All Tennessee Adults Eligible For Covid-19 Vaccination By April 5

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee on Monday, March 22 announced all Tennessee adults will be eligible for COVID-19 vaccination no later than April 5. Tennesseans aged 55 and older and those in Phase 2 of the state's COVID-19 Vaccination Plan were made eligible for COVID-19 vaccinations on Mar. 18.

By April 5, all Tennesseans age 16 and over will become eligible for COVID-19 vaccination. Eligibility for those in Phase 3 of the state's COVID-19 Vaccination Plan will run concurrently with age-based eligibility. Phase 3 includes residents and staff members of congregate living facilities including college dormitories, group homes and shelters and those in the corrections system. Phase 3 also includes grocery store workers who were not eligible for vaccination based on previous age or risk-based categories. To help ensure vaccines are available to these populations, direct allocations of vaccines will be made to these facilities.

Tennessee continues to see increasing supplies of COVID-19 vaccines, which allows the state to rapidly accelerate eligibility to receive the vaccination. TDH requests every dose of COVID-19 vaccine made available to the state: 2.9 million COVID-19 vaccine doses have been delivered to Tennessee providers to date; approximately 311,000 vaccine doses arrived the week of March 22; Expecting new allocations of

Johnson and Johnson vaccine week of March 29, which will increase weekly supplies by 30 percent.

"As we've promised, we're able to expand our COVID-19 vaccine eligibility as vaccine supplies have increased and we've made substantial progress in protecting those most at risk of serious illness and death from COVID-19," said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP. "Tennessee will now open COVID-19 vaccination to all eligible adults well ahead of the federal goal of May 1."

Expanding COVID-19 Vaccination Eligibility

Effective Mar. 18, Tennesseans aged 55 and older and those in Phase 2 of the state's COVID-19 Vaccination Plan are eligible. Phase 2 includes those who work in settings that have experienced high numbers of COVID-19 infection clusters, and whose work is critical to continuing vital state operations. These groups include: Child welfare and adult protective services agency workers with direct public exposure; Commercial food manufacturing workers; Commercial agriculture workers involved in production and safety of food supplies and commodities; Corrections system workers not previously covered under Phase 1a1; Public transit drivers and maintenance personnel; People working in other transportation, public infrastructure, telecommunications and utility industries.

County Nears Parks Plan Completion

The Jackson County Commission will vote on the Parks and Recreation Master Plan at the next County Commission meeting set for April 12.

This news came at a public input meeting last Tuesday at the Jackson County Courthouse—with the meeting being led by Kevin Guenther of Ragan-Smith Associates.

As previously reported in the *Jackson Coun-*

ty Sentinel, the river was cited as the "cultural, social and historical spine" of the area.

Guenther said the river could provide recreational opportunities that draw tourists to Jackson County.

The consulting firm is compiling data from over 400 surveys and other community commentary to devise the plan.

According to Guenther—thus far—surveys have shown major support surrounding improving the parks and

recreation improvement and progression.

Many people have responded enthusiastically to the expansion of outdoor programs geared toward hiking, biking, paddling, etc.; youth programs; greenways; and health and fitness.

Guenther maintained that delegating the upkeep and responsibility to a specific, stand-alone department—which is non-existent for the time being.

"Whether or not you get someone full-time on staff that works for the

county that is seen as a parks manager or someone who maintains the various programs—that would be something you would decide... That is maybe a couple of steps down the road," Guenther said. "In the meantime, designate someone that is on a Parks Advisory Board... Give people an opportunity to take some responsibility and ownership."

Guenther said they are six to eight weeks away from making a formal recommended plan for the county.

Gainesboro Student Is Award-Winning Videographer

If you were to ask Jackson County High School student Zachary Pennington about his award-winning video, he would have to ask you, "Which one?"

The JCHS senior has been producing videos since he was 13, starting with a historical documentary of Gainesboro, which amassed more than 15,000 views. Two years later, a mini-documentary about the "Abandonment of Gainesboro" garnered the "Best Film on a Budget" award at the Johns Hopkins University Film Festival.

His video for the JCHS Drama Club won a \$10,000 prize for the school through the NBC Rise Grant program.

Zachary produced a video in the eighth grade

that caught the eye of JCHS Basketball Coach Jim Brown, who kickstarted the teenager's interest in closed-circuit television.

"I found him his first week of high school and asked him to help with JCTV," says Coach Brown. "I learned that he was not just talented. He was also dependable, trustworthy, and extremely well-mannered. He's been the backbone of JCTV, and we're blessed to have him at our school."

On Feb. 7, in a virtual ceremony, Governor Lee honored Zachary with the Governor's Volunteer Star Award for a video he produced for the Chamber of Commerce.

As the awards and video production requests began to pour in,

the teen did what any good business person does; started his own successful company, Pennington Productions. Those who have seen Zach's work know that he possesses something that sets his videos apart from the rest.

"Like many other things, there is a science and an art to videography," says Coach Brown. "Anyone can create videos if you have the equipment. However, the outstanding ones are also artists. Zach is an artist. This is what separates him from many others in the profession."

This busy young man was also honored by Upper Cumberland EMC as a candidate in the 2020 Youth Summit due to his leadership ability, talent, and excellent grades.

Mack S. Prichard Day Set Honoring First State Naturalist

Gov. Bill Lee has designated March 31 as Mack S. Prichard Day, honoring Tennessee's first state naturalist and state archeologist.
Prichard, who died last year at 81, built a career of state service beginning at age 16. He worked to conserve Tennessee's landscape and was instrumental in the acquisition of more than 40 sites for Tennessee State Parks, natural areas and archeological areas.
"Mack Prichard was a Tennessee treasure, and we are pleased to proclaim this day in his honor," Lee said. "Mack recognized the wonder of the nature we have in Tennessee and was a champion for its preservation and promotion."
"We are indebted to

Mack Prichard for his lifelong contributions to Tennessee State Parks – contributions that helped make Tennessee's state parks system the best in the nation," David Salyers, commissioner of the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), said. "He was an inspiration to us at TDEC, to people throughout Tennessee and beyond."
A native of Memphis, Prichard was known for presenting slideshows throughout the state for audiences such as state parks friends' groups, school groups and camps. He enjoyed leading hikes to Tennessee waterfalls and informing outdoors enthusiasts about wildlife and native plants. Prichard's writings, presentations

and thousands of photographs can be found at www.mackprichard.com, a site curated by Friends of South Cumberland State Park. The Mack S. Prichard Foundation was established in 2019 with the mission of protecting and conserving the environment. It provides scholarships for students in environmental science.
Current State Naturalist Randy Hedgepath will lead a walk to remember Prichard on March 31 at Meeman-Shelby Forest State Park. Events for Mack Prichard Day at other state parks can be found online.
TDEC last year opened a \$2.4 million visitors center named for Prichard at Cummins Falls State Park near Cookeville.

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How To Manage Kids’ Screen Time

Devices are everywhere in the digital age. The Statista Research Department notes that a 2020 survey found the average American has access to more than 10 connected devices in his or her household. Though adults may be capable of governing their screen time, kids may not be so disciplined.

Establish Screen-Free Times And Zones

Establishing a time of day when devices cannot be used and areas of the home where they should

not be taken can help parents govern kids’ screen times. For example, by establishing children’s bedrooms as screen-free zones, parents can make sure kids aren’t spending all of their time staring at screens when they’re behind closed bedroom doors.

Research Apps And Programs

The AAP recommends parents research the age-appropriateness and ratings of apps and programs before installing them on devices. Speak with children’s teachers to determine which apps and programs kids will need for school. Read fellow parents’ ratings before installing any entertainment apps and programs on devices children will use.

Use Tech To Monitor

Tech Sharing

“Family Sharing” capabilities on Apple devices allow parents to manage devices and screen usage across the household. Parents can add children to their accounts and then set daily time limits on apps children will use. They also can make certain apps off limits for children to keep kids safe. Other device manufacturers offer similar tools to help parents effectively monitor and control kids’ device usage.

Encourage New Interests


Parents can help to control screen time by encouraging new interests and introducing children to new activities that do not involve screens. Commit time each weekend to activities that do

not involve screens, such as hiking, gardening and painting. Exposing children to activities that don’t involve screens is a great way to get them off the couch and away from their devices. If kids don’t take to a given

activity, keep trying. Devices are a big part of life in the digital age. Parents can develop family plans that allow for screen time but also emphasize activities that call for some time away from our devices.

A Legal Helping Hand For People With Criminal Records

Not everyone can relate to the challenges of people with criminal records or view them as a vulnerable population. Their struggles often go unseen or are misunderstood. Some Tennesseans may not realize that they themselves are likely to have a neighbor, co-worker, friend or family member with a criminal record.

In fact, as the Wall Street Journal reported in 2015, around 1 in 3 Americans has been arrested at some point during their adulthood. It is in everyone’s best interest that this section of our population succeed.

However, the reality is that a criminal record — anything from a minor infraction to a period of incarceration — can have long-lasting repercussions that follow a person throughout their life, sometimes even decades after they have paid their debt to society.

Answering “yes” to previous felony or misdemeanor convictions on a job application will immediately take a candidate out of the running for many employers. When seeking housing, landlords typically run background checks on potential tenants and will often opt against renting to someone with a criminal record — particu-

larly in a city like Nashville, where affordable apartments are in high demand. Some people with criminal histories may also be ineligible for a driver’s license, which severely limits their ability to travel to a job. In rural counties with few transportation options, this is an even larger hurdle.

According to the Prison Policy Initiative, people who were formerly incarcerated are 10 times more likely to be homeless and have an unemployment rate of 27%. With few opportunities or options, hope can be lost and many people eventually break the law again and are reincarcerated. Tennessee has one of the highest recidivism rates in the U.S., with 47.1% reoffending within three years, according to state data.

Overcoming barriers to re-entry

People with criminal histories deserve a chance to rebuild their lives without unnecessary obstacles standing in their way. Since 2015, Legal Aid Society’s re-entry program has been helping clients to remove these barriers so that they can reach their goals. This is good for our clients and good for society. Our attorneys provide free assistance for qualified residents with issues like driver’s license reinstatement,

certificates of employability for private employers and state licensing, civil rights and voting rights restoration, as well as criminal record expungement.

Expungement is a process that essentially erases the legal record of an arrest or criminal conviction. Although it doesn’t forgive a person for committing a crime in the way that a legal pardon would, it does treat a previous conviction as if it had never taken place. For people seeking a job, housing, or enrolling for public assistance, having previous offenses expunged from their record can be enormously beneficial.

Only certain nonviolent convictions qualify for expungement — and any guilty conviction is going to be much harder to expunge than an arrest that did not result in sentencing. Arrests that did not result in sentencing (criminal charges), on the other hand, are usually simple to have expunged and are free. So, even if a conviction cannot be expunged, cleaning up a client’s criminal record by having the arrests or criminal charges expunged can truly help someone when looking for employment and housing.

In Tennessee, expungement laws and costs have changed considerably in the past five years. The cost of ex-

pungements for criminal convictions used to be one of the highest in the country. Now it is \$100 for convictions and diversions. The expungement of an arrest or criminal charge continues to be free. Although expunging a previous offense is easier than it once was, navigating the process often requires a legal expert who is familiar with expungement laws and the court system.

New tool helps determine eligibility

How do you know if you qualify for expungement? Legal Aid Society, in collaboration with the Georgetown University Law Center, has developed a new online tool to help with that. The Tennessee Expungement Eligibility Assessment helps determine a person’s eligibility for expungement by asking a series of questions about their criminal record. At the end of the brief assessment, the person’s answers can be emailed to them to provide proof of the report. The results are also sent to Legal Aid Society, and a staff member can provide clients with further information and assistance.

Legal Aid Society has found that the situations preventing our cli-

The Colonel’s Legacy



“I’m astonished,” Sarge said when we met outside the coffee shop back door. “All on their own they set up a schedule for bathroom cleaning, cooking dinner, doing dishes, shower times. They worked it out themselves,” he said, obviously proud of the formerly homeless veterans who’d moved in upstairs. “Come look at this.”

I trailed him up the narrow staircase to the attic dormitory. “Look how they keep it. Pristine.”

And it was. Beds made, pillows fluffed, not a thing out of place. Since I’d been up there last, Sarge had brought in a couch, two recliners, and a 35-inch television.

“Computer and internet’s next,” he said. “One guy’s ready to start remote college classes. I found out he was only six credits away from an accounting degree before he went homeless. The VA screwed up his payments, he lost his apartment and

his wife, and it was downhill from there.”

I asked Sarge how he was able to pay for all this, finishing and furnishing the attic, feeding four hungry guys and only charging them \$10 a week rent. He’d gotten an inheritance years ago when his father died, he said. The money had been sitting in the bank.

Sarge went quiet for long minutes and then he said, “My father was a colonel during one of our ugly wars. Every Thursday night when I was growing up, he wasn’t at dinner with us. He’d come home, jump into civvies, and dash to the VA hospital to help with ... whatever. Change bed pans, play chess, feed the ones who couldn’t hold a fork, write letters home, help guys figure out how to get up off the floor while they learned how to walk on their new legs, talk to the ones who woke up screaming ... whatever. The veterans never knew he was a full bird colonel.”

Sarge looked around the dormitory. “The colonel,” he said with a small smile, “would be happy about this.”

Bacon and Eggs Over Asparagus

If you're worried about breaking the egg yolks, crack each egg, one at a time, into a small cup or bowl before pouring onto the asparagus.

8 slices bacon
1 pound asparagus spears, trimmed
1/2 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves, chopped
Salt
Pepper
8 large eggs
3 tablespoons packed fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves, chopped
1 tablespoon fresh dill, chopped

1. Preheat oven to 475 F. In 18-by-12-inch jellyroll pan, arrange bacon slices in single layer, spacing 1/4 inch apart. Roast 8 to 9 minutes or until browned and crisp. Transfer to paper-towel-lined plate; set aside. Drain and discard excess bacon fat in pan, leaving thin film of fat.

2. Add asparagus to pan in single layer. Roll in fat until evenly coated. Arrange in tight single layer, with bottoms of spears touching one long side of pan. Sprinkle thyme and 1/4

teaspoon freshly ground black pepper on asparagus. Roast 8 to 10 minutes or until asparagus spears are tender and browned.

3. Carefully crack eggs, without breaking yolks, directly onto asparagus spears, staggering if necessary and spacing 1/4 inch apart. Carefully return pan to oven. Roast 5 to 6 minutes or until whites are just set and yolks are still runny. Sprinkle 1/8 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper on eggs.

4. Return bacon to pan; sprinkle eggs and asparagus with parsley and dill. To serve, use wide spatula to transfer to serving plates. Serves 4.

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How Hemp And CBD Can Impact Animal Health

Hemp and CBD are hot topics in the front room, on the front page and across the nation. For those involved in agricultural production, food and animal sciences, and veterinary medicine, the root question is how do hemp-based products impact animal health? This topic and others like it will be explored at the 2021 Hemp Products and Animal Health Conference, hosted by the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture.

With support from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, the conference aims to provide an opportunity for a national audience to learn from leading experts in current science, address knowledge gaps and identify opportunities for future collaboration in the hemp and animal health research and education spheres.

Conference topics include the current status of hemp in agriculture; including hempseed in animal feed; hemp industry and government policy; measuring product quality; and physiological, toxicological and health impacts of CBD on animal health.

Scheduled for May 18-19, the conference will be presented online. More information about scheduled sessions, including speaker biographies and abstracts, is available at vetmed.tennessee.edu/ce/hemp. More than twenty experts from the fields of veterinary medicine, animal feeds, food science, toxicology, clinical nutrition and hemp use are slated to lead sessions.

The registration fee is \$50 for one day or \$75 to attend both days. Advance registration is required. The registration deadline is May 14, and those interested in attending may register online. Each day of the conference includes six continuing education credits, with 12 total for those who attend both days. Specific questions may be directed to conference director Dennis Geiser, assistant dean in the UT College of Veterinary Medicine, by emailing dgeiser@tennessee.edu. The conference grant is led by Toni Wang, a professor in the UT Department of Food Science.

Registration is open to anyone with interest in hemp products and animal health, including veterinarians, animal science and food science researchers, technicians, and other professionals in related industries.

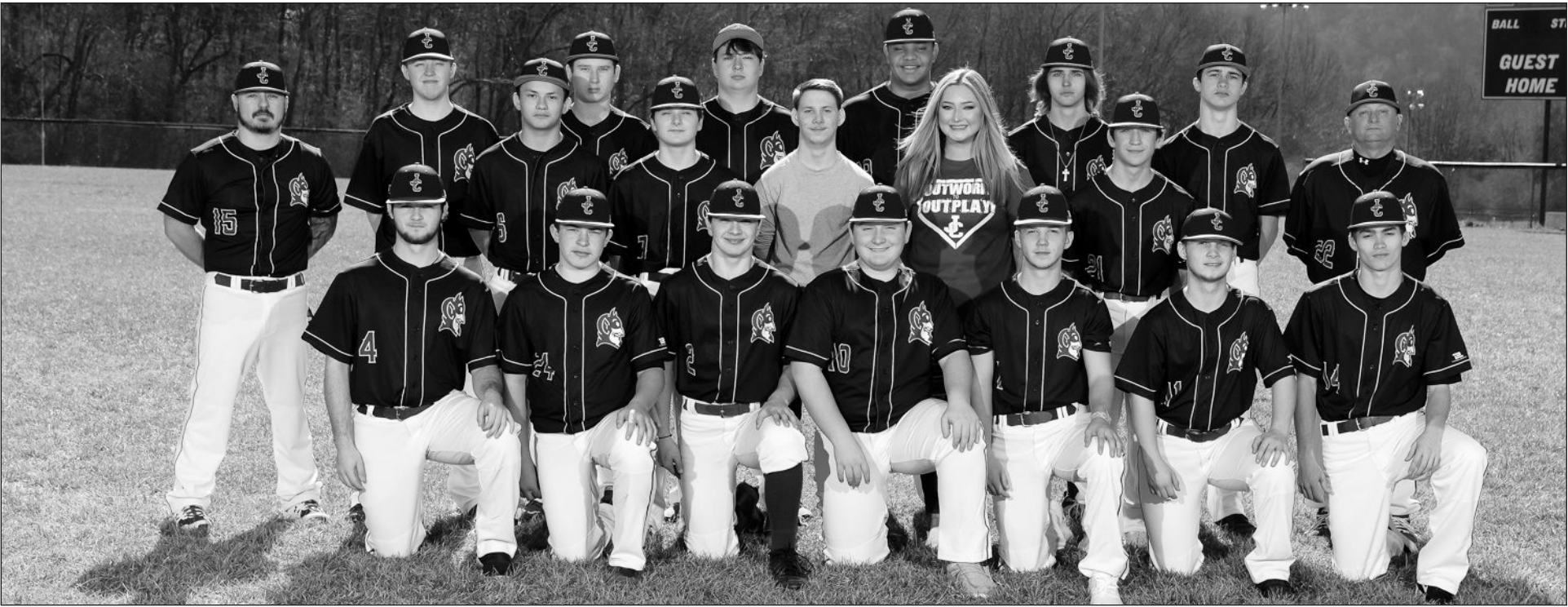

Some Baseball Fans
Can Return This Season

Sports fans have been anxiously awaiting a return to normalcy for professional athletics. In 2020, professional sporting events were played in largely empty stadiums and arenas. In instances when fans were allowed in stadiums, capacity was often limited to very small crowds.

As bleak as 2020 might have been for sports fans, good news is on the horizon. Spring heralds the return of many things, including Major League Baseball, which begins its season on April 1. But it may be May before many fans feel comfortable returning to the stands to cheer on their favorite teams.

State and local governments will continue to have major input in regard to determining how many fans will be able to attend live sporting events. In addition, the percentage of fans allowed inside stadiums is likely to change based on fluctuations in COVID-19 cases and regional vaccinations rates.

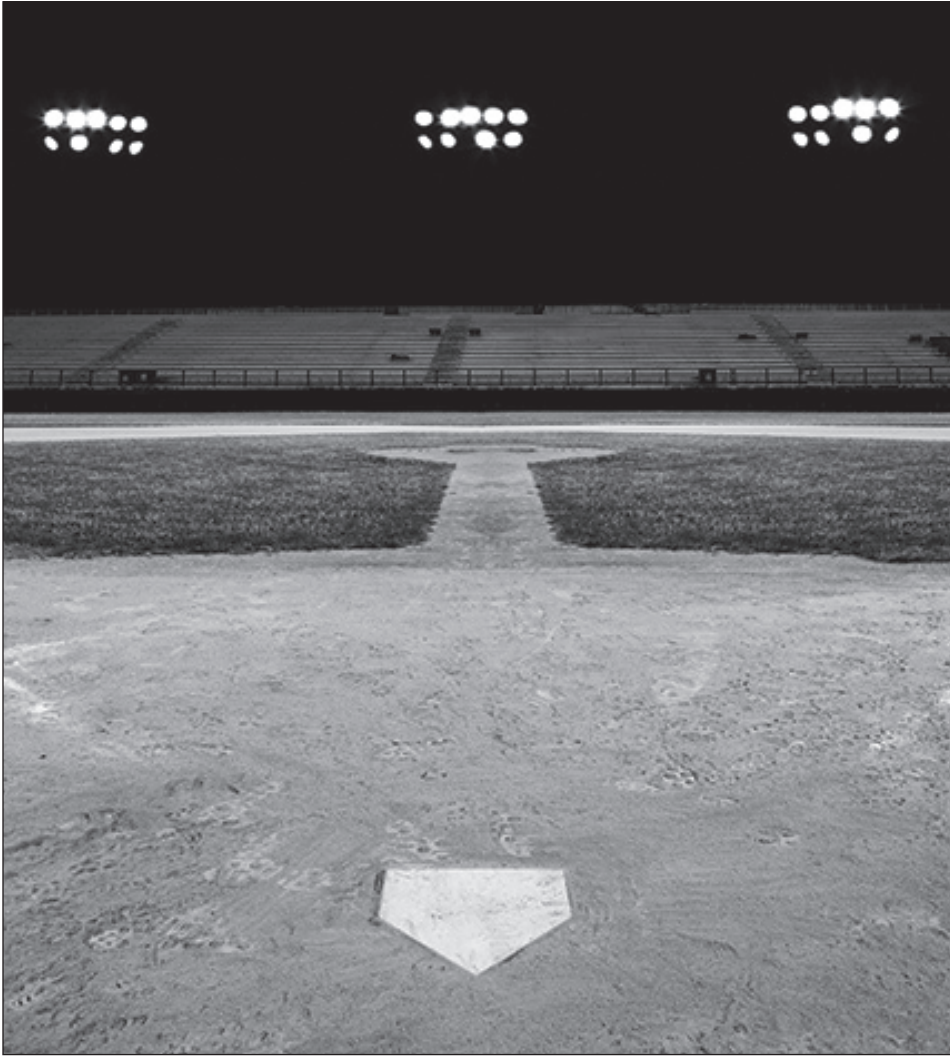
As of early March 2021, a handful of the 30 MLB teams had yet to release their attendance plans. However, the number of fans who will be allowed to attend games is predicted to range from 10 percent to 30 percent capacity in various stadiums. For example, the state of New York is allowing stadiums to open at 10 percent capacity. That means the Yankees and

Mets can seat 5,400 and 4,200 fans, respectively. The Kansas City Royals will start the season with 30 percent capacity and Kauffman Stadium has been reconfigured for pod-style seating. The Miami Marlins and Marlins Park are allowing 25 percent capacity to begin the season, or approximately 9,200 fans.

Baseball fans who find they are unable to get tickets to games or still want to wait a while before attending in person can indulge their love of baseball in other ways.

Continue to watch games on television and create virtual game watches with fellow fans via Zoom; Support local minor league baseball. Check to see what restrictions, if any, local stadiums may have regarding attendance; Plan a road trip to a state that has a large stadium or high capacity volumes for fans; Make a pilgrimage to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY. Visits may be governed by certain restrictions, which can be found at www.baseball-hall.org; Volunteer as a coach for a youth baseball team or attend a high school baseball game; Baseball fans have reason to rejoice as the opportunity to enjoy their favorite sport in person is once again possible in many areas.

re-entering society are often multifaceted. Clients may seek our help with one issue, and in the course of working on their cases, we may identify several other problems that overlap into many areas of their lives.

For instance, a client might seek help with an expungement, but when we investigate, we discover unpaid court costs that affect the person's ability to get an expungement. If those unpaid fees have been reported to collections, it would also affect the client's credit score, impacting her ability to borrow money. She may not have a valid driver's license because it has been suspended for unpaid costs or driving offenses. Due to not having a driver's license she may not be able to find employment. Without employment, she may be having a hard time paying bills, leading to additional collections issues. She may not be able to afford enough nutritious food but has been denied SNAP (food stamps) due to a previous felony drug conviction. In the end, we might end up opening three or four separate cases.

At a certain point, those sincerely wanting to make a better life for themselves can be easily overwhelmed by the sheer complexity of their legal problems. These challenges can prevent people who've paid their debt from the finding firm ground and

becoming productive members of society.
