## Shop Lifting Leads To Drug Charges

A suspected shoplifting charge led to drug charges late last month.

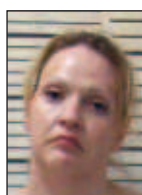
Jackson County deputies arrested Rebecca Leeann Bohannon on June 29 following a call from the Dollar General on Highway 56 South.

According to the sheriff's department, Deputies Daniel Cummings and Shane Stanton responded to the alleged shoplifting incident and detained Bohannon. They recovered just over \$100 of stolen property, but while searching Bohannon, they

also discovered several different illicit drugs, as well.

The deputies allegedly found around 2.02 grams of methamphetamines, a one milligram Clonazepam pill, four grams of suspected marijuana, and various items of drug paraphernalia.

Bohannon was arrested on possession of methamphetamine, possession of Schedule IV narcotics, simple possession, possession of drug paraphernalia, and theft of merchandise. She was transported to the Jackson County jail.

## Early Voting Begins Friday

Early voting kicks off Friday for the Aug. 4 County General Election.

Several competitive races highlight this year's election cycle in Jackson County.

In the race for County Mayor, incumbent Randy Heady faces two opponents vying to unseat him, Josh Locke and Kim Denson.

Sheriff Marty Henson also has two challengers this year. They include Chis Carter and Brad Stafford.

Four candidates are running for the office of Register of Deeds. They are Michelle Hix, Tammy Chapman-Clouse, Sharon Moyer, and Glenda Mayberry.

Incumbent Road Supervisor Edward Preacher Anderson is being challenged in this election by Daniel Garrison.

The remaining county-wide offices on the ballots all see unopposed incumbents. Trustee Anthony Mudecat Platt, General Sessions Judge Tiffany Gentry Gipson, County Clerk Brandon Murtle Stafford, and Circuit Court Clerk Jeff Hardy will all remain in their office.

In the race for County Commission seats, in the First District, incumbents Douglas Stafford and Joey Denson will be joined on the August ballot by James

"J.W." Jones and Jeff Smallwood.

The Second and Third District will have three incumbents on the ballot, Jim Morgan, Troy York, and Josh Denson in the Second and Darrell Church, Brian Lee, and Shelby Fox in the Third.

The Fourth District race features incumbents Paul Ballard, Gary Garrison, and Thomas Wilmoth joined by John Andrew Glasscock.

The Fifth District sees incumbents Don Chinoy and Richard Head being challenged by Jerry Head, Rodney Brown, Jack Meadows, and Ryan Hopkins.

In the Sixth District, incumbent Anthony Buck and Mark Dosch are the two qualifiers.

The Jackson County School Board will see some new faces following the August election.

In the First District, Tina Sandlin and Emily Mahaney Trisdale will be on the ballot, while the Fourth and Sixth District only had one qualifier each, Shannon Wilson in the Fourth and Dustin Kennedy in the Sixth.

In the Gainesboro City Election, incumbent Gainesboro Mayor Lloyd Williams is running unopposed.

In the race for City Alderman, incumbents Ricky Head and Travis Agee will be joined by Colonel White, Patrick Highland, Eric Bartholomew, Nancy Pruett.

Early voting for the August 4 County General Election will continue until July 30.

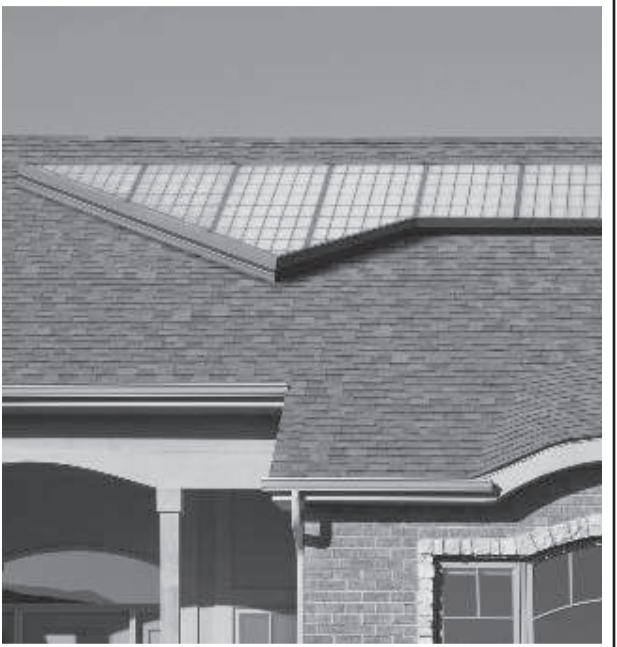

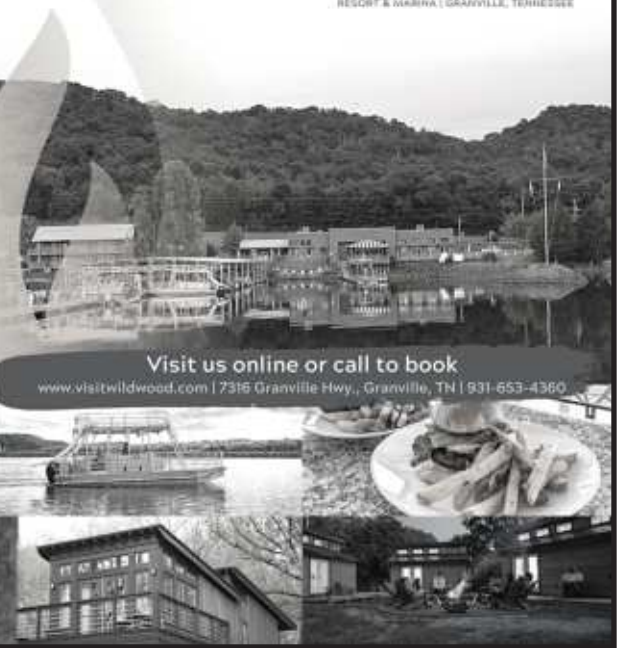

## Mental Illness Erupts In Kentucky

Allen, Kentucky is a place that holds fond memories for me. When I was only sixteen years old, Allen Baptist Church invited me to speak for a weekend youth event. I had the opportunity to meet and work with over a hundred people from the Allen community. Lasting friendships were made with some of the finest people on earth. To this day, the kindness and fellowship bestowed on me by that group of people were instrumental in my life's direction. Sadly, even the finest communities and dearest people on earth can experience pure hell. Mental illness erupted as Floyd County police officers were shot dead in Allen last week. According to news reports they were trying to serve a warrant to a man accused of domestic violence.

Floyd County Sheriff John Hunt said the officers faced "pure hell" when they arrived at the man's home. Four other people were injured at the scene in Allen, a small town of 166 people located just outside of Prestonsburg. The officers who died in the shooting late on Thursday have been named as Capt. Ralph Frasure, Deputy William Petry and dog handler Jacob Chaffins. K9 Drago, one of the dogs that Mr. Chaffins handled, also died. Capt. Frasure had been with the Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Police Department for 39 years. The department said he had served "with honor and glory up until the last second". The men ran into a barrage of gunfire from a rifle when they went to the house on Main Street shortly before 6:00 EST. The shooting continued for nearly three hours

before suspect Lance Storz was taken into custody, having surrendered after negotiations involving members of his family. He has been charged with two counts of murdering a police officer, five counts of attempted murder of a police officer, one count of attempted murder and one count of first-degree assault on a service animal. The families and friends of the slain police officers and the wounded officers have been forever changed. The community of Allen will forever be scarred by one of the worst events to ever occur in the state of Kentucky. Gun violence is not limited to age. An assault rifle in the hands of any mentally deranged person results in tragedy. Police officers have a scary job. It's no wonder they are nervous and seem sometimes quick to pull their weapons. Floyd

county officers walked into a situation and were totally caught off guard. Looking back, they would approach Storz differently. A miscalculation too often is fatal. ## Caregiver

### Reassessments Paused



If you're a family caregiver, or if you're a veteran receiving family care services, heads up: The Department of Veterans Affairs is suspending the annual reassessments for those in the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers. At the same time, at least for now while they review the program, the VA won't change stipends based on a reassessment nor remove anyone from the program. They will, however, continue to do reassessments when there is a reason, such as the veteran or caregiver is asking for an increase in the stipend or if there's a need for more personal care services. The VA also will keep making wellness visits. If you aren't part of the program and want to be, the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) is for veterans who were seriously injured (or who now have a serious illness) while in active duty on or before May 7, 1975, or on or after Sept. 11, 2001, if they meet two criteria:

-- Service-connected disability of 70% or more.  
-- Need personal care services for at least six months because of inability to perform activities of daily living or have a need for supervision, protection or instruction. Primary caregivers can receive a monthly stipend, access to CHAMP-VA health care insurance and 30 days of respite care per year for the veteran so the caregiver can take a break. Other caregiver benefits include online and in-person educational sessions, counseling, use of telehealth and techniques and skills for caring for the veteran. Apply online at [www.caregiver.va.gov/support/support\\_benefits.asp](http://www.caregiver.va.gov/support/support_benefits.asp) or download VA Form 10-10CG on that same page and send it in by mail. You also can hand the form in at your local VA medical center by contacting the caregiver support coordinator. For more info, call them at 855-260-3274 Monday - Friday 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Saturdays 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Do not send in any medical records with this application. They'll ask for it later. ## Prostate Drug Price Controls

Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra is facing mounting pressure to unilaterally lower the price of high-cost medications. A group of nonprofits just petitioned him to cut the cost of six medications, including Xtandi, a popular prostate cancer medicine manufactured by Astellas, a Japanese drug company. The petitioners argue that because the federal government helped fund the basic research that ultimately led to Xtandi, the government can seize the intellectual property rights utilized by Astellas. Even if the government could legally do that, which would rest on a dubious reading of existing law, the costs would far outweigh any benefits. It would chill all investments in drug development and dramatically slow medical innovation. Petitioners' case for government intervention is based on an unprecedented and hotly contested reading of a 1980 law known as the Bayh-Dole Act, which Congress passed to facilitate the commercialization of technologies invented with the help of federal

funding. Bayh-Dole allows the government to "march-in" and relicense the patents to third parties -- but this was only supposed to be in an exceptionally narrow set of circumstances when the products are truly unavailable to the public. The government has never once found a reason to assert its march-in rights. In fact, administrations of both parties have rejected all previous petitions to march-in based on the price of publicly available products. Yet, in the case of Xtandi, activists and lawmakers want the federal government to do just that. They are asking the Biden administration to cancel Astellas' exclusive license to the technology behind Xtandi so that generic drug makers can copy it and sell it for less. Federal officials should reject this call. Without reliable IP protections, the entire enterprise of drug development simply doesn't work. After all, when a company licenses a new technology, it's taking an enormous risk. Turning a laboratory breakthrough into a practical medical treatment takes years -- and costs can easily run into the

billions. More often than not, those efforts fail. Companies and investors accept these high risks for only one reason: the assurance that, if a drug succeeds, they will have the right to sell the product exclusively until their IP protections expire. Changing the rules in the middle of the game, as the petition seeks, is indistinguishable from patent theft and will have wide ranging consequences. Should the government choose to assert its march-in rights in the case of Xtandi, it would send a message to the entire pharmaceutical industry that IP protections can no longer be trusted -- even for medicines that are already on the market.

For this reason, the decision to use march-in rights in this way is about far more than the drugs being discussed. Once venture capital funders and start-ups lose confidence in the security of the IP rights they think they are acquiring, the incentive to invest in drug development would greatly diminish. The Biden administration must join its predecessors in resisting this kind of push. *Craig Garthwaite is the Herman R. 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# Seven Study Tips For High School Students

Assessments such as quizzes and exams help educators recognize areas where students are excelling and where they might need a little extra help. In addition to tests in the classroom, high schoolers generally take standardized testing for state or provincial assessment purposes.

### Find value in the lessons.

Many students lament that what they learn in school just isn't relevant in daily life. That can make the subject matter feel less important and uninteresting. Finding

value in what one is learning and seeing how it can be applied outside of the classroom may make a student more inclined to learn and retain information.

### Avoid distractions.

Study time is time to take a break from social media, video games and any other distractions that can pull a student away from studying. Constantly checking notifications can interrupt thoughts and make it hard to learn the material.

### Establish a study schedule.

Develop a system and a schedule for studying. Students should establish a fixed habit of studying each day or week - whatever is best for him or her. Over time, studying will become routine.

Establish dedicated study spots.

Students should locate places that work best for them as study and homework stations. Certain individuals may need the quiet of a library or a bookstore. Others may do best with the hum of conversation around them or in a group. There's no right or wrong study spot. Maintaining consistency will help the mind associate a place with studying.

### Use grades as benchmarks and motivators.

Blaming a teacher for a poor grade won't get a student anywhere. Rather, grades should indicate how well one is learning the material, and in turn, the effectiveness of students' studying habits. Students can tweak their habits if they find their grades are not where they want them to be.

### Rephrase material.

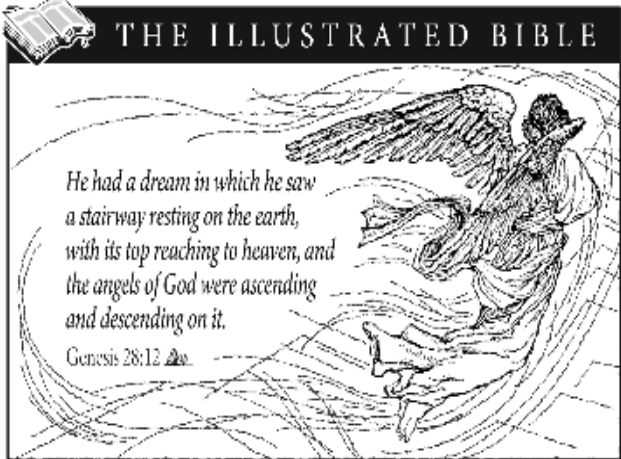
Textbook language can be dry and unappealing. Students can try putting the material into their own words or rephrase passages to make them easier to remember and recall. Similarly, teaching or sharing the material with another person also may improve retention.

### Make a formula sheet.


Depending on the subject, having a sheet with

shortcuts, formulas or diagrams can put the material into smaller bursts of information that are easier to digest. Along this same vein, writing information down can help improve recall.

Sun-Loving Lantana Can Be Hardy

As a child, I was always fascinated with Lantana and its blooms. All those tiny individual florets forming one substantial flower cluster was a wonder to me. I used to pick the little flower heads apart and see how many single flowers I could get. The color of the flower head also captivated me. I remember how the separate flowers slowly faded or darkened to other shades as they aged. Then there were the bicolors that would have contrasting colors on the outer rings of the cluster or umbel inflorescence as I learned later. These, too, transition as they aged. How cool was it that a flower could change colors!

As an adult gardener, I became aware of just how valuable Lantana (Lantana camara) is in the landscape. It is a drought tolerant once established, very heat resistant, and provides season-long color even tolerating a light frost before succumbing to winter freezes. It is a semi-woody shrub that can get up to 2 to 4 feet tall and wide or larger, so one specimen can make a big splash in a garden

bed. Newer varieties are more compact and are ideal for mixed containers or as a landscape border. Throughout Tennessee, we treat them as annual bedding plant for the most part.

There are a few cultivars, however, that have been shown to be hardy in some parts of the state and will regrow each year. It all depends on how low the temperature gets in the winter. ‘Miss Huff’ is perhaps the most reliably hardy, widely available and popular cultivar in Tennessee. Established plants can withstand 0° F. With showy pink, yellow and orange florets this selection is standout. Jason Reeves at UT Gardens, Jackson, related that he has plants there that have been coming back for 15 years now. It is a vigorous grower and his reaches in the 4- foot range though they can get taller.

Another Lantana that has shown to be hardy in many areas of Tennessee is ‘Ham and Eggs’. This variety has a rather richer, deeper bicolor inflorescence pattern with the outside flowers shaded a bright, deep pink (ham) and the inside flowers being yellow (eggs). It also can grow to be rather

large, and Jason indicates it has been hardy in Jackson.

‘Chapel Hill Yellow’ has proved hardy for us in Knoxville and has come back for about four years. Somewhat smaller than ‘Miss Huff’ or ‘Ham and Eggs’, it usually tops out about 18 to 24 inches. It has a spreading habit that makes ideal for the front or mid-border. Its solid yellow color brightens up any full-sun location where all Lantanas thrive.

When we are dealing with “hardy” or “perennial” Lantana those terms can be relative in Tennessee as we are in a transition zone of their hardiness range. Depending on your particular micro-climate, one cultivar may be hardy for you but not your neighbor. Shalena Durkot at the UT Gardens, Crossville, has said she has had no luck with any of them, however, Jason and I have had success in Jackson and Knoxville. My advice is to try any of these varieties and see how you fare. Lantanas are beautiful, low maintenance, pollinator-attractors whether they last one season or

many.

A variety of Lantana can be found at the UT Gardens, Jackson, and Knoxville.

The UT Gardens includes plant collections located in Knoxville, Crossville and Jackson.

Designated as the official botanical garden for the State of Tennessee, the collections are part of the UT Institute of Agriculture. The Gardens’ mission is to foster appreciation, education and stewardship of plants

**Slow Cooker Butter Chicken**

1/2 cup plain yogurt  
1 1/2 tsp. ground cardamom  
1 tsp. ground cumin  
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon  
1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg  
1/8 tsp. ground cloves  
2 lbs. boneless, skinless chicken thighs, trimmed of fat  
1 Tbsp. margarine  
2/3 cup tomato paste  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 tub Knorr® Homestyle Stock Chicken  
2 tsp. (10 mL) grated fresh ginger  
1 clove garlic, chopped  
1/2 cup half & half

Ingredients

3 cups sugar  
5 large eggs, room temperature  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
3 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup 7UP soda  
**Glaze**  
1-1/2 cups confectioners' sugar  
1 tablespoon lemon or lime juice  
1 to 2 tablespoons 7UP soda  
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon or lime zest, optional

**Directions**  
Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a 10-in. fluted or plain tube pan. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in lemon juice and vanilla.

Add flour alternately with 7UP, beating well after each addition. Transfer batter to prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 65-75 minutes. Cool in pan 20 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.

For glaze, in a small bowl, mix confectioners' sugar, lemon juice and enough 7UP to reach desired consistency. If desired, stir in zest. Drizzle over cake.

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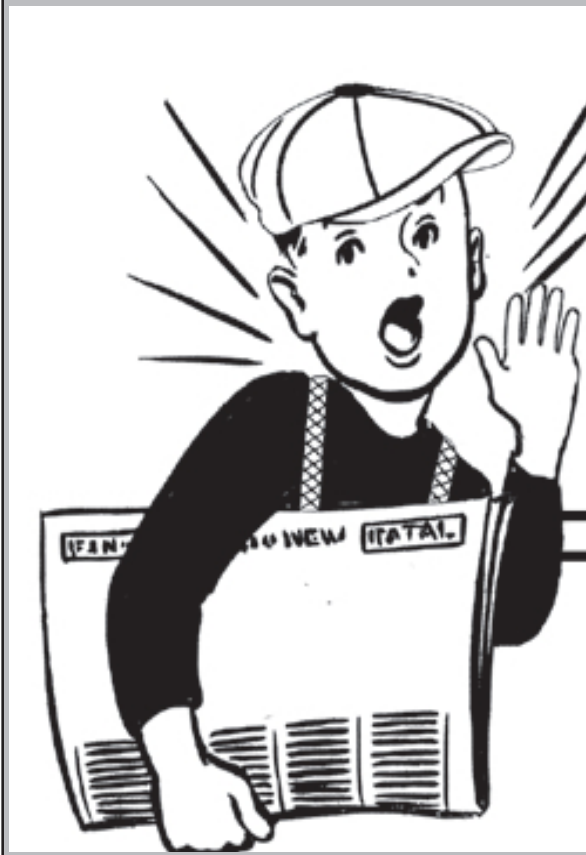

# Elect Marty Hinson Sheriff Of Jackson County

I Sheriff Marty Hinson would like to ask you for your vote and support. Early voting starts the 15th and ends the 31st of this month. The General Election is August the 4th. I would like to take this time to share a few of our accomplishments over the past 8 years. I have been humbled by your support and appreciate the opportunity to serve as your Sheriff. If you have any questions or want to talk about issues call me on my cell at 931-261-7200.

Upon taking office I knew some of the challenges were residential burglaries and narcotics. I also wanted to focus on the safety of our children and the re-offending of crime. To accomplish my goals I surrounded myself with experienced people who were dedicated to make Jackson County a safer place. The fact of the matter is that crime is committed by criminals. My years of service has taught me that if you stop the criminals that are committing the crime you lower your offence rate and the chances of our citizens being a victim to such crime. It sounds simple but it takes hard work and dedication to accomplish.

My first priority was to address a series of burglaries that were flourishing in the community. Some of these burglaries were considered cold cases which are difficult to solve because time has passed and evidence may be lost. I won't go over every case because they are many but would ask everyone to go over the history of our facebook page to see some of those cases and accomplishments.

How we got started, a particular individual was suspected in several of the reported burglaries. We focused on getting that individual into custody on known crimes. He was in custody within weeks of taking office. I then directed my staff to open all of the cold cases and re-work them for possible leads. This led to multiple interviews, search warrants, evidence collection, recovered property, working with surrounding agencies and analysis of crime characteristics. Great relationships were built with local, state and federal agencies who were more than willing to assist in the investigations. The end result was numerous charges being filed against several individuals who were responsible for the crime spree that happened over several years. With our focus on the crime, the individuals committing said crime, we were able to reduce our offence rate by 31.5% over a 7 year calculation. These statistics are taken from the TBI website on crimes by jurisdiction. Below is a chart of each year starting in 2014 and ending in 2020 which is the latest information on the TBI website. 2021 has not been posted by the TBI at this time. This information takes into consideration Class A crimes, which are Crimes against persons, Crimes against property and crimes against society. I have also provided our clearance rate for the offences. The Tennessee average of clearance rate during this time period ranged from 39% to 42 %.

When you compare the total offences from 2014 (374) to 2020 (256) there has been a decrease of 31.55% reduction of offences over the 7 year period. The Tennessee average during the same time was a 6.4 % increase of offences. 509,722 in 2014 to 542,827 in 2020. As you can see by focusing on solving the cases and holding those responsible accountable you reduce the number of offences reported and lower your crime rate. As you will notice the increase in clearance rate of offences has increased significantly. We started out taking office in 2014 with a 40.64 % clearance rate and ended 2020 with a

70.35 % clearance.

The narcotics issues facing the entire Country have challenged law enforcement resources. Keeping up with the transient individuals involved in the narcotics trade is difficult. Again our relationships with local, state and federal agencies have been invaluable to our success in narcotics enforcement. The community has been our partner in this area. We utilized tips@jcsdept.com to receive anonymous tips from the community. Several investigations that led to the arrest of major narcotics trafficking started with concerned citizens in the community. One such investigation uncovered a major methamphetamine ring that admitted to selling as much as two kilos of methamphetamine a week in Jackson County. After a lengthy investigation a large amount of methamphetamine was recovered and three individuals were arrested on numerous charges to include conspiracy to distribute over 300 grams of methamphetamine. The intelligence developed by our staff led to further investigations and recovery of methamphetamine in other jurisdictions. Another investigation uncovered a major methamphetamine ring that consisted of large amounts of meth being shipped all over the Country. The case that started with a concerned citizen led to investigations across the Country by DEA and Drug Task Forces. We have also enhanced our street level narcotics enforcement. The deputies have done an outstanding job with numerous arrest and seizures.

I'm always concerned with the safety of our children. Being a father and having been a school resource officer I take the safety of our school very serious. We have developed a great relationship with the Jackson County School System which has allowed us to add two school resource officers to our team, and I say team because we look at the school system as our team mates. Jackson County now has a resource offices at every public school. These deputies are chosen very carefully and must mesh well with the assigned school. They also must be willing to defend the school and children without hesitation. They must be willing and able to go direct to any threat and neutralize the situation. We have many programs in the jail to help lower re-offending of crime and help inmates become productive members of society. These include General Adult Education. Life Recovery for men and women, Celebrate Recovery (12 step program), Maranatha for men and women (12 step program). Life Church, Living Hope Ministries, Budgeting & Basic Checkbook Balance, Donations for inmate prison books: Gainesboro Library, Addictions/Recovery-Charles Plaque. We have partnered with both Misdemeanor and Felony Drug Court which has had great success. Sometimes you win, sometimes you learn, which is a 12 week program (John Maxwell) which includes 5 levels of leadership. We have also partnered with The Bridge Church who helps re-introduce recovering individuals into society. All of these programs are completely voluntary.

Addiction has touched every family in some kind of way, if we can provide a path for recovery we not only help that person but we help the family. No one wants to watch a family member destroy themselves by their addiction, so let's work together and provide the resources to give them a fighting chance.

I have also demanded transparency. I hold my staff to a very high standard. I will not tolerate substandard or illegal conduct by any employee. I have held employees accountable both administratively and criminally for misconduct, and will continue to do so, the citizens of Jackson County should have confidence in their law enforcement and I will always stand on those principles.

If re-elected I will continue to work on increasing solvability of crime and reducing the crime rate. I will also continue our stance on narcotics enforcement and building relationships with other agencies. I will continue to increase the citizen's involvement which creates ownership in the community. Again thank you for your confidence in me and my staff. We have worked together to accomplish what we have done, and we should all be proud of what we have achieved.
