RAM Clinic Coming To Livingston

Free medical care is coming to Livingston in July.

Remote Area Medical, a nonprofit that provides pop-up clinics devoted to free dental, vision, and medical care for people in need will hold a clinic at First Baptist Church of Livingston July 9-10.

According to RAM, all services are free and no identification is required. Also, services

are on a first-come, first-serve basis.

RAM clinics may include dental cleanings, dental filling, tooth extractions, dental x-rays, eye exams, glaucoma testing, eyeglass prescriptions, women's health exams, and general health exams. In addition, free take-home colon cancer screening test kits will be available.

Cookeville High School has hosted RAM clinics for several years, the last of which was

held in March.

RAM is seeking volunteers to help with the two-day clinic in Livingston. According to a release, RAM needs interpreters and general support volunteers to help with set-up and take-down. Any group or individual that would like to volunteer can contact RAM by visiting its website at www.ramusa.org or calling 865-579-1530.

The clinic is being held in collaboration

with the Rotary Club of Livingston and is partially funded by a UCEMC Cares grant.

When it was founded by Stan Brock in 1985, RAM was dedicated to serve as a provider of medical care in remote areas of developing countries. The first domestic clinic was held on May 9, 1992 in Sneedville, Tenn.

RAM has provided over 888,000 people with more \$181 million worth of free healthcare and veterinary services.

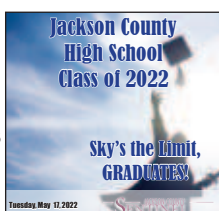

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A Message from Hell

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Jesus spoke of hell. Luke writes about a rich man and Lazarus (16:19-31). In this narrative, the rich man lived a very different life than the beggar Lazarus. As all things go, they both die. The rich man goes into torment and Lazarus to the "bosom of Abraham." The rich man wanted reprieve, but he wouldn't find any. "And he cried out and said, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus so that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool off my tongue, for I am in agony in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your life you received your good things, and likewise Lazarus bad things; but now he is being comforted here, and you are in agony' (Luke 16:24-25). The rich man asked for Lazarus to return and speak to his family "so that they will not also come to this place of torment" (Luke 16:28). "But Abraham said, 'They have Moses and the Prophets; let them hear them' (Luke 16:29). There is a place called "hell." People are there, and others are on their way to a place of endless torment. This subject should be taught to save souls.

We must understand that there is a hell. Not believing in a thing does not mean it doesn't exist. If it were true, then everyone should stop believing in death, famine, sickness, and poverty. The fact that many do not believe in hell is a good reason to talk about it. The fool that has said in his heart, "There is no God" is a cousin to him that says, "There is no hell" (Psa. 14:1).

We must understand that hell is a place. In talking about the death of Judas, this was the Biblical commentary, "Judas turned aside to go to his own place" (Acts 1:25). Jesus said this concerning heaven. "In My Father's house are dwelling places; if it were not so, I would have told you; for I go to prepare a place for you. If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:2-3). If heaven is a place, hell must also be a place.

We must understand that hell is a place of eternal torment. "And the smoke of their torment goes up forever and ever; they have no rest day and night, those who worship the beast and his image, and whoever receives the mark of his name" (Rev. 14:11; 2 Thess. 1:9).

Bipartisanship Isn't Dead

Having just watched a Supreme Court nominee supported by a comfortable majority of Americans draw just three Republican votes in the Senate, you could be forgiven for thinking bipartisanship in Congress is a thing of the past. And in the case of Supreme Court nominees, you'd be right: The last time a nominee got over half the votes of the opposition party was in 2005, and you have to go back nearly three decades—to Ruth Bader Ginsburg in 1993—to find one who drew votes from almost all senators.

But if you look carefully, there are plenty of signs that bipartisanship is still possible in Washington. President Biden recently signed into law a bill reforming the Postal Service, which drew strong support from both parties in Congress. The same happened with a measure that keeps companies and universities from shielding themselves against lawsuits for sexual harassment. And both houses have passed a package aimed at boosting American competitiveness, again with support in

both parties.

There are other examples, as well, but you'll notice something about them: They're not focused on hot-button issues like voting rights or gun control or immigration. This is in no small part because in the Senate, a measure effectively needs 60 votes to pass—which means neither party can get bills approved without members of the other party.

This is often intensely frustrating to partisans of whichever party is in power. Yet I'd argue it's not a bad thing. In fact, the need for bipartisanship is pretty much baked into our system.

We live in a time when political life is intensely polarized and many Americans live in what amount to partisan bubbles of like-minded neighbors. For many people, this is just fine—they're okay with avoiding contact with people who have different views. And ambitious politicians, always looking for an edge, have figured out how to navigate division: They use polarization to raise money from one group of potential supporters by attacking another group, and then goose election turnout by riling up their base.

There are some state legislatures where party-line lawmaking can produce actual laws—witness the wave of strict anti-abortion and anti-voting-rights measures passed last year and on the docket this year. But at the national level, intense polarization yields legislative deadlock. And at both the federal and state levels, it produces laws with dubious futures.

The reason for this is that by requiring lawmakers to compromise and work with their political adversaries, bipartisanship often produces better, longer-lasting legislation. It helps ensure that a proposed law will take into account a broad range of views, produces wider acceptance both within a legislative body and in the public at large, and perhaps most important, means that the legislation has a chance of surviving the next change in power. Which, inevitably in our system, will occur.

Politicians recognize this, of course. It's not just that most Americans prefer to see bipartisanship. The reason you see politicians talking about finding bipartisan support and, less frequently but still often enough, working hard

to secure it, is that they know that getting support from members of the other party is usually necessary not only to get something passed, but to have it be implemented effectively.

To put it simply, if you're just interested in scoring points with the base, then bipartisanship doesn't matter. If you want to have a beneficial and lasting impact on American life, it matters a great deal.

It may be tempting these days to throw up one's hands in despair at the displays of highly partisan behavior in Washington and all around us at home in our states. But as a voter, there's something you can do about it. Notice all the instances in which lawmakers work across the aisle to secure some piece of legislation. Pay attention to who does the heavy lifting to make it possible, and who stands in the way. Then support the people who recognize that bipartisanship is the route to effective legislating.

The VA Releases Its Equity Action Plan

In response to Executive Order 13985, the Department of Veterans Affairs has now released its Equity Action Plan.

The order, signed in January 2021, was intended to bring equity to underserved communities, such as Blacks, Latinos, Native Americans, Asian Americans and others, as well as lesbian, transgender, LGBTQ+ and gay persons, as well as those who live in rural areas. The role of the White House Domestic Policy Council was to formulate and implement the administration's policy objectives and embed them across federal government. Hence the VA's newly released Equity Action Plan.

The VA's highest priorities are to provide all veterans with world-class health care, ensure that veterans and their families can access benefits and honor veterans with a final resting place as a tribute to their service.

And it must be done in a fair and impartial way, with tools and resources for all veterans, by eliminating barriers and creating opportunities. To ensure this, the VA will:

-- Develop data for equity strategy (cap-

ture the demographics so women, LGBTQ+, Blacks and others can be identified),

-- Improve access (reduce barriers by "creating institutional pathways for underserved vets to increase awareness" of VA benefits and services),

-- Increase contract awards to women-owned businesses and small disadvantaged businesses,

-- And address health equity for underserved veterans (which is impacted by race, gender, income, education and more).

VA officials already have started taking steps. For example, they have expanded the gender-affirming care and benefits package for LGBTQ+ veterans. (The VA provides all medically necessary gender-affirming care to transgender veterans, short of surgical interventions.) Additionally, they've instructed VA adjudicators to classify as eligible for benefits any veteran who was discharged due to sexual orientation, gender identification or HIV status. Medical records now display the patient's birth sex, self-identified gender identity, sexual orientation and preferred pronouns.

Protect Patents To Protect Patients

This spring, a U.S. negotiating team in Geneva made a deal that could have dire consequences for patients around the world.

Those negotiators -- along with their counterparts in the European Union, India, and South Africa -- threw their support behind a proposal that would effectively nullify intellectual property protections on Covid-19 vaccines. Though ostensibly intended to make the shots more accessible, the deal will do the exact opposite -- by discouraging the research investments that lead to lifesaving vaccines and treatments.

Patients can only hope that negotiators come to their senses and back out of the deal.

In October 2020, before the shots were even approved by regulators, India and South Africa asked other member nations of the World Trade Organiza-

tion to waive patent protections on Covid-19 vaccines and treatments. The two countries claimed this unprecedented assault on intellectual property rights was necessary to combat the pandemic, since it would supposedly enable generic drug companies in developing countries to quickly manufacture and distribute cheap knockoff vaccines to patients that otherwise wouldn't have access to the shots.

This claim was ridiculous then, and it's ridiculous now. Vaccine developers inked hundreds of voluntary partnerships with other manufacturers -- including many in the developing world -- to rapidly scale up production.

Those companies collectively produced about 12 billion vaccines in the past year -- enough to fully vaccinate every adult on the planet -- and the world has the capacity to produce another 20 billion this year.

In fact, far from a shortage of vaccines, there's now a glut.

The CEO of the Serum Institute recently explained that he has 400 million vaccines in storage, and that his company has halted production until new orders come in. Likewise, the director of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention recently requested a pause on vaccine donations until later in the year, saying that he worries that new donations will expire before they can be used.

Yet despite all the evidence showing that patent protections aren't hindering the supply of vaccines to developing countries, India and South Africa seem to have finally gotten what they wanted. This deal is a slightly slimmed down version of their original request.

The timing of the deal is more than a little odd. India and South Africa have effectively sided with Russia in its war of aggression against Ukraine

-- yet U.S. negotiators are now poised to reward both nations.

More importantly, the deal -- if it's approved by all 164 World Trade Organization member nations -- will hamstring scientists' ability to respond to new Covid-19 variants and future pandemics, putting patients at risk. Intellectual property protections enable companies to innovate, take risks on research and development projects, and rapidly respond to public health needs with confidence.

There is still time for the Biden administration to reverse course. This IP waiver is a proposal in search of a problem, and it could have dire consequences for the scientific research that ultimately saves patients' lives.

The Importance Of Safety When Swimming

Backyard pools provide families with ample opportunities for recreation. It's easy to be distracted by all the fun when swimming in a backyard pool, but it is crucial that homeowners take steps to ensure everyone is safe when spending time in the pool.

Establish A Barrier

The Consumer Product Safety Commission warns that drowning is the leading cause of unintentional death in children between the ages of one and four in the United States. Pools attract curious children, so maintaining a barrier between the home and the pool is essential. Many municipalities require some sort of fencing around pools or ladders that self-latch or can be closed off to climbing.

Locks and alarms on windows and doors that face or provide access to the backyard also can serve as barriers.

Keep Play Under Control

Children and even adults may be swept up in the fun and engage in potentially dangerous behaviors. Pool users should not be allowed to run around the perimeter of an inground pool, as the cement can get slippery when wet and lead to falls that can cause injuries.

Exercise caution when using diving boards or diving into pools. It's easy for divers to hit their heads when diving off a

board into a pool due to close proximity of the transition wall in the deep end of the pool or by diving into shallow water. The Red Cross recommends a water depth of 11.5 feet for safe diving and the transition wall should be at least 16.5 feet from the tip of the diving board. However, the standard depth for many pools is 7.5 feet of water and a slope beginning seven feet from the board.

Exercise Caution With Inflatables

The Good Housekeeping Research Institute found that inflatable pool toys are especially dangerous. Such toys can flip easily, putting children at risk for injury (from striking the sides of the pool) or drowning (especially if the children

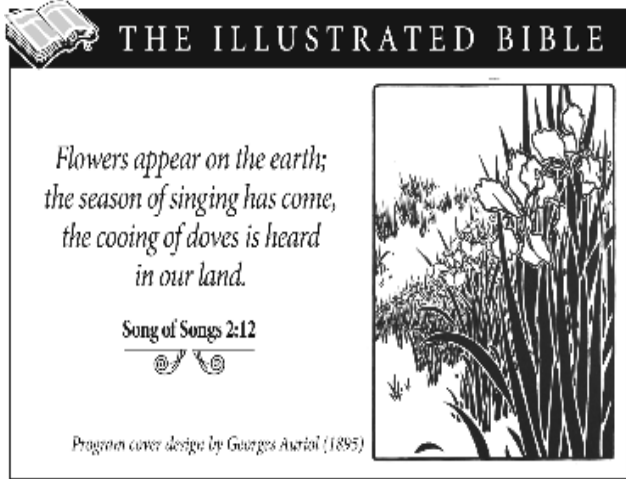
were ejected into deep water). Inflatables also can prevent access to the surface of the water for submerged swimmers.


Choose A Backyard Lifeguard

At least one person should be designated as backyard lifeguard when the pool is in use. This person should always direct his or her focus on

the pool, counting swimmers and keeping track of who enters and leaves the pool. Safe Kids Worldwide suggests rotating water watchers every 15 minutes.

Pools are fun places to spend summer afternoons, especially when every step is taken to ensure the safety of swimmers. TF207062

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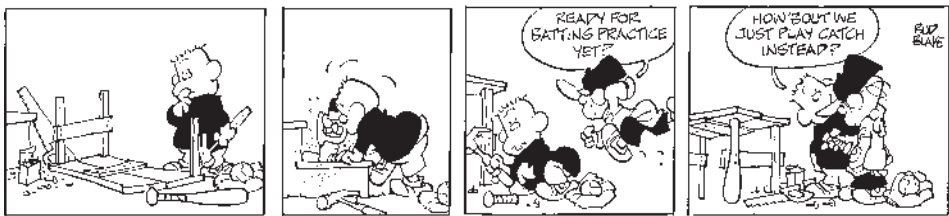

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The Importance Of Safety When Swimming

Backyard pools provide families with ample opportunities for recreation. It's easy to be distracted by all the fun when swimming in a backyard pool, but it is crucial that homeowners take steps to ensure everyone is safe when spending time in the pool.

Establish A Barrier

The Consumer Product Safety Commission warns that drowning is the leading cause of unintentional death in children between the ages of one and four in the United States. Pools attract curious children, so maintaining a barrier between the home and the pool is essential. Many municipalities require some sort of fencing around pools or ladders that self-latch or can be closed off to climbing.

Locks and alarms on windows and doors that face or provide access to the backyard also can serve as barriers.

Keep Play Under Control

Children and even adults may be swept up in the fun and engage in potentially dangerous behaviors. Pool users should not be allowed to run around the perimeter of an inground pool, as the cement can get slippery when wet and lead to falls that can cause injuries.

Exercise caution when using diving boards or diving into pools. It's easy for divers to hit their heads when diving off a

board into a pool due to close proximity of the transition wall in the deep end of the pool or by diving into shallow water. The Red Cross recommends a water depth of 11.5 feet for safe diving and the transition wall should be at least 16.5 feet from the tip of the diving board. However, the standard depth for many pools is 7.5 feet of water and a slope beginning seven feet from the board.

Exercise Caution With Inflatables

The Good Housekeeping Research Institute found that inflatable pool toys are especially dangerous. Such toys can flip easily, putting children at risk for injury (from striking the sides of the pool) or drowning (especially if the children

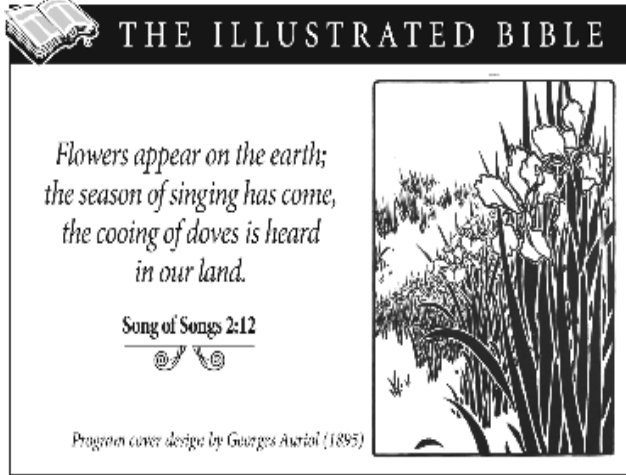
were ejected into deep water). Inflatables also can prevent access to the surface of the water for submerged swimmers.


Choose A Backyard Lifeguard

At least one person should be designated as backyard lifeguard when the pool is in use. This person should always direct his or her focus on

the pool, counting swimmers and keeping track of who enters and leaves the pool. Safe Kids Worldwide suggests rotating water watchers every 15 minutes.
