Biden-Harris Administration Invests In Rural Water, Wastewater Infrastructure

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack last week announced that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$307 million to modernize rural drinking water and wastewater infrastructure in 34 states and Puerto Rico. Tennessee Rural Development Acting State Director Dan Beasley is pleased to announce investments in Hamilton and Sevier County, Tenn.

The investments being announced today follow President Biden’s announcement last week of a Bipartisan Infrastructure Framework that will make the largest investment in clean drinking water in American history. The Framework will replace all of the nation’s lead pipes and service lines, helping address barriers faced by communities of color, Tribal communities, and rural America.

“We are excited to partner with the Walden’s Ridge and East Sevier Utility Districts,” said Beasley. “It is our commitment to provide investments to improve the infrastructure in these rural communities in an effort to help them build back better and stronger.”

USDA is financing the projects through the Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant Program to help eliminate outdated pipes and service lines to safeguard public health and safety in rural communities. They will help improve rural infrastructure for 250,000 residents and businesses.

USDA is announcing investments today in Arkansas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Maine, Michigan, Min-

nesota, Missouri, North Carolina, North Dakota, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Vermont, Washington Wisconsin, West Virginia and Puerto Rico.

In Tennessee:

Walden’s Ridge Utility District is receiving a \$12.1 million loan to construct a new booster station at the site of the existing station for a parallel feed to the Walden’s Ridge Utility District service area. The station will consist of three High Pressure Multi-Stage Horizontal Split Case pumps, each with 350 horsepower and rated at 800 gallons per minute at 1,250 head in feet, 2,800 linear feet of 16-inch welded steel pipe up the Signal Mountain escarpment will replace the existing 6-inch pipe, and 4,000 linear feet of 12-inch ductile iron pipe for suction pressure improvements. Currently, Walden’s Ridge only feed is from the Mountain Creek Road booster pump

station. The second feed will reduce the vulnerability of reliance on one feed. In addition to the construction component of this project, the utility will refinance \$6 million of existing debt. This will allow them to consolidate debt and lower the total interest expense over the life of the loan. These improvements will benefit 9,517 residents.

East Sevier County Utility District is receiving a \$112,000 loan and \$91,000 grant to provide additional financing to construct a wastewater treatment plant. The project will replace the existing steel package plant with a steel package plant. The plant will have greater capacity and operational efficiency to treat sewage from the more than 400 residents. Previous funding includes \$1 million in USDA loans and grants.

Background:

The Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant Program provides funding for clean and reliable drinking water systems,

sanitary sewage disposal, sanitary solid waste disposal, and storm water drainage. The program serves households and businesses in eligible rural areas with populations of 10,000 or less.

This is a big no-no. An Ohio man threatened to kill a Department of Veterans Affairs social worker’s daughters. You do not do that, no matter what your beef. You do not go after family.

The Ohio idiot didn’t even do it anonymously, sending a threatening text message, and it wasn’t long before the VA Office of Inspector General was all over it. Turns out he was known to the social worker because he’d availed himself of homeless-veterans services and had been given permanent housing. Several years later, he was evicted due to multiple complaints of physical threats and public intoxication. Upset, he sent the threatening text message.

At this point he’s indicted. No established guilt. Court to be held forward to now: He’s just been sentenced to 46 months, plus two years of supervised release.

do not threaten family. This next case I don’t understand. Oh, I understand the theft and scamming part. What I don’t understand is why it took so long.

In 2017, a VA employee who worked in the IT department was nabbed and indicted for attempting to sell the personal info of veterans and employees he’d grabbed off the computers. He’d even narrowed down the victims to those making over \$50,000 per year, saying that would be valuable to identity thieves. He selected veterans who’d received compensation or a pension, those who went to a VA medical center and those who’d had a VA financial assessment. He even made fake credit cards and had the equipment to do that. He was picked up in a bathroom when he went to the VA to steal a server.

In 2019, he pleaded guilty to one charge in exchange for having the others dropped. Fast-forward to now: He’s just been sentenced to 46 months, plus two years of supervised release.

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Office Of Criminal Justice Programs: 11th Victims' Facility

The Office of Criminal Justice Programs (OCJP) will help formally open a new Family Justice Center this week in Oak Ridge, bringing together services for victims of domestic abuse, sexual assault and exploitation and elder abuse. The Anderson County Family Justice Center grand opening on July 9 marks the 11th facility of its kind in operation in Tennessee.

"It takes a special community to make a Family Justice Center a reality and Anderson County is one of those few communities in Tennessee with the local collaboration, vision and dedication to reach this milestone," OCJP Director Jennifer Brinkman said. "Each of the eleven facilities we've helped establish brings together people who can help all victims, because they understand the level of needs people have and

they're intensely dedicated to helping them."

The first center opened in Knoxville in 2006; grand opening will be held on July 16 in Overton County for another new FJC; and, on July 22, formal opening for the Haywood County FJC. That will bring the number of FJCs in Tennessee to 13, more than all except one other state. Grand opening for the Anderson County Family Justice Center will be Friday, July 9 at 10:00 a.m. EDT at 301 Broadway Avenue, Unit 1A in Oakridge. Operating hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. local time. The center provides a combination of free and confidential services and interventions that are available in one convenient location to help victims break the cycle of violence and become thriving survivors.

Additional FJCs are in Knox, Scott, Sulli-

van, Madison, Washington, Davidson, Hamilton, Putnam and Shelby Counties. Since the Tennessee Family Justice Center Initiative started in 2012, federal funding from OCJP has totaled more than \$15 million.

A Family Justice Center is a community-wide collaboration of public and nonprofit agencies providing co-located, wraparound services in one safe, convenient, and family-friendly location. In addition to benefiting victims and their families, the FJC model benefits the broader community by reducing competition and redundancy among stakeholders.

The OCJP functions as a strategic planning agency that secures, distributes, and manages federal and state funds for Tennessee, including Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds and STOP Violence Against Women Program (STOP) funds.

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Bariatric Surgery Changes Many Peoples’ Lives

Weighing nearly 285 pounds five years ago, Colleen Lentini had a number of health issues, including hypertension, Gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), sleep apnea, gout, neuropathy, asthma, hypothyroidism, aortic stenosis and heart murmur that she was on multiple medications for.

It was the aortic stenosis diagnosis that got her on the path to wellness.

“The former pastor of my church died from it after he retired,” she said. “That’s what woke me up.”

The path hasn’t been easy. She gained weight due to recurring foot injuries, which required surgeries and had to have a knee repaired as well.

Her cardiologist, Dr. Stacy Brewington, said with aortic stenosis, she had to lose weight—but with her foot and knee injuries, that was not as easy as it sounded.

Lentini consulted with Dr. Charles Huddleston, surgeon at Middle Tennessee Surgical Associates, about bariatric surgery.

There are three options when it comes to bariatric surgery procedures:

Restrictive

Restrictive surgery is aimed at limiting the size of the stomach;

Malabsorptive

Malabsorptive surgery is aimed at decreasing the absorption of fat and/or calories;

Combination

A combination of restrictive and malabsorptive surgeries.

“I really had to work hard before the actual surgery was done,” Lentini said.

That includes a comprehensive psychiatric evaluation, a thorough medical exam by an internist or primary care physician, dietary counseling by a registered dietitian, instruction in an exercise program by a personal trainer or physical therapist, six months in a physician supervised weight loss program and participation in a weight loss support group.

“They really teach you a lot at those seminars,” she said.

She had her surgery June 13, 2019, and has lost a total of 155 pounds to date.

“I don’t take medication for hypertension, GERD, sleep apnea or treatment for gout anymore,” she said. “My neuropathy and asthma are also better.”

It’s been a long process. Weight loss doesn’t happen overnight.


“You have to change your entire lifestyle,” she said. “You can’t eat what you used to. You have to change your approach to cooking and what you can and can’t eat. It’s about learning where to balance things.”

She visits Dr. Huddleston every six months for a follow-up and Dr. Brewington to monitor her aortic stenosis.

“Teamwork like this allows patients to have better outcomes,” said Cookeville Regional Medical Center (CRMC) CEO Paul Korth. “Having bariatric surgery options here, whether it’s traditional or robotic, can have a great impact on a person’s well-being.”

Lentini is grateful the service is available close to home.

“They want you to succeed and will help you in any way possible,” she said. “I’m a new person thanks to Dr. Huddleston and the team at CRMC who made this surgery possible. I got great treatment here. It was a no-brainer to come here to get it done. It’s close to home. This type of surgery is not easy to go through, but it’s worth it.”

Federal and state tax codes are complicated, so learning about the deductions you see on your pay stub is vital to managing your money and budgeting. When it comes to the federal income tax withheld from your pay, you should make sure the right amount is being taken out. When you file your taxes, you don't want to discover that you owe a large amount because you didn't have enough withheld throughout the year.

Each employer's pay stub is different, but you will usually see these items:

Gross Pay: This is what you earned during that pay period before any taxes or benefits, such as insurance, were withheld.

Net Pay: This is your

take-home pay after withholdings.

Federal Tax: This might be abbreviated as Fed Tax, FT or FWT. It shows how much was withheld from your paycheck in federal income taxes.

State Tax: This could be abbreviated as St Tax, STW or simply by the abbreviation of the state in which you reside. Your state many not have a state income tax.

Local Tax: Some cities or counties levy a local tax. Depending on where you live or work, you may not be subject to this tax and, therefore, won't see anything withheld.

Social Security Tax: This tax might be abbreviated as FICA, SS, SSWT or OASDI. The federal government requires that 6.2 percent of your wages be withheld.

Medicare: This tax is typically abbreviated as MWT or Med. The federal government requires

that 1.45 percent of your wages be withheld.

Year-to-date (for pay and deductions): The year-to-date fields show how much you have earned up to that point and what has been deducted for each tax or benefit.

Seven Tennessee Sites Added To National Register Of Historic Places

The Tennessee Historical Commission (THC), the state agency that is designated as the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), today announced the addition of seven properties to the National Register of Historic Places. They include a WWII-era aircraft hangar, African American Cemetery, foundry complex, apartment complex, and three fire lookout towers.

“This designation recognizes the significance of properties that highlight Tennessee’s important history and the value of their presence in Tennessee’s landscape,” said State Historic Preservation Officer and Executive Director Patrick McIntyre.

The sites recently added to the National Register of Historic Places are:

T-201 Aircraft Hangar (Tullahoma - Coffee County)

Middle Tennessee was a center of military training during WWII, with Camp Forrest in Tullahoma and the Smyrna Army Airfield in Rutherford County. The Tullahoma Army Base (now Tullahoma Regional Airport) was a supplementary training base where the T-201 Aircraft Hangar was built in 1941. When it was built, the 1,300 acre training center included over 100 buildings and three runways capable of handling bomber planes. Constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the center was in use from 1941-1945. The aircraft hangar was used for flight operation and maintenance training. Clad in metal, the hangar is distinguished by the large sliding glass and metal doors and its irregular roofline. It is one of the few extant buildings from the training center.

Beck Knob Cemetery (Chattanooga – Hamilton County)

Beck Knob Cemetery is a one-acre site believed to have been started around 1865 for deceased African American contraband soldiers. Joshua Beck, a Union supporter, donated the land to the African American community. The first known documented burial was in 1884 and in 1888 the property was deeded to a local African American church (now the Hurst United Methodist). There are 188 known burials and 42 grave markers; it is thought that many graves have not yet been discovered. The cemetery represents the diversity of individuals and families who were a part of the African American community in northern Chattanooga. The austerity of the cemetery design and use of handmade markers is an often-seen feature of African American cemeteries in the state.

Price-Evans Foundry (Chattanooga – Hamilton County)

The five buildings of the erstwhile Price-Evans Foundry were built between 1907 and 1923. Most of the build-

ings were constructed of brick with large expanses of glass. Resources at the site include the bungalow-style office building, foundry and storage facilities. Located in the Highland Park section of Chattanooga, near the railroad, the foundry was active during the heyday of the city’s industrial development when Chattanooga was branded as the Dynamo of Dixie. Price-Evans was known for ornamental ironwork that was used in-state and shipped throughout the eastern US. Their ironwork can be found on Chattanooga’s historic buildings. Although the company declared bankruptcy in 1934, the site continued to operate under various other names, manufacturing products such as boilers, mining machinery and industrial metal wheels.

Overton Park Court Apartments (Memphis – Shelby County)

Located in Midtown Memphis, the 1924 Overton Park Court Apartments consist of two two-story with raised basement apartment buildings set in a u-shape. The layout of the buildings provides a large grassy courtyard for residents. The brick veneer buildings feature multi-light windows, eave brackets and belt courses on the exterior. An interesting feature of each building is the tall curved central parapet, reflective of Renaissance Revival or Mission Revival styles. Architect William Lester designed the apartments, as well as other apartment buildings in Memphis. Overton Park Court Apartments were designed to attract the middle-class who worked in the city. The complex was near the streetcar lines and close to retail businesses and restaurants.

Fire Lookout Towers

Three fire lookout towers were listed in the National Register of Historic Places. In 2015 a consultant prepared “Tennessee Division of Forestry Fire Lookout Towers, 1933-1975.” This document contains a comprehensive history of the state’s fire towers constructed from 1933-1975. Often called a “cover form”, individual nominations that are written for fire lookout towers require less context, since that is in the larger document. The document makes preparing individual nominations easier.

Big Hill Fire Lookout Tower (Sequatchie – Marion County)

The Tennessee Division of Forestry constructed the tower, operator’s cabin, utility building and crew house around 1947 as part of its efforts to manage forest fires. Aeromotor Company built many of Tennessee’s lookout towers and although there is no marking on the Big Hill tower, it is believed to be an Aeromotor MC-39. The 60-foot tower was ideally suited to provide an all-around view of the surrounding forest in Marion County. As

with other fire lookout towers, this tower was permanently staffed. Of the five towers that were once located in Marion County, the Big Hill tower was sited at the highest elevation of 2,032 feet. Big Hill is one of the three remaining in the county, Prentice Cooper and Cave Spring are the other extant towers.

Twinton Fire Lookout Tower (Crawford – Overton County)

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) erected the 80-foot Aeromotor MC-39 Twinton Fire Lookout Tower in Overton County in 1933. The square cab at the top provided an unobscured panoramic view of the surrounding forests, allowing rangers to spot fires more easily than at ground level. Although this was built by a federal government program, fire lookout towers were part of the Tennessee Division of Forestry’s statewide forest fire protection program. Aeromotor was a leading manufacturer of steel fire towers in the 20th century. Federal and state agencies cooperated to conserve forests and prevent fires and the Twinton Fire Lookout Tower is a good example of this. The tower was built as part of the conservation efforts that included having permanently staffed towers. At one time Tennessee had 208 lookout towers, but little more than half remain.

Chuck Swan Fire Lookout Tower (Sharps Chapel – Union County)

Unlike the other two fire lookout towers, the Chuck Swain Fire Lookout Tower was built for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) rather than for the state of Tennessee. An example of the TVA’s efforts to improve fire and forest management in the state, the CCC erected the tower around 1935. In 1952, the TVA sold the tower and forest lands to the state. When constructed, the tower was known as the Central Peninsula Fire Lookout Tower. It was later named for Commissioner of the Department of Conservation, Chuck Swann, who oversaw the purchase. The 100-foot Aeromotor LS-40 tower, lookout operator’s cabin, privy, crew house, workshop, shed and two utility buildings are included in the National Register nomination.

The National Register of Historic Places is the nation’s official list of cultural resources worthy of preservation. It is part of a nationwide program that coordinates and supports efforts to identify, evaluate and protect historic resources. The SHPO administers the program in Tennessee.
