Embrey was a passenger in a 2003 Cadillac driven by Roland Coker, 86, also of Waxahachie. He and another passenger, Betty Mclead, 81, also of Waxahachie, were taken by air ambulance to Harris.

Coker was turning left (north) out of a private roadway off Paluxy Highway to travel toward Granbury and failed to yield right of way to a southbound 2003 Chevrolet Tahoe driven by Carri Tuggle, 41, of Tolar, according to the Texas Highway Patrol.

The Tahoe hit the front left of the Cadillac, and both vehicles traveled into the east barrow ditch of Paluxy Highway, troopers said.

Coker and Mclead are expected to recover, said highway patrol Staff Sgt. Dub Gillum.

State increases victims' compensation benefits

Recovering from a violent crime can be an expensive pro-

To help, the Texas Criminal Victims' Compensation program benefit limits were increased last year, said state Attorney General Ken Paxton.

In financial year 2017, the program paid out \$64 million, \$16.8 million more than in 2016, according to state

records. The compensation provided to victims in each county during 2017 is still being calculated, according to the attorney

general's office. In 2016, before the increase went into effect, 15 Hood County victims were awarded \$71,282 in compensation, according to state records.

The state also reimbursed Hood County law enforcement agencies \$21,152 in sexual assault exam costs in 2016, according to state records.

The Crime Victims Compensation Program reimburses victims and their families for certain crime-related expenses up to \$50,000, according to

the attorney general's office. Reimbursement includes loss of income, loss of support, medical costs, mental health counseling, rent and relocation assistance, and funeral and burial costs.

The fund is paid for by criminal court costs, fees and fines from convicted offenders. No taxpayer money is involved.

"The aftermath of violent crimes causes heavy financial, physical and emotional burdens for survivors and their families," Paxton said. "While

of money can lessen a crime victim's pain, my office is committed to doing everything it can to assist Texans

who face enormous obstacles on their road to recovery."

Mary Flores, the crime victim liaison for the Hood County Sheriff's Office, said she has helped victims file for compensation.

"This program is very important since most of our local resources are limited on how much funding for each individual who is seeking assistance, Flores explained. "The CVC Program may provide financial assistance to victims of violent crime for related expenses that cannot be reimbursed by insurance or other

sources. To apply for the program, a victim must be a Texas resident or a U.S. resident victimized in Texas, she said. Texas residents victimized in a state that does not have a compensation fund may also apply.

Applicants must report the crime in a timely manner and must cooperate with the investigation and prosecution, Flores said.

A victim's dependent, family or household member or authorized representative may also apply.

In addition to the sheriff's office, information and application forms are available at Mission Granbury, the Paluxy Children's Advocacy Center, Hood County courts and

study done about a year ago and another one done within the past few months "indicate a very strong need for multi-family housing in Granbury.'

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

GHS turns in 2,004 enrollment to UIL

Granbury High School recently submitted student enrollment data for the University Interscholastic League's biennial reclassification and realignment process.

The official number for Granbury is 2,004 students.

The UIL will use the numbers to determine athletic and academic competition districts for the 2018-19 and 2019-20 school years. That announcement will be made in early February 2018.

In 2015, GHS was in Class 5A with 1,959.5 students for the realignment process - up from the 1,911 turned in 2013.

The class is currently composed of schools with student populations between 1,100 and 2,149. 6A schools are those with 2,150 students and above. For the upcoming realignment, the UIL is expected to divide Class 5A into Division I and Division II by school population for football only.

TOLAR

Tolar High School turned in a 238 enrollment, down one from 2015. Tolar Superintendent Travis Stilwell thinks Tolar will remain Class 3A.

Lipan's high school enrollment was 96, an increase of two from 2015. Lipan Superintendent Cindy Edwards believes Lipan will stay Class A, but growing elementary and junior high enrollment "will more than likely push us over the classification threshold" in two years, Edwards said.

Pirates survive wild ending to beat Cleburne

With 6:47 left in the third quarter against Cleburne at Pirate Stadium on Friday, the Granbury Pirates took a 39-7 lead on a 13-yard rush from Zach Adams.

Then things got weird.

There's no other way to put it - the last 18 minutes on the way to a 41-34 Granbury win were almost unbelievable to watch.

Cleburne recovered two onside kicks in the second half and scored three touchdowns. all on long pass plays down the left side, in a span of seven minutes to cut the Granbury lead to 39-34 with 2:03 left, pending the extra-point conversion after a Yellowjackets touchdown.

That conversion, a pass to the right flat, was intercepted by Granbury's Daegon Saffle and returned 100 yards for two points for the Pirates.

And somehow that still wasn't the weirdest thing that happened. When Granbury quarterback Kevin Moore tried to run the last seven seconds off the clock by sprinting backward with a Cleburne defender holding on, the referees ruled that his forward progress had stopped, and gave the ball back to the Yellowjackets with a second left.

Cleburne got two cracks at a Hail Mary thanks to a pass interference call, but wasn't close on either one, bringing a rather anticlimactic end to the game.

While Granbury's chances of making the postseason are officially over, the Pirates can still end the year with a winning record for the first time since 2013. The lone opponent left on the schedule is Arlington Seguin, which comes into Friday's game holding a 2-7 (1-5 District 9-5A) record.

Seguin is athletic, Zschiesche said, with two outstanding defensive linemen clogging up the middle of the field. Keeping them in check will be a major focus, especially with Granbury's reliance on the run game to keep the offense moving.

"You better recognize where those two are - and neither one of them will be hard to find," Zschiesche said. "They're large individuals.

"If you don't wanna watch the football, watch our center versus the nose guard. That'll be a good matchup."

The Cougars' offensive line is the weak point of the team, Zschiesche said, so the Pirates will look to exploit that as much as possible and blow up Seguin's ground game.

Granbury ends their season at 7:30 p.m. at Wilemon Field in Arlington.

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Despite Cisco loss, Rattlers clinch playoff berth

The Tolar Rattlers ran into a very strong Cisco team on Friday night at home and lost

40-14. "I think offensively we did well, we moved the ball pretty good and had over 300 yards, Tolar head coach Jeremy Mullins said. "We didn't finish good enough, so there's certainly some things there.

The Rattlers will most likely play Alpine in Big Spring next week, if all current standings

In Tolar's football offices, there's a hallway with a wall of photos of past Rattler teams that have had success. To get on that wall, you either have to win a district title or win a playoff game.

The district title is out of Tolar's hands now; either Cisco or Eastland will claim that. But the Rattlers still have a very good chance to make some noise in the playoffs.

"It doesn't matter where you're at, but if your name is on that bracket you've got a chance. So we've done that, and now we have to put ourselves in the best position possible by taking care of business Friday.'




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A Football Life

Former NFLer Jon Gilliam celebrates life while fighting Alzheimer's

Just one look at Jon Gilliam, even at the age of 79, and you can tell pretty easily that he was a football player.

He's built sturdily, with long limbs and big hands. When he stands up, he has an athletic stance that makes it look as though he's ready to either

drop down into his natural center position or lay a block on a passing defend-

Gilliam, a seven-year NFL veteran who served as the center and captain for the Kansas City Chiefs in the first Super Bowl,

lives in Granbury with his wife Becki. Their beautiful house with a great view of the Granbury countryside has an entire corner dedicated to memorabilia from Jon's playing days cleats, footballs, commemorative Coke bottle caps.

Those help serve as reminders of how much Jon accomplished in his career. He has Alzheimer's disease, and his memory isn't what it used to be.

Becki, who often acts as Jon's mouthpiece, filling in the blanks when he can't, said that her husband's memory of football plays and people is actually better than his memory of daily life.

"He can remember all the plays," Becki said, "just don't ask him what he had for lunch an hour ago."

With Jon's Alzheimer's progressing, the Gilliams wanted to make sure he could be reconnected with family and friends, both from his playing days and his current life. Inspired by a former teammate of his at East Texas State (now

Texas A&M-Commerce), who also has Alzheimer's and held an 80th birthday party earlier this year, Becki started reach-

ing out to different groups. "I started thinking, with his Alzheimer's, I don't know where we're going to be for his 80th (birthday)," Becki said. "So I started it off saying 'Jon Ray's Lookin' Fine at 79.'

bers of the Dallas-Fort Worth Chapter of the NFL Players' Association, so she rallied some of those men and their wives. Becki is in charge of organizing the reunion for Jon's East Texas teams that won three straight Lone

Star Conference titles from 1958-1961, so she tapped into her contacts there as well.

She invited a couple of people from their church, Stone-Water, and that invitation spread through the congregation. By the end of it all, the Gilliams' house could barely fit all the party-goers inside on Satur-

day, Oct. 28. "This was like happy hour at a nice nightclub," Becki said. "It was packed."

GETTING HIS DUE RECOGNITION

In addition to the party, Jon also received a unique gift. Through some connections with the NFLPA and the city of Fort Worth, Jon received a Certificate of Recognition from Fort Worth Mayor Betsy Price for his "athletic achievements, business success, Christian leadership and positive impact on the communities he has

The Gilliams have done a significant amount of work outside of Jon's performance on the playing field (which was outstanding, to be sure - he was a Pro Bowl selection in his first year). He wanted to be a

With the NFLPA, the Gilliams are trying to bring more retired players in the Metroplex area into an active role with the D/FW chapter. Through that organization, Jon and many other former players have had a chance to receive treatments and benefits they otherwise

"They're working on various different resources to help the players," Becki said. Those issues include sleep apnea treatments, free hearing aids and an experimental stem cell treatment.

The NFLPA likes to use the phrase "one locker room, one team" for retired players. No longer battling each other out on the gridiron, retired NFL players are now working together and developing friendships across team lines.

That was glaringly evident at Jon Gilliam's birthday party. For a man that was there on the field for the first Super Bowl, players came together to remi-

Last week I addressed some issues which I feel should be brought up for public review by both Christians and non-Christians. I want to take that a bit further today by looking at what is being spoken and taught in the pulpits across America, and hopefully removing some shadows or sacred cows that are

being ignored either because of lack of understanding, or fear. Some may want to respond to my statements by saying they are only my opinion. My answer to that is, "The things that are in the Bible aren't true because they're in the Bible, they are in the Bible because they are true." You may have to chew on that a bit, but it's



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

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
