# Council member threatens to sue city over daughter's wedding

BY KATHY CRUZ HOOD COUNTY NEWS

After council member Rose Myers threatened to sue the city over her daughter's wedding, originally scheduled for the Granbury Resort Conference Center, she was granted a deposit refund, \$3,000 to book

another venue and more than \$1,200 in loaned items.

The items were delivered to the other venue and picked up the following Monday by Parks Department employees.

Between the \$3,000 paid by the city to the other wedding venue, the lending of items for which the city normally charges and free labor by city employees, the savings on the wedding amounted to around \$5,000.

Myers said the settlement was justified due to a booking mistake. She also noted that the other venue was outdoors and there were heat advisories that

According to City Manager

Chris Coffman, the city's Meeting Facility Booking Policy authorizes the city manager to consider special adjustments on a case-by-case basis.

However, there are no written guidelines for when those special adjustments involve an

#### City manager: 'I may lose my job' over Myers issue

Granbury City Council members Tony Mobly and Rose Myers will probably have a lot to say to each other at the Sept. 5 council meeting, and it's doubtful that any of it will be pleasant.

It is City Manager Chris Coffman, though, who may have the most to lose. His job could be on the line.

Mobly has asked for an agenda item to allow for public discussion of the settlement Coffman agreed to after Myers threatened to sue the city over issues related to her daughter's wedding.

Mobly feels Coffman should never have been put in that position, and he wants the council to set guidelines for such situations going forward.

a deposit refund after they cancelled a contract with the Granbury Resort Conference Center, as well as \$3,000 to rent another ven-

ue and the loan of more than \$1,200 worth of items from the GRCC.

In email exchanges this week with the HCN while traveling for her job, Myers blamed the controversy on politics and Mobly, and said she will be ready for Mobly's "public antics" at the upcoming council meeting.

Myers also criticized the HCN, stating that in newspaper articles. Mobly is placed "on a pedestal above all others."

Mobly does not always agree with Myers and other elected officials and is quoted frequently in the newspaper.

#### WHAT IT MEANS

**AFTER** council member Rose Myers threatened to sue the city over her daughter's wedding, City Manager Chris Coffman granted her and her daughter a \$250 deposit refund, \$3,000 for another venue and more than \$1,200 in borrowed items.

AS a member of the City Council, Myers is one of Coffman's bosses.

**ANGERED** by the situation, council member Tony Mobly has asked that an item be placed on the Sept. 5 agenda so that the matter can be discussed publicly.

MYERS, who is up for re-election and has a challenger, blamed the controversy on politics and Mobly.

**SHE** said the wedding was held at an outdoor venue on a day when there were heat advisories, and that there were extra costs involved that were not covered by the city.

**REGARDING** Mobly's claim that she has threatened the city manager with his job, Myers said that she and other council members have made such comments in jest.

With no way of knowing the truth in a situation that involved two friends - one of whom is an elected official who is one of his bosses; the other, one of his former employees -City Manager Chris Coffman cut his, and the city's, losses.

After council member Rose Myers threatened to sue the city over her daughter's wedding, Coffman acquiesced to her demands.

He approved a deposit refund for the booking of the Granbury Resort Conference Center, \$3,000 to rent a different venue and more than \$1,200 worth of loaned items.

Coffman and Assistant City Manager Michael Ross said the situation was "highly unusual," and not just because it involved an elected official.

Both said that the settlement

was the right thing to do. "We were trying to look at this from many angles going, 'Okay, if this was just some other citizen and not a council member. would we have done it differ-

ently?" Coffman said. "And we didn't hesitate to say, 'No, we would be looking at this the exact same way."

Still, in Coffman's mind, there are questions.

For instance, could the wedding reception still have been held at the GRCC, despite what Myers has characterized as a triple-booking?

In Coffman's view, the answer is yes.

One event, a gathering of the West Texas Press Association, was moved next door to the Hilton Garden Inn and was no longer a factor, he said.

The other event, a family reunion, was being held upstairs not downstairs, where the wedding reception was to be - and was to conclude an hour-and-ahalf before the wedding.

Question 2: Did the disgruntled employee - former operations manager Cleo Brown - intend all along to give her friend Myers free items that normally

"There will be 11-foot driving lanes with 3-foot shoulders in each direction," Galindo said.



#### One killed, 3 hurt in crash near Cresson

A Granbury woman was killed after her vehicle struck a parked car on Highway 377 north of Cresson Wednesday afternoon.

Three other people were transported to hospitals after the crash, said DPS Staff Sergeant Richard A. Hunter. Three others escaped unin-

About 2:20 p.m., state troopers responded to the accident just north of Cresson in Parker County, Hunter said.

A 2012 Toyota Tundra pickup was parked on the shoulder of 377 after running out of gas, Hunter said. The driver and two passengers were inside the Tundra while two people were standing in front of the vehicle, he

For unknown reasons, a 2015 Chevrolet Equinox traveling south on 377 drifted onto the shoulder and struck the driver's side of the Toyota, Hunter said.

After the collision, the Chevrolet left the roadway, overturned and came to rest



elected official who is one of the city manager's bosses.

That may change. Council member Tony Mobly has asked that an item be placed on the Sept. 5 City Council agenda to allow for public

discussion of the situation. "It's time for this to end," Coffman said during an interview Tuesday in his office at City Hall. "I hope that the council meeting will put an end

He noted during that discussion with the HCN that he had previously turned down the request of a city employee who wanted to borrow items from the conference center for a wedding.

"We typically rent those things, but she said that was included in her rate," he said, referring to Myers.

Coffman said he cannot prove or disprove that claim, since the GRCC operations manager who was there at the time the deal was struck is no longer a city employee. The file at the conference center, he said, contained no details about ancillary items for the wedding reception.

Two years ago, Myers was the driving force behind the creation of new policies intended to stop the conference center from losing money.

Myers communicated with the HCN this week via email as

she traveled for her job. She answered some, but not all, of the HCN's questions.

One of the questions that went unanswered was: "Since you have been very involved in the GRCC - taking the lead in restructuring the partnership between the GRCC and the Hilton Garden Inn - should you not have been aware that these materials/services are charged separately?"

In one of her messages to the HCN, Myers wrote that "all wedding arrangements, contracts and most communications" were initiated by her daughter.

"She is an adult, this was her wedding and her day," Myers

But, according to Coffman, it was Myers - not her daughter who threatened to sue the city. And he said it was Myers who requested the venue payment and loaned items on top of the \$250 deposit refund.

#### COUNCILWOMAN, MOTHER Myers defended her actions

in seeking a settlement from

the conference center.

"I understand as a taxpayer and on a personal level how important it is for us to bring that conference center up to everyone's expectations," she wrote in one of her emails.

Myers detailed that the wedding had to be cancelled 44 days prior to the event because it came to light that the GRCC was "triple-booked" for that particular Saturday in late July.

The triple-booking, she said, led to additional costs being incurred and created "chaos' around her daughter's special day after invitations had already been mailed.

Regarding her threat to sue the city, she wrote: "I had every intention of protecting my daughters (sic) privacy and ability to move forward with the wedding by providing legal representation due to the political infusion associated with her day."

A situation connected to the wedding reception was discussed by the City Council, at Mobly's request, during a closed door session in June.

Mobly said he was concerned that Myers had violated the City Charter by improperly interjecting herself into a personnel matter when Coffman accepted the resignation of Cleo Brown, who was the GRCC's operations manager.

Myers said there was nothing wrong in her communications to Coffman, in which she made clear her frustrations over Brown's departure.

Myers and her daughter cancelled the contract with the GRCC on June 7, the same day the HCN published an article about Myers' communications with Coffman over Brown's resignation.

#### **STOPPING THE THREAT**

Both Coffman and Assistant City Manager Michael Ross said that agreeing to Myers' terms was cheaper for city taxpayers than a lawsuit.

Ross said it was only the second time in his 35-year career that he has dealt with a situation in which an elected official threatened to sue the municipality they serve.

"The key to anyone threatening legal action, including a council member, is that it automatically triggers that thought process in the (city) manager's mind of 'Okay, I want to cost the city the least amount of money," Ross said.

Coffman stated: "If I had said no, there would have been a lawsuit. I'm confident of that. So I think, under risk management practices, I did the very best that I could under the constraints that we had."

Just under that message is this one: "7/21/17 - Additional items requested and picked up by Rose Myers. Approved by Chris Coffman.'

The contract for the facility rental states a figure of \$1,200 but includes a standard \$300 discount due to the booking of 25 hotel rooms. The total cost for the 12-hour booking was

Coffman said a refund of the deposit was issued to Myers' daughter. He also said that he feels the agreed-upon settlement was "fair."

"We made a mistake by letting them book that wedding to begin with," he said, referring to confusion over a press association booking that set off a chain of unfortunate events.

Myers wrote in an email to the HCN: "Any mother of the bride would have protected her family - again, why should my daughter be treated any differently because I happen to serve on the city council?

cording to Coffman) contained no details that would either have backed up or refuted Myers claim that the items were included in the rental price?

"Is that why she was so upset because I let Cleo leave?" Coffman said, referring to emails and text messages he received from an annoyed Myers when he accepted Brown's resignation in June.

Those exchanges were the subject of an article in the HCN's June 7 issue.

'I can't answer that," Coffman continued. "All I know is, it's put me in a very difficult position."

Question 4: Did Myers cancel the event, getting a deposit refund plus almost \$5,000 in perks, in a fit of pique because Coffman allowed Brown to resign without trying to convince her to stay?

After Brown's departure, Myers, Coffman said, "did not want to have the wedding there with the staff that I have.'

In an email sent by Myers to Coffman on June 7 detailing reasons for the cancellation of the GRCC booking, she wrote:

"Exchanges between the current manager at the GRCC did not focus on how to move the wedding forward. We lack the confidence that the GRCC can provide the wedding that this bride deserves."

#### **DIFFERING ACCOUNTS**

It was known almost from the beginning that there was a conflict, or possible conflict, because of the West Texas Press Association.

According to Myers and Brown, confusion was created because the WTPA was on-again, off-again before finally moving forward with their contract to book space at the GRCC.

That worked out okay, though - at least at first.

Instead of having access to the GRCC for 24 hours, which is standard with weddings and wedding receptions, the wedding party had just 12 hours, but that was doable.

The wedding was to take place at 6 p.m. under a tree by the lake, just outside the conference center. The ballroom for the reception was booked until midnight.

Due to the reduced number of hours, the group received a discount, plus the standard discount given to groups that rent a certain number of hotel rooms.

Later, it was decided that the WTPA event would be moved next door, to the Hilton Garden

However, according to Myers, it came to light after Brown's departure that someone had scheduled a family reunion for the conference center on the same day.

Coffman said he later phoned Myers with the "good news" that the family reunion scheduled for the upper floor would be over and done with by 4:30 p.m.

"She said, 'Well, they'll be in our way,' Coffman related. He said Myers then said that the wedding would be moved to the other venue, and that the city could pay for it.

Details about the booking of the family reunion may never be fully known.

"I don't know how, where, why that ever came about," said Brown. "That was a shock to me."

Coffman and Ross, though, indicated that there were many issues with Brown, including at least one other time when a double-booking occurred.

Coffman said that he discovered after the fact that Brown appeased a state government association that had been doublebooked with a Tarleton event by comping, at city expense, two continental breakfasts and a beer and a wine reception for 125 people.

Coffman said that when Brown resigned, he provided the City Council with a "summary" of her personnel file, which contains grievances filed against her by other employees and a write-up by former Assistant City Manager Sheri Campbell-Husband.

The summary is 2 1/2 pages. Assistant City Manager Michael Ross said that if Brown failed to communicate to Myers relevant information about the conference center as it related to the wedding reception, it was "ironic" since the two seem to "talk hourly."

"Text messages, everything," Coffman added. "As soon as I accepted (Brown's) resignation, within five minutes my phone was ringing, and it was her friend, the council member. So, it's been stressful."

In a conversation with the HCN on Wednesday, Brown acknowledged the friendship, but said she is friends with other city officials as well.

Regarding comped goods and services, she said policies adopted by the city two years gave her the authority to make those decisions.

Under the heading "Requests for Rental Fee Waivers," the city's Meeting Facility Booking Policy states that waivers "will require consideration and approval by the City Manager or his/her designee on a case-bycase basis."

"They gave me that authority," Brown said. "That was very clear."

#### **FEELING THE HEAT**

Coffman said that he strongly cautioned Brown against doing anything that could be viewed as giving Myers special treatment. He said he told her it would "not play well next November when she's up for re-election." Coffman also said he phoned Myers and that she fully agreed.

Myers is on the Nov. 7 ballot, and has a challenger.

Brown denied that the exchange between her and Coffman took place. She said that Coffman not only was "absolutely" aware of the arrangement regarding comped ancillary items, but even gave his approval, though she said she may not have told him about everything.

"He was fine with that," she said of the freebies. "There was no argument or disagreement.'

According to Myers, the details about those ancillary items that Coffman claims are missing or non-existent "reappeared" at the conference center on July 21.

The wedding of Myers' daughter was held at an outdoor venue, on a day when there was a heat advisory. According to Ross, the assistant city manager, the family paid the \$500 deposit, with the city paying the remaining balance of \$3,000.

Myers said the city had attempted to move the family reunion to the outdoor venue, but the owners refused out of concern over heat conditions and the age of some of the attendees.

Although the venue typically does not schedule weddings for July and August because of the summer heat, the owners agreed to accommodate the evening wedding and reception.

Myers said the venue change resulted in distress and extra expenses that were not covered by the city. Some who attended, she said, fell ill from the heat, including her daughter.

Coffman said that, under the unusual set of circumstances, he feels he did the best he could to salvage a situation that appeared headed for a lawsuit. He said he realizes that it's the

"I'm not going to answer that," he replied.

Mobly said it has happened. He said that Coffman made the claim twice about Myers during a closed session and that he (Mobly) interpreted Myers' response as an admission.

Myers wrote this in an email in reply to a question from the HCN:

"I never threatened the (city manager) with his job. In executive session we all talked about how prior to Mobly's election we gave him direction on some of the changes the city needed.

"When the changes seemed slower to complete, most everyone, at one time or another said jokingly we would fire him." Myers said Coffman told

her that he took the threat more seriously when it came from her. She said that, the next day, she met him for breakfast and gave him a book titled "The Speed of Trust."

She said she told him that she has always supported him, but "needed to trust that he wasn't playing poli-

"It was a good meeting and I thought we left it with an understanding to be truthful and honest," she wrote.

Coffman initially declined an interview with the HCN about the Myers/GRCC situation, but then relented.

Sitting at a round table in his second-floor office at City Hall where windows overlook Shanley Park, he said that he recently moved his motherin-law to Granbury and that he and his wife hope to retire

"I've weighed this very carefully in my mind," he said of speaking about Myers' lawsuit threat. "I may lose my job over this.'

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# Statue vandalism not justification to shoot, police chief says

Doing some of the things you read about on the internet could land you in jail.

The Granbury Police Department wants to stepp in and contradict one such rumor, Police Chief Mitch Galvan said.

In the frenzy of Confederate statues being removed or protested, a widely circulated Facebook post suggested that in Texas there is legal justification for shooting someone for vandalizing or damaging a statue.

That is simply not true, Galvan said.

"I was shocked by it," he said. The post, made by an individual claiming to be a Texas law enforcement officer, attempts to argue that Texas laws justify shooting a person to stop crimi-



curring at night. A local resident asked the Granbury Police Department for clarification on the law, Galvan said.

An officer found the post and discussions about

"The conversations after that post were getting out of hand. The officer wanted to post the real facts related to the law," Galvan said.

According to a rebuttal statement on the Granbury Police Department's Facebook page, it is not legal to use deadly force to stop someone from simply vandalizing a statue.

Before a person is justified to use deadly force, they must believe deadly force is the only way to protect or recover the property or that the use of less than deadly force would result in the risk of serious bodily injury or death, according to the

"When the entire statute is read, it becomes obvious this issue is not nearly as simple as some would have you believe,' the Granbury Police Department stated. "Additionally, you must ask yourself if it is worth it to take a life over a piece of property which doesn't even belong to you."

The rebuttal seems to be making an impact, at least locally, Galvan said.

"A lot of people saw it and posted back "Thanks for clearing that up," he said. "That is all we need, somebody to drive by and think someone is doing something to the General Granbury statue and start shooting." Instead, if someone sees vandalism of any kind, they should call 911 and try to remember every detail about the incident and people involved, Galvan

Don't just look for gender and age range, he said, but for hair length, facial feature, scars, tattoos, jewelry, clothing and shoes, he said. If the vandals leave the scene, take note of the direction they ran or any details about the vehicle including license plates, dents, bumper stickers, the number of doors or anything else that will let an officer pick it out of a crowd.

If possible, take a photo or write the details down, he said.

"We try to put people in the mindset that when you see something going on, start looking for details," Galvan said.



It was erected by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, General Granbury Chapter No.

Legislation in 1866 organizing Hood County specified the county seat be named in honor of the Confederate general.

Southerners built many Confederate memorials and monuments during that time, "most of which had nothing to do with the actual Civil War," said Michael Todd Landis, assistant professor of history at Tarleton State University.

"When people name towns and erect monuments, they are making a decision about which values they want to publicly display," he said. "By naming a town after a Confederate, townspeople were announcing their devotion to white supremacy and the Lost Cause."

Vircy Macatee, long consid-

ered one of the two chief local historians (Mary Kate Durham the other), shared interesting information in 1996 about the city's namesake.

Granbury was born in Mississippi in 1831, the son of a Baptist preacher. He graduated from Oakland College, a Presbyterian college, in Mississippi. Granbury, she said, stood 6

feet, 2 inches, weighed about 160 pounds, was well-built, stately and commanding. He traveled to Texas after graduation and opened a law

office in Sequin. The business didn't prosper so he began building concrete houses to take care of expenses. He later moved to Waco and

served as chief justice (today's county judge) of McLennan County from 1856-1858.

In his spare time he assisted with editing the first paper in Waco village.


"He was considered to be a profound scholar and a fluent writer," Macatee said.

#### **CALL TO ARMS**

In 1861 when the matter of secession was growing, Granbury answered the call to arms. He entered the Army of Tennessee and organized the Waco

He was promoted to major of the 7th Texas Infantry and later brigadier general for his valor at Ringgold Gap.

On a warm November afternoon, 20,000 Confederates marched toward death against Union General William Sherman in an effort to protect Tennessee and Alabama. The Battle of Franklin began that afternoon, Nov. 30. 1864. There was handto-hand fighting. With heavy losses, the Confederates were beaten back. "In places bodies

were piled seven deep," Maca-

tee said. Granbury was shot and killed. Major General Pat Cleburne was also killed, as were three other Confederate generals.

General Granbury was buried in a pauper's grave in Ashwood Cemetery, Columbia, Tennes-

Twenty-nine years later the former Confederate soldiers in the Hood County area pooled resources to bring Granbury's remains to be buried in the

town named in his memory. On Nov. 30, 1893 about 5,000 people were in town for the ceremony. Eleven Union veterans were present.

"This showed the esteem that both Confederates and Federals held for General Granbury,' Macatee said. "Col. M.D. Herring, a friend of General Granbury, said at the reinternment ceremony that the freedom of the Negro was not the issue of the war. The Southern soldier did not fight for slavery. The Confederates - the rebels as they were called - fought for a

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# Sky's the limit for students

# Pupil-built plane lifts off, flies

recently took to the sky and flew perfectly, school officials said.

Twenty-four Granbury High School students constructed the full-sized two-seat plane last school year.

"This is a success story of a concept turned into reality - a story of volunteerism, discovery, adventure, learning, a passion and a gift passed on to youth by Hood County adult volunteers," GHS aerospace engineering teacher Mark Kirk said.

The Eagle's Nest program was first proposed last summer by Granbury Regional Airport operations supervisor Pat Stewart to Granbury ISD Superintendent Jim Largent, and career and technical education director Judy Gentry.

The proposal was to allow a foundation named Eagle's Nest Projects to provide an airplane kit to GHS to be assembled by the students with local volunteer mentors overseeing the as-

The GISD leadership accepted the challenge and provided facilities for which to build the

Lead mentor Kevin Ross and about 12 other local mentors joined Kirk to guide the students in the assembly from start to finish in about eight months.

The Van's RV-12 model allaluminum airplane was constructed from a kit composed of thousands of parts and hundreds of plan sheets.

The bulk of the airplane is riveted together using common shop and metal working tools. The students learned to install the flight controls, engine, fuel system, and a total electrical system to include modern electronic instrumentation and an autopilot.

The airplane features the latest safety equipment and stateof-the-art moving map navigation and computerized engine monitoring, school officials said.

Soon to feature school colors including mascot graphics, the first plane will fly out of Granbury Regional Airport for two years, and GHS aerospace students will be eligible to receive up to 20 hours of free flight instruction in the aircraft that they built. To be eligible for the instruction, students must pass a Federal Aviation Administration written examination for a private pilot license.

A maiden voyage is forthcoming once the plane has completed required initial flights for safety purposes. The project will continue at GHS under Kirk's leadership. The next aircraft kit is due to arrive late this month, and the build will start again.

#### ROTC recognized as **Naval Honor School**

The Marine Corps JROTC unit at Granbury High School has been named a Naval Honor School for the fourth year

Only 10 percent of Marine Corps JROTC programs received this recognition.

The selection was based on several criteria, including cadet citizenship, the percentage of cadets involved in student government organizations,

#### Budget includes \$1,500 teacher salary increase

Also included is a 3 percent midpoint increase for other employees. A major expenditure is \$486,000 for five new school buses.

GISD is projected to maintain a fund balance of 33 percent of the 2017-18 operating budget. The reserve balance next August is expected to total about \$21.18 million.

In other action, board members approved a change to the 2017-18 school calendar after the Texas Education Agency adopted new dates for state

testing. The change moves a student holiday/staff workday from Monday, April 9 to Monday, April 2. Students and teachers now have a four-day Easter holiday weekend.

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

#### House legislation to modernize the appeals process

hree very important bills were passed by the House and Senate this month. The first is H.R. 2288, the Veterans Appeals Improvement and Modernization Act of 2017, which provides three important items for appeals.

First, it clarifies that in certain circumstances the VA must correct duty to assist errors unless the VA can grant the maximum

Next it provides a limited duty to assist in connection to a supplemental claim when veterans identify additional evidence to decide the claim and finally, it clarifies the difference between an "issue" and a "claim.' This provides a strategy for making the process more efficient and reducing the time it takes to decide an appeal.

Right now there are 470,000 appeals in the works and the VA estimates it would take five years just to clear the backlog. This bill works to enhance veterans' rights and provides a more efficient claim appeals

It is expected to be signed by President Trump any day now.

#### **VETERANS EDUCATION/GI BILL**

The second bill, HR 3218, The Harry W. Colmery VeterVOICE

Assistance Act of 2017, removes time restrictions to use the GI Bill allowing the benefit to be available for future eligible recipients through their lifetime instead of the

current 15 year time line. This is not a

retroactive benefit so current veterans are still subject to the law in place when they enlisted, but this is a great benefit for future generations.

#### **QUALITY EMPLOYMENT BILL**

The third bill, S.114, known as the VA Choice and Quality Employment Act of 2017, was signed into law on Aug. 12.

The Veterans Choice Program was created in 2014 as a temporary program to address the long wait times veterans were experiencing at VA facilities and the travel distances for specialty care. It was originally funded with \$10 billion so when the funds run out, the program

This new bill provides for an additional \$2.1 billion to fund the VA Choice Program for six months while Congress works on its reform. It also authorized 28 major medical facilities leases and enhances the recruitment, retention and training of the VA workforce.



# Catching fish in the heat "You never know unless you

go" is probably one of better known phrases for anglers and hunters. If you can deal with the heat this time of the year, you could be surprised no matter what time you get on the water.

I generally fish early, as that is typically when the fish are the most active especially in the summer. On occasion, some folks want to go in the afternoon.

Although that would not be my first choice in the summer heat, I will take folks out when they want to go. Turned out this particular afternoon was a great time to fish Lake Granbury. The thermo-

cline on this

day was not as shallow, and fish were feeding in 15 to 20 feet of water. The thermocline was around 25 feet down.

We started catching fish at 4:30 p.m. and continued to get bites until about 7. It was a dark moon the evening before, which usually means the fish will feed during day.

A full moon, on the other hand, will generally have fish feeding at night. You just never know for sure unless you go...

As I have mentioned previously, fish get stressed in the heat and at times will not feed as often. Many species will lose weight during summer and regain it back when the fall weather cools the water.

The point here is that they still have to feed to survive in the summer.

It also doesn't hurt to be a little lucky to find them feeding in the middle of the day in August. There are ways to entice the fish to feed when you locate them.

Sometimes if there is a large school of fish present, a little competition between the predators encourages feeding. Chumming the area with diced up shad may turn on the bite, and of course thrashing the water to mimic feeding fish can bring in active predators.

Luckily on this afternoon the

fish were hungry, and catching fish was the name of the game. If you can get out on a weekday in the afternoon, you might be surprised on how well the fish can bite.

Daylight hours in the spring and summer are more conducive for evening fishing. Most every Wednesday evening, the local bass club has an evening tournament for bass anglers to try their luck.

Maybe it's a good idea to frequent the evening a little more

during the summer (if you can get away).

#### **HOOD COUNTY FISHING REPORT**

Lake Granbury water temperatures are in the upper 80s. As I mentioned in the article, a thermocline continues to be present around 20 to 25 feet down.

Black bass to 7 pounds continue to be good near main lake points with deeper water close by. The black bass are schooling with the sand bass near the deCordova subdivision.

Sand bass have been fair on slabs and hellbender/pet spoon combinations. Stripers are good to 12 pounds on live shad fished near creek channel ledges on the lower ends.

Catfish are good to excellent in the same areas as the stripers on cut shad. I do not have a

crappie report. Squaw Creek tilapia continue to be good to excellent on worms fished under a cork. Largemouth bass are being caught in numbers with an occasional fish to 8 pounds being caught.

Days where you catch 30 to 50 bass are possible.

On other close reservoirs, Possum Kingdom and Whitney reservoirs are producing limits of stripers on most days on live bait and down-rigging jigs with curly tail trailers. Black bass on Whitney are good to 10 pounds on deep-diving crankbaits and Texas-rigged soft plastics near points near cliffs.





causes a devastating tree disease called oak wilt.

It is a major problem in live oaks, Shumard oaks, Spanish oaks, water oaks, black jack oaks and other members of the red oak family.

Although oak wilt can be fatal, it can be managed with early identification and a precise di-

Indicators of oak wilt include foliar symptoms, patterns of tree mortality and the presence of fungal mats. Leaves on diseased live oaks often develop yellow veins.

Defoliation may be rapid; damaged leaves are often found beneath the tree. Some live oaks escape infection, others decline over time, but most die within six months after symptoms ap-

Foliar symptoms in red oaks are less distinct. In spring, young leaves simply wilt, fade and turn brown. Mature leaves develop dark green "water soaking" marks, fade and then turn bronze starting at the leaf margins and moving inwards.

Red oaks seldom survive oak wilt and often die within 3-4 weeks after symptoms appear.

The mats, which may have a fruity odor, grow in the narrow cracks and hollow areas of the tree bark. These fungal mats typically do not form on red oaks that become infected in

became infected the previous

spring to summer. The oak wilt fungus spreads when wood from infected oaks is moved to another location.

Fungal mats on diseased trees, stumps or logs also lure sap-feeding beetles, which spread the disease when they visit other trees.

Also, in dense groups of live oaks, the disease spreads underground up to 150 feet in all directions through interconnected tree roots.

Preventing new infections starts with removing any disfeet deep and 100 feet beyond the infection perimeter) can disrupt root connections to reduce spread.

Injections of the appropriate fungicide (propiconazole) to individual high-value trees helps reduce crown loss and extend tree life. These measures do not "cure" oak wilt, but they reduce tree loss.

All wounds on oaks, such as pruning cuts, should be avoided February - June. The least risky times to prune oaks are the coldest and hottest days of the year. Regardless of the season, all cuts to oak trees, stumps or roots should be painted immediately with a wound or latex paint to minimize insect contact and infection. Cover firewood from diseased trees and store it in clear plastic with the edges buried to prevent insects from leaving the wood pile. When replanting in areas where oak wilt is present, select trees less susceptible to the disease, such as chinquapin oak.

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# A welcoming smile

#### Hospital volunteers focus on injecting cheer, helpfulness where they can

eople usually don't come to the hospital because it's a good day. But at Lake Granbury Medical Center, a group of dedicated volunteers is working to lighten the emotional load where they can.

"I tell all the volunteers to be friendly. Smile and say hello," said Valta Heffley.

She and her husband Gerald Heffley have been volunteering at the hospital for a little over 10 years and became the volunteer coordinators nine years ago, she said.

"Even if they don't respond, just be friendly and smile," she continued. "Usually we are the first people patients see. If we aren't happy, the whole hospital isn't a happy place."

LGMC volunteers are part of the Lake Granbury Medical Center Auxiliary, a nonprofit that operates independently of the medical center, the Heffleys explained.

The auxiliary raises money for local causes including scholarships. But a big part of what they do is provide support to different hospital departments, they said.

A former schoolteacher, Valta got involved at the hospital before pulling Gerald in.

"I decided after I retired, we didn't have anything to do," she said. "So I started working here. We enjoy it so much. We didn't want to just watch TV.'

"I tell people if we didn't come here to volunteer in the afternoons, we would just sit and look at each other," Gerald explained.

"And that gets old," Valta chimed in.

Valta spends most of her time in the nursery, answering phones, fetching warm blankets and numerous other small tasks that free up the doctors and nurses to directly care for their small patients.

Until recently, Gerald worked at an outpatient physical therapy clinic until it was reabsorbed into the main medical center location.

Now he works at the various front desks, greeting and directing patients and their families. When he works the surgery check in desk, he ensures every patient is checked in on time and is escorted back to their proper room, he said.

But their job as coordinators has given them lots of experience in all positions, Valta said.

THE VALUE OF A SMILE: Valta and Gerald Heffley are always ready to welcome staff, patients and their family members to the Lake Granbury Medical Center. The couple have been the auxiliary volunteer coordinators for

Currently, the auxiliary has about 63 volunteers that can be scheduled for half-day shifts, Valta said. But many of the volunteers are seniors, so some take off during the summer when it is too hot, or have medical issues that prevent them from coming in at times, she explained.

When there aren't enough volunteers to man the minimum

of four positions during normal hours, the Heffleys step in.

The volunteer work is not just a social opportunity, but an opportunity to learn more about the community, Valta said.

"I didn't know what went on in the world. I taught school, I thought I knew everything," she said.

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


