After Dark group working to bring life to square at night

Granbury will be a little more vibrant after dark tonight, thanks to the efforts of local businesses.

That is because Granbury After Dark will begin on the square, said Sam Houston, manager for Granbury Live. In cooperation with Granbury Live and the Opera House, four restaurants on the square will stay open late to offer special aftershow menus for those leaving the shows, or just not ready to head home for the night, he

"So many times, when the shows let out at 9 or 9:30 p.m., people want a cup of coffee or a desert and there was nothing," Houston said. "For people who live in Granbury, there is almost no place to eat after 8 p.m."

The Opera House and Granbury Live can pour more than a thousand people onto the square each weekend night, he

So he banded together with the Opera House, Visit Granbury, Historic Granbury Merchants Association, several local bed and breakfasts, and other community organizations and businesses to ask restaurant owners to fill the void, he explained.

So far, Farina's Winery and Cafe, Christina's Bistro, Ketzler's Schnitzel Haus and Biergarten, and Eighteen Ninety Grille and Lounge have agreed to stay open until 11 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, he said.

"Each place offers something a little different," he said.

After Dark is a community effort, he said. The restaurants will provide the place, and other businesses and community partners will encourage their customers to check them out, according to Houston.

So far, they have had a very enthusiastic response to the

"People are excited they will be able to go to the movies and then stop somewhere on the way home," he said, "or even drive back from the Metroplex and be able to stop for food in town.'

Saturday's beginning is only a glimpse at the potential, he

"I hope to see it grow as new ideas come up," he said.

City incumbents unseated; school races are decided

In an Election Day upset, Granbury voters unseated two incumbents - including the city's mayor pro tem and longest-serving council member.

Both newcomers swept to victory with more than 70 percent of the vote, changing the dynamic of the City Council.

Voters also approved all seven constitutional amendments that were on the ballot and settled three school board races - two in Granbury and one in Tolar.

Numbers for both early voting and Election Day were less than a comparable election held in 2015, according to Elections Administrator Jenise "Crickett"

In 2015, 2,427 ballots were cast by mail and during the early voting period, and the total turnout, counting Election Day, was 6,299, according to Miller.

By comparison, early voting and mailed ballots numbered 1,792 for this election, and the total number of ballots, counting Election Day, came to 3,981

That number represents a little more than 10 percent of the 38,508 registered voters in Hood County.

BIG NUMBERS, BIG WIN

In the Granbury City Council races, Granbury Chamber of Commerce board chair Trish

Reiner unseated Rose Myers from the Place 4 seat, and Greg Corrigan, a volunteer firefighter and chamber ambassador, took control of the Place 6 seat from Mickey Parson.

Parson, the mayor pro tem, has held that seat since May 2005. At 70, he is the oldest person on the City Council.

When Corrigan, 29, is sworn in along with Reiner at the City Council's regular meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 21, he will become the youngest member of the city's governing body.

Early vote and mailed ballot tallies released just after the polls closed at 7 p.m. indicated that both incumbents had likely been dealt a fatal blow.

Reiner received 82 percent of those ballots (607 votes) to Myers' 18 percent (135 votes).

Corrigan netted 73 percent of the early numbers (534 votes), a far greater share than Parson's 27 percent (201 votes).

There was little change in the vote splits when final numbers came in.

Reiner won 77 percent of the vote to Myers' 23 percent, and Corrigan snagged 70 percent of ballots cast to Parson's 30 percent.

Voters favor all constitutional amendments

Hood County approved all seven constitutional amendments that were on the ballot, as did the majority of Texas voters.

Here are the propositions that passed and the approval percentages both in Hood County and across the state.

Proposition 1

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead and harmonizing certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution.

Hood County: 90 percent (3,477 for; 386 against) Texas: 86 percent

Proposition 2

The constitutional amendment to establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and removing certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establishing certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, changing certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, changing the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allowing home equity loans on agricultural homesteads.

Hood County: 76 percent (2,900 for; 908 against) Texas: 69 percent

Proposition 3

The constitutional amendment limiting the service of certain officeholders appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate after the expiration of the person's term of office.

Hood County: 89 percent (3,439 for; 405 against) Texas: 83 percent

Proposition 4

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional.

Hood County: 73 percent (2,741 for; 1,011 against) Texas: 64 percent

Proposition 5

The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charitable raffles.

Hood County: 61 percent (2,282 for; 1,453 against) Texas: 60 percent

Proposition 6

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty.

Proposition 7 The constitutional amend-

ment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings. **Hood County: 59 percent**

Sheriff, police chief: Most churches have shooter plan

Had the First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs had a security team, Devin Patrick Kelley might have been spotted - and the congregation alerted - before he ever walked through the door last Sunday carrying an AR-556 semi-automatic rifle.

Kelley killed 26 people and injured 20 that day as he walked from pew to pew, committing the deadliest mass shooting in an American house of worship in modern history.

As the horror was playing

out 30 miles east of San Antonio, security teams in many of Hood County's churches were quietly guarding worshippers.

Some churches, such as Lakeside Baptist, have had safety plans in place for years prompted, according to Sheriff Roger Deeds, by the Wedgwood Baptist Church shooting in Fort Worth in September 1999.

Larry Gene Ashbrook killed seven people, including four teenagers, and injured seven others during a teen prayer

Over the years, other local churches have formed security teams as incidents of mass shootings have increased.

Most of the volunteers are current or retired law enforcement.

Deeds said that he and Granbury Police Chief Mitch Galvan spoke last year to a packed gathering of the Hood County Ministerial Alliance, which had requested they speak on the topic of church security.

"We've been on top of that for quite a while now," Deeds said of Hood County's level of preparedness.

Still, last Sunday's tragedy prompted a new spate of calls to Deeds from church leaders including, Deeds said, his own

"Pastor Drew is coming to see me in the morning," the sheriff said Tuesday.

Both the sheriff's office and the police department provide free active shooter training to any businesses, churches or schools that request it. Deeds and Galvan did not

provide details on how security is provided at churches so as not to tip off anyone with evil intentions.

Galvan stressed that it is important for there to be continued training for the volunteer teams.

"Over half of the people are

going to freeze," he said, adding that the more training a person receives, the more likely it is that they will fall back on it in an emergency situation.

Galvan said that even officers sometimes freeze in realistic training situations. He said that the best training involves fake bullets that aren't deadly, but leave a mark.

"If you're doing it right, it's like living the scenario," he

"Getting hit with rounds that hurt and leave a mark lets you know you just got shot. It's eyeopening. It gets very intense, very quickly.'

Galvan said that trainings that give the best chance of survival involve "a lot of details" and "a lot of scenarios." "You've got to be serious

about it every day," he said.

AMUD president to file for commissioner seat

The filing period for the spring 2018 primary officially opens today, and AMUD Board of Directors President Ron Cotton plans to be among the first to submit paperwork.

Cotton is running for the Precinct 2 seat on the Hood County Commissioners Court, which currently is held by Butch Barton.

Barton told the Hood County News on Thursday that he will not be seeking a second term. "I'm 73," he said. "I've got a

big bucket list.' Barton said he made the decision after meeting this week with Cotton, whom he feels is

well qualified to take over. "He's a strong candidate," Barton said. "I've known Ron for

many, many years." Cotton retired after 34 years with the railroad. In addition to his service on the board of the Acton Municipal Utility District, he served as president of the Pecan Plantation Homeowners Association.

"I have the time and the desire, and I'm willing to take on that task," Cotton said of serving on the Commissioners Court.

The filing period will close at 5 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 11.

Ten county races will be on the ballot.

In addition to the seat held by Barton, the Precinct 4 spot on the Commissioners Court will also be on the ballot.

Steve Berry, who has held that seat for 11 years, will not be seeking another term.

Other positions that will be on the ballot are: district judge, district clerk, county court-atlaw judge, county clerk, county judge, county treasurer and peace justices for Precincts 2 and 3.

District Judge Ralph Walton and county Court-at-Law Judge Vincent Messina have announced that they will run for re-election.

County Judge Darrell Cockerham said that he will not be seeking a third term.

Former Granbury School Board member Kevin Myers, who has been IT director at Lake Granbury Medical Center since late 1998, has announced his intentions to seek that seat.

Dallas attorney and local ranch owner Ron Massingill, who is a member of the Hood County Sheriff's Posse, has also stated he wants the county

Wolf Hollow 1 to change ownership in bankruptcy

Citing "historically low power prices" in the state, **Exelon Generation Texas** Power, a wholly owned indirect subsidiary of Exelon Corporation, on Tuesday filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy.

A prepared statement released by the corporation on the day of the filing announced a two-part plan.

"First, Exelon Generation has negotiated an agreement with EGTP's lenders that, pending a competitive bidding process and receipt of all necessary approvals, would allow Exelon Generation to continue to own and operate the Handley Generating Station in exchange for a \$60 million payment to the lenders," the statement read.

"Second, the lenders have agreed to exchange the debt they currently hold on EGTP's other four plants for equity in the plants, effectively taking ownership of these facilities.

The Handley plant is in Fort Worth.

The other four plants are the Wolf Hollow Generating Station 1 in Hood County and plants in Wharton, Dallas and La Porte near Houston.

According to RTO Insider, which provides coverage and analysis of the wholesale electric industry's markets and policy-making, Exelon officials said the bankruptcy filing was made to "offload most of a \$675 million loan due in September 2021."

Knight won 41 percent of the vote, which was 81 votes. Imel won 33 percent, or 65 votes, and Turner got 27 percent of ballots cast, which was 53 votes.

Distracted driving ends in head-on collision

Distracted driving resulted in a man colliding head-on with a trash truck Wednesday morning, according to the driver's statement to Texas Highway

That driver, Michael Halder, 31, of Granbury, was flown to a Fort Worth hospital with serious injuries, according to Texas Highway Patrol Staff Sergeant Dub Gillum.

The crash occurred at approximately 5:30 Wednesday morning on State Highway 144 near the entrance to Rock Harbor.

Halder was traveling south on 144 in a 2002 Ford truck, Gillum said. The trash truck was traveling north on 144 in the left lane.

Halder told troopers he was distracted and drove across the center turn lane and into oncoming traffic, Gillum said. He swerved to get back into his lane but struck the trash

truck head-on. The road was shut down for several hours to clear the incident, Gillum said.

The accident occurred in a 55 mile per hour zone and the roadway was wet from rain at the time, he said.

The crash is under investigation by the Texas Highway Patrol, Granbury.





Plant your roots

Select easy-care trees

n Texas, fall is the best time to plant trees. The cooling weather allows trees to develop strong roots before summer's hot, dry

Trees are among the easiest landscape plants to maintain. Aside from water, an appropriate planting site and welldrained soil, they demand little for the many benefits they provide.

Houses with 50 percent of their roof shaded by trees can save up to half on their air conditioning bills.

Trees also provide shade to the plants growing beneath them. Consequently, plants growing in shade only require about half the water as they would if growing in sun. Aside from cost savings, trees also provide beauty, structure and

privacy. When selecting trees, choose those that are native or welladapted to North Central Texas weather conditions (Zone 7 or 8). In addition, select trees that will thrive in the site where they will be planted. Site considerations include soil structure, drainage, slope, shade/sun, wind, soil acidity or alkalinity and water availability.

Another critical site consideration is space. A common gardening mistake is choosing a tree that will outgrow its space. Know a tree's expected size at maturity before purchasing and planting. Check vertical as well

height, but their spread is too wide for small yards. Be sure to measure the

distance from walkways, buildings and driveways to allow for tree limbs to spread without the need for constant trimming.

A sampling of small, medium and large-sized trees for area landscapes includes:

CHASE TREE (VITEX)

This outstanding multitrunked tree boasts long, bluepurple bloom spikes for up to five months late spring through summer. Butterflies and bees flock to this tree, which prefers to grow in full sun. Cultivars are available with white or pink flowers. Vitex, which is deciduous, grows quickly to a height of 10 to 15 feet. It also grows wide, with a spread of 15 feet or more. Give it room to grow!

CHINESE PISTACHE

This medium-sized tree grows quickly, but it is durable. It attains an average size of 20 feet to 40 feet tall with a canopy spread to 30 feet in very good conditions. This de-

ciduous shade tree tolerates poor, rocky soils and harsh urban environments. Once established, Chinese pistache is drought and pest/disease resistant. Although gangly when young, these trees develop a nice, rounded crown. In fall, the tree's leaves turn shades of orange and yellow.

BUR OAK

One of many native oaks, this deciduous tree grows into a tough and durable specimen

that is tolerant of poor soils and low rainfall. It adapts to a wide range of soil types. Give this beauty room to grow to its mature height of 60 feet to 80 feet. It has a slow to moderate growth rate, but it is long-lived. Bur oak produces very large acorns. It is resistant to oak wilt disease.

The Granbury Pirates are going to be a very, very annoying team for opponents this season.

That's a compliment, by the way. In a scrimmage against Saginaw at home on Thursday night, the Pirates displayed the new look head coach David Breazeale foresaw them using before the season started. Granbury spread the floor, played up-close, man-to-man defense, and knocked down shots from the outside with regularity.

Saginaw was Granbury's final preseason opponent before the Pirates open up the regular season against Aledo on Tuesday night. The two teams didn't keep score for the whole game, with the scoreboard resetting at the end of each quarter.

Granbury's starters played the entire first and third quarters. The bench played all of the second period, and the Pirates substituted freely during the fourth quarter.

Senior Michael Horne, who played more of a small forward role last season for Granbury, slid into a power forward role on Thursday night. Horne displayed the same silky midrange jumper he had last season, and was able to get to the rim with regularity against Saginaw.

That was no small task. Breazeale said Saginaw was much bigger and better than last year when the two teams scrimmaged.

Defensively, Granbury was at a disadvantage for most of the game, as the Rough Riders were bigger at nearly every position than the Pirates. So Granbury did what Breazeale said they'd

have to - they did everything they could just to stay in front of Saginaw, and made the opposition lower their shoulder to get to the basket.

As a result, Granbury drew plenty of offensive fouls, stopping Saginaw possessions.

When the bench came in during the second quarter, Joseph Schmidt caught fire. The senior had 3 three-pointers in the quarter, launching some from deep behind the arc.

The starters didn't lack for three-point shooting, either. Cade Dudley, the starting point guard, had 3 three-pointers of his own.

Dudley also did a good job of managing the press break. Saginaw threw on a full-court press on occassion, and the Pirates were able to get through and find open looks several times.

Senior Kyle Beck made several hustle plays to keep possessions alive and stop Saginaw drives.

The game may have been unofficial, but it was easy to see the competitive nature of both sides emerge as the scrimmage proceeded. The first two quarters were relaxed - some of the referees working the game were new hires in training, and the coaches were content to let them work through their troubles.

But in the fourth quarter, it was clear how badly each team wanted to "win." Granbury jumped out to a big lead in the fourth, but Saginaw closed on a 15-0 run that impressed Breazeale and unofficially handed the game to the Rough



Indians look to repeat as state champs

The Lipan Indians know the

1 in UIL 1A basketball. But, despite knowing that they're now the main target of every 1A school in Texas, the Indians might have had more pressure on them last year.

"I believe there was more pressure on us last year to get it done, especially after the disappointment from the year before," Lipan head coach Brent Gaylor said.

That year, in 2015-16, with a similar roster to the one that brought home a state title, the Indians were knocked out in the regional semifinal round by

Lipan avenged that title, though - the team called last year a "revenge tour" - and they're primed to win another one this season. But it won't be an easy task, as the Indians are losing two senior starters in Derrick Cook and Tate Phillips.

Losing Cook and Phillips "will definitely affect" how Gaylor plans for opponents.

"It's hard to replace 6'7" and 6'5" players," he said. "For the past two years we were always able to keep at least one 6'7 player on the floor to protect the rim.

"That won't always be the case this year. Backup center Josh Boucher has had a good summer and I think by the time district rolls around he will be giving us some good minutes

off the bench."

Even with the loss of Tate Phillips and Cook - and with the addition of Boucher - Lipan still returns plenty of talent. Guards Santana Martinez and Ty Phillips return, as does junior forward Ty Bryant, the championship game MVP.

All told, Gaylor will have plenty of players to throw at opposing teams.

'We got seven guys back from last year that are going to log most of the minutes," he said. "I think some of the returning guys are going to surprise some people simply by their roles expanding this year."

The Indians are certainly challenging themselves in the non-district schedule. Lipan is playing several teams far above the 1A classification, including 4A Mineral Wells and 5A Fort Worth South Hills.

Lipan made a killing last year

on the full-court press, harassing teams into mistakes and keeping the tempo at a lightning-quick pace. The Indians still have plenty of length and wingspan at the guard and forward positions, so they haven't lost the ability to pressure opposing guards.



No nights off for defending champ Pioneers

James Southerland, head coach of the TAPPS 1A fourtime defending champion North Central Texas Academy Pioneers, has a "decent little group" coming back, he said.

That might be just a slight understatement.

Sure, the Pioneers are losing Marko Jovanovic and Luis Rivas, two cornerstones of last year's title team who are both now playing collegiate basketball.

But NCTA returns perhaps the most talented team in TAPPS 1A, headed by Strahinja Ivic, Austin Ngalia, Marc Langston, Marko Kovacevic and some new talent that moved into school over the break.

For Southerland, getting all of the new players, many of whom come from different countries, accustomed to life in the United States is his biggest challenge.

"We're just trying to get them to understand what we're trying to do," he said.

Ivic, who has played three years at NCTA, has been a big help in that regard. Southerland can use him as an example, and lean on him to help the new players.

In addition to acclimating to American high school life, NC-TA's players also have to battle preseason expectations. The Pioneers are one of the favorites to win the title yet again, which Southerland said is a pressure

his teams are used to.

"It's always been like that," he said. "They know they're the team to beat.

"We can't take nights off. You could have a terrible shooting night, and the other team could shoot lights out. We have to respect everybody we play against."

Respecting opponents won't be a problem early on in the season for the Pioneers. NCTA has scrimmaged 5A teams, including Aledo and Everman, and have games scheduled against 4A Glen Rose and 3A Dublin.

In practice sessions, Southerland has tried to "set an atmosphere" of competitiveness. "Somebody has to step up," he said, in order to replace the losses of Rivas and Jovanovic.

The Pioneers still don't have all of their players in practice yet, even though they've been in session for three weeks. Langston, for example, is currently performing at an all-state level at wide receiver and cornerback for the football team.

With the players that he does have available, Southerland is focusing on running the floor in practice and using his team's athleticism to put up points.

NCTA may have every other team in TAPPS 1A eyeing them. But beating the best is a lot easier said than done, and after last season, there's no doubt the Pioneers are the best.

Now they just have to go out and prove it.



Winter fishing is upon us

hat is the best time to fish around a cold front? Our discussion today is for those folks who can choose their fishing days. Choosing these potentially bet-

day more worthwhile - assuming, of course, that the fish will cooperate. There are many different factors that can affect the fish bite. but knowing how the weather

ter fishing days can make the

impacts the bite can be to your advantage. These weather changes are generally more frequent in the winter. The winter season, despite the cold, is also a great

time for catching striped bass and many other species. Dealing with the passing of cool fronts is the norm in this season, and dealing with these weather changes is well worth it for many striper, largemouth and crappie anglers. Some of the biggest fish of the season are usually taken in this time

frame. As most of us know, right before the cold front hits is probably the best time for catching fish. The fish seem to know that it's time to feed before the high-

er pressure moves in. If you have an overcast sky before the front moves in, this can also be a great time for active striped bass. If the fish are biting right before the front, and the front pushes through while you are on the water, the bite will probably continue for

holding deeper in the water column may be less impacted by the passage of the front. Striped bass have been known

to bite often during nasty weather. The weather

can be cold, rainy and miserable, but the fish seem to feed in this environment. Just be careful out there when the weather

After a front has just passed through, many anglers typically get back on the water (if they can pick their times) as soon as the wind shifts back from the south. Fish that have not been feeding during the high pressure may start biting at this time.

If you don't have a choice and you get out after the front passes and the high pressure has settled in, you may have to alter your fishing pattern to get the fish to bite. Black bass may move out to deeper holes, and vou may have to slow your presentation.

Stripers normally gorge and then don't eat for a while. You may have travel to find active fish and place your bait on their

a short while We can never be sure what mode the fish are in regardless after the wind of the weather. Fish may bite on Stripers those "Blue Bird" days, contrary to all expectations.

However, there are times that are generally more productive. The best thing to do is to wet your line and see if the fish will



WWII vet's widow recalls how he saved others

Courage can't be predicted by physical characteristics - certainly not the missing fingers that prevented an eager young man from joining the fight in World War II, said June Wil-

Her now-deceased husband, Army Private First Class Ralph Williams, was awarded Bronze Stars and a Purple Heart for his service in Europe during the war, she said.

When the war first broke out, Ralph tried to join every branch, but was rejected because he was missing two fingers on his right hand, including his trigger finger, she said.

But by the end of the war, men were needed everywhere and he was drafted, June said. He was assigned to the medical unit of the 415th Infantry leading a group of 16 men who carried the wounded men to the hospitals in the rear, she said.

He earned one of the Bronze Stars on Feb. 23, 1945, when he saved 47 young men during a river crossing operation.

"Private Williams evacuated forty-seven casualties despite intense enemy fire, refusing to rest until all men had been evacuated after many hours of work," reads his official medal citation that hangs on his widow's wall. "By his courageous actions Private Williams saved the lives of many of his com-

Reading those words in her Granbury home still brings goosebumps all these years later, June said.

"He didn't quit until it was done," she said.

Ralph received his Purple Heart after he was wounded on a battlefield in Germany, she said. One of his litter bearers was killed by a land mine, June said, but Ralph refused to stop

"He led them back out. He ended up stepping on a mine. The bomb got him from his toes to his head on his right side. He had so many surgeries. They wanted to take his leg, but he refused to let them," she said.

Ralph was discharged by the fall of 1945, she said.

The couple had met and married on Valentines Day in 1944 before he was sent to Europe, June said. They had been married a month and a half shy of 52 years when Ralph died in 1995, she said.

"His mother introduced us," she recalled.

FINDING LOVE – AND HAPPINESS

June worked at a grocery store in a small Kentucky town. Every day, Rachel Wilson would come and buy four Coca-Colas, one for herself and one each for three friends.

"She came by on a Saturday and said, 'I want you to meet my son," June remembers. "Oh, he was so cute! He was in his Army uniform."

The young people said hello, and then Ralph left to take his mother to work, but returned to talk all afternoon, June said.

"He asked if he could walk me to my house. I said yes. He stayed talking so long he missed the bus and had to walk two miles home," she said.

"We saw each other at church on Sunday. We went skating on Tuesday, to the movies on Wednesday and he came to dinner on Thursday. Then he asked me to marry him," she said.

They were married seven months later when he came back on leave before being sent to Europe. People married quickly during the war because they were never sure there would be a tomorrow, she ex-

"I just loved and supported him and I would have walked through water or fire or whatever for him," June said.

"He wrote me every day, even if it was just hello on a scrap of paper. His letters were full of 'I love yous.'

After Ralph came home and recovered, the couple had three boys and lived a full, happy life, she said, including living on a houseboat in California.

The couple was able to visit Europe in 1989, she said, and Ralph took her to several places he had served.

"In some of the towns, there

were buildings on the street, but if you went around the back, they had just built facade so it looked like there was a town," June said.

The lessons they learned during the war, to make the most of each day with their loved ones, guided their lives and their happiness, she said.

"We lived everywhere and did everything," she said. "We loved to go fishing and camping. Life was great."



Convenience counts

Granbury men develop vending machines for firewood, propane bottles

magine you are camping at a state park. About 8 p.m. you decide you'd like to have a campfire. The park office sells small stacks of wood, but the office is now closed.

Or maybe you are about to grill some burgers on the back porch. Unfortunately your grill is out of gas. You can't get another tank, because the store is now closed.

Two Granbury men have a solution for either of these di-

With the swipe of a credit card, you can purchase a tank of propane or a bag of wood for the campfire from a vending machine that is open 24/7.

"You know in this day and

propane.

age, everybody wants it now," said John Agor, who partners with Leonard Halsey in Outdoor Vending Solutions. "If they want something, it's an immediate need."

The propane vending machine accepts exchange tanks, or you can purchase a full tank.

The firewood vending machine dispenses a bag of small split firewood.

After 25 years in the Army, Agor retired with a medical disability. He dabbled with a construction-related business, and later met his business partner, Leonard Halsey, through mutual friends in the construction business.

Halsey went to ITT Technical Institute, envisioning a career in electronics. "There weren't many jobs in that field when I finished school," he said. Instead he worked construction.

After meeting Igor, Halsey told him of his father's invention to sell firewood from a vending machine. "We were an outdoors family and we like to camp," Halsey said of his father's interest in campfires.

Igo and Halsey formed a partnership and began to fabricate the outdoor vending machine. They placed their first firewood machine at Dinosaur Valley State Park in 2015. Other state parks are also getting on board.

Specialized electronics prevent the sale of campfire wood when there's a burn ban.

The propane vending machine can sense when an exchange bottle is placed in the cage. Electronics detect when the vending machine is getting low and a message is sent.

As Outdoor Vending Solu-

tions continues to grow, the founders plan to keep the company in Granbury.

"There's so many hard-working people here," Agor said of

the local workforce. Agor began his military career as a helicopter crew chief, later received an ROTC scholarship and began to fly helicopters.


After spending time in Iraq, he returned to the States to lead the ROTC program at TCU. He also developed the ROTC program at the University of North Texas and worked with the ROTC program at Baylor.

"We would love to employ veterans and disabled veterans as we expand the company," Agor said.



America entered World War I 100 years ago

America's entry into World War I came just over 100 years ago when on April 6, 1917, the United States declared war on Germany.

It has been estimated that over 25 percent of the entire male population of the United States between the ages

of 18 and 31 years were in military service during the war. Among these were roughly 200,000 Texans.

When the war ended on Nov. 11, 1918, the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, more than 100,000 Americans did not return home.

Among the 5,000 Texans who lost their lives in service during The Great War were Hood Countians Arthur E. Joiner, of Granbury; and John H. Davis and Elven Helms, both of Lipan. All three died from wounds received on the battlefield.


Larkin C. Clifton and Charles H. Jones, both of Granbury, along with Ollie P. Kelley, of Tolar, were among the thousands of who fell victim to the influenza pandemic of 1918-1919. Known as "Spanish Flu" or "La Grippe," the influenza killed an estimated 43,000 American servicemen who mobilized for World War I.

Private Clifton, son of Essie Cleveland and Joseph Edwin Clifton, was just 23 years old when he succumbed to the flu during the long, difficult voyage overseas. PLEASE SEE **WWI** | 3C

Parade entries will gather at the Granbury ISD administration parking lot on Pearl Street prior to the Veterans Day parade today. The parade is at 2 p.m. and will travel east on Pearl Street and circle the square.

INFLUENZA BLAMED: These brothers, Joseph E. Clifton and Larkin C. Clifton, are sons of Essie Cleveland and Joseph Edwin Clifton of Granbury. Clifton and soldiers of the 31st Division embarked the SS Balmoral Castle on Aug. 8, 1918, at Hoboken, New Jersey. He did not live to serve with Company E, 106th Engineers, American Expeditionary Forces, in Europe. Clifton died of pneumonia, a complication of the flu, in Glasgow, Scotland on Oct. 12, 1918, and now eternally rests in Acton Cemetery.

Other World War I veterans in the Acton Cemetery include James A. Collier, Clarence Frederick, Ira Walter Goodin Sr., Ronald Lynn Jackson, James Roy Day, Derrell L. Langston, Maurie J. Maloney, Henry Grady Massey, Gordon Leigh McCarty, John Hobson Stout, Warren W. Stribling, Cecil H. Tarrant, Homer Henry Tompkins and Dolan Wright.

Acton Cemetery, a state historical site, was founded in the early 1800s. More than 3,000 graves occupy the nearly 20-acre cemetery, including the gravesite of Elizabeth Patton Crockett, second wife of Davy Crockett, and graves of numerous men and women who served the nation during the Civil War, World War I, World War II, Korean War, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan, and in all branches of the U.S. Armed Forces.


