



Bed Bugs Reported In School

An outbreak of bed bugs were reported at Jackson County High School prior to Spring Break.

According to a release from Director of Schools Kristy Brown, the school was treated by a pest control company while students were away over the break.

In the release dated for Wednesday, Brown said the system is looking into "a recent report and working with TN Department of Health personnel to ensure all necessary steps and protocols are taken."

The release said that follow up inspection will be scheduled "as soon as possible" and that all recommendations will be followed to help mitigate the affected areas.

"We take any report of this nature seriously and the school will continue to be inspected regularly," Brown said. "We are aware of vid-

eos and posts that have circulated on social media. However, it is very important that students report current sightings of bed bugs or any other health concerns directly to the Principal, Assistant Principal, or Nurse immediately."

In the release, Brown said it is important that parents and students take precautions to help limit the spread of the parasites.

"The source of bed bugs in schools often cannot be determined," Brown said. "Once areas are treated, bed bugs can return if they are brought back into the school. Please inspect your child's belongings and reach out to the school and a pest management professional if you suspect bed bugs in your home. Contact the health department for additional resources."

Brown's report said that parents were notified about the bed bug problem at JCHS prior to the break.

Grant Will Help Childcare

A grant from the state of Tennessee will help childcare facilities throughout the Upper Cumberland.

Funneling through the Department of Economic Development and down through the 14-county region comprising the Upper Cumberland Development District, the grant will pump just over \$1 million into helping childcare providers.

The Jackson County Commission passed a resolution at its April meeting agreeing to help disperse the money in the county.

"Every existing, licensed childcare can apply for this grant," Jackson County Mayor Randy Heady said. "This is a 100% grant with no match if any childcare facility in our county qualifies, or is awarded the grant, this is just approval they can get the grant. That money would funnel through the county."

Heady said the effect of the grant may be limited in Jackson County due to few licensed daycares.

"The only licensed

childcare we have is "Over the Rainbow," Heady said. "That's the only one we have in the county at the present time, and they have applied for the grant, but we haven't hear anything back on that."

Heady said the issue of adequate childcare is widespread and will only continue to grow.

"Childcare is a huge issue in all the Upper Cumberland, but also the state of Tennessee," Heady said. "We don't have enough childcare facilities. There are waiting lists. What we're trying to do with UCDD is funnel money down to local communities to try to alleviate this problem."

According to Heady, the lack of childcare can have an effect on the region's overall economy.

"We don't have enough childcare," Heady said. "Especially affordable childcare. One of the reasons we have 30 job openings within five minutes of where we are sitting is that we don't have affordable childcare. We're trying to create more childcare and trying to get more people back to work."

The Exchange Returning

After almost a decade, The Exchange is returning to Gainesboro.

Located on West Hull Ave., The Exchange is a ministry in which people can bring in items that are old to them and exchange for items that are new to them. Jessica Mayberry is helping to organize The Exchange.

"The Exchange was a clothing ministry," Mayberry said. "It was kind of like a Goodwill meets Salvation Army."

Mayberry said The Exchange initially opened for around seven years in 2008. It will be reopening in the same location on May 14 and will be celebrating a Grand Re-opening from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"The whole point of it was that we could help people get clothes, or items they needed, without them having to pay money for it," Mayberry said. "It was a tradeoff, thus the name."

If one did not know better, Mayberry said, they would think The Exchange was a store, but she feels it is much more.

"It was just open a couple days a week, and we mainly dealt with clothes," Mayberry said. "If you came through the front door, that's what you saw. It looked like a store. There were racks and shoes. We had diapers and baby clothes."

Mayberry said the same forces that led to the initial creation of The Exchange still exists and is one of the driving her to restart the mission.

"As we know, (Jesus) represented the physical, tangible part of God," Mayberry said. "He represented that physical

part, and people could have their needs met. Keeping in the pattern of that, we created The Exchange."

According to Mayberry, by working with the community through the ministry helped fill other needs, as well.

"As we worked with people and finding out their real needs, we could minister to people," Mayberry said. "We could invite them to church. That was a good, good thing."

By reopening The Exchange, Mayberry said she feels like she can heal some of the wounds

that were caused when it closed.

"The Exchange had a time, and that time came to an end," Mayberry said. "And there was a darkness that fell over us when that happened. It was sadness."

Mayberry said the outpouring of support from the community has been great. She said The Exchange is not currently able to take donations because they already have too many items, but she added that after they open on May 14, donations would again be welcome.

RECIPES of the WEEK

Ham and Bean Soup

1/2 tablespoons canola or vegetable oil

1 medium onion chopped
3 ribs celery chopped
3 carrots peeled and chopped
2 cloves garlic minced
1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves
2 1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper
1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper
6 cups low sodium chicken broth
2 tablespoons brown sugar
3 (15.5) ounce cans white beans rinsed and drained

2 bay leaves
1 1/4 - 1 1/2 lb bone in ham steak
Heat oil in a Dutch oven or heavy stockpot over medium heat. Add the onion, celery and carrots. Cook until the onion and celery have softened; 6-7 minutes. Reduce the heat to low and add the garlic, thyme leaves, cumin, white pepper and crushed red pepper cooking for one minute while stirring constantly. Stir in the chicken broth, brown sugar, white beans and bay leaves. Add the ham steak by slicing it into sections that will fit in the pot. Don't forget to include the ham bone. Let everything simmer for 20-30 minutes.

Then remove the ham from the pot and cut into bite size pieces. Discard any fat, skin, the ham bone and the bay leaves. Then return the ham to the pot and simmer for 5 minutes. If desired season to taste with additional black pepper, crushed red pepper or thyme.

For a creamy texture puree a small portion of the soup with a handheld immersion blender or in a stand blender. Always remove the inner cap when blending hot liquids.

Kool-Aid Pie

1 graham cracker pie crust, pre-

pared
1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk

1 packet unsweetened Kool-Aid any flavor
1/2 pint heavy cream, whipped or 1 (8 oz.) tub cool whip

Pour condensed milk into a medium bowl. Sprinkle in Kool-Aid packet and mix together. Add in whipped cream or cool whip and fold together until completely mixed. Pour into graham cracker crust. Cover and refrigerate for 4 hours or over night.

Slice and enjoy.

Teriyaki Noodles

16 ounce thin spaghetti noodles
1 cup Teriyaki Sauce
1 cup snow peas tips removed sliced on the diagonal

1 bunch green onions sliced on the diagonal

2 carrots shredded
1 tablespoon sesame seeds
1/2 cup cilantro loosely chopped

Put a large pot of water on to boil.

When it comes to a rolling boil, cook the thin spaghetti according to package instructions to al dente.

While the water is boiling and noodles are cooking, prepare the vegetables.

Slice the snow peas and onion.

shred the carrots and loosely chop the cilantro.

Mix the teriyaki sauce. Remove one cup, reserve the remaining sauce for another use.

Drain the noodles and rinse with cold water.

Add the vegetables reserving a small amount of the onions and cilantro for garnish.

Toss with the sauce-garnish with the remaining vegetables.

Can VA Puppy Program Help Combat PTSD?

The Department of Veterans Affairs has published its plan for starting up a pilot program for the Puppies Assisting Wounded Servicemembers for Veterans Therapy Act. In the PAWS Act, the VA will do a five-year pilot program to train dogs as a means of assisting veterans with PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder), with the veterans doing the training.

Five VA medical centers will be part of the pilot program: San Antonio; West Palm Beach, Florida; Anchorage, Alaska; Asheville, North Carolina; and Palo Alto, California.

There are three requirements for veterans to be eligible to join the pilot program: be enrolled in VA health care, be diagnosed with PTSD and get a recommendation from a VA mental health-care provider.

Veterans getting care from a non-VA provider will need to contact the VA facility where they get authorization for the non-VA care and

ask about taking part in the pilot. Additionally, the veteran must have had an appointment for some type of care within three months of asking to join the program, and then continue with appointments every three months.

The VA would be required to provide the dogs to veterans with mental illnesses who do not have mobility problems with training provided by certified trainers. Veterans would not be allowed to be around the dogs unless the trainer is present, nor to use any shock collars.

At the end of training, the veteran can adopt the dog if the trainer believes it's in the veteran's best interest, and additional training will continue for the life of the dog. However, some of the training involves getting a dog ready to be a service animal for someone else, so a veteran might work with multiple dogs.

To read all the fine print about the dog program, go to the Federal Register (www.federalregister.gov) and search for PAWS Act, then look for Implementation of the PAWS for Veterans Therapy Act.

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Small Businesses Can Protect

Many small business owners wonder how cybersecurity pertains to their business, or think they could never fall victim to cybercriminals.

But, according to the Small Business Administration (SBA), cyberattacks are a growing threat for entrepreneurs and the U.S. economy. In 2020 alone, the FBI reported that the cost of cybercrimes reached \$2.7 billion.

While some small businesses have little to no financial resources to devote to professional information technology solutions, tools are available to help understand the risks and where improvements can be made.

The Federal Communications Commission, for example, offers a free planning and assessment tool for business owners to develop a strategy based on their unique needs. There are also free online resources from the Department of Homeland Security, including a cyber resilience review, cyber hygiene vulnerability scanning, and supply chain risk management toolkit.

Additionally, resources are available for training employees, a key part of developing a cyberse-

curity plan. According to the SBA, employees and emails are a leading cause of data breaches because they are a direct path into business systems. Training topics include using good browsing practices, avoiding suspicious downloads, creating strong passwords, and protecting sensitive information.

The SBA suggests businesses use and keep antivirus software up-

dated, safeguard internet connections by using a firewall and encrypting information, and if using Wi-Fi, making sure it's secure and hidden. Backing up data regularly, working with bank and card processors on a secure payment process, and preventing access or use of business computers by unauthorized individuals, can also improve security.

Being able to use

technology is key for small businesses. Having a good plan and consistent practices will go a long way in protecting them from cybercriminals.

Why The Water Matters To Novice Kayakers

Kayaking is a fun way to spend an afternoon, particularly in summertime. If smiles on the faces of kayakers aren't enough to convince you just how fun this sport can be, perhaps statistics can convince you how enjoyable it is to paddle away in a kayak.

According to the Physical Activity Council, which each year conducts the largest single-source research study of sports, recreation and



leisure activity participation in the United States, recreational kayaking is the most popular paddlesport in the United States, attracting more than 11 million participants each year.

People who have never before been in a kayak may be intrigued by those statistics and tempted to follow the example set by millions of kayakers who take to the water every day when the weather permits. Safety should be a top priority for all kayakers, and especially for novices. A kayaking course can be a great way for novices to familiarize themselves with the basics of kayaking, including the best practices in regard to staying safe on the water. Local watersports retailers and recreational organizations

that take watersports enthusiasts out on the water may offer safety courses, and these courses can be great resources while also helping people get their feet wet before paddling away.

When kayaking for the first time, it's important that novices choose the right type of water for their experience level. Rough, choppy waters can prove challenging to even the most skilled kayakers, and these same waters can be deadly for novices. The following are some characteristics novice kayakers should look for in a body of water before pushing themselves and their kayakers into the current.

Size

Novices should avoid vast bodies of water, such as oceans, rivers or large

lakes, until they gain more experience. Large ponds and small lakes can be great places to gain some experience and familiarize oneself with the nuances of paddling.

Demeanor

Demeanor might not be a trait one normally associates with water, but looking at a body of water in this way can be a great way to determine if it's the right place for a novice. If a body of water is raging, with choppy waters and rapid waves, then steer clear. If the water is calm, then it's likely a safe spot for novices.

Traffic

Novices may be intimidated by crowds, but other kayakers can serve as something of a safety net for novices. Kayaking is a fun group activity, and novice paddlers

Variety

Novices should steer clear of waters that allow power boats. Such vessels can alter paddling conditions quickly, and that can put novices in potentially precarious positions. Stick to waters that allow only canoes or other boats that won't affect water conditions.

Access

Until they get more

comfortable in their kayaks, novice kayakers should stay close to shorelines so they have quick and simple access to land should they struggle to get acclimate to the water and being in a kayak.

Kayaking is a popular activity that even novices can enjoy, especially when they take certain measures to ensure their safety.

Grass Tetany Prevention And Treatment

Spring with its green pastures is the time of year that cattle long for at the end of a long winter. These grasses will be lush and your cows will tear a fence down to get on these pastures, but these grasses also will be full of moisture and potentially diluted of minerals. This can lead to condition known as grass tetany. Causes Grass tetany is a highly fatal disease associated with low levels of

magnesium (Mg) in the blood. Grass tetany can affect all classes of cattle, but older cows with calves on their side during late winter and early spring are most at risk. Cattle store magnesium in their bones and muscles, but cannot readily access and utilize these stores when needed. The animal constantly loses magnesium in urine, feces and milk, so when grazing lush green magnesium-deficient grass, cattle need magnesium supplements to meet daily requirements. A cow in peak lactation (six to


eight weeks following calving) needs a constant source of magnesium to replace the large amount lost from the body in milk. Some potential causes of grass tetany are: cattle grazing cool-season grasses and legumes, which have a low concentration of magnesium; grasses grown on leached acid sandy soils have lower levels of magnesium; magnesium levels are low when potash and nitrogen fertilizers are used and growth is lush; high moisture content in grass causing rapid gut transit and low uptake; reduced absorption of magnesium resulting from high rumen potassium, nitrogen and low rumen sodium; low energy intake, fasting or sudden changes in feed; transport stress and low intake of phosphorus and salt. Signs

Animals suffering from grass tetany are often found dead. There may be signs of struggle on the ground beside the animal indicating they were leg paddling before death. Early signs include some excitability with muscle twitching, an exaggerated awareness and a stiff gait. Animals may appear aggressive and may progress through galloping, bellowing and then staggering. In less severe cases the only signs may be a change in the character of the animal and difficulty in handling. Treatment Blood magnesium levels must be restored. Veterinary administration of an intravenous calcium and magnesium solution produces best results. However, in acute cases where time is critical, producers should administer and Epson salt solution via

an enema while waiting on the veterinarian. Producers also should provide oral sources of magnesium to affected herds to prevent relapses. These include: magnesium oxide in minerals; magnesium lick blocks; and addition of magnesium to concentrates or pellets. These products are available from your veterinarian and feed supplier/retailer. Prevention and control The goal of a well-managed prevention program should aim to: eliminate factors that reduce magnesium absorption and provide a magnesium supplement. Immediate actions: increase energy and roughage intake, good quality hay or silage is suitable; pellets or grain can be added if introduced carefully; provide a balanced mineral source (block or loose);

move lactating cows (especially older animals) to high legume and high dry matter pastures; reduce stress factors; and provide magnesium supplements. Long-term management: correct soil acidity with lime or dolomite (dolomite contains some magnesium); plant clovers; apply phosphate fertilizer; limit potash and nitrogen applications until soil acidity is corrected and clovers are established. Maintain and review records to identify repeat offenders. Some cattle are more susceptible than other, so identification and supplement of Mg may head off problems before they occur.
