No more Boys & Girls Club Board reopens sites under Afterschool America

The Boys & Girls Club that so many people years ago worked hard to bring to Hood County is no more – at least, not under that name.

It is now called Afterschool America. The independent organization will no longer involve oversight from a national institution.

Some people aren't real happy about that.

Board members, however, say

serves with five other board members. "It's the exact same program and same instructors. (The name change) will help us grow."

Currently, he said, there are 53 kids participating at the

club's Acton location, 15 at Decker Gym and eight at the new site in Bluff Dale.

Lyman and fellow board member Ben Hiler said that the club's leadership was being pressured by the national organization to merge with Fort Worth and Arlington chapters – a move they felt was not in the best interest of Hood County.

Hiler said that, during the last two years, smaller clubs in rural areas have moved to independent organizations.

"We didn't want someone in

Fort Worth telling us what to do here," he said.

The switch also was necessary in order to keep the club financial solvent and serving the needs of kids, the two board members said.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of America charter costs thousands of dollars each year, they said. Lyman said that, although he was unsure of the exact figure, it was around \$4,000 or \$5,000.

Facebook posts from angry parents began appearing last

summer when it was announced that the Boys & Girls Club would offer no summer camps.

Lyman and Hiler said there were two reasons for doing away with the camps: No one had signed up, and the summer sessions cost the club about \$15,000.

"We didn't have that extra fifteen grand to do it," Lyman said. He added that afterschool programs, not summer camps, are the club's "core program."

There are some who dispute the claim that there wasn't a

single sign-up for the camps.

One former employee, who asked that her name not be used, said that one woman had not only signed up her child, but had also paid a deposit.

Angry comments were posted again last week, when the name change took effect on Oct. 1.

Among those comments were accusations of mistreatment of employees and a disproportionate amount of funds going to pay the salaries of three family

Man, wife airlifted from crash

A Granbury husband and wife were injured in a two-vehicle crash on Temple Hall Highway near Old Granbury Road Saturday evening.

On Sept. 26, a woman was killed in a collision at the same intersection.

Ruth Ortega, 53, and Jose Ortega, 65, were airlifted to JPS Hospital in Fort Worth. Jose was listed in good condition Monday, but Ruth's condition could not be released, according to the hospital.

The driver and passenger of the second vehicle had only minor injuries and were not transported for medical treatment, said Texas Highway Patrol Staff Sergeant Dub Gillum.

The crash occurred about 6:45 p.m. Bradley Patterson, 33, of Carrollton, was driving a 2015 Hyundai Sonata north on Temple Hall Highway when he turned left in front of a southbound Suburban driven by Ruth, according to Gillum.

The vehicles collided when the front of Ruth's vehicle struck the front right side of Patterson's vehicle, Gillum said. Patterson was cited for failing to yield right of way turning left.

On Sept. 26, a woman died turning onto Temple Hall Highway from Old Granbury Road when she failed to yield the right of way to oncoming traffic, according to the DPS.

members - Executive Director Jeff Bates, his wife, Paula, and their 16-year-old daughter.

Some of the posts were made by former employees or others who had once been affiliated with the club or its resale shop.

One woman urged the board to speak to former employees.

Lyman disagreed that too much money goes toward salaries and said that the club's finances are audited.

"I sign the checks and (the salaries) are not exorbitant at all," he said. "They're not overly paid. I mean, (Bates) hasn't had a raise in years."

As for Bates' wife and daughter also working for the club, Lyman said: "Nepotism's not illegal. It's not immoral... And they're our best employees."

Lyman and Hiler also addressed online dialogue about

employees of the club's resale shop at 4329 E. Highway 377 allegedly having to work last summer in oppressive heat after the building's air conditioner failed.

They said that a rumor that funds had been donated for a new air conditioner but had not been used for that purpose were not true.

"There was no donation," Lyman said. "We did have to secure the financing. We had to do it through a loan. That takes time, and we had to secure bids."

Lyman said that even though employees were told they were always free to close the shop if it grew too hot, there was also a need to be open as much as possible.

"We were hurting financially," Lyman said.

Hiler said there was a "direct correlation" between the air conditioner going out and a decrease in sales. The board recently increased weekly fees from \$20 per week to \$35, Lyman and Hiler said, but scholarships are still available.

"There hasn't been a change since 2011, so it was kind of needed," Hiler said of the fees.

He said the club will focus on raising money through the resale shop and events such as golf tournaments, rather than through individual donations.

"We'd love to find a bunch more donors that want to take care of everything, but that's not what happens in a town that gets so many new charities every year," Hiler said. "There are a lot of good causes, but that pie gets smaller and smaller every year."

Proposal heightens billboards to 85 feet

The Lake Granbury Area Beautification Council has joined other groups opposing a plan to double the height of highway billboards - from 42.5 to 85 feet, nearly the height of a 10-story building.

"Can you imagine driving down Granbury and seeing a billboard 85 feet high?" said Mark Graves, president of the beautification council. "No one around here wants that."

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has written the proposed rule, which applies to billboards along federally funded highways such as U.S. Highway 377, the major thoroughfare through Granbury.

Scenic Texas, a nonprofit organization, believes the new rule would impact the beauty and safety of public highways.

The group says citizens have

raised concerns that doubling the height of billboards could create more driver distraction issues at a time when TxDOT, the Legislature and cities are attempting to end or drastically curb the use of hand-held devices while driving.

The Fredericksburg Standard-Radio Post has editorialized against the proposal. The newspaper wrote, "Want to talk about 'Messing with Texas'? The billboard industry is doing just that."

The opportunity for the public to comment on the rule ends at 5 p.m. Monday, Oct. 16.

Cresson bypass plans progressing

The Highway 377 Cresson Relief Route's environmental assessment has been cleared with a finding of no significant impact for construction.

It allows the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to continue with the development of the bypass to the west of 377, TxDOT officials said.

Right-of-way acquisition and utility relocation have now begun. The design work is also well underway.

A contractor is expected to be selected in the summer of 2018 with construction beginning soon after.

No injuries in crash involving deputy

A Hood County deputy crashed into another vehicle while chasing a suspect into Parker County on Thursday. Around 12:30 p.m. Thursday, Hood County deputies responded to a burglary in progress on Granda Calle Street, northeast of the Weatherford Highway bridge, said Public Information Officer Lt. Johnny Rose. Before they arrived, deputies were told the suspect had left the scene and was heading toward Weatherford on High-

way 51, he said. "A deputy was traveling northbound on Highway 51 at Walden Road trying to catch up with the suspect vehicle," Rose said. "The deputy topped a hill, and a vehicle traveling southbound was making a left turn and the deputy didn't have time to stop and struck the other vehicle on its rear passenger's side." No one was injured, Rose said. The crash occurred just north of the Hood-Parker county line. Investigators are still looking for the suspect, he said.

Traffic stop ends in drug arrest

Deputies had to physically restrain a suspect from eating methamphetamine during an arrest, said sheriff's office Public Information Officer Lt. Johnny Rose.

Around 5 p.m. Wednesday, deputies stopped a vehicle on the east side of the Highway 377 bridge, he said. Deputies saw Brandy Michelle Cummins, 35, of Granbury, trying to hide something, he said. Deputies had to wrestle with Cummins to prevent her from eating less than a gram of methamphetamine, Rose said. Cummins also brought a methamphetamine pipe into the Hood County Jail during the booking process, he said. Cummins was charged with felonies for tampering with evidence and prohibited substance in a correctional facility. She is also charged with possession of a controlled substance, a state jail felony, and a misdemeanor for resisting arrest.

Pirates drop second straight district game

The Granbury Pirates found themselves on the wrong end of an amazing high school football performance Friday night in Crowley.

Rodrick Williams had seven touchdowns for the Eagles, three of which came on plays of 90 yards or longer, and Crowley handed Granbury its second straight loss 48-17.

The loss dropped Granbury to 3-2 (0-2 in District 9-5A).

Despite Williams' night for the ages, Granbury head coach Chad Zschiesche says the Pirates loss had nothing to do with anything Crowley did.

"I'm not so sure that - other than their speed - that they got us," Zschiesche said on Monday. "I think we got us."

"Offensively, we didn't execute real well, we were always behind the chains, although the receiving corps played pretty well. Their speed combined with some missed tackles hurt us offensively."

But the main concern came in the oft-forgotten third phase of the game.

Last week, Zschiesche said Granbury's special teams were "horrendous." This week, he deployed the term "atrocious."

Two of Williams' touchdowns came on kickoff returns in the

fourth quarter. His first went for 90 yards; his second went for 94.

That's going to have to change if Granbury is to find success moving forward. And Zschiesche says it's a symptom of poor execution.

"There's certainly techniques on all special teams that we've taught since last spring," he said. "And that's why it's so frustrating."

"At the beginning of the season our special teams were really good. So we just have to get back to playing better and executing."

Granbury is also banged up in key areas, including running back, although that may change this weekend. Kaiden Smith started in the first varsity game of his career on Friday in the backfield beside quarterback Kevin Moore.

Smith finished with 57 yards rushing on 12 carries, a solid debut.

"I thought for the level of opponent we were facing, Kaiden played pretty well," Zschiesche said. "He's a talented kid, but just young and inexperienced."

ON TO THE OWLS

Granbury now has to turn its attention to the Joshua Owls, who are much better than anyone predicted. Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine pre-

dicted the Owls to finish last in the district, but Joshua knocked off Seguin 21-18 in the district opener and took Burleson down to the wire in a 17-14 loss last Friday.

Burleson had an off night. Zschiesche said the Pirates would've loved to have played

that version of the Elks instead of the version Granbury faced two weeks ago.

But that doesn't mean Joshua doesn't pose a threat.

The Owls run a shapeshifting offense that doesn't stick to one style of play.

"A lot of time coaches will use this term, but it's very true this week: they run a multiple offense," Zschiesche said. "They can line up in the spread, they'll line up in empty, they'll line up in the Wing T."

That style of play means that Granbury will have to prepare for a myriad of different formations. However, when Joshua lines up a certain way, the Pirates should have a good idea of what type of play is coming, which could be an advantage.

All that planning is no good, Zschiesche said, unless he and his staff can get his team to play physically on both sides of the ball. That means no more missed tackles, no more missed assignments.

"All this stuff - that's what's so frustrating as a coach," he said. "Everything that we want to improve on, we've been addressing."

"At some point in time, the result has to change on the field."

That point in time for Granbury hopefully begins at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Owl Stadium in Joshua.

Tolar preps for Eastland out of bye week

The Tolar Rattlers are 3-2 coming out of the bye week in head coach Jeremy Mullins' first year with the team.

In a vacuum, that's pretty darn good.

But Mullins said his players have done a fine job of not resting on pre-district laurels and have had an excellent week of practice and film study.

"I thought the kids did a great job," Mullins said. "It's sometimes hard to stay focused, but I thought we showed up every day and got better."

"It gave us a good opportunity to work on some things that we needed to address, and gave us a good opportunity to prepare for Eastland at the same time."

It wasn't necessarily a week of relaxation for the coaches and players, either. In fact, Mullins prefers weeks with games -- bye weeks seem to drag on forever, he said.

"I think there's obviously a little less -- stress may not be the right word for the kids, but maybe for the coaches," he said. "You can focus on yourself instead of worrying so much

about an opponent."

During the bye, Tolar worked on fixing the little things. Even though the Rattlers won their last two games, Mullins and his staff were keeping track of the small tune-ups they needed to make heading into district.

Mullins swore he and his staff weren't concerned with how other District 4-3A Division II teams were doing, but did admit he had a general idea of the state of the district.

"I don't know that we've necessarily taken the time to look, but you know, though," Mullins said. "You check scores, and have an idea of how others are doing."

"There's no doubt it's a good district. There's definitely some big tests ahead of us."

HITTING THE ROAD

Tolar's first big test will come on the road this Friday.

The Eastland Mavericks are 3-2 this season, with wins over Merkel, Clyde and Breckenridge and losses to Wall and Comanche.

Mullins made it clear that he expects a tough battle this weekend.

"They're good. They're prob-

ably the best team that we will have seen up to this point," he said.

The Mavericks are strong at skill positions, have a tough offensive line and a defense that "flies around," as Mullins put it.

But to beat Eastland, the Rattlers won't have to pull out a bag of tricks.

"We've just got to execute," Mullins said. "And that wouldn't matter if we were playing Eastland or the Dallas Cowboys."

The Rattlers are also looking to create a "second and manageable" instead of going for a touchdown play on every first down. Quarterback Bryan Morgan has improved over the season in that regard.

"That's something I think Bryan has done better at the quarterback position," Mullins said. "That gets tough as a quarterback sometimes, you feel like you have the whole world on your shoulders and you have to make it all happen on one play."

"But we have a lot of plays. So just give us a chance to do it again."

They'll get that chance starting at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Eastland.

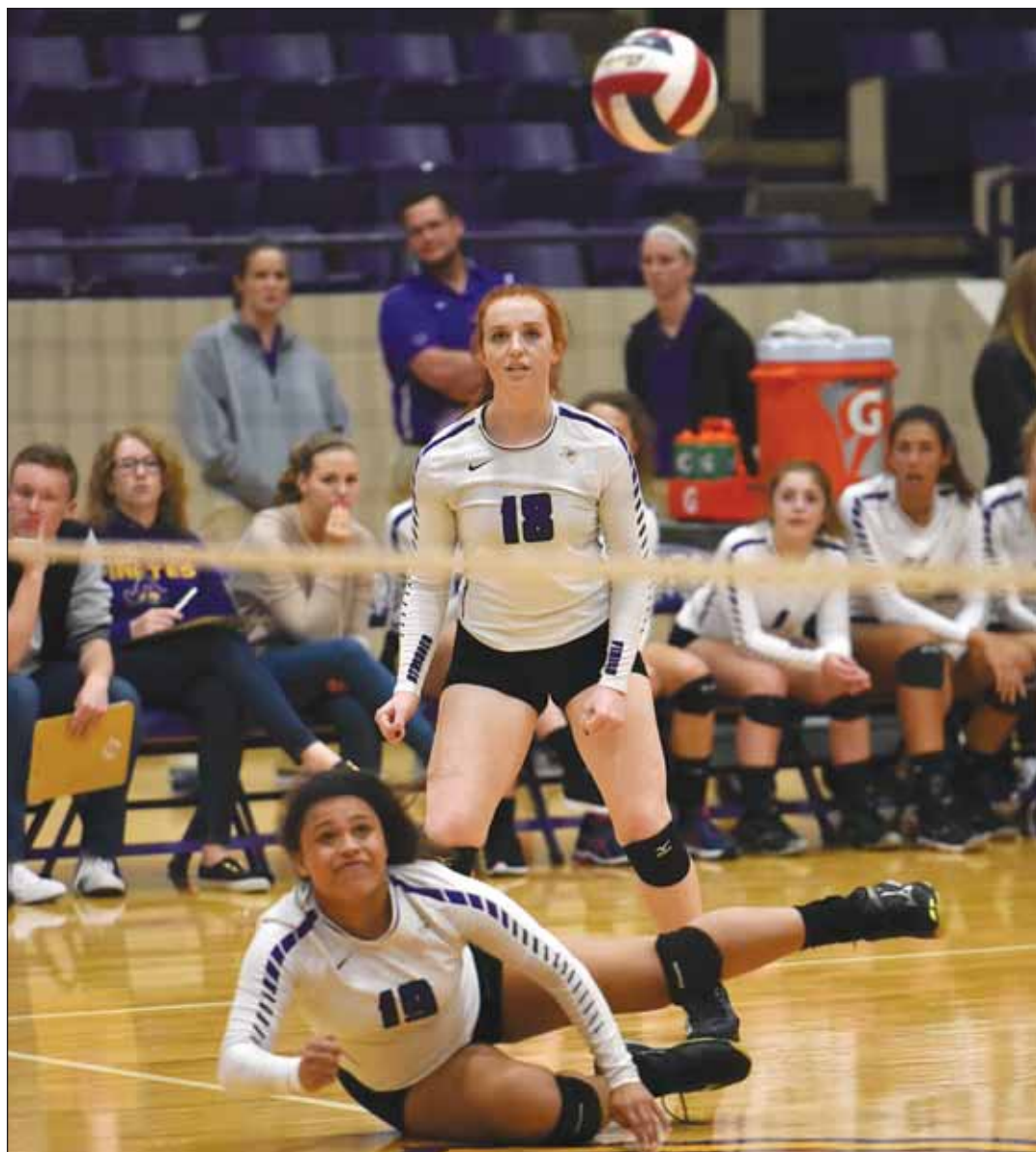

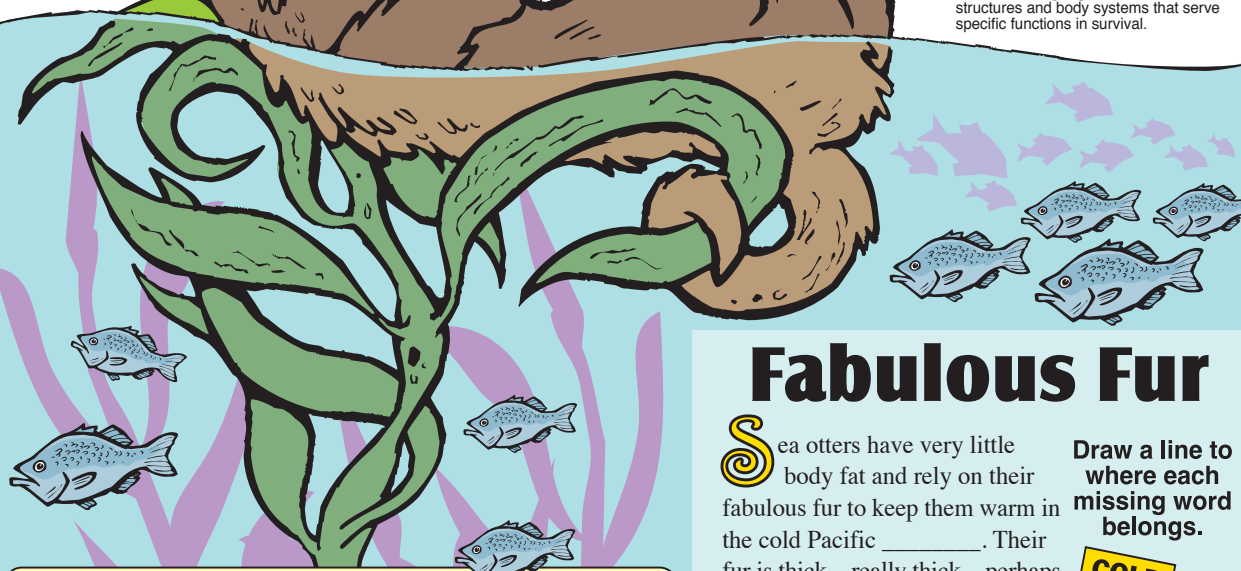

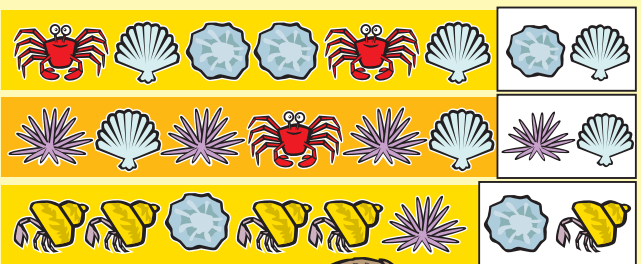


Food Rocks!

Sea otters once ranged from Baja California to Canada. Today, they are only found in a small area of California's central coast. Wear there were once hundreds of thousands, there are now less than 3,000.

Hunted

In the 1700s, European and Russian sailors discovered sea otters along the west coast of the United States and hunted them for their thick, warm fur. Over the course of nearly 200 years, hundreds of thousands of sea otters were killed. In 1911, so few were left that people agreed to step hunting them. By 1938, many scientists thought they had died out and become extinct.

In March of 1938, Howard Sharpe, an author who lived on the California coast, saw a small group of otters. That discovery jump-started an effort by scientists and environmentalists to help this little colony grow.

Endangered Otters

Today, there is still a struggle to keep otters from becoming extinct. Pollution from pesticides and waste from humans and their pets wash into the sea. These make otters sick. California passed a law to stop pet waste from being dumped into the ocean. Coastal Cleanup Days also help protect sea otters.

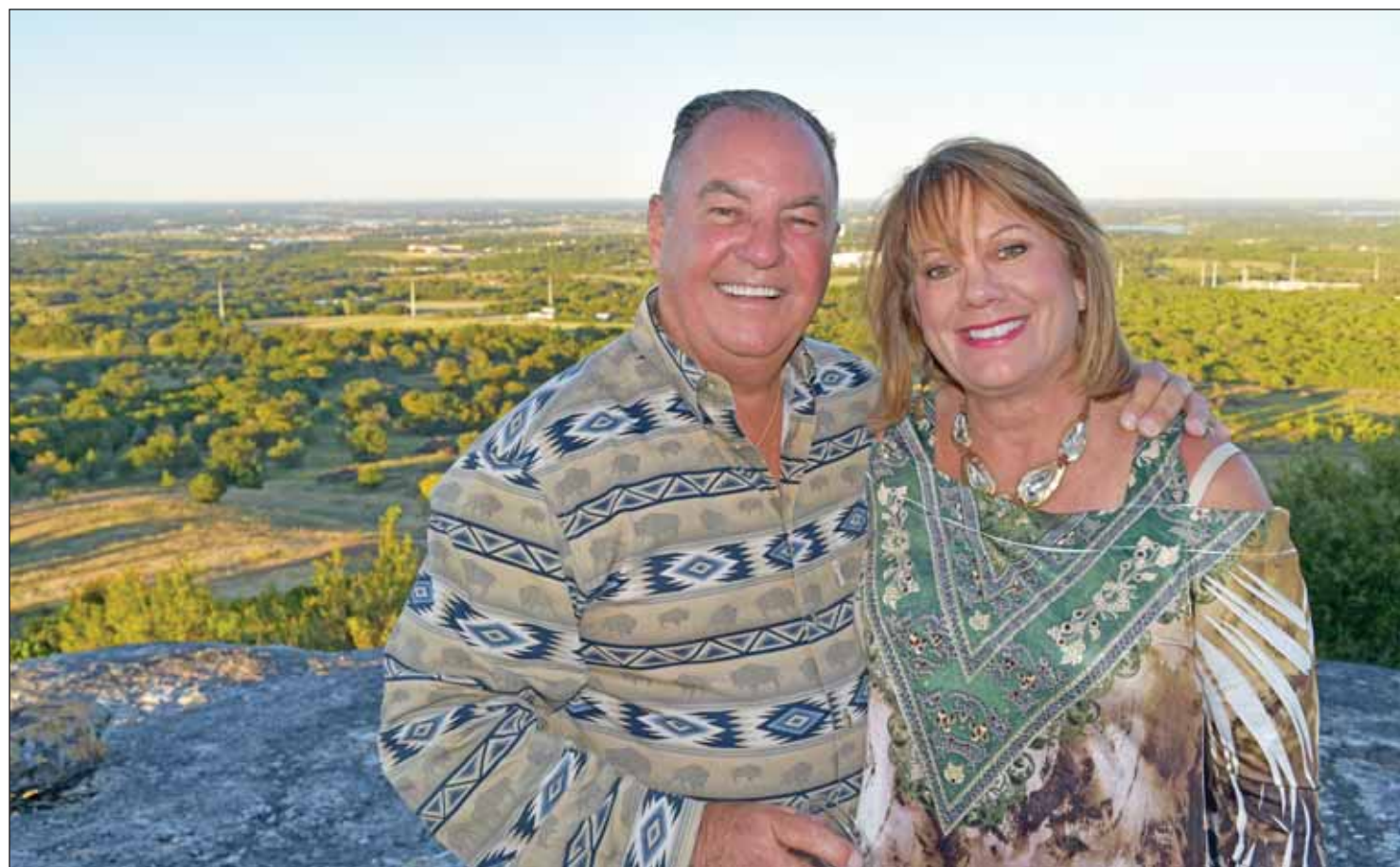

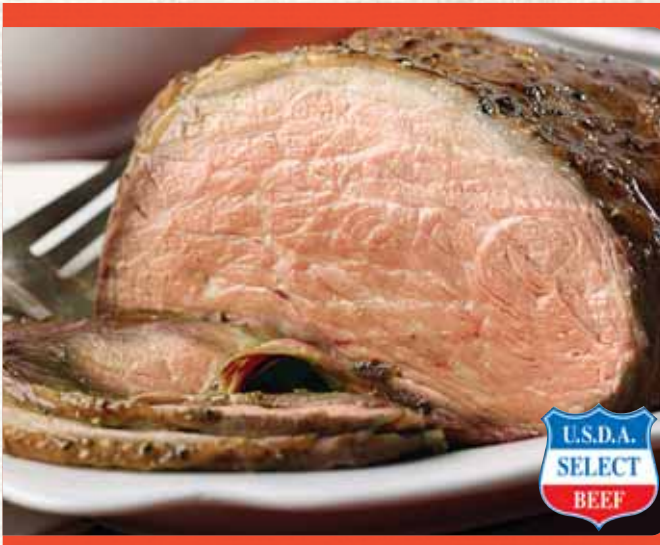
