common contaminants such as fecal coli form, salinity and nitrate.

The screenings are only for private wells in Hood County. The cost is \$10

per sample.

Samples must be turned in between 8 and 10 a.m. that day.

Sample bags must be obtained from the AgriLife Extension Service office prior to Monday. That office is located in Room 22 at county Annex I, 1410 W. Pearl St.

Instruction forms will be given along with the bags.

A water quality meeting to explain test results will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the United Cooperative Service building, located at 320 Fall Creek Highway.

Powell said she received reports from some of her son's friends and acquaintances that a party had taken place that night.

She wonders if Brawley was assaulted at the party, and if he was forced to overdose or given drugs that were laced with a poisonous substance.

As for the assault last May, Powell said she found her son, beaten and bloody, at the home of his father, who was not there at the time.

Powell stated that the assault allegedly involved two young

men, with two young women also present.

One of the young women allegedly used her cell phone to record Brawley being beaten.

Mills said he could not provide much detail since the cases are pending, but did say that both young men were arrested and posted bail.

If found guilty, they could face up to a year in jail, a \$4,000 fine, or both. They could also be placed on probation, Mills said.

## Family loses home in electric fire

A mother and two young children escaped a burning home on Thursday morning.

The woman was inside the home in the 2800 block of Sunset Ct. in Brazos River Acres with her 3-year-old and 3-month-old children when the fire started in the attic, said Hood County Fire Marshal Ray Wilson.

"She heard a pop up in the attic. She went outside and saw smoke coming out the roof,"

Wilson said. "She got the kids out and called for help."

None of the three were injured, he said. The fire began at around 10:50 a.m. and was put out by noon.

The cause of the fire appears to have been electrical, Wilson said. Firefighters were able to contain the flames mostly to the attic, but the rest of the house suffered water and smoke damage.

The Red Cross came out to assist the displaced family, he said, which also includes a man and a third child.

## Officer, GHS student save family, their home

A Granbury High School senior and a Granbury police officer's quick actions helped save a Granbury family and their home Friday morning.

At about 5 a.m. Friday, high school senior Robert Alvizo spotted flames on the front porch of a mobile home, said Hood County Fire Marshal Ray Wilson.

"He was able to make entry into the home past the flames and got everyone out," Wilson said.

Inside the trailer was a couple and their young child the teen knew from spending time in the neighborhood with friends, he said.

"A Granbury police officer was able to get there before the fire department and used a water hose to contain the fire," Wilson continued.

The fire appears to have started when a barbecue grill the family had used the night before was knocked over, presumably by an animal, he said. The hot coal caught the wooden porch on fire.

"There was no damage to the structure at all," Wilson said.

## Pitching powering both baseball and softball for Pirates

With the district seasons over halfway through for both Granbury baseball and softball, the Pirates and Lady Pirates each sit in second place in District 9-5A.

Although the two teams aren't exactly comparable - the Lady Pirate offense has shown more explosiveness than the boys, for example - it's become clear that Granbury, in both cases, will live or die based on the performances of the players on the mound or in the circle.

For the boys, ace Matthew

Hickey has shouldered much of the load. In his three district starts, Granbury has yet to score more than five runs in a game. In fact, run support has been limited for the Pirates throughout the district schedule, as Granbury has only scored more than five twice, in blowout wins over Arlington Seguin and Everman.

Trevor Jones, a sophomore that has solidified himself in the second spot in the rotation, ensures that Granbury doesn't miss a step when Hickey isn't pitching. Bryce Foutz, Wesley Case and Lachlyn McPhie have

all thrown good innings as well.

Head coach Brad Eppler said before the season started that his team's strength would lie in their depth, and that's been the saving grace for the Pirates on the mound thus far.

"At any given time we will have people on the bench that could be starters for our opponents," Eppler said in February. "We are going to dress around 17, 12 of which are pitchers, and all can throw strikes."

Throwing strikes is nearly a given - outside of a six-walk game against Cleburne, the Pirates haven't walked more than

three batters in a game in their last five contests.

Granbury softball also features a pitcher with great control.

Kelby Been, a sophomore righthander, has been outstanding on the mound for the Lady Pirates. She's started every district game for Granbury, losing just two, and has shut out two opponents.

Been has the advantage of a hot-hitting Lady Pirate lineup for run support. Granbury has scored more than 10 runs five times in the last six games, winning each time.

She rarely slips up, but when she does, Granbury can produce enough scoring to save her. The Lady Pirates have won 15-8 over Burleson and 16-6 over Crowley this district season, proof that this team is dedicated to resolving what head coach Erinn Jayjohn called "unfinished business" from last year.

Granbury's wins have largely been blowouts, but that shouldn't take away from Been's excellence in the circle. She has been every bit as good as Hickey is for the boys, and both the baseball and softball teams should and do appreciate

their aces.

Granbury baseball and softball are built for playoff runs, but how far they'll go will depend on the arms they rely on.

As of Monday, Granbury baseball holds a 6-2 record in district play, one game back of Cleburne and one game ahead of Burleson Centennial and Joshua.

The Lady Pirates are 9-2, one game behind Centennial and three games ahead of Cleburne and Joshua. Just three games remain in the softball schedule, and one more win would clinch a playoff spot for Granbury.

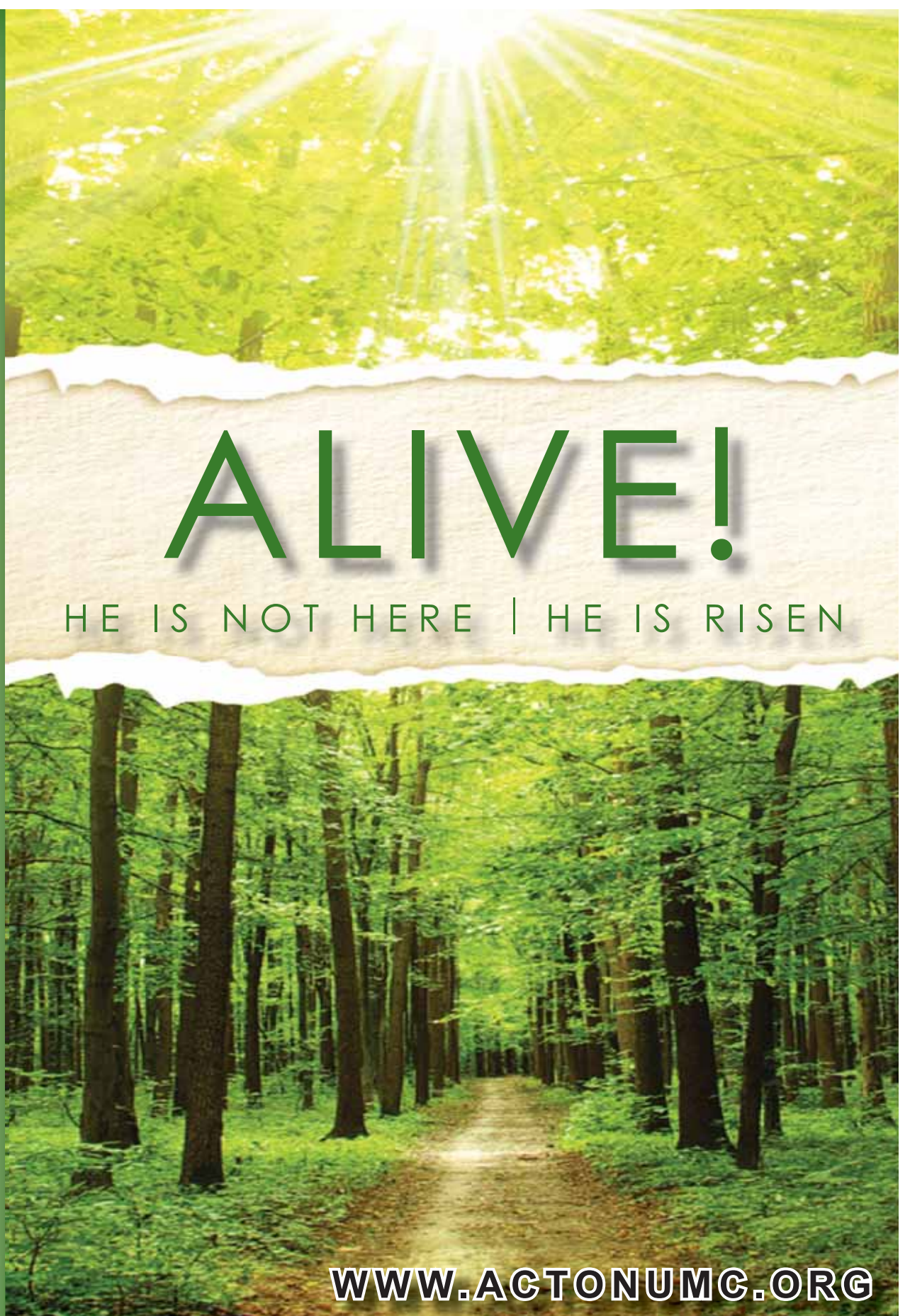

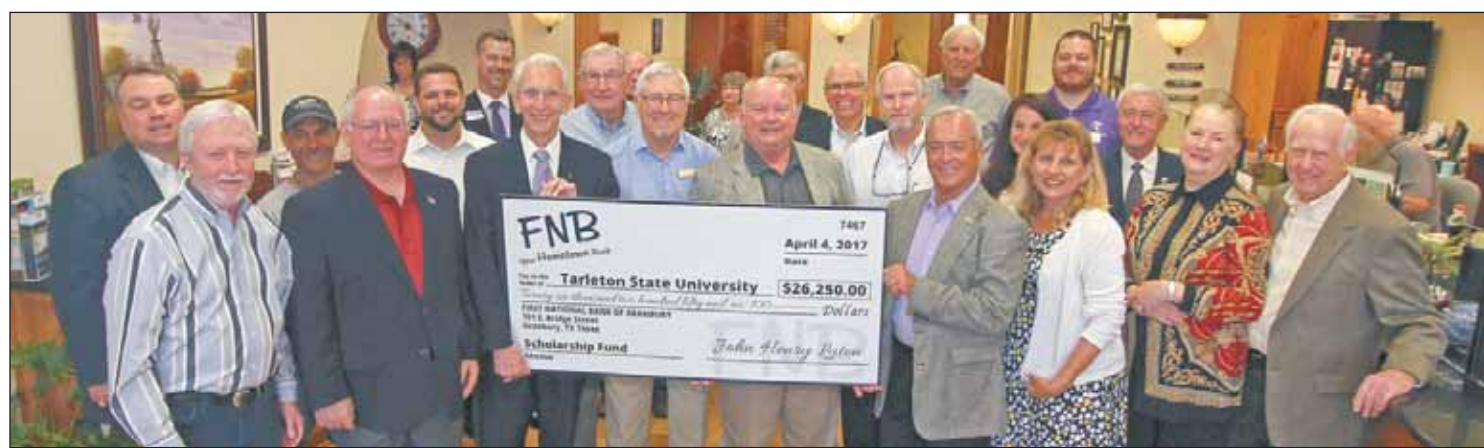
