

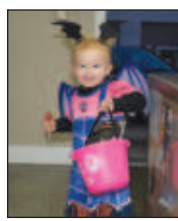

County Investigates Revenue Streams

The Jackson County Board of Commissioners met on Monday to conduct their monthly business.

Jackson County Mayor Randy Heady opened the meeting, the pledge of allegiance was recited and then roll was called.

The first item on the agenda was the approval of the minutes from the previous meeting that took place on Sept. 21.

Doug Stafford made a motion to approve the minutes. Gary Garrison seconded the motion.

The next topic of dis-

cussion was a recent audit that the county had placed upon itself to help find unutilized revenue streams.

Jackson County has teamed up with The Barrett Group of Murfreesboro to perform the audit.

Auditor Donna Barrett has been in charge of conducting the audit and she shared with the committee her findings so far since she began in December.

So far Barrett has only audited three of the county's revenue streams:

Man Found Guilty Of Murder

A local man, Kevin Meadows, 37, of Gainesboro was indicted and found guilty on the charges of first-degree murder, aggravated arson, theft over \$1,000 and two counts of tampering with evidence, after a murder took place in Jackson County in May of 2018.

As previously reported by *The Jackson County Sentinel*, an investigation by Special

Agents with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and deputies with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office resulted in the arrest of Meadows, who faced murder and other charges, stemming from a homicide in 2018 and was found guilty after a four-day trial that took place late last month.

At the request of the 15th District Attorney General Tommy Thompson, on May 11, 2018 TBI Agents joined investigators with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office in investigating the homicide of Solomon Minder, 71, of Gainesboro. The victim was found deceased in his

McCoinville Road residence in Gainesboro. The investigation revealed evidence that a fire had been set inside the home. During the course of the investigation, agents and investigators developed information that identified Meadows, an acquaintance of the victim, as the individual responsible for Minder's death.

After the guilty verdict, Meadows is facing sentences for first-degree murder, aggravated arson, theft over \$1,000, and two counts of tampering with evidence, which could result in a life sentence plus up to an additional 39 years.

Prosecutors were

Jason Lawson and Ian Bratton.

Defending attorneys were Tom Bilbrey and Jo McLerran.

"The success of this case would not have been possible without the efforts of Sheriff Hinson and the Jackson County Sheriff's Department as well as Bobby Simmons and the investigators of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. Because of their hard work, Mr. Minder and his family received justice," Lawson said.

Meadows' sentencing date is set for Dec. 17 at 1 p.m.

Judge Brody Kane presided over the case.

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Countdown To 2020 Open Enrollment

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Individuals and families may receive help ap-

plying, looking at different health insurance plans and enrolling. All health insurance offered through the Marketplace meets the minimum essential coverage requirements.

Counselors will help you learn about plans for which you qualify based on your income and the number of people in your household. You must apply for Marketplace plans during the open enrollment period beginning Nov. 1, and

running through Dec. 15. Open enrollment is only six weeks, so make sure you enroll/renew in time to receive coverage for 2021.

You may qualify for a special enrollment period if any of the following happen to you outside of the open enrollment period: losing existing health insurance; moving; getting married; or having a child. You have 60 days from the time of the event to qualify for a special in-

surance enrollment. Get help throughout the year from your local health center with enrolling in a special enrollment period.

You may also receive assistance with applying for TennCare or CoverKids any time throughout the year.

2 eggs

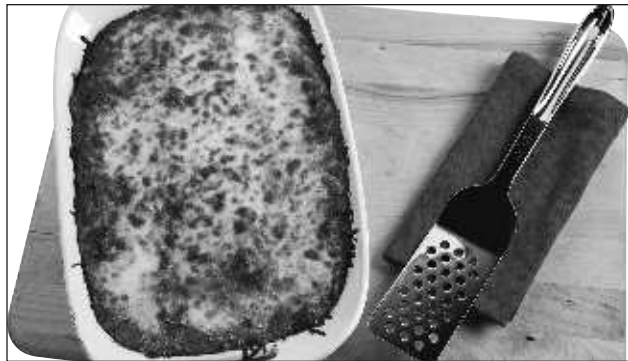
Directions:

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Stock The Pantry With Holiday Baking Ingredients

Many holiday traditions begin with family and friends gathered in the kitchen or around the dinner table. Food is an integral part of celebrating Thanksgiving, Christmas and Chanukah, and key components of each holiday are tied exclusively to food.

Come the holiday season, many people gather to make delicious desserts for holiday dinners or even as gifts. The right ingredients are necessary to produce a bounty of baked goods. It's also essential to ensure those ingredients are fresh, as age can compromise the taste of some spices, and leavening ingredients like yeast, baking soda and baking powder may lose efficacy over time.

Flours
All-purpose flour is versatile and useful in

many recipes. In addition, bread flour, cake flour and pastry flour have attributes that make them better suited for their respective jobs than all-purpose flour. Individuals who follow certain diets, including gluten-free diets, can find alternative flours that can be substituted in many different recipes.

Baking soda
This leavening agent is activated when it is combined with acid and heat. That is why it is often paired with citrus juice, buttermilk and sour cream.

Baking powder
This leavening agent is baking soda mixed with a powdered acid and cornstarch. If baking soda is the only leavening agent, it will not require the addition of another acidic ingredient. "Double-acting" means carbon

dioxide bubbles will form during mixing and again during heating.

Yeast
Yeast takes more time to metabolize and cause doughs to rise than other leavening agents.

Sugar
Granulated sugar is the most common sugar found in recipes. Confectioner's sugar (powdered sugar) is used in frosting and icings. Brown sugar is refined sugar with molasses added, and is used in certain recipes, like gingerbread.

Salt
Granulated table salt is used in everyday baking.

Unsalted butter
Unsalted butter will be the default for baked goods unless the recipe specifically mentions salted butter.

Eggs

Eggs help to bind ingredients together. Large eggs are most often cited in many baking recipes.

Milk
Dairy adds moisture and texture to batters. Alternative milks, such as soy or almond milk, can sometimes be substituted, but the resulting texture may change.

Vegetable oil
Many recipes call for vegetable oil, which has a neutral flavor.

Shortening
Shortening is a solid vegetable fat used to make tender baked goods. Shortening also has a higher melting point, which helps cookies and other items retain their shape while cooking.

Flavorings
It is helpful to have various spices and extracts on hand. Cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, cloves,

and allspice are some common baking spices. Almond and vanilla extracts are quite versatile and add extra punch to recipes.

Additions
Mix-ins, such as chocolate chips, cocoa pow-

der, oats, nuts, and dried fruits, often turn up in holiday recipes. Certain ingredients are essential for baking and holiday cooks can take steps to ensure their pantries are stocked in time for the holidays.

sales tax, hall income tax and utility sales tax.

Barrett informed the committee that she had found approximately \$21,000 in recurring funds that the county should have received but did not. She also explained that there is an additional \$40,000 of one-time payments that Jackson County should have been paid by the State of Tennessee.

That is \$38,485 in sales taxes, \$753 in hall taxes and \$2,000 in utility sales taxes.

The idea is to find out how much money is owed to Jackson County by the end of the audit and then request a “one-time collection” of the owed funds from the state.

“The one-time collection is something that the state allows to happen to kind of makeup for all of the years that it’s been wrong in the first place,” Barrett said.

Barrett went on to explain that Jackson County could be owed over \$400,000 from the State of Tennessee for unreceived payment for the past 20 years.

The audit is expected

to be complete in less than 18 months.

The board also discussed that insurance premiums for county employees will increase by 5%. As previously reported in the *Sentinel*, the additional cost of the premiums will be absorbed by the county beginning on Jan. 1—keeping insurance costs low for county employees.

Heady also made a motion to clarify that all hotel and motel occupancy tax will go to the 101 funds balance, the motion passed.

The board then announced that Jackson County has received a Community Development Block Grant from the Tennessee Department of Economics and Community Development in the amount of \$381,060.

“The grant will provide (two) ambulance re-mounts for the EMS and special equipment needed for the local Volunteer Fire Departments as well as the Jackson County Rescue Squad,” Heady explained.

Heady then closed the meeting and announced that the board’s next meeting will be held on Dec. 14 at 7 p.m.

New Visitors Center At Cummins Falls

Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) officials Tuesday opened a new \$2.4 million, 5,400-sq.-ft. visitors center at Cummins Falls State Park just north of Cookeville.

“This is an outstanding facility for Cummins Falls,” TDEC Commissioner David Salyers said. “It will be a welcome addition to assist visitors who want to enjoy the natural wonder here. This facility will enhance the experience for everyone.”

The visitors center will have a spacious lobby with exhibits, gift shop, rentable conference room, two covered patios, restrooms, and staff offices. The design is intended to blend modern construction with a natural environment, with nearby historic and agrarian buildings. Visitors will go by rangers’ offices as they walk down the trail to the waterfall. The designer is Tinker Ma of Chattanooga, and the construction is by W&O Construction of Livingston, TN.

While the Tennessee

General Assembly allocated \$2.8 million for the project, the construction came in under budget at a cost of \$2,435,354.34.

Cummins Falls State Park is a rugged 282-acre day-use park nine miles north of Cookeville by the Blackburn Fork State Scenic River on the Eastern Highland Rim. Located in the Cordell Hull Watershed, the area has been a scenic spot and swimming hole for residents of Jackson and Putnam counties for more than 100 years. Cummins Falls, 75 feet high, is Tennessee’s eighth largest waterfall in volume of water.

Visitors to the park are advised that Cummins Falls is a natural area with inherent safety risks. Getting to the waterfall involves strenuous physical activity, and access to the waterfall requires a gorge access permit. Gorge access permits are currently only issued on fair-weather days and can be purchased in advance on the Tennessee State Parks website for \$6.
