Not child's play: Officers confiscate illegal products packaged like chips, candy


A team of five Granbury police officers found products containing illegal levels of THC and seemingly packaged to appeal to children and eeens at 19 stores earlier this month. Thanks to the cooperation of store owners, officers pulled more than 4,600 illegal products from tores that sell vaping and tobacco products.

Earlier this month, five Granbury police officers conducted site visits to stores that sell vaping products and confiscated 4,613 items containing illegal amounts of THC that were packaged to look like candy and other products that appeal to kids.

THC, or
Tetrahydrocannabinol, is the major psychoactive component in cannabis
other words, it's pot. The officers didn't make a single arrest, nor did they ask the county attorney or district attorney to proseute anyone That wasn't the purpose The police department's goal was to educate store owners and protect customers who might be unpurchasing could lead to a felony charge.
Every store owner com-
plied with the effort, department representatives said, and they will-
ingly turned over more th \$82,000 worth of illegal merchandise.
"The law is confusing," said Lieutenant Garrett Wiginton. "It's not very well
written, and these products (have) labels that would make you think they're legal. But when you actually scan the codes for the ingre dients, or you do a test with
one of our field test kits one of our field test kits,
they're not legal. Anything above .3 is presumed from the marijuana leaf and contains THC."


Parents might not look twice if they spot what appears to be name brand candy and chips in their children's backpacks, but these products are illegal and could lead to a felony charge.

He said that the products surrendered by store owners are "either a synthetic THC or THC that's (derived) from the marijuana
plant. So, from the state's plant. So, from the state's
view, all of these items are a felony offense to possess, whether you're a child or an adult. It's a felony offense regardless."

Wiginton said that consumers often believe that a product has a. 3 or less THC potency and therefore legal, but they actually contain

Maybe it is not unreasonable to think of Memorial Day as a three-day weekend which serves as the official kickoff of summer, but while summer activities are noble pursuits, I do hope we all stop for at least a few moments over Memorial weekend and thank the men and women who have given their lives in defense of our nation. Celebrating those brave souls is the true reason for the holiday. As a reader of history, it is easy account about Valley Forge, the Alamo, or Iwo Jima, and picture myself being a part of the battle.
Straining to imagine what it was
like to be there, I struggle to sense the weather conditions, the sounds of battle, and the devastation whic
surrounds me. I question myself wondering how I would measure up under the pressure of battle?
here be no feeling at all? No matte how well the author writes the pas sages or how vivid my imagination iepict the horror of the battlefield and the experiences of each individual soldier. Surely battle must be personally expe
truly understood.
I frequently find myself thanking the good Lord that I never had to experience the horror or war. When "Band of Brothers", the story of Easy Company, 506th Parachute Regiment of the 101st

Iloved the very realistic ticularly enjoyed the interviews of the actual Easy Company survivors and listening to them share their memories. ## Former U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm dies at age 84 (

Granbury resident Charles Stenholm, who served 13 terms (19792005) in the U.S. House of ing the 17th Congressional District, died on Wednesday at age 84 according to multiple reports. He served Hood County until redistricting changed in 2004 and he was defeated by Lubbock Republican Randy Neugebauer. Stenholm was born in
1938 in a rural community 1938 in a rural community graduated from Stamford High School, about 40 miles north of Abilene. He was a former farmer and rancher who had been living in Hood County in recent years. his residence in Granbury's Harbor Lakes neighborhood, where he lived with his wife, Cindy.
Ron Botsko, 85, a friend of Stenholm who lived
near him in Harbor Lakes met him socially and had known him for about 10
years. Botsko told the Hood County News by phone on Thursday that he had dinTuesday evening at Harbor Lakes Country Club and had "a delightful time." Then they went to Botsko's residence for a post-meal visit
before the Stenholms went home for the evening at about 10 p.m.
"He left with a big smile,"
said Botsko who said Botsko, who moved to
Granbury in 2003 with his Granbury in 2003 with his
wife, Billie, who passed away wife, Bilie, who passed away to talk to him the next day." Instead, Botsko said, the next morning Stenholm and Cindy "got up for a morning walk. She went in the
kitchen, and he sat in a chair watching TV." Botsko said Cindy told him that the next time she looked at her husband, she thought he had fallen asleep, but then real"He had a beautiful personality," Botsko said of Stenholm. "He was soft-spoken. You would have never
known what his profession known what his profession Stenholm had a reputation
as a conservative Democrat waring heavily time involved in agricultural issues. "He was a regular bluedog Democrat." Botsko said, adding that the congressman wanted "the left and right sides to compromise. his life doing. He did not like the extremes on either side. He and his wife were both Christians."

## ONCE AGAIN, FLAGS TO HONOR VETERANS

Special to the Hood County News s has been a tradition in Hood County and the nation, veterans will once again be honored with flags in 2023.

## Collect Your Rainwater

In North Central Texas, summer rain rarely follows spring showers. The water tap typically shuts off by July 4th! Knowing this, we should collect rainwater while it is readily available. Your stored water will help you afford ably grow vegetable and ornamental plants if drought and water restrictions ensue.

Efficient water use is our limited supply of both roundwater and surface
 tored for later use If reated, rainwater may be used for drinking. But sinc Texas communities regular y expend $30-60$ percent of their total water consumpion on landscape irrigation this single use is where the may be attained. Harvesting water to irrigate landscapes not only makes an efficient use of a valuable resource
but the practice can also demand on municipal wate supplies and reduce flooding, erosion, and surface water contamination. Plants prefer rainwater! minerals that harm root growth. As rain percolate into the soil, it pushes salts (prevalent in fertilizers) down and away from roo zones leaving them a bette environment in which to
grow. The deeper the roo grow. The deeper the rowt tolerant the plants become Storm water falling on
impermeable surfaces runs off immediately, causing off immediately, causing
erosion and washing pollut ants into area waterways. Roofs, sidewalks, driveways parking lots and roads are ypical of the impermeable surfaces found in urban
areas. Diverting some of this rain helps to slow the runoff and allows water more time to soak into the ground. To mitigate flooding and erosion, direct
the rain hitting rooftops the rain hitting rooftops into gutters and then into
harvesting systems, such as rain barrels.
Storage containers, either under or above ground, are generally made of polyethylene, fiberglass, concrete, round systems often more than aboveground storage due to excavation and pumping. Examples of aboveground containers include steel drums, barrels, cisterns, and stock tanks. If re-using a previously owned
container, ensure that it is free of any toxic residues. Tips for storage containe placement and use are
