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





GENERAL MANAGER

Since we are headed into October and the end of PPOA's fiscal year, I wanted you to know our financial planning efforts for the upcoming year are in full swing. Our controller Kristi Nickel, managerial staff and Finance Committee are currently working diligently to develop the FY 2025 budget. In fact, by the time this article has reached your mailbox, the new budget has already had its second reading. Pecan's budgeting cycle is, by design, very meticulous, as our goal is to ensure it reflects the community's needs with a balanced approach to financial responsibility.

This month, I wanted to briefly explain where your monthly assessments go, and how it fits into the budget process. Let's start with what you see on a normal monthly statement if you own property in Pecan and you haven't charged anything at the club on your account.

Your bill should be \$200.41. Of that amount, \$20 goes to the Volunteer Fire Department and EMS. PPOA does not receive any of those funds, as they simply "pass through" our hands and to the VFD/EMS. We do this as a service to the organization and our members, so you don't have to pay two different monthly assessments. An additional \$17.66 goes to pay for trash pickup. If you only own a lot, you don't receive this charge until you have a home that generates garbage. There is an \$8 charge that goes into a Reserve and Replacement Fund, which builds over time and is only used to replace, modify or repair current PPOA assets used for operating and maintaining our facilities. For example, let's say one of our industrial mowers broke down and could not be repaired. This fund would be tapped to purchase a replacement mower. And then there is a \$44 fee that goes straight to the Roads and Drainage fund to fund projects in that arena. You can see these dollars in




action right now on Bellechase, Wedgefield and other spots around the neighborhood.

What's left over after all those dollars are moved into their specific "buckets" is \$110.75. That amount is what is used to fund everything needed for our daily operations... from pool chemicals to security and from staff salaries to Easter egg hunts at the PAC. Basically, it is the money used for keeping the lights on, the engines running and ensuring you enjoy the current amenities we have. This fund is also supplemented with monies generated from food and beverage purchases, golf shop sales, etc.

Then there is the New Capital Fund. It is where funds are held should the community decide it wants to build a new amenity, or if the club needs to purchase new items needed for association operations (vehicles, buildings, equipment, etc.) Bylaws stipulate the Board is only allowed to authorize up to \$100,000 each year for any new capital expenditure. That figure is capped, regardless of how much money is in the fund, and once \$100,000 is reached, no other new capital expenditures can be made until the following fiscal year without the approval of the two-thirds of the PPOA membership. The account is solely funded by the initiation fees paid when new members purchase previously unassessed properties (i.e. new development). The initiation fees paid by new members buying previously owned homes goes to Reserve and Replacement Fund.

So as you can see, we have to learn to stretch a dollar or two when we are developing the budgets. We carefully review past expenses, current service requirements, and upcoming projects to allocate resources effectively. This process includes assessing maintenance needs, planned improvements, and potential cost-saving measures to ensure continued service excellence throughout our community.







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Raise your hand if you like seeing all the dead trees in Pecan Plantation.

What, no hands?

None of us like it. Our namesake, those beautiful trees, left to die of their own accord, lacking care, lacking water, lacking all those amendments, fertilizer, pesticides. Brutal, shameless.

We know, there are a lot of opinions, considerable anger, and lots of folks who can't understand how we got here ... way too many dead trees. It's easy to point fingers and make our own judgement calls.

Now what?

Here's another perspective. Those trees were a crop, not unlike others. Think corn, cotton, wheat. A crop. The big difference here is longevity. Those traditional crops, by nature, are annuals, where farmers till the soil, plant the seeds, fertilize ... and do a rain dance.

Pecans, on the other hand, take years to mature enough to get a profitable crop of nuts. They grow into beautiful rows of trees we admire ... 'er admired.

Here's the bottom line. Drive around our community and observe. Thousands of pecan trees in our yards are thriving. That's because that property owner is watering them, maybe adding additional care.

The orchard trees are dead because they have been a crop for profit, propped up with massive amounts of water coming from Lake Granbury, with fertilizer, soil amendments, pesticides to keep away the fungus, Army worms and whatever other boogeyman stuff happens to that singular crop.

The land has outvalued, and outlived, the value of pecans. If you really think about it more deeply, those trees were destined for what's happening, whether we like it or not.

It's just happening in our lifetime, not someone else's. Yes, they're an eyesore now.

No one debates that.

Peeling back the next layer of the proverbial onion, those gorgeous pecan trees in the orchard were anything but "natural." They were a monoculture, kept alive by management strategies. Take away any part of those strategies, and we all see what's happened, especially 90 hot days last year with no water.

That begs the question, "What's next?"

Here's a challenge. Presuming there's nothing "natural" about a crop of pecan trees, how about these new landowners, or even the rest us, learn how to add diversity to our plant life?

A recent research study between TCU and the Fort Worth Botanic Garden found some fascinating facts. This stuff could happen right here, in Pecan Plantation, if we embrace it and then act on it.

The study revealed the 109-acres of the South Woods of the Fort Worth Botanic Garden, with its plant diversity, sequesters and stores more than 490 tons of carbon, the equivalent of what 106 cars produce annually. Carbon sequestration, capturing and converting it to mass, was almost 13.5 tons annually. Another eyebrow raiser is replacement value of those plants — a whopping \$3.42 million dollars … plants grown there thoughtfully over time.

Want to read that study? Go to the Botanic Gardens' website

Inch by inch, new buyers, and people who've been in Pecan Plantation before they had gray hair, can do a little bit of homework and learn what plants are natural, which use the least amount of water, and will thrive in these thousands of acres of great sandy soils.

Wouldn't it be cool to improve wildlife habitat, add plants for pollinators, and turn this monoculture situation into one that does so much good on so many fronts?

It's time to shift the paradigm of thought to something truly natural and productive. Let's grow good, healthy, natural plants to replace the crops.

The short time we've lived here, I stand amazed at the amount of knowledge and experiences people in Pecan have. Master Gardeners, Master Naturalists and so many others with backgrounds to be able to think through this dilemma and do our parts to make plans to resurrect and give a great restart to Pecan Plantation's mass tragedy of dead trees.

The next challenge is to get some of our knowledge passed around. We live in USDA Hardiness Zone 8, and with this sandy soil, there are some great plants to help create the diversity needed and build the next destiny our community deserves.

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PECAN PLANTATION VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Concerns about a grass/wildland fire in Pecan Plantation By Doug Caughley

The Pecan Volunteer Fire Department has recently been asked if the residents of Pecan are adequately protected from grass/ wildland fire. We received an email from Cindy, a Pecan resident, about this subject. Hood County Fire Marshal Jeff Young was also asked about all the dead and dying pecan trees in the orchard. Cindy was rightly concerned about the ugly dead trees and ruined aesthetics of Pecan Plantation, along with the possibility of reduced home values, and the fuel load available for a fire.

As of Aug. 28, the date of this writing, Pecan and all of Hood County are presently included in a fire ban. Your PPVFD is closely monitoring the weekly updates on the Texas Burn Ban Map. We expect as the summer months continue with temps in the triple digits and inadequate rainfall, the counties under the burn ban will soon include most of our surrounding counties.

To help alleviate some of the fears of our residents, the PPVFD has been in touch with the Emergency Management Center of Hood County, the fire marshal, and all nine fire chiefs in Hood County. Discussions and plans of action have been reviewed and are ready when needed.

Specific to Pecan Plantation is our pecan orchard and the dead and dying pecan trees. The trees are planted 35 feet apart and are dying because the irrigation to them, supplied from their planting, has been cut off. When new roads were built the existing waterlines were cut. There is very little fuel load of leaves left on the trees to help spread a fire. The spacing of trees will help alleviate the ability of a fire jumping from tree to tree.

There is an adequate supply of water in Pecan and the surrounding neighborhoods in our fire coverage district. PPFVD has recently inspected, pressure tested and measured the volume of water flowing from 325 hydrants. Some of the inspected hydrants are marked with yellow tape so AMUD can correct any problems. In an agreement with AMUD, the water pressure can be increased to provide more water in case of a major fire. PPVFD is equipped, if necessary, to draw water from ponds, lakes and rivers.

The road system in Pecan Plantation can also be used as a fire break. Our roads will allow us access to any fire but will also slow down any grass fire that tries to cross the pavement. If the need should arise, we have mutual fire support from all the nine Hood County fire departments. Each volunteer fire department is equipped with brush trucks dedicated to fighting grass and wildland fires. They have access to our gate system 24/7.

The Pecan Plantation Volunteer Fire Department is a 100% volunteer organization. The need is great for more volunteers. The national rate of individuals who volunteer has been on a steady decline for more than a decade. The average length of service is five years. There is always a shortage of people who volunteer; we need your help. If there is a yearning in you to serve your community, we can find a place for you. GARDEN TIP

How to store basil for the winter

Quickly blanch basil in boiling salted water for 15 seconds, drain and dunk in ice water. Then whirl in a blender with a little olive oil. Pour the puree into ice cube trays, freeze and transfer cubes to resealable plastic bags where they keep for up to a year. Add to soups, stir fries, pasta sauce and casseroles.

VANCE'S SWEET SOY AND LIME VEGETABLE MARINADE

3 tablespoons of each: soy sauce, honey, olive oil

4 large garlic cloves, minced

Juice from one large lime

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

1/4 teaspoon cayenne (optional)

Dash of onion salt

Combine all ingredients in a jar or ziploc bag. Pour over vegetables and marinate for one hour. Grill vegetables for 3-5 minutes per side. Can also be used with fish or meat with adjusted cooking time.

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WILDLIFE COMMITTEE REPORT

River ecology and deer count

Dear deer, how many art thou?

Your wildlife committee volunteers spread out into defined sections over the entire community three times, for an hour each, and counted deer. Those numbers have been submitted to our regional Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's biologist, who will take a look at the amounts and provide a recommendation to manage the herd to keep it healthy.

That recommendation will be presented to the PPOA board of directors, who will decide what to do.

Stay tuned to these pages for those decisions.

The July 29, 7-8 a.m. count yielded 107 bucks, 280 does, and 203 fawns.

On Aug. 5, 7-8 a.m., the numbers were 120 bucks, 327 does, 216 fawns and 15 "unknown" ...

Aug. 12, 7-8 p.m. count was 104 bucks, 310 does, 209 fawns with another of those animals "unknown" at 18. Average for the three counts was 636.

Observations: Most yearlings do have one fawn, older ones have twins, a few of them will even drop triplets. Those babies are naturally 50-50 boys and girls. When we look at these numbers, the buck count should be higher. That's a clue some bucks are being harvested outside Pecan Plantation, which makes sense. It also suggests our deer herd consists of residents and nonresidents, since no hunting is allowed here. A sizable number of deer migrate across the river and back. Well, some of them make it back.

The fawn to doe ratio also suggests mortality last spring, which is normal. In theory, there should be one fawn per doe. Reality proves otherwise, be it weak animals, some road kills, predators, or weather, or all the above.

Mark your calendars for the annual Dr. Barna Kid's Trout Fishing Tournament. It's set for Dec. 30. It has to be on a Monday, to keep people from being plunked on the noggin with golf balls.

The River Ecology Program is moving forward rapidly. We need more volunteers to help. There are three parts of the project. Water quality is probably the most important. Monthly, volunteers collect and analyze river water samples from at least 4 spots along our stretch. Data is forwarded to the Texas Stream Team to add information for a bigger cause. For us, data will be logged and, over time, trends will be developed to judge the health of our water and see if it changes ... or not.

A trainer with the Texas Stream Team came to Pecan Sept. 14 to teach volunteers how to collect and analyze the samples, using special water testing kits. Contact Bob Lusk at boblusk@outlook.com to join the team. Or, call 903-814-7634.

The second part is doing a fish population inventory twice yearly. Tentatively, we have Oct. 19 set aside for that first go around. Sampling fish is fun, and we're soliciting interested




teachers (inside or outside of Pecan) who have middle schoolaged students to high school to participate.

Who knows, we may spawn (forgive the pun) career ideas for conservation-minded youngsters.

The third part is studying riparian plants, those plants living along the river and its flood plain. This may be the easiest part. Download the iNaturalist app on your phone, take photos, upload to the Pecan Plantation file. Over time, not only can we see what grows where, our River Ecology volunteers can see what's thriving, what's missing, and see if we can improve our stretch of the river.

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



Hood County Hospital District Proposes To Increase Its Tax Rate 2 Cents

On the November 5 ballot, the following referendum appears, allowing for a FOR or AGAINST vote.

Approving the ad valorem tax rate of \$0.02 per \$100 valuation in the Hood County Hospital District for the current year, a rate that is \$0.02 higher per \$100 valuation than the voter-approval tax rate of the Hood County Hospital District, for the purpose of providing indigent healthcare and emergency medical services. Last year, the ad valorem tax rate in the Hood County Hospital District was \$0.00 per \$100 valuation.*

*Official ballot language mandated by state law.

Proposed Tax Rate To Cover Costs of Healthcare for the Medically Indigent and Dependable EMS Services for All.

Hood County Hospital District is a "special district" established by state law. Every county in Texas MUST provide healthcare for the medically indigent persons who are legally defined as those for whom medical bills would threaten the household's financial viability. In 1976, Hood County created the Hospital District, with the responsibility to levy a property tax to meet these costs. Costs associated within the healthcare system are increasing, thus increasing the District's budget.

Contrary to public opinion, the District does NOT fund or operate Lake
Granbury Medical Center of Lakeside Physicians Group (whose parent
organization is Community Health Systems, or CHS, one of the largest for-profit healthcare networks in the nation).

In 1996, the District Board of Directors dropped the property tax rate to ZERO, having entered into a 30-year agreement with the predecessor of CHS to lease and operate the District's hospital. This \$15 million lease was providing the funding necessary for the District to meet its statutory responsibilities. With the monies associated with this agreement reaching an end, there are no government grants or contributions coming from the private sector to fund the District.

Ensuring ALL Hood residents have access to ambulance services regardless of where they are and the time of day can only be realized by additional funding in support of Texas EMS and the EMS provider in Pecan Plantation.


ORGANIZE A HALLOWEEN TREAT EXCHANGE



ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL AND PPOA COMPLIANCE

ACC REPORT

The number of new home permits during August 2024 increased a little over last month's total with the ACC approving seven new residence construction permits, six miscellaneous construction permits, one construction revisions, and no permit extensions.

The ACC construction permit list currently contains 43 active permits for new homes under construction and 35 active miscellaneous permits for various other improvements.

COMPLIANCE CORNER

During August 2024, the compliance office received 75 calls and 32 emails reporting possible compliance issues, 54 calls and 15 emails regarding vacant property maintenance, plus 594 calls and 102 emails requesting ACC, plat/lot, rules, C&R or construction information.

HOME SALE NOTE Upon the sale or transfer of home ownership by any other means, Section-15 of PPOA Rules & Regulations requires residential property to be in compliance with all applicable elements of PPOA's governing documents. If ownership is transferred with an existing noncompliant issue, the new owner will be responsible for bringing the property into compliance. When it is requested by a title company, lending institution or prospective buyer, PPOA will perform a compliance inspection and return a report stating whether or not the property is in compliance and detail any deficiency if it is not. Since compliance certification requests are frequently received only a few days before the scheduled closing date, we remind members contemplating the sale of their home to help avoid any last-minute surprises or delays by contacting membership services at the PPOA business office to arrange an early inspection of the property to identify any existing issue that may require corrective action.

HOUSE ADDRESS REMINDER

Since the USPS has mandated the use of "community mailboxes" in the newly developed additions, there is no longer a roadside mailbox in front of each home that bears the address number of the house. Even though most new homes have an address block located somewhere on the front wall of the house, residents of those newer homes are reminded that such an address block may not be easily seen or accurately read by EMS, fire department, or law enforcement personnel in the event they may be responding to your critical emergency at night, in a heavy storm, or during any other poor visibility condition where life or death can often depend on the difference in mere seconds of their arrival time and quick determination of the correct address. Therefore, residents of the newer additions might consider placing an attractive, double-sided address plaque in their front yard area near the roadway that can be easily read by first-responders approaching the residence from either direction during poor visibility conditions.



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
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




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
