ATV Accident Results In Child Fatality

Two Jackson County girls were involved in an ATV incident Sunday, Nov. 8—ultimately resulting in fatality for one.

According to the Tennessee Highway Patrol preliminary incident report, the two girls—one 11 years of age and the other seven—were assisting their father in pushing a disabled ATV northbound on Stacy Cemetery Lane.

Danny Murray, 70, of Gainesboro was traveling southbound in a 2003

F-150 and struck the ATV and two children, forcing the ATV off of the roadway.

Both were immediately transported via Life Flight.

Both were critically injured; however, the injuries were fatal to the seven-year-old and she passed away last Monday.

The family held services for her over the weekend in Overton County.

Trooper Ian Stickler investigated the crash.

Charges are currently pending.

Schools To Receive Aviation Education

Overton County Schools was awarded the 2020 Perkins Reserve Grant, Growing Opportunities in the Upper Cumberland with Unmanned Aircraft Systems in excess of \$179,000.

This is an initiative that focuses on college and career readiness of students in rural counties. Overton County has created a regional partnership that includes Clay, Jackson, and Pickett Counties.

Students can learn about all types of aircraft beyond airplanes and helicopter, including hot air balloons, rockets, and UAS's. The equipment will allow students to engage with unmanned aircraft systems that include programming and navigating drones and train on an aircraft simulator with dual pilot controls

with cockpit views.

Students in Clay, Jackson, and Pickett counties will have the opportunity to learn and engage with drones through virtual learning hosted by an Overton County classroom teacher, Jason Copeland, a licensed aviation pilot.

Students will learn about different types of drones, equipment, settings, and drone operation.

This is a new way of making learning more fun and interactive while also providing them with the opportunity to explore technology with agriculture that they may decide to make their future career.

Community partners that will work with these students and drones include Clay Co. Farmer's Supply, State Farm Insurance,

and Co-op of Pickett and Overton County.

They also have an

opportunity to earn dual credit with MTSU's agriculture program.

County To Participate In Book Program

Recently, Governor's Early Literacy Foundation (GELF) and the Tennessee Department of Education, in collaboration with Scholastic, the global children's publishing, education and media company, announced the launch of a new K-3 Book Delivery program to deliver 580,000 books to 58,000 kindergarten through third grade students and teachers across the state.

Over 70 school districts are participating in the K-3 School Year Book Delivery program, which will deliver books and literacy resources directly to the homes of students and teachers, at no cost to families or participating school districts. Book packs consist of ten high-quality, grade appropriate books with guided activities and tips for parents to engage with students as they read. Book packs and resources are expected to be delivered to students' and teachers' homes by the end of 2020. Additionally, K-3 families will gain access to engagement tips via text.

"The School Year Book Delivery program is an incredible opportunity

for our state to make important early literacy gains," said Commissioner Penny Schwinn. "This partnership could not have come at a more important time, as many students, families and teachers are working hard to make up for classroom time lost last spring. Building literacy skills early is foundational to lifelong educational success and the department is grateful to GELF and Scholastic for their work to expand access to high-quality books and literacy resources and help students and families read together at home."

Participating districts for the new K-3 Book Delivery program were selected based on size, 2018-2019 third grade reading proficiency rates and the economic prosperity of the county as defined by the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development. Rural districts with lower reading proficiency rates were prioritized, and all three grand regions of the state are represented. Over 70 school districts are confirmed to participate. Two of the participating districts are Clay County and Jackson County.

Dale Hollow Eagle Watch Canceled

The annual Dale Hollow Lake Eagle Watch is canceled in January 2021 due to COVID-19 and concerns with space limitations on the barge that transports visitors during this event.

"We regret not being able to engage our community in our environmental education programs," said Stephen Beason, Dale Hollow Lake resource manager. "However, we encourage the public to enjoy the environment and natural resources of Dale Hollow Lake while staying safe and healthy."

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Nashville District usually organizes these annual trips on the lake because of the natural resources staff's role it played in carrying out a conservation plan in the late 1980s to restore the nation's symbol to the upper Cumberland region.

From 1987 to 1991 a total of 44 eagles were transplanted from nests in Alaska, Minnesota and Wisconsin and then reared, tagged and released on the shoreline of Dale Hollow Lake near Irons Creek. The team utilized a technique called "Hacking" to care for then release the birds of prey in hopes they would someday return to the vicinity of where they first took flight to nest and reproduce.

Eagles declined in Tennessee between the 1950s and 1970s because of the insecticide DDT, which caused infertility or thin eggshells that would break under the weight of adult birds.

A lot of different agencies

and people were involved with the logistics of locating and obtaining young eagles, transplanting them, site preparation and building the hacking tower at Dale Hollow Lake, caring for eagles, and tracking them initially upon their release to ensure a smooth transition into the wild.

The Tennessee Wildlife Resource Agency, Tennessee Tech University and the staff at Dale Hollow were extremely involved in monitoring and caring for the eagles in the hacking tower that allowed observers to see them through a two-way mirror, and to easily water and feed them. Students were involved with caring for the eaglets on a 23-foot tower 24 hours a day for up to six weeks. They fed them with fish and sometimes meat using drawers from the observation area.

Beason, the current resource manager, attended TTU in the 1980s and as a student actually took part in the Eagle Restoration Program.

"My job as one of the students was to observe, monitor, feed and document the actions of the eagles that were placed in the tower," Beason said. "It was exciting to watch them grow from the time they were four weeks old till they were fledglings and actually took their first flight."

He said he spent a lot of time looking through the two-way mirror and writing down notes about the eagles' feeding habits, if they were active or still, if they were preening,

which is grooming themselves or one another with their beaks, and whenever they flapped their wings.

In 1987, two eagles were released. In 1988, six eagles were released. In 1989, 11 eagles were released. In 1990, 13 eagles were released. In 1991, 12 eagles were released. Today the American Bald Eagle nests at Dale Hollow Lake and surrounding waterways and can be seen flying overhead all year.

The American Bald Eagle is one of the most iconic and recognizable birds of prey in the world. Its striking white head and tail feathers make it difficult to mistake for any other bird. This bird is not actually bald but is named for the white feathers on its head. The bald eagle is the national bird of the United States and can be found in Canada, the lower 48 states, northern Mexico and more than half of their population lives in Alaska. These birds can be found soaring, nesting and feeding around most major bodies of water. Eagles become old enough to lay eggs around four to five years old. They usually lay one to three eggs every year in late winter.

Park Ranger Gregg Nivens, who worked with the wildlife management program at Dale Hollow Lake during the project, said in the 1980s most people didn't see the American Bald Eagle flying over the lake unless they were fishing in the winter when eagles would come to feed. That isn't the case today as hundreds of eagles nest and call the

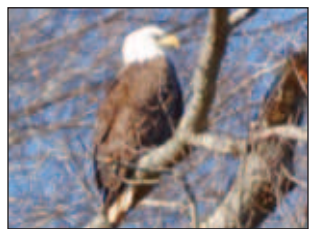
Cumberland River Basin home.

"You see the big white head up there and you're mesmerized when you sit and watch a bald eagle," Nivens said.

The staff at Dale Hollow Lake has sponsored annual Eagle Watch events annually since reintroducing the American Bald Eagle to the region, so it's no small thing that the staff regretfully cancels this year's event. The public is encouraged to observe the Dale Hollow Lake Eagle Cam at <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ThqPc15QVvA> this winter in lieu of being able to participate in Eagle Watch.

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Tips For Safe Holiday Entertaining With Pets

The holidays are a time to spend with friends and family. Celebrating and entertaining are large components of what makes Thanksgiving, Christmas, Chanukah, and New Years festivities so enjoyable. Holiday hosts with pets must consider companion animals when planning the festivities.

The holiday season brings added dangers for pets. The American Veterinary Association notes that, by keeping hazards in mind, pet owners can ensure their four-legged friends enjoy the season as much as everyone else.

Secure the tree

Securely anchor the Christmas tree so that it won't tip over on anyone, including rambunctious pets. Also, stagnant

tree stand water can grow bacteria. If a pet should drink the water, it may end up with nausea or diarrhea. Replenish the tree basin with fresh water daily.

Skip the candles

When creating mood lighting, opt for electronic or battery-powered lights instead of open flames. Pets may knock over candles, and that can be an instant fire hazard.

Keep food out of reach

Situate food buffets beyond the reach of hungry and curious animals. Warn guests to promptly throw out their leftovers so that dogs and cats do not sneak away with scraps that may cause stomach upset or worse. Real Simple magazine warns that fatty foods

can promote pancreatitis - a potentially dangerous inflammation of the pancreas that produces toxic enzymes and causes illness and dehydration. Small bones can get lodged in a pet's throat or intestines as well.

Avoid artificial sweeteners

Exercise caution when baking sugar-free desserts. The artificial sweetener xylitol can cause dogs' blood pressure to drop to dangerously low levels. Xylitol is found in some toothpastes and gum, so tell overnight guests to keep their toiletries secure to avoid accidental exposure.

Be cautious with cocktails

If the celebration will include alcoholic beverages, the ASPCA says to

place unattended adult beverages where pets cannot reach them. Ingested alcohol can make pets ill, weak and even induce comas.

Be picky about plants

Mistletoe, holly and poinsettias can be dangerous in pet-friendly households. These plants can cause gastrointestinal upset and may lead to other problems if ingested. Opt for artificial replicas instead. If guests bring flowers, confirm they are nontoxic to pets before putting them on display.

Watch the door

Guests going in and out may inadvertently leave doors open. In such instances, pets who get scared or are door dashers may be able to escape the house. Put a note by

the door to watch for escaping pets.

Designate a safe space for pets

If the holiday hustle proves too much for cats, dogs, birds, and

more, give the pet a safe, quiet spot away from the crowds.

Food Safety Tips For The Holidays

The holidays are quickly approaching and we all need to be reminded of important food safety tips. To have a happy and healthy holiday season practice these safe food tips.

When buying a Turkey

Frozen – Allow one pound per person. Buy anytime but keep frozen until ready to thaw.

Fresh – Allow one pound per person. Buy one to two days before cooking. Do not buy fresh pre-stuffed turkeys. Purchase only frozen pre-stuffed turkeys with the USDA or state marks of inspection.

Safely handle your turkey

Raw poultry can contaminate anything it touches with harmful bacteria.

Clean your hands and surfaces often.

Wash hands for 20 seconds with soap and water before, during, and after preparing food and before eating.

Wash your utensils, cutting boards, and countertops with hot, soapy

water.

Separate raw turkey and the juices from other foods.

Use separate cutting boards and plates for raw meat, poultry, and seafood.

Keep raw turkey and juices away from other foods when shopping and in the refrigerator

Transfer raw turkey from packaging to the pan.

Do not wash your turkey or other raw meats – washing will spread bacteria in your kitchen and on you.

Thawing your Turkey

The safest method for thawing turkey is in the refrigerator. This method takes time, so allow one day for each four to five pounds of weight. If your turkey weighs 16 pounds, it will take about four days to thaw. Once thawed, the turkey is safe for another two days, so you can start thawing it six days before Thanksgiving.

Thaw in a container or pan to prevent the juices from dripping on other foods.

Thawing time in the refrigerator at 40 °F or below.

Approximately 24 hours per five pounds (whole turkeys).

five to 12 pounds one to three days.

12 to 16 pounds three to four days.

16 to 20 pounds four to five days.

20 to 24 pounds five to six days.

The other two methods (cold water and microwave) must be done immediately before you start cooking the turkey, so you'll have to wait until the day it will be cooked.

Cold Water Method

For this method, leave the turkey in its original wrapping and submerge it in a sink or container full of cold water. This will prevent cross-contamination and keep the turkey from absorbing water. It is important that the water be cold so that the turkey stays at a safe temperature. You should change the water every 30 minutes. Empty out the water and replace it with fresh cold water.

Approximately 30 minutes per pound (whole turkey).

4 to 12 pounds 2 to 6 hours.

12 to 16 pounds 6 to 8 hours.

16 to 20 pounds 8 to 10 hours.

20 to 24 pounds 10 to 12 hours.

Thawed turkey by the cold-water method should be cooked immediately.

Microwave Method

Check the manufacturer's instructions for the size of the turkey that will fit into your oven, the minutes per pound and the

power level to use when thawing a turkey. Remove all outside wrapping and place on a microwave-safe dish. Use the defrost function based on weight. As a general rule, allow six minutes per pound when thawing a turkey in the microwave. Be sure to rotate it several times, and even flip it, during the thawing process. Cook immediately after thawing.

Safely Stuff Your Turkey

Cooking stuffing in a casserole dish makes it easy to make sure it is thoroughly cooked. If you put stuffing in the turkey, do so just before cooking. Use a food thermometer to make sure the stuffing's center reaches 165 °F. Wait 20 minutes after removing the bird from the oven before removing the stuffing from the turkey's cavity; this allows it to cook a little more.

Safely Cook Your Turkey

Set the oven temperature to at least 325 °F. Place the thawed turkey with the breast side up in a roasting pan that is 2 to 2 ½ inches deep. To make sure the turkey has reached

a safe internal temperature of 165 °F, insert a food thermometer into the center of the stuffing and the thickest portions of the breast, thigh, and wing joint. Let the turkey stand 20 minutes before removing all the stuffing from the cavity and carving the meat.

Storing leftovers

Debone turkey and refrigerate all leftovers in shallow containers within two hours of cooking.

Use leftover cooked turkey, stuffing, and gravy within three to four days.

Boil leftover gravy before serving.

If freezing leftovers, use within two to six months for best quality.

Reheating your turkey

Cooked turkey may be eaten cold or reheated. Reheat turkey, stuffing and gravy thoroughly to

an internal temperature of 165 °F.

If you choose to buy a frozen stuffed turkey, look for the USDA mark of inspection. USDA does not recommend buying stuffed turkeys prepared at store or restaurant. If not prepared and handled carefully, the stuffing can be a source of bacteria.

Paul's Conversion

How do you become a Christian? The answer depends on who you ask. Some people teach that you pray to become a Christian; others teach that simple belief in God is all that it takes to be saved. The different answers are troubling because God is not the author of confusion (1 Cor. 14:33), so why can't everyone teach the same thing as God desires (1 Cor. 1:10)? The only way that true unity can exist is if we all examine the scripture and let it answer for us. How does God want us to become a Christian?

Is Belief Enough? Paul was a person who believed in God but not in Jesus. Paul says in Acts 22:4, "I persecuted this Way to the death..." He not only believed in God but also was willing to do everything in his power to stop people who he thought were doing wrong. He was passionate believer but a misguided one. Paul did not believe in Christ until Jesus appeared to Paul on the road to Damascus, at which point Paul asked the only question that anyone would ask: What would you have me do? At this point Paul believes, but is he saved?

Is Prayer Enough? Acts 22:10, Paul is told to go into the city, and he will be told what to do. Paul is temporarily blinded by trying to look at the glory of the resurrected Christ, so he is led into the city. He has an agonizing 3 day wait in the city before anyone came to him. While waiting, Paul neither ate or drank (Acts 9:9) but prayed (Acts 9:11). Jesus appeared to Paul, but He did not tell him what to do to be saved. Paul was not unfamiliar with God and knew the Old Testament well, so he tried to pray his sins away. Did it work?

What is Enough? Jesus sent a messenger to Paul named Ananias. When Ananias found Paul praying he asked him, "What are you waiting for?" Paul was doing everything he knew to do to atone for his sins, but Ananias talks to him like he is just wasting time. What did Ananias expect Paul to do? Acts 22:16 "And now why are you waiting? 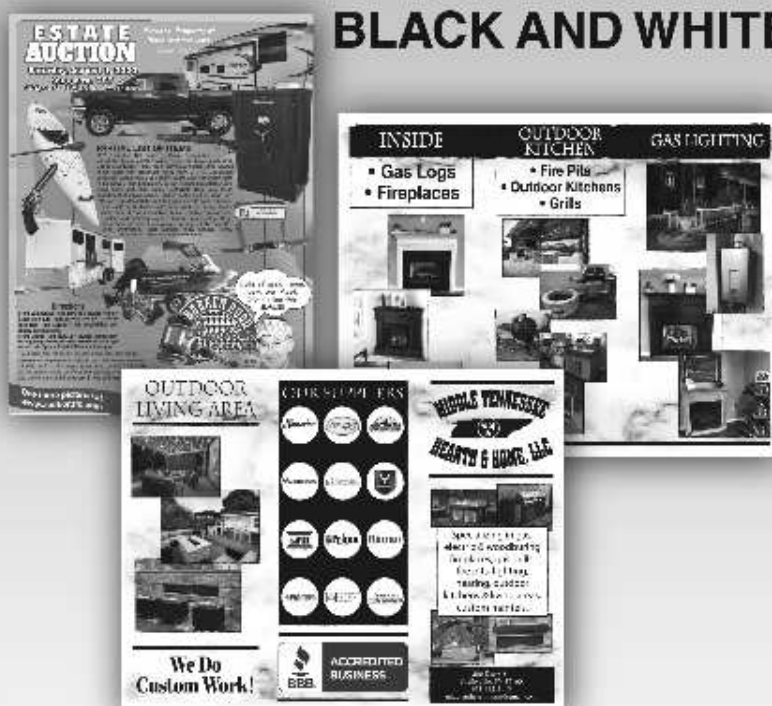

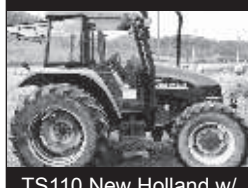

How Can One Know They're A Christian?

Wouldn't it be good if we could know for certain, based on what the Bible says, that we are a Christian? Some are just not sure and therefore agonize about it. Others insist they are a Christian based solely on their feelings. But are feelings reliable?

If a woman gets a report from the local law enforcement officials that her husband has been killed, she is immediately devastated. She may, however, learn that it was a mistake. Her feelings were unreliable because they were not based on the truth. Because our feelings can be deceptive, God surely had a better plan for our security than for each one to merely look to his feelings.

Generally, as in the case of the woman above, feelings of grief or joy are based upon evidence that we accept as credible and therefore believe. Nevertheless, to the question "How do you know you are saved?" many people would respond by saying, "Because I feel it in my heart." Therefore, what they believe is not based upon any evidence at all. A prophet of God said, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it? (Jer. 17:9). And the wise man said, "He that trusts in his own heart is a fool." (Prov. 28:26a). Therefore, surely God reveals to us how we can know we are saved. It is commonly preached that there is nothing man can do to be saved. It is argued that at the proper time, God opens the hearts of those whom He has predestined to be saved. He changes their wills and causes them to believe the gospel. In other words, God controls the process of salvation from the beginning to the end. We are told our will has nothing to do with it. But I don't find that taught in the Bible. Both God and the church (bride) urge the unsaved to come to Jesus: "And the Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22:17). (See also Matt. 11:18-19; Jos. 24:15). John stated that it was the things he was writing (the inspired written word) that enabled Christians to know they had eternal life (1 John 5:13). This must mean that the Bible does in fact tell us we can know the very point that we become a Christian and can thereafter know if we are still in the faith.

Some say they are a "born again Christian." When this was said to Johnny Carson he said, "I didn't know there was any other kind." Indeed. At any rate, in answering Nicodemus' question Jesus explained how and when one is born again (John 3:1-5). He was speaking of baptism as was Paul when he likened it to a burial from which one rises to walk in newness of life, being then freed from sin (Rom. 6:3, 4, 17, 18; Col. 2:12, 13). Paul also taught that one gets into Christ (Col. 1:24; Eph 1:3) by being baptized (1 Cor. 12:13). See also Mark 16:15-16, Acts 22:16, and 1 Peter 3:21.

One can know he is a Christian after he believes in Jesus, repents, confesses, and is baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:37-38; Romans 10:10). Those who obey the gospel need have no doubts at all (Rom. 6:17, 18; 10:16). Continued confidence is based upon their "walk in the light" (1 John 1:7; Romans 8:1).
