# Governor Touts Importance Of Masks

Tennessee newspaper reporters congregated in a community call with Governor Bill Lee on Wednesday afternoon and heard updates surrounding COVID-19 as case numbers, hospitalizations and deaths continue to ravage many communities.

The day of the teleconference, Tennessee had a total of 39,406 active cases, 2,183 hospitalizations and 4,466 deaths. The state remains a hotspot in the country as cases continue to rise and as of Nov. 6 ranks fifth in the country in the number of deaths per capita.

“The numbers are certainly up,” Lee stated. “Our case counts are up. Our hospitalizations are up. Our healthcare capacity is down.”

Lee explained that the state is in a very challenging situation due to hospitals’ capacities.

Because of these challenges he explained that it is important to re-examine the way we live in our day-to-day lives until there is resolve in COVID-19.

“We’re encouraging Tennesseans to really think about how important wearing a mask is,” he said. “How important gathering when you don’t have to is and how important that simple things that we can do and the choices that we make... Now is the time to begin, return to and continue re-

maining vigilant.”

While he touted the importance of mask wearing, he maintained that keeping masking decisions in the hands of local government is what is best for the state of Tennessee.

At the time of the community call, Jackson County had a total of 66 active cases, 24 hospitalizations and 10 deaths.

Lee stated that masks are an important tool and is something that is non-intrusive in day-to-day life.

In other business, he informed that vaccination efforts would shortly begin trickling down to the population in phases and the state should see that start in early December.

He stated that vaccines would be available to the public in early Spring.

“Folks can begin to talk to their doctor to see if that would be a good choice for them or not,” he stated. “Of course in this state, it will remain a choice.”

Additionally, he commented on the continuation of the upward trajectory of the economy as it continues to recover across the state.

“We have been very encouraged this year,” Lee said. “Particularly, our economies in our rural areas are outperforming expectation and are doing better than they did a year ago.”

With no further business to discuss, the conference adjourned.

# Residential Fire Total Loss

In the early morning hours of Tuesday, Nov. 24, the fire departments were called to 401 Maple Street with reports of a structure fire.

Upon arriving on scene the crews found a single story structure

with heavy fire coming from the eaves of the roof. All occupants had exited the home safely. The fire continued to rekindle throughout the day and into the next morning.

1:15 a.m. on Wednesday morning, Nov. 25 the fire had rekindled and was fully involved. The crews worked through the morning to extinguish the blaze.

# County Unemployment Rates Increase

Many Tennessee counties experienced changes in their unemployment rates during October 2020, according to newly released data from the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDLWD).

Unemployment in 93 of Tennessee’s 95 counties increased in October.

Davidson and Sevier counties saw their rates decrease during the month.

During October, two counties in the state had unemployment rates below 5%, 90 counties had rates of 5% or greater, and three counties recorded rates of 10% or higher.

Williamson County had the state’s lowest unemployment in October with a rate of 4.6%, which is up 0.8 of a percentage point from its revised September rate of 3.8%.

Shelby County recorded October’s highest jobless rate in Tennessee. At 11%, the county’s unemployment increased by 0.7 of a percentage point when compared to the previous month’s revised rate of 10.3%.

Regionally, Smith County had the lowest unemployment rate at 5.5%, a 1.1 percentage point increase from the previous month.

Overtown County had a jobless rate of 6%, nearly two percentage points higher than September’s rate.

Jackson County had an unemployment rate 7.4%, a 1.6 percentage point increase.

Clay County’s jobless

rate increased by nearly three percentage points, bringing the rate to 8.2%, which is the second highest in the region next to DeKalb County’s 8.4% jobless rate.

TDLWD has produced a report with a complete analysis of Tennessee’s October 2020 county unemployment data.

Tennessee’s statewide unemployment rate increased during October. The preliminary, seasonally adjusted, statewide unemployment rate for October 2020 is 7.4%, an increase of 0.9 of a percentage point from September’s revised rate of 6.5%.

Nationally, unem-

ployment decreased from September’s revised rate of 7.9% to 6.9% in October. The U.S. rate is 3.3 percentage points higher than it was in October 2019.

Tennessee employers are ready to help the state’s economy rebound by hiring individuals to meet their business needs. Jobs4TN.gov, Tennessee’s workforce development website, currently has over 240,000 open positions for workers of varying skill levels.

Jobs4TN.gov also offers online assistance with writing a resume that will catch the attention of employers, advice on how to engage and impress dur-

ing job interviews and details about potential job training opportunities.

There are more than 80 American Job Centers across Tennessee that are open for business and offering job seekers one-on-one personalized assistance. Career specialists are ready to work with individuals to devise a reemployment plan that will help them rejoin the state’s workforce.

All the assistance is free to anyone who needs help finding a new job or career path.

The state of Tennessee will release the unemployment rate for November 2020 on Thursday, Dec. 17 at 1:30 p.m.

## Rural Service Grant Award Awarded To Area Places

The Foundation for Rural Service (FRS) today announced the recipients of 23 grants totaling \$104,000 to advance the quality of life and enable economic development in communities served by members of NTCA–The Rural Broadband Association.

Twin Lakes is pleased to announce Baxter Fire Department and Jackson County Middle School as two of these grant recipients. Baxter Fire Department received \$5,000

to purchase a thermal imaging camera to provide firefighters with the ability to see objects and people in the dark and smoke-filled environments. Jackson County Middle School received \$4,900 to purchase iPads, Apple Pencils, and a 360-degree camera to provide better instruction and access for virtual students.

“Especially during the ongoing pandemic, the work or projects these grant recipients are

going to accomplish will make a significant impact in their communities,” said FRS Executive Director Pam Becker. “It is more important than ever before to expand telemedicine options and ensure that students have access to technology. We are grateful for all our recipients’ hard work, the NTCA members that endorsed them and continue to help their communities, and to our grant sponsor Womble Bond Dickinson.”

## Tennessee Selected As Participant For Vaccine Pilot

Tennessee has been selected as one of four states to participate in a pilot program for delivery of the Pfizer Inc. COVID-19 vaccine now under development. This program is designed to address distribution challenges posed by requirements for ultra-cold storage of the vaccine.

“We have a robust plan in place for distribution of this vaccine, and we’re honored to be chosen to help establish a model for other states in providing COVID-19 vaccine to their residents once it’s approved,” said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP.

Tennessee will participate in the pilot along with New Mexico, Rhode Island and Texas, states chosen based on their differences in size, population diversity and immunization infrastructure.

Lessons learned through this program will help support all states in development of effective immunization programs for this COVID-19 vaccine.

Once the vaccine is approved, Tennessee and other states participating in the pilot will not receive vaccine doses earlier than other states by virtue of the pilot. Pfizer is working with Operation Warp Speed and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to ensure that following approval, their COVID-19 vaccine can be provided to those most in need as quickly and equitably as possible.

TDH in coordination with other state and local agencies submitted an initial draft of the COVID-19 Vaccination Plan for Tennessee to the CDC on

Oct. 16. This plan will be modified as more is understood about the virus and the availability of approved vaccines currently in development. Tennessee is preparing to begin distribution of COVID-19 vaccine as early as December 2020.

TDH is working to onboard hospitals, pharmacies, clinics and other partners capable of storing vaccine and administering it to priority populations. TDH will ensure distribution of vaccination sites across all 95 counties, especially in rural counties and areas with high concentrations of people in vulnerable populations. 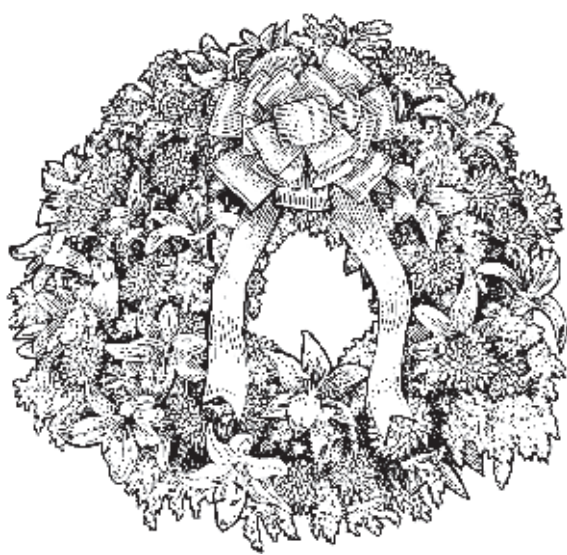

# Strategies To Overcome Seasonal Affective Disorder

Winter can be an awe-inspiring time of year. Snow-covered landscapes and opportunities to enjoy sports like skiing and snowboarding make winter a favorite time of year for nature enthusiasts and athletes.

As fun as winter can be, many people struggle with the transition from warm weather and long, sunny days to cold weather and reduced hours of sunlight. Sometimes mistaken or misidentified as the “winter blues,” this phenomenon is known as seasonal affective disorder, or SAD.

**What Is Seasonal Affective Disorder?**

According to the National Institutes of Mental Health, SAD is a type of depression. The NIH notes that a person must meet full criteria for ma-

lor depression coinciding with specific seasons for at least two years to be diagnosed with SAD. The American Psychiatric Association says symptoms of SAD can be distressing and overwhelming and even interfere with daily functioning.

The APA notes that SAD has been linked to a biochemical imbalance in the brain that’s prompted by shorter daylight hours and less sunlight in winter. As the seasons change, a shift in a person’s biological internal clock or circadian rhythm can lead to them being out of step with their normal routines. That can contribute to various symptoms, including:

Feeling sad or depressed, Loss of interest or pleasure in activities

once enjoyed, Changes in appetite, usually eating more and craving carbohydrates, Loss of energy or increased fatigue despite increased sleep hours, Increase in purposeless physical activity or slowed movements or speech that may be noticed by others, Feeling worthless or guilty, Difficulty thinking, concentrating or making decisions, Thoughts of death or suicide

**Overcoming SAD**

The weather can’t be changed, but people can speak with their physicians about the following strategies to overcome SAD.

**Light Therapy**

According to the APA, light therapy involves sitting in front of a light therapy box that emits a very bright light.

In the winter, patients typically sit in front of the box for 20 minutes each morning, and they may see some improvements within one to two weeks of beginning treatment. Light therapy is usually continued throughout the winter.

**Medication**

The APA notes that selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors, or SSRIs, are a type of antidepressant that are sometimes prescribed to treat SAD.

**Spending Time Outdoors**

People with SAD who don’t typically spend much time outdoors when the temperatures dip may notice their symptoms improve if they make a concerted effort to spend time outdoors in winter.

**Rearrange Rooms In**

The APA notes that rearranging rooms and furniture in a home or office to allow more natural light in during the daytime can help improve symptoms of SAD.
