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Constables to seek pay increase

When budget workshops begin this month, the county's four constables will ask for pay equal to that of peace justices.

If approved, the increase for the four constables would cost the county a little more than \$15,000, total.

Constables are armed peace officers who serve notices of evictions and lawsuits.

As with other peace officers, their jobs can be dangerous. In August of 2012, Brazos

County Constable Brian Bachmann was shot and killed when he arrived at a residence near the Texas A&M University campus to serve eviction papers.

"When you go to the door, you don't know what's on the other side of the door until they open it," said Precinct 1 Constable Delton Thrasher.

Thrasher said that he and the county's other constables - DeWayne Hart of Precinct 2; Kathy Jividen of Precinct 3; and Chad Jordan of Precinct 4 - do research before making those calls to find out if the person

they are serving papers on has outstanding warrants or a criminal history.

Thrasher said that the request for an increase in pay is to bring the constables more in line with other elected and appointed officials and department heads.

Currently, the constables

are paid an annual salary of \$64,292.

The salary for each of the county's four JPs is \$68,076 - a difference of \$3,784. Constables serve as bailiffs

for the JP courtrooms. With the

exception of Jordan, whose office has an officer who handles truancy cases, the constables have no staff. They handle their own administrative paperwork.

Although constables are elected to specific precincts, Thrasher said that each constable travels throughout the county to serve papers. He said they also at times help with traffic situations.

County Judge Darrell Cockerham said that whether the Commissioners Court approves the request will depend "on how much money we have this year."

He said that property tax revenues will not be known until July.

Aside from the as-yet-undecided constable issue, Cockerham said he is recommending no salary increases for the 2017-2018 fiscal year for elected and appointed officials.

However, he said that "could change," depending on how much money the county will have to work with.

The judge said he will be recommending a standard 3 percent raise for county employees.



Property tax collection switch moves forward

The Commissioners Court is holding its breath after a unanimous vote Wednesday that will plunge the county into unchartered waters.

The county judge and commissioners are hoping that Tax Assessor-Collector Teresa McCoy and her staff won't be in over their heads when they take over the county's tax collections from the Hood County Appraisal District, which has collected all taxes within the county for 35 years.

If mistakes are made, services to citizens could be impacted. and the county could miss

Nguyen said, referring to other clients that use the company's When asked by Precinct 2 Commissioner Butch Barton what "land mines" the county might anticipate, Nguyen said that changes in statutes might be a bit of a challenge. However, he said that the company works with tax offices and the attorneys representing those offices to navigate through such changes. "I don't know that there's any big 'gotchas,'" Nguyen said. "We work with our tax offices routinely - day in, day out; year in, year out. And we're confident in Teresa. I think she's very knowledgeable." The court approved Mc-Coy's request for a prorated software subscription in the amount of \$7,884. The amount needed for the 2017-2018 fiscal year, which will start Oct. 1, will be about \$27,000. That figure includes both a yearly subscription and costs for records retention, according to McCoy.

TxDOT hoping to speed up Cresson bypass

TxDOT officials are working to move forward as fast as possible with the Cresson bypass, according to County Judge Darrell Cockerham and Precinct 4 Commissioner Steve Berry.

The two met with several Tx-DOT officials last week. According to Cockerham, a representative of the North Central Texas Council of Governments was also present.

The speed-up was welcome news for the county officials, who were disappointed when Texas Department of Transportation reps said in February that dirt probably wouldn't turn until 2019.

At one point, the state transportation agency had said the project would get underway this year.

"They're going to try really hard to move the Cresson project along faster," Cockerham told the HCN on Wednesday.

"They said it may be fiscal year, rather than calendar year. It might happen quicker than we think.

He was referring to fiscal year 2018-2019, which is different from the calendar year.

Last week's meeting was followed by an email to Cockerham, Berry and others from Loyl Bussell, acting district engineer for TxDOT's Fort Worth District.

The email is meant to serve as "talking points" with the public, Berry said.

Bussell's email states that Tx-DOT "is actively working on the project and pursuing opportunities to accelerate awarding a contract to a construction contractor."

It also states that a preliminary construction plan is under development to allow for phasing and early contract award. Bussell's email outlines that

TxDOT is:

Working through environmental issues to finalize approval of the environmental study;

Beginning the preliminary

survey for right-of-way acquisition;

Working with utility companies to expedite relocation when right-of-way is clear;

Pursuing all possibilities to start construction as early as possible.

Cockerham said that Texas Parks and Wildlife has "interjected themselves" into the environmental study because the bypass "crosses ranchland."

However, he said this is not expected to cause problems or delavs.

Several years ago, the county entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with TxDOT to cap Hood County's portion of the bypass bill at \$11.8 million.

"They've given you the tools," Precinct 3 Commissioner Bruce White told Mc-Coy, referring to the prorated subscription for online tax billing and collection software that the court had just approved. "It's up to you to sink or swim.'

The vote took place at the end of a 90-minute workshop late Wednesday afternoon during which Du Nguyen of Texas-based Governmental Data Services (GDS) gave a presentation and answered commissioners' questions.

GDS was McCoy's preferred vendor among companies that offer tax collection-related software. She told the court that the company is "way more cost effective" than other companies and that she feels it is "a good fit for us."

McCoy has expressed confidence in her office's ability to not only handle tax collections for the county, but to save the county money in the process.

The way it stands now, property owners will receive two bills - one from McCoy, the other from the appraisal district. Although cities and school districts within the county have the option of having McCoy handle their tax collections, as yet none have done so.

CONFIDENCE IN MCCOY

During the workshop, Nguyen expressed confidence in McCoy and indicated that the company will work closely with her.

"Our success is measured through our tax offices,"

When discussing the \$24,000 annual expense for the software subscription, Precinct 1 Commissioner James Deaver asked of Nguyen: "What happens if a year from now you come back and say it's \$44,000 or something?"

Nguyen indicated that the company's clients can attest to the fact that GDS has never suddenly and dramatically raised rates.

"We just don't do that," he said, adding that the contract with Hood County could in-

Slave bracelets puzzle family

A Granbury woman's family has always wondered about some slave bracelets they were gifted.

Faye Landham submitted this week's mystery item in hopes someone could explain its role in the slave trade.

"My dad worked for the Mobil Oil Company and was in charge of drilling the first oil/gas well in Eket, Nigeria,' Landham said.

"In his position he became good friends with the government officials because Mobil hired many of the people living there."

Her mother, the only white woman in town, started a library, she said. Her parents were active members of the Nigerian Baptist Church. There was even a street named after them - Gibbons Street, Landham said.

"When they left, they were presented these bracelets as a token of the town's appreciation for all my mom and dad had done for the community," she said.

Her parents were told the metal circular bracelets were slave bracelets, Landham said.

"They never understood just how they were used as they seem too small to go around someone's wrist," she said. "Maybe they were for trading somehow? I would love to

know what and how they were used."

The bracelets are made of a special metal that a Granbury jeweler identified as bronze and tin. Landham said.

Heavy for its size, each bracelet is about 5 to 6 inches in diameter, and the ends are about an inch apart.

The opening is too small even for her young grandson's wrists, she said. While the bracelets are a

matching pair, they are not identical. Differences in the metal's

thickness and the shape of the ends led Landham to believe they were handmade.

"If they somehow pertained to slavery I would like to donate them to an appropriate museum," she said.



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

Joseph Scala pleaded not guilty to the charge of murder at his arraignment hearing Tuesday.

Scala, 73, is charged with murder in the death of his wife Betty Scala, 72, in Granbury on March 23.

"His case will be placed on the trial docket. I expect that it will be tried next year," said Hood County District Attorney Rob Christian.

Former Hood County District Attorney Richard Hattox has been appointed to Scala's defense, according to court records.

Scala was indicted by a grand jury on May 13.

The couple lived in Arlington but Betty was staying with friends in Granbury when she died, according to the affidavit for probable cause arrest warrant. Neighbors called

Betty was found dead next to a vehicle, according to the affidavit.

At the time, Scala told police he had driven from Arlington and suffocated his wife, according to the affidavit. He told officers he planned to drive her body to Arlington and turn himself into police, the affidavit continued.







Even though Tolar softball was in its first season in a bigger conference, the Lady Rattlers still managed to earn some all-district honors.



Cut-bait fishing for hybrids and stripers

If you don't mind being patient waiting on the fish to bite, cut-bait might be your type of fishing.

For many catfish anglers, cut-bait is the norm. What many folks don't know is that this method can catch bigger striped bass.

Several avid striper tournament anglers use this method to seek out the bigger fish, especially when competing in a "big fish" event.

What is cut-bait fishing and how can it out perform other methods? Cut-bait fishing is basically using cut shad or perch, and the presentation is usually a slack line on the bottom.

This is effective many times throughout the year. Right now, fishing cut shad on humps or feeding flats will put fish in the boat.

The strategy is to put some cut bait in a feeding area, looking for that bigger striper picking up the remains of the other fish feeding. It is a fact that the larger, lazier predators are usually below waiting on an easy meal.

The experts always tell you that stripers feed upward because their eyes are on the top of their heads. This is generally true, but they also can feed off the bottom.

cast your bait HOOD away from the **OUTDOORS** boat. This gets



bait presentations out at

Cut-bait anglers will chum the area with ground-up or diced shad to bring on the bite. The diced shad is typically thrown around the boat.

Don't overfeed them and wait for the bite. If there is no activity, move to another location.

When cut-bait fishing, it is wise to choose a location on a hump or a feeding flat adjacent to deeper water. It is good idea to survey the area with your sonar, looking for bait and fish and the depth they appear to be at. If possible, it is good to set your boat near the elevation change so you can put baits at both depths.

I like to use a Carolina rig with a 1.5 to 2-ounce sinker and 3 to 4 feet of leader. (Sometimes

on the clicker if you have one. This is exactly like catfishing. as I mentioned earlier. Trv different sizes of cut shad to

match what they are feeding on. A big presentation will catch bigger fish at times. When the fish picks up the bait and runs, reel in any slack and set the hook.


stickups near main lake points. Sand bass and stripers are good to 8 pounds on the lower end on slabs and live shad. Trollers are catching stripers and sand bass near Striper Alley as well.

Crappie are being caught near deeper structure on small minnows.

Squaw Creek is in the 80s and the tilapia are good on worms. Black bass are good on top early and are in or near creek channels later. Soft plastics are hard to beat.

On other reservoirs, Whitney and Possum Kingdom are boasting on striper fishing. Live shad or downrigging jigs are produc-






Mark was not a drinker, drug user, nor smoker. At only 135 pounds, no 200 pound boy in Granbury would mess with Mark. Mark went to A&M and graduated cum laude. He was well read, and knew the history of our wars with exact accuracy. He even read The Warren Report on Kennedy's death twice, once with his closest friends Craig Shaum and Lance Looper.

Mark's messages were: Learn all sources of knowledge. Define your goals. Pursue your goals. Protect your freedom. Conservation protects freedom. Be your own leader. Never follow without knowing all the facts. Being passive helps the enemy. Being active is the only way to succeed. Right is right. Wrong is wrong. No gray in between.

Mark believed this so strongly that after trying to convince others unsuccessfully, he felt he could not make a change in our corrupt liberal policies, so he gave up and went to sleep June 1, 2016. Housing market remains strong in Hood, Granbury

hey say timing is everything. This could be the time to sell your house.

The Granbury and Hood County housing market remained strong during the first quarter of 2017, with 22.5 percent more homes sold compared to the same time last vear.

People are in the market for vacation homes, lake homes, as well as retirement homes and communities, according to the Granbury Association of Realtors.

"Also, we are seeing a lot of younger buyers from the Fort Worth area," said Administrative Executive Denise Huber of the GAR.

"Our infrastructure is good, and they can buy so much more for their money in Hood County than in Tarrant or Dallas counties."

In Hood County, buyers can find a home for about \$120 per square foot; whereas, the same home would be closer to the \$140/\$150 range in Fort Worth.

The median sales price for homes in Hood County was \$216,500, a 25.5 percent increase from the first quarter in 2016. That means half the homes sold were above the median price and half the homes were below.

The number of homes sold increased 22.5 percent, with 310 homes sold in the first three months this year.

"We need more houses to sell," Huber said.

Monthly housing inventory is low at 3.1 months, compared to 5.1 months in the same quarter last vear.

"This is well below the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University's

benchmark of 6 to 6.5 months of inventory as a balanced housing market," Huber noted.

Easy access to the Metroplex is bringing many here. "Access to the Chisholm Trail has taken 20 minutes off the commute to downtown," Huber said.

Active listings are down 28.7 percent compared to the first quarter of 2016.

Homes spent an average of 71 days on the market in the first quarter, which is four days less than the same time last year.

For the month of April, homes were moving even more quickly, selling in 63 days.
