BOARD PRESIDENT

The start of June represents the halfway point of the year, and many new things are on the horizon for the association and the Board. It pleases me to discuss that General Manager Rick Lantgen and our directors have begun discussions with the developers about making a new golf course a reality.

Though there's still a great deal of work ahead for this project, we believe it is possible to construct an executive 18-hole, par-62 golf course across from the current driving range ons Monticello without increasing assessments. Through strategic timing and careful use of Association funds, we believe this can be achieved responsibly, and if all goes according to plan, construction could begin this fall, with turf in the ground by 2026 and opening for play in spring 2027.

In addition to easing capacity issues on our existing course, the new design might could also help address drainage challenges in the South Longwood Drive area.

Timing for this project is critical. The developers are scheduled to finalize their plan for the land by September 2025. To secure this opportunity, we will need membership approval for both the agreement and the funding by that time. If the vote does not pass, the developers will revert to their original plan and the golf course opportunity will be lost. This is truly a rare and exciting opportunity for our community, as we can potentially add a major amenity for all our members with no dues increase.

Another priority we have undertaken is the review and

modernization of our Association's governing documents — including our Policies and Procedures, Rules and Regulations, and, when approved by the membership, updates to our Bylaws.

I bring this up because we've recently uncovered a need to revisit another key set of governing documents that may not be top of mind for many members. Pecan Plantation operates under two nonprofit corporations: the Pecan Plantation Owners Association (PPOA), which most of you are familiar with, and Pecan Plantation Country Club, Inc. (PPCC). Each of these entities maintains its own set of Bylaws.

The Bylaws governing the Country Club have not been updated since 1981, and a review is long overdue. While the two sets of Bylaws share some similarities, there are differences — and those differences deserve careful review and clarification. For example, the PPCC Bylaws state that the PPOA Board of Directors also serves as the Board for the country club. The current language suggests that the country club operates as a wholly owned subsidiary of PPOA, but that language could benefit from more legal clarity. A proposed update by our legal counsel is now is the hands of the By Laws Committee for review and comment, eventually leading to Membership review and a Membership vote announced in the future.

Thank you for your continued support of Pecan Plantation.

FIREWORKS SAFETY:

CELEBRATE THE 4TH OF JULY WITHOUT A TRIP TO THE ER

Nothing says summer like fireworks lighting up the night sky. But every year, thousands of people across the United States end up in emergency rooms due to fireworks-related injuries. Hands, eyes and faces are the most commonly injured parts of the body, and sadly, children account for a significant portion of these accidents.

"Fireworks are beautiful, but they are also explosives," says Martha Alcantar, FNP, pediatric nurse practitioner at Lakeside Physicians. "Treat them with the same caution and respect you would any other dangerous device."

TOP FIREWORKS SAFETY TIPS:

- Leave it to the pros: Attend public fireworks displays conducted by trained professionals.
- Buy legal, consumer-grade fireworks: Avoid illegal or homemade devices.
- Supervise children closely: Never allow young children to handle fireworks, including sparklers, which can burn at 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Light one at a time: Back away quickly after lighting.
- Keep water nearby: Always have a bucket of water or a hose ready in case of fire or malfunction.
- Don't relight duds: If a firework doesn't go off, don't approach it. Soak it in water and dispose of it.
- Protect your eyes: Safety glasses can prevent serious injuries.

MOST COMMON FIREWORKS INJURIES:

- Burns
- Eye trauma
- Lacerations
- Hearing damage

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, fireworks cause around 15,000 injuries treated in emergency rooms annually, with many more likely going unreported. Most injuries occur in the weeks surrounding the Fourth of July.

IF YOU'RE INJURED:

- Seek immediate medical attention, especially for burns, eye injuries, or wounds.
- Don't attempt to treat serious injuries at home.

Bottom line: Fireworks can be a thrilling part of your 4th of July celebration, but safety must come first. A few simple precautions can mean the difference between lifelong memories and a life-changing injury.



Brook Hammond, Firefighter Pecan Plantation VFD/EMS

Welcome back to the station. We started this month with a big thank-you to Hood County Commissioner Jack Wilson. Jack, in conjunction with Kroger, donated 70 cases of water to our station just in time for the warm weather. Staying hydrated can be a real challenge, and we're always grateful for any donations.

Forest fires and brush fires seem to be front and center on social media platforms. The Anthony Group is continuing to clear land for future development, and those large piles of trees and limbs appear menacing at first sight. Orchard Development doesn't actually perform its own controlled burns. They contract with a regional company that does nothing but large burns like the one



we conducted on April 21. These guys are truly professional and control these burns like an orchestra. Waiting until after a hard rain and making sure the winds were calm, they cleared the burn line around the site with their bulldozer and carefully controlled how fast the piles burned. State and county regulations specify that a controlled burn can start no earlier than sunrise and must be completely extinguished by sunset. The company also coordinated closely with the fire station to make sure we had volunteers available if needed. We'll have more burns in the future as land is cleared. Rest easy knowing that we're here and keeping a watchful eye on these burns.

You'll soon be seeing construction beginning on the Station 80 renovation. Pecan's firehouse is getting a much-needed expansion and general overhaul in the coming months. The VFD/EMS board approved the funds for both projects and a contractor has been selected. We'll make sure to post photos and project updates here. If you have a free minute, stop by and we'll show you how it's going.

As always, we're here for you, so we'll see you next month around the station.







The community gardens would like to honor and thank all its worker bees and the organic vegetables they have produced.

March, April and May workdays brought a record number of members to plant squash, eggplant, cucumbers, beans, okra, peppers and tomatoes. This spring, we harvested radishes, lettuce, bok choy, snow peas, kale, turnips and beets.

In June, garlic will be ready to pull along with onions, tomatoes, peppers and potatoes.



STIR-FRIED BOK CHOY WITH GINGER AND GARLIC

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon fresh ginger, peeled and minced
- 8 cups chopped fresh bok choy
- 2 tablesoons reduced sodium soy sauce
- salt and ground black pepper

Directions:

Heat oil in large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and ginger and cook 1 minute. Add bok choy and soy sauce; cook 3-5 minutes until greens are wilted and stalks are crisp-tender. Season to taste with salt and pepper.







Gardening tip #1

A common recipe for homemade bug spray is to mix 1 tablespoon of Dawn soap with one quart of water. Spray directly onto plants to kill insects. Evening is the best time to spray.

Gardening tip #2

Fresh herbs are easy to dry for future use. Clean them and put them on a paper plate to air dry. The best herbs to dry are sage, rosemary and oregano, all available in the garden.

WILDLIFE COMMITTEE REPORT

Free to good home—feral hogs.

What, no takers?

So far, Operations Manager Daniel Van Patten and his team have trapped 40ish pigs this year.

Feral hogs have been making themselves at home, rooting up yards around Pecan this spring, like they seem to do each year. Ravenswood has been hardest hit, at least until the river came up for several weeks in April and May. Seems those hogs aren't so interested in swimming the river when 15,000 cubic feet per second are flowing downstream.

Speaking of the Brazos River, the Wildlife Committee-sponsored Pecan River Ecology Program (PREP) is continuing to monitor river quality monthly. So far, so good. We are gathering good data to present when the time is right. Go to the Pecan River Ecology Program Facebook page, ask to join, and see what we're up to. You can participate at your own level, especially cataloging plants along the river and in the river bed. That's valuable information, plus it's a lot of fun. There are tutorials about how to take photos and upload them to our PREP iNaturalist page

As we wander into June, fawns are still dropping. Leave them be, please. Mom is near.

Late July, into August, the Wildlife Committee will do our annual deer count. Bucks, does and fawns will be counted all over the community, in one-hour increments, three times. There will be two morning counts and one evening trip. Numbers will be submitted to Texas Parks and Wildlife Biologists, who will make a written report with recommendations on how to manage the herd via harvest.

With so much new construction, roads and homes, trees going away, deer behavior has made an obvious change. Deer habitat is changing, and their movements are shifting as well.

When recommendations come back from TPWD, the letter will be presented to the PPOA Board of Directors, who will decide what action, if any, will take place.

Folks, at some point, deer will need to be selectively harvested to keep their numbers in check and to maintain the overall health of the herd. Heavy on the word "selectively". That means judging each animal caught, based on body condition, age, gender and ratios of bucks to does. There is a

method to it.

We have one choice — trapping. That's it. No bullets, no arrows, no lassoing them on horseback. Trapping, using nets.

Look for more news on our deer population, right here, as it becomes available.

How often do you hear that loud, honking noise just in time to look up and see a low-flying "V" near your house? Canada geese. No, not "Canadian" geese — they're Canada geese.

These big, beautiful birds are noisy, but it's good to know a little bit about them. There are seven different subspecies of Canada geese. Not so long ago, most flocks migrated. They were totally wild. In today's world, there are those who migrate, and those who reproduce and establish a resident population. We have both. They love golf courses (imagine that, here), ponds (imagine that, here), and places to land and graze.

Natural predators, especially raccoons, love to eat eggs or grab the goslings. Foxes and coyotes will feast on the babies. There have been reports of goslings swimming in ponds, and big snapping turtles helping themselves. Big geese — not likely to be eaten by a predator, unless a slow one deserves it.

You can tell when Canada geese have been to your house by what they leave behind, literally. Messy little critters.

Egyptian geese — invasive things, as pretty as they are. If you see a nest, send an email to hogs@ppoaweb.com. Daniel wants to know.

Bird migration is ongoing, as we speak. Migration usually ends around the end of this month, maybe into July. Want to be amazed? Google "BirdCast" and give it a look. U.S. Weather radar tracks bird migration, which happens at night. It's stunning to see how many birds are on the move each night.

Because of that, please turn off your outside lights by 10 p.m. each night so artificial lighting doesn't distract them from going where nature wants, not into the side of your house.
