The investments being announced today follow President Biden's announcement last week of a Bipartisan Infrastructure Framework that will make the largest investment in clean drinking water in American history. 

They include a WWII-era aircraft hangar, African Cemetery, American foundry complex, apartment complex, and three fire lookout towers.

"This recognizes the significance of properties that Tennessee's highlight important history and the value of their presence in Tennessee's landscape," said State Historic Preservation Director Patrick McIntyre.

The sites recently added to the National Places are:

T-201 Aircraft Hangar (Tullahoma - Coffee County)




