

## County Considering New Jail Med Options

The Jackson County Commission is considering a new medical provider for the county's jail.

Mayor Randy Heady said the county has been in talks with Fast Access Healthcare, one of two bidders for the service. He said their bid was more affordable and will also provide more coverage at the jail.

"They gave us a proposal which is much cheaper than what we have from our current provider," Heady said. "We were looking at moving providers even before we found out how much the savings were going to be to go to them."

Heady said the cost savings with Fast Access would be significant, coming in at around \$30,000 less, however, he added that the county will also study extend-

ing the amount of coverage at the jail from five to seven days a week.

"We're going to be looking at the seven eight-hour days option," Heady said.

According to Heady, that will cut down on the number of transports to outside of the county for inmate healthcare.

"To say that we won't ever have to go to Cookeville Regional is a stretch," Heady said. "But we're hoping to lower those transports. That's absolutely the goal."

Heady said that both he and Sheriff Marty Hinson thought changing providers was a positive step for the county.

"We think this is a real good move for us," Heady said. "We're both in agreement for this."

Fast Access is headquartered in Athens, Tenn. The company already provide services in Fentress and Cumberland Counties.

# RECIPES ON A BUDGET

## Beef and Tater Bake

4 cups frozen Tater Tots  
1 pound ground beef  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of broccoli soup, undiluted  
1/3 cup 2% milk  
1 package (16 ounces) frozen chopped broccoli  
1 can (2.8 ounces) french-fried onions, divided  
1 cup shredded Colby-Monterey Jack cheese, divided  
1 medium tomato, chopped  
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spread Tater Tots evenly in an ungreased 13x9 inch baking dish. Bake, uncovered, 10 minutes.  
Meanwhile, in a large skillet, cook over medium heat until no longer pink, 5-7 minutes, crumble meat, drain. Stir in seasonings, soup, milk, broccoli, 3/4 cup onions, 1/2 cup cheese and tomato; heat through. Pour over potatoes.  
Bake, covered, 20 minutes. Sprinkle with the remaining onions and cheese. Bake, uncovered, until cheese is melted, 5-10 minutes.

## Pizza on a Stick

8 ounces Italian turkey sausage links  
2 cups whole fresh mushrooms  
2 cups cherry tomatoes  
1 medium onion, cut into 1-inch pieces  
1 large green pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces  
30 slices turkey pepperoni (2 ounces)  
1 tube (13.8 ounces) refrigerated pizza crust  
1 1/2 cups shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese  
1 1/4 cups pizza sauce, warmed  
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a large nonstick skillet, cook sausage over medium heat until no longer pink; drain. When cool enough to handle, cut sausage into 20 pieces. On 10 metal or wooden skewers, alternately thread sausage, vegetables and pepperoni.  
Unroll pizza dough onto a lightly floured surface; cut widthwise into 1-inch wide strips. Starting at the pointed end of a prepared skewer, pierce skewer through one end of dough strip. Spiral-wrap dough strip around skewer, allowing vegetables and meats to peek through. Wrap the remaining end of dough strip around skewer above the first ingredient. Repeat with remaining dough strips and prepared skewers.  
Arrange kabobs on a baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Bake 10-12 minutes or until vegetables are tender and pizza crust is golden. Immediately sprinkle with cheese. Serve with warm pizza sauce.  
Any of the vegetables or meat can be substituted to your liking. Try frozen meatball, black olives, take out the mushrooms. Use whatever pizza toppings you

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### ELDERLY VOTERS OR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

Any elderly voter or voter with a disability whose polling place is inaccessible may vote early by absentee ballot or at the Election Commission Office on Election Day.

If the voter chooses to vote at the Election Commission Office on Election Day, they must complete an affidavit at the Election Commission Office not later than 10 days before Election Day stating that their designated voting location does not comply with the provisions of Public Law 98-435.

As an alternative to voting at the Election Commission Office on Election Day, the voter may vote by absentee ballot or during the early voting period. (\*Note – If the voter registered by mail, they must vote in person in the first election they vote in after registering). To vote an absentee ballot by-mail, the voter must make the request in writing and include their name (as registered), social security number, residence address (911 address), mailing address (if different from residence address), voter's birthdate, the election they wish to vote in, the reason they are requesting to vote an absentee ballot and their signature. The written request must be received by mail not later than July 25, 2022. The first day to request absentee ballots to be voted by mail by persons other than armed forces, their spouses and overseas voters is May 6, 2022. Requests must be mailed to the Jackson County Election Commission, P.O. Box 13, Gainesboro, TN 38562

### Photo ID Requirements for All Voters

Tennessee state law requires all voters voting in person to present a Federal or a State of Tennessee issued photo ID. The ID must contain the voter's name and photograph. ## Investigative Journalism Matters

Recently, a couple of reporters at The New York Times published an intriguing story about conversations between House Republican leader Kevin McCarthy and other members of his leadership team. It was shortly after the events of Jan. 6 at the Capitol, and they were talking about what to do about then-President Trump.

His conduct, McCarthy said, had been “atrocious and totally wrong.” Moreover, wrote Alexander Burns and Jonathan Martin in their article, McCarthy “faulted the president for ‘inciting people’ to attack the Capitol, saying that Mr. Trump’s remarks at a rally on the National Mall that day were ‘not right by any shape or any form.’” He added, “I’ve had it with this guy.”

Burns and Martin have since published a series of articles on the subject, including McCarthy’s fears that some of his more extreme colleagues could themselves incite more violence. Not surprisingly, there have been plenty of denials, but the two reporters have countered with one key point: They have the audio recordings.

I happen to believe

these stories are important for the insight they provide into key politicians’ thinking at a dark moment in our history—and on those politicians’ willingness to backtrack in the year since. But whether you agree or not, the willingness of two reporters to dig deep into what actually happened and set the record straight has sent shockwaves through Washington and cast the behavior of powerful officials in a new light.

This is what good investigative journalism does. It is an essential part of our representative democracy, offering all of us—the people who have the most at stake in who represents us in Washington and how they and other officials behave on our behalf—the chance to understand more fully what’s going on. I often think to myself how dull our lives would be without the difficult, important work that enterprising journalists do. They get for us the facts and—mostly—put them in context so that we can understand what we need to know.

I’m not going to recite a list of all the important stories that journalists have uncovered or helped to explain; it would take us hours.

But a quick look back at some relatively recent investigative work gives you a sense of the key importance they play. There was the 2019 Washington Post story on a confidential “trove” of government papers documenting nearly two decades of US officials’ misleading statements about the war in Afghanistan. And Ronan Farrow’s groundbreaking investigation of the sexual predation of Harvey Weinstein. There’s been ongoing coverage of the dark corners of America’s war on terror, from Abu Ghraib to Guantanamo. The work by the Seattle Times on how failures of government oversight helped lead to the crashes of the Boeing 737 MAX. The Boston Globe’s earthshattering investigations of abusive behavior by priests and the Catholic Church hierarchy’s efforts to cover it up.

It’s possible that just by reciting that tiny fraction of important work, I’ve spurred you to think of other examples, from Watergate to the exposure of corruption or malfeasance or toxic pollution or some other community harm where you live. And that’s my point: Journalists are constantly finding and exposing the truth in

ways that, ideally, spur us to improve our lives, communities, government, and democratic system as a whole. They have a lot of power—they can destroy the career of public officials and private-sector leaders—and certainly some of them have their faults, obsessing over feuds and conflict and giving them more attention than they deserve. But overall, I’ve found journalists in particular to be intelligent, compassionate, and people of integrity.

And I’ll say it again: They’re vital to our representative democracy. We need the work journalists do to remain a free and independent nation, with power residing ultimately in the hands of its citizens. There’s a reason that one of the first things authoritarians do is try to bring the press to heel. They understand, perhaps better than we who get to take these things for granted, how a thriving free press lets people form their own opinions.

## Most VA, DoD Health Records Aren’t Accurate

It can be a big problem when you need medical care and the electronic health records sent from one provider to another contain inaccuracies. Unfortunately, a Department of Defense Inspector General audit showed this is happening in far too many active-duty and veterans records.

After sending surveys to 7,387 health care providers in late 2020 asking about their ability to access health care information for both DoD and Department of Veterans Affairs patients and whether that information was accurate, the DoD recently reported that:

- 91.2% of DoD patient records were inaccurate or incomplete.
- 67.5% of VA patient records were inaccurate or incomplete.
- 93.9% said that it impacted patient care, including giving an inaccurate or incomplete diagnosis.

The inaccurate or missing information included problems and conditions, lab results, medications and much more.

Over at the VA, they’ve known for a long time that they needed to upgrade their 40-year-old computer system and proposed to merge with the DoD’s system. That got started in 2018. They would begin with one facility as a test.

In 2020, the VA Office of the Inspector General was tasked with finding out one overriding answer: Is it all going well at the test site before they open the system at the 174 VA medical centers, as well as the 1,577 other sites?

The answer, in a word, no.

The ill-timed pandemic no doubt kept most workers at home, especially in the beginning. But they’ve made progress. Just recently, the VA brought online its third site with the new system to track and store patient data.

Thoughts: Keep track of your records ... and whether they’re accurate. Carry a 3x5 card in your wallet listing your drugs and dosages, conditions and surgeries. When you go to a medical appointment at a VA facility, ask for verification that their records are correct. The last thing you need in an emergency is for your medical records to be inaccurate.

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## Rural Entrepreneurs Can Become Climate Leaders

Investments in renewable energy and efficiency provide opportunities for business owners to reduce costs and improve their bottom line. Additionally, when commercial energy users cut usage and invest in efficiency, emissions reductions can be achieved.

Focusing on energy efficiency can be as simple as turning up or down—depending on the season—the thermostat in the office by 10-15 degrees when no one is around at night, insulating workspaces with energy efficient windows and doors, and installing LED or other energy saving light bulbs. Switching off lights when not in use, either manually or through automatic sensors, can also improve efficiency, along with encouraging employees

to turn off all their equipment at the end of the day.

Businesses can help reduce waste by reviewing their presentation of products to ensure they’re not over-packaged, converting paperwork to digital if at all possible, and only printing documents if necessary. When printing, use recycled paper and the two-sided and save-ink functions on the printer. Businesses are also encouraged to create a recycling program for cans, plastic, and glass.

Addressing fuel and travel, business owners can encourage employees to bike, walk, or carpool instead of driving their own vehicle, or allow them to work remotely from home occasionally or when it makes sense. If the workplace has a fleet of vehicles, use the most energy-efficient models possible, such as electric cars or hybrid

vehicles. Also, reassess business travel requirements and consider video conferencing instead of air travel.

By taking measures to improve energy efficiency, reduce waste,

and address fuel/travel, rural entrepreneurs can help build resiliency in the face of our changing climate.

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# Revitalize Your Landscape On A Budget

Perennials are the gardener's friend when it comes to saving money. These plants sprout anew each year, and many, such as sedum, catmint, ferns, hostas, and black-eyed Susans, can propagate by division. Figure out the best times of year to divide the plants and start growing them in individual containers before planting the sturdy new shoots in the ground. A single variety of plants grouped together in mass plantings is affordable and easy.

### Shop End-Of Season Sales

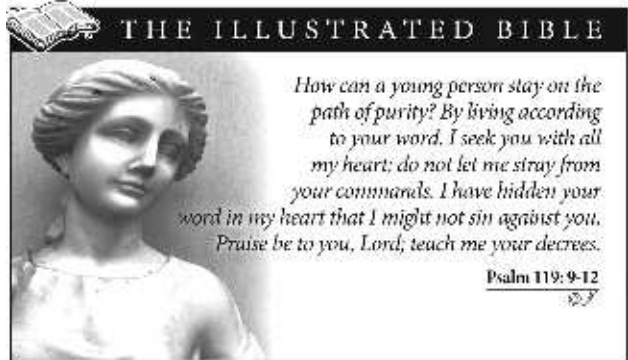

Some handy ideas can help homeowners transform landscapes without spending too much.





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

### County Court To Appoint New Sheriff Law Enforcement Under Study Here

The Jackson County Quarterly Court will meet in special session tonight, June 8 at 7:30 with the express purpose of selecting a sheriff to replace Johnny Pippin whose resignation will become effective June 10, according to Vernon Carver, chairman of the court.

Pippin was appointed in January to fill the unexpired term of Junior Lynch who resigned for what he then termed health reasons.

The Gainesboro City Council has been seeking a new chief of police to replace Joe E. Heady who is among the three members of the police department to recently resign in apparently unrelated incidents. Heady will seek election to the Sheriff's post in the August 3 election.

These two appointments will perhaps quell the "breakdown in law and order" which have been in evidence here through recent events in what Mayor Bennie Hix terms "a bad situation".

### Twin Lakes Announces \$6.9 Million Improvements

Twin Lakes Telephone Cooperative has started a five-year program to furnish one-party service for all its subscribers.

Just five years after starting its conversion from an eight to a four-party system, the Cooperative become the South's first to announce it will install a one-party system.

### Local Lake Is Busy On Holiday

Well over one million visitors at the seven Corps of Engineers' lakes on the Nashville District set new Memorial Day weekend records at five of them, according to Col. William F. Brandes, District Engineer.

The new records were established at Lake Barkley with over 238,000 visitors; Center Hill with nearly 170,000; Old Hickory with more than 145,000 and Dale Hollow with over 61,000; and Cheatham with 45,000 visitors. Although Lake Cumberland did not enjoy a new record they still hosted the largest crowd with 344,000 visitors.

Rick's Drive-In, located across the street from the Jackson County Hospital, was completely gutted by an early morning fire Tuesday. The Gainesboro Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene but they could not halt the flames' damages to the buildings interior. 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# Walk Across Tennessee Results Announced

Walk Across Tennessee, a University of Tennessee Extension program partnered with the Jackson County Health Department to conduct the eight-week physical activity challenge.

The purpose of the program is to encourage teams to be active by walking or choosing their favorite physical activity. The goal for the entire challenge is to cumulatively walk the equivalent of the length of Tennessee which is about 500 miles.

We had 18 teams participated, with 72 participants, 15 out of 18 teams walked at least 500 miles, 8 teams walked at least 1,000 miles and total miles walked were 20,707.55. The top 3 teams received prizes from the Jackson County Health department, the UT Extension Service, and local businesses. Invest In Plants That Are Easy To Propagate

Perennials are the gardener's friend when it comes to saving money. These plants sprout anew each year, and many, such as sedum, catmint, ferns, hostas, and black-eyed Susans, can propagate by division. Figure out the best times of year to divide the plants and start growing them in individual containers before planting the sturdy new shoots in the ground. A single variety of plants grouped together in mass plantings is affordable and easy.

Shop End-Of Season Sales

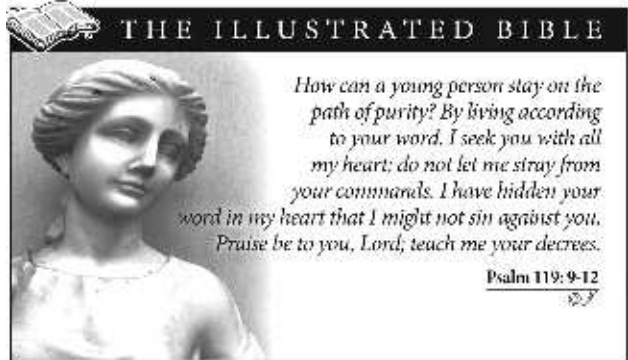
