

# **ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE**


May was an exciting month and what a way to start with our new entertainment committee who have such great ideas.





# WILDLIFE COMMITTEE REPORT

# Turtles, fawns, and birds, oh my!

WHY DID THE TURTLE CROSS THE ROAD?

We've recently seen quite a few water turtles, mostly red-eared sliders, slipping across lanes of traffic. That's part of their ritual to make baby turtles this time of year. With fertile eggs about the size of a taw marble, (all you old-timers will appreciate that comparison) and with a leathery texture, colored white, the female is on a mission to find the best spot.

The momma turtle moves to find sandy soil to make her nest. When she finds the best spot, she'll jet water from her tailpipe and scratch with her hind legs to dig a hole up to 6 inches deep. She'll lay her eggs, usually in a clutch of 5-10, but the number can vary even higher.

When the eggs hatch, the little turtles, about the size of a silver dollar, dig their way out of the nest and head straight for water. They leave behind the leathery remnants of their egg shells. The bright green babies are on their own from the beginning. Better learn how to eat, fast.

#### **BIRDS**

For all us bird enthusiasts, take some time to identify some of the species. You'll be surprised at the variety of birds that make a part-time living here in Pecan Plantation. Did you know the purple martins seen around here traveled all the way from Brazil and are already seriously into nesting and raising their broods? Neighbors have reported successful blue bird hatches, some boxes are boasting their third hatch of the year. Painted buntings have been sighted, too. They love to eat from flat tray-feeders. Try white millet with finely chopped sunflower kernels and nyjer.

Don't forget about your hummingbirds. Show them some love as you enjoy their antics. They are territorial little energy-burners. The ruby-throated hummingbird is most common in our area.

One hummingbird fan bought hanging baskets of fuchsia and hangs them as a "welcome wagon" for his hummers, with sugar-water feeders close by.

If you want to attract more hummers, here's a tip. Put multiple feeders around different sides of your house to keep just a few from dominating all of your

If you are really enterprising and have access to a horse, place piles of horse hair near your feeders. That's a popular nesting material for intricately designed Mississippi kites glide in Pecan for a few months each hummingbird nests.

#### PLEASE KEEP IN MIND THE BIGGEST RULES WHEN YOU SEE A FAWN.

## PECAN PLANTATION VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Have you ever wondered how to respond in the event of an area wide emergency? How will you know what has happened, where the danger area is located? Also importantly, who oversees keeping residents safe and informed. This month's Columns article will hopefully answer some of these questions.

Most residents of Pecan Plantation know Texas has its share of natural and man-made disasters. We experience tornadoes, wildland fires, flooding, periods of power failure, and endure excessive heat and droughts in summer months. Hopefully we will never experience any emergencies with the Comanche Peak Nuclear Power Plant, De Cordova Bend Dam, or any leakage from the miles of underground natural gas lines crossing Hood County.

A mass notification system (MNS) broadcasts messages to inform employees and the public of an emergency. It sends real-time alerts and instructions to groups and individuals during critical events. Everbridge sends multiple channel messages through SMS, email, desktop alerts, and/or voice. Pecan Plantation Fire Department supports the usage of a single provider for emergency mass communications. With a unified network that Texas Department of Public Safety and Hood County Emergency Response use, problems with several different notification protocols should be addressed.

Hood County Emergency Management Office is responsible for emergency notification which includes outdoor sirens, usage of local media outlets radio, TV and websites. This month we would like to offer a letter presented by Margaret Campbell, Emergency Management Coordinator

here in Hood County. Hood County already uses an app called Everbridge to alert residents to important area information.

The Hood County Office of Emergency Management uses the Everbridge alert system to provide both critical and non-critical information in real-time. Hood County will issue informational messages to alert residents about a variety of events, ranging from severe weather, fires, floods and other emergencies, to boil water notices or road closures.

You can choose how to receive the message: text message, cell phone, home phone or email. You can also list any physical, sensory or cognitive needs to signal that you or someone in your house may need extra assistance during an emergency. For example, if you have someone in your household that is wheelchair-bound and you think you may need extra help evacuating during a flood or wildfire, or if you are dependent on supplemental oxygen and need a shelter during a power outage, you are able to add that information to your profile.

Hood County can send messages in a variety of ways. Weather notifications are sent out automatically, but when you create an account, you can choose to receive many different types of weather alerts, from a real flood advisory to severe thunderstorm warnings and tornado watches.

In the event of an emergency, the Hood County Office of Emergency Management will send out a message to those affected. We can send messages to individuals, groups or neighborhoods to keep citizens informed before, during and after critical events.

Do you have an elderly parent in another town, or a child that has moved away to college? You can add up to five addresses to keep track of events in their locations as well. Since you create the account, you control the information YOU want to receive, and you are able to update your preferences whenever you want. If you need help setting up or making changes to your account, the Hood County Office of Emergency Management is always available for you.





any people anxiously await the first day of summer and look forward to activities that are tailor-made for warm weather. The first day of summer is known as the summer solstice, which marks the official start of astronomical summer. The solstice features more hours of daylight than any day of the year, according to Space.com. The next summer solstice in the Northern Hemisphere occurs on June 20, 2024 (the Southern Hemisphere celebrates the solstice on December 21, 2024).

The National Weather Services says the summer solstice happens at the moment the earth's tilt toward the sun is at a maximum. The sun will appear in its highest elevation with a noontime position that will not move much for several days before and after the summer solstice. The word solstice is derived from the Latin word "sol," meaning sun.

During the summer solstice, the sun travels the longest path through the sky, which is why it is the day with the most daylight. The length of daylight depends on the latitude. At

the equator, the time from sunrise to sunset is about 12 hours.

Although many people celebrate the summer solstice primarily for the extra hours of daylight, the solstice has historically been assigned deeper meaning in many cultures. In Scandinavian countries, the solstice is celebrated as a holiday known as Midsummer's Eve, which is observed on a weekend near the time of the summer solstice. Festivities include dancing, singing, drinking, cleaning house, lighting bonfires, and more.

During the summer solstice at Stonehenge in the United Kingdom, the sun will rise behind the entrance to a stone circle and the sunlight will flow into the center of the monument. Researchers believe solstices have been celebrated at Stonehenge for thousands of years.

The summer solstice is soon to arrive, marking the start of summer, which is reason enough to celebrate this unique day on the calendar.

- The dam began impounding water Sept. 15, 1969. Shortly after that the Leonard family started development of the pecan farm as a residential community. The country club, golf course, airport and several recreational areas and parks were opened in 1971.



## WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT

Dairy is consumed in many forms, including cheese, milk, yogurt, butter, and ice cream. The debate rages on regarding the nutritional value of dairy. As with most foods, there are pros and cons to dairy consumption. Dairy is a convenient way for many people to get the calcium, vitamin D and protein necessary to keep their bones, muscles and heart functioning properly, says nutrition research scientists with the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. A study examining 2,000 men published by the British Journal of Nutrition found that those who ate fermented dairy products like yogurt and cheese had a smaller risk of coronary artery disease than those who ate less. Still, there are some concerns about dairy. A 2017 study funded by the National Cancer Institute that compared the diets of women diagnosed with breast cancer to those without breast cancer found that those who consumed the most American, cheddar and cream cheeses had a 53 percent higher risk for breast cancer. Regular consumption of dairy products also may be linked to prostate cancer. The Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine reports milk and other dairy products are the top sources of saturated fat in the American diet, which can contribute to heart disease, type 2 diabetes and Alzheimer's disease. Low-fat milk can reduce some of the risks of dairy consumption. Moderate consumption also may reduce any risks associated with dairy consumption.

## ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL AND PPOA COMPLIANCE

#### **ACC REPORT**

**HOME SALE NOTE**: Upon the sale or transfer of home ownership by any other means, Section-15 of PPOA Rules & Regulations requires residential property to be in compliance with all applicable elements of PPOA's governing documents. If ownership is transferred with an existing noncompliant issue, the new owner will be responsible for bringing the property into compliance. When it is requested by a title company, lending institution or prospective buyer, PPOA will perform a compliance inspection and return a report stating whether or not the property is in compliance and detail any deficiency if it is not. Since compliance certification requests are frequently received only a few days before the scheduled closing date, we remind members contemplating the sale of their home to help avoid any last minute surprises or delays by contacting membership services at the PPOA business office to arrange an early inspection of the property to identify any existing issue that may require corrective action.

#### **COMPLIANCE CORNER**

During April 2024, the compliance office received 74 calls and 48 emails reporting possible compliance issues, 102 calls and 28 emails regarding vacant property maintenance, plus 609 calls and 88 emails requesting ACC, plat/lot, rules, C&R or construction information.

## POSSIBLE CAUSES OF LOW ENERGY IN DOGS

Many dog breeds love to get outdoors and run. Dogs' love of activity endears them to millions of animal lovers, and it's one of the first distinctions people make between canines and other popular pets, such as cats.

Obesity is another potential cause of lethargy in dogs. The PDSA notes that overweight dogs tend to move around less, so pet owners may need to alter pets' diets and exercise routines to help them lose weight and become more physically active. Overweight dogs are at an elevated risk of developing diabetes, which the PDSA notes is one of a handful of hormonal issues, including Cushing's disease and hypothyroidism, that also can cause low energy in dogs. Each issue is serious and dog owners are urged to work with their veterinarians to help dogs lose weight.

Dogs also can suffer from heart disease, which can cause low energy. PetMD notes that many dogs develop heart disease as they age. The most common forms of heart disease in dogs are heart valve disease, myodcardial (heart muscle) disease, heartworm disease, and arrhythmia. Heart disease in dogs affects blood flow and makes it hard for the heart to pump blood, which can make dogs tired.

Additional causes of low energy in dogs include anemia, kidney disease and liver disease. Certain medications also can cause low energy in dogs, so it's vital that pet owners discuss potential side effects of any medicine prescribed to their dogs.

Low energy in dogs can be a warning sign of various issues. Dog owners are urged to contact their veterinarians immediately if dogs exhibit signs of low energy.
