



#### WHAT IS CONGESTIVE HEART FAILURE?

"Congestive heart failure (CHF), often referred to simply as heart failure, is a chronic condition in which the heart's ability to pump blood effectively is diminished," mentioned Dr. Levi Rice, general and interventional cardiologist at Lakeside Physicians. "This leads to inadequate blood flow to meet the body's needs, resulting in a buildup of fluid in the lungs, legs and other tissues."

CHF is a serious and progressive condition that requires medical attention and lifestyle management.

#### **CAUSES OF CONGESTIVE HEART FAILURE**

CHF develops when the heart becomes too weak or stiff to function properly. Common causes include:

- Coronary Artery Disease (CAD): Narrowed arteries reduce blood flow to the heart muscle.
- High Blood Pressure: Over time, increased pressure can strain the heart.
- Heart Attack: Damage to heart muscle can impair its pumping ability.
- Valvular Heart Disease: Faulty heart valves can lead to inefficient blood flow.
- Cardiomyopathy: Diseases of the heart muscle, often from genetic factors, infections or alcohol abuse.
- Arrhythmias: Irregular heart rhythms can reduce pumping efficiency.

#### SYMPTOMS OF CONGESTIVE HEART FAILURE

CHF symptoms can vary depending on the stage and severity of the condition but often include:

- Shortness of breath, especially during physical activity or lying flat.
- Fatigue and weakness.
- Swelling (edema) in the legs, ankles and feet.
- Rapid or irregular heartbeat.
- Persistent coughing or wheezing, often with white or pink-tinged mucus.
- Sudden weight gain from fluid retention.

#### TYPES OF HEART FAILURE

- Left-Sided Heart Failure: The left ventricle fails to pump blood efficiently, leading to fluid buildup in the lungs.
- Right-Sided Heart Failure: The right ventricle cannot pump blood effectively, causing fluid to accumulate in the lower body.
- Biventricular Heart Failure: Both sides of the heart are affected.

#### TREATMENT AND MANAGEMENT

While CHF is a chronic condition, treatment can help improve quality of life and slow progression:

- Medications: ACE inhibitors, beta-blockers, diuretics and other drugs can manage symptoms and improve heart function.
- Lifestyle Changes: A low-sodium diet, regular exercise, quitting smoking and managing weight are critical.
- Medical Devices: Pacemakers or implantable defibrillators may be used to regulate heart rhythms.
- Surgical Options: In severe cases, procedures like coronary bypass surgery or heart transplants may be necessary.

"Congestive heart failure is a complex condition requiring a comprehensive approach to treatment and management," Dr. Michael Ibe said, general and interventional cardiologist at Lakeside Physicians. "Early diagnosis and adherence to medical recommendations can help individuals live longer, healthier lives despite the challenges of CHF."

#### **EQUESTRIAN UPDATE**

The last several articles have been highlighting various boarders at the Pecan Plantation Stables.

Tammy is our longest tenured boarder, and has had one to two horses at the Pecan Stables since she and her husband, Jim, moved to Pecan in January of 2002.

When she first came to the stables there were nine horses being boarded. Over the next few years, that number grew to 16 horses, which was the maximum there was space for at that time. It was shortly after that a waitlist was necessary. With the waitlist starting to grow, we added four stalls to the existing barn, giving us a total of 20 stalls. This is the maximum space for stalls and pasture area our current facility has room for. Those spaces filled quickly as well, and the waitlist has consistently grown over the last 10-15 years.

Tammy has volunteered her time at the stables since shortly after her arrival back in 2002. In conjunction with management, she coordinates overnight guests, new boarders, stall and locker assignments, goat pens when requested, relays information from management and/or caretakers and miscellaneous things at management's request. She has also volunteered her time serving on the Horse Owner's Committee in various positions since the committee's inception. Her passion for horses, as well as her love for the Pecan Plantation community, is what has motivated all her volunteer hours over more than two decades.

It's been said that every horse person has a "heart" horse. Tammy's first horse and "heart" horse was her striking 16.2 hand big boy, Jabez. She and Jabez were together for 20 years before he passed in June of 2022. They learned everything together! Tammy had never owned a horse trailer, never hauled one, had no experience hauling a horse, and not much trail riding experience, which is her favorite thing to do now. After quite a learning curve, she and Jabez were rock solid. They hauled and rode approximately 10,000 miles over their 20 years together and experienced so many great things and memories. A picture of Tammy and Jabez is included.

Next came learning to ride and compete in Drill Team. Jabez did not like carrying a flag, so she ended up performing and competing on her mare, BB. BB was a beautiful buckskin that was so level headed, you could do anything on her. She was always the go-to horse for anyone that wanted to ride and she was very loved at the Pecan stables. We've included a picture of BB and Tammy performing at a rodeo in Deleon, TX.

As Jabez's years were coming to an end, Tammy knew that she was going to have to get a younger horse. Jabez was around 26 years old when she had to quit riding him and BB wasn't too far behind in age, being around 20 years old. Some tough decisions had to be made in order to be able to continue trail riding with her friends. After extensive research, personal visits and interviews, she made the decision to donate BB to an equine therapy program for handicapped kids and veterans. The owner of Stars and Strides kept in frequent contact and informed her of all the wonderful things kids were accomplishing on BB and how she was their favorite horse.

Now with Jabez in retirement, a perfect home found for BB, the hunt for a younger horse geared up. After several months and a few different trials, she found her current horse, Gus. Gus, affectionately named after the little chubby mouse in Cinderella (also the lead horse carrying her to the ball) is a very handsome, 15.2 hand sorrel, quarter horse gelding. He is such a level-headed guy, loves trail riding, hauls like a champ, is an easy keeper, is affectionate and takes such good care of her on the trails. They have formed quite a bond, and Tammy hopes that she and Gus get to finish out their riding years together. What a duo they are!

#### LAKE GRANBURY FISHING REPORT

Good. Water temperatures are in the upper 50s to low 60s and rising.

- Striped bass fishing has been hit-and-miss, but when located fish to 10 pounds are possible. Best bait is live shad or trolled spider rigs fished near striper alley.
- Crappie limits are possible on small minnows or jigs fished near structures, creek entrances and in the back of the creeks.
- Blue catfish are active and can be caught on cut or live shad on main lake humps and on the upper ends near Hunter Park
- Sand bass are still spawning on the upper ends near Tin Top, however many are returning to the main lake and can be caught in numbers on white and chartreuse slabs near humps and ridges.
- Largemouth bass are also moving into the shallows to their spawning beds. Look for fish staged at creek entrances and in the back of creeks. Largemouth bass anglers are reporting some good catches on soft plastics and spinner baits working sloughs and docks.

#### WHY GRANDMA WAS RIGHT ABOUT VEGETABLES

(excerpted from People's Pharmacy)

Vegetables and fruits are good sources of flavanols, plant compounds that appear to have health benefits. Studies show that flavan-3-ols can lower blood pressure and maintain cardiovascular health. Researchers found that people who eat the most produce have the lowest risk of peripheral artery disease. According to the CDC, only about 9 percent of Americans get 2-3 cups of vegetables a day. Try to eat at least five servings a day.

#### AROUND THE STATION

Brook Hammond, Firefighter Pecan Plantation VFD/EMS

Welcome back to the station. This past month has been extremely busy with grass fires and a sizeable brush fire just outside the front gate of Pecan. With early spring weather in the 80s and extremely low humidity, the grass fire potential will likely remain high into the summer. To see if we're under a county burn ban, check the fire marshal's website at https://hoodcounty.texas.gov/departments/fire\_marshal/burn\_ban.php

While it looks like Ken and Barbie are about to lose their new dream home, this was a deliberate case of arson. Your Pecan firefighters were playing with the dollhouse for entirely different reasons. This flow path house (pictured) is actually constructed to help train firefighters on proper ventilation techniques. When do we cut a hole in the roof for ventilation? When do we open upstairs windows? What happens if we have a fire upstairs and open windows downstairs? Learning about flow paths is absolutely critical and our seasoned Chief used this tool for teaching these critical skills. While some people may be accustomed to seeing a Firefighter with a chainsaw cutting a hole in the roof, most have no idea why. Additionally, ventilating a fire is a sensitive task. Done properly, you can extinguish the fire faster and save a great deal of the house structure and contents. If done incorrectly, the entire house can be lost in a flash.

Do you sleep with your bedroom door open at night? This can be a fatal mistake. Studies show that even cheap, hollow core doors can provide over 15 minutes of additional fire protection during a house fire. For example, if you're asleep in your bedroom and a fire breaks out in the garage, your house will likely begin to fill with smoke. Smoke detectors will sound. Keeping that smoke out of your bedroom can make the difference between surviving or not. It's worth restating: "Sleeping with your bedroom door closed will increase your chances for surviving a house fire". Additionally, having a smoke detector in every bedroom (on the ceiling) should be considered a must. Having a smoke detector in the garage is also a great idea. If you get frustrated with the idea of a smoke detector in the kitchen due to nuisance alarms, install one just outside the kitchen. The smoke detectors can easily alert you to the presence of smoke or carbon monoxide minutes faster than




you can discover on your own. Here's a fun fact... smoke detectors don't last forever. Most manufacturers recommend replacing your detectors (not just the battery) every 10 years. Changing your batteries every six months is a great start but if your smoke detectors are over 10 years old, remember to change those too.

If you have any questions about fire safety and prevention, stop on by and ask. We'll see you next month around the station.





## WILDLIFE COMMITTEE REPORT

## Deer Count, River Fish

Late Sunday, March 30, my wife, Debbie, and I decided to make a spontaneous run around Pecan in the golf cart. She wanted, "To look at deer."

West on Ravenswood, right on Monticello, then into the air park. Sure enough, several small herds appeared and we counted, for fun. Three herds, 26 animals. Headed toward Nutcracker. 10 more. Into the Landings and saw the biggest herd I've personally witnessed. Eighty-six in that batch. Down some of the new roads, to see new construction. Three more sizable herds. We

counted an astonishing 268 deer on that hour-long sunset drive.

Each summer, in July and August, wildlife committee members spread out across Pecan Plantation to do their annual deer count. Routes run simultaneously cover all sections of the area for one hour, once a week, for three weeks. The first two counts are from 7-8 a.m., the last one is an evening count, from 7-8 p.m. Bucks, does and fawns are counted and logged into datasheets. Numbers are tallied and numbers are submitted to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

Biologists send a letter of recommendation to the Wildlife Committee chairman who presents it to the PPOA Board of Directors. Typically, biologists recommend selectively harvesting deer from the herd to keep the population in healthy numbers. They have a formula, based on statewide numbers and what is called, "carrying capacity" of the habitat. Our habitat is quite different than "typical" deer country, with as much land covered in pavement, homes and landscaping. The board decides whether to follow the recommendations or modify. Then, a plan is developed.

My wife lost a magnolia tree to a young buck last fall. The rutting animal decided to take all the bark off the young trees as it rubbed velvet off its antlers...killing her tree, in the middle of the night. She was somewhat less than thrilled. She considered it an expensive education in deer behavior.

During our monthly meeting in March, the committee discussed the likelihood of needing to manage the herd next fall via trapping, our only option. Sure, there will be opposition, there always seems to be. But if the herd is allowed to manage itself, life gets ugly for our trademark species. When that time comes, your wildlife committee will educate our masses as to the need.

May and June are when fawns drop. Be on the lookout. As a reminder, when you see a fawn and think it's orphaned, it isn't. Don't touch it, leave it alone. Mom is nearby. Please

avoid that temptation. Fawn lives depend on it.

The Pecan River Ecology Program is rolling along quite well. Basic water quality and chemistry is checked monthly. So far, the water seems quite healthy. There are no red flags, yet.

The Riparian plant cataloging part of the program is up and rolling, with volunteers using the iNaturalist app on our smartphones to take pictures and log them into our project. Want to know more? If you are on Facebook, find "Pecan River Ecology Program." It's a closed

group, but just ask permission to join. There, you will see updates as to ongoing activity, plus four short videos explaining how to use the iNaturalist app and how to upload photos to assist cataloging plants into this important project.

Did you know Channel catfish are native to our stretch of the river? Yep, they are. We've found evidence (baby catfish) in the river in the recent past. Contrary to popular belief, channel catfish are not scavengers. They are like teenage boys — head to the fridge and look for meat. If there's no meat, they'll settle for chips and some veggies. And, yes, these whiskered creatures make good table fare. Especially dipped in corn meal and deep fried at 350 degrees in peanut oil.

Oh, and they spawn at the end of this month, into June. Cavity spawners, those catfish. You might be able to go noodling this month, if you dare.

Bird migration is ongoing, so remember to turn off outside lights at night to minimize in-flight confusion of our feathered masterpieces. Earth needs birds.
