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
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#### THIS FAMILY OWNED BAR HAS SEEN GENERATIONS OF **STUDENTS PASS THORUGH**

Like any good college town, Kirksville knows how to throw a party. With thousands of students flooding the city between September and June, the city's club scene offers a variety of venues to unwind and relax in. Whether it's to dance, watch a football game or to socialize with friends. Kirksville has something for everyone.

The king of the local club scene though, might just have to be the DuKum Inn, which has been entertaining guests at the same location since 1938, longer than any other nearby saloon. The club has been operated by the Shorten family (Craig, Gina and Chade — who grew up in the DuKum) since 1987 and it draws a clientele from an array of differing backgrounds and generations. It's a place,

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as the old-timers say, "where the rich man can rub elbows with the poor man" A place you can put everything aside and have a beer and a conversation.

"The history is the biggest attraction," said Craig Shorten. "There's been so many people pass through our doors and there's not a week goes by that somebody hadn't been here in at least 10 to 20, 30 and even 40 years. If they get back to Kirksville they're checking out their old haunt, you know, the places they used to go."

With a transient student population, many generations of families have attended Truman State or A.T. Still and have ate and/or drank at the DuKum Inn.

Once a man came in with some friends and told Chade, "My dad and grandpa drank at this bar." Chade told him, "no" and led him and his friends upstairs where the original bar from 1938 (that was decommissioned around 2002), is still being used

for special events. She let the man sit at the bar while she chatted with his friends and when they turned around, the man, who had already had a few drinks, was crying.

"He was overcome with emotion," Chade said. "He's at the same place and like, that's cool. Like you should get to be able to do that — you should get to be able to go to med school the same place and get to go have those experiences."

Craig talked about another emotional experience when on A.T. Still Founder's Day in 1988, shortly after he had purchased the bar, a doctor from Indiana in town for his 50th reunion, sat at a table drinking a beer, sharing how he had sat at that same table 50 years earlier and had not been back since.

"Right then I went, now I know what I got," Craig said. "Now. I understand what I have."

With so many students having attended Truman State and A.T. Still since 1938, the DuKum Inn has provided a memorable experience to thousands and thousands of friends, families and visitors.

The DuKum offers its visitors the second best cheeseburger in town, though where the best cheeseburger is being served, no one knows. They just feel that being second best is very acceptable and it's an honor they relish.

The DuKum features 24 draft beers from brewery's both near and far that include Pale Ales, Stouts, Lagers and Pilsners. They have widescreen TVs surrounding the bar so visitors can catch all the sports action from football, basketball, baseball and more.

Thursday's are college nights with different themes every week during the school semester and they have trivia nights where gift card prizes are given out.

The Dukum Inn is located at 111 S. Elson Street in downtown Kirksville. They are open on Sunday and Monday from 2 p.m. to 12 a.m., and Tuesday through Saturday from noon to 1:30 a.m. Daily grille hours are 5-8:30 p.m.



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

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
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## Christmas in Kirksville
