## Veterans Day Friday

Every year since 1954, the United States government has set aside Nov. 11 as a federal holiday to honor military veterans from the U.S. Armed Forces.

While May's Memorial Day recognizes those that have died while in military service and Armed Forces Day honors those currently serving, Veterans Day honors all those who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. Before Congress named Nov. 11 as Veterans Day in 1954, the date was known as Armistice Day and Remembrance Day, and it served as a celebration to mark the anniversary of the end of World War I.

According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, Armistice Day officially received its name in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later, also by an act of Congress. By that point, many nations, including England and France, along with the United States would hold memorial gestures honoring World War I soldiers on Nov. 11, in recognition of the day that war ended in 1918 at 11 a.m. that morning, leading to the saying that the war ended in the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

Not too many years after creating a holiday to celebrate the end of the "war to end all wars", war again broke out in Europe. Lasting six years from 1939 to 1945, World War II was the most destructive war in human history, involving militaries from around the globe, including 16.5 million Americans. Over 407,000 Americans died in service, with around 292,000 dying in battle.

According to the VA, the first celebration to use the term Veterans Day was held in Birmingham, Al., on Armistice Day in 1947. World War II veteran Raymond Weeks organized what he called "National Veterans Day", including a parade and other festivities to honor all veterans. Weeks later received the Presidential Citizens medal from President Ronald Reagan in 1982.

U.S. Representative Edward Rees of Kansas later proposed a bill in Congress to change Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The bill passed in 1954 and was signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the general that led Allied forces in Europe during World War II.

Although Congress later attempted to move Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October in 1968, the public continued to recognize Nov. 11 as a significant historical date. A decade later, Congress moved the celebration back to the traditional date.

Communities around the nation continue the tradition of celebrating veterans on Nov. 11 through local parades and ceremonies.

Local health departments across Tennessee will be offering free flu vaccinations on Wednesday.

The Tennessee Department of Health announced its Fight the Flu '22 event last week as a way of encouraging all Tennesseans over six months to receive a vaccine this year.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, Tennessee is currently marked in the red when it comes to the flu. The designation means there is a large number of cases and that

it continues to spread.

"Getting a flu shot is the most important thing we can all do to help prevent the flu and keep ourselves, loved ones and everyone around us healthy," said TDH Commissioner Morgan McDonald, MD FACP FAAP. "We know flu vaccines are safe, effective, and protect against the most common types of flu circulating, so I urge everyone eligible to receive a flu shot to do so."

## New Curator Appointed

Mike Mitchell has stepped into the position of curator for the long established Jackson County Veterans Memorial Hall originally started by Mr. Glenn Jones.

The Veterans Memorial Hall is located in the old County Jail downstairs from the County Archives at 104 Short Street, behind the Library in downtown Gainesboro. Currently the hall has approximately 509 Military veterans from all wars ranging from the Revolution-

ary war to current active duty veterans. All veterans that are represented there are Jackson County residents, whether born, having lived or died here. Each has a framed a photo with a plaque giving info on their units and time in the service.

Several projects to update the Hall have been completed after years of being closed due to the pandemic and a new re-opening will be planned sometime in the future but individual tours are still available.

Mike, although new to the area he has very deep roots here on his mother's side of the family, with 3 Generations buried here up the hollow on Indian Creel with two Confederate Veterans. His line goes back to the late 1700's and early 1800's. Mike works at the County Archives as a part time volunteer Archivist every Tuesday from 9 to 2:30. Mike was a Paramedic in Miami Florida for 36 years and is now retired. His parents were Lt. JG Jean Mitchell, US Navy and a Nurse for 9 years (his Forkum/Huffhines Line) and father was Captain Joe Mitchell in Navy Cryptology for 34 years.

One of his new projects is working on local cemeteries. Using stellar references by Mr. Larry Mabry and Mrs. Reda Bilbrey JC TN Cemetery Inscriptions 1801 - 2003 and a map of the county showing each of the 469 cemeteries Mike is adding photos and personal site specific information on this reference. He has identified 4 cemeteries of historical importance and is now in the process of clearing, resorting, repairing and preserving them. If you have questions on restoring or repairing your family cemetery, please feel free to contact him, he'll be glad to help.

Special group tours can be arranged any day of the week through Mike at the Archives by calling 931-268-9877 or personal number at 931-678-4850.

Are your ancestors, husband, wife, children or distant family member's veterans? Are they from Jackson County? Drop by the County Archives any Tuesday between 9 and 2:30 to talk to Mike about getting them represented.

"Usually each veteran is framed separately to honor them as an individual but there are rare exceptions. There is a father/son, and several brothers in a single frame and or 2 or 3 frames with family members that joined at the same time for the same conflict one or both were killed in action.

There is one very notable exception with one family who are all framed together in one frame. All SEVEN brothers joined and served during the same conflict. This type of patriotism in today's environment will probably never be seen.

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## North Springs Music Festival Held



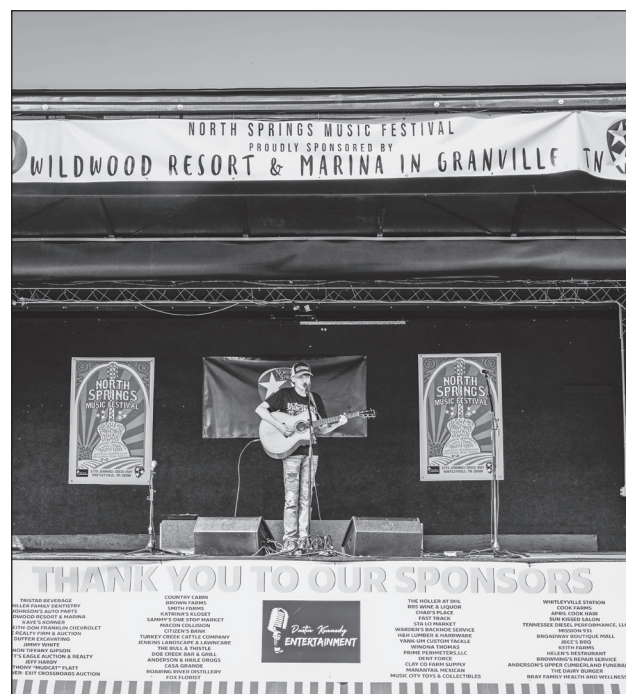

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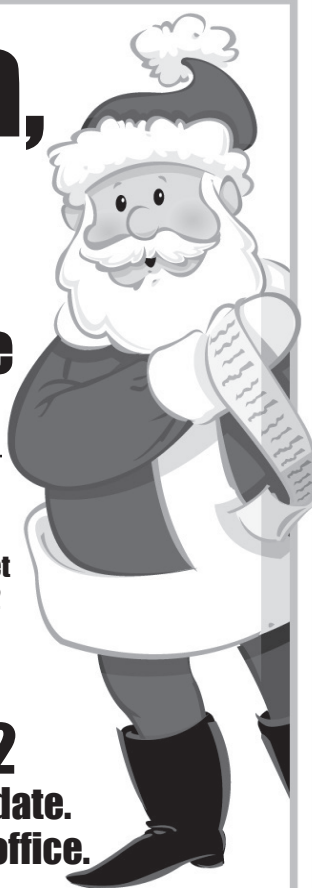

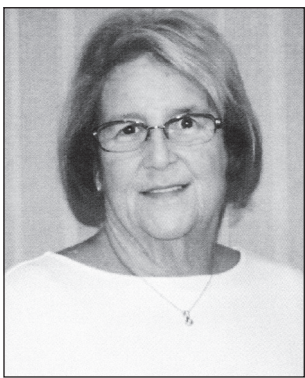

No appointments are needed for the Fight the Flu event on Wednesday. Health Departments will still continue to offer free flu vaccinations following the kick-off event.

TDH officials also suggest continuing to take precautions to prevent diseases like influenza and COVID-19, such as practicing proper hygiene and hand washing, covering your coughs and sneezes, and staying at home if you are sick.

The flu virus is highly contagious and pregnant women, infants, the elderly, and people with

certain medical conditions are at the highest risk of severe complications from the flu. The CDC estimates up to 7.5 million illnesses, 400,000 hospitalizations, and 22,000 deaths could be prevented every year if more people chose to get the flu vaccine.

Fight Flu '22 also serves as a statewide preparedness and response exercise where TDH's local public health teams practice their emergency plans to vaccinate communities during a pandemic. This is the fifth consecutive year for the Fight Flu TN event.

## Moving Forward Will Take Creativity

I don't know about you, but I'm not inclined to make many predictions about the outcome of the midterm elections this year. Too many contests are too close-fought.

There's one prediction, though, that I think is safe: After the dust has cleared, Congress will be narrowly divided and President Biden will have to work hard to govern effectively. Whether he can do so will depend on plenty of different factors, but none will be more important than his relationship with members of both parties in Congress.

To the extent that Americans think about how national policy is developed, they tend to focus on the president and his positions. Congress often has its own agenda, of course, but there's no question the president is usually the chief actor, laying out an agenda, proposing a budget, driving media coverage. Still, the president is not all-powerful: To achieve his goals most effectively, he has to work with Congress, which will often debate, change, and sometimes reject them.

In recent decades, as Congress has grown more divided and partisan, frustrated presidents have sought an end-run,

exploring the use of executive orders and other unilateral approaches to setting policy. And as former presidents of both parties have discovered, once the White House changes hands one of the new occupant's first priorities has been to reverse his predecessor's actions. If you're interested in sustainable policies that will last longer than an electoral eyeblink, the road runs through Congress.

Taking it won't be easy, regardless of how the elections turn out. If both chambers turn Republican, there's a decent chance the new majority will spend the next two years doing everything it can to undermine Biden's presidency. If the chambers split, with Republicans running the House and Democrats the Senate, substantive legislating may take a back seat to maneuvering for the 2024 elections. And even if Democrats hold on to their control, which is unlikely, there's not much question that legislative progress will depend on Republican help.

Yet even if gridlock and partisan tension might be on the docket, they don't have to be. Biden did depend entirely on his party for the climate-change and other policies embedded in the Inflation Reduc-

tion Act, which passed along strict party lines. But it was an exception in a surprisingly productive Congress: Most of the major steps Congress has taken recently, whether on guns or health care for veterans or strengthening US technological capacity, have been hammered out and passed by coalitions of Democrats and Republicans. Common ground, in other words, is possible.

The challenge will be to get there. And on that front, much of the weight will be on the Biden administration's shoulders.

For one thing, the President will have to take the lead and do what needs to be done to encourage or entice political leaders in Congress to work in a bipartisan way. He'll need a strategy for this, since it's likely to put him at odds with some members of his own party—party loyalists and policy activists don't like seeing their leaders reach across the aisle to get work done—and put Republican leaders at odds with members of their own party.

One key to achieving this is to have a structure in place that makes it easier: clear lines of communication between the White House staff and congressional leaders, staff on both sides who know

one another and have experience working with one another, and a President who doesn't just make himself accessible to key members of Congress, but knows how to listen and adjust to meet congressional demands. On all these fronts, the past two years could serve as prologue.

Regardless of party, as Americans we should all hope that the Biden administration and congressional leaders can pull it off. Over the course of a long career watching national policy get made, I've been impressed by a simple fact: The more bipartisan it is, the better its chances of lasting. On the whole, Americans want commonsense approaches to resolving our problems. Even on tough issues like immigration and police reform, there's common ground. The challenge our leaders face is to agree to inhabit it.

## A Monk Walks Into A Beer Garden

It's always amazing what thieves think they can get away with, especially when the Department of Veterans Affairs Office of Inspector General starts looking their way. Here are two instances where the thieves really should have known better.

When the Covid pandemic assistance money was handed out to businesses for economic disaster in 2020, two people figured that would be an excellent way to grab funds for their nonprofit religious organizations. One was an Orthodox Christian monk and the other was an attorney. After multiple fraudulent applications, they eventually made off with \$3.5 million. One-third of the money was used for a property they were turning into a monastic complex, complete with chapel, brewery and beer garden, not to mention an audio system and antique furniture.

The monk, who'd taken a vow of poverty, additionally purchased a \$40,000 Swiss watch. Those who reviewed and approved the applications should have been clued in by the

name of the monastic property: Shrine of St. Nicholas the Wonderworker, Patron of Sailors, Brewers & Repentant Thieves. At this writing, the pair has been released on a comparatively tiny \$10,000 bond after arraignment.

A Texas woman didn't nab as much cash, but the circumstances are still despicable. The woman and her husband claimed VA and SSA disability money because they said that the veteran had an active duty injury that left him paralyzed from the waist down. They'd been given an adapted home by a nonprofit group, a specially equipped vehicle and money. A thumbs-up to the local news, however, for their investigation after being sent a video of the veteran walking around the neighborhood and playing basketball.

The veteran died in federal custody while awaiting trial, but his spouse was found guilty of mail fraud, wire fraud, healthcare fraud, theft of government funds and more. At sentencing she faces 20 years for each wire and mail fraud charge, 10 years on each health care fraud charge and theft of funds and five years for each false statement related to a health care matter.

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# Consider These 13 Gratifying Thanksgiving Facts

Thanksgiving is a time to gather with family and friends and reflect on one's blessings. In 2022, Canadian Thanksgiving takes place on October 10, while Americans celebrate on November 24. In anticipation of these holidays, here are some interesting facts about the Thanksgiving celebration.

1. American Thanks-

giving is largely modeled on a 17th century harvest feast shared by the English settlers and the Wampanoag tribe.

2. Canadians celebrate Thanksgiving on the second Monday of October. It is based on European harvest festivals.

3. The National Turkey Federation says around 45 million turkeys will be

eaten on Thanksgiving, which equates to about 720 million pounds of turkey being consumed (with the average turkey size being 16 pounds).

4. The Butterball hotline answers roughly 100,000 calls every year on its turkey question hotline.

5. In 1953, the Swanson company overestimated the number of frozen turkeys it would sell for the holiday season by 26 tons. Rather than waste the meat, Swanson sliced it up, repackaged it and created the first frozen TV dinners.

6. Thanksgiving in America may be older than many recognize. While Thanksgiving is largely tied to the 17th century settlers, the National Parks Service says in 1565 Spanish settlers in St. Augustine (now Florida) celebrated by having a

meal to which they invited the native Seloy tribe. The Spanish served pork stew, sea biscuits, red wine, and garbanzo beans. Some say the Seloy contributed turkey, venison and maize.

7. Thanksgiving didn't become a civic holiday until Abraham Lincoln made it one after the Civil War tragedy. Thanksgiving was declared a national holiday on October 20, 1864.

8. The Pilgrims did not refer to themselves as "pilgrims." They used the word "separatists" as they were separating themselves from a larger belief system.

9. In addition to Canada and the United States, Grenada, Liberia, the Philippines, Saint Lucia, and the Netherlands celebrate their own versions of Thanksgiving.

10. Each year, the American president "par-

adons" a turkey from slaughter on Thanksgiving. This tradition dates back to when Abraham Lincoln's son was upset that his family's turkey that was going to be killed for Thanksgiving dinner.

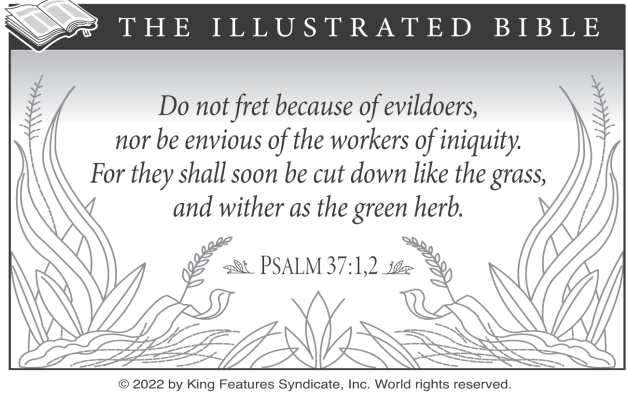
11. According to the U.S. Calorie Control Council (CCC), an average American may consume 4,500 calories and 229 grams of fat on Thanksgiving Day.

Thanksgiving is a popular holiday in Canada and the U.S. Many traditions have been borne of the holiday, and it is a favorite time of year for many people.





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

## Winterberry Holly Blazes In Color

As the beautiful fall-colored leaves drop and we transition into winter, winterberry holly (Ilex verticillata) is sure to catch your eye. The berries are especially prominent when the holly is planted in front of evergreens. Unlike most hollies, winterberry holly is deciduous which adds to the “berry” pleasing display on its bare branches during the plant’s namesake winter months. While red berry varieties of the holly tend to be most popular, there are gold and orange cultivars, as well.

Ilex verticillata is native to eastern North America (USDA plant hardiness zones 3 to 9) where it typically occurs in wetlands or along lakes and stream banks. The shrub is slow growing and may reach up to 15 feet in the wild, but tend to be smaller in the home landscape. Though commonly found in wet areas, winterberry holly is easily grown in average, well-drained, acidic soils with adequate moisture. Generally the shrubs are pest and disease free, but they can be susceptible to leaf spots and powdery mildew. They may readily sucker to form a colony in wet sites, and remain in a tighter clump with drier soils. Winterberry holly will grow in part shade, however their best fruit production occurs in full sun at sites that receive six or more hours of sunlight a day.

The shrub has elliptical, toothed leaves that are two to three

inches long, and it develops inconspicuous, greenish-white flowers in late spring. Most importantly, Ilex verticillata is dioecious, meaning that some plants are male and some female. To enjoy the bountiful berries for which this plant is cherished, you must plant both male and female plants in your landscape. One male plant can pollinate five to 10 females and should be planted within 40 to 50 feet. It is also important to match bloom times when selecting a male pollinator. Some bloom earlier than others, and the more overlap you can achieve, the better the berry production will be.

Winterberry holly is quite versatile in the landscape. As mentioned earlier, the plant is stunning with an evergreen backdrop. Shrubs can also be used as hedges, borders, foundation plantings, native gardens, rain gardens, and for wildlife. Ilex verticillata attracts many species of songbirds, as well as butterflies and beneficial insects, including bees and other pollinators. The berries make a wonderful addition to holiday arrangements. In fact, December is a good time to do any needed pruning, or otherwise wait until late winter and prune before new growth appears.

You can see winterberry hollies in person growing at all three locations of the University of Tennessee Gardens.

Popular winterberry holly cultivars with their recommended pollinators include:

‘Winter Red’ grows 6 to 8 feet tall, multi-stemmed, abundance of red berries.

Pollinator, ‘Southern Gentleman’ grows 6 to 8 feet tall.

‘Winter Gold’ grows 5 to 8 feet tall, dense, heavy fruiting orange-yellow berries.

Pollinator, ‘Southern

Gentleman’ grows 6 to 8 feet tall.

‘Nana’ (Red Sprite) dwarf cultivar grows to 3 feet, bright red berries.

Pollinator, ‘Jim Dandy’ grows 3 to 6 feet.

‘Berry Poppins’ dwarf cultivar grows 3 to 4 feet, display of red berries.

Pollinator, ‘Mr. Poppins’ grows 3 to 4 feet.

‘Berry Heavy’ grows 6 to 8 feet, bright red berries.

Pollinator, ‘Mr. Poppins’ grows 3 to 4 feet.

‘Berry Heavy Gold’ grows 6 to 8 feet, big, bright gold fruit.

Pollinator, ‘Mr. Poppins’ grows 3 to 4 feet.

The UT Gardens includes plant collections located in Knoxville, Crossville and Jackson, Tennessee. Designated as the official botanical garden for the State of Tennessee, the UT Gardens are part of the UT Institute of Agriculture. The Gardens’ mission is to foster appreciation, education and stewardship of plants through garden displays, educational programs and research trials. The Gardens are open during all seasons and free to the public.



# TN Department of Human Services Continue

ChildcareTennessee, TN Department of Human Services Continue Partnership Supporting Child Care Programs

The Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee and the Tennessee Department of Human Services have extended their partnership supporting licensed child care providers across the state.

ChildcareTennessee, an initiative of The Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee, administers several grants, provides free administrative resources on [ChildcareTennessee.com](http://ChildcareTennessee.com) and discounts on products, and services child care programs use every day.

"I have never had the type of support ChildcareTennessee offers," said Sandy Greene, owner of The Greene House Children's Center in Dunlap, Tennessee. "The resources are amazing, and the discounts are really helpful."

Support and Enhancement, Supplemental, Establishment and Expansion Grants are all still available to licensed child care programs, along with two new additional Supplemental Grants.

In the past year, 60 new licensed child care programs have been established and 18 programs expanded with the assistance of Establishment and Expansion grants — accounting for 3,544 new child care slots across the state.

The Establishment and Expansion grants allow eligible child care

providers to apply for up to \$1,000 per licensed child care slot of new capacity, up to a maximum of \$100,000 per program. ChildcareTennessee will continue to work with the Department of Human Services' Pre-Licensure and Licensing teams in their collective effort to create more licensed child care capacity through these grants.

"With the initial success of the Establishment and Expansion Grants, our team is excited to see what more will be accomplished in the coming year," said Anne Clem, ChildcareTennessee grants manager.

New Supplemental Grants will support directors pursuing the Tennessee Early Childhood Program Administrator Credential through the Tennessee Early Childhood Training Alliance, as well as educators who complete preschool and pre-K specialization training with the Tennessee Child Care Resource & Referral Network.

"The Tennessee Early Childhood Program Administrator Credential (TECPAC) helps directors examine their programs, set goals, and increase program quality," said Rhonda Laird, TECPAC program manager.

"The Supplemental Grant helps programs invest in materials that ease the transformation to higher quality," Laird continued. "Investing in our child care program administrators means higher quality care for children and families

across Tennessee."

Supplemental Grants already are making an impact across the state.

A total of \$54,000 has been distributed to 48 programs in the past six months, with grants used for infant/toddler specialization education and program accreditation.

Licensed child care programs can continue to apply for playground equipment, classroom supplies and furniture, curriculum and other items and services associated with running their programs through Support and Enhancement Grants.

Programs that participate in the Child Care Certificate Program or are located in an economically distressed county are eligible for an extra \$1,000. Economically distressed counties as identified by the state for this current grant cycle are Lake, Hardeman, Perry, Clay, Grundy, Bledsoe, Morgan, Scott, Hancock and Cocke.

"Since 1994, The Foundation has worked diligently with organizations to create and expand child care access in Tennessee," said Ellen Lehman, president of The Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee. "These grants are an important investment in child care providers and Tennessee's children and have been needed in all the intervening years."

The ChildcareTennessee/TDHS partnership also provides other services. An administrative website, [ChildcareTennessee.com](http://ChildcareTennessee.com), features more than 2,600 resources

to assist child care directors and owners with administrative tasks, from human resources to staying compliant with federal and state regulations. These resources alleviate some of the administrative load so directors can focus on what matters most — more than 171,000 of Tennessee's children.

Since October 2019, thanks to the partnership with TDHS, ChildcareTennessee has distributed nearly \$79 million in Support and Enhancement, Supplemental, Establishment, Expansion and Disaster and Emergency Grants to licensed child care programs across the state.

Applications for all of these grants are open through September 30, 2023. Providers can apply at [ChildcareTennessee.com](http://ChildcareTennessee.com).

Jackson County UD# 3 water System recently violated Federal Drinking Water standards. Although this situation does not require that you take immediate action, you as a customer, have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what was done to correct this situation.

During the **January 1st 2022 through September 30, 2022** compliance period, Jackson County UD#3 exceeded the Locational Running Average (LRAA) Maximum contaminant Levels (MCL) as indicated below.

Jackson County UD#3 2022 LRAA for **Total Haloacetic Acids** has exceeded the MCL of 0.060mg/L at stage 2 monitoring site. The LRAA at Site #101 at George Green -Max PT has been calculated to 0.06818mg/L. This exceeds the Maximum Contaminant Level of 0.060mg/L.

Some people who drink water containing **Haloacetic** acids in excess of MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problem with their liver, kidneys or central nervous systems, or may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

During the **January 1st through September 30, 2022** compliance period the water system's Locational running Annual Average (LRAA) at site #101 George Green-Max PT, Total Trihalomethanes (TTHM) has been calculated to be **0.09978 mg/1**. This value exceeds the Maximum Containment level of 0.080mg/1 set for this parameter.

**Please note that that we pull three more paired samples at the same time as we pull the max point sample, and all of the results are much lower than required EPA Standards.**

The actual risk has been identified as 1 out of 10000 people may get cancer if they drink 2 liters of water each day for 70 years. You do not need to boil your water or take other actions. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

**Haloacetic Acids and Total Trihalomethanes** are disinfection by products resulting from our chlorination of the water to minimize risk of microbial life in the drinking water. The EPA considers microbial contaminants as the greatest risk to the public. We are evaluating the results of the required disinfected and will continue making an effort to reduce the disinfection by products without increasing the microbial risks.

We are increasing our norman Flushing procedures in an effort to reduce the levels of the Haloacetic Acids and total Trihalomethanes.

**Apple Cider Cookies**  
Ingredients  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 package (0.74 oz) apple cider instant drink mix (do not prepare)  
1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
1 pouch (17.5 oz) Betty Crocker™ sugar cookie mix  
1/2 cup butter, softened  
1 egg  
3/4 cup finely chopped peeled apple (1 medium)  
Directions  
Heat oven to 375°F. In small bowl, mix sugar, 1 teaspoon of the apple cider drink mix and 1/2 teaspoon of the cinnamon; set aside.  
In large bowl, stir cookie mix, softened butter, egg, remaining apple cider drink mix and cinnamon with spoon until soft dough forms. Stir in apple pieces until combined. Shape dough into 40 (1 1/4-inch) balls. Roll balls in sugar-spice mixture. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Discard sugar-spice mixture after rolling balls.  
Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until edges are set and light golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 20 minutes. Store covered in airtight container.

**Easy Pumpkin Pie Cookies**  
Ingredients  
Cookie Base and Topping  
1 pouch (1 lb 1.5 oz) Betty Crocker™ sugar cookie mix  
1/4 cup cold butter  
4 oz (half of 8-oz package) cold cream cheese  
Pumpkin Filling  
3 oz cream cheese, well-softened  
2 tablespoons sugar  
3 tablespoons canned pumpkin (not pumpkin pie mix)  
2 teaspoons Gold Medal™ all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice  
Directions  
Heat oven to 350°F. Generously spray bottoms and sides of 24 regular-size muffin cups with cooking spray. Place cookie mix in large bowl. remaining pumpkin filling ingredients; mix well. Place 1 rounded teaspoon pumpkin filling in center of each cookie. Sprinkle each with 2 teaspoons reserved cookie topping.  
Bake 18 to 20 minutes or until edges of cookies are golden brown. Cool completely in pan, about 30 minutes. Run metal spatula around edge of cookies in muffin tin to loosen.  
**Orange Chocolate Slice and Bake Cookies**  
Ingredients  
1 pouch (17.5 oz) Betty Crocker™ sugar cookie mix  
Butter and egg called for on cookie mix pouch for drop cookies  
3/4 cup 70% cacao bittersweet chocolate chunks  
1/3 cup coarsely chopped slivered almonds, toasted  
1 tablespoon coarsely chopped orange peel  
1/4 cup coarse sparkling white sugar  
Directions  
Make dough as directed on pouch for drop cookies. Stir in chocolate chunks, almonds and orange peel.  
Divide dough in half; shape each half into a roll, 8 inches long and 2 inches in diameter. Roll in sugar. Wrap dough logs tightly with plastic. Refrigerate about 2 hours or until very firm.  
Heat oven to 375°F. Unwrap 1 of the dough logs; cut into 1/2-inch slices. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets, reshaping if necessary. Repeat with remaining dough log.  
Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are set. Cool 2 minutes; remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 1 1/2 hours or until chocolate is set. Store covered in airtight container.
