Newly elected Kirksville City Councilmembers were sworn in on April 11, after winning seats in April 5 election.



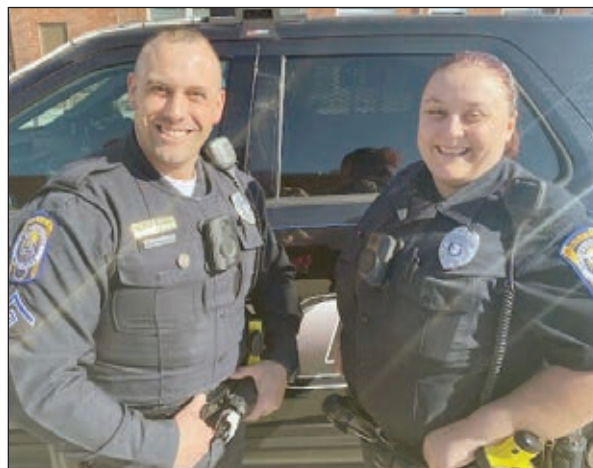
Zac Burden is sworn in on April 11 after winning a seat on the Kirkville City Council for the second time on April 5. Burden was chosen to be mayor by the new city council.

## Kirksville Police Department adds two Marine Patrol officers

Kirksville Police Department Master Police Officer Jake Roberts and Officer Ashley Davis have completed the Missouri State Highway Patrol Boat Operations course and have become the department's newest Marine Patrol officers.

In an effort to increase safety of all boaters and lake visitors, the Kirksville Police Department will be stepping up operations at Forest Lake and Hazel Creek this summer. Along with Officer Ray Jagger, these two new officers will be conducting safety inspections, boat permit enforcement, and Boating While Intoxicated enforcement.

"Let's work together and prevent drownings and lake accidents," Kirksville police officials said in a press release. "Make sure you have adequate life preservers on-board and don't drink and operate a motorized boat."

Forest Lake and Hazel Creek Lake are two city-owned properties that lay outside the Kirksville city limits. ## City's Think 2040 Comprehensive Plan moves into new stage of assessment

The Kirksville City Council held discussion on the city's Think 2040 Comprehensive Plan at a study session held on April 11. City Planner Mary Turner, in a staff report, wrote that the implementation phase of the plan began with the majority of 33 strategy teams meeting in the summer and fall of 2021, then some strategy teams were combined in hopes to improve efficiency and reduce redundancy in meeting content.



"That effort was successful," Turner wrote. "There may be additional opportunities for combining strategy teams. The current goal for implementation is for all teams to meet quarterly and for the assigned City point person to provide progress reports in the form of action plans containing action items."

Turner provided a spreadsheet to council members listing completed and ongoing objectives being overseen by various committee team leaders. She said that nearly all

teams met in the first quarter of 2022 and that she was hopeful the momentum would continue.

Councilman John Gardner said that he had attended many of the committee meetings and that the groups are moving forward. He said that assessing the progress of the committees was the next stage for the council to consider. He said that at one meeting he attended, there were people representing many

## Police seek public's help in locating suspect

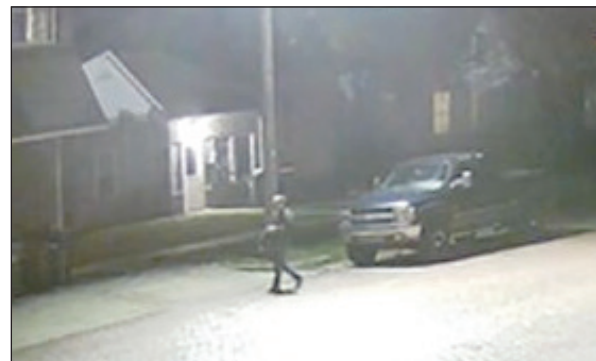

differing sectors of the community with many different agendas, which he said was a good thing. He said that the chairs or department heads needed to determine what the success of the committee would look like. Mayor Zac Burden said that there were some good ideas and good discussion and that a lot of people that had little opportunity to discuss things together before have been having good experiences in doing so now. “That’s healthy for the comprehensive plan but also for just general communication that happens throughout town,” Burden said. “So I’ve been pleased with the meetings I’ve been a part of. I’m really pleased that at this stage of the game there’s not a whole lot of ‘no’, there’s a lot of, ‘let’s talk about it and see where we go with it.’ I think that’s an important part.” Burden said that as they begin to move into an assessment phase, it will change to determining what the actual steps need to be moving forward. He said that evaluation is valuable and that he has seen a lot of ideas from people in the room and people in the community. “I’m overall really positive,” Burden said, offering appreciation to the committee members who keep their efforts moving forward. Gardner said that they were getting to a point where they need to determine what success actually looks like. He said that groups have been consolidated because oftentimes

the discussions were the same. “I think we’ve kind of nailed down what it is that each of those groups are talking about and what are those ideas and now we switch to the assessment process,” Gardner said. He said that getting word out to the community about the groups would be vital to getting more involvement and more feedback. He said that he feels there are people in the community that are interested in the topics being discussed but that they don’t know how to join in. City Manager Mari Macomber said that the city is in the process of hiring a communications director that she hoped could help in the process of bringing more voices to the committees. She said that they’ve gotten into a mode of, “this is how we have to do it” making it difficult for staff to navigate how to track and move forward. Councilmember Jennifer Walston asked to integrate the different commissions by notifying all of the them of upcoming meeting dates so that they would have an opportunity to attend. Macomber said that city staff was being left with all the work after committee meetings and that work needed to be spread among committee members to keep everyone more engaged. “I think developing measurable goals is a great first step because once you have that measurable goal, then you can break it down into specific tasks, that you could open it up and say, ‘we could use some help with this, who’s interested in that,’”

Walston said. “I do think that articulating specific goals is the first step toward that. Ownership will be greater if people on the committees do something in between meetings, myself included.” Macomber said that when sending out meeting notifications, they might include a note that they’re looking for people to work on the action items that will be presented at the meeting. “That’s not unreasonable to ask,” Gardner said. “If people are not willing to come to a meeting prepared for the things they said they would do, they need to ask themselves, ‘should I really be on that committee?’” Burden said that most people when presented with a challenge or request will respond to it. He that in upcoming strategy meetings, they should make clear people need to take on tasks and responsibilities so the burden is not just on city staff. “I think most people would rise to that challenge and be willing to do that,” he said.

In accordance with Section 117 of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA), as amended by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986 (SARA), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has developed an Explanation of Significant Differences (ESD) to document a change in the remedy for the monitoring portion of the decision for the Former Kirksville AFS Site. The site is located on the west side of U.S. Highway 63, approximately six miles north of Kirksville. The change concerns vapor intrusion monitoring at the site.

In the Record of Decisions (ROD) signed in November 2009, the selected remedy consisted of enhanced biodegradation with monitoring and alternative water supply. The remedy selected in the ROD stated that USACE would evaluate the vapor intrusion pathway as part of the Five-Year Review. The first Five-Year Review determined that a Vapor Intrusion Study was required to determine if there was risk to human health. In 2017, USACE conducted a Vapor Intrusion Study, which concluded that there was no current risk due to vapor intrusion. However, the contaminant concentrations in the sub-slab vapor samples were high enough that concentrations in indoor air could pose a future risk to human health at the FAA Facility if the vapor pathway were completed. This ESD adds routine vapor intrusion monitoring to evaluate possible future vapor intrusion risk. The ROD remains protective and continues to meet Applicable or Relevant and Appropriate Requirements for the site.

# Kirksville fire chief says ballot measure will make permanent \$1 device fee

Kirksville Fire Chief Jon Cook, who also serves as the city's 911 director, spoke to the Kirksville City Council about the E911 Joint Services Board's progress towards meeting its goals in the city's strategic plan at a study session held on April 11 at Kirksville City Hall.

Cook said that a ballot measure approved by Kirksville voters in 2019 that charged a \$1 device fee, was due to sunset in October 2023. He said that the board, after considerable study and deliberation, will ask voters to continue the \$1 device fee, this time without a sunset, on the August ballot. In a staff report, Cook said that the device fee revenue has stabilized at approximately \$186,000 per year, which accounts for 20 percent of 2022 operating costs, approximately the same percentage of operating costs as was provided by the original landline fee when the 911 Center was established in 2000, he wrote.

"We're hopeful that will be successful," he told the council. "I think we'll be able to show taxpayers we've done what we said we're going to do when they passed that originally, so I'm hopeful they will continue it."

Cook told the council that they had received a grant of over \$600,000 that will be used to replace the 911 phone system and the interfaces with all the radios.



"Those are the two biggest dollar ticket items a far as infrastructure downstairs at the 911 center," he said, noting that they are working at getting it replaced and that the request for proposal draft is complete.

He said that the plan to move the 911 center to a larger room next door to its current location hit a roadblock, having received just one bid that was more than expected. He said they are looking to move some of the logistics in-house and look at sub-contracting some components of the work.

He said that they are full-staffed after two years of challenge — but they are in a "really good spot right now." He said that past staffing problems were due to not having a good mechanism in place to train employees. He said that by adding a third console in the 911 call room, that would be a spot to put a trainee.

Cook said that they have about a 60 percent attrition rate for new hires over the last five years. He said that they have found

a computer-based assessment exam that measures an applicants basic ability to do the job.

"Multi-tasking, the ability to hear information and be able to retain that and enter it into the computer," were skills Cook told the council the test would determine. "I haven't done the math but we had everybody take it. I took it, all the incumbent dispatchers took it and they all felt it was a really good representation of the job."

He said that applicants don't always realize how busy the dispatcher position is and how many tasks have to be done at the same time.

"I was blown away by the sheer volume of work they have to do in a short amount of time," he said, noting that with the assessment test, they are securing more qualified candidates. "So far its worked very well."

Mayor Zac Burden told Cook he appreciated his leadership and that in a very short order of time they were improving the quality of what they are offering.

Deric Doporto announced his commitment to Central Methodist on Wednesday in a gym full of family, friends and teammates.

“It means a lot to me because it’s always been my dream to just go out there and play,” Doporto said. “I’m blessed to even have the chance to. A lot of people don’t get a second chance after high school, so I’m more than grateful to be able to go on and play.”

Doporto had a stellar career in green and yellow. He was one of the strongest and most physically imposing players in the area. He had plenty of natural strength bestowed upon him, but he didn’t settle for that. Doporto’s always training, and not just with weights, but also to improve his footwork.

“The one thing I always think about with him is, he’s got so much natural, gifted strength that he could’ve still been one of the strongest kids that’s come through here since I’ve been here,” said Milan coach John Dabney. “But do you want to be one of the better ones in the state? Doporto was a bruising runner, typically like a bowling ball crashing down the lane and leaving pins in its wake. He ran for 1,762 yards and 14 touchdowns this past season as a senior. He did that as the featured runner, getting 296 carries for the Wildcats.

Plenty of talented runners have performed well in Dabney’s Wing T offense and he called Doporto an exact prototype for what he wants in a fullback. If the Wildcats needed one yard, Doporto could get that and more.

# Woodruff returns to form as Brewers defeat Cardinals 5-1

MILWAUKEE — Brandon Woodruff wasted no time bouncing back from an uncharacteristically poor performance in his season debut.

Woodruff threw five shutout innings, Omar Narváez homered and doubled, and the Milwaukee Brewers opened their home schedule with a 5-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals on Thursday.

“Today was a better step in terms of getting back to who I am,” Woodruff said. “I’m not quite on the train tracks yet, but I’m getting there.”

Woodruff (1-1) struck out two and allowed just three hits and a walk. The return to form came five days after he allowed seven runs — matching a career high — and lasted just 3 2/3 innings in a 9-0 loss to the Chicago Cubs. He had opened the loss to Chicago by walking three men and hitting a batter.

The two-time All-Star had no such control problems Thursday, throwing 65 of his 89 pitches for strikes.

# Former Truman players Cade McKnight, Masen Miller a package deal to Indiana State

Two former Bulldog hoopers are sticking together after transferring from Truman.

Cade McKnight and Masen Miller are moving to Division I and Indiana State. Both players entered the transfer portal in March after Truman’s season ended in the NCAA Tournament.

McKnight announced his selection of the Sycamores on April 7, with Miller following suit this week.

McKnight and Miller were both first-team All-GLVC selections this past season. McKnight, who was named an All-American for the second straight season, led the conference with 19.2 points per game. He is a graduate transfer with one year of eligibility left.

Miller, who was a great 3-point shooter in his two seasons in Kirksville, averaged 14.4 points per game

this year. He shot 45 percent from behind the arc.

Todd Aaron Golden, Sports Editor at the Terre-Haute Tribune-Star, tweeted that Miller will enter as a walk-on but could likely get a scholarship later on.

The Sycamores went 11-20 last season in Josh Schertz’s first season as head coach. Schertz rose through the Division II ranks at Lincoln Memorial before taking over Indiana State. He had 10 appearances in the Division II NCAA Tournament, and has been pulling players from that level.

“I am so excited to add a student-athlete of Cade’s caliber to our program. In between the lines, he is a two-time All-American and in the classroom, he is a First Team Academic All-American,” said Schertz in a press release about McKnight’s transfer. “Cade has a fantastic work ethic and is the rare player for whom winning is enough. He has a unique com-

bination of size, strength, skill, and intelligence that allows him to stand out while amplifying his teammates’ strengths. Cade McKnight is a perfect fit for our system as well as our culture here at Indiana State.”

Truman played an exhibition at Indiana State on Dec. 8, 2020, losing 80-66. Neither McKnight nor Miller played in that game.

Truman has two more transfers who have yet to make their next step known. Eric Northweather and Sam Nissen also entered the portal in March. There remains a chance they could return.

Truman coach Jeff Horner has pulled in one transfer of his own with Brandon Kracht. Kracht is a Kahoka native and Clark County grad who spent the last two seasons at John Wood Community College in Quincy. He averaged 13.8 points per game and shot 40.6 percent from behind the arc.

Pauley previously committed and signed with Missouri State and coach Amaka

Agugua-Hamilton. Agugua-Hamilton, nicknamed Coach Mox, departed Springfield in March to become the new coach at Virginia.

Pauley then de-committed from the Bears and restarted her recruiting process, landing with a familiar face.

“Throughout the recruiting process I was looking for a family atmosphere and coaches that believed in me. I found that from day 1 with (Coach Mox) and staff,” Pauley tweeted with her announcement.

Pauley averaged 33 points,

9.6 rebounds and 3.5 steals per game in her senior season at Milan, guiding the Wildcats to a second straight district title and the program’s first conference title. Her 3,074 career points rank eighth all-time in Missouri girl’s basketball history.

Virginia went 5-22 last season with a 2-14 record in the ACC, prompting the coaching change. Agugua-Hamilton went 74-15 in her three seasons at Missouri State, winning the Missouri Valley Conference and going to the NCAA Tournament twice.

# Truman State Mourns Loss Of Track & Field/Cross Country Coach Tim Schwegler

He led the Tigers to three district titles, two North Central Missouri Conference championships and had three top ten state finishes.

A moment of silence was held for Schwegler during Kirksville’s home

He returned to Truman to complete his master’s degree and served as a volunteer assistant for the women’s Cross Country/Track & Field squads.

Following his master’s degree completion, Schwegler was named the head coach at Highland (Kan.) Community College where he built a top-20 NJCAA Track and Field/Cross Country program. He coached 106 athletic all-Americans and 192 academic all-Americans during his tenure at Highland. The Scotties won eight Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference championships and were named the NJCAA Top Academic Team of the Year nine times. He was the 1999 NJCAA

Men’s Track Coach of the Year and the 2004 NJCAA Region VI Women’s Coach of the Year. He was inducted into the Highland Hall of Fame.

Schwegler returned to Truman and the Kirksville community in 2006 to serve as an assistant coach for the Bulldogs and was later elevated in 2013 to the head coaching position. During that time period, he has helped produce 25 conference champions, six NCAA Division II all-Americans, one National Champion, numerous USTFCCCA All-Academic scholars and teams, nine CoSIDA Academic All-Americans and new school records in 15 different events.

He is survived by his wife Nancy and two sons, Matt and Sam.

Not the easiest conditions to run, jump and throw in Thursday, but the Kirksville boys and Schuyler County girls made it work. Both of those teams walked away with first-place finishes at the 2022 Tiger Invitational in Kirksville.

Thursday also featured senior night activities for the Tigers' eight boys and three girls, so the boys stood tall in the last home meet of their careers.

"It's wonderful. There's no better way to finish it," said Kirksville's Prophet Krepps, who placed in three events. "Couldn't really ask for anything better."

The Tiger boys won nine events and had others place highly. They racked up 199.5 points as a team. That was ahead of La Plata in second with 74, Green City in third with 68.5 and Schuyler County in fourth with 66.

A 4x400m relay team of Ryan Harvey, Jake Amerman, Kevin Crooks and Prophet Krepps took first. Ethan Austic finished No. 1 in the 200m dash, with Tigers filling all top five spots. Krepps won the 800m in 1:05.89. Patrick Jennings and Jack Marlin

finished behind him in second and third. Owen Fraser took first in javelin and discus, plus a second-place finish in shot put. Amerman won the 400m. Crooks and Marlin were No. 1 and No. 2 in the 1600m. And the Tigers 4x200m team (Cruz Mendez, Alepio Bedford, Andrew Novencido, Austic) and 4x800m (Amerman, Krepps, Marlin, Crooks) also finished in first.

Kirksville medaled at state last spring in the 4x400m and 4x800m relays and brought three runners back on each unit. Finding a fourth person has been a work in progress. Krepps, who was on last year's 4x800m team, stepped in on the 4x400m team Thursday and hopes to keep running well to stay aboard.

"In the 4x400m especially, we've really been testing the waters with a few underclassmen and me as well," Krepps said. "I've primarily ran mid-distance. It worked out pretty well for me today ... and I think that may have been a season P.R. for us. With that performance and some consistency, I think we can be solid there."

And coach Alicia Wollmering came away pleased with Kirksville's

"We've had some rough weather, so our times haven't been super. Tonight, it was good to see some of their times drop down, even in windy conditions," Wollmering said. "So that is encouraging to me. It tells us when we get just a great day, our times should be dropping."

The Schuyler County girls are no strangers to success after winning a bunch of meets and a dis-

trict title last season. They bring a bunch of girls back from last year, leaving that winning mentality in place.

The Rams compiled 152 points to win. Kirksville took second with 133, La Plata was in fourth with 79 and Green City was in fifth with 57.

Thursday was the first meet of the spring for junior Jacie Morris after a pulled quad kept her on the sideline to start the spring. She had a solid day, winning the long jump, taking second in the 400m, running the anchor leg on a first-place 4x800m relay team with Haylee Gordon, Sidney Aeschliman and Kelsey Tallman, and being on a third-place 4x400m relay team.

"It really was a team win because with the weather conditions, it wasn't the easiest, so it's really cool to see everyone succeed in their events. It's a team win — we can't win without everyone's contributions," said Morris, a three-time state medalist last spring.

Schuyler also had a winner in the 3200m with Xavia Cullers and the Rams dominated the throwing events.

MaKinley Aeschliman, Kait Hatfield and Madison Haley finished one, two and three in shot put. Hatfield, Emilee Burns and Aeschliman did the same in discus, and Aeschliman took first in javelin. That allowed the Rams to score in bunches.

"My goal is to always get two girls in every event

because that's how you get your points," said Schuyler coach Corey Randall. "We work really hard on that. Across the board, you don't win meets unless all the girls do well. I was impressed with every single one of them."

About a month out from trying to defend their district title, the Rams hope to be rolling at the right time. With a team full of kids that Randall can't keep off the track, they'll battle for a repeat.

"It's really easy to just go out there and run and not give it your all," Morris said. "But we have a lot of kids that put everything they have into it and they want to get better, so they continue to set goals and try to break them."

"Sometimes when the holes aren't there, you

have to be able to make one," Dabney said. "He was definitely someone who could make a hole for himself, get an extra yard or two that might not have

been there. I can't say enough great things about him. Definitely someone who brings fear into (opposing players) — knowing you're gonna have to

tackle this guy for 48 minutes. You may stop him for a series or two, but you have to keep doing it."

Whether it was dragging players or delivering some of the stiffest stiff arms, Doporto made room.

"There's times where you see a pile wrapped around him and it just keeps moving up another two or three yards," Dabney said.

Doporto said that ability was born out of a mindset he crafted from early advice in the sport.

"I was always told if they're not gonna move, go through them," Doporto said. "No matter how big they are, they always fall. ... I kept it as a mentality that no matter how bigger or how better someone says they are, they always have a downfall, too."

For his career, Doporto

had 4,237 rushing yards and 41 touchdowns. He also had 21 two-point conversions in his career and 288 points scored. He was just as good on the defensive side as a lineman. He had 51 tackles and three sacks last fall.

Doporto said CMU's coaches told him his future is likely at running back, which he is just fine with. He will also do track at CMU, planning to throw shot put.

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Kirksville tennis part of three-way tie for annual Under the Lights title
