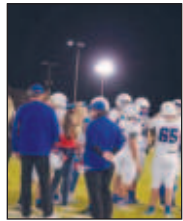

Unemployment Down In Jackson County

Newly released data from the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development highlighted an improving economy with lower unemployment in nearly every county across the state in August.

Unemployment rates decreased in 94 of Tennessee's 95 counties during the month. Benton was the only county with a slight increase of 0.1 of a percentage point in its month-to-month comparison.

Moore County had the state's lowest unemployment rate in August. At 5.1%, unemployment in the county dropped by 1.3 percentage points when compared to the previous month's revised rate of 6.4%.

Pickett and Williamson counties had the next lowest rates in the state. Pickett County's rate went down 1.1 percentage points to 5.2%. Williamson County's revised July rate of 6.5% dropped to 5.3% in August.

Following closely behind, Overton County had an unemployment rate of 5.5%, a 1.2% decrease from the previous month.

Clay County's unemployment rate dropped 2.1%, bringing the rate to 7%.

Jackson County's rate is at 7.8%, a 1.9% decrease from the previous month.

Shelby County experienced the state's highest unemployment in August. The county's new rate of 13.4% is down 1.4 percentage points from its revised July rate.

At 11.4%, Haywood County had the second-highest unemployment rate for the month. That represents a 1.6 percentage point decrease from the previous month. Davidson County recorded the third-highest unemployment rate in August. Its new rate is 10.4%, down 1.9 percentage points from the county's

July statistic.

Each of the state's largest cities experienced lower unemployment in August. Memphis dropped 1.4 percentage points from its revised July rate of 17.4%. Nashville's rate is now 10.4%, down 1.9 percentage points. Knoxville's August rate of 8.1% is 1.5 percentage points lower than its July rate.

The statewide seasonally adjusted jobless rate in August dropped to 8.5%, down 1.2 percentage points from July's revised rate of 9.7%.

Nationally, seasonally adjusted unemployment also decreased in August. At 8.4%, the United States unemployment rate fell 1.8 percentage points from the revised July rate of 10.2%.

Businesses across Tennessee are ready to help the state's economy rebound by reemploying out of work individuals. Jobs4TN.gov, Tennessee's workforce development website, currently has 219,000 open positions for all job skill levels.

Jobs4TN.gov also offers online assistance with writing a resume that will catch the attention of employers, advice on how to engage and impress during job interviews, and details about potential job training opportunities.

There are more than 80 American Job Centers across Tennessee that are open for business and offering job seekers one-on-one personalized assistance. Career specialists are ready to work with individuals to devise a reemployment plan that will help them rejoin the state's workforce.

All the assistance is free to anyone who needs help finding a new job or career path.

The state of Tennessee will release the unemployment rate for September Thursday, Oct. 15, at 1:30 p.m.

I Walk The Line 50th Anniversary

It is hard to believe it has been half a century since Hollywood sent some of its best actors and actresses to our town to make a movie. That's what happened in 1969. The Town of Gainesboro became the setting for the story about a sheriff going through a mid-life crisis, played by one of Hollywood's best leading men, Gregory Peck, who fell head over heels in love with a traveling moonshine-making family's daughter portrayed by Tuesday Weld.

Miss Weld was famous in her own right before performing in Gainesboro, nine years earlier; she won a Golden Globe Award for Most Promising Female. One year later she had an

off-screen romance with Elvis, after starring with him in the 1961 film "Wild in the Country."

The star that portrayed the moonshiner, the father of Tuesday Weld's character, was Ralph Meeker who three years earlier, starred in two major films, "The Dirty Dozen" and "St. Valentine's Day Massacre" in 1966.

Charles During successfully pulled off portraying the obnoxious deputy sheriff, who decided to visit the moonshiner's family after discovering the affair between their daughter and the sheriff. His role in the film didn't last much longer, after he chose to kill the family dog and assault the daughter. The

next sequence of the film was where to bury the deputy.

Of all the Hollywood actors that came to Gainesboro, to make the movie "I Walk the Line", only one is still performing, and she is still going

Town Of Gainesboro Meeting Minutes September 03, 2020

Mayor Williams called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Introduction of the new board members: Ricky Head, Travis Agee, and Wayne Strong.

The Pledge of Allegiance and a moment of silence was observed by all present.

Wayne Strong made a motion to approve the meeting minutes for July 2, 2020 and Aug. 13, 2020, with Travis Agee as second. All voted aye.

Old business:

Ricky Head made a motion to approve renaming the city park to Gainesboro Bicentennial Park, with Travis Agee as second. All voted aye.

Wayne Strong made a motion to approve Ordinance# 2020-06-01: Second Reading of the water and sewer rate increase of 2% across the rate structure to take effect Oct. 1, with alderman Travis Agee as second. All voted aye.

New business:

Wayne Strong made a motion to give authority to police chief to hire part-time officer as needed, with Travis Agee as second. All voted aye.

Travis Agee made a motion to repeal the motion that was made to have the Town of Gainesboro insurance adjuster to come look at the sewer problem at 100 South Main Street, with alderman Ricky Head as second. Travis Agee and Ricky Head voted aye with Wayne Strong as no.

Travis Agee made a motion to approve the 1st reading of ordinance 2020-09-01: for the Town of Gainesboro, Tennessee providing for regulations concerning tiny houses, with Wayne Strong as second. All voted aye.

Ricky Head made a motion to approve a public hearing on Thursday Oct. 1, at 6:45 p.m. at the Gainesboro City Hall to consider the adoption of an ordinance providing regulations concerning "tiny houses." An ad will be placed in the "Jackson County Sentinel" to run Sept. 15, with Travis Agee as second. All voted aye.

Travis Agee made a motion to re-appoint John R. Fox to the historical district commit-

tee, with Ricky Head as second. All voted aye.

Mayor and aldermen discussed issues with 450 N. Grundy Quarles Hwy parking lot.

Alderman Ricky Head addressed narrow road on Oldfield Drive. Discussion only.

Wayne Strong made a motion to appoint Travis Agee to the Gainesboro Regional Planning Committee, with Ricky Head as second. All voted aye.

Public Entity Partners recommendations for the Town of Gainesboro, Mayor Williams suggest to Supervisor Chester Hamlet to fix what he can and table until next meeting.

Travis Agee made a motion to approve the Cares Act grant to add a drive thru window at

the City Hall building and the city pay the additional cost, with Ricky Head as 2nd second. All voted aye.

Any further business: Nathaniel Green with the James C. Hailey group updated on the SRF and CDBG grant the city applied for.

Jordan Hunter with the Chamber of Commerce updated on the park renovations.

Jordan Hudson addressed the Mayor and Board of Aldermen about setting up a farmers market at the intersection of School Drive and Hwy 56. Discussion only.

Adjournment: alderman Travis Agee made a motion to adjourn at 7:41 p.m., with Wayne Strong as second. All voted aye. Meeting adjourned.

People Of The Past Revealed

Did you guess correctly? Was the picture of the young boy in last weeks *Sentinel* any help?

Read on to find out who this person of the past was.

James Mack Draper

Of Mary Mack and Thomas Jefferson Draper, Jr., was born March 30, 1887 and died April 28, 1971. His first marriage to Lola Pearl Darwin was on Dec. 25, 1912. Pearl Darwin was born Aug. 6, 1889 and died Oct. 22, 1938. Mack and Pearl were the parents of James Darwin Draper, born May 23, 1915 and died Aug. 25, 1984; Margaret Elizabeth Draper, born March 4, 1917 and died Jan. 29, 1966; Robert Marshal Draper, born March 7, 1920 and died July 22, 1934; and Jane Ann Draper, born Jan. 29, 1932.

James Mack Draper married for a second time. He married Nola Bronson Quarles on Aug. 20, 1942. They were the parents of Mary Linda Draper who was born on April 29, 1945.

Mack Draper was a merchant, farmer and a civic leader of Jackson County. With only an eighth grade education and no capital he began his long business career teaching school in rural areas of Jackson County. His retail experience began in 1910 when he entered the firm of what had been McDearman & Stafford, but Stafford sold to W.M. Draper, (a relative of Mack Draper). In 1920 he and his brother, James William Draper bought the business and changed the name to Draper & Draper Company. In 1930,

O.F. Darwin of Lebanon entered the organization, forming a chain of dry goods stores in Tennessee and Kentucky. They were known as Draper & Darwin Stores.

Mack Draper, a lifelong Democrat, was elected Mayor of Gainesboro for five terms from 1940 to 1950. He was a Tennessee Delegate to the National Democratic Convention in Chicago in 1944. He served as the delegate from Jackson County to the Second Constitutional Convention of Tennessee in 1964.

He was a charter member of the Gainesboro Rotary Club, a Third Degree Mason and a member of the Gainesboro Church of Christ.

In his later years, as President of the Upper Cumberland River Development Association, he successfully fought for a lock to be included in the

Cordell Hull Dam.

Mack Draper had many interests and hobbies, including horse racing, University of Tennessee football, breeding of Hereford Cattle and Democratic politics. He held box seats at the Kentucky Derby for many years. He regularly attended Vanderbilt-UT football games. His interest in sports and his concern for young people precipitated his contributing \$32,000 toward the erection of a football stadium at the Jackson County High School located on his family farm. The stadium was named the Mark Draper Memorial Stadium after his death in 1971. His leadership and generous nature will long be remembered in Jackson County.

Mr. Mack as he was affectionately known by all is most assuredly an honorable person of the past.



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Is COVID God's Curse?

When bad things happen in life, it is a natural response to try to assign a reason why. If something bad happens to someone else, it makes us feel safe if we can find some way that they brought it on themselves. The whole world is experiencing something frightening right now, and people are finding different ideas to make them feel safe. Most of these ideas have little to do with the Bible, but there are a few which the Bible addresses plainly.

Idea 1: God is cursing for our sinfulness.

There are examples in the Bible where people are punished for their sinful ways. We know when this occurs because God tells us that this is the case. When God does not tell us that a bad thing occurred for a certain reason, it is easy to start speculating about who is to blame. There are a couple of passages in the New Testament that addresses this speculation. In John 9, Jesus and his disciples pass by a man born blind. Using the reasoning that a bad thing must be a curse from God, the disciples ask Jesus if the blindness was caused by this man's sin or if it was a result of something his parents had done. In verse 3, Jesus tells them that the blindness isn't a result of anyone's sin.

In Luke 13, Jesus talks about two incidents. A group of people are killed by their governor while worshipping, and eighteen people are killed when a tower collapses. Jesus tells the crowd that these people were not worse sinners than other people. In fact, we all need to repent of our sins. He says this because some people see calamity as a sign of God's particular displeasure. Therefore, the absence of calamity means God must be happy. Both are incorrect assumptions. The blind man had done nothing to be blinded, and those who were crushed by the tower were not worse sinners than the rest.

Idea 2: COVID is a sign of the end of times.

No matter your age, there have been dozens of things that have happened that people claimed were heralds of the end of the world. World War II, the 9/11 attacks, and now COVID all seem like the beginning of the end. When the Bible talks about the end of the world, it talks of the unexpectedness of it all. II Peter 3:10 says the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night. Luke 12:40 tells us that Jesus is coming at an hour we do not expect. Will there be bad things happening before Jesus returns? Absolutely, but only because there are always bad things happening on Earth.

When times are scary, it is easy to get swept up in bad ideas, but as God said in Joshua 1:9 "Be strong and of good courage, do not be afraid..." We can't control sickness and happenstance, but we can study our Bibles to make sure we are the people God would have us be.

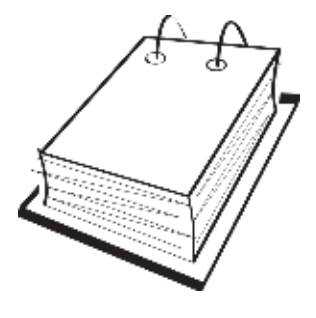

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Prevent Pet-Related Damage To The House

The benefits of having a pet are innumerable. Pets can be companions, protectors, service animals and even help produce products that can be sold, such as eggs from chickens. While there are many positive attributes to pets, one potential concern is the impact they have on the home.

Pet-related damage can occur when pets are angry or happy. Boisterous animals may scratch or claw at furniture and floors. Some animals may climb or chew. Woodwork and furniture can be damaged by pet paws and teeth, but that's not where it ends. The following are some potential pet-damage problems and how to avoid them.

Marking

Many animals use scent markers to estab-

lish their territory and communicate with other animals. As a result, both male and female pets may spray urine in certain areas of the house. While it may not eliminate the problem immediately, making sure to neuter or spay cats and dogs can reduce the likelihood that they'll mark indoors or attempt to seek out and mate with feral animals they smell canvassing the property.

Accidents

In addition to marking, pets that have not been properly trained or were trained and are experiencing a behavioral or medical issue may be going soiling in improper areas, such as outside of the litter box or in the home. Obedience training can head off some issues, but if a medical

condition is suspected, consult with a veterinarian promptly.

Dirt, Fur And More

An investment in regular grooming can help keep certain damage at bay, states Home Advisor. Regularly brushing and trimming coats, keeping nails clipped and bathing will keep a home fresh and minimize damage. Other pets may not be groomed but require cleaning of cages or other habitats. Bird droppings and feathers can get on surfaces. Cleaning daily or very frequently can help keep a home tidy.

Provide Toys And Scratching Posts

Pets need an outlet to tame anxiety and energy. If they don't have suitable outlets, pets may cause damage to a home. Cats will take to furniture

to stretch their paws if they don't have scratching posts or special mats. Dogs, particularly puppies, can be orally fixated. When the urge to chew sets in, unless there are appropriate chew toys, furniture, moldings and other items around the house may become fair game.

It is important to note that declawing a cat to prevent damage should not be a consideration. It is a surgery that can cause ongoing health problems. Nail caps can be used as a safe alternative.

Escape Artists

In some cases, pets may chew or scratch their way through doors and window screens. Others may dig under fencing or climb, leaving damage in their wake. Boredom, anxiety or lack of train-

ing may be behind these behaviors, according to Pets Weekly. However, the urge to roam also may be tied to pets not being fixed. Work with the vet or a trainer to help stop

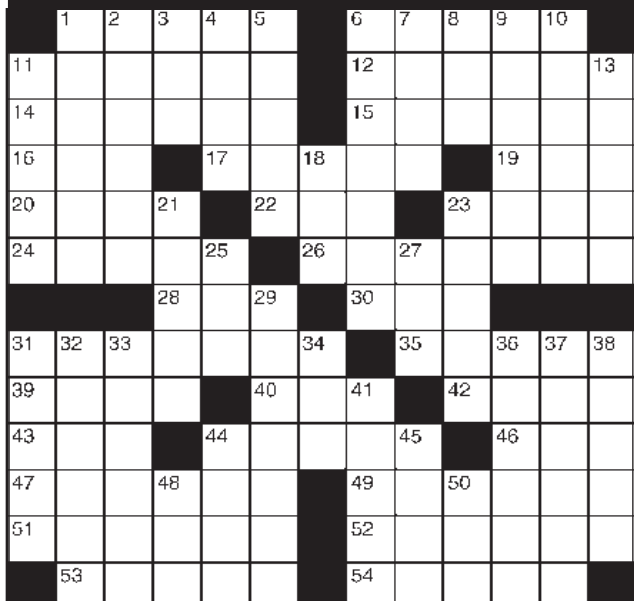

strong. Her name is Estelle Parsons who portrayed Gregory Peck's wife, the sheriff's wife. Today you can see 92 year old Estelle Parsons play Rosanne's mother on the long running TV series, The Roseanne Show and its spinoff The Conner's.

The director of this movie was John Frankenheimer, who eight years earlier in 1961, directed the blockbuster, Birdman of Alcatraz and five years later Grand Prix, before bringing his 200-man crew to Tennessee. He needed a stunt double for his young Hollywood actor that would play the role of the moonshiner's son. He sent his assistant to the Cookeville Jr. High School to find an 8th grader that looked like him. When she saw Freddie McCloud sitting at his desk, she immediately knew he was the one. As it turned out, the Hollywood actor could not do the role, so Freddie was cast in the role as Buddy McCain, the son of the moonshiner. Since Freddie was active and athletic they no longer needed a stunt double for his role; he did the stunts himself.

Freddie was taken out of school, and the director provided a tutor for him. "I was schooled for two hours a day," said Freddie. Freddie went on to say, "The crew took me under their wing, and it was really exciting being around all those people that were different from what I was used to. My first scene was driving my older sister (Tuesday

Weld) in a 1950's pickup truck hauling sugar back home for whiskey, when the sheriff took after us, I drove into a field and the truck stalled out."

This truck scene took place in Middle Tennessee, where many scenes in the movie were shot. Some of the close ups were filmed in the Columbia Studios in Hollywood. The scenes of the mill, the river and the swinging bridge were filmed in Oakland, Calif.

Since the story was about a small town sheriff, many of the scenes took place in and around the Gainesboro Square. In 1969 Gainesboro was a thriving town, where you could buy almost anything.

You could drive off in a new Ford or a Chevrolet car or truck from dealerships right off the square. Buy Gulf or Esso Gas, groceries, clothes or even a color TV. If you were in the market to buy, Gainesboro was the place to be.

"The day the movie crew rolled down Main Street heading to the square, they made quite a commotion," said Katherine Anderson.

Truck after truck, some pulling trailers, passed by her house. Everyone was excited about the movie being shot in their town. Katherine Anderson, explained, "They had to let school out for several days, because the students would ride in on the school bus and instead of going to class, they would walk to the square to see the Hollywood Stars." She also recalled, "They hung a fire hose from a second story window on the courthouse to make the

rain scene.

Fifty years later the square looks much like it did in the movie. The most noticeable changes are the empty lot where the old hardware store stood, and the signs for the gas stations and the car dealerships are no longer there. Someone today would have a hard time believing that the courtroom scene was filmed in Gainesboro.

In the movie Gregory Peck is real proud to show off this impressive large courtroom with its surrounding balconies to Tuesday Weld. Several years ago the room was divided into two, and the balconies were walled up into office space. The downstairs pool hall on the square is no longer in business. A lot has changed since Hollywood came to town, but overall the town still looks the same.

Freddie accompanied by his mother, flew to California to Columbia Studios and Oakland, to finish up the movie. While there Gregory Peck saw the potential talent in 12-year-old Freddie; he had his personal agent work with him. As a result Freddie was interviewed for three TV series, which included several shows: Daniel Boone, Wagon Train and a new production. He was interviewed for a MGM production spot in a movie starring Greta Garbo.

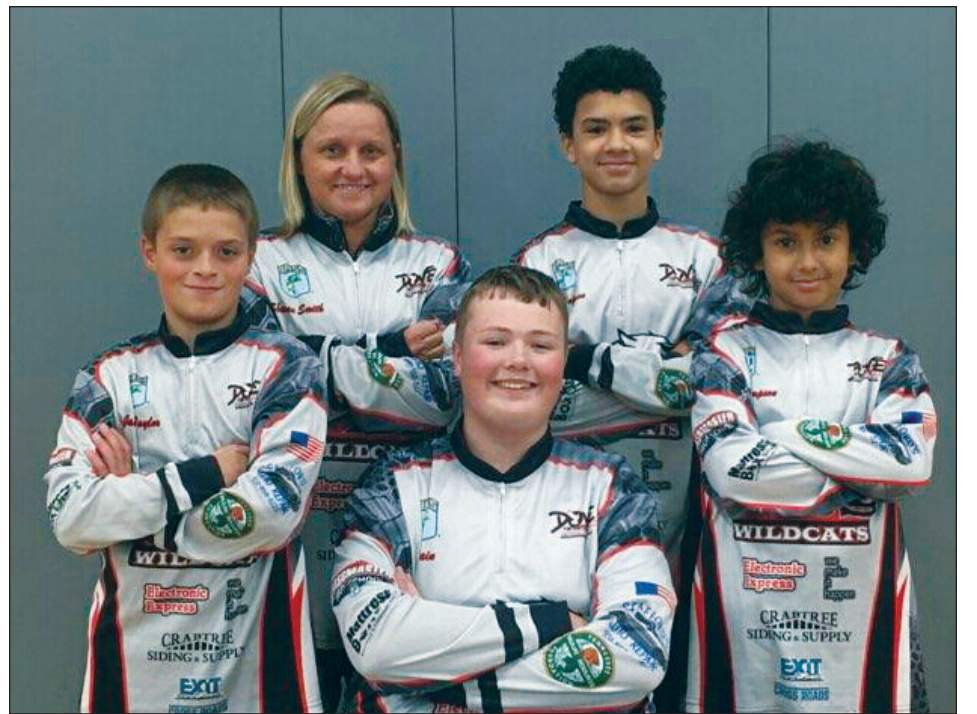
Freddie decided that Los Angeles was too big. "I just wanted to come back home," he said. Fifty years later when asked if he had made the right decision to leave Hollywood he replied "Yes, I did".

Rosewood plans to host a showing of the feature film I Walk the Line sometime in the spring, to celebrate the film's fiftieth anniversary. It will be sponsored by the

Jackson County Historical Society in conjunction with the Gainesboro Bicentennial Celebration, which has been moved to the spring because of the virus.

Freddie McCloud will be there with many personal items to show including his director's chair, original photos and the original script he read from.
