Pastor Council's questions to candidates draw scrutiny

The Hood County Pastor Council is involved in another rumpus related to the Granbury School Board election, though it is not yet clear whether it will amount to much.

The group created a stir in late July and early August when it published ads in the Hood County News containing lengthy messages to the community that were critical of the superintendent and school board.

The ads accused some among the district's leadership of promoting liberal agendas and principles not in line with Christian values.

The council's president, Mark Roath, pastor at Acton Baptist Church, later wrote a Letter to the Editor apologizing to those who had been offended by the ads.

The new controversy, if it can yet be called that, involves a questionnaire that was sent on behalf of the council to the five school board candidates.

Three candidates - Kim Cruz, Maureen Griffin and Michael Moore - are

vying for the Place 1 seat vacated by Chris Tackett. Incumbent Barbara Herrington is being challenged for the Place 2 seat by Dinae Hicks.

The HCN attempted on Monday to contact all of candidates after a concerned citizen brought a copy of the questionnaire to the newspaper's offices on Friday.

That person, who asked not to be identified, expressed concern about the appropriateness of the questions, the limited word count for explaining viewpoints and ambiguity in, for instance, question number 3.

That question is: "Do teachers have any responsibility to promote traditional morality in the classroom?" No explanation of what constitutes "traditional morality" is provided.

The 9-question survey includes questions about whether parents should be able to opt their children out of classes they consider to be religiously offensive, whether evolution should be the only view presented to students regarding the origins of life and whether sex education should be "solely abstinence-based."

CANDIDATE REACTIONS

Four candidates - Herrington, Griffin, Moore and Cruz - weighed in on the survey.

The HCN did not hear back from Hicks by press time.

Herrington, Moore and Cruz said they have no problem with the questions. Griffin does not feel they are appropriate.

Herrington and Cruz said they will submit answers. Moore and Griffin said Monday afternoon that they had not yet decided.

Herrington said the questions are "directly related" to decisions she has made or might make on the school board and which reflect Hood County's "conservative community."

She stated, however, that some of the questions "are much more subjective, with less of a direct connection" and some involve issues that are determined at the state, not the local, level.

Moore indicated that he, too, takes issue with some of the questions, such as whether curriculum and instructional materials should be made available to parents.

They already are, he said.

Griffin praised a candidate questionnaire prepared by Granbury High School students, which she said shows an understanding of school board members' responsibilities. But she feels that the Pastor Council survey does not show that same level of understanding.

"I don't think it reflects the roles and the responsibilities of a school board trustee as defined by the Granbury Independent School District," she said.

The GUSD's website states that trustee responsibilities include curriculum, school taxes, the annual budget, facilities and employment of the superintendent and other professional staff.

Herrington, Moore and Griffin all hold the view that the 15-word limit on any questions not answered with a simple "yes" or "no" is inadequate. Moore said that some of the questions "are not an easy yes or no answer."

Herrington stated: "Some of the questions needed more than 15 words. I fully explained myself and exceeded

4. Should evolution be the only view of the origins of life presented to students?

Vegas concert turns to nightmare; Granbury grads thankful to be alive

Gunshots turned a fun Las Vegas concert into a nightmare for two Granbury graduates.

Rowdy Moore, a 2008 STARS Academy graduate, and his wife, Kristen, were taking in the Jason Aldean concert in Las Vegas on Sunday. Kristen graduated from Granbury High School in 2009.

About four songs in, he said he realized the pops he had heard moments before were gunshots, not fireworks.

"The first person down was roughly 25 feet from us," Rowdy said.

Stephen Craig Paddock, 64, opened fire on a crowd of more than 22,000 concert-goers from a hotel room overlooking the venue, according to a statement by the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

He shot from the 32nd floor of the Mandalay Bay Hotel, according to police.

"SWAT responded to the call, breached the ho-

Misconduct ordinance may protect Allen

Tony Allen, whose phone number was allegedly connected to a threatening phone call in which a man claimed to be a Hood County News reporter, may be home free.

That may depend on whether the Granbury City Council expands the definition of official misconduct as outlined in a proposed ordinance that it tabled Monday night.

The council will revisit that ordinance at its regular meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 17.

The way it stands now, the ordinance prepared by San Antonio attorney and city charter expert Charles Zech deals only with cases involving criminal acts. It makes no mention of unethical be-

havior, or behavior unbecoming of an elected official.

It also contains language about "behavior related to official duties," which might provide even more cloud cover in cases such as the incident involving Allen.

Last Saturday, the HCN published an article detailing a phone call reportedly placed to Ovilla City Hall three days after the HCN published a Letter to the Editor from the town's mayor pro tem, David Griffin, in praise of Granbury councilman Tony Mobly.

Allen and Mobly frequently disagree. The number shown on Caller ID allegedly matched Allen's cell phone number.

Last week, Allen denied having represented himself as an HCN reporter named "Cruz." His response to the HCN

was less clear, though, on whether he had phoned Ovilla City Hall, speaking to a receptionist as well as the city secretary.

Both women claim that the "reporter" threatened to write a negative story about Griffin and submit it to Ovilla's community newspaper.

The incident involving Allen was not specifically mentioned during the almost 90-minute discussion about Zech's proposed ordinance, but there were hints that the council - with the exception of Mobly - might circle the wagons around Allen.

Gary Couch said he thought Zech would be coming back to the council with choices "other than removal" and also said he does not want council

tel room and found the suspect dead," the statement read.

At press time, 59 people had died because of the shooting and 516 people were injured, according to the police department. The numbers were expected to rise as the investigation continued.

"There was only one attacker, and his motive is unknown," the department stated on its Facebook page Monday afternoon.

Rowdy entered the Air Force after graduation and now lives in Vegas with Kristen, he said.

The couple had gotten wristbands to the concert from friends, Rowdy said.

But Sunday night turned tragic quickly.

"Three shots rang out sounding like fireworks - like Black Cats," Rowdy said.

No one really responded, he said, and Aldean continued to play.

"Then I looked over and people were pointing down," he said, to where he now assumes the first victims were.

"Then it started just ringing and ringing," he continued. "I heard roughly 100 rounds with no stop. Then a pause, then more shots ringing and ringing."

As people realized they were being fired upon, the concert turned to chaos, he said.

"People did what they say on the news, to drop down," he said. "First we ducked, and I covered my wife while looking to find the shooters."

But he saw a muzzle flash from an upstairs window and knew they had to escape, Rowdy said.

"I knew that these people laying down are literally sitting in the bright stage lights and right where the shooter had the perfect view for just laying blanket fire," he said. "So I turned, covered my wife and told her 'we have to run.'"

Thousands of people were running in every direction while others tried to lay flat on the ground.

"We ran to the Hooters Casino then through there we went to the Topgolf," Rowdy said. "We were climbing over people and jumping over bodies to get out. I tried telling people to 'run, it's not a normal shooter, take cover' but they just laid down trying to stay low."

He and Kristen ran for five or six long blocks before he felt they were safe, Rowdy said.

"She was just kinda stunned at first, then went into fleeing and was just running with pure adrenaline," he said. "She was scared. Afterwards, she was pretty distraught trying to take in everything that had happened."

The couple stayed at Topgolf until family members came to pick them up at 11 p.m., he said.

"I was thankful we were safe and saddened because I knew the devastation that was behind us," Rowdy said.

The Moores suffered only a few scratches as they fled.

They don't know any of the victims, he said.

The rising death toll has only enforced the Moores' nightmare.

"It's hitting hard," Rowdy said. "Makes everything more real, more scary, because we love going to these events. Plus

it's making us realize how easily it could have been us."

members to be given "tools to avenge each other unnecessarily."

Further in the discussion, Couch asked Zech what would constitute reasons for *not* removing someone from office. Zech declined to state specifics.

"I don't like dealing with a negative," he said.

Rose Myers made references to situations involving a council member "having it in for someone" and allegations being made "over and over again," which she said might result in people not wanting to serve in public office.

Allen, who typically is vocal at council meetings, was silent during most of the discussion.

However, near the end he raised a question of whether an accused person could recoup their attorney's fees.

A couple of people in the audience reacted to that question, saying: "No."

Zech stated that the charter has no jurisdiction over recouping attorneys fees.

that limit because a simple 'yes' or 'no' would have been misleading."

ATTEMPTS TO REACH COUNCIL

Candidates were asked to submit their answers to the council by Thursday. "These answers will then be used to create our voters guide that will be distributed in interested churches and ministries," the message to candidates said. The HCN made several efforts to obtain a comment from

a representative of the Pastor Council before press time Tuesday, but without success.

These efforts were made:

- Emails were sent on Friday and Monday to Merrie Cardin, the Pastor Council member who had emailed the questionnaires.
- An email was sent through the Pastor Council's website on Friday.
- Multiple calls were made to a phone number listed on that website, which states that callers can leave a voicemail mes-

sage. However, the system did not allow for voicemail messages to be left.

- A message was sent Monday morning to an email address listed in the ads published by the Pastor Council, but it resulted in a delivery failure notice.
- A voicemail message was left for council president Roath at Acton Baptist Church Monday morning.

Suspect caught red-handed

Hood County deputies arrested a White Settlement man inside the store he was attempting to burglarize, said Public Information Officer Lt. Johnny Rose.

Around 11 p.m. Wednesday, deputies responded to Mambrino Highway when a burglary alarm went off at the Dollar General, Rose said.

Shockley had entered the store by shattering the front glass door, Rose said.

He was arrested and charged with burglary of a building, a state jail felony.

Road-rage incident leads to drug arrest

A showdown in the middle of the street landed an intoxicated teen in jail, said Public Information Officer Lt. Johnny Rose.

Around 8 p.m. Thursday, two friends were involved in the incident starting at Temple Hall Highway and Highway 377 East, Rose said.

The female, Kaitlynn Lee Rodgers, 18, had threatening to commit suicide, he said.

The two people chased each other at high speeds before stopping in the middle of the road near Monroe Highway and Temple Hall Highway in northeast Hood County, Rose said.

Reports of shots being fired were not accurate, Rose said.

"The noise turned out to be Kaitlynn Lee Rodgers slashing her friend's vehicle tire, which

caused the friend to slash Rodgers' tire," he explained.

Rodgers threw rocks, breaking a window of the male's vehicle, but no one was injured, Rose said.

Rodgers, who was intoxicated, fought deputies when they arrested her, he said. A gram of marijuana was found her possession, he added.

The male driver was released, he said.

Rodgers was charged with a state jail felony for possession of a controlled substance and misdemeanors for resisting arrest and driving while intoxicated with an open container.

Altered plate doesn't fool Granbury cop

A Hood County resident was arrested for using a modified license plate, said Granbury Police Sgt. Cris Brichetto.

On Sept. 26, a police officer observed a 2001 Chevrolet Lumina displaying a temporary paper license plate, Brichetto said.

A check of the vehicle's registration showed the temporary plate had expired, he

said, and the officer pulled the vehicle over.

During the stop, the officer detected the date on the paper tag had been altered, Brichetto said.

"The driver stated he had altered the temporary license plate and was arrested for display of a fictitious license plate," he said, a misdemeanor.

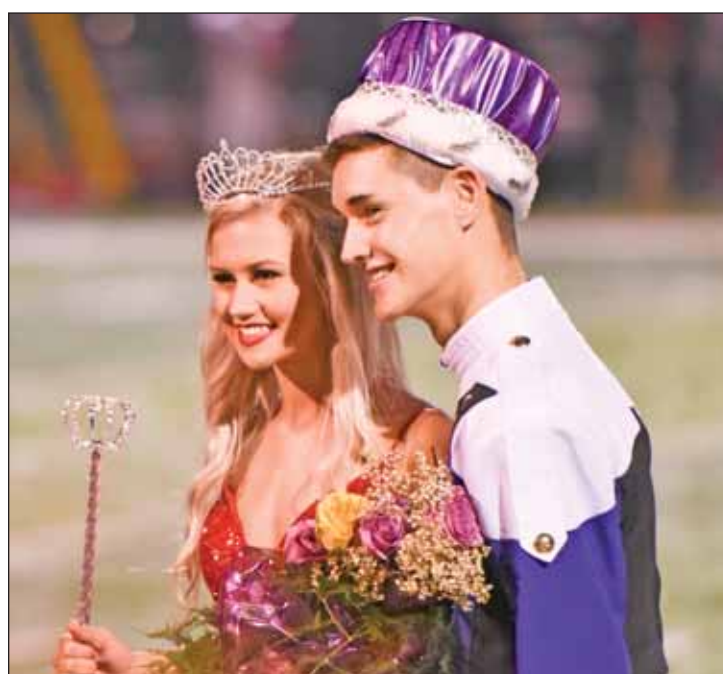

Granbury lost to Burleson 42-6, ending the Pirates' undefeated start to the season.

Pirates' win streak snapped by Burleson in district opener

Granbury football's undefeated start came to an end Friday night with a 42-6 loss at the hands of the Burleson Elks at Pirate Stadium.

The game started with a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Burleson, and didn't improve much for Granbury after that.

The Pirates scored on their first drive of the game to make the score 7-6, but couldn't find the end zone again.

Granbury head coach Chad Zschiesche was succinct in his postgame comments.

"It's a product of not playing well in all three phases of the ball game," he said. "When you play a good football team you have to execute on offense, defense and special teams, and we didn't do very well in any of those."

The Pirates actually outgained the Elks, 284 yards to 275. But it took Burleson only 48 plays to reach that total, an average of 5.72 yards per play, while Granbury ran 72 plays for an average of 3.9 yards per play.

The Pirates' lone touchdown, a 24-yard scamper by quarterback Kevin Moore, came on fourth down. Granbury tried for three more fourth down conversions and did not get any of them.

Burleson was able to force Granbury out of its rhythm in the passing game. The Pirates finished with a 45 percent completion rate, with 174 yards and an interception.

The loss dropped Granbury to 3-1 (0-1 in District 9-5A). Burleson moved to 4-0 (1-0).

son moved to 4-0 (1-0).

HITTING THE RESET BUTTON

Some coaches like to "burn the game tape" after a big loss, as the saying goes. The thought process is that by chalking up an off game as an aberration that won't happen again, a team can better move on to the next week.

Zschiesche isn't fully subscribing to that theory. He said after the game he wanted the loss to "sting."

"I want it to hurt, I want it

to sting," he said Friday night. "That's not who we are, but unfortunately that's how we played tonight."

On Monday, he said he didn't want to let Burleson "linger" in his players' minds. But he drew parallels to lessons learned from the preseason scrimmage.

"I shared with them that the last time we played a physical team, it helped us, in Stephenville," he said. "And so, I'm hoping again that it can be somewhat of a wakeup call, and we'll respond like good teams do."

Their first chance to respond comes this Friday at Crowley. The Eagles beat Burleson Centennial 20-7 last week, and are 2-2 overall.

Zschiesche said he thinks Crowley is better than its record indicates. The Eagles' two losses came against very good teams in Mansfield Legacy and Azle.

Crowley runs some "exotic" defensive schemes, Zschiesche said, which they can pull off due to their athleticism. But he believes the Pirates will have an opportunity to force turnovers on defense, as the Eagles have a tendency to "put the ball on the ground."

Granbury isn't at full-strength this weekend. Some starters are out with injuries, meaning the Pirates will be trotting out new faces.

"It's just next man up," Zschiesche said. "One man going out is another man's opportunity."

"Hopefully we'll have a few kids step up and fill those shoes, and we'll move on down the road."

Granbury and Crowley kick off at 7:30 p.m. on Friday at Eagle Stadium in Crowley.

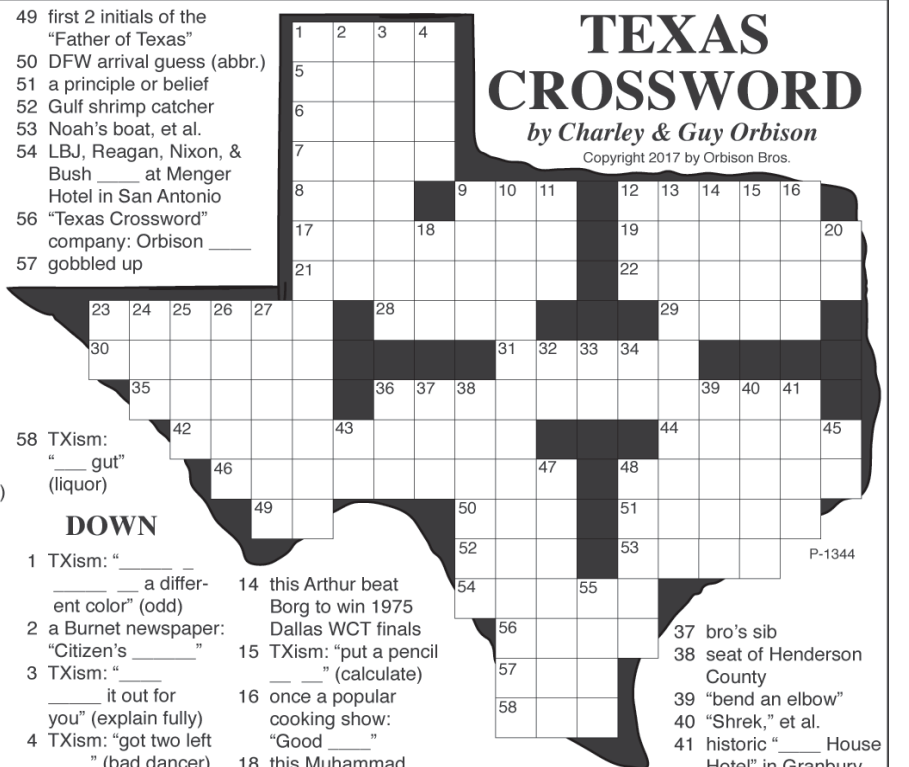

Rattlers win big; North Central, Cornerstone fall

Tolar head coach Jeremy Mullins said last week that he hoped the Rattlers' game against the Waco Reicher Catholic Cougars wouldn't turn into a replica of last year's matchup, which was an offensive onslaught that ended with a 60-47 Tolar win.

On Friday, Mullins got his wish - sort of. Tolar brought the offense, while the Cougars left theirs in Waco.

Tolar beat Reicher Catholic 47-10, a dominant victory through and through.

The Rattlers put up 400 yards of offense, 241 of which came through the air and 159 on the ground. Tolar averaged 5.7 yards per play.

Clayton Deaver had four touchdowns. Two of those were receptions from Bryan Morgan passes, another came on the ground and the fourth was a pick-six late in the second quarter.

During the bye, Mullins hopes to focus "80 percent" or so on self-improvement and the rest on Eastland. His team is starting to come together at exactly the right time.

"I told these guys before the season that it's a process," Mullins said. "We were just trying to be hitting a point to where we were starting to click by Eastland, and here we are."

Iva Jeovac added 13 assists and five aces. Milica Pejovic was a perfect four-for-four on kill attempts.

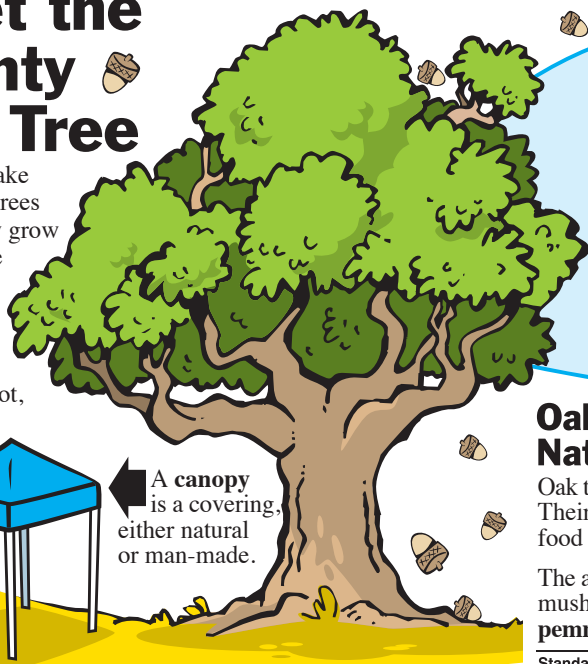

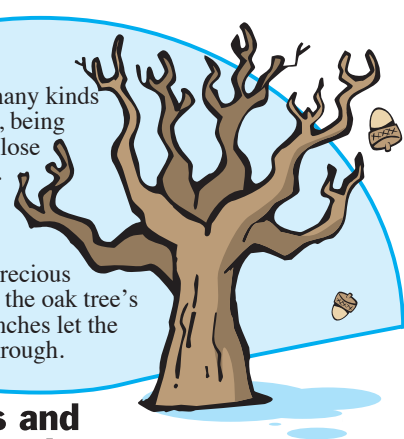
Meet the Mighty Oak Tree

Oak trees make good shade trees because they grow tall and wide enough to create a big canopy that you can sit under on a hot, sunny day.



A canopy is a covering, either natural or man-made.

In winter, many kinds of oak trees, being deciduous, lose their leaves. During that time when sunlight is especially precious for warmth, the oak tree's leafless branches let the sun shine through.



Oak Trees and Native Americans

Oak trees provided more than shade for the first Americans. Their fruit, known as acorns, were an essential source of food for Native Americans from coast to coast.

The acorns were ground into a meal that was used to make mush or pounded with meat, fat and berries to make pemmican, a paste that dries into chewy, nutritious strips.

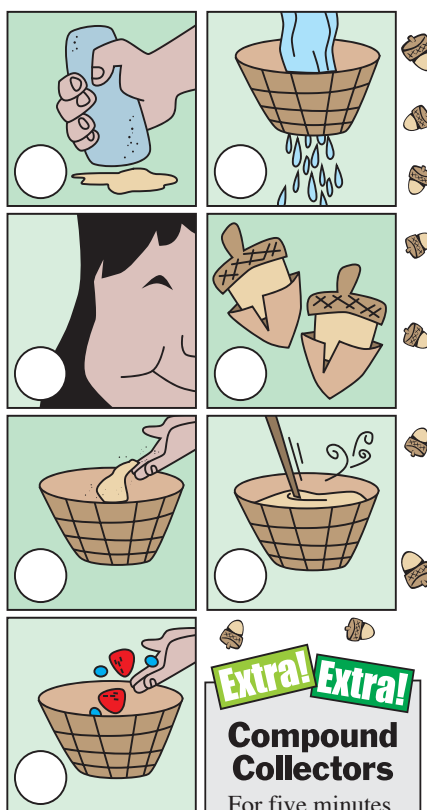

Making Acorns Safe for Eating

Read the steps that Native Americans followed to remove tannins from acorns. Then number the pictures in the correct order.

1. Shell the acorns by splitting the outer shell and removing the light-colored inner nut.
2. Grind the shelled acorns into a fine meal.
3. Scoop the pounded meal into a basket.
4. Rinse the acorn meal with hot water to wash away the tannins. The meal must be rinsed at least ten times, or more if cold water is used.
5. Add water to the leached meal and stir with a hot rock lodged into a looped stick.
6. Add berries, seeds or dried meat for flavor.
7. Eat!

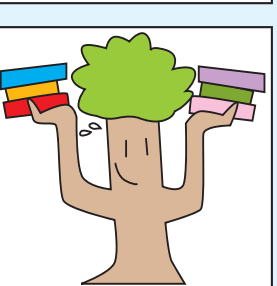

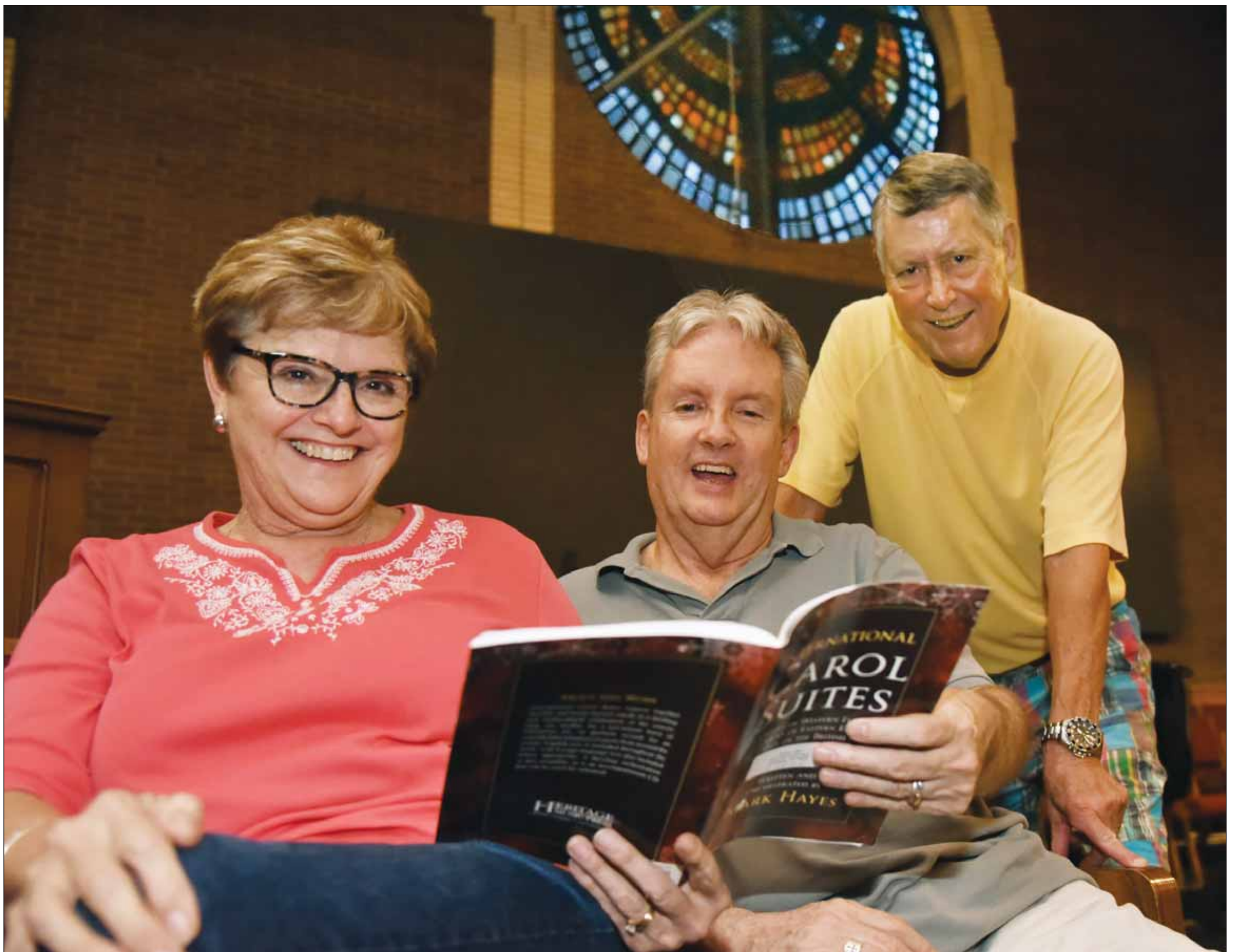

Starting to sound a lot like Christmas

Acton United Methodist choir prepares for Carnegie Hall

Since opening in 1891, New York's Carnegie Hall has hosted countless prominent performers.

Benny Goodman and his orchestra performed in 1938. The Beatles performed two shows in 1964.

The Acton United Methodist Church choir will perform in Carnegie Hall next month.

"We are very excited!" choir member Bob Miller said of the upcoming performance. "We didn't even know it was in the works until it was a done deal."

About 20 members of the 60-member chancel choir will join another 200 to 300 choir members selected across the nation.

Award-winning composer, arranger and conductor Mark Hayes will lead the performance of "International Carol Suite."

The work is divided into five sections, including Carols of Western Europe, Carols of Eastern Europe, Carols of the British Isles, Carols of Central and South America, and Carols of North America.

The Acton choir will perform the same music with a full orchestra at Acton Methodist on Sunday, Dec. 17.

"Many of the songs are familiar carols," said AUMC Director of Music Ken McDonald.

The choir's audition was actually in the works before McDonald became music director AUMC earlier this year.

McDonald and his wife, Marge, moved here from Virginia in May. The couple has five kids and nine grandkids.

"We're both native Texans, so we were glad to come back," he said.

Preparations for the concert have meant lengthening the weekly choir practice by

30 minutes each Wednesday night.

Because of the upcoming performance in New York, McDonald said the choir began practicing Christmas music about a month early. He chuckled and said, "It's beginning to sound a lot like Christmas around here."

Those making the trip hope to take in some attractions when they're not practicing.

An evening boat trip is planned on the Hudson River, many will visit the Holocaust Museum and some hope to see a Broadway show.

The choirs arrive in New York on Thursday, Nov. 16, and will have five-hour practice sessions Friday and Saturday. Another practice is planned Sunday with the performance later that night at 8:30.

"I just can't wait," said Kathy Nutt. "We are honored that we were asked."

After moving from Mexia, she and her husband, Art, have been in the AUMC choir about 2 1/2 years.

"We had been in a small church choir and now get to experience the larger choir at Acton Methodist," Nutt said.

She said she looks forward to singing God's praises with such a large group in New York.

"I believe it's every musician's dream to perform at Carnegie Hall," she added.

The concert is produced by Distinguished Concerts International New York City (DCINY), known as a leading producer of musical programs.

Artistic Director and Conductor Jonathan Griffith said, "The chancel choir received this invitation because of the quality and high level of musicianship demonstrated by the singers as well as the exceptional quality of their audition recording."

James "Jim" Donald Parnell

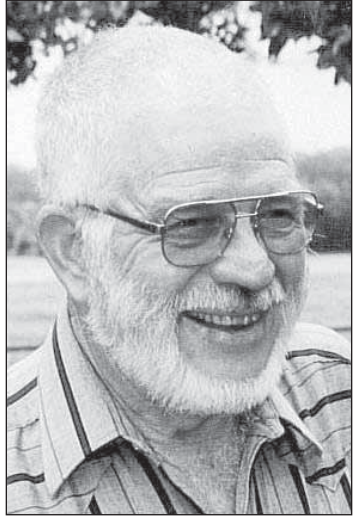

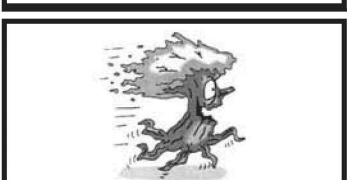

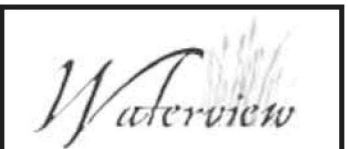
