Early Voting To Start Oct. 14

Early voting in the Nov. 3 election starts tomorrow.

Jackson County Administrator of Elections Clay Thaxton says early voting is open to all voters beginning tomorrow and will run through Oct. 29.

Thaxton is expecting the election cycle to be busier than usual.

He expressed that there has been an increase of registered voters in the county, and he has seen a large increase in the number of absentee ballots requested.

“We have seen the number of absentee ballot requests nearly double,” Thaxton said. “We normally see around 150 absentee ballots, but this election we have had 285

so far.”

According to Thaxton, nearly 700 new voters have registered in the county, bringing the number of eligible voters up to 8,233.

“This is a huge increase for us,” he said. “Everyone is out to vote, and that is a good thing. We are hoping to see many more people take advantage of early voting.”

He explained that the best thing about early voting is its convenience.

“We strongly encourage people to early vote,” Thaxton said. “It’s a real easy way of doing it. You get to (vote) at your convenience and don’t have to worry about what the weather is going to be like or the lines are going to be like on Election Day, and with what’s going on with COVID-19, it’s a really

easy way to aid in social distancing.”

Early voting hours will be 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday at the Courthouse. On Wednesday and Saturday, voting hours will be 8 a.m. until noon. This will be the only location available for early voting.

In this election cycle, residents will be voting in the federal election as well as state.

For the U.S. House Of Representatives race, voters can vote for Republican candidate John Rose or Democratic Candidate Christopher Finley. Voters will also be voting for candidates vying for a seat in the U.S. Senate, Democratic Candidate Marquita Bradshaw and Republican Candidate Bill Hagerty.

In addition to the federal race, voters can

expect to vote for an unopposed candidate running as Tennessee State Representative in District 41, Democrat John Mark Windle.

Thaxton asked that during early voting and on Election Day voters refrain from wearing clothing that could be perceived as campaign material. What you wear to the polls on Election Day could prevent you from voting.

A sample ballot of all of the elections and candidates vying for seats in federal, state and local office can be found at jacksoncotn.com or refer back to last week’s edition of the *Sentinel*. Thaxton also informed that on election night, updates will be given live on that website.

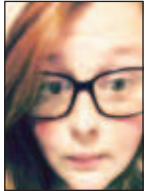

According to Kentucky State Police reports, officers responded to a residence on White Oak Ridge Road in the Fountain Run Community in reference to two deceased males being located inside the residence with apparent gunshot wounds to the head.

The victims are Trevor Cleary, 20 of Tompkinsville, Ky., and Austin Copas, 19 of Fountain Run, Ky.

The motive is still unclear at this time, however Kentucky authorities report that the killing was “execution-style.”

Tennessee Tech alumnus and Board of Trustees member Barry Wilmore is returning to space. The NASA astronaut will command NASA's Boeing Crew Flight Test, the inaugural crewed flight of the CST-100 Starliner launching to the International Space Station in 2021.

"This is a test flight. The first flight of this space craft. These don't come around very often," said Wilmore. "To have the opportunity to step in and be the commander of the first flight is a great opportunity."

A native of Mt. Juliet, Wilmore earned bachelor's and master's degrees in electrical engineering from Tech, and has served on the Tech Board of Trustees since 2017. His commitment to the university was recently recognized by Gov. Bill Lee, who reappointed Wilmore to the board through 2026.

Wilmore is a retired captain in the U.S. Navy, with more than 7,800 flight hours and 663 carrier landings in tactical jet aircraft. He was selected as an astronaut in 2000.

He has spent a total of 178 days in space over the course of two missions. In 2009, he served as the pilot of space shuttle Atlantis on STS-129, helping to deliver 14 tons of spare parts for the

space station. In 2014, he returned to the space station via a Russian Soyuz spacecraft for a 167-day mission, during which he performed four spacewalks.

"I enjoyed the other missions and I was an important part of them," said Wilmore. "But, to command a launch vehicle is really why I came to NASA from the Navy."

Wilmore has been training side-by-side with the crew since being named the sole backup for all flight positions in July 2018. On Wednesday it was announced that Wilmore would replace Boeing astronaut Chris Ferguson, who has decided not to fly for personal reasons. Wilmore will now shift his focus specifically to the spacecraft commander's duties in preparation for the

flight to the space station. The flight is designed to test the end-to-end capabilities of the new Starliner system.

"It's all about the mission," said Wilmore. "The first time I flew was the space shuttle, taking a lot of cargo to the space station. The second time I launched on a Russian Soyuz and was the commander of the space station. Two very different missions. The first one was just under two weeks and the second one was six months. This one we don't know how long it will be, but we are training for a long flight."

Wilmore was a letterman and team captain of the Tennessee Tech football team and was inducted into the university's Sports Hall of Fame in 2003. He currently holds the number two spot in

Tech's record books for most tackles in a game, and number three on tackles per season.

As a member of Tech's Board of Trustees, Wilmore attended the quarterly meeting held on campus last week, serving on the Academic and Student Affairs Committee. He says now that he is the commander of this upcoming flight, his schedule will change somewhat.

"Right now we are scheduled to launch no earlier than June 25, 2021. There is an uncrewed test launch in December or January," Wilmore said. "As a backup, I was not required to be at certain places at certain times. As the commander, I will have to be there. My whole year will be different but I'm excited about it."

Budget Amendment for EMIF (Electronic Monitoring Image Fund): This was not included in the current budget as agreed upon. If the county supplies \$1,500, the state will match that amount. Judge Gipson has been using this as an alternative to incarceration to those who qualify. Commissioner Thomas Wilmoth made a motion to approve and this was seconded by Commissioner Josh Denson. 15 commissioners present voted "Aye" and Commissioner Shelby Fox voted no. The motion carried.

Budget Amendment for the County Clerk's office: The insurance reimbursement was received for \$40,514.33 from missing funds and another \$10,000 in restitution. These monies were paid to the mayor's office and needs to be transferred to the county clerk's budget to be paid to the appropriate entities. All of the money owed to the state for various fees is now paid. Commissioner Tim Agee made a motion to approve and this was seconded by Commissioner Joey Denson. All 16 commissioners present voted "Aye" and the motion carried.

New Washer Funding Resolution: The jail's washing machine needs replacing. This was not included in the budget. The funds are available due to excess in buying police cars and ambulance out of the 171 Capital Projects Budget. The budget committee has already in the possession of the jail. Commissioner Thomas Wilmoth approved this motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Anthony Buck. All 16 Commissioners present voted "Aye" and the motion carried.

New Library Board Members: Mr. George Cassetty and Ray Hansen are due to rotate off the board leaving two open seats. The Library Board voted and nominated Matthew Scoggins and Brandon Korgan to the Board. Commissioner Doug Stafford approved

this motion and was seconded by Don Chinoy. All 16 commissioners present voted "Aye" and the motion carried.

Short Term Rental Occupancy Tax Info Only: County Clerk Brandon Stafford asked the commissioners for their help in informing the community that a business license and payment of occupancy tax is required by law in order to lease short term rentals, such as hotels, motels and AirBnB's. Currently, the county has received \$14,423 from the tax this year. County Clerk Stafford informed the commissioner that a business license is \$15 for the first year. Mayor Heady asked the commissioners to encourage those in the community to pay this tax if warranted. The AirBnB website is somewhat misleading as it seems that the company is paying the occupancy tax, however, they only pay those in Davidson, Hamilton and Knox Counties.

Wildwood Marina Dumpster: Commissioner Shelby Fox asked if the county had provided a dumpster to Wildwood Marina. Mayor Heady reported that Wildwood Marina does have a cardboard dumpster, but not a trash dumpster as the county does not collect any commercial trash.

Notary Renewals: Megan Renea Jackson, Mary E. Strong, Shannon Johnson and Steven Cassetty were approved as notaries. Commissioner Shelby Fox made a motion to approve these and was seconded by Commissioner Joey Denson. All 16 commissioners present voted "Aye" and the motion carried.

Next meeting is set for Oct. 26, at 7 p.m. There will be an audit update on this date. Health insurance will be addressed during this meeting.

Adjournment: Commissioner Glenda Mayberry made the motion to adjourn until the next meeting and Commissioner Thomas Wilmoth seconded the motion. All 16 Honorable Legislative Body Members present voted "Aye" and the meeting adjourned at 7:25 p.m.

iversity of Tennessee, Knoxville, Austin Peay State University, and Lipscomb University.

"We are thankful for the State in providing these funds," said Danny Weeks, director of Schools for Dickson County. "We are proud to partner with Austin Peay State University and Nashville State Community College to serve our community."

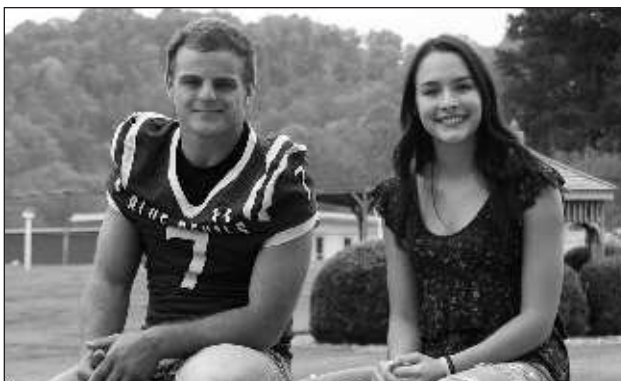
