Groundbreaking set for lakeside apartments

They'd start sooner, but it's deer season. Developer Don Murphy said he will close on the Brazos Crossing lakefront apartments in December, but will put off breaking ground until January.

Murphy said that, because of deer season, subcontractors would miss about half a month's work if the project got underway in December and, well, why pay interest during that time? Eight two- and three-story apartment buildings will go up on an eight-acre parcel of land on Hill Boulevard, behind the Avalon Shopping Center

(where Chili's and Flames restaurants are located). Local elected officials have been saying for a while that more multi-family housing is needed in Granbury and Hood County. Bob Hill, who owns the land along with his brother, Kelly, said a market PLEASE SEE APARTMENTS | 2A

State increases victims' compensation benefits

Recovering from a violent crime can be an expensive process.

To help, the Texas Criminal Victims' Compensation program benefit limits were increased last year, said state Attorney General Ken Paxton.

In financial year 2017, the program paid out \$64 million, \$16.8 million more than in 2016, according to state records.

The compensation provided to victims in each county during 2017 is still being calculated, according to the attorney general's office.

In 2016, before the increase went into effect, 15 Hood County victims were awarded \$71,282 in compensation, according to state records.

The state also reimbursed Hood County law enforcement agencies \$21,152 in sexual assault exam costs in 2016, according to state records.

The Crime Victims Compensation Program reimburses victims and their families for certain crime-related expenses up to \$50,000, according to the attorney general's office.

Reimbursement includes loss of income, loss of support, medical costs, mental health counseling, rent and relocation assistance, and funeral and burial costs.

The fund is paid for by criminal court costs, fees and fines from convicted offenders. No taxpayer money is involved.

"The aftermath of violent crimes causes heavy financial, physical and emotional burdens for survivors and their families," Paxton said. "While

no amount of money can lessen a crime victim's pain, my office is committed to doing everything it can to assist Texans who face enormous obstacles on their road to recovery."

Mary Flores, the crime victim liaison for the Hood County Sheriff's Office, said she has helped victims file for compensation.

"This program is very important since most of our local resources are limited on how much funding for each individual who is seeking assistance, Flores explained. "The CVC Program may provide financial assistance to victims of violent crime for related expenses that cannot be reimbursed by insurance or other sources."

To apply for the program, a victim must be a Texas resident or a U.S. resident victimized in Texas, she said. Texas residents victimized in a state that does not have a compensation fund may also apply.

Applicants must report the crime in a timely manner and must cooperate with the investigation and prosecution, Flores said.

A victim's dependent, family or household member or authorized representative may also apply.

In addition to the sheriff's office, information and application forms are available at Mission Granbury, the Paluxy Children's Advocacy Center, Hood County courts and

Woman, 86, dies after joyous family reunion

An 86-year-old woman died and two other people, also in their 80s, were seriously injured in a two-vehicle crash after leaving a family reunion Saturday afternoon southwest of Granbury.

The accident was on Paluxy Highway west of Neri Road. Loretta Embrey, of Waxahachie, was taken by air ambulance to Harris Hospital in Fort Worth where she died later that day.

Greg Cobb posted on Facebook: "My Nannies (sic) last day here on this Earth was spent exactly

the way she wanted it to be. It is very rare for our family to all be able to get together and enjoy in each (other's) company. She loved her family more than anything and was sooooo happy that we were together at the reunion. We all got to hug her, we all got to tell her we loved her. Her last words to me were, 'Greg, I'm so happy that everyone was able to make it here today! What a wonderful day this has been!' Nannie left this world a very happy lady and pain free."

Embrey was a passenger in a 2003 Cadillac driven by Roland Coker, 86, also of Waxahachie. He and another passenger, Betty Mclead, 81, also of Wax-

ahachie, were taken by air ambulance to Harris.

Coker was turning left (north) out of a private roadway off Paluxy Highway to travel toward Granbury and failed to yield right of way to a southbound 2003 Chevrolet Tahoe driven by Carri Tuggle, 41, of Tolar, according to the Texas Highway Patrol.

The Tahoe hit the front left of the Cadillac, and both vehicles traveled into the east barrow ditch of Paluxy Highway, troopers said.

Coker and Mclead are expected to recover, said highway patrol Staff Sgt. Dub Gillum.

Tuggle, who had minor inju-

ries, posted on Facebook:

"I was notified while in the hospital she passed after she was revived then (airlifted) to Harris. Been a hard day for sure. I keep seeing their sweet faces, I somehow finally got out of my (Tahoe) when you can't even open the door. It was God letting me out for sure, I hopped over to their car and tried to help them and a bunch of people showed up then. Just can't sleep and yet so tired and body sore."

Tuggle added, "I held the (lady's) hand (that) was in the back seat (Mclead). She kept asking if I was okay and she was sorry."

County sets workshop to talk developers, regs

The Hood County Commissioners Court has scheduled a workshop to figure out how to effectively enforce regulations among developers who have put substandard roads in some developments.

The meeting is scheduled for

2 p.m. Tuesday in the Jury Selection Room at the Hood County Justice Center. It will be open to the public.

An engineer with an independent firm that does work for the county is expected to attend, as well as County Attorney Matt Mills.

The effort is being spearheaded by Precinct 3 Commissioner

Bruce White, the newest member of the court. He has extensive experience at constructing roads.

Commissioners will discuss what the county's legal options are, as well as how best to provide help for Road Operations Director Donald Linney.

White said that Linney cannot manage to personally in-

spect every road in the growing county while handling his many other responsibilities.

Mills told the Hood County News last week that he is open to prosecuting developers who violate the county's regulations.

He noted, however, that many of the regulations lack clarity.

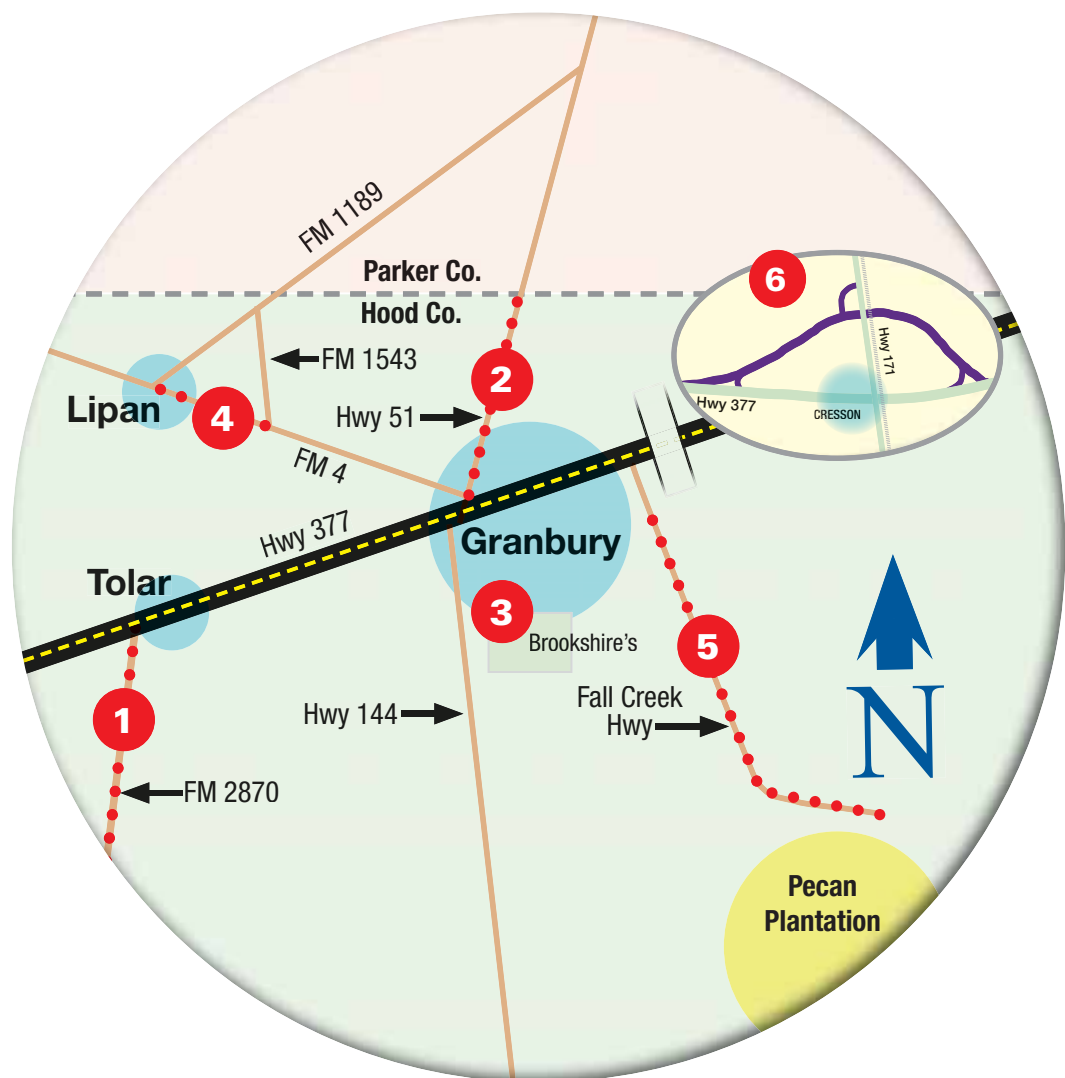

TxDOT projects

- 1. FM 2870** - TxDOT maintenance crews will perform pavement work on FM 2870 (Rock Church Hwy) from FM 205 (Chalk Mountain Rd) to Tolar starting in mid-November. The work will take approximately two weeks.
- 2. FM 51** - FM 51 will be re-striped from north of Lake Granbury to the Parker County line (where Temple Hall Hwy intersects 51) starting in mid-November. The work will take approximately two to three days.
- 3. SINKHOLE BY BROOKSHIRE'S** - The remaining work includes construction of the retaining wall, waterline, culvert, curb and parking lot pavement. The work is expected to be completed by the end of the year.
- 4. FM 4** - Construction is estimated to begin in early 2018 to add shoulders on FM 4 from FM 1189 to FM 1543. The \$2.1 million project is estimated for completion in summer 2018.
- 5. FALL CREEK HIGHWAY** - Work is underway on the widening of FM 167 (Fall Creek Highway). The \$2.6 million project is adding shoulders on FM 167 from FM 4 to County Road 306. It is estimated for completion in summer 2018.
- 6. CRESSON BYPASS** - The Highway 377 Cresson bypass environmental assessment was cleared last month with a finding of no significant impact for construction, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. Right-of-way acquisition and utility relocation have begun for the bypass, which will be west of Cresson. A contractor is expected to be selected in the summer of 2018 with construction starting soon after.

district attorney's office, the Lake Granbury Medical Center's Eligibility Screening Services and the Texas Attorney General's office, Flores said.

Appointments to talk about an application with Flores can be made by calling 817-579-3330, she said.

"I always suggest that a victim visit with one these agencies before submitting the application or at least to look over the application," she said. "You want to make sure the application is completed correctly and all required documents are attached with the application."

The program focuses on paying expenses that are not covered by insurance, worker's compensation or settlements, Flores said.

study done about a year ago and another one done within the past few months "indicate a very strong need for multi-family housing in Granbury."

Both Hills are partners with Murphy on the Brazos Crossing project. Their deceased father, John, was a philanthropist whose gifts to the community included donating the nearby house that serves as a headquarters for the Ruth's Place free medical clinic.

"How long has it been since a multi-family project of this magnitude has been built in Granbury?" Bob Hill said. "There is a definite need, and we hope to fill that void with attractive, affordable multi-family homes that will probably have the best view."

With views of the City Beach, fireworks over the lake during the Fourth of July and, during the holidays, a brightly-lit square, "it doesn't get a whole lot better than that," Hill said.

Brazos Crossing will have its own dog park and a beach area with white sand stretching 1,000 feet wide and 40 feet deep to give the complex a resort feel.

It will have 130 units, 68 of which will have one bedroom and 62 of which will have two bedrooms.

There will be four different floor plans for each size unit.

Four of the buildings will be three-story and four will be two-story.

Monthly rent will range from \$900 to \$1,400, according to Murphy.

Some of the apartments will have attached garages, and some will have garages that are detached. Other units will have carports.

Murphy said the complex could have had 24 more units, but he and the Hills designed the plans so that most of the trees on the property will be saved.

"Almost every tree on that site will still be standing when we finish," Murphy said. "You can't replace mature, 100-year-old oaks and pecans."

Some of the white beach sand will be beneath some of those trees, Murphy said, enabling residents to lounge in the sun or in shade.

Murphy anticipates that construction will take about a year to complete.

However, he said that leasing of the first units will probably begin in August or September of next year.

"We'll be leasing while completing the last few months of construction," he said.

Murphy said he is receiving positive feedback, mostly from "interested tenants."

"People can't wait until we open," he said.

Murphy added that Brazos Crossing will be the type of apartment homes "that you typically find in major cities."

Police find drugs inside vehicle's dashboard; driver arrested

Police arrested a local man after finding multiple types of drugs hidden inside his dashboard, officials said.

On Thursday, Granbury police officers stopped Jacob Guerra, 27, of Granbury, on Pioneer Road for a traffic violation, said Lieutenant Russell Grizzard.

Guerra was arrested for possession of a controlled substance penalty group one, more than 1 gram but less than 4 grams, a third-degree felony.

Officers found marijuana, methamphetamine, unauthorized prescription medication and a loaded handgun in a void inside the dash, Grizzard said.

He is also charged with misdemeanors for possession of a controlled substance penalty group three, less than 28 grams; unlawful carrying of a weapon; possession of a dangerous drug; and possession of marijuana, less than 2 ounces.

Home saved after stove catches fire

Firefighters' quick removal of a burning stove limited damage inside a mobile home, said Fire Marshal Ray Wilson.

At 7:26 a.m. on Friday, a structure fire was reported on Rickabaugh Road south of Granbury, Wilson said.

An off-duty Tolar firefighter was the first to reach the scene and ensured everyone was out of the single-wide mobile home, he said.

The Granbury, Tolar and Indian Harbor fire departments were dispatched to the scene, along with Texas EMS and the Hood County Fire Marshal's Office.

Firefighters removed a stove/oven that was on fire, Wilson said, and the fire was extinguished with minimum damage to the residence.

All damage was confined to the stove and cabinets next to the stove, he said. There were no injuries, and the occupants were only minimally displaced, Wilson said.

Early morning fire destroys empty mobile home

At 3 a.m. on Oct. 31, a grass fire was reported on Green Brook Street in Oak Trail Shores, said Fire Marshal Ray Wilson.

Sheriff's deputies were the first to arrive at the scene

and reported a structure had burned to the ground, Wilson said.

"This was an older single-wide mobile home that had not been occupied for at least five years," Wilson said.

The cause of the fire is under investigation, and no one was injured in the fire, he said.

Fire stations that responded to the call included Station 70, North Hood County and Granbury.

GHS turns in 2,004 enrollment to UIL

Granbury High School recently submitted student enrollment data for the University Interscholastic League's biennial reclassification and realignment process.

The official number for Granbury is 2,004 students.

The UIL will use the numbers to determine athletic and academic competition districts for the 2018-19 and 2019-20 school years. That announcement will be made in early February 2018.

In 2015, GHS was in Class 5A with 1,959.5 students for the realignment process - up from the 1,911 turned in 2013.

The class is currently composed of schools with student populations between 1,100 and 2,149. 6A schools are those with 2,150 students and above.

For the upcoming realign-

ment, the UIL is expected to divide Class 5A into Division I and Division II by school population for football only.

TOLAR

Tolar High School turned in a 238 enrollment, down one from 2015. Tolar Superintendent Travis Stilwell thinks Tolar will remain Class 3A.

LIPAN

Lipan's high school enrollment was 96, an increase of two from 2015. Lipan Superintendent Cindy Edwards believes Lipan will stay Class A, but growing elementary and junior high enrollment "will more than likely push us over the classification threshold" in two years, Edwards said.

Pirates survive wild ending to beat Cleburne

With 6:47 left in the third quarter against Cleburne at Pirate Stadium on Friday, the Granbury Pirates took a 39-7 lead on a 13-yard rush from Zach Adams.

Then things got weird. There's no other way to put it – the last 18 minutes on the way to a 41-34 Granbury win were almost unbelievable to watch.

Cleburne recovered two on-side kicks in the second half and scored three touchdowns, all on long pass plays down the left side, in a span of seven minutes to cut the Granbury lead to 39-34 with 2:03 left, pending the extra-point conversion after a Yellowjackets touchdown.

That conversion, a pass to the right flat, was intercepted by Granbury's Daegon Saffle and returned 100 yards for two points for the Pirates.

And somehow that still wasn't the weirdest thing that happened. When Granbury quarterback Kevin Moore tried to run the last seven seconds off the clock by sprinting backward with a Cleburne defender holding on, the referees ruled that his forward progress had stopped, and gave the ball back to the Yellowjackets with a second left.

Cleburne got two cracks at a Hail Mary thanks to a pass interference call, but wasn't close on either one, bringing a rather anticlimactic end to the game.

Granbury head coach Chad Zschiesche said that while he was happy for the seniors, who were playing their final game at Pirate Stadium, he was "frustrated" with his team's inability to close out the game securely.

“You better recognize where those two are – and neither one of them will be hard to find,” Zschiesche said. “They’re large individuals.”

“If you don’t wanna watch the football, watch our center versus the nose guard. That’ll be a good matchup.” The Cougars’ offensive line is the weak point of the team, Zschiesche said, so the Pirates will look to exploit that as much as possible and blow up Seguin’s ground game.

Despite Cisco loss, Rattlers clinch playoff berth

The Tolar Rattlers ran into a very strong Cisco team on Friday night at home and lost 40-14.

“I think offensively we did well, we moved the ball pretty good and had over 300 yards,” Tolar head coach Jeremy Mullins said. “We didn’t finish good enough, so there’s certainly some things there.”

“And, defensively, they’re just a team where one little missed assignment turns into a huge play. So we just gave up too many big plays in the first half.”

The Tolar offense was bolstered by a touchdown run of over 60 yards from James Henderson in the first quarter.

The loss dropped Tolar to 5-4 (2-2 District 4-3A Division II) on the season.

The outcome of that game surely mattered to first-year head coach Jeremy Mullins and

his players. But the Rattlers accomplished something on Friday night despite the loss.

They’ve officially earned a postseason berth in the UIL 3A Division II playoffs.

Playing in the postseason might seem like a birthright to Tolar fans, and rightly so – the Rattlers are a perennial playoff team – but it shouldn’t be overlooked that Tolar seemingly hasn’t missed a step since Mullins took over.

“This is the fun part now,” Mullins said. “All the hot days, and two-a-days, and going against each other, and then you finally play other teams, and that’s fun, but then it kind of becomes a long stretch of games – and then now, this is what you worked for.”

The Rattlers will most likely play Alpine in Big Spring next week, if all current standings hold.

In Tolar’s football offices, there’s a hallway with a wall of

photos of past Rattler teams that have had success. To get on that wall, you either have to win a district title or win a playoff game.

The district title is out of Tolar’s hands now; either Cisco or Eastland will claim that. But the Rattlers still have a very good chance to make some noise in the playoffs.

“It doesn’t matter where you’re at, but if your name is on that bracket you’ve got a chance. So we’ve done that, and now we have to put ourselves in the best position possible by taking care of business Friday.”

GET SOME MOMENTUM

Tolar’s final game of the season is Friday against the Coleman Bluecats.

Coleman enters this game with a 3-6 (2-2 District 4-3A Division II) record, the same district as Tolar. The winner of this game will be the third seed in the playoffs, while the loser will

be the fourth.

“Coleman’s good,” Mullins said. “They’ve gotten a couple of guys back here recently, and so that has certainly helped them.”

“Their record probably doesn’t speak to the talent that they have. They’re playing better obviously here lately the last couple of weeks.”

Offensively, Coleman will present a similar look as Cisco

did last week.

“They’re a similar team offensively to Cisco, as far as what they do scheme-wise,” Mullins said. “They’re not just like Cisco, but they’re gonna run the ball.”

“They’re a run-first, throw it when they have to type team.”

For Tolar, the similarities in offenses will allow the Rattlers defense to try and fix some mistakes they made against Cisco.

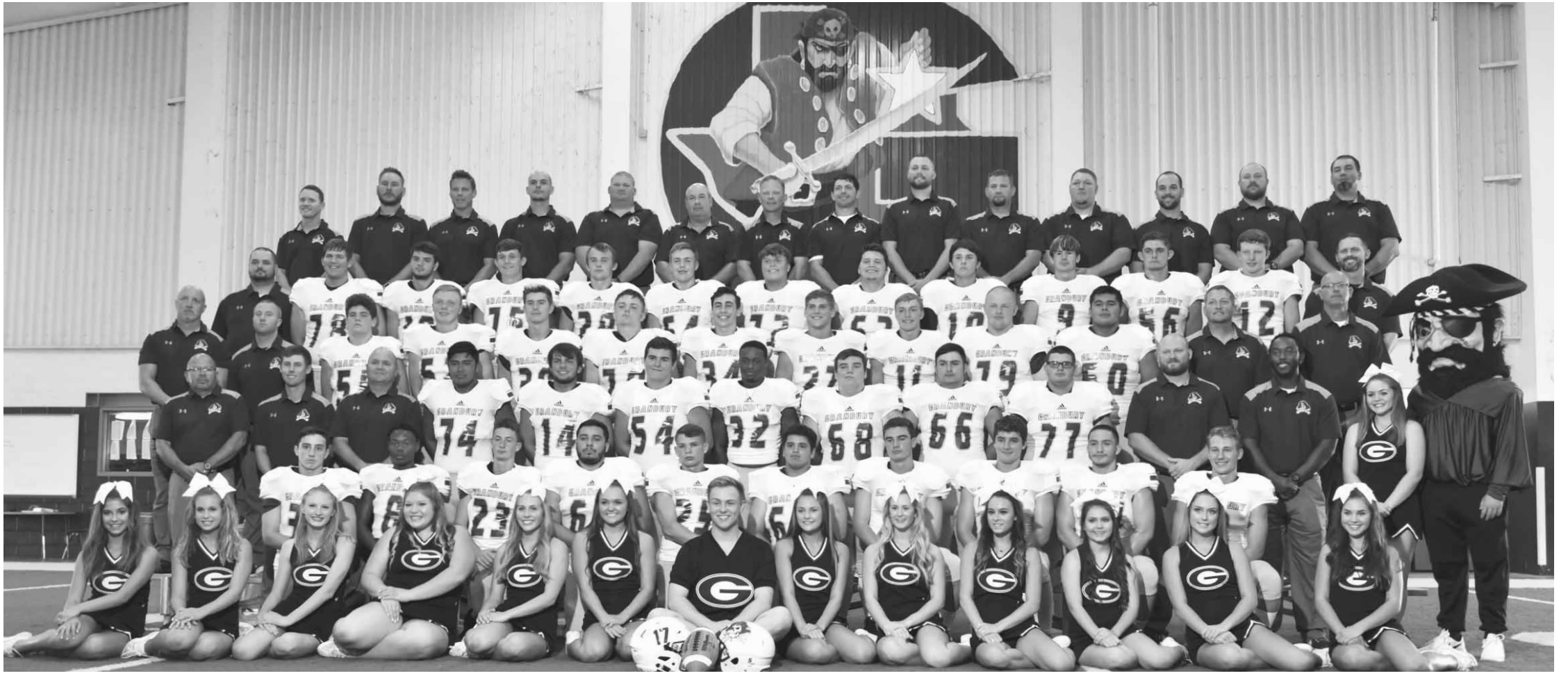

A Football Life

Former NFLer Jon Gilliam celebrates life while fighting Alzheimer's

Just one look at Jon Gilliam, even at the age of 79, and you can tell pretty easily that he was a football player.

He's built sturdily, with long limbs and big hands. When he stands up, he has an athletic stance that makes it look as though he's ready to either drop down into his natural center position or lay a block on a passing defender.

Gilliam, a seven-year NFL veteran who served as the center and captain for the Kansas City Chiefs in the first Super Bowl, lives in Granbury with his wife Becki. Their beautiful house with a great view of the Granbury countryside has an entire corner dedicated to memorabilia from Jon's playing days - cleats, footballs, commemorative Coke bottle caps.

Those help serve as reminders of how much Jon accomplished in his career. He has Alzheimer's disease, and his memory isn't what it used to be.

Becki, who often acts as Jon's mouthpiece, filling in the blanks when he can't, said that her husband's memory of football plays and people is actually better than his memory of daily life.

"He can remember all the plays," Becki said, "just don't ask him what he had for lunch an hour ago."

CELEBRATION TIME

With Jon's Alzheimer's progressing, the Gilliams wanted to make sure he could be reconnected with family and friends, both from his playing days and his current life. Inspired by a former teammate of his at East Texas State (now

Texas A&M-Commerce), who also has Alzheimer's and held an 80th birthday party earlier this year, Becki started reaching out to different groups.

"I started thinking, with his Alzheimer's, I don't know where we're going to be for his 80th (birthday)," Becki said. "So I started it off saying 'Jon Ray's Lookin' Fine at 79.'"

The Gilliams are active members of the Dallas-Fort Worth Chapter of the NFL Players' Association, so she rallied some of those men and their wives. Becki is in charge of organizing the reunion for Jon's East Texas teams that won three straight Lone Star Conference titles from 1958-1961, so she tapped into her contacts there as well.

She invited a couple of people from their church, Stone-Water, and that invitation spread through the congregation. By the end of it all, the Gilliams' house could barely fit all the party-goers inside on Saturday, Oct. 28.

"This was like happy hour at a nice nightclub," Becki said. "It was packed."

GETTING HIS DUE RECOGNITION

In addition to the party, Jon also received a unique gift. Through some connections with the NFLPA and the city of Fort Worth, Jon received a Certificate of Recognition from Fort Worth Mayor Betsy Price for his "athletic achievements, business success, Christian leadership and positive impact on the communities he has served."

The Gilliams have done a significant amount of work outside of Jon's performance on the playing field (which was outstanding, to be sure - he was a Pro Bowl selection in his first year). He wanted to be a

cowboy - not a Dallas Cowboy, but a real Western cowboy - as a kid, so when he earned his paycheck from the NFL, Jon bought himself a ranch in East Texas.

With the NFLPA, the Gilliams are trying to bring more retired players in the Metroplex area into an active role with the D/FW chapter. Through that organization, Jon and many other former players have had a chance to receive treatments and benefits they otherwise wouldn't.

"They're working on various different resources to help

players," Becki said. Those issues include sleep apnea treatments, free hearing aids and an experimental stem cell treatment.

The NFLPA likes to use the phrase "one locker room, one team" for retired players. No longer battling each other out on the gridiron, retired NFL players are now working together and developing friendships across team lines.

That was glaringly evident at Jon Gilliam's birthday party. For a man that was there on the field for the first Super Bowl, players came together to remi-

nise about the old days and swap stories of the old legends.

The Gilliams aren't giving up the fight against Alzheimer's just yet. Last Friday, they started a memory-regaining treatment that has proven effective in war veterans suffering from trauma, and they hope the treatment might help Jon, too.

They may not know where they'll be when Jon Gilliam turns 80 next year. But as his 79th birthday party showed, they know they'll have the support of dozens of former players that Gilliam fought alongside with on the field.

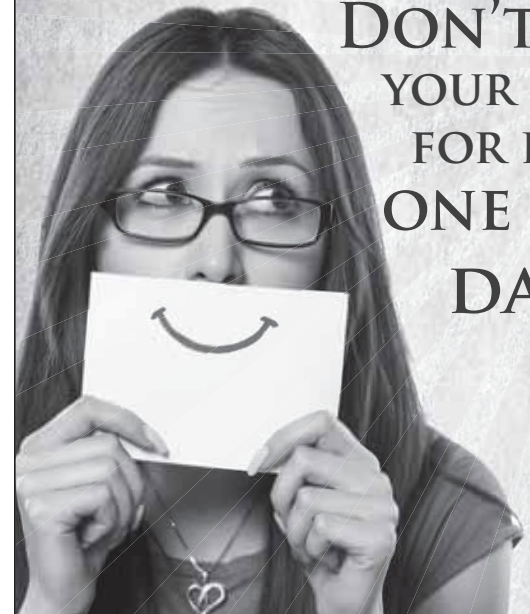

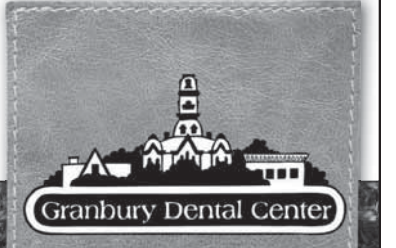

Remember those spelling tests back in school? Back when we learned the different spellings for principle and principal. I remembered the different spellings because the school principal is your pal.

As the leader at Acton Elementary School, Anna Roe is definitely a principal.

She dreamed of a career in education as a child, and taught in elementary school before moving into administration.

This high-energy lady loves to watch the Texas Rangers and Dallas Cowboys, is married and has six kids involved in sports, cheerleading and gymnastics.

Q. How did you become interested in education? Were you influenced by someone or something? Did you play "school" as a child?

Ever since I can remember, it has always been my dream to be in education.

When I was six years old, I woke up to the most memorable Christmas ever. Running to find my presents, I ran into the world's largest chalkboard. Even more, the room was filled with any

and every teaching supply you could imagine, even teacher edition textbooks that my mom had saved from outdated adoptions at the school where she taught.

I knew without a doubt that I would become a teacher one day. I never looked back; it's what I was going to do.

Even though I never questioned the decision, my true passion for becoming an educator came from someone who did not know he would forever change my life. My sister was in the fourth grade and in her class was a boy who always got in trouble.

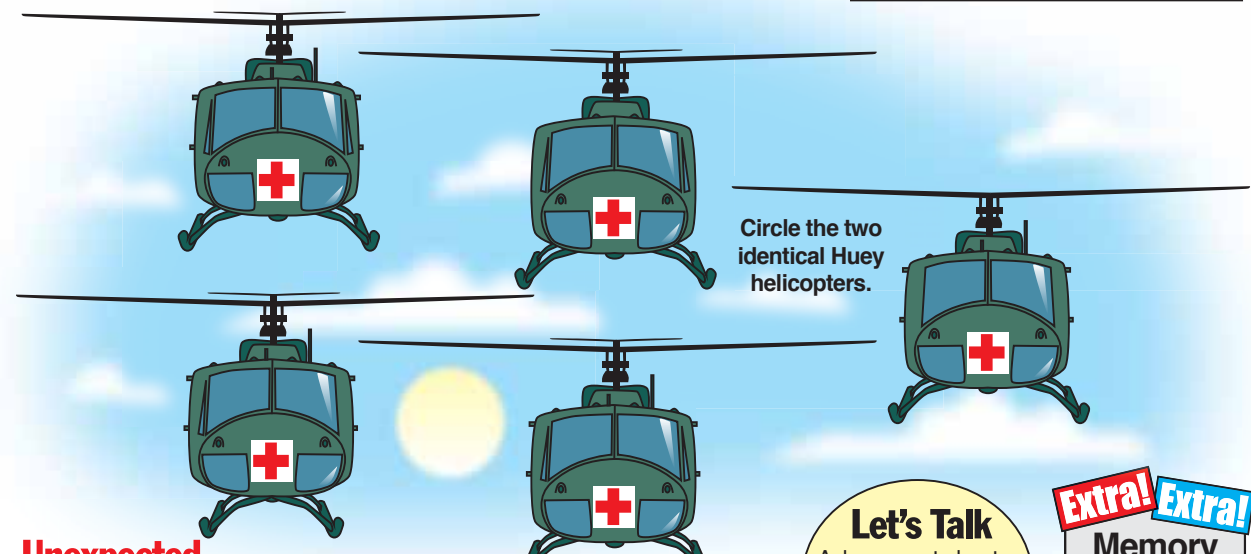
