Green City Chamber of Commerce invites community to a special July 4th celebration

Save the date: July 3 and 4, 2024.

As part of the Green City Chamber of Commerce July 4th Celebration and Fireworks Display, the chamber welcomes the community to join them on July 3 and July 4 to celebrate the restoration of the 1931 Shell Filling Station off the southeast corner of the square where Fred (Killer) Burke was first identified and was later captured at Green City on March 26, 1931. They will also have two authors and historians coming to the Green City Museum.

"Bloody Chicago" was the name given to America's most corrupt city after the grotesque scene that left seven humans embedded into masonry walls and oil-slicked concrete. Two Thompson submachine guns did most of the damage but the masterminds behind the St. Valentine's Day Massacre escaped.

Ten months later, on Dec. 14, 1929, in St. Joseph, Mich. while working a routine traffic crash Police Officer Charles Skelly came face to face with a killer. Shots were fired, the assailant escaped, and the dying Officer Skelly identified his murderer before taking his last breath. The trail led to a home in Stevensville, Mich. where authorities found an arsenal of weaponry, over \$300,000 worth of stolen bonds, bulletproof vests, and two Thompson submachine guns. The hideout belonged to Fred Burke, a highly sought suspect in the St. Valentine's Day Massacre and now the most wanted man in the nation.

Chriss Lyon, is a retired public safety professional and historian who has not only walked the beat, but shot the most famous Thompson submachine guns in the world, all while documenting and researching the historic era of the "The Roaring Twenties." Using techniques of forensic genealogy combined with investigative research, she has been able to uncover little known facts about the people and events surrounding the St. Valentine's Day Massacre using police reports that had never been published, interviews with family members of key witnesses, and leading experts.

Historian Lyon established the foundation for what would develop as a haven for gangsters from the onset of the Prohibition Era through to the mid-20th century, while revealing new information about the eventual capture of notorious gangster Fred "Killer" Burke on a farm northwest of Green City. Lyon is the author of "A killing in CAPONE'S PLAYGROUND, The Story of the Hunt for the Most Dangerous Man Alive."

Enfys (ENvis) McMurry, author of, "Centerville, The Mid-America Saga and Disaster at 39,000 Feet" is a Welsh American writer and public speaker.

The authors and the Green City Historical Museum are looking for previously untold or lost stories and artifacts from families and area citizens about the capture of Fred (Killer) Burke and stories about Harvey Bailey and other gangsters. Help them save that intriguing part of Green City history for the

generations to come. Please visit and share your story with the authors before it is lost forever.

Meet & greet with Chriss Lyon and Enfys McMurry, at the Book Nook (Green City Library) housed on the first floor of the Green City Museum.

"The Capture of Fred Burke", the movie filmed on location in Green City in 1931, will be shown every hour on the hour starting at 1 p.m. The cast of the film are all the original people involved with the capture and local area citizens, except for Fred Burke.

Thursday, July 4 at City Hall 2 p.m. and repeated at 6 p.m.: The authors and historians will have historical displays about Fred (Killer) Burke and Chriss Lyon will have presentations about her findings regarding the history of Fred (Killer) Burke.

The Famous Shell Filling Station and Historic Depot:

Open to public July 4, 1-4 p.m. Green City Museum special display: Harvey Bailey (Dean of American Bank Robbers) open to public July 3, 1-5 p.m. and July 4, 1-4 p.m.

Kirksville police seek wanted person, Dakota Wayne Gibson

The Kirksville Police Department and other local law enforcement are seeking the public's assistance in apprehending Dakota Wayne Gibson. Gibson currently has felony warrants for his arrest for domestic assault, stealing, resisting arrest, 1st degree assault, and unlawful possession of a firearm.

Gibson is a white male, 30 years old, 5'6" tall, 180 lbs., with brown hair and brown eyes. Gibson has the word "HONKY" tattooed on his chest and Browning deer head logo on his abdomen. His left arm is sleeved out with tattoos to include fishing lures, a woman, skulls, iron cross and anchor. Gibson has the names "MCFARLAND" and "MAHURIN", as well as skulls and demon faces tattooed on his right arm. Gibson has a tattoo on his back that reads "LAKEY" and tattoos on his left leg of arrow heads, "660" and doodles. Gibson sometimes wears eye glasses.

Gibson has fled from law enforcement on two occasions in the last 30 days. The first of which occurred in Kirksville on May 22, when an officer attempted to stop a vehicle Gibson was driving. Gibson did not stop and fled

the vehicle on foot on Missouri Street, west of Osteopathy Street. Law enforcement were unable to apprehend Gibson on that date.

On June 20, law enforcement received a report that Gibson was seen with a female and a white minivan in the rural southwest part of Adair County. An Adair County Sheriff's Deputy attempted to stop the white van Gibson was driving and Gibson again fled. Gibson later fled this vehicle on foot and entered a heavily wooded area near Montgomery Woods Conservation Area.



Several agencies including the Kirksville Police Department, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Missouri Conservation Department, Brookfield Police Department, and Linn County Sheriff's Department assisted in the search but were unable to apprehend Gibson.

Police would also like to remind the public that anyone providing assistance such as transportation, lodging or financial help to a wanted person can be charged with hindering prosecution.

Arrest made in shots fired investigation

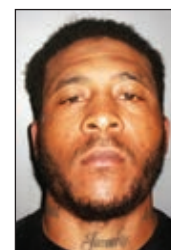

These two groups exchanged words, had a physical altercation and shots were fired. No persons were struck by gunfire; however, one vehicle was hit.

Firework sales may have begun, but fireworks may only be used within the city of Kirksville from June 30 to July 5, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 11 p.m., on your own property. However, if a complaint is received

and verified by the Kirksville Police Department as a disturbance of the peace, discharging shall immediately cease. Those complaints can be made on the non-emergency line at 660-665-5621. "Please use caution when lighting fireworks to prevent injuries and property damage," police officials said.



Street repairs in South Cottage Grove Avenue area starting June 26

The city of Kirksville's asphalt contractor, W.L. Miller, will begin street repairs on Wednesday, June 26.

The streets being repaired include:

- Cottage Lane Avenue
- East George Street, from South Cottage Grove Avenue to the end of the street.
- East Patterson Street, from South Baltimore Street to South Cottage Grove Avenue.
- East Jefferson Street, from South Baltimore Street to South Cottage Grove Avenue.
- South Cottage Grove Avenue, from East Hamilton Street to East Harrison Street.

Work will begin with Cottage Lane, George Street, Patterson Street and Jefferson Street before moving to Cottage Grove Avenue. This work is expected to last about 10 days, depending on the weather.

These repairs include milling the old street surface and overlaying new asphalt. Traffic control will be in effect, and may be reduced to one lane, or possibly closed at times, during construction. Street parking will not be allowed during construction. The traveling public is strongly encouraged to use caution and drive slowly through work areas.

Northeast Regional Medical Center seeks to deliver radiation oncology cancer care services

Northeast Regional Medical Center has filed an application for a Certificate of Need (CON) to bring a new linear accelerator to its campus. Linear accelerators use high energy x-rays or electrons that conform to a tumor's shape to destroy cancer cells while sparing healthy tissue surrounding the tumor. Radiation oncology, using a linear accelerator, is an extremely effective treatment that can be used to treat many types of cancer.

"Cancer care has been offered on the Northeast Regional Medical Center campus for the past 25 years and we are proud of our ability to support life-saving cancer treatments close to home for local residents," said Patrick Avila, chief ex-

ecutive officer of Northeast Regional Medical Center. "With our CON application now filed, we have an opportunity to enhance cancer services on our campus."

The Missouri Health Facilities Review Committee is scheduled to decide on the CON application during its August meeting.

Avila went on to say, "It is our desire to move forward with all of the approvals and preparations necessary to offer radiation oncology. We look forward to working with physicians and other partners in the community to deliver advanced treatments for cancer."

A.T. Still University and Northeast Regional Medical Center are also working toward potential enhancements to the cancer program over time, including exploring opportunities for

a new educational resource center, cancer screening events, navigation programs, connections to social services, and caregiver support programs.

While the likelihood of surviving cancer continues to increase, the number of new cancer cases in the U.S. is expected to surpass two million in 2024, and, increasingly, cancer is affecting younger people. Prevention, screening and early detection, diagnosis, and effective treatment are keys to further reducing cancer mortality.

"That's our goal at Northeast Regional — we want to help our community minimize cancer risk, and when someone in our community is diagnosed with cancer, we want to stand ready to provide the services needed to fight and win the battle

against cancer," said Avila. "We are diligently working toward approval of our CON application in August."

The Dump Truck Daddy

In 1977, when I was about 5 years old, my father bought a new Ford dump truck for his one-man landscaping business. It was big, green, and loud. My 11-year-old brother Greg and I thought this was the greatest thing that could have ever happened to us.

We were young and easily impressed with large machinery. Our dad buying a dump truck meant we were a sure bet to win the neighborhood "My dad is better than your dad" contest. After all, we were the only kids we knew whose dad got paid to play in the dirt.

On the Fourth of July, just days after the dump truck came to live at our house, we had a backyard cookout. Mom and Dad invited some of their friends over, and Greg and I invited every kid on our block with instructions to wear swimsuits.

While the parents grilled hot dogs, the kids fought over who was next in line to run through the water sprinkler. Suddenly, Dad disappeared, and minutes later, we heard the roar of the dump truck's engine starting up in the lot beside our house. The sound grew louder and soon we saw the truck rounding the corner, heading right for us. Everyone cleared the path as Dad backed the new truck into the center of the yard.

He got out and didn't say anything but grabbed the water hose and tossed it over the side of the truck's bed. Then he went about crafting a makeshift water seal out of an old rubber inner tube from a tractor tire, and he shoved it in the crack of the tailgate so the water wouldn't leak out. My mother thought he was nuts, of course, but it wasn't the strangest thing she'd ever known him to do, so she resumed cooking hot dogs while her friends stood around murmuring, "What in the world..."

Soon, the dump truck's bed began to fill with cool water, and Dad gave us the go-ahead. We climbed onto the top of the truck's cab and jumped in. I was little enough so that the water at the deepest end was over my head. Soon, about 10 kids were swimming in that

truck bed, splashing, diving for pennies, and thoroughly happy to have gone from sharing one wimpy water sprinkler to doing the backstroke in a dump truck.

The parents took pictures, knowing it was perhaps the only time they'd see their kid jumping into a dump truck swimming pool. After that day, the truck went on work duty, hauling topsoil, tree limbs, and pea gravel from job to job.

Sometimes, Dad would bring home some "extra dirt." He'd let my brother pull the levers that made the hydraulic steel cylinders tilt the truck bed to a high angle until the dirt cascaded into a heap in our yard. This kind of dramatic event attracted every kid within a two-mile radius of our house. We all played "King of the Mountain" and other games on this dirt pile until it was trampled down, almost even with the yard, or until the next load of "extra dirt" got brought home.

The dump truck put in years of service in our family landscaping business, suffering through cracked windshields, dented sides, worn-out engine parts, and well over a hundred thousand miles. The green interior turned dark gray from years of accumulated dirt and oil, and the black rubber floor mats grew large holes.

And to this day, so many years after that Fourth of July "pool party," I still have a soft spot for dump trucks. And I can't help but smile when I see them chugging toward construction sites around town. They remind me of home and of dad, and of good times.

And they always make me want to go for a swim.

Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month

Welcome to the Public Health Corner: Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month

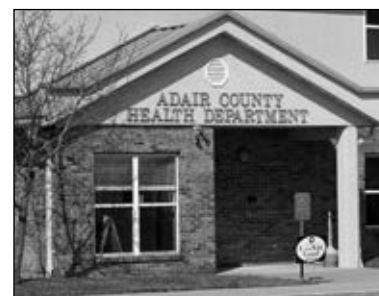
Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month is dedicated to increasing awareness about sickle cell disease (SCD), understanding its impact, and promoting resources for those affected. SCD is a group of inherited red blood cell disorders that can cause severe pain, organ damage, and other serious health complications. It's essential to recognize the challenges faced by individuals with SCD, provide support, and advocate for effective treatments and research.

Understanding Sickle Cell Disease

EMBRACING LOCAL HISTORY

Part 108

Journey to America — The Early Webers

This story begins in France but ends in Adair County, Missouri. A man named Jean Jacques Weber was born in France about 1776, the same year that the Second Continental Congress of the new United States adopted the Declaration of Independence, the document which explained to the world why the Thirteen Colonies considered themselves as independent, sovereign states no longer subject to British rule.

Jacques was of German ancestry, born in the town of Hermerswiller in Wissembourg, Bas-Rhin, France. This region was in the northeast of France near the German border about 80 miles from Stuttgart. Bas-Rhin is a department within the Alsace-Lorraine area which has a complicated history. Alsace-Lorraine was the name given to the 5,067 square miles of territory that was ceded by France to Germany in 1871 after the Franko-German War. This territory was returned to France in 1919 after World War I. It was ceded again to Germany in 1940 during World War II, and was again returned to France in 1945.

When Jacques came of age in about 1796, it was the era when Napoleon Bonaparte, the great conqueror, was coming to power. Napoleon, who was only 7 years older than Jacques Weber, seized political power in France in 1799 and made himself emperor in 1804.

Napoleon raised great armies, up to 600,000 men, motivated troops, and won unprecedented victories in Europe. War seemed like an endless pursuit in those days. Napoleon was always strategizing for new conquests because he was insatiably ambitious. Participation of his subjects in the French army was by conscription (compulsory). Jacques Weber served 14 years in Napoleon's army, achieving the rank of an officer.

He was with Napoleon in the spring of 1800 when he crossed the Alps in an attempt to surprise the Austrian army in Italy. This was a major feat for Napoleon's men who had a large amount of artillery in tow. They used pack animals to carry their supplies. Later, Napoleon had paintings made of himself crossing the Alps on a regal horse when in reality he rode on a mule which was more adept on the rough mountainous terrain.

Jacques was also with Napoleon's "Grande Armee" when they made the disastrous invasion of Russia in June 1812. Reportedly, half of Napoleon's men died when they were not able to gather food along the way and failed to prepare for Russia's harsh winter. Miraculously, Jacques Weber survived this ordeal.

Jacques would have also been in the service of Napoleon when this ambitious leader acquired the region of Louisiana in the New World in 1800. Jacques didn't know it, but his descendants would, not many years later, live in this Louisiana Territory far across the ocean.

The future State of Missouri was a part of this land officially owned by the First Consul of the Republic of France, Napoleon Bonaparte. Although a far-sighted man in Europe, Napoleon was not far sighted enough to see the value of the enormous chunk of land which he owned in North America. He sold this 530 million acres as the Louisiana Purchase to President Thomas Jefferson and the United States in 1803 for \$15 million. He felt he needed the money to finance future wars in Europe.

Jacques Weber married in July 1807 in his birth town of Hermerswiller to Madeleine Haberstick (sometimes spelled Haverstick). They had eight known children, six of whom were girls. The two boys were born 12 years apart and both named Michael. However, the oldest Michael died as an infant. The younger Michael was born in 1823, and he would eventually make his way to America.

In the 1836 French census, the Weber family was listed as living at #16 Dorfgasse St. in the town of Hermerswiller, France. Jacques was age 60 and his wife was 52.

Their oldest four daughters were all in their 20s, Michael was 13, one daughter was 18 and a younger girl was 11.

Michael married in 1845 in France when he was 22 to 18-year-old Magdalena Spielmann (1826- 1904). The

next year when the Webers were expecting their first child, they had a serious discussion. Because of the continual wars involving the French, which they had lived through all their lives, they did not want a son of theirs to become a soldier. They decided that if their first child was a girl, they would stay in France, but if the expected baby was a boy, they would move to the United States. On December 17, 1846, Michael and Magdalena's child was born, and it was a boy. Their fate was sealed. They would leave France, and they would waste no time about it! The baby was named Michael after his father.

When he was 3 months old, they boarded a ship named Salamander, a steamer headed for New York harbor. Magdalena told her children and grandchildren stories about their voyage across the ocean. She told of how large waves would engulf their ship. This not only frightened the passengers but also got everything that they owned wet! Since Michael was the only living son of his father, Jacques, he had received his father's papers showing he had served in Napoleon's army. Magdalena said that even these papers got wet on the journey to America.

The Webers arrived in the New World in about March or April 1847 and traveled to Ohio to make their home in Ashland County. The older Michael Weber's parents and four older sisters lived all of their lives in Bas-Rhin, Alsace, France, and died there. (Jacques died in 1845 and Madelaine in 1852 in France.) However, two of Michael's sisters who were closest to his age, Anna Mariah, born 1819, and Elizabeth Elise, born 1824, also came to America with their spouses. Anna Mariah was married to George Leavengood (sometimes spelled Leavenguld or Loewenguth) in 1843. Elizabeth Elise was married to George Mutchler whose parents also came to the U.S. These families all initially settled in Ashland County, Ohio.

The Webers spent 11 years in Ohio, and four additional children were born to them besides young Michael: George, Elizabeth, Philip and Mary Eva. It was 1858 when the family decided to move further west. Michael's sister and family, the Leavengoods, had already moved to Adair County, Missouri, so the Webers had that destination in mind.

In the spring of 1858, the Weber family consisting of two adults and five children, along with three other families (George Niece, John Darr, and Mike Darr families), first traveled by team to Cincinnati, then took a riverboat down the Ohio River and up the Mississippi River to Quincy, Illinois. There, they drove a team and wagon across Missouri to find Adair County. This was a very uncomfortable journey particularly for 32-year-old Magdalena Weber. We know this because she not only had to corral five children but was also in labor during the ride in a primitive wagon over rugged trails. They arrived in Adair County on May 14, 1858, and the Webers' sixth child, Jacob, was born that night.

In Adair County, the Webers first settled northeast of the junction of present day State Highways 11 and 149, southwest of Kirksville. Later, they homesteaded southwest of the site of the old College Mound Schoolhouse and west of Union Temple Church. This was near the village of Nind, Mo., in Adair County.

Next, we will look into their adventures in America.

This Week in Local History

100 Years Ago, June 27, 1924

The water fountain on the southwest corner of the Kirksville square was erected by the Sojourners Club in 1910. It was used for horses to drink from the large receptacle and people could drink from the upper shaft that emitted water through lion's heads. It was eventually moved to Brashear Park where it became a flower planter. The fountain was finally moved to its present location on the southwest courthouse lawn near its original location.

"Who Wants the Big Fountain on the Public Square?" So read the headline on the front page of the newspaper. The article began: "If anyone has a good idea as to what to do with the big drinking fountain at the southwest corner of the courthouse, he will confer a favor by telephoning No. 219." The drinking fountain, in its day was a boon to horses and dogs but became "a white elephant since a horse on the public square is a rarity and automobiles cannot use the fountain." The fountain was a large iron bowl about four feet across on an iron pedestal. The fountain became an eyesore as the only water it contained was rainwater, and it had become a receptacle for cigar and cigarette butts, as well as small trash items. The fountain had been offered to the Kirksville Country Club and the City of Kirksville, but both declined the offer.

100 Years Ago, June 27, 1924

Fourteen children, seven boys and seven girls ranging in age from four to ten years, arrived in Kirksville aboard an "orphan train" from New York. The orphans were in the care of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Swan, state agents. The children were taken to the Presbyterian Church where about two hundred people had gathered. Some came due to curiosity, some interested in adopting, and some were there "because the heartstrings had been touched by the thought of the homeless boys and girls who came to Kirksville hoping that they could find a mother and father to love them." The children were neat and attractively dressed. Mr. Swan spoke for a while and introduced the children. There was one family of five children, three girls and two boys, named Smith, and another family of three, two girls and a boy, named Plant. Two brothers, name Greenfield, were not to be separated. The 4-year-old smaller boy was inseparable from his older brother. The youngest child was age four and the oldest was ten named Martin Frank. The children were given numbers and interested adoption applicants completed the necessary paperwork and interviewed by Mr. and Mrs. Swan. The applicants would later be interviewed in their homes. Several people wanted to take the children to dinner, but Police Chief and Mrs. Willis entertained them at Janes' Restaurant. They finished their meal with ice cream and were each given a piece of chewing gum. The Swans were to remain in Kirksville for several days, placing the children in homes. They were staying at the Dockery Hotel where the children could be visited. A day later two of the children had been placed with Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Jibben and Mr. and Mrs. Dow Jones.

90 Years Ago, June 24, 1934

Raymond Brazovich, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Brazovich, of near Yarrow, died at the family home after a critical illness of ten days believed to have been induced by the bite of a poisonous reptile. The boy was heard



screaming out in a potato patch. The boy's mother investigated and found the boy's leg swollen from his ankle to his hip from instantaneous venom from the bite of some kind. A doctor was summoned later in the day. He believed the boy had been bitten by a rattlesnake, since they are native to that section of the county. The boy was treated by the physician, but ran high temperatures, went into delirium, and died.

90 Years Ago, June 24, 1934

Doris Lee Darr, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil H. Darr, Kirksville, was severely injured when attacked by a dog that had been her pet for some time. The girl sustained a number of lacerations on her head and face, some of them penetrating the skull. The right eye was injured, but it was not determined if sight would be lost or impaired. One eardrum was ruptured. The attack occurred at the home of Mrs. Darr's mother, Mrs. Kibler, who lives southwest of Kirksville. The dog had been gnawing on a bone. The child picked up the bone which precipitated the attack.

90 Years Ago, June 24, 1934

The Kirksville School Board met and decided to hire an architect and propose a \$225,000 bond issue for construction of new Willard and Greenwood School buildings. The new buildings would complete the physical improvement plan implemented by the school board in 1925 with a \$200,000 bond issue for construction of Washington and Benton Schools. The board's original goal was to "make them (the school buildings) of such sturdy construction and utilitarian design, envisaging future needs that they will virtually be buildings to end necessity for more elementary school facilities here for many years to come." One of the biggest problems facing the board was that of conducting school for students in the Willard and Greenwood districts during the upcoming year while the old buildings were being razed and the new ones constructed. One solution under consideration was to operate a double enrollment schedule utilizing the existing Washington and Benton schools, but a workable schedule would have to be developed.

70 Years Ago, June 28, 1954

The Johnson Construction Company of Kirksville began pouring the concrete floor for the new McGraw Electric Company building being constructed on North Osteopathy. Workmen estimated it would take about three weeks to complete the flooring work. The floor, constructed of five-inch reinforced concrete, would support from 3,500 to 4,000 pounds per square inch when complete and cost about \$7,000.

45 Years Ago, June 27, 1979

Cook's Jewelry Store, located at 105 E. Harrison Street, in downtown Kirksville, was the scene of an armed robbery. The store was owned by Mrs. Eunice Cook. Police were looking for a young man, for whom they had a detailed description. They were also canvassing the downtown area near the jewelry store to locate witnesses who may have seen the suspect. Cook family members said the value of the stolen jewelry would exceed \$25,000.

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Men, take charge of your health this Men's Health Month

Northeast Regional Medical Center encourages men in the region to get their annual wellness exam added to the calendar

Research backs up the long-standing stereotype that men avoid going to the doctor. In fact, recent surveys show that approximately 44 percent of men don't get an annual physical, and 60 percent of men won't see a doctor if they suspect something is wrong.

"Don't wait until the 'check engine' light flashes to take care of your health. Just like cars, our bodies need routine and preventive maintenance, too" said Dr. John DeLeeuw, Internal Medi-

cine. "As fathers, as husbands, as coworkers, as friends, we owe it to the people who care about us that we take care of ourselves—not just when we're sick."

DeLeeuw encourages the men in the area to be proactive about their health this Men's Health Month, and to be on the lookout for common health issues he sees among male patients:

Heart Disease

Sometimes heart disease may be "silent" and not diagnosed until a man experiences signs or symptoms of a heart attack, an arrhythmia, or heart failure, according to the CDC.

Prostate Cancer

One in eight men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer. It's the most common cancer, other than skin cancer, among American men, according to the American Cancer Society.

Urinary Incontinence

Leaking isn't a female-only problem. According to the Urology Care Foundation, a quarter to a third of men have dribbling and incontinence problems, too.

Low Testosterone

The major risk factors for low testosterone are men who have diabetes and who are overweight.

Risk only increases as weight increases and can be treated with an appropriate diet and weight loss, per DeLeeuw.

Depression

Depression can affect men and women differently. When depression happens in men, it can be hidden in unhealthy coping mechanisms. Untreated depression can lead to serious and sometimes tragic results. But the good news is that with proper evaluation and treatment, depression in men can improve. "While you may not feel comfortable discussing health concerns or below-the-belt issues with buddies, it should not be embarrassing to go to the doctor," added DeLeeuw. "Intimate and serious health issues can often be addressed and are easier to treat when found early."

In fact, primary care physicians use screenings that check

for conditions before many people experience signs and symptoms of a health problem. Depending on age and family medical history, DeLeeuw says an annual physical may include:

- BMI calculation
- Blood pressure, heart and respiration rates
- Questions around alcohol and tobacco intake
- Questions around diet and exercise habits
- Cholesterol and other blood tests
- Vaccinations
- Mental health screening
- Testicular, hernia and/or prostate exams

Spark memories, not fireworks, this Fourth of July

Northeast Regional Medical Center encourages the community to prioritize safety during holiday celebrations

As Independence Day approaches, Northeast Regional Medical Center emphasizes the importance of fireworks safety to prevent injuries and avoid a trip to the emergency department.

While fireworks have been an integral part of Fourth of July festivities since 1777, it has not been without risk and should be handled only by experienced pyrotechnicians.

“Leave the fireworks to the professionals,” said Dr. Erin Grgurich, Emergency Medicine Physician. “By attending community-sponsored displays, you can enjoy the celebrations from a distance, without putting yourself or your loved ones in harm’s way.”

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, fireworks-related incidents have led to a significant number of injuries and fatalities. In fact, in 2022, there were 11 reported deaths and over 10,000 injuries treated in emergency departments due to misuse, malfunction or tip-overs.

While the majority of incidents were due to amateurs attempting to use professional-grade or homemade fireworks or

explosives, less powerful fireworks like firecrackers and sparklers can also cause significant damage. The National Council on Fireworks Safety research shows more than half of sparkler-related injuries happen to children under the age of 14. While seemingly a harmless way to celebrate, sparklers can reach temperatures exceeding 2,000°F—hot enough to melt some metals.

“If sparklers can melt metals, imagine the severi-

ty of the third-degree burns they can cause to hands,” said Grgurich. “Even with adult supervision, there is no safe way for a child to handle a sparkler.”

The most common injuries seen in emergency departments are burns—accounting for 38 percent of all fireworks-related injuries—but it is important to remember that fireworks injuries can range from minor cuts and bruises to amputation or blindness. The areas most susceptible to injury

are hands and fingers, legs, head, face, ears and eyes.

Grgurich encourages residents to attend local fireworks displays such as the Kirksville Annual Red, White, and Blue Festival on July 6, versus lighting off fireworks at home.

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State Fire Marshal says safety must come first as fireworks sales set to start in Missouri

Seasonal retailers may sell fireworks in Missouri from June 20 through July 10

JEFFERSON CITY – While the drought conditions that plagued Missouri for over a year have eased, the Division of Fire Safety is urging Missourians to continue to exercise extreme caution if they choose to use consumer fireworks as part of July 4th celebrations. Across the nation, July 4th is not only the busiest day of the year for fireworks, it's the busiest day of the year for fires.

“Across the country, fireworks killed 11 people in 2022, with the youngest victim being

only 11 years old,” State Fire Marshal Tim Bean said. The most spectacular sights are at public displays put on by professionals. If folks choose to use consumer fireworks, please handle them with extreme caution and do not allow children to use fireworks.”

About 40 percent of Independence Day structure fires are the result of fireworks, according to the National Fire Protection Association. About 250 people go to emergency rooms each day with fireworks-related injuries in the month around July 4th. Fireworks start an average of 18,500 fires a year.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, across the U.S. in 2022:

- Eleven people died as the result of fireworks, with victims ranging from 11 to 43 years old.

- 10,200 people were treated for injuries in hospital emergency rooms.

- Children under 15 years of age accounted for 28% of the 2022 injuries.

About 43 percent of selected and tested fireworks were found to contain illegal components that could cause severe injuries. The components included fuses that did not comply with the law, the presence of prohibited chemicals, and pyrotechnic materials overload.

Missourians who choose to use consumer fireworks should follow these safety tips:

- Confirm fireworks are legal where you live; only purchase fireworks from licensed retailers.

- Only use fireworks in a large open space that has been cleared of flammable materials.

- Always keep young children away from fireworks; if teens are

permitted to handle fireworks, they should be closely supervised by an adult; always wear eye protection.

- Make sure to have a garden hose or a bucket of water nearby in case of a fire.

- Only light fireworks one at a time; never try to re-light fireworks that have malfunctioned.

- Dispose of fireworks by soaking them in water and leaving them in a trash can.

- Never shoot fireworks off from a glass jar or container.

- Never use fireworks while consuming alcohol.

- Never store fireworks from season to season.

Fireworks sales at licensed seasonal retailers are legal in Missouri from June 20 to July 10. Through June 16, the Division of Fire Safety had issued 1,133 permits to seasonal fireworks retailers.

DFS conducts safety inspections at fireworks retailers, including checking to make sure they sell only legally-permitted consumer fireworks, that they have at least two exits, are equipped with fire extinguishers, and that fireworks tents have been treated with fire retardant chemicals.
