

Feedlot School offered in Kirksville

Missouri Extension

University of Missouri Extension in Kirksville is hosting a feedlot school this summer to teach producers how to feed out their cattle instead of shipping them out of state.

"We will cover health, nutrition, economics; tour local feedlots; give producers opportunities to interact with representatives from local packing plants; and engage with MU Extension faculty," said Eric Bailey, MU Extension state beef nutrition specialist.

The feedlot school is August 29-30 in Kirksville, and will be led by MU Extension livestock field specialist Zac Erwin. "We'll teach everything from feedlot performance expectations to fat cattle marketing with tours of two confinement barns," said Erwin.

The Missouri Department of Agriculture's Missouri Agricultural and Small Business Development Authority has provided grant funding to allow MU Extension to hold more feedlot schools.

"MU Extension has the goal of doubling the economic impact of agriculture in Missouri by 2030," Bailey said. "Currently, 1.4 million out of 1.7 million beef calves raised in Missouri are harvested out of state. We can have a big impact on Missouri agriculture by increasing cattle feeding capacity now that a new harvest facility, American Foods Group (AFG), is coming to the state," said Bailey. A new beef packing plant is opening in 2025 in Warren County.

AFG packing plant in Missouri, there are existing plants within reasonable distances to northern Missouri for those looking for marketing outlets," Erwin stated. Representing one such plant, Brian Bertelson, Vice-President of Field Operations for US Premium Beef will be part of the Feedlot School agenda.

"There is a steep learning curve if you are traditionally cow/calf and looking to finish cattle, but there's opportunity, especially for young producers, to add value,' said Mike Erwin, Adair County farmer and cattle feeder.

Erwin is one of the tour stops for the feedlot school. "Feedlot school is a great place to start if you want to feed cattle. The connections you can make with the speakers and other attendees and the information you can learn about what not to do is invaluable."

MU Extension has been hosting feedlot schools since 2021, Bailey said. "Seventy-eight percent of attendees have started or expanded their operations after attending a school."

The Aug. 29-30 feedlot school in Kirksville will be held at White Oaks Barn, 23255 State Highway 11. Cost is \$75 per person. Find more information at https://tinyurl. com/3ddwdzsf or by contacting the MU Extension Center in Adair County at





Hometown physicians return to Northeast Regional Medical Center

Northeast Regional Medical Center announced that two physicians are returning to the Kirksville community to care for patients.

Melissa Mann, D.O. will return in October and will be practicing at the Northeast Regional Medical Group. Dr. Mann will build and lead a geriatric medicine program focused on the unique needs and medical concerns for older adults. According to the Missouri Department of Health & Senior Services, the number of Missouri citizens over the age of 65 has grown over the years, along with incidence of the health conditions that come with aging. Often, older adults deal with multiple health issues, medications and chronic conditions. Geriatricians develop comprehensive care plans to help older adults prevent and manage illness and



disease, leading to a better quality of life. A second familiar face is scheduled to return to the community in September. Jessica "Jess" Caine, D.O. will rejoin the clinical team at Northeast Regional Medical Center to build and oversee an intensivist program, along with providing additional coverage for the trauma program. Intensivist programs provide highly specialized care for critically ill patients. Fewer than than 20 percent of US hospitals have intensivist coverage, according to the American Hospital Association.

Patrick Avila, chief executive officer of Northeast Regional Medical Center said, "We are honored that Dr. Caine and Dr. Mann will be joining our team and incredibly excited about what this means for our community, especially that these specialized services will keep people close to home for the medical services they need. The ability to provide specialty care to our community by local physicians is one of our top priorities."

Both Dr. Mann and Dr. Caine received their medical degrees from A.T. Still University Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, along with completing their residencies at Northeast Regional Medical Center.

The Smith-Kellogg Mansion -Chapter 1 - Early Days Of The Builder, Capt. John T. Smith

In approximately 1875, an impressive three-story, brick mansion was built northeast of Kirksville on several acres of land. It was said to be "the first brick home in this part of the country," according to newspaper reports of the time. The builder was early settler, Captain John Thompson Smith (1813-1896), proprietor of the first dry goods store in Kirksville and banker.

This home later became known as the Kellogg Mansion when a family by that named lived there for many years. Maybe it should be known as the Smith Mansion since Capt. Smith financed its building, but unfortunately, he never got to live in it.

When the demise of the home came over 80 years later in 1958, a Kirksville subdivision was built on the 57 acres left of the once large estate. It was named Kellwood Hills after the Kellogg family. Today, the home at 1 Center Drive sits on the location of this old mansion.


The building of this mansion is only one small item which John Thompson Smith accomplished in his long and adventurous life. First we will look at his early days: He was the son of Josiah Alex Smith (1780-1843) and Martha (French) Smith (1781-1847). He was born February 25, 1813, and raised in eastern Tennessee. In 1830, his family moved to a farm in Randolph County, Missouri. As a young man, John became a successful farmer in his own right.

One outstanding thing noted in John's youth was that he had musical talent. He had a very melodious voice, so he was often called upon to sing in church, at weddings, funerals and even at hangings.

Adair County, Missouri, was created in 1841, and the county seat of Kirksville was laid out in 1842. John moved to Kirksville in 1843 and embarked upon the mercantile business, said to be the first such store in Kirksville. John Smith knew Jesse Kirk, the person after whom Kirksville had been named in 1842. Jesse Kirk lived in the northwest part of Kirksville and ran a tavern which served as the city center at that time. The tavern was a hotel, restaurant, stagecoach stop, supply outlet, meeting place for county officials, etc. It was the only place of its kind at that early date since there was as yet no courthouse, and the town was undeveloped.

Unfortunately, Jesse Kirk lived only four years after the town was named for him. He died in 1846 at the age of 52. His tavern carried some basic supplies that citizens of the area needed, but his establishment was not known as a dry goods nor mercantile store. After Jesse died, John said he purchased the stock of Jesse Kirk and incorporated it into his mercantile store. (For a more complete look at Jesse Kirk, see Parts 38 and 39 of this history.)

In 1844, John T. Smith married Sarah Ann Goode, daughter of Capt. William Duncan Goode (1778-1848), a prominent politician in Marion County, Missouri, and his wife, Mary Polly (Cabell) Goode. John and Sarah would eventually have eight children, one of whom died in infancy.




In May of 1846, John was one of the founders of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Kirksville. He served as a ruling elder for many years. It is written in his obituary that he was a "helpful member especially in conducting the music for which he was qualified by nature and culture. He was more than usually gifted in selecting music for the different parts of divine service. His generous financial aid and untiring efforts had much to do with the progress this church made in Kirksville in its early history." John's strong faith in God would sustain him through many future trials that he would have to face and would cause him to prosper.

In 1849, the California Gold Rush drew many people to the West Coast. Several men went from Adair County who were contemporaries of John T. Smith. It was 1850 when John caught gold fever but not the kind you might think. He saw another way of making money in California. Like many other men of the time, he left his wife to run the household at home, care for the children, and wait for his return. Like many men in Adair County, John owned slaves who helped him run the family farm. These slaves were the major force in keeping the Smith property running during John's absence.

John had a brother named Henry Smith who died in 1847 leaving a second wife and children by two wives. John took one of these children, his nephew, Alfred Hannah Smith (1831-1898). by his brother's first wife, and went to the California Gold Rush. They took ox-driven wagons full of merchandise from his mercantile store in Kirksville because John saw the opportunity to sell things to gold prospectors. So, John wasn't really interested in panning for gold himself but in earning some of that gold from those who did. Of course, the trip to the West Coast was through perilous territory, and it took three months to reach San Francisco. John later wrote that they had "a narrow escape from death on the plains," but he did not elaborate on the circumstances.

In California, John not only sold his goods but also went into the hotel business. Both businesses were very profitable since the abundance of temporary residents in this gold-seeking area needed a place to stay and clothes to wear. John and his nephew only stayed in California for 18 months since John felt the need to get back to his family in Kirksville. He reportedly accumulated \$70,000 while in California, a huge amount for those days, and he knew this sum would go a long ways back in Kirksville.

In those days, there were two ways to get from Missouri to California or vice-versa. One was overland, the way John had gone to California. The other was the long way around through the Isthmus of Panama. He chose the latter upon his return. John went by ship from the West Coast to the Isthmus where he crossed on foot. From there, some people chose to go by boat to New Orleans, then up the Mississippi



River. But, John and his nephew took a vessel to New York and from there traveled back to Adair County by rail and stagecoach.

When John returned home, he purchased a larger farm in Adair County where he dealt in raising cattle. John's brother's second wife, as mentioned above, died in 1853 leaving five minor children. John and his wife took in at least some of these children, as indicated by later census records.

It was probably the politician Capt. William Duncan Goode, John's father-in-law, who was responsible for getting two of his sons-in-law involved in politics. His daughter, Elizabeth Duncan Goode (1812-1894), was married to Matthias "Tice" Link, a Kirksville lawyer; and daughter, Sarah Anne Goode (1818-1889) was married to John T. Smith. Both men at different times ran for the Missouri Legislature. John T. Smith served in the Legislature during the time when Sterling Price was Missouri Governor from 1853 to 1857. In 1858, Tice Link ran for the Legislature, but his is a tragic story which John T. Smith witnessed.

On July 17, 1858, John and a friend, Hiram Maxey, were traveling by horseback with John's brother-in-law, Tice Link, who was on his way to a political rally west of the Chariton River where he was to give a campaign speech. They arrived at Duemy's Mill where they planned to cross the river. (Duemy's Mill was discussed in Part 109 of this history.)

In those early days, there were no bridges across the Chariton. And, spring rains had caused the river to rise. But, when the men got close, they were confident they could cross it with no problem. Tice and Hiram spurred their horses forward and entered the water. John was more cautious. He hung back a ways to see how they made it across before he tried it. Suddenly, one horse was swept off his feet, then the other! The water was much deeper and the current swifter then Tice and Hiram had anticipated. The men were thrown from their horses and struggled to gain a footing. They could not. Any swimming skills they had did not save them.

John watched in horror as his friends were swept under while they thrashed about, then succumbed to the swift stream. Only John remained alive to go for help and to tell the story.

Tice Link was 48 and left behind a wife and five children still at home. His oldest daughter was married to John T. Smith's nephew, William Franklin Smith. Tice was buried in what is now Forest Llewellyn Computery in Kirksville

Cemetery in Kirksville.

Hiram Maxey was 40 and left a wife and three young children. In addition, he had an older son by his late first wife. This son, Pvt. Edward W. Maxey, would serve in the Civil War and die of smallpox while still a teenager. Hiram Maxey's place of burial is unknown.

This Week in Local History

115 Years Ago, July 28, 1909

Records showed that there were twenty-five automobiles in Kirksville, and two railroad car loads more had been ordered by local car dealerships. All of those on order were sold.

115 Years Ago, July 29, 1909

Some of Kirksville's "society women" complained because of the spitting of tobacco juice on the sidewalks and streets in the downtown shopping area. Quite commonly men could be seen sitting around on the curbs and standing on the street corners emitting their tobacco saliva and tobacco wads on the public thoroughfares. Fashionably gowned ladies would then come along wiping up the residue with their skirt tails. These ladies were demanding that something be done to stop the nuisance.

115 Years Ago, July 31, 1909

The first commencement of all of Adair County's schools was held in conjunction with the Kirksville Chautauqua. Held at 2 p.m. in the afternoon, it was the first event of the 1909 Chautauqua. The graduating class of 56 boys and 57 girls averaging in age from 11 to 20 were all seated on a platform in a tent in Kirksville's Chautauqua Park. The program opened with music by the Sperry Band and the program was conducted by L.B. Sipple, superintendent of Adair County Public Schools.

115 Years Ago, August 3, 1909

At the request of Kirksville's Mayor, most Kirksville businesses were to be closed at 2 p.m. on August 4 for the Chautauqua address of William Jenning Bryan. Bryan (1860-1925) was an American lawyer, orator, politician and threetime nominee for President of the United States on the Democrat ticket. The 1909 Chautauqua was Kirksville's fifth such event in as many years. The first was held in 1905. A Chautauqua was an adult education and social movement in the United States that peaked in popularity in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The Chautauqua assemblies expanded and spread throughout rural America until the mid-1920s. The event brought entertainment and culture for the whole community, with speakers, teachers, musicians, showmen, preachers, and specialists of the day presenting the programs for the week-long event. The Kirksville Daily Express reported that "The people (of Kirksville) see great value of the Chautauqua and are supporting them liberally in time and money." The Kirksville Chautauqua continued to be held annually until the mid-1920s.

105 Years Ago, July 31, 1919

A list of motor vehicle licenses issued in Kirksville showed that there were 410 motor vehicle licenses issued in Kirksville in the previous year. The records showed that there were 40 different makes of vehicles in use in the city. Of the 40 different makes, 141 were Fords, followed in second place by the Chevrolet with 42, and other makes in descending order were Overland, Dodge, Buick, Studebaker, Maxwell, Hupmobile, Chalmera, and Reo which completed the top ten on the list.

95 Years Ago, July 28, 1929

Adair County law enforcement officials raided two homes in the west part of Kirksville and secured home brew. The homes of Goldie Stewart and Charles Whitlock were raided. Sheriff Winslow stated that 115 pints of home brew were secured at the Whitlock home and



three quarts confiscated at the Stewart home. Both defendants entered pleas of guilty before Justice of the Peace Lindsey's court. Whitlock was fined \$200 and thirty days in jail while Mrs. Stewart was fined \$200. A stay was granted in both cases, as conditions demanded that the parties be at their respective residence for the present time.

90 Years Ago, August 3, 1934

State Highway 11, running southwest from Kirksville to connect with Highway 36 two miles east of Brookfield, was completed with spreading of the last stretch of gravel. The east end of Highway 11 from Kirksville to the Knox County line was finished earlier. The new stretch of roadway shortened the driving distance from Kirksville to Brookfield by about 18 miles compared to the distance by going through Macon. The road opens an extensive new trade territory for Kirksville as many people in the southwest and northeast sections of Adair County did not come to Kirksville because of the rough and treacherous dirt roads. The Highway 11 construction project began in early July of 1933 and employed as many as 200 Adair County men at a cost of around \$300,000 for the Adair County portion of the road.

80 Years Ago, August 3, 1944

Martin Edward "Eddie" Powell, 24 of Kirksville, was accidentally killed while swimming in the Chariton River south of the Highway 6 bridge east of Novinger. His death was due to a broken neck, which he sustained when he dived into the water and his head struct a submerged log. Powell and Ruben Potter, 17 of Kirksville, were swimming in the river and according to Potter, had been playing tag to elude each other. Powell on his second dive into the river struck the log. When he did not come to the surface, Potter started a search for him and soon located him. Powell told Potter to "Drag me out," but was unable to say anything more. Adair County Coroner W. C. Summers called an inquest, and Potter testified that he had helped Powell unload coal and went with him on a second trip to the mine. When they were unable to get a load of coal, they decided to stop at the river to swim. Potter said that after retrieving Powell from the river, he went to a nearby field and summoned M. E. Dains and his son, Bob, who were working there. They went to assist Powell, and the young Dains performed artificial respiration to revive Powell who at that time was still breathing. Dr. John Denby, who examined Powell at the American School of Osteopathy (ASO) Hospital after he was brought there, said that he found a two-inch wound on the top of Powell's head and that his neck was broken. The coroner's jury found that Powell "came to his death by accident."

45 Years Ago, July 31, 1979

Miss Mary Ann Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth B. Miller of Kirksville, was crowned 1979 Northeast Missouri Fair queen at the fairgrounds. She was a 1978 graduate of Kirksville High School and a sophomore student at Northeast Missouri State University (now Truman State University). Miller was sponsored by the Adair County Cattlemen's Association. The first runner-up in the queen contest was Miss Pam Turner of LaPlata, and second runner-up was Miss Macae Krogh of Kirksville.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of Missouri

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, the 6th day of August, 2024.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

[Proposed by the 102nd General Assembly (First Regular Session) SJR 26]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to allow places where individuals, corporations, organizations, and associations provide childcare outside of the child's home to be exempt from property tax? This is intended to make childcare more available, which would support the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole.

State governmental entities estimate the state's Blind Pension Fund could have annual lost revenue of up to \$400,000. Local governments expect an unknown fiscal impact.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 6 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to a property tax exemption for certain child care facilities.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2024, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article X of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 6, article X, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 6, to read as follows:

Section 6. 1. All property, real and personal, of the state, counties and other political subdivisions, and nonprofit cemeteries, and all real property used as a homestead as defined by law of any citizen of this state who is a former prisoner of war, as defined by law, and who has a total service-connected disability, shall be exempt from taxation; all personal property held as industrial inventories, including raw materials, work in progress and finished work on hand, by manufacturers and refiners, and all personal property held as goods, wares, merchandise, stock in trade or inventory for resale by distributors, wholesalers, or retail merchants or establishments shall be exempt from taxation; and all property, real and personal, not held for private or corporate profit and used exclusively for religious worship, for schools and colleges, for purposes purely charitable, for agricultural and horticultural societies, or for veterans' organizations may be exempted from taxation by general law. In addition to the above, household goods, furniture, wearing apparel and articles of personal use and adornment owned and used by a person in his home or dwelling place may be exempt from taxation by general law but any such law may provide for approximate restitution to the respective political subdivisions of revenues lost by reason of the exemption. All laws exempting from taxation property other than the property enumerated in this article, shall be void. The provisions of this section exempting certain personal property of manufacturers, refiners, distributors, wholesalers, and retail merchants and establishments from taxation shall become effective, unless otherwise provided by law, in each county on January 1 of the year in which that county completes its first general reassessment

as defined by law. 2. All revenues lost because of the exemption of certain personal property of manufacturers, refiners, distributors, wholesalers, and retail merchants and establishments shall be replaced to each taxing authority within a county from a countywide tax hereby imposed on all property in subclass 3 of class 1 in each county. For the year in which the exemption becomes effective, the county clerk shall calculate the total revenue lost by all taxing authorities in the county and extend upon all property in subclass 3 of class 1 within the county, a tax at the rate necessary to produce that amount. The rate of tax levied in each county according to this subsection shall not be increased above the rate first imposed and will stand levied at that rate unless later reduced according to the provisions of subsection 3. The county collector shall disburse the proceeds according to the revenue lost by each taxing authority because of the exemption of such property in that county. Restitution of the revenues lost by any taxing district contained in more than one county shall be from the several counties according to the revenue lost because of the exemption of property in

each county. Each year after the first year the replacement tax is imposed, the amount distributed to each taxing authority in a county shall be increased or decreased by an amount equal to the amount resulting from the change in that district's total assessed value of property in subclass 3 of class 1 at the countywide replacement tax rate. In order to implement the provisions of this subsection, the limits set in section 11(b) of this article may be exceeded, without voter approval, if necessary to allow each county listed in section 11(b) to comply with this subsection.

3. Any increase in the tax rate imposed pursuant to subsection 2 of this section shall be decreased if such decrease is approved by a majority of the voters of the county voting on such decrease. A decrease in the increased tax rate imposed under subsection 2 of this section may be submitted to the voters of a county by the governing body thereof upon its own order, ordinance, or resolution and shall be submitted upon the petition of at least eight percent of the qualified voters who voted in the immediately preceding gubernatorial election.

4. As used in this section, the terms "revenues lost" and "lost revenues" shall mean that revenue which each taxing authority received from the imposition of a tangible personal property tax on all personal property held as industrial inventories, including raw materials, work in progress and finished work on hand, by manufacturers and refiners, and all personal property held as goods, wares, merchandise, stock in trade or inventory for resale by distributors, wholesalers, or retail merchants or establishments in the last full tax year immediately preceding the effective date of the exemption from taxation granted for such property under subsection 1 of this section, and which was no longer received after such exemption became effective.

5. Because the availability of childcare supports the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole, all property, real and personal, used primarily for the care of a child outside of his or her home may be exempted from taxation by general law. If a portion of the property of an individual or a for profit or nonprofit corporation, organization, or association is used for such childcare, an assessing authority may be authorized by general law to exempt from the assessment, levy, and collection of taxes such portion of the property of such individual, corporation, organization, or association that is used primarily for such childcare.

Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official summary statement of this resolution shall be as follows:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

[Proposed by the 101st General Assembly (Second Regular Session) SS 2 SJR 38]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to authorize laws, passed before December 31st, 2026, that increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities?

This would authorize a law passed in 2022 increasing required funding by the City of Kansas City for police department requests from 20% of general revenue to 25%, an increase of \$38,743,646, though the City previously provided that level of funding voluntarily. No other state or local governmental entities estimate costs or savings.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 21 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to the funding of law enforcement agencies.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2022, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article X of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 21, article X, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereo; to be known as section 21, to read as follows:

Section 21. 1. The state is hereby prohibited from reducing the state financed proportion of the costs of any existing activity or service required of counties and other political subdivisions. A new activity or service or an increase in the level of any activity or service beyond that required by existing law shall not be required by the general assembly or any state agency of counties or other political subdivisions, unless a state appropriation is made and disbursed to pay the county or other political subdivision for any increased costs.

2. Notwithstanding the foregoing prohibitions, before December 31, 2026, the general assembly may by law increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities.

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official summary statement of this resolution shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to authorize laws, passed before December 31, 2026, that increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to serve its communities?"

Tasheina Dale earns Car Seat Safety Certification

Scotland County Hospital announced that Tasheina R. Dale, RN, BSN, has received her Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) certification. Dale completed the national four-day certification program, which included skills testing and written exams, in Hannibal.

This is a renewable twoyear certification. The National CPST Certification Program is a partnership with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Safe Kids and State

Farm Insurance.

Dale realized there was not a CPST in Scotland or Clark counties, and therefore took the initiative to complete the course. She said, "Since there was no one currently in Scotland County with the certification, I wanted to be able to offer the service to parents in the area and to our patients at Scotland County Hospital & Clinics.'

As a qualified CPST, Dale is available to provide information about car seats and she is certified to install car seats. Additionally, she can teach parents, grandparents,

babysitters and caregivers how to correctly install and use car seats. She is also available as a presenter for group meetings.

The National Child Passenger Safety Certification Training Program certifies people as child passenger safety technicians and instructors. Since the CPST certification program began in 1997, with the first courses offered in 1998, more than 180,000 people have successfully completed the CPST Certification Course, including more than 38,000 currently certified CPS technicians. Many technicians are trained health and safety professionals, others are parents, and some are volunteers. They all have one thing in common: they care deeply about kids and want to make sure they are safe.

According to the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety, many parents are unaware of the importance of proper use and installation of child passenger safety restraints and related laws. In 2021, 9 children less than eight years of age were killed and 80 suffered serious injuries as occupants

in motor vehicle crashes in Missouri. Thirty percent of the children killed and seriously injured were not restrained in a car seat or safety belt. Car crashes are a leading cause of death for children 1 to 13 years old in the United States.


