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Man sentenced to life for murder

A Hood County man was given a life sentence after a jury found him guilty of murdering his landlord.

Michael Loren Jacobs, 57, beat and shot to death 75-year-old Floyd Flud on June 24, 2015.

The two had a rocky relationship, according to testimony. Jacobs will be eligible for parole after 30 years, when he's

85. The trial began on Tuesday and included two and a half days of testimony from more than 20 witnesses and more than 100 pieces of evidence.

Flud was found dead on the floor of his mechanics shop at 1111 Mambrino Highway, according to testimony.

Jacobs claimed self-defense. Flud had been beaten repeatedly with a heavy object on his face, hands and arms, according to Dr. Marc Krouse, medical examiner for Tarrant County.

Part of his lower jaw had become detached from his head during the beating, he testified. Blood loss from the beating alone would have been life threatening, Krouse said.

A shotgun wound to Flud's shoulder would have caused

him to bleed out quickly, Krouse said. A pistol shot to the back of Flud's head would have been instantly fatal, he told the jury.

His examination suggested Flud was not breathing when the damage occurred to his face, Krouse testified, contradicting Jacobs' testimony that he struck Flud only before Flud was shot.

Jacobs took the stand and told the jury he was not guilty of murder.

"I killed that man, but I did not murder him," Jacobs said. According to Jacobs, Flud had offered to let Jacobs live on his property in exchange for handyman work. Flud pulled a gun on Jacobs several times in the months he stayed there, Jacobs said. At about 10 p.m. on June 23, he told Flud he was going to move out in the morning, and Flud became angry with him, Jacobs said.

Flud pointed a shotgun at him and pulled the trigger, but there was no cartridge in the chamber, Jacobs testified. As Flud chambered a shell, Jacobs wrestled him to the ground. "I velled, 'Give me the gun,

Floyd, give me the gun," Jacobs shouted from the witness stand in agitation.

Jacobs said he hit Flud on the head with a jackstand used to lift a car off the ground.

"I was thinking, 'He is not getting up with the gun,'" Jacobs said.

Jacobs said he continued to hit Flud with the riser from the jack until he was able to grab the stock of the shotgun. When he pulled the gun from Flud's grasp, the gun went off, Jacobs said.

He said he took the shells out of the shotgun and realized Flud was dead.

Until daylight, Jacobs said he wandered from the shop to his trailer in a daze, at one point retrieving the pistol from a desk drawer in the shop and shooting Flud again, he said.

He then drove Flud's truck to a friend's house off Fall Creek Highway to ask them to care for Jacobs' dog, Jacobs said.

Gayla Williams, who was at the house off Fall Creek, testified Jacobs told her about the killing and that he had "'beat him, and beat him, until I couldn't beat him no more," she said. District Attorney Rob Christian read excerpts from Jacobs' diary that outlined his hostility towards Flud whom he said was a "lying," "vindictive," "know-itall" who he blamed for preventing him from legally registering his truck and moving on.

Jacobs confirmed the words in the journal reflected his feelings at the time he wrote them.

Former Hood County Sheriff's Office investigator Sonny Frisbie testified that in his experience the extent of Flud's injuries and the lack of injury to Jacobs was not consistent with self-defense. Frisbie is trained in blood splatter patterns, and he is a licensed mortician who assisted with the crime scene.

Jacobs had several health issues that delayed the case coming to trial, Christian said.

Contract awarded for \$3.3 million library expansion

Bedford-based Modern Contractors, Inc. has been awarded the contract for the library expansion project.

The Commissioners Court approved the recommendation brought forth by architect Alan Magee and county Purchasing Agent Nelda Walters at its regular meeting Tuesday.




The vote of the Commissioners Court to approve Modern Contractors, Inc. was unanimous.

After the vote, Magee told commissioners that he will have further information for them about the project in early October.

He said that both the city's Historic Preservation Commis







ern Contractors before, but the company was chosen for the library job because it bested competitors in the RFP (Request for Proposals) process.

"We had nine respondents, which, from what I understand, is phenomenal," Walters told commissioners.

Magee said that Modern Contractors' bid to serve as the "manager at risk" for the project was \$305,450 - \$117,884 less than the second-best proposal. The figure represents a basic fee covering overhead and profit, Magee said.

The company also offered the lowest percentage fee for their portion of the work, he said. It sion and the Hood County Historical Commission have unanimously expressed support for the expansion.

Magee also said that issues related to zoning and parking are making their way through city channels and will soon go before the City Council.

The \$3.3 million expansion of the Hood County Library on Travis Street will involve expanding the building at the back end, which faces Shanley Park and the back of City Hall. That expanded area will have a second story.

911 dispatch to get new equipment

Sometimes, lightning really does strike twice in the same place, and maybe even more than that.

Lightning strikes are among the reasons Sheriff Roger Deeds asked for permission from the Commissioners Court to spend up to \$100,000 to replace the dispatch console and interface equipment, radios and power supplies for 911 dispatch.

Money to cover the cost will be moved from eight accounts, including Fuel, Uniforms & Accessories, Radio Maintenance and Computer Maintenance. Deeds said that the current console was purchased in June of 2009 "after a bad lightning strike."

There were other lightning strikes over the last couple of years, he said.

"It's cheaper just to move forward and buy new stuff" so that the problematic equipment will not cause problems for emergency services, he said.

Deeds said that it will take six weeks for the new equipment to arrive.

"It's expensive to get it all done, but it's definitely needed," he said.

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County clarifies home quarantines for rabies

The county has more clearly defined its policy for home quarantines for animals who must be observed for rabies.

Home quarantines are allowed under state law, but counties have authority over how those quarantines are managed.

When an animal bites or scratches someone and must be placed under rabies observation, they can be quarantined three ways: at Animal Control, at a veterinarian's office or at home.

For home quarantines to be

allowed, though, certain criteria must be met.

According to the policy adopted this week by the Commissioners Court, the requirements for a home quarantine are:

The animal's rabies vaccination must have been current at the time of the bite or scratch;

They must not have been at large (roaming freely) at the time of the bite or scratch;

The victim is the owner or a person who lives at the same residence as the animal, or is an adult victim who consents to the home quarantine;

The owner has a secured

facility, such as a kennel, that is approved by the local rabies authority;

■ If the animal becomes ill during the 10-day quarantine period, the owner must notify the local authority;

The owner must sign an agreement to abide by the terms and conditions; and

The local rabies authority must observe the animal on the first and last day of the quarantine period.

Before the vote was taken to approve the policy, Precinct 4 Commissioner Steve Berry expressed concern that everyone be treated equally and be granted permission for a home quarantine if they meet the criteria.

County Attorney Matt Mills said that he worked with the sheriff's office to draft the revised policy.


"I'm not too worried that they're just going to arbitrarily say, 'Well, I don't like you and we're not going to let you qualify," Mills said.

Sheriff Roger Deeds said Wednesday that, with the revised policy, "the county attorney's happy, the commissioners are happy, everybody's happy."

"It's just more clarified now," he said.



The YMCA of Hood County now has 48 more parking spaces.


The additional spaces were completed Tuesday.

Time to apply pre-emergents for your lawn

very year the dog days of summer get me down about my lawn. By the end of August,

I am thinking it is way too hot and dry for weeds to germinate, and I need to wait a few weeks to put down pre-emergent for cool season weeds.

It always seems like the cool weather will then slip up on me, and I miss getting it down early enough.

With the recent rains and the cooler weather the last couple of weeks, I think we have been given notice not to be late with our pre-emergent.

Generally we want to put down a pre-emergent herbicide in early September to help prevent weeds such as poa annua and henbit from germinating.

These weeds will begin germinating with adequate moisture when soil temperatures begin to cool. By getting your pre-emer-

weeds in our lawns.

Both weeds mentioned will soon be germinating with cooler temperatures and some fall time moisture.

Henbit is probably one of the top 10 most despised lawn weeds. This weed is the one that produces purple flowers from March through May.

While the purple flowers are pretty to look at, most people would rather not have them

taking over their St. Augustine yard. Another culprit of ruining springtime lawns is a small clump grass called poa annua or annual bluegrass.

Like henbit, this weed will grow all winter but will really begin to show up in late winter and early spring as soon as we get a few warm days.

Control of both winter and summer turf grass weeds starts with good cultural practices. Practices such as proper mowing heights, proper mowing intervals, good fertilization programs and a good watering program that supports deep root development go a long way in controlling weeds.

A good first step is to use a pre-emergent herbicide to prevent the weed seeds that are present from germinating.

When looking at pre-emergent products, it is important to look at the label to make sure

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
the product is labeled for the type of grass that you have and that it controls the weeds you are after.

After applying the herbicide at the labeled rate, be sure to water it in with at least onehalf inch of water. Allowing the product to lay out in the sunlight reduces the effectiveness of the product.

Hopefully, a little effort this fall will go a long way in getting your yard off to a good start next spring.

Don't forget: if summer weeds have been a problem late February, now is a good time to put out a pre-emergent for summer weeds such as crabgrass and grass burs.





Cash donations puts money in the hands of organizations who are active in the direct rebuilding and have better knowledge of the items they need to carry out their work.

If you choose to provide personal assistance to the rebuilding and recovery process you need to be able to provide assistance and not become a part of the problem.

To provide personal assistance you need to realize that you will have to provide your own housing, transportation, water, food and tools.

You should have special skills in rebuilding homes, infrastructure, medical training and counseling skills. Additionally, you need to be healthy and physically fit. The restoration of coastal Texas will require a volunteer to work long hours under difficult conditions.

As stated earlier, cash is probably the best way to provide assistance, but you need to beware of scams.

The Houston Chronicle provided a list of responsible agencies that include the following: Houston Food Bank, Texas Diaper Bank, Hurricane Harvey Relief Fund, United Way of Greater Houston, Jewish Foundation of Greater Houston, Good Samaritan's Purse and the Salvation Army.

There are many other trusted organizations, but you need to be aware of criminals who take advantage of these disasters.

The internet makes it easy for scam artists to operate successfully. It is easy to establish a website using hurricane-related photographs with a link that enables donations through PayPal, and the funds may end up in the personal bank account of criminals. Be sure you properly vet anyone asking for hurricane donations, and if you discover a fraudulent website report it to the FBI, local police or Department of Public Safety.

main nameless, posted: "Her writing sucks." This was followed a few colorful sentences later with "The paper is a rag."

Any reporter who has ever done his or her job has been the target of similar posts, tweets, letters, emails, etc. And any reporter worth his or her salt has laughed them off, then sat down at their computer to write the next story.

While I think that Swindler's idea is brilliant and witty (just imagine how funny it would be to see incredibly mean, vile comments written in grandmotherly cross-stitching), what's not funny is that some journalism professors are now advising students to take courses in self defense and consider getting a concealed handgun license

Seriously, they are. They've told me so.

A few years ago, my friend Tommy Thomason and I wrote a book for journalists called "You Might Want to Carry a **Gun: Community Newspapers** Expose Big Problems in Small Towns.

Tommy is founding director of the Schieffer School of Journalism at Texas Christian University and also founding director of the TCU-based Texas Center for Community Journalism.

Though many people might assume that it's investigative reporters at large metropolitan newspapers who face the greatest physical dangers, Tommy and I know that this is not always the case.

Big fish in small ponds can have piranha teeth.

On Monday, Tommy - and our book - were included in a piece about rural journalism written by Washington Post media columnist Margaret Sullivan.

"Some of these small-town officials think they've been elected deities," Tommy was quoted saying.

Former Whitley County, Kentucky, Sheriff Lawrence Hodge might fit into that category.

Hodge's behavior became odd and combative whenever Swindler requested to view his department's evidence log.

Swindler and Sulfridge ultimately revealed to their readers that 78 confiscated firearms were unaccounted for and \$125,000 was missing from the sheriff's accounts.

As things heated up, the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives got involved. An agent advised Swindler and Sulfridge on ways to stay safe.

Swindler bought a .38. She kept it in the glove box of her car and in the house with her when she was home.

The start of 2010 brought more stories and more trouble for the sheriff.

The newspaper reported that a majority of felony drug cases handled by the sheriff's department had not resulted in felony convictions because charges had been dismissed, cases were downgraded to misdemeanors or deputies had failed to show up to testify.

As the walls closed in, the sheriff became more threatening. This only made Swindler and Sulfridge more determined to continue their reporting.

One day, while Sulfridge was at home in the shower, his cell phone rang. It was the ATF agent.

"Get out of there," he told the young reporter. "We've received a credible threat on your life.'

For several weeks, Sulfridge was in hiding, with federal agents moving him from motel to motel.

On Nov. 1, 2010, he returned to the mobile home he shared with his mother. She was in Mexico and, danger or no danger, there were animals

traffickers who supplied him with controlled substances to operate freely within the county.

His former bookkeeper admitted to felony embezzlement, and signed a plea agreement stating that she had helped her boss embezzle or launder almost \$223,000.

She testified that Hodge had kept 50 percent of the illgotten gains while she and a co-worker split the other 50 percent.

Williamsburg attorney Ronnie Wayne Reynolds admitted that he and the sheriff had conspired to extort money from defendants in felony drug cases. Hodge would refer clients to Reynolds, and then Reynolds would guarantee them that the charges would be dropped or reduced if they made a "donation" to the sheriff's department.

Reynolds' law license was suspended and he was sentenced to two years and three months in federal prison.

As for Hodge, he was sentenced to federal prison, too. On Sept. 28, 2011, he was sentenced to 15 years and six months. His laundry list of offenses included three counts of tampering with physical evidence and 18 counts of abuse of public trust.

You would think that the Times-Tribune's readers would have appreciated the editor-reporter team that put a stop to the sheriff's endangerment of the public and his theft of their coffers, right? Wrong.

Despite the mountain of evidence and federal prison sentence, some continued to insist that the newspaper's stories had been politically motivated.

Swindler did not receive many thank you cards from the citizens she had worked hard to protect.

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

The Tolar Lady Rattlers trailed two sets to none at Eastland Tuesday night.



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






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

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PUBLIC NOTICE **Brief Explanatory** Statements of Proposed **Constitutional Amendments Special Election**, November 7, 2017

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 21)

HJR 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Texas legislature to expand the circumstances under which a partially disabled veteran or their spouse may qualify for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the veteran's residence homestead. Currently, the Texas legislature may provide that a partially disabled veteran or their spouse is entitled to an exemption from ad valorem taxation of a percentage of the market value of the disabled veteran's residence homestead only if the residence homestead was do-nated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization at no cost to the veteran. The amendment would allow the Texas legislature to provide that the exemption also may be taken when the residence homestead was donated, sold, or transferred to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead. The amendment also harmonizes certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead and harmonizing certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 60)

SJR 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to require that certain conditions be met for the refinancing of a home equity loan to be secured by a voluntary lien on a homestead. The amendment also would: redefine what is excluded in the calcu-

lation of the cap on fees associated with a home equity loan, lower the cap from 3% to 2% of the original principal amount of the extension of credit, and specify that such fees are in addition to any bona fide discount points used to buy down the interest rate. The amendment would further specify the list of authorized lenders to make home equity loans, change the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, allow agricultural property owners to acquire home equity loans, and update technical terminology in the Texas Constitution. The amendment would be effective on January 1. 2018, and applicable only to a home equity loan made or refinanced on or after that date.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and removing certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establishing certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, changing certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, changing the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allowing home equity loans on agricultural homesteads."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 34)

SJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prevent certain office holders from serving indefinitely beyond the expiration of their term. Office holders who are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate and receive no salary would only be able to serve until the last day of the first regular session of the Texas legislature that begins after their term expires.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment limiting the service of certain officeholders appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate after the expiration of the per-son's term of office."

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 6)

SJR 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to require any court that is hearing a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute to notify the attorney general of that challenge, if the party raising the challenge notifies the court that the party is challenging the constitutionality of such statute. Additionally, the amendment would allow the Texas legislature to set a period of not more than 45 days following the notification to the attorney general that the court must wait before rendering a judgment that a state statute is unconstitutional

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional.'

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 100)

HJR 100 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide a more detailed definition of "professional sports team" for purposes of their charitable foundations, which the Texas legislature may permit to hold charitable raffles. The amendment also deletes a requirement that an eligible professional sports team charitable foundation permitted by the Texas legislature to hold charitable raffles had to be in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charitable raffles.

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature by general law to provide that a surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty is entitled to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the surviving spouse's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. It would also allow the Texas legislature to provide that the surviving spouse, who qualifies

and receives the exemption and then qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead, receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation of the different homestead in an amount equal to the dollar amount of the exemption of the first homestead for which the exemption was received in the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption for that first homestead. Like the initial exemption, this benefit will only remain available if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2018.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 37)

HJR 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to make an exception to the law regarding the award of certain prizes. Currently, the Texas Constitution requires the Texas legislature to pass laws prohibiting lotteries, raffles, and other programs where the award of gifts is based on luck or chance. The proposed amendment would make an exception to this general rule to allow the Texas legislature to authorize credit unions and other financial institutions to institute programs which, in order to encourage savings, would award prizes based on luck or chance to the credit union's or financial institution's customers.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings."

person on the 1990s Atlanta Falcons, but I know all about (and have repeated several times in backyard football games) the "Dirty Bird" touchdown dance that they popularized. The Chicago Bears made an entire music video, the Super Bowl Shuffle, and that's still looked upon fondly.

But there's a contingent of grouches that just want players to flip the ball to the referee and walk away after scoring a touchdown. "Act like you've been there before" is the common refrain.

And I agree with them. Act like you've been there before - have a pre-planned dance and communicate with your teammates so you're all on the same page about which routine you're doing this time.

The NFL has become a bit more lax on this, which is surprising considering it normally rivals the MLB in the race to become the most stodgy league in professional sports. But pro football now allows coordinated team celebrations, and I think that's a step in the right direction.

Service your rquipment before the feeding frenzy

any of us will use days when we cannot get on the water to work on servicing our equipment.

This might be the best time to be prepared for the fall feeding frenzy, and maybe the winter as well.

Though I do not totally put up my equipment in any season, I can get my winter equipment up to par for the winter season, and I can also service my live bait rods and reels, as they do not get much action in the winter.

I have to admit, I don't generally have a lot of time between trips, but if you don't at least retie knots you will pay with lost fish.

After each fishing trip, I will pull out enough line off the reel to where I feel no rough spots on the line. I then retie and put a new leader on, etc.

I do this for every pole used during the previous fishing trip. This little effort is extremely important, as breakoffs due to worn line and/or old knots are minimized.

When the level of the line on the spool gets a little low (probably around 50 percent), I then will generally replace the main line.

If you don't use your equipment that often, it is still a good idea to replace your monofilament on a regular interval to avoid age-related failures regardless of the level on the spool.

I like to use clear Berkley Big Game or Stren, as it is relatively inexpensive and is a good main line. After removing the old line, this is where I like to clean and grease the reel - not only the reel internals but also the level wind.

The level wind is open to the air and weather more so than the reel internals and warrants the additional attention.

After cleaning and greasing, I put the reel back on the rod and fill the reel with line, adding fluorocarbon leader and the end lure or live bait setup as appropriate to make it completely ready.

Braided lines can age as well. Many will put a monofilament backing on the reel and tie on the braided over the mono,

I like using a fluorocar-**OUTDOORS** bon leader on both my "lure"

rods and my "bait" rods. Fluorocarbon is much more expensive than most fishing lines, and that is

why I only use Mike Acosta it as a leader. Unfair Advantage Fluorocar-Charters bon needs to be replaced

more frequently than other monofilaments. Fluorocarbon is virtually invisible, limp and has little stretch, which makes it a good choice, but its weaker point is its knot strength.

Just make sure you wet your line before you cinch up the knot when using fluorocarbon. as vou can overstress the knot. The stealth of fluorocarbon will put more fish in the boat, especially when fishing in clearer water.

Learn your knots. I generally use a palomar for tying to a swivel or to the lure. I use a Seaguar knot for tying the fluorocarbon to the main monofilament.

See you on the water.

Gianna Jessen was intended to die before she was born. She was bathed in a burning saline solution in an attempted abortion.

Instead, she entered the world two months premature and weighing just 2 1/2 pounds. She spent her first couple of months in a hospital. Eventually, she entered the foster care system.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES

The failed abortion provided the "gift" of cerebral palsy, as Jessen calls it on her website. "It allows me to really depend on Jesus for everything," she said. Doctors predicted Jessen would never lift her head. Instead, she was walking at age 3 and in recent years has run marathons.

The 2012 movie "October Baby" was loosely based on Jessen's life story. The single, "Ocean Floor," provided the emotional point during the film and was sung by Jessen.

Jessen, now 30, travels the world as a pro-life and disability rights activist.

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


