## Candidates speak front and center

Candidates for Granbury City Council and the Granbury School Board appeared Thursday night at a candidates forum sponsored by the Republican Party of Hood County and the Hood County Tea Party.

Each entity has two races on the Nov. 7 ballot.

The forum was held in council chambers at Granbury City Hall.

District Judge Ralph Walton served as moderator for the Q&A sessions, using written questions submitted by the audience.

Each forum lasted for about an hour. Candidates

spoke in rotating order.

Early voting continues through Friday at county Annex I, 1410 W. Pearl St. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Tuesday is Election Day. Polls throughout the county will be open that day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

### Race pits city against chamber

For the second time this election season, the four candidates for Granbury City Council squared off in a candidates forum.


Two incumbents are fighting to hang onto their seats.

Rose Myers of Place 4 has competition from Trish Reiner. Mickey Parson, who has held the Place 6 seat since May 2005, is facing Greg Corrigan, who feels it is time for "new blood."

Myers has been on the council for four years. She was elected to fill the unexpired term of Nin Hulett, who moved into the mayor's seat after former Mayor Rickie Pratt suffered a stroke.

"I think I'm not finished yet," Myers said in explaining why she wants another term. She said

### School hopefuls share views

Candidates for two seats on the Granbury School Board gave their opinions on those and other issues during Thursday night's candidates forum.

Political newcomers Kim Cruz, Maureen Griffin and Michael Moore are competing for the Place 1 seat vacated by Chris Tackett.

Another newcomer - Dinae Hicks - is challenging established incumbent Barbara Herrington for the Place 2 seat. Herrington has held that seat since May 2005.

### Tolar band marches on to state

Tolar's high school band will make back-to-back appearances in the state marching contest.

Tolar advances after chosen one of the top three bands in Saturday's area marching contest at chilly Waco Midway High School.

"The kids did a great job and did not let the weather elements affect them in the slightest," Tolar Head Band Director Bobby Yerigan said.

Tolar marched at state in 2015 and 2009, placing sixth both times. Bands are eligible for state only every other year.

Tolar was one of 24 Class 3A bands competing in the prelims Saturday. Tolar and nine other bands were picked for the finals that evening. Judges tapped Tolar and three others for the trip to state.

"They knew they had a job to do on Saturday (two times), and they knocked it out of the park," Yerigan said.

Twenty-one 3A bands will march at state in the San Antonio Alamodome Monday-Wednesday, Nov. 6-8. Tolar will march in the prelims at 12:45 p.m. Tuesday and the finals will be that evening.

### Teacher charged with asking girl for nude photos

A 23-year-old Granbury High School teacher was arrested and charged with criminal solicitation of a minor after allegedly asking a 16-year-old girl to send nude photographs, authorities said.

Kirby Chase Vineyard, an agricultural science teacher, was arrested by local law enforcement after asking the Granbury High School student to send him nude photos of herself on the social media site Snapchat, according to the official complaint.

Vineyard was jailed in the Hood County Law Enforcement Center and later released on \$15,000 bond set by Peace Justice Kathryn Gwinn.

Granbury ISD does not believe the incident involves any physical contact with students.

GHS administrators learned of the allegations on Thursday and immediately referred the matter to the Hood County District Attorney's Office, school officials said. At that time, Vineyard resigned from Granbury ISD.

Criminal solicitation of a minor is a third-degree felony that carries a punishment range of two years' probation to 10 years in prison.

School officials address educators about appropriate use of social media with students.

"It is part of our employee handbook and technology responsible use policy," GISD Director of Communications Jeff Meador said. "It is also a regular part of Dr. Largent's comments at New Employee Orientation and Convocation."

Largent, the school superintendent, said in a written statement Friday after the arrest, "The safety and well-being of our students is our highest priority at Granbury ISD. If any student or parent has any information related to the matter, please contact the district attorney's office. Additionally, GHS will make available counselors for any student who wishes to discuss this matter."

# Milkweed plants vital for butterfly gardens

While November may not be the month most people associate with romance, it is a great time to think about wooing monarch butterflies, said Lake Granbury Master Gardener Deborah Rollins.

Monarch butterflies depend

on the milkweed plant during all stages of their lives, she explained, and fall is a great time to plant them.

"Its roots will grow all winter, and in the spring, just as the first monarchs fly north, it will flower," Rollins said.

To help enterprising gardeners, entomologists and enthusiasts plant a monarch-worthy

butterfly garden, Master Gardeners will hold a free "Romancing the Monarch" event Sunday from 1:30 to 4 p.m. at the Lake Granbury Master Gardeners Demonstration Garden, behind Annex 1, 1410 W. Pearl St.

"You can have a great butterfly garden, but if you don't have milkweed, they will fly right by

you," Rollins said.

The come-and-go event will have a variety of opportunities to learn about monarch tagging and research, how to differentiate between monarchs and other orange butterflies, and how to include milkweed into a garden. Face and rock painting will be available for children.

Some gardeners may struggle

to incorporate milkweed into their idea of a tidy garden, she said.

"Milkweed has a little more flair," Rollins explained. "It is a pretty plant, just not a perfect plant."

It grows to about 4 feet tall and 4 feet wide, she said. Originally a prairie plant, the increasing urbanization of the Midwest

and widespread farming have reduced its range.

But milkweed is the only plant monarch mothers will lay eggs on and the only food source for the developing caterpillars, Rollins said.

Master Gardeners will be handing out milkweed seeds at the event, or plants will be available for purchase.

In her introductory statement, Cruz said she has been married for 26 years and has lived in Granbury that same amount of time. She said she is "fiscally responsible" and wants to "make a difference in the school system."

Griffin, a school volunteer and member of the district's speakers bureau, said she believes Granbury has "an amazing school district" and that she wants to work "collaboratively with other board members" to take the district "to a new level."

Moore, a banker with two children in elementary school, said he has lived in Granbury for almost 20 years and his wife has been a teacher in the Granbury school district for 21 years.

He said that he is "a product of public education" and believes in "fiscal responsibility."

Herrington, who retired after more than four decades in education, said that her experience, as well as her ranking by the Texas Association of School Boards as a "master trustee," means that she brings "something unique" to the school board.

Hicks was delayed at work and missed the introductory statement and the first few questions. However, her candidate paperwork states that she is co-owner of Lakeside Sports and has two children.

In a closing statement at the end of the hour-long forum, Hicks told the audience that she and her husband "love this town" and want to be involved. "I think I can shake things up a little bit," she said, adding that she is "outsoken" and "sometimes not politically correct."

### DOES MONEY=EDUCATION?

Candidates were asked to state their opinion about studies that have shown no correlation between money spent on education and the outcome in educational performance. They were also asked what GISD should focus on instead of more spending.

Griffin stressed the importance of ingenuity and adequate funding from the Legislature.

Moore said the district "might have to get creative on how we're focusing on spending our money," and Cruz said she would like to review "every program that we have" because "every dollar counts."

Herrington praised local churches that have helped financially by adopting schools and said, "I think you'd be hard pressed to find anybody that does a better job than this school district does with fiscal responsibility."

### TRANSGENDER DEBATE

Regarding transgender bathrooms, Moore said he does not think it's "an issue here in Granbury schools." He said he has confidence that, if it does become an issue, it will be handled in "an appropriate manner" by the district's leaders.

Herrington said she does not view the situation as a problem, but said, "As long as I can raise my hand, we will never have boys going into girls' dressing rooms or girls going

into boys' dressing rooms or the restrooms or vice versa."

Cruz spoke next. "This is a problem that's coming to all of us," she said, adding: "I really think that boys need to go into boys' restrooms and girls need to go into the girls' (restrooms). I don't think that exceptions need to be made."

Griffin said she agreed with Herrington, and added that she has "100 percent confidence" in GISD leadership to make the right decision on that issue.

Hicks had not yet arrived, so did not provide an answer to that question.

### TOO MANY ADMIN POSITIONS?

Another written question from an audience member was: "What is your opinion about whether there are too many administrative positions that are taking hard-earned money away from teachers?"

Herrington said that, according to state and national standards, Granbury ISD is "understaffed" in admin positions. She said she does not feel the district is top-heavy.

"(Administrators) may take money away from teachers, but they also take some of the burdens away," she said.

Cruz said it is her understanding that in Texas schools there is a ratio of one admin person per teacher.

"To me, that's top-heavy," she said. Her answer drew applause.

Both Griffin and Moore said they do not yet have an opinion on that issue because they need to research it further.

Hicks, who had arrived by that time, said: "I think we have too many administrators."

She detailed a phone call to the bus barn a couple of weeks ago in which she said she spoke to "three separate administrators." She also said that in an attempt to speak to Superintendent Jim Largent, she spoke to "four separate administrators."

"So, yes, I think we are way too top-heavy," she said. "I think there is some micro-managing going on."

A couple of minutes later, while responding to another question, Herrington addressed Hicks' claims about administrators.

She said there is only one administrator over transportation, but there are a couple of other employees in that department.

Should all have a voice? One question was whether the entire community - including pastors and taxpayers who have no children in the school system - should have a voice in how the school district is run.

Griffin and Moore said they feel everyone should have a voice and they encouraged attendance at school board meetings.

Hicks said that anyone who pays taxes has the right to voice their opinions.

Herrington agreed that everyone's opinion matters and said that everyone on the school board "needs to have an open ear."

that, among other goals, she wants to help make the Granbury Resort Conference Center profitable.

Reiner, who is chair of the Granbury Chamber of Commerce board and is endorsed by the Granbury Association of Realtors (as is Parson), said she is running because she wants to see more equitable representation on the council. Several members of the current council live in the same neighborhood.

Both Reiner and Myers work in the health care field. Corrigan works for a local elder care company. Parson is a CPA and Realtor.

Regarding debt and spending, Reiner said she favors researching grant possibilities for projects and letting voters decide projects that involve "an inordinate amount of money."

Myers noted that grant funds were used to pay part of the cost of the recently completed Downtown Streetscape Project and will pay for a large portion of the upcoming airport expansion.

She said she initially "fought" the airport project out of concern over costs and that expenses were reduced by more than \$100,000.

Corrigan noted that the city has an "excellent" bond rating, but added: "I think that there are things that have been done in town that could have been done a little better" and possibly at a cheaper rate.

Parson said: "Do we have too much debt? I don't think so."

He then went on to say that during his time on the council bond ratings have gone up three times, both for the General Fund and the Utility Fund, "which means our cost of borrowing is a lot less."

Parson also noted the low interest rate the city received to replace the city's water meter system, build the new desalination plant that is about to become operational and replace aging water delivery infrastructure.

The lake has been full for a while now, but Parson and Myers stressed that they fought the Brazos River Authority's permit for more water rights back when

water levels were alarmingly low.

Corrigan said he didn't think anyone would oppose continuing to fight the BRA.

Myers said it was "a very small group of people" who got up at 3 a.m. to board a bus for Austin to fight the BRA.

"I know who was on that bus, and it wasn't the chamber," she said.

Reiner noted that in December 2014 the chamber and the Granbury Association of Realtors signed a joint resolution opposing the BRA's attempts to take more water from Lake Granbury.

She said she supports "maintaining that" and that the City Council should serve as "a watch dog."

When making that statement, she added that she hopes to include an ethics clause in the City Charter, which is currently under review.

When asked to name successes with boards or organizations, Myers said that she is proud of her role in creating Visit Granbury, Inc., a nonprofit tourist organization that became financially independent within two years.

Corrigan listed his service on the city's Municipal Utility Advisory Board, which was involved in the water meter replacement project and the new desalination plant.

Corrigan also serves on the city's Zoning Board of Adjustment and is a volunteer firefighter.


Parson, who told the audience that he is 70, listed a number of projects with which he has been involved during his terms on the council. Those projects include the Opera House renovation, the creation of the City Beach and the Moments in Time hike and bike trail, and managing growth, both in terms of businesses and homes.

Corrigan, in his late 20s, stated that Parson has "done a great job for the last 12 years." However, he said that he is a "firm believer that everyone has their time." It is time, he said, "for some new blood, some new ideas."

District Attorney Rob Christian made a point to commend the superintendent.

"I appreciate the professionalism and transparency he exhibited in his handling this matter," Christian said.

According to the official complaint, the girl indicated that Vineyard had sent her Snapchat messages that asked "if she liked secrets, stated that he is attracted to her and asked her to send nudes."

The district attorney's office recorded a phone call between the girl and Vineyard, according to the complaint.

"Mr. Vineyard told (the

girl) to say nothing ever happened, to say it's rumor and that none of this happened," the complaint said. "Mr. Vineyard also asked (the girl) to delete the chats. Mr. Vineyard also told (the girl) that he could go to jail, that she is the only one he asked and that he shouldn't have ever done it. Mr. Vineyard also told (the girl) that he is going to go to counseling and that he is sorry. Mr. Vineyard indicated that (the girl) should not tell police the truth."

The complaint also said Vineyard indicated that it was "a onetime mistake."

# Memorial ride planned for Indian Harbor fire captain

A seven-year veteran of the Indian Harbor Volunteer Fire Department passed away Saturday.

Captain Frank Hawker had been battling cancer in his lung and brain since July, said Indian Harbor Fire Chief Jeff Young.

"Frank was our resources manager," Young said. "As a captain, he would be at the scene giving guidance and tactics to the guys as well as keeping them in safe, up-to-date gear."

Retired, Hawker joined the fire department in March 2010, Young said, and was an extremely active member of the volunteer force.

"We have a Top Hand award, and he has been in the running for at least the last five years,"

Young said. "To be considered, for the Top Hand, you have to go out on about 350 calls, which is half of all the calls we get."

Among the 17 people on the department's roster, Hawker was known for lifting the mood, he said.

"Frank was one of those people who was cracking jokes and making light of difficult situations," he said. "You could always count on him to have something funny to say."

In July, Hawker sought medical attention after his increasingly limited mobility kept him from going out on calls, Young said. He had been traveling to Fort Worth for cancer treatments.

The department had planned a benefit for Saturday to help him pay for those trips, but the money will now go to his family to assist them with their current

needs, Young said.

Car or motorcycle ride will begin at the Indian Harbor Fire Station at 10 a.m. and travel through several cities before returning to the fire station. The event is for all ages and includes door prizes, a raffle and food. Registration is \$10 and \$5 for each additional person.

# Judge: Man shows up drunk to DWI hearing

Showing up drunk for a court date on a driving while intoxicated charge is just what one man did, according to Hood County Court at Law No. 1 Judge Vincent Messina.

The man showed up intoxicated on the afternoon he was supposed to plead his case, Messina wrote in a Facebook

post on Thursday.

The man was arrested and his bond revoked, according to the post.

"As the sheriff's deputies were arresting him ... one of them pulled out a big bag. I thought, 'Oh Lord, he is about to puke all in my courtroom.' Everyone standing around him

started to scatter," Messina wrote. "They hustled him out stage right without incident."

Two juveniles were in the courtroom during the incident, he said.

"Boy, did they get a good lesson in straightening up," Messina wrote.

## Two men arrested during traffic stop

Two Hood County men were taken to jail after deputies found methamphetamine and prescription pills in their possession, authorities said.

Around 7:30 p.m. Thursday, deputies conducted a traffic stop at Loop 567 and Summerlin Drive, north of Granbury, said Public Information Officer Lt. Johnny Rose.

During the stop, Randy Lee Jones, 35, of Lipan, was found to be in possession of under a gram of methamphetamine, he said.

The passenger, Sean Michael Lee James, 33, of Granbury, gave a fake name to the deputies and admitted to eating several Xanax pills to prevent deputies from finding them, according to Rose.

Jones is charged with possession of a controlled substance, a state jail felony with a \$5,000 bond. James is charged with failure to identify, a misdemeanor, and tampering with evidence, a third-degree felony with a \$10,000 bond.

## DEFAMATION • ETHICS • FAKE NEWS

The obsession by the Hood County News into my personal business affairs continues: the latest edition being my homestead exemption. Like many others who move to Granbury, I decided to build a home here and make it my permanent residence. I planned to sell my old house once construction was completed; however, due to a bad real estate market in 2009, the sale never happened and the house was turned into an investment property. Until recently, I was unaware that Dallas County never removed the old exemption. In my real estate career, I have acquired a considerable number of properties over the years along with their corresponding tax bills. I have a service that assists in the payment and process of all property tax due. I NEVER intended to have two exemptions. I have contacted Dallas County and have requested invoices for any underpayment due to this oversight. This process has enlightened me to the fact that our county appraisal offices are not interconnected and therefore duplicate exemptions are never flagged for removal. However, the HCN article was never really about homestead exemptions anyway. It is undoubtedly their attempt to defame my character in hopes to sway the outcome of the City Council election on November 7th. This year, Ms. Cruz has contacted me several times for comment, none of which are related to City government.

She has written front page articles about a frivolous lawsuit over balconies in a Home Owners Association. She wrote a front page article about two phantom condominiums that were supposedly missing from the tax rolls. And yet when HCN's most beloved council member gives thousands of dollars in interest free loans to candidates that are challenging the incumbents, they deem this to not to be news worthy? Is there any doubt what would be splashed across the front page if it was Couch who was handing out interest free loans to candidates?? **All of this is an attempt to distract from the successes this council has had, and there are many:**

- OPERA HOUSE RENOVATION, WHICH HAS BEEN A HUGE SUCCESS IN BRINGING THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE TO DOWNTOWN ON A WEEKLY BASES • TURNED DEFICITS INTO SURPLUSES BY CREATING AN INDEPENDENT TOURISM AND MARKETING ORGANIZATION • THE HIRING OF A SEARCH FIRM THAT HAS BROUGHT US ONE OF THE MOST EXPERIENCED CITY MANAGERS IN RECENT MEMORY • NEW WATER METERS ARE BEING INSTALLED SO THAT CUSTOMERS CAN REVIEW USAGE IN REAL TIME

These are just some examples of the accomplishments championed by the current city council members. Unfortunately, the HCN has little interest in informing the public about these successes. Most recently, when the streets were opened to mark the completion of the new downtown Street-Scape project, providing for much needed safer sidewalks and areas for people to enjoy, HCN failed to report the elation that was felt by all who attended. Nor did they report that the corners causing issues with drivers had been resolved by implementing a new design. I am giving HCN notice that if you want commentary unrelated to my official capacity as a Granbury Council member, you need not waste your time. There will be no comment. My consolation in all of this is knowing that every morning when I awake, my livelihood does not rely on defaming others. The casualty in all of this is not me, my ego, or reputation. It is the people of Granbury and Hood County. Given the display over the past several months of the pettiness, self-interest and just plain hate written in the Hood County News, those among us who have considered serving in public office who are talented, experienced, gifted and passionate for Granbury will simply choose, "NO THANK YOU," and because of that, WE ALL LOSE.

## Lady Pirates eliminated in bi-district play

**NORTH CROWLEY** -- For the second straight year, the Granbury Lady Pirates' season came to a close at the hands of the Red Oak Lady Hawks in the UIL 5A bi-district playoff round.

But Granbury didn't let them off easy. Sure, the scoreline read 25-21, 25-8 and 25-15 in favor of Red Oak. That doesn't tell the whole story.

Granbury led 5-0 in the opening set. In those first five points, the Lady Pirates looked like they could beat anyone in Texas, not just Red Oak.

But the Lady Hawks were 34-5 coming into this match, the champions of District 10-5A, and they were no easy foe. Red Oak stormed back, and the first set turned into a tense battle.

Granbury crawled back from a 21-16 deficit to trail by one at 22-21. The Lady Pirates had all the momentum and forced Red Oak to call a timeout.

The Lady Hawks responded out of the break and scored the next three points. Set over, momentum over.

Red Oak rode that momentum to a rollicking 25-8 win in

the second set, scoring the last 10 points in a row.

In the first few points of the third set, Granbury hung with its opponent. But once the score read 10-6 in favor of Red Oak, the Lady Hawks pulled away, scoring 15 of the next 24 points to win 25-15 and advance to the area round.

Granbury head coach Tammy Clark tipped her hat to Red Oak after the game.

"Red Oak will compete well in postseason play," she said. "They're a fantastic team, and I expect that they'll make it all the way to the regional tournament at least."

Granbury's season ended with a 19-25 record. The Lady Pirates were the fourth-place finishers in District 9-5A.

Clark said after the season had ended that she was excited for what the future holds for Granbury volleyball.

"Most of them will continue to still compete well for us for quite a few more years," she said. "They're aggressive, aggressive young girls, and it's going to be fun."

For the seniors, Madison Scott, Valentina Crippa and Haley McLane, Clark said she was appreciative of the leadership they had shown this season.

"The senior leadership was steady, and hopefully the younger ones took that lesson with them," she said.


With such a young team, Granbury did well to make the playoffs at all.

## Pirates can't stop Centennial ground game; Cleburne next

**BURLESON** -- Two Fridays, two ground-and-pound option opponents and two straight losses for the Granbury Pirates.

That's the situation after Granbury went to Burlleson Centennial on Friday night and lost, 51-20.

The Centennial Spartans run a flexbone, option-style offense; Granbury's previous opponent, the Everman Bulldogs, run the option out of the Wing-T.

Granbury's run defense was tested yet again, as Centennial put up 353 yards on the ground and chewed up clock. The Spartans threw just seven passes and ran 55 running plays for an average of 6.4 yards per rush.

"There is nothing more demoralizing than not being able to stop the run," Granbury head coach Chad Zschiesche said. "When you know the run's coming, and you can't stop it, it wears on you mentally, physically and emotionally."

On the offensive side, the Pirates couldn't get into a flow. They went 1-11 on third-down conversions, preventing any sort of rhythm from developing.

"When you can't convert third downs and move the chains, it's hard to get in a rhythm," Zschiesche said, "and when you can't get in a rhythm, it's hard to score."

Ty Williams provided a spark of life in the first quarter, taking a handoff 63 yards up the left side and blowing by the entire Centennial defense for a score.

Half of the press box simultaneously said "there he goes" when he took off -- there was no doubt he was going to score.

But that would be the last big play for Granbury. The Pirates didn't have a run over 10 yards for the rest of the game.

The next two Granbury touchdowns came through the air, with Kevin Moore finding Zach McCreight and Clayton Jones hitting Blake Jones for scores.

The loss dropped Granbury to 4-4 (1-4 District 9-5A). Centennial improved to 4-4 (3-2 Dis-

trict 9-5A).

### A BREAK FROM THE RUN

Granbury's next opponent, the Cleburne Yellowjackets, run the type of spread offense that most high schools are adopting these days.

"You see it more often, one because we run it and two because most other teams run it," Zschiesche said. "So, sure, our guys are more familiar with it."

Defensively, Cleburne runs a three-man front, with either three or four linebackers depending on the play. They're not afraid to blitz and stunt, which means that while the Yellowjackets are opportunistic, they're also vulnerable to the types of big plays that Granbury has been able to manufacture all year.

"They're gonna get you on a few plays, just because of what they do," Zschiesche said. "When you get them, it can be six points in a hurry."

The Yellowjackets have had a down year. Cleburne has yet to win a game and enter into Friday's contest at 0-8 (0-5 District 9-5A).

In their last game, the Yellowjackets lost to Burlleson 35-7.

Still, Zschiesche said his team isn't viewing this as an easy win.

"We view it as a rivalry, and we fully expect for our team to respond and come out ready to go on Friday," he said.

Granbury and Cleburne will kick off at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Pirate Stadium.



## Safety propels Tolar win; Rattlers can lock down playoff berth Friday

What a way to win. Tied in Dublin 28-28, 30 seconds left but the Lions have the ball on fourth down near their own end zone, and Tolar head coach Jeremy Mullins calls time-out, hoping for some miracle on the punt.

"They were probably going to run the clock out and go to overtime," Mullins said. "We sent everybody on the punt." Dublin snapped the ball over the punter's head. Safety. Tolar won, 30-28, and moved to 5-3 (2-1 District 4-3A Division II). It wasn't pretty, but it got the job done.

"I'd rather it not have been such a close game," Mullins said. "It wasn't the prettiest. We struggled a bit finishing drives off."

"But at this point in the year, I'll take a win however it comes."

Tolar dominated on the ground, with 51 carries for 298 yards, an average of 5.84 yards per rush. James Henderson led the way with 152 yards rushing and a touchdown. Mason King and Bryan Morgan also scored rushing touchdowns, Morgan linked up with Henderson on a score through the air as well.

The win carried a large amount of significance. It puts Tolar in a very favorable spot in

terms of the postseason going into the final two games of the district schedule.

Tolar's 2-1 district record means the Rattlers are in solo third place in the district. Eastland and Cisco are both 3-0, Dublin is 1-2, and Coleman and Bangs have yet to record a district win.

But Mullins isn't ready to rest just yet.

"A couple of people came up and said congrats" as if Tolar

had clinched a playoff spot, Mullins said. "But there's nothing solidified. There's still some crazy options, crazy outcomes."

### A CLASH WITH CISCO

They may not have officially clinched a berth to the postseason on Friday, but Tolar has a chance to lock down a spot in the playoffs on Friday against Cisco.

The Rattlers will have home field advantage, which is a plus. They'll need all the help they can get against a very talented Cisco team that runs a punishing style of offense.

"Cisco's going to do what they do," Mullins said. "Coach (Brent) West has been there forever. They run a power game, a lot of two-back sets, and they'll toss it to a big running back and let him get downhill."

Mullins said Cisco's offense is comparable to Crawford, whom Tolar played in the first week of the season.

Still, the defensive line is one of Tolar's strongest units, and the linebackers aren't too far behind. A power-run team will have a hard time breaking through the tough Tolar line.

"We're excited for the test and excited for the opportunity," Mullins said.

Tolar and Cisco will kick off at 7:30 p.m. from Rattler Stadium.




