## Traffic Stop Leads To Drug Charges

On April 13 Deputy Dillon Sandlin conducted a traffic stop in the South Grundy Quarles area of Jackson County, which led to heroin and methamphetamine being seized.

During the course of the traffic stop Deputy Sandlin, assisted by Deputy Kamron Johnston, discovered narcotics in plain view while talking with the driver. The driver Johnathan Randolph was also found to be driving on a revoked

drivers license. During a search of Randolph and his vehicle deputies discovered a substantial amount of methamphetamine, heroin and marijuana.

Several items of paraphernalia were also seized which are commonly used in narcotics distribution.

Johnathan Randolph was charged by Deputy Dillon Sandlin with possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of marijuana, felony possession of heroin, felony possession of methamphetamine and driving on revoked drivers license.

## WIC Program Releases WICSHOPPER App

Tennessee Department of Health announced last week the release of the WICShopper application for smartphones. As a part of the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program, the new WICShopper app is another tool to help participants establish and re-enforce healthy eating habits.

The WICShopper app helps WIC participants identify what they can purchase with their prescribed WIC benefits. The app allows WIC participants to scan the UPC barcode of store products determining whether that product is allowable as a WIC food item and on the participants WIC benefits. There are many key features such as location of Health Department clinics and WIC authorized store locations, healthy recipes, cooking and shopping tips.

"The WICShopper App makes it one step easier to access healthy food and nutrition education resources available through WIC," said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP. "The WICShopper App puts resources at the fingertip and is another example of how the Tennessee Department of Health is implementing innovative solutions to improve services for Tennesseans."

Since the statewide rollout of the TNWIC Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card in

April 2019, the Tennessee WIC program continuously strives to enhance the process for WIC participants to receive benefits and purchase food products for their families. The WICShopper app represents the most recent example of this commitment to Tennessee residents.

WIC participants can download the WICShopper app onto their smartphones by going to the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store and search for WICShopper. Additionally, participants can visit the Tennessee Department of Health's website at [www.tn.gov/wicshopper](http://www.tn.gov/wicshopper) for instructions to download the app to their smartphone. The WICShopper app is available to all and free to download.

The mission of the Tennessee Department of Health is to protect, promote and improve the health and prosperity of people in Tennessee. TDH has facilities in all 95 counties and provides direct services for more than one in five Tennesseans annually as well as indirect services for everyone in the state, including emergency response to health threats, licensure of health professionals, regulation of health care facilities and inspection of food service establishments. ## 2021-2022 Budget Amendments Introduced

Last Tuesday Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced his amendment to the proposed Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget.

The amendment includes \$580 million in available funds as a result of fiscal prudence. These funds will be invested in strategic long-term projects that focus on a return to pre-pandemic priorities and deliver critical services while not growing government. The budget amendment also includes nearly \$100 million for a two-week sales tax holiday on all grocery sales, purchases at restaurants, and all prepared food.

"This proposal supports Tennesseans by strategically investing in long-term initiatives that will move our state forward," said Gov. Lee. "I'm especially proud to provide tax cuts to get money back to Tennesseans to encourage them to frequent industries that have been disproportionately and negatively impacted this year."

This amendment reflects the Governor's priorities and includes record investments in broadband, economic development, safety and law enforcement, increasing reserves, and education.

"Due to Tennessee's strong financial leadership, Tennessee has been ranked number one in fiscal stability by US

World News & Report in both 2019 and 2020," said Commissioner of Finance and Administration Butch Eley. "Our prudent and cautious approach has established Tennessee as a leader in fiscal conservatism, and we thank the General Assembly for their partnership in these efforts."

Notable investments in the FY 21-22 budget amendment include:

### Tax Cuts

\$25M for a two-week sales tax holiday for groceries

\$75M for a two-week sales tax holiday for restaurants and all prepared food

\$16M to reduce the professional privilege tax by 25 percent

K-12 Education and Mental Health

\$250M trust fund to assist K-12 families who are facing significant mental health issues in the wake of COVID-19

\$18.5M to transportation to students for summer learning

\$2M to provide an additional 4 high quality, grade aligned books and resources over the summer for the 88,000 rising first graders in Tennessee

### Higher Education

\$79M to eliminate current TCAT waitlists statewide, currently at 11,400 students

\$25M to Tennessee Promise to permit increases in the Hope Scholarship

\$4M to increase

Agriculture Extension Agents at University of Tennessee and Tennessee State University

### Rural & Agriculture

\$50K to support the state fair (in addition to the \$250,000 recurring in originally proposed budget for total of \$300K and \$5M non-recurring)

\$3M to provide additional funding for rural projects as part of the Rural Economic Opportunity Fund (in addition to \$21M in originally proposed budget for total of \$24M)

### Safety

\$500K to provide gun safety programming for children

\$17M to replace radios for state troopers

\$18M to improve the statewide disaster communications system

\$680K to add 4 new Homeland Security

Economic Development

\$5M to provide grants to restore and preserve historic downtowns across the state

\$3M to increase employment in Tennessee through the Small Business Innovation program

### Transportation

\$3M recurring and an additional \$10M non-recurring to provide additional direct funding to airports across Tennessee through the Transportation Equity Fund (total \$50M investment in air infrastructure)

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# Many Ways To Identify Poison Ivy

Poison ivy is an unwelcome guest on many properties. Unfortunately, many people don't recognize the presence of poison ivy on their property until it's too late and they've already fallen victim to the uncomfortable, itchy red rash that is the plant's hallmark.

According to Poison-Ivy.org, a website providing information about poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac, the rash from poison ivy may first appear as just a slight itchy spot. But that spot will gradually get worse and can even cover your entire body with giant red sores if left untreated or if it goes undetected for too long. That only highlights the importance of learning to recognize poison ivy

on a property and taking the appropriate measures to prevent anyone from coming into contact with it.

### Is all poison ivy the same?

Many people may be surprised to learn that all poison ivy plants are not one and the same. Poison-Ivy.org notes that there are different types of poison ivy in different places, so curious homeowners should visit the site to determine how to identify the type of poison ivy specific to where they live. Eastern Poison Ivy grows on the ground, climbs and sometimes appears as a shrub. And despite its name, Eastern Poison Ivy grows from the east coast to the mid-west, affecting people in middle American states

like Kansas and Nebraska. Eastern Poison Ivy also can be found in some parts of Texas and Arizona.

### What are some telltale signs of the poison ivy plant?

Eastern Poison Ivy is the most widespread poison ivy plant, and these are some of its characteristics. (Note: People who live outside of regions where Eastern Poison Ivy grows can learn about the characteristics of plants in their area by visiting [www.Poison-Ivy.org](http://www.Poison-Ivy.org)).

Poison ivy plants always have leaves of three. No poison ivy plants have more than three leaves.

### Poison ivy always grow left, then right.

That means that the

stem/branch of leaves closest to the root of the plant will always lean left. Subsequent stems/branches of leaves can lean right. Stems/branches of poison ivy leaves are never side by side.

Poison ivy plants never have thorns. The edges of poison ivy leaves are never saw-toothed or scalloped.

### Poison ivy leaves will appear differently depending on the season.


In spring, Eastern Poison Ivy leaves will appear red. As spring turns into summer, the leaves will gradually appear more green. Come fall, the green leaves will look as if they were brushed with red, with some leaves featuring patches or spots of red.

The poison ivy rash can be very uncomfortable. Learning to identify

poison ivy plants can help people avoid the rash.

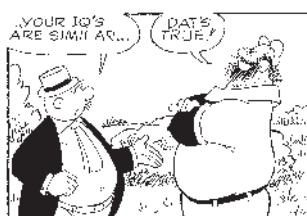
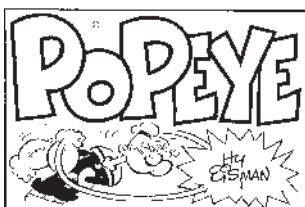
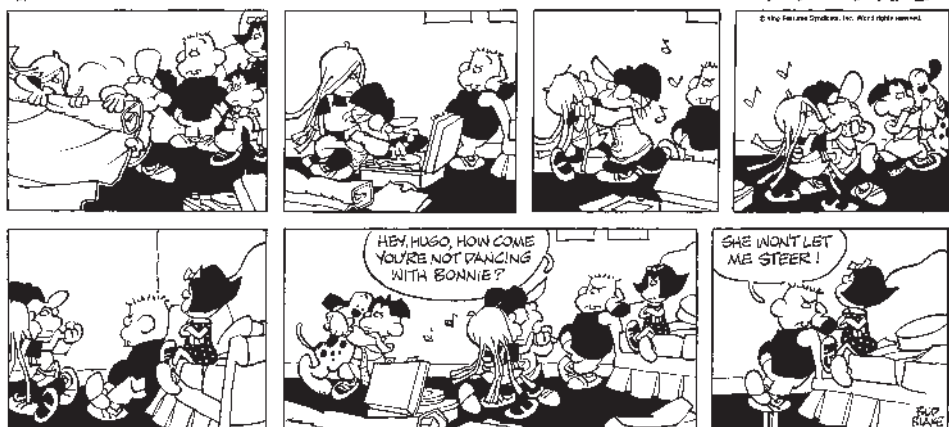

## Who Do We Target For Failure To Support Even A Permitless Carry Law?

Tennessee has had the opportunity this year to pass real constitutional carry. It failed to achieve that goal. But, it did manage to pass a law that continues to make it a crime in Tennessee for someone to carry a firearm with the intent to go armed but which now creates an “exception” to that law if the person can satisfy about seven qualifications, some of which are more stringent than federal laws restricting who can purchase a firearm.

Some legislators described this law, using different terms, as the most that they could get this year. An obvious question is why? Why was it with a Republican super majority and a Republican governor that this was all that could be achieved?

Some have indicated that it was because there were many, perhaps a

third of the House Republicans, that would not support real constitutional carry. If so, it would be a great service to conservatives in Tennessee for those legislative insiders to name names – tell the voters which legislators would not support real constitutional carry so that the voters can try to change their minds or, if necessary, replace them. Right now, not a single legislator has been naming names.

Even without the names of those who would have blocked real constitutional carry, we do have the names of those who refused to support even the governor’s permitless carry exception. The negative votes by Democrats are no surprise although there are some Democrats like John Mark Windle who did and typically do vote for 2nd Amendment issues. The negative votes by Republicans – once you understand who they are – are no surprise

either and perhaps they will see primary challengers.

The big question remains and those inside the legislature likely know the answer – which other legislators, mainly those who identify as Republicans – are the reason why various leaders in the Legislature kept offering the excuse that real constitutional carry was simply unattainable this year. Who are these elected officials who would not stand true to support removing infringements on your rights?

I pushed through the coffee shop’s back door and found the attic dormitory crowd in the kitchen.

Sarge had arranged for the lady who gave free haircuts at the senior center to come in and “neaten up” the homeless veterans, as he’d expressed it to her, before they went on job interviews. She breezed through the door with a plastic tarp for the floor, fancy salon wraps for their shoulders, a hand mirror, and a bag of scissors, combs, razors, sprays and gels, plus a stack of cosmetology magazines from which each veteran could choose his preferred hairstyle. All just opted for “something shorter.”

For one of the veterans, the one with long, tangled hair past his shoulders and a full bushy beard and mustache that covered half of his face, the “something shorter” turned into “more, please” as she cut.

“Hello again,” he quietly said to his image in the small mirror, touch-

ing his chin and cheek after the haircut and shave. “Haven’t seen you in a long time.” He handed the lady a few bills, even though he didn’t need to pay, and then trotted up the street to the drug store, where he bought a pack of disposable razors and shave cream.

Seeing this, Sarge made arrangements for the lady to come back twice a month for trims and cut her a check that she refused to take.

Standing outside under the streetlight after the haircuts, Sarge was subdued. “Did you see how his eyes lit up, seeing himself in the mirror like that? All trimmed and shaved? And all of them confident now about finding jobs?”

He quietly muttered an uncharacteristic string of profanities, then spun to face me. “We have to do better for them. The VA has to do better. Towns have to do better.”

As he stared off across the parking lot, I pointed out that he’d singlehandedly changed the lives of these four men by opening the dormitory.

He faced me again and said, “Well, I’m not done yet.”

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## Rural TN Communities Trapped In Cash-Bail System

For rural Tennesseans, the cash-bail system has accelerated an endless cycle of arrests, excessively high bonds and incarceration, in communities already grappling with a substance-abuse epidemic and shrinking local economies.

According to a Vera Institute of Justice study, pre-trial incarcerations have jumped by 163% in the 53 rural Tennessee counties, compared with a 2% increase in urban areas in the past two decades.

Selina Williams, a mental-health liaison at Carey Counseling Center in Union City, a town with a population of about 10,000, said rural families without the means to pay bail suffer the most. “People feel like that, ‘OK, people are in jail and it doesn’t affect the community.’ But actually it does; it’s affecting our children,” she said. “I think the whole

community is impacted by the criminal-justice system.”

While larger counties have higher jail populations, rural regions are seeing the highest per-capita rates of incarceration, according to the ACLU of Tennessee. State lawmakers are considering a bill to boost regulation and oversight of bail-bond companies, and create a committee to review the state’s cash bail policies. If Senate Bill 804 passes, the committee’s findings and recommendations would be due by next January. In the meantime, Williams said her community is fighting poverty and opioid use, on top of the coronavirus.

“The majority of the people that I have, they can’t afford bail to get out,” she said. “The majority of my people, they don’t have any money, they don’t have a job, they don’t have insurance.”


McMinn County resident Jessica, who

asked that her last name be withheld, said she’s struggled with a substance-use disorder and is now in recovery. She said bail has affected her ability to stay employed.

“So, I was in and out of the jail system,” she said. “My dad, sometimes he’d post my bond, and then, sometimes he’d be fed up and he’d be like, ‘No, you’re

going to sit there,’ you know. But then I’d lose my job - if I had one at the time - I’d lose my job for not being able to get bonded out. I felt terror, I guess, fear about losing my job.”

Both women in this report also are part of a campaign called “In Our Backyards,” highlighting the ways cash bail has affected rural Tennesseans.

## ALAS! We Will Not Be Celebrating This Year! Class of 1951

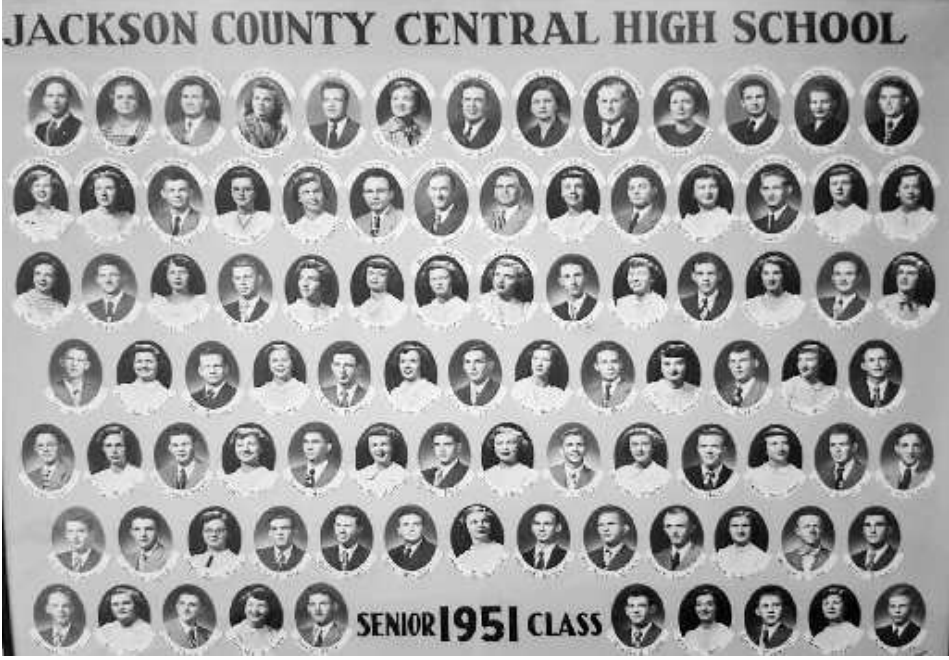

# UTIA Dogwoods Usher In The Season

Two flowering dogwood cultivars developed by UT AgResearch scientists have been recognized by two of the biggest names in woody ornamental horticulture, Michael Dirr and Paul Cappiello. ‘Appalachian Joy’ and ‘Appalachian Spring’ were praised for traits including clean foliage, great fall color, and resistance to leaf spot and anthracnose in a recent article in Fine Gardening. In addition, the New York Botanical Garden has installed a planting of the ‘Appalachian’ series, which also includes ‘Kay’s Appalachian Mist’, ‘Jean’s Appalachian Snow’ and ‘Karen’s Appalachian Blush.’

The ‘Appalachian’ series was developed by a team of scientists from the departments of Plant Sciences and Entomology and Plant Pathology including the late Effin Graham, Bob Trigiano, Alan Windham, Mark Windham and Will Witte (retired). The original trees are planted at the UT Arboretum on the Forest Resources AgResearch and Education Center in Oak Ridge, and clones of those trees are planted at the UT Extension Central Region Office at the Ellington Agricultural Campus in Nashville. Cuttings and budwood from trees at both locations supplied the Tennessee’s nursery industry with superior flowering dogwood genetics and ultimately lovely trees that celebrate the season all across the nation.
