Challengers file for council seats

On Monday, the first day in the filing period when city and school offices were open, challengers filed for seats on the Granbury City Council currently held by Mickey Parson and Rose

Both have said they intend to seek re-election.

Parson is the mayor pro tem

and has occupied the Place 6 seat since May 2005. Myers represents Place 4.

Both challengers - Greg Corrigan and Patricia Corrigan "Trish" Reiner -

are connected to the Chamber of Commerce.

Corrigan is vying for the Place 6 seat, and Reiner, for the Place



Corrigan said he is not against Parson, but is simply wanting to serve on the council.

"I'm running so I can hopefully bring some new

views to the council and a level head when it comes to making city financial decisions," he Corrigan, 29, is director of marketing and community liaison for Visiting Angels Living Assistance Services. He and his wife, Meredith, attend Granbury Baptist Church.

Corrigan is a volunteer firefighter and training lieutenant for the Granbury Volunteer Fire Department. He serves on the city's Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) and the Municipal Utility Advisory Board (MUAB).

A chamber ambassador, Corrigan was appointed chair of that group in 2015 and last year was named Ambassador of the Year. He is currently treasurer of the Granbury Business Devel-

opment Network. Reiner works for Interim Healthcare and has lived in Granbury for 12 years. She is president of the chamber's board of directors and chair of its Government Affairs Committee. She was named Chamber Director of the Year in 2014 and 2016.

A Rotarian, Reiner has served on several committees within the community, including the Walk to End Alzheimer's and Relay for Life. She has a website - www.trishreiner.com.

City struggling with code enforcement

People in violation of code ordinances are costing the city money and stretching employee workload to the limit.

Granbury City Manager Chris Coffman recently gave a report to the City Council about the

Two employees are responsible for sending violation letters, he said, and thus far this fiscal year, they have mailed 276 of them.

The letters are sent by certified mail and cost the city about \$6 each, Coffman said, not counting the employees' time.

"It takes a little while to do that," Coffman said of preparing the letters, adding that "coaxing" and working with people to convince them to resolve the problem can oftentimes be "pretty intense."

"Our code enforcement staff is extremely busy and stretched

_ as far as they can go," he said.

Out of the 276 violations, 81 complaints were resolved through voluntary compliance, he said.

Coffman also said that 2,815 inspections and 1.071 follow-ups have occurred.

Two businesses were closed because of health or safety violations, he said.

The city currently is dealing with multiple violations - including high weeds and grass, junk vehicles and unsanitary conditions - on several properties, according to Coffman.

One of those properties involves the city dealing with the estate of the deceased owner.

Coffman noted that June was the third wettest on record and that it rained in Granbury at least every seven days. This, he said, caused grass to grow faster and made it difficult for property owners to maintain their lawns since the ground

Coffman told the council that the city has thus far towed nine vehicles from the parking lot of the old Kroger location at Highway 377 near Business 377/ Pearl Street. That building is vacant, but the grocery store chain still owns the property.

Coffman said he does not know how many vehicles may have been towed by Kroger officials, but that Kroger has authorized the city to tow any vehicles parked at that site.

"It was beginning to look like a used car lot," Coffman said.

Get your scream on GranScary to audition haunted house actors

Can you belt out a shriek worthy of any horror flick?

Is it easy for you to convince people that you're mentally disturbed? Does your idea of a great makeover involve fake blood, purple bruises and

grotesque gashes? Is so, then GranScary needs you. This year, for the first time, the GranScary committee will be holding auditions for the popular Halloween

attraction that raises money for Hood County Christmas for Children. It's not a paying gig, but it's a fun

"Due to past years' response, we're just wanting to narrow it down to the more committed actors," HCCFC board member and haunted house director Larry Jones said of the auditions.

This will be GranScary's fourth year. The haunted house is staged in the livestock barn at the Granbury Reunion Grounds.

Actor auditions will be held there on Saturday, Aug. 12, from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m., and on Sunday, Aug. 13, from 2 to 6 p.m.

Those high school age or older can try out.

Saturday, Aug. 12, will also mark the first day of construction on the haunted house. Volunteers are always needed.

Jones is not revealing many details about this year's "House of Horror," but he said that the money-raising venue will not be appropriate for young

children since organizers are "upping the scare factor.'

Nevertheless, there will entertain-

ment for tykes.

Jones is planning to construct a maze near the haunted house's entrance for younger children to enjoy, along with games, photo ops and concessions that were part of the event last year.

There will also be a "Scaredy-Cat Tour," a Trunk or Treat event and a costume contest for younger children from 6 to 8 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28.

The dates for GranScary will be Oct. 27, 28, 30 and 31, which is Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuesday evenings. GranScary will not take place on Sunday, Oct. 29.

Regular tours for the "House of Horror" will begin at 8 p.m., with ticket sales ending at 10 p.m.

The GranScary committee plans to once again have spooky, after-dark tours of the nearby City Cemetery.

Jones said there will be hayride tours, but the committee is having discussions with the city about possibly using its covered tram again as well.

Ticket prices have not yet been determined, Jones said, because it is possible that separate tickets will be sold for the haunted house and the cemetery tours.

Selling modestly priced tickets for the cemetery tour on a first-come, firstserved basis would make it easier to accommodate patrons, Jones said.

The cemetery tours have been a very popular part of the overall GranScary event.

Red, white and blue balloons, paper rose bouquets and an assortment of patriotic-themed objects - from birthday hats to American flag-covered peppermints - were arranged throughout the room.

A hum of chatter filled the dining hall.

Before long, the room was filled with nostalgic tunes from the 1940s sung by local Susie Strong, who donned a formal green dress and black feather boa for the special occasion.

Born in 1910, Clarence Barrett, a resident at the assisted living center, turned 107 on Monday.

His fellow residents at the center, as well as family and friends, celebrated with him.

Many residents of The Courtyards at Lake Granbury tapped their feet, swayed, snapped and sang along as they listened to the familiar songs.

Despite his age, he's still a part of activities at the center.

"He's a pretty sharp guy," Goodman said. "He plays dominoes, he plays bingo. And if you try to tell him he missed a number in bingo he says he's got it. He's got the bingo down.

"He's frail. There's no doubt about it. I can't tell you that he's out there running laps or anything. But his mind is still there.

"It's not every day that a resident of the courtyards turns 107 years old. If that wasn't a good excuse for a party, then I don't know what was.

By now you've seen the highlights from the Open, I'd imagine, and you know the heroic shots and the lightning-quick turnaround and the emotions on the back nine at Birkdale -Spieth going birdie-eagle-birdie birdie and telling his caddy to pull the ball out of the hole on

Knowing what happened doesn't make it any less fun to talk about or write about - we should be talking about the 2017 Open for years and decades to come. But it's also important to think bigger, about how this win and this week fit in with the narratives surrounding golf as a whole in general and Spieth's career specifically.

Golf, as has been discussed time and time again, including in this space, lacks an "alpha dog," a surefire number-one player that should be the favorite in any tournament they enter. There have been pretenders to the crown in Rory McIlroy, Dustin Johnson and Jason Day for a brief six-month stretch, but none have stuck around.

Is Spieth the alpha dog we've been craving? Consider the fol-

He's the only one of those mentioned above that has demonstrated a proven ability to bounce back from a sojourn into the wilderness - if you can count missing two cuts in a row "the wilderness."

He's only 23 years old, four years younger than McIlroy and six years younger than Day.

He's won three majors in 19 tries. McIlroy has won four in 35 tries. The only other person besides those two to win more than two majors since 2011 is Bubba Watson.

He's won on a diverse array of courses, from bombers' paradises like Chambers Bay and Kapalua to ball-striking tracks like Birkdale and Colonial. So let's look at what this

means for Spieth's future.

If we assume he'll win another this year - and though nothing is certain, that seems like a safe bet - that's a pace of three wins per year. At that rate, he'll pass Phil Mickelson's career win total by the age of 33.

If he wins a major every other year until he turns 33, he'll be at eight majors, good for sixth all time. He'll have another solid 10 years or so after that. Those are numbers that

would vault him into top-five all-time discussions. And if it happens, we'll look back on Sunday at Birkdale as the moment that golf found its alpha

Volunteers needed for area fire departments

Where there is smoke and fire in Hood County, there will also be volunteer firefighters.

But soon, there may not be enough firefighters in DeCordova to go around.

"All of our fire departments can always use the help," County Fire Marshal Ray Wilson said. "You always have to ask, 'What would happen if our volunteers didn't volunteer?"

Nine fire departments serve the residents and businesses of Hood County. All of them are staffed entirely by volunteers.

The DeCordova/Acton Volunteer Fire Department is looking at a dramatic increase in emergency calls in the next several years, said DCBE Fire Captain Kenneth Elliott.

That increase could overwhelm the volunteers currently on the station's roster, he said.

The station now has about 28 people on its roster, he said. Station leadership is hoping to increase its roster to 45 or 50 members in time to cope with a predicted residential boom, he said.

"There will be about 1,300 new dwellings in Acton alone in the next three to five years," Elliott said. "Our 28 to 29 people can't handle that.'

Firefighters respond to elderly people who have fallen and other medical emergencies, vehicle accidents, structure and land fires, boating accidents, and search and rescue operations.

In 2015, the DeCordova station received 893 calls and in 2016 received 859, according to county records.

The number of calls in a year can fluctuate, but always trends upward with increased population numbers, Elliott said.

He remembered one year that DeCordova was called out on about 1,000 calls. Even with 35 members on its roster at the time, getting a team together to answer almost three calls a day placed a lot of strain on each volunteer.

"It's hard for a volunteer department to get bodies into the station for every call," he said.

Volunteers have jobs, families and other obligations that make it impossible for any one individual to respond to every call, he said.

DeCordova and other Hood County stations are planning a community event in August to connect with people interested in volunteering, Elliott said, but applications are accepted at any

Volunteers do not need any specific firefighting or emer-

gency medical training before becoming a volunteer, he said. Basic CPR and first aid are recommended but not required.

Those interested in volunteering can pick up an application at the DeCordova station any time the station's bay doors are open, he said.

Applications are reviewed by Wilson and a background check conducted. Applicants attend two business and training sessions at the station before they are voted on for probationary status, Elliott said. The training usually takes six months before the potential volunteer is voted on as a member of the roster.

"It's not, 'Here's a helmet, pants and a suit; go fight a fire.' For the first six months, they are helping the engineers, observing and getting their qualifications," Elliott said. "It's hard work, but it's free training, and a lot of the guys take advantage of that."

Training extends beyond firefighting to other areas like diving and emergency medical.

In the last three years alone, the station has trained 12 new EMTs, bringing the station's total to 17, he said.

Those interested in becoming a volunteer firefighter should reach out to the fire station where they live, Wilson said.

"Also keep in mind that there are many opportunities to assist in a volunteer fire department besides fighting a fire," Wilson added. "Volunteers can assist in helping around the station, or provide rehab assistance at the scenes of large fires or even traffic control at a

Though fire stations are assigned to geographical areas, it is really a service to the entire community, Elliott said.

"We will go all over Hood County to help other departments just like they would help us," he said. "Anything the public or our county needs, we try to help out as much as we can."





Trial by water

DeCordova firefighters exercise new dive gear

BY BETHANY KURTZ HOOD COUNTY NEWS

Two firefighters headed underwater Sunday to make sure they are prepared for the next emergency.

Captain Kenneth Elliott said five of DeCordova/Acton Volunteer Fire Department's 29 volunteers are certified to dive during emergency operations with three more firefighters working on their certification.

On Sunday, the pair of divers suited up and headed into the swim area of DeCordova Bend Park for training. They chalked up one more of their 10 required dives for the

While Sunday was an easy day, it is necessary to keep diving skills sharp, Elliott said.

The station responded to four calls for water rescues last year, he said, and as the county grows more populated, he expects more calls will come in.

Even one chance to save a life is worth the investment of manpower and equipment, he said.

"If I ever have to put that suit on one time to rescue a person and return them to a family, it has paid for itself," Elliott said.

The suits protect firefighter divers as they work underwater to rescue drivers and passengers from cars and boats, or for swimming search and rescues, he said.

"We use dive suits for any coldwater rescues or when the water has hazardous material like when a car goes into the water," Elliott said.

Some of the water sources in

Hood County are spring fed, making them cold enough to require suits, he explained. The equipment also help with the depth and visibility in Lake Granbury, he said.

"When they were down there on Sunday, the visibility was less than 6 inches," he said.

The divers were also showing off the equipment donated to the department by Firehouse Subs. A representative of the company was there on Sunday to learn more

about how the equipment is used. "Firehouse Subs donated \$23,000 worth of dive gear last August," Elliott said. That's four complete dry

The department uses the suits for their own calls and responds to requests from other Hood County fire stations. Occasionally, they receive calls to back up dive teams from other departments across in the Metroplex.

"A couple times we have gotten calls from Benbrook Lake," Elliott said. "We are getting known so other agencies are starting to call. We all train together so we know the same skills."

DeCordova divers are certified as Public Safety Divers by PADI, Professional Association of Diving Instructors, Elliott said. The station uses PADI because it is the most recognizable certification around the world, he said.

The training is funded by the county and through grants, he said.



Sources: Power plant unit down, but not due to Russian hackers

Sources at Luminant and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission have confirmed that Unit 2 at the Comanche Peak Nuclear Power Plant in Glen Rose is currently offline, but said that it is not related to Russian government-sponsored hackers.

A source reported to the Hood County News last week that the unit has been down at least six weeks.

Newsweek reported earlier this month that Russian hackers are suspected in the infiltration of computer systems in at least a dozen nuclear power plants in the United States with the aim of disrupting the nation's power supply.

According to the magazine, the Wolf Creek nuclear facility in Kansas is among the sites targeted.

At the time that Unit 2 celebrated its 20th year of commercial operations in August 2013,

it had produced 180 million megawatt-hours of electricity the equivalent of providing the annual consumption of more than half a million homes.

In an email to the Hood County News, Meranda Cohn, who works in corporate affairs for Vista Energy, TXU Energy and Luminant, confirmed that Unit 2 is offline, but stated:

"I am not able to provide any further information as it is considered market-sensitive in the competitive ERCOT market. However, I will tell you that the operational status of the unit is in no way related to Russian hacking or any other cyber-security related issue."

In response to an emailed inquiry from the HCN, the NRC's Dallas office provided this statement: "They are working on non-safety related equipment at the plant. We have no reason to believe it is related to cyber-threats.'

v attornev resigns

City Attorney Walter Leonard has resigned.

He presented a letter to the Granbury City Council in closed session at last week's regular council meeting, giving a 30-day resignation notice.

Leonard has served as city attorney for about the past year and a half.

In his letter, which the Hood County News obtained through Open Records, Leonard stated that it has been his "great pleasure" to serve Granbury. But he also wrote:

"Nonetheless, in recent times, it has come to my attention that a rift has devel-

oped in an essential relationship necessary for me to be able to perform these duties in a manner in which I think is appropriate for the City and most beneficial to all concerned.

"Accordingly, I feel that the City should have a situation in which this is not a problem and everyone can work smoothly together."

Leonard's letter then stated that he was resigning and giving the 30-day notice required by his contract.

Contacted on Monday, the Fort Worth attorney declined to provide any further statement about his resignation.

Closed session discussions about Leonard were on the agendas for last week's regular council meeting as well as the one on July 5.

For the July 5 meeting, the agenda item was for a discussion of Leonard's contract.

For the meeting last week, the agenda item, which was listed under the heading "Personnel Matters," was to "deliberate the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline or dismissal of the city attorney."

In April, Leonard and the City Council agreed to new contractual terms that would cap his legal fees.

At the time, he was charging the city a "special rate" of \$140 - \$60 per hour less than his usual fee.

But council members were

concerned over higher-thanexpected legal costs. In the 2016 calendar year, the city paid Leonard \$115,520.

Public Information Officer Bethany Kyle said that City Manager Chris Coffman has contacted Taylor Olson Adkins, Sralla & Elam, LLP, (TOA-SE), a municipal law firm that represents a number of cities.

TOASE, Kyle said, will provide interim legal services to the city until the City Council makes a decision on how to proceed.

Kyle said the law firm already provides legal advice to the city in other areas, such as the airport and human re-





Devoted

Landin went to war in Afghanistan while another battle raged in his head

ate Landin didn't know he had a mass growing in his brain. For three weeks leading up to his deployment to Afghanistan, Army National Guard 1st Lt. Landin was bothered with a metallic smell.

"I felt something was wrong, but I didn't know what," the Granbury man

Tate, now 28, was seen by multiple doctors during his nine-month deployment. None determined a diagnosis.

He chose to continue his service in the war zone instead of seeking additional medical help in the States. He didn't want to leave his fellow soldiers short-handed.

AND BABY MAKES THREE

Tate was called up for deployment in Afghanistan starting in October 2012. At the time, he and his wife Jessica were living in Carrollton. Six days before he left for training, the couple's first child, Abigail, was born.

A 2007 graduate of Granbury High School, Jessica (formerly Wunderlich) moved with the baby back to Granbury to be with her parents while Tate was deployed.

"We were lucky that he got to see the baby when she was born. And he was the first to change her diaper and the first to give her a bottle," Jessica noted.

AMBUSHED IN AFGHANISTAN

While in Afghanistan, Tate's unit served as instructors for the Afghan soldiers.

Tragedy hit the unit on Dec. 13,

Soldiers had traveled in four armored trucks to Kandahar Air Field to get supplies.

As the U.S. vehicles were leaving Kandahar, the lead truck was rammed by another vehicle that was rigged with a bomb.

The lead truck's driver, Staff Sgt. Trent, was killed, while Sgt. Rutherford and Spc. Aguilar were wounded.

METALLIC SMELL PERSISTS

As Tate's condition continued un-

"But after losing one in the bombing, and two others wounded, I felt obligated to stay with my team. I didn't want to leave them," he said.

When a new truck arrived, Tate said

no one wanted to be the driver. "I know what's going to happen to me when I die. So I volunteered to drive

it," he said. The metallic smell was occurring more frequently for Tate, and it was suggested he may have had a temporal lobe seizure.

Back in the U.S. from deployment, one doctor suggested his problem could be related to his tonsils and adenoids. He also had swollen glands on his neck and around his arms.

But following surgery to removed the suspected culprits, Tate still had the smell.

SYMPTOMS BECOME SEVERE

Driving home one day from a monthly training drill with the Guard in 2013, Tate became sick and had to pull over.

"He couldn't drive, he couldn't even talk," Jessica said. "He called me on his cell phone and I couldn't really understand what was going on. After he answered a series of yes and no questions, I was able to find him pulled over on the road."

Tate was taken to the emergency room at Lake Granbury Medical Center. It was there a nurse suggested a CAT scan. A large mass was found on his

In the weeks that followed, Tate was diagnosed with Stage 4 Glioblastoma. He had a tumor in his brain.

On Feb. 26, 2014, Tate endured a 20hour brain surgery at MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. While in recovery, an emergency MRI revealed the tumor was bleeding, and he was back in surgery for another four hours.

The surgery was followed by inpatient rehabilitation through May 2014. He then went to Fort Sam Houston Army Post in San Antonio for outpatient rehabilitation for two years.

A result of the tumor, Tate lost half his vision in each eye, and is still working to gain strength on his right side. He has difficulty recalling words and numbers.

Medically retired from the Guard, Tate continues to push himself to re-

gain his strength. Already, Tate has exceeded expecta-

tions by the doctors.

"I wasn't expected to walk again," he said with a smile.

Now walking with a limp, he can also ride a bicycle.

"We moved to Pecan Plantation, knowing Tate can ride his bike to the Pecan Activity Center where he swims and can work out," Jessica explained. "We couldn't have made it through all

of this without the support from our parents and our church family at Acton Baptist Church.'

Daughter Abigail, 5, has been attending the Wee School preschool program at Acton Baptist. She starts kindergarten in Granbury ISD this fall.

"We believe God provided the deployment so we would learn to really

rely on Him," Jessica stated. While Tate continues his rehabilitation, Jessica works as a substitute teacher and is pursuing her degree in education.

SPECIAL WHEELCHAIR

Tate recently gained more freedom outdoors with a track-driven wheelchair. As a man who likes to hunt and fish, the all-terrain wheelchair is a blessing.

Outfitted with left-hand controls, Freedom Alliance presented the special wheelchair in May.

The nonprofit organization supports injured service members with rehabilitation and recovery, outdoor adventure trips, retreats and scholarships.

Freedom Alliance has found that independence and freedom of mobility keep veterans motivated in their rehabilitation. Twenty-five all-terrain wheelchairs have been provided. More information can be found at https:// freedomalliance.org

CLOSING WORDS

"Oh, there's one more thing I want to tell you," Tate said as his interview with the Hood County News was winding down.

"The day before we deployed to Afghanistan, Staff Sgt. Trent (driver of the truck) told me something.

"He said, 'Hey Landin, I'm with you.' "I said 'Yeah, you're with me. We're

together on this.' At first Tate didn't really know what

he meant. "Then he said, 'I'm a believer now.

Like vou. "That's how I deal with his death. That day he was blown out of the truck. I know I will see him again some day.'
