


Todd and his wife plan to relocate from Dallas in the near future with their teenage son. Please help us welcome Todd Lettman to our Decordova Community.

### EL NIÑO WINTER: WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Meteorologists are saying with some confidence that people should prepare for an El Niño winter in 2023-2024. Late summer water temperatures indicated a strengthening El Niño event. Many have heard of El Niño, but may not entirely understand what it signifies.

According to the National Ocean Service, El Niño and La Niña are climate patterns in the Pacific Ocean that can affect weather worldwide. Typically, these weather patterns last nine to 12 months, but sometimes can last for years. The weather events occur every two to seven years, but not on a regular schedule. El Niño is more common than La Niña.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) notes that, during normal Pacific ocean conditions, trade winds blow west along the equator, moving warm water from South America toward Asia. Cold water rises from the depths to replace that warm water. During El Niño, trade winds weaken and warm water is pushed east toward the west coast of the Americas.

South American fishermen are credited with discovering El Niño in the 1600s. They named it "El Niño de Navidad" because it typically peaks around December. During an El Niño, weather is affected, says the NOAA. Areas in the northern United States and Canada are dryer and warmer than usual, but the Gulf Coast and Southeast experience wetter conditions with more flooding.

La Niña has the opposite effect, with stronger trade winds that push more warm water towards Asia, and the cold waters in the Pacific push the jet stream northward. This causes drought in the southern U.S. and heavy rains and flooding in the Pacific Northwest and Canada. During a La Niña year, winter temperatures are warmer than normal in the South and cooler than normal in the North.

However, all of these factors also are affected by the patterns' degree of severity. Fox Weather says strong El Niños produce warm signals across much of the Lower 48, while more moderate events can lead to warmth or extreme cold. Weaker El Niños tend to produce the coldest winters out of the three stages. There hasn't been an El Niño since the 2018-19 season, which was controlled by a weak El Niño pattern. Change is coming, though the extent of that change remains difficult to predict

hough I married a native Texan, and my husband and I have parented two native Texans I am the outsider among them. Born in Missouri, I moved from Colorado at the age of twelve. As the saying goes, I got here as fast as I could. My husband says I am a Texan by osmosis. And man, do I love Texas, but here's the rub, I was stunned by the Texas cold. When Texas gets cold it gets really cold. Mean cold. Wet, icy, and dangerous.

When my family moved to Texas in fall of 1981 I was not prepared for the weather that first winter. The junior high I attended insisted we go outside after eating lunch, regardless of temperature it seemed. I had a darling red puffed jacket with the batting sewn into small squares. Really puffy, that was one cute jacket, worthless in the Texas winter but cute.

Standing outside in the wet cold I felt every degree the temperature dropped. I came home from school complaining to my parents that they had moved us to Texas for us to freeze. Of course we had yet to meet Texas summer, but that at least we expected. We had watched on the evening news from Colorado the ice dropped in swimming pools in Texas during summer of 1980.

Nearly every year in Hood County there are at least a few ice days where many roads are unsafe to travel, school is canceled and most folks stay home from work. The storms of February of 2021 caused a severe drain on power sources causing shortages and outages. This seemed to make us more aware going forward of the soundness of our domiciles and making sure they are as efficient as possible.



# **FUN FACTS ABOUT DECEMBER**

December is arguably the most festive month of the year. The holiday season and all the gatherings with family and friends make the final month of the year a busy time. But a peek under the proverbial hood reveals that there's more to December than the holiday season.

1. Armchair linguists might know that the Latin word "decem" means "ten," which is a little curious given that December is the twelfth month of the year. So why isn't December the tenth month of the year? Like other months on the modern calendar, including October and November, December once occupied a different place on the calendar, namely the Julian calendar that was used prior to the adoption of the Gregorian calendar. Back then, December was the tenth month on the calendar. Though its position changed when the Gregorian calendar was adopted, its name remained the same.

2. It's easy to overlook in a month populated by holidays like Chanukah, Christmas and Kwanzaa, but the winter solstice is a significant day on the calendar as well. According to the Farmer's Almanac, the 2023 winter solstice occurs on December 21 at 10:27 p.m. EST for the northern hemisphere. The winter solstice might not be sun worshippers' favorite day of the year, as it's the day with the least amount of sunlight all year long. However, one positive to keep in mind is that, once the winter solstice occurs, each day thereafter experiences a gradual increase in daylight. That should give anyone yet another reason to celebrate in December.

3. December has historically been a month of firsts, particularly for women and politicians. On December 1, 1919, Lady Nancy Astor became the first woman to serve in the British House of Commons. Exactly 69 years later, Benazir Bhutto was nominated for the role of prime minister of Pakistan. Bhutto ultimately became the first woman to be elected as head of a democratic government in a Muslimmajority country. Political firsts in December are not limited to events involving women. A year after Bhutto was nominated, Russia's Mikhail Gorbachev became the first Soviet Russian leader to visit the Vatican and meet the Pope.

4. January might be the month people most associate with efforts to change their fortunes, but the birthstone of December also is considered a symbol of good fortune. The Farmer's Almanac notes that one of the birthstones of December is turquoise, which some believe is symbolic of good fortune and success.

# THIS EGGPLANT DISH IS Perfect FOR A CROWD

Orthodox Christian churches celebrate Christmas later in the holiday season than other denominations. That's because the Orthodox faithful still celebrate the birth of Jesus in accordance with the Julian calendar rather than the Gregorian calender that is currently used in other Christian churches. That means Orthodox Christmas falls on January 7 each year. As with other Christmas celebrations, there is bound to be plenty of fanfare and delicious food to commemorate this special time of year.

Moussaka is a classic dish served in Eastern European countries like Greece and Turkey. There are many variations, but moussaka often is made with eggplant and a creamy white sauce called béchamel. As a layered casserole similar to lasagna, it can be made in advance and then served to a crowd. It's hearty, tasty and filling, and likely something that will appeal to most guests this Christmas. Hosts interested in preparing "Moussaka" can try the following recipe, courtesy of "Throw a Great Party" (iUniverse) by Mary Bartlett, Antonia Hoogewerf and Catherine Monnet.

### Moussaka Serves 25

6 pounds eggplant 1 cup olive oil, approximately 1 pound onions, chopped 2 tablespoons garlic, finely chopped 6 pounds ground beef or lamb 1 can tomatoes (29 ounces) 1/2 bottle red wine 1/2 bunch parsley, chopped 1/2 bunch dried oregano 2 tablespoons cinnamon 2 teaspoons nutmeg 1 teaspoon salt and pepper Béchemel 8 ounces butter 1 cup flour 2 quarts milk Nutmeg Salt and pepper

Slice the eggplant into 1/2-inch round slices and sprinkle with salt. Let the eggplant rest about one hour to draw out the liquid. Pat dry, brush each slice with olive oil and arrange overlapping on baking sheets. Bake about 20 minutes or until soft. Set aside. This step may be done in advance.

If you prefer to grill the eggplant, brush both sides with olive oil or cooking oil and cook on a hot grill about two minutes per side.

Using one or two large skillets, heat about 1/4 inch of oil and sauté the onions and garlic until softened and set aside. Do this in batches, as necessary.

Using the same pan, add additional oil and sauté the beef or lamb until lightly browned. As each batch browns, place it in a very large pot.

Add the cooked onion and garlic mixture, tomatoes, red wine, parsley, oregano, cinnamon, and nutmeg to the browned meat. Simmer slowly about 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

While the meat mixture simmers, prepare the béchemel sauce. Melt the butter in a large pot until it is bubbling. Whisk in the flour gradually and continue to stir for about 8 to 10 minutes over low heat without browning the mixture. Heat the milk in a large pan or in the microwave. Gradually add the hot milk to the flour mixture, stirring continuously. Add the nutmeg, salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a boil, lower the heat, and whisk a few minutes until thickened. Taste and correct the seasoning.

Oil two 9 x 13-inch baking pans or one large roasting pan. Using half of the eggplant slices, distribute them on the bottom of each pan. Top with meat mixture followed by remaining eggplant. Spread the sauce evenly over the eggplant. bake in a moderate oven (325 F) for about one hour. The béchemel should be lightly browned. Let the moussaka sit about 10 minutes before cutting into squares. It may be served at room temperature.

Serve with rosé or a medium-bodied white wine.

With the new year just around the corner I want to remind everyone that fireworks are not allowed in DCBE, we do not give warnings for this violation.

Dogs must be securely enclosed or confined to its owner's property in a manner that will isolate the animal from the public and from other animals. A cat must remain within the boundaries of its owner's property. When a dog is being walked or with its owner off of the property, the dog must be on a leash at all times. If a dog is restrained off of the owner's property, the owner must be present and able to control the animal. If the dog is walked or with its owner off of the owner's property without a leash it is considered unrestrained and is in violation of the restraint ordinance and a NORV may be issued and a fee assessed

Please remember to tell your guests to have a valid driver's license with them and that the speed limit is 25 MPH in DCBE.
