Money crunch

Exelon lawsuit could mean a hit to county budget

HOOD COUNTY NEWS

County government could be faced with a big money problem if Exelon wins a lawsuit it has filed in district court against the Hood County Appraisal District.

If the company prevails, the county might not be able to move forward on planned projects such as technology and road upgrades.

The Commissioners Court was counting on significant tax revenue from Exelon's Wolf Hollow II plant in southeastern Hood County, which went online in June to produce electricity.

However, corporate representatives claim it is worth much less than what the Hood County Appraisal District says.

About \$200 million less. "This has thrown me for a loop, budget-wise," County Judge Darrell Cockerham said earlier this week.

The HCAD lists the appraised value of the plant at \$436,200,666.

Chief Appraiser Greg Stewart said company representatives say the plant is worth \$236 million.

Stewart uses an outside firm to handle appraisals for utility companies. It was Pritchard & Abbott, Inc. of Fort Worth that handled the appraisal of the Wolf Hollow II property, he said.

Located next to Wolf Hollow I. the new plant is one of two sites in Texas where combined-cycle gas turbine units utilize a new General Electric technology that is clean and efficient.

Drivers face steep bills after cars and deer collide

Hood County residents say deer racing across roads and colliding with vehicles is a predictable part of life in the

"I've hit three in two years," said Michael Durant.

Texans have a 1 in 269 chance of hitting a deer in the next 12 months, according to data compiled by the State Farm insurance company.

That's a 7 percent increase over last year's risk.

Other new data from the insurer reveal that nearly half of all deer-related crashes in Texas occur from October to December during the mating season.

Sheryl Mather-Oberle's 18-year-old son became part of that statistic last Saturday

"He was on Star Hollow Road, out in Lipan, and it was raining," Mather-Oberle said. "He went around a curve, and the deer was in the road. He hit it, then slid off the road and into a small mesquite tree.

"He only had the car for four months, had just made his third payment. The insurance adjuster totaled the car."

Her son is now using a rental car to get to work, she said. Cody Daffan co-owns Bolton

Shooting video shown only in courtroom

An Arizona jury watched video Thursday of a former Mesa, Arizona police officer shooting a Granbury man.

That officer, Philip Brailsford, is charged with second-degree murder for shooting and killing Daniel Shaver while Shaver was on his hands and knees pleading with police not to shoot him.

Brailsford was later fired for violations of departmental policy and pleaded not guilty to the murder charge. Police said Brailsford shot Shaver five times with a rifle.

Mesa police officers were responding to a report of someone pointing a gun out a hotel room in Shaver's hotel.

Shaver was 26 when he was killed on Jan. 18, 2016, and left behind two young children and his wife Laney Sweet.

Early voting for the Nov. 7 General Election will continue next week at Annex 1, 1410 W.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday through Friday.

By the time the polls closed at 5 p.m. Thursday, 537 people had voted, according

to daily counts provided by Elections Administrator Jenise "Crickett" Miller. (The HCN went to press Friday morning.)

Miller said turnout has been a bit lower than the last similar election, which was in November 2015.

"By the end of the third day of early voting, 564 voters had voted," she said of that election, comparing it to the 376 that had voted by closing time Wednesday.

ham said that about \$800,000 in tax revenue hangs in the balance.

"Right now, we're at a standstill until it goes through court," Stewart said. "It takes awhile."

Cockerham and Precinct 2 Commissioner Butch Barton, in whose precinct Wolf Hollow II is located, said they attended a meeting last week with

Exelon officials. Both county officials said it is their understanding that Exelon is legally obligated to pay some portion of the taxes during the time the dispute is pending, but right now are unsure of what that amount

will be. "They indicated that they have had issues in the past with this type of situation at different plants and that they never have had to litigate," Barton said. "So they are very positive that they think this can be worked out short of the

courts." He added that the situation "is of great concern" to the county judge and Commissioners Court.

"It's going to be a big chunk of change, one way or another, that we will need for expenses for the county," he said.

The county budget has been particularly challenging for the Commissioners Court during the past several years due to a down economy and everincreasing unfunded mandates from the state.

Jimmy Porch, communications and government affairs manager for Exelon, said that the company is "committed" to paying its "fair share" of property taxes, but disagrees with the appraisal district's as-

sessment.

"Over the past few years." the ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas) wholesale power markets have declined significantly, therefore, reducing asset valuation," he wrote in an email to the HCN.

"The recent Appraisal District's assessment neglects to consider this and, based on those facts, we are appealing their decision."

Barton is unclear as to why that matters.

"My position was - not to be a smart aleck - but what does that have to do with an appraiser coming in and affixing a number to a hard asset?" he

BACK TO THE DRAWING BOARD

Barton said it's a safe bet that, regardless of whether the case is settled in or out of court, the amount of tax revenue the county will get from Wolf Hollow II won't be what was expected.

"It's back to the drawing board time," he said, adding that commissioners will have to take another look at the budget to figure out what to put on the "chopping block."

Barton said, however, that he does not anticipate eliminating any jobs.

The commissioner also said that he continues to view Exelon as "a good partner" and that the company has "every right" to challenge an appraisal that corporate officials feel is unfair.

Porch stated that Exelon wants a resolution "that benefits all parties."

Man sentenced to 60 years for meth possession

HOOD COUNTY NEWS

A Hood County jury sentenced an Abilene man to 60 years in prison on Tuesday.

Alfredo Gonzalez, 28, was in possession of more than 100 grams of methamphetamine when he was arrested by deputies on May 8, 2016, according to testimony.

"The defendant possessed a large amount of pure methamphetamine," Hood County District Attorney Rob Christian said. "He armed himself with a sawed-off shotgun. The defendant created a very dangerous situation for our community,

Gonzalez was sentenced to 60 years for possession of the drugs with in-

tent to distribute and 10 years for unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon, said Christian.

The terms will be served concurrently, and Gonzalez will be eligible for parole in less than 15 years, he said.








PUT EDUCATION FIRST, NOT LAST

Every two years the state samples a school district's property values and establishes a "recommended" districtwide threshold.

Since the sample is usually drawn from the "hottest" areas of the district it tends to skew district valuations artificially upward.

As those valuations go up so too does the district's collected property tax dollars. That permits the state to cut school funding to that district dollarfor-dollar.

In this manner, state funding of our schools automatically declines, without public fanfare, every year.

Since 2008 the state portion has declined 9 1/2 percent, yet our locally funded dollars (in Granbury) have increased by about 32 percent. Those extra dollars don't make for better schools ... they just cover the loss of the state funds.

This maneuver annually shifts a larger share of the school funding onto the local property tax base. Next time, please vote for those that put education first, not last, and commit to restore full state funding.

On Oct. 31, 1517, a German priest and professor named Martin Luther mailed a letter to one of the most powerful church leaders of the day.

500 YEARS LATER

It listed 95 theses protesting what Luther believed to be unacceptable practices of the church at the time, namely putting a price tag and condition on God's love and forgiveness. This, in part, triggered the Protestant Reformation and a reinterpretation of scripture's good news.

The Greek word euangelion means "gospel" or "good news." It is the root of the word "evangelical.'

Luther combed scripture for "what to believe" and "how to act" so that he could sufficiently love God and vice versa.

He could never comfort himself that he had achieved success.

That's when he read this passage (among others): "For

have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." (Romans 3:22-24 NRSV)

God's mercy, forgiveness, salvation and even faith comes to us as a gift.

This precious gift is the one I tend to forget at Christmas, pass by on Good Friday and skim over on Easter: Christ! Through Christ's life, death and resurrection, God has set us free from sin, death, and the devil in ways we hardly understand, but in ways that free us to love and serve our neighbor for the sake of our neighbor.

Besides sparking the birth of so many Christian church branches (Lutheran, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, etc... even "non-denominational" churches) the Reformation resulted in freedom in ways we still hardly believe: Freedom from having to worry that anything will ever separate one from God's love. Freedom to be, and be accepted, for who one is: simultaneously sinner and saint. Freedom in living as redeemed, precious children of God.

The Reformation reminds us that we are loved to be loving. We are forgiven to be forgiving. We are blessed to be blessings, even to our enemies.

Thank you for sharing that amazing gift and good news rediscovered 500 years ago but too often neglected 500 years later: grace.



Disease befalls **cypress** trees

For many years, Italian cypress trees stood tall and distinctly upright in area land-

These remarkable columnar trees proved drought tolerant and wind resistant despite their height of 20 to 40 feet.

While the trees were susceptible to a few pests and diseases, nothing has affected Italian cypress like the current plague

- Seiridium canker. The North Texas urban envi-

ronment has never been as hospitable for Italian cypress as their own native Mediterranean climate. Conditions such as drought, high humidity, lack of air circulation, excessive rain-

fall or irrigation or less than a full sun exposure tend to stress the trees and make them vulnerable.

This year's weather, particularly high moisture and humidity levels, predisposed Italian cypress to disease.

Seiridium canker is a fungal disease that is now affecting stressed cypress trees across the state. It is responsible for the death and ultimately the removal of Leyland cypress trees throughout much of Texas. It is now a major disease in Italian

There are no chemical controls available for treating or preventing the disease. The best plan for keeping cypress trees healthy is providing a well-drained site with good air circulation.

The first symptom of Seiridium canker can be a dulling of selected branches throughout the tree. The dark-green foliage first becomes gray-green and then brown. As the disease progresses, additional branches sport dead foliage.

The brown branches are

sometimes referred to as "fox tails," and they are an easy-tospot indicator of Seiridium canker. Eventually, the tree's central leader may brown and die.

There are no chemical controls available for treating or preventing this disease. The best plan for keeping cypress trees healthy is providing a site that is well-drained with good air circulation. Provide drip irrigation if possible so that the tree foliage is not sprayed with

Should trees become diseased, remove the infected parts. When pruning, make the cuts below the infection sites. Dispose of affected plant parts. Severely infected trees should be removed and replaced with a different species.

According to numerous authorities, there are no studies that indicate that any current Italian cypress varieties are resistant to the disease.

Another fungal disease that affects cypress trees is Phomopsis, which causes browning and tip growth death. Trees can generally overcome Phomopsis if they are otherwise healthy and grown in optimal conditions.

Phytophthora root rot is a soil-borne pathogen that attacks root systems. Trees affected with Phytophthora should be removed. Pests most likely to visit the trees include bagworms and spider mites, which can be managed with insecticides.

Lake Granbury Master Gardeners (LGMG) will host "Romancing the Monarchs - A Butterfly Festival," Sunday afternoon, Nov. 5 at their Demonstration and Research Garden.

Events, including a release of monarch butterflies, children's crafts and one-on-one gardening instruction, begin at 1:30 p.m. and continue until 4 p.m.

The Demonstration Garden, located behind Hood County Annex 1 at 1410 W. Pearl St., in Granbury, attracts several butterfly species including the monarch with its abundant nectar-producing plants, such as native lantana and coral honeysuckle.

Festival attendees are encouraged to net, identify and tag monarch butterflies visiting the garden.

Children may register at 1:30 p.m. to participate in the limited release of live butterflies.

The goal of the festival is to celebrate the monarch's migration through Texas while providing instruction on how to identify them, encourage their visits and support the butterflies as they travel along their southerly route. The day's activities are designed to engage

Release of live monarchs, which is scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

Netting, identification and tagging. Participants will be taught how to distinguish between butterfly species.

After netting a monarch, they will place a small sticker on the butterfly, which will en-

able tracking. Becoming citizen scientists. Attendees will be encouraged to join the Monarch Watch, thereby contributing to the research that is being conducted regarding the decline of the monarch population.

One-on-one gardening coaching. Master Gardeners will provide one-on-one gardening and landscape design consultations to assist visitors in creating their own butterfly gardens.

To aid understanding, pollinator plants and sample gar-

den designs will be on display. Migration station. Education videos documenting the monarch's life cycle and migration will be on hand for viewing.

But Granbury has weathered those moments, and they're stronger for it. A huge young core is playing well together this season and will return most of the starters for what should be a very talented squad in


Still, though, there's games to be won this year. And the losses at the end of the season have the Lady Pirates well aware of what they need to work on.

Birds, birds and more birds

The fall season is upon us, and the return of the wintering birds has just started.

I witnessed the gulls scouring the water looking for active fish this past weekend. There will be a variety of wintering birds arriving at our home lake.

Some are welcomed by anglers, while others are not.

We have the osprey, great blue heron, the white egrets and terns year-round. At times, these birds can point you to active fish, but nothing compares to the wintering gulls.

Gulls and white pelicans will arrive in numbers and will hover over feeding fish. We occasionally will see bald eagles, which is a great sight to see.

A few loon pairs will come in from the north as well, and they are generally always near bait and fish. We also get thousands of cormorants, which most anglers despise due to the amount of fish these diving birds con-

Birds and gulls are not always on feeding fish. Sometimes the birds will be working the cormorants, who are diving on bait schools, which brings shad to the surface.

From the distance it will look like birds feeding on the surface, but as you approach you will see the cormorants start to fly off as they are spooked by boats.

Catfish anglers look for cormorant roosts, which can be timber sticking out of the water. Cormorant droppings are typically all fish, and the catfish will be holding under those roosts.

When you do find the birds working fish, approach slowly using your trolling motor so that you do not disturb the fish feeding on the surface. If you run through the school with your big motor, the feeding may stop.

If you accidentally spook some feeding fish, give it a few minutes as they may regroup and continue.

feeding fish are typically so active that anything mimicking a shad will be hit. Spinner baits, Rat-L-Traps, Zara spooks, etc. will all put fish in the boat.

Surface-

Many times the bigger fish will be below

the surface feeding fish waiting on injured baitfish to fall their way.

This is a great time to be on the water. Bring your binoculars so that you can scan the lake for active birds and feeding fish. See you on the water!

HOOD COUNTY FISHING REPORT

Water temperatures are falling into the lower 70s, and the fishing is starting to get good. The birds (gulls) are returning to their wintering grounds, and they are quick to point you to active fish.

Black bass continue to be good on spinner baits and Rat-L-Traps worked near stickups on points. Sand bass are fair to good in 10 to 15 feet of water on slabs and Little Georges.

Striped bass has been good to excellent to 10 pounds on live shad and down-rigged jigs with worm trailers.

Squaw Creek action is good for largemouth bass on crankbaits and Texas-rigged soft plastics.

Tilapia continue to be good on worms fished under a cork. On other reservoirs, Possum Kingdom stripers are good to 17 pounds on live bait fished from South D&D to Broadway. Whitney limits of stripers are typical on down-rigging jigs or using live bait mid-lake.







Veteran ID card in the works

On July 20, 2015, President Obama signed into law the Veterans Identification Card Act. This bill allows for the issue of a government ID card similar to the ID card now issued to veterans as proof of enrollment in the VA health care system.

What this card will do is allow veterans who were honorably discharged to present a government issued ID card where discounts to veterans are offered like Home Depot or Lowes without having to carry their DD214.

This card does not authorize any other benefits with the Department of Veterans Affairs or any other government agency.

The card was expected to be available in November of this year but to date we have not heard any hard and fast evidence of an official start date.

ID Cards currently issued to veterans are those issued by DOD for military retirees, their dependents and veterans rated at 100 percent permanent and total disabled, and the VA issued health care enrollment card for veterans using the VA Health Care System. Until the new card becomes available, veterans can continue to use their DD214.

Texas Department of Public Safety allows for a veterans' designation on the drivers license with proof of military service (DD214).





The house on Haunted Hill

Mineral Wells attraction is 'home' to nine spirits

had never heard of the Haunted Hill House in Mineral Wells until a friend's Facebook post noted that it was for sale.

Located at 501 NE First St., the house is about an hour's drive from Granbury. It sits in the shadow of the ghostly, 14-story Baker Hotel and is just a block from White's Funeral Home.

A favorite among paranormal groups, ghost hunters and thrillseekers, the Haunted Hill House is allegedly inhabited by nine ghosts, plus some occasional strays that drift over from the Baker, which closed 45 years ago. In its heyday, the hotel hosted celebrities such as Judy Garland and Roy Rogers.

Deaths that reportedly occurred there include a little boy in an elevator accident and a woman who jumped from a balcony after a manager broke off their affair.

Paleontologist Phil Kirchhoff, a Hurst resident, owns the Haunted

Hill house, but put it on the market a few months ago at the request of his wife, Kim, who is not the least bit amused by ghosts.

It didn't help, Kirchhoff said, that the first time his wife visited the property, a black cat walked across the yard and she looked out an upstairs window just as a casket was being un-

loaded at White's. Built in 1890, the 2,840-square-foot home sits on 1.4 acres that butt up against a hill. The structure has tandem windows, hardwood floors and a few odd architectural twists, including a full bathroom on the ground floor that was completely - and inexplicably Sheetrocked over, with another full bath built in front of it.

Kirchhoff said he had owned the house for about a year be-

> The bathroom that was Sheetrocked over is actually visible through a window on the side of the house.

Two mediums said they sensed a woman crying over a baby in that part of the house, Kirchhoff said.

"Now, is that related (to the bathroom)? I don't know," he said. "But they both wrote down the same thing. Some people claim to have seen a lady looking at them out of the (bathroom) window."

Legend has it that the house was a brothel during the 1940s, servicing clients from the Baker and a nearby military base.



the house was haunted when he bought it in 2013.

He had spotted it while driving through Mineral Wells en route to his getaway at Possum Kingdom Lake. He bought it with the intention of restoring and selling it.

When it became clear that the house was inhabited by ghosts, Kirchhoff decided to make money by renting the place out to ghost hunters on weekends. He charges \$400 per night for groups of up to eight people.

With that income, he has been able to pay off the mortgage and make upgrades requested by city officials, who were concerned about thrill-seekers'

The house is valued at just \$26,000, but Kirchhoff's initial asking price was \$125,000 due to its money-making potential.

When no buyers appeared, he lowered the price to \$99,000. He said this week, though, that he may raise it again because of all the exterior upgrades.

That work was just getting started at the time of my visit.

'ARE YOU THERE?'

In the kitchen at Haunted Hill, there is a flat-screen television showing images from 16 cameras that are positioned throughout the house (except for the bathrooms) for the purpose of detecting any paranormal activities. Orbs at times have appeared on the TV, Kirchhoff said.

On the table were several instruments used in paranormal research. Kirchhoff demonstrated them for me.

His favorite is a K2 meter, a device about the size of a smartphone that measures electronic magnetic fields and flashes lights of green, yellow and red. Paranormal researchers entice spirits to make certain colors flash in response to questions.

As we stood in the kitchen, Kirchhoff picked up a set of L-shaped dowsing, or divining, rods. The instruments date back centuries and were used

to locate water or buried metals and other objects. They are also used in paranormal experi-

Standing at the head of the table, the long end of the dowsing rods jutting straight ahead, Kirchhoff said: "Kathy's here. Can you point to Kathy?"

The dowsing rod in Kirchhoff's right hand swung to the right until it was pointing directly at me. Kirchhoff's right hand did not appear to move.

"It can be really fun when (the spirit) isn't malevolent," Kirchhoff said. "It's almost like they want to interact with you. It's like, 'Oh, good, there are people here. Let's talk.' They'll touch you. You can feel them tugging at you."

Perhaps what surprised me most about my afternoon with Kirchhoff is that I remained in the house alone - and unafraid - for several minutes while he went outside to perform a quick

We had spent a couple hours touring the house and had ended up back in the kitchen. I took a seat at the table during his absence and watched the TV for any sign of movement or orbs in the other rooms.

Periodically, a "running man" symbol would appear in one particular block of the screen. Kirchhoff had told me he believes that leaves blowing on a tree outside a window cause that symbol to appear.

I noticed that directly in front of me on the table was a small toy airplane made of polystyrene foam. I watched as the ceiling fan caused occasional gentle

movements to its tail or wings. "Are you here?" I asked, addressing any random spirit that might be hanging around.

"If you're here, would you make the airplane move?" I asked.

Immediately, the airplane slowly and methodically began to move. It stopped after it had rotated one complete half

I asked that the airplane be moved a second time. Once again, it moved precisely one half turn.

When Kirchhoff came back into the house, I told him about the airplane. We tried the experiment together, and, once again, the airplane moved precisely one half circle.

THE TALKING DEAD

We moved to the front room, where Kirchhoff said a good deal of paranormal activity tends to occur. He took the K2 meter and the Spirit Box. The room was empty except for a small, square plastic table. We knelt on either side of it, and Kirchhoff began to speak.

"Are you a man?" he asked. The K2 meter showed a single green light but didn't flash.

"Are you a woman?" he asked. The colored lights flashed. "See if it will say your name," I suggested to Kirchhoff.

"Can you say my name?" he asked.

The answer, in a woman's voice, was immediate and clear.

Kerchhoff picked up a playing card that was lying facedown with other cards on the table. Without looking at it or showing it to me, he held it behind his head.

"Let's play a little game," he said to the spirit. "Can you tell me what card I am holding?"

Kirchhoff looked at the card, then showed it to me. Seven.

UNSCATHED?

Satisfied that communication had occurred, we wrapped up our meeting. With the spooky Baker Hotel in my rearview mirror, I felt relieved that I had managed to make it out of the Haunted Hill House unscathed.

A few days later, I would question that.

On the Friday following my visit to the Haunted Hill House, I had an appointment for a haircut. Misha suddenly stopped what she was doing and asked, "What did you do to your

I had no idea what she meant. "You have a cut on the back of your nead, she said. It s ing. It's scabbed over."

She parted my hair and held up a mirror. There was a red, jagged, angry-looking cut spanning several inches. I had no idea how I could have sustained such an injury without having

The cut's possible connection to the Haunted Hill House didn't occur to me until late that night. If it was healing, as Misha said, then the cut would have been inflicted several days earlier. It had been six days since my trip to Haunted Hill.

Of course, skeptics may say, "For anyone who believes that a spirit caused that scratch, I have a bridge you might want to buy."

But for those who are into such things, Kirchhoff has a house he'd like to sell you.
