2021-2022 School Calendar Approved

The Jackson County School Board met on Thursday and approved next year's calendar.

Next, The last of the new business was the approval of the 2021-2022 school calendar.

Director of schools Kristy Brown informed the board the only major change to the new calendar was built-in teacher planning days.

"The committee worked really hard... and I feel like they tried to get the teachers input," Kristy Brown said. "There are several teachers who have talked about the need for planning, and having time at school to plan and there's never enough time. So we wanted to maybe build that into the calendar and make some time during the days for it."

She then went on to explain where those extra days would come from.

"We would use two stockpile (snow) days to put these in place so that teachers would have time to plan for the spring semester. If we were to have inclement weather and run out of days... we would basically just come to school these days and make it a makeup day," Kristy Brown said.

Following FMLA approval, Mark Brown shifted the meeting to new business.

The JCHS Volleyball Club received approval from the board to raise funds.

They also approved a "Book Fairy" project for the JCMS sixth grade class.

Friends, family and community members are encouraged to donate money for the project. The money donated will be used to purchase a book for every sixth grade student to keep either at Christmas or the end of the year pending on funds.

The board unanimously approved the school calendar.

The board also unanimously voted to approve Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) for Melissa Smith from Oct. 29 - Nov. 27 and Jana Case from Jan. 4 - Feb. 15.

The county principals each gave an update on their respective schools.

JCHS principal Jason Brown informed the board that they have hired a transitional employee to work with special education students and the community to help the students better transition into the workforce after graduation.

"I think it's great... Our special ed students got their coffee shop up and running today and they're doing everything from collecting money to counting inventory to cleaning up, I think it's going to be a great thing," Jason Brown said.

After the principal reports, Kristy Brown announced that Angela Johnson had been hired as a substitute teacher and that Jeanne Key has retired from Dodson Branch School.

Following Mrs. Brown's report, Mark Brown closed the meeting and the board decided on a date for their next meeting.

The next meeting of the Jackson County School Board will be held on Dec. 17 at the School Board Central Office beginning at 6 p.m.

Second Food Distribution A Success

On Wednesday, Nov. 18, the Gainesboro 1st United Methodist Church on Main Street held their second food distribution in two months this time they were able to hand out almost 3,000 boxes of perishable food consisting of chicken, milk and vegetables.

This was distributed by a reservation only system that allowed volunteers to distribute the 90,000 pounds of food without anyone having to wait in line or block traffic. The food was obtained

through the USDA and paid for with COVID-19 relief funds allocated by Congress.

"This food was a gift from God that practically fell in our laps. We're so thankful for the quick response by volunteers to rally together to help get these goods on the table of the people who need them," said Rev Tim DuNavant.

While no date is set yet, the church is hopeful they will be able to host another distribution right before Christmas.

RECIPE of the WEEK

Fresh Apple Spice Cake

1 cup vegetable oil
2 cups sugar
3 eggs
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground

nutmeg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup chopped pecans
3 cups peeled, finely chopped apples

Directions:
Combine oil and sugar; beat well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine flour, soda, salt,

cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir. Add dry ingredients to sugar mixture, beating well. Add vanilla; mix well. Stir in pecans and apples. Pour batter into a greased and floured 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

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How To Practice Food Safety At Home

In a typical day, few people may pay much mind to foodborne illnesses. But once a person gets sick from food poisoning, the experience is something they don't soon forget.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, each year 48 million people get sick from a foodborne illness. The CDC notes that most instances of food poisoning are infections caused by various bacteria, viruses and parasites. Food safety can prevent many instances of food poisoning, which is one reason why restaurants must adhere to strict protocols designed to keep customers safe. Routine inspections by government officials ensure those guidelines are followed, but what about cooking

at home? When cooking at home, the family chef can follow these steps to reduce the risk of foodborne illnesses.

Clean Your Hands And The Surfaces In Your Kitchen

The CDC notes that germs can not only survive in many places around the kitchen, but also spread throughout the kitchen. Prior to preparing a meal, clean all countertops where you will be dicing, slicing, etc. In addition, before touching any food, wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds, and be sure to do so each time you finish working with one food and before working with another.

Rinse Fruits And Vegetables

Fruits and vegetables may contain harmful

germs that can increase your risk of foodborne illnesses. Salmonella, E. coli and listeria have each been found on fruits and vegetables, and the CDC estimates that a significant percentage of foodborne illnesses can be traced to contaminated produce. Rinse all fruits and vegetables thoroughly under running water prior to slicing or dicing.

Separate Foods

The Food and Drug Administration advises people to keep raw meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs away from other foods. Keep foods separate in shopping carts, grocery bags and then in the refrigerator upon arriving home. When preparing dishes that include meat and fresh fruits and vegetables, use separate

cutting boards for each raw food.

Cook Foods To The Correct Temperature

Foods are only safe to eat when they reach certain internal temperatures. Recipes typically include this information, and cooks should always follow recipes. Food thermometers can be used when cooking in the stove or using a grill. A list of foods and their corresponding temperatures can be found at www.foodsafety.gov.

Cool Foods At The Right Temperature, Too

Cooking foods at the right temperature is vital to food safety, but so is cooling foods at appropriate temperatures. The CDC advises keeping refrigerators at 40 F or below. When thawing

foods, do so in the refrigerator in cold water or use the defrost setting on your microwave. Foods should never be thawed on the counter, as bacteria can multiply quickly

in the parts of the food that reach room temperature.

(J.W. McCain, Jackson County Sentinel, 1925, Letter to the Editor)

I owned the first car in Jackson County, and thought perhaps a few lines about it would be of interest to many readers of the *Sentinel*.

I purchased the car in Detroit about Jan. 18, 1913, paying over 600 dollars for it, and then paid the freight to Nashville on it, which made the machine cost me pretty heavy. But what did I care for expenses at that day and time. I wanted to own one, and did, and I had some fun, believe me, while the thing was new, and scarce as they are in this section at the time.

I went to Celina, soon after I got the car. I went via Baptist Ridge. In passing a school house on the road, all the children ran out of the house and went to the woods. I passed a house near the road, and an old 'like woman was sitting on the porch churning. She became frightened at the car, kicked over her churn, milk and all, and began to hollow, "Come here

Ned, I see a buggy running like the devil, with nothing pulling and nothing pushing." Further on I met two women, both had a basket of eggs. They set their baskets down and ran to the fence, one climbed upon the fence, but the other one was so excited she couldn't make the rifle, so she just got as close up to it as possible and stood, gazing at the car. The trip was one thing right after another and was very amusing to watch the people along the road who had never

seen or heard of an automobile.

Time and again, I was called to different parts of the country to let people ride with me, and by-the-way, I made some good pocket change in this way, and had scuds of fun to boot.

The first trip I made to Gainesboro, with J.W. Stafford as my escort, I had lots of fun with the small boys.

The roads at this time were very rough and hard to get over them with it and had lots of fun along.

People Of The Past Revealed

This one stumped a lot of people. Did you guess correctly? Read on to find out if you were right.

Early Years
Therold Richardson was born on Aug. 28, 1924 in Jackson County, Tennessee. He was raised in the Hurricane Community of Jackson County and attended Sugar Creek School, grades one through eight. He then attended Jackson County High School and graduated in 1943.

In 1949 he married Jean Garrett Watson and they had one son, Lee G. Richardson, an attorney in Gainesboro.

Therold helped organize the Mohawk softball team and played in the outfield.

The Mohawks were undefeated in the surrounding areas.

The State Champion Girls Softball team from Nashville came to Gainesboro to play the Mohawks. The Mohawks won the game in the bottom of the ninth inning 1 to 0.

Business and Community Involvement
In 1950 at the age of 26 he started his own business known as Richardson Realty and Insurance. That business continued under her leadership for the next 60 years.

He was active in community and civic affairs for Jackson County and the Town of Gainesboro. He served as president of the P.T.A., president of the Lion's Club, served as the Mayor of the Town of Gainesboro in the 1960's and was President of the Jackson County Industrial Board. He earned a 32nd Degree in the Masons and was in the Masons for over 50 years.

In addition he actively farmed and raised cattle for many years. He enjoyed collecting coins, antique cars and was an avid golfer.

Musical History
Therold Richardson started playing in bands at age ten. There would be many stories of him in his early teens canoeing across the Cumberland

River to go make music over at Choate Spivey's house in Big Bottom on Webster Branch.

Therold Richardson and Frasier Moss appeared many times together making music. To keep country music alive in Jackson County he started The Little Opry in 2001 at the Fairgrounds and then it moved to Fox Elementary School Cafeteria in 2003. The Little Opry would meet on the second Saturday of every month. He also encouraged the playing of country music at his office starting in 2001 on Tuesday nights. There would be many pickers and a lot of visitors who would come to hear the music played that night. This continued on until his death. After the Anderson Brothers took over leadership of the Opry, they renamed it Therold's Little Opry, which is the present title today and it is still going.

Therold started the fourth Sunday singings among the churches in Jackson County, which continued under his direction for over 50 years. He was an active member of the Gainesboro Church of Christ.

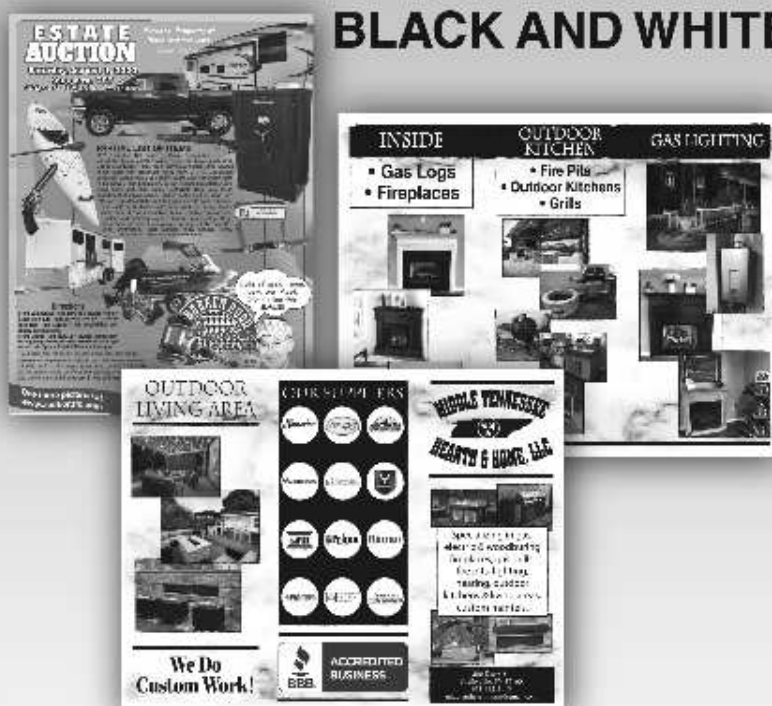
