### Martin-White named head coach of Lady Bearcats basketball

The Long Beach High School Lady Bearcats basketball team has a new head coach. Current Lady Bearcat leader Christopher Odom will be transferring to Long Beach Middle School as assistant principal next year, leaving the high school girls' basketball coaching position open. The Board of Trustees voted unanimously to hire Jacqueline Martin-White to fill the Lady Bearcats head coaching position.

White comes to Long Beach from Hinds Community College, where she has served as the head women's basketball coach since 2018. Prior to her time at Hinds, White has an extensive basketball background, including serving as varsity girls basketball head coach at Warren Central High School,

assistant varsity coach/head junior varsity coach at Warren Central, working with the Basketball League in Battipaila, Italy, and one year as an assistant coach of women's basketball at the University of Mississippi.

"The Long Beach School District is excited to have Coach Jack-

ie White lead our girls' basketball program," said incoming Athletic Director Shane Rutledge. "Coach White has had a great deal of success on the court from her days as an all-SEC performer to her coaching career. Her extensive experience coaching 6A and college basketball will benefit the young ladies of our program tremendously."

Coach White says she is excited to have the opportunity to come to Long Beach and work with the Lady Bearcats.

"First, I want to continue the tradition that Coach Odom started to bring the program up," said White. "I'm excited to bring my playing and coaching experience to the program and offer young ladies the opportunity to connect with someone who can help them reach their full potential. My passion and love for the game of basketball will be evident in my development of young, upcoming players. I am very grateful to the administration at Long Beach for giving me this opportunity."

In addition to her coaching experience, White earned numerous honors and accolades as a player and coach. She was a member of a Mississippi Class 5A State Championship team, Mississippi Player of the Year, NCAA All-Region team member, Ole Miss Top 5 Ranking in Assists, Ole Miss Top 5 Ranking in Three-Point Baskets, All-SEC Player, ranked 13 in Ole Miss scoring history and is a member of the Vicksburg Warren School District Sports Hall of Fame and the Ole Miss Sports Hall of Fame.




According to statistics provided by airport officials, more than 638,200 passengers were served by Mississippi's Gulf Coast international airport in 2021.

: Will the sewer manhole covers be out of the roadway vehicle wheel tracks?

It's always the contractor's intentions not to have the manhole cover in the wheel tracks. Sometimes it is out of their control if there are other utilities in the area, but, as far as this project goes, it will not be in the roadway.



Where is the road work and construction happening now?

They HCUA project is currently [at the time of this interview] on Nicholson Avenue. If you live in that area, please pay attention to where the crews are when you leave home; because when you come back home, you may need to come from the north, or you may need to come from the south instead. The construction workers know where the work will be happening that day, and they should be able to advise residents whether they should come from the north or the south upon return. Just bear with us. We know it's not optimal, but it will be worth it.

### **Looking ahead from Levens:**

"They still have to go back in on Cleveland Avenue right now. That's not paved, and Klondyke Road is not paved, because they still have to do some tying in. Then they'll do an overlay. It won't be quite done at that point, but at least it will be covered."

"Please have patience. We understand. Work crews are out there. That's somebody's dad, father, grandpa out there working. We just ask that you slow down and be patient. We know it's not fun when there's a road closing. We understand, but we try to give everybody notice when there's a road closure in the area or to expect a slowdown in the area. So far, everything's gone smoothly, and we appreciate everybody bearing with us."

selected based on their aptitude and aspirations in technology and computing, as demonstrated by their computing experience, computing-related activities, leadership experience, tenacity in the face of barriers to access, and plans for post-secondary education

LaRosa has been a member of the Bearcat Belles Dance Team since her freshmen year and is also an active member of the LBHS Student Council, BETA Club, National Honor Society, Key Club and Mu Alpha Theta. She is also the vice president of LBHS's Women in STEM, a club dedicated to promoting women's involvement in areas of STEM.

LaRosa is currently top-ranked in her class and has challenged herself with honors and AP courses, including AP Computer Principles, for which she earned a five (the highest possible score) on the exam.

This past summer, LaRosa was able to apply her computing skills with her volunteerism at the Institute for Marine Mammal Studies using a program that matched dolphin dorsal fins. In the future, she plans to

attend college and major in biology or biomedical engineering, and then she plans to go to medical school to become a dermatologist. As a dermatologist, she says she plans to optimize her practice by using the most advanced technology to provide her patients with the best preventative and curative treatments.

### Celebrate Mother('s Day) before it's too late

Mother's Day cards hit the stands weeks ago. While stores are fully stocked with these cheerful greeting cards, there's a hole in my heart – a void I know can never be filled - and these festive cards are just one of the many reminders that my mother is gone. It's still "fresh" to me, or should I say raw? On March 15, I got the call no one ever wants to get – my mother was found dead in her apartment. She died of an apparent heart attack. She was only 67 years old. They say time heals all wounds, but I'm still hurting. I don't cry every hour

anymore, but thoughts of my lovely mother cross my mind throughout the day. Sometimes I wake up in the middle of my many sleepless nights in a fog, still reeling from shock – is she really gone?

She is. And my life will never be the same – something anyone who has experienced this understands all too well. Simple things, like the teenage girl calling out to her mother to look at something at a local store, rips open this gaping soul wound, just when I think I'm beginning to cope and will one day be alright.

Death is no stranger to me. It has cast its shadow at my doorstep and a dark

cloud over my heart more than once, and, as I barrel into mid-life, thinking I just may finally be beginning to figure it all out, this unwelcome visitor descends upon me once again, visiting me more often with each passing year, whether it be childhood friends or college sweethearts whose lives were "taken" much too soon. This time, though, it hit close to home - TOO close.

I've been told Mama's death was "quick" and hopefully painless. An unexpected heart attack stole this precious woman from me with no notice. I was sure we had at least another ten years or so together, but death does not discriminate, and no one knows for sure when his or her number will be called.

My mother, Cynthia Anne Cain Butler, passed away just five days before my 46th birthday. I hoped and prayed that she had mailed me a birthday card early, as she often did - that I would find one last message from her. That card would never come. I'm sure she was planning to send it the next day, but "the next day was never promised. Not to her. Not to any of us.

Instead of celebrating my birthday with my mom, I was planning her funeral and packing up her belongings. Heart heavy, I went through the motions, doing what had to be done. Until something caught my eye. A letter I had written her more than two years ago was sitting on her nightstand.

A wave of relief and thankfulness washed over me as I read the words I wrote to her back in 2019, expressing that none of us knows how long we will live our lives here on earth, but I wanted her to know one thing – that I loved her more than anyone or anything here on this side of Heaven. As the letter closed, I assured her that, despite the time we had left to spend together, one day we would celebrate "on the other side," free of pain, hardships, challenges and disappointments our lives are strewn with as we "live."

I barely remember writing this letter, and not even sure the reason behind its contents, but I am glad I wrote it. I am glad she KNEW straight from my heart and clearly through my written words how much she means/meant to me before it was too late.

I'll never forget that last image of her more than a month ago as I pulled out of the driveway, leaving. Mama was on the other side of the screen door waving, too, fighting back the tears she always cried and tried to hide each and every time I had to leave. I waved back, and held back my own tears as I drove out of view...like mother, like daughter.

If your mother, grandmother, or anyone who has loved and mentored you along the way is still alive, please let her, let them, know now how much they mean to you and how much you appreciate them. Celebrate them while they are alive. Forgive and forget petty arguments that don't mean much in the scheme of things. Death comes to all of us, and, as I learned in yet another one of life's sobering "lessons," none of us is guaranteed tomorrow.

Celebrate Mother('s Day) before it's too late, and while she's still here!

While I can't write a message or drop a card in the mail for my mother this year, I do still have a message to share: "Until we meet again, Mama, fly high. I

love you, and we SHALL meet again!"

With programs that include Buddy Ball Baseball, kick ball, fishing, horseback riding and many others, the organization requires a huge volunteer commitment to operate.






half. The Bearcats eventually won the game 4-1.

The program provides delegates with opportunities to gain experience through action by participating in activities as elected officials, allowing them to experience the leadership responsibilities required to successfully operate and manage a city.

This year's Long Beach delegates are David Anderson, Hayes Johnson and Stokley Sawyer; and Pass Christian delegates are Boven Cai and Randy Vu.

Eligibility for all Boys State delegates requires them to be juniors in high school, which allows the students to participate in academic, athletic, media and student council activities as a leader with a passion to serve during their senior year of high school. The Boys State program demonstrates that a democracy needs an intelligent citizenry with a moral, honest and impartial administration responsive to the will of the people.

Boys State operates as city, with a constitution, statutes and ordinances constructed by its delegates to govern. Participation provides delegates opportunities to gain experience in city management, daily governmental operations and budgeting. Each delegate competes for political office, participating in primary and general elections. Delegates also participate in athletic, academic and various competitive field day events. The experience is more than a classroom civics lesson; it is about experiencing competition and actively participating in government. Delegates also experience the roles of elected officials, participating in legal simulations, creating bills and debating policies following administrative procedures. In addition, Boys State offers delegates interaction with elected officials and participation in various leadership careers, including politics, broadcast media and print journalism.

Mississippi's 2022 Boys State session will be held on the campus of the University of Mississippi from May 29 to June 4. Forty-nine states and the District of Columbia conduct a Boys State program annually, and more than 28,000 young men participate in the civic workshops each year.

# Historical marker dedicated in prayer garden

St. Thomas the Apostle Catholic Church had a rededication ceremony unveiling the Marian Grotto Prayer Garden's new historical marker on Palm Sunday. Emcee Jerry Levens made a statement of thanks and appreciation to parishioners Henry Schepens, Sr., Mary Fayard and Helen Ann Fayard, representing their father, A.C. Fayard, for their contributions made in 1972 and 1973. Thanks was also expressed to Mary Schepens Levens, who sponsored the historical marker, and the St. Vincent de Paul Society, which led the refurbishment project under the direction of their project coordinator, Paula Spears, and president, Mike Barry. The historical marker provides information for visitors and future generations of St. Thomas Parish.

The rededication ceremony included more than one hundred parishioners and guests.

Fr. Vincent led with the opening prayer, followed by Deacon Buddy Van Court reading the gospel of the Angel Gabriel calling on Mary. Father Cuddy O'Connell performed the blessing of the Marian Grotto and Prayer Garden.

Parishioner Henry Schepens, Sr. donated the grotto to St. Thomas in 1972. The donation was in memory of his parents, Leo and Theresa Dauro Schepens, and the Vincent and Angelina Trippe Dauro family. The original site for the grotto was south of Bear Bayou and west of the church. The statue of the Blessed Mother in the grotto was donated to St. Thomas the Apostle in 1972 by A.C. Fayard. The following year, Helen Fayard rededicated the Statue of Our Lady in memory of her husband, A.C. Fayard, and their daughter, Helen Ann. David Fayard donated the landscaping. Two

additional monuments in the prayer garden are the cherub fountain, provided by St. Thomas parishioners and Fr. Louis Lohan, and a statue of an angel holding a baby, known as "The Essence of Love," which was donated by Steve and Kathy Day.

In recent years, the prayer garden has been visited more frequently by parishioners and organizations to peacefully pray. A St. Vincent de Paul Society member mentioned the grotto and prayer garden needed improvements at a Society meeting. Spears said they met with Pastor O'Connell to request permission and discuss ideas on refurbishing the prayer garden.

Members started cleaning the garden and planting flowers in October 2021. Parishioners Frances Carrubba LeBlanc and Carmela Vizzini Frost donated their time and artistic talent painting the Statue of Mary after Blane Moody made repairs. Leblanc also designed and created the crown of flowers placed on the statue. Spears said no funds given to the Society for the underprivileged were used for the project.

The prayer garden is visited often by parishioners and guests for many reasons other than prayer. Children attending St. Thomas School of Religious Education use the grotto for May Crowning. Parishioners and guests often take pictures on special occasions in the prayer garden for First Eucharist, Confirmation, Mother's Day, weddings, high school prom, and graduation. Spears stated the Society of St. Vincent de Paul believes "it is not only important to nourish our bodies, but also our souls. For this reason, we adopted the grotto and the area around it, providing a community service of beautification and preservation for this peaceful, sacred site."

### March of the Mayors: On a mission to feed locals



About 200 volunteers from throughout South Mississippi pitched in to help out with this year's Packing Party for the March of Mayors event benefitting local food pantries.



It's known as "Mississippi's largest food box packing party," but the annual March of the Mayors food drive, collection and distribution is serious business for hundreds of South Mississippians struggling to put food on the table, especially now, with record-high food and gasoline prices.

"It's important for our community," said Mississippi Power employee James Dobson, who was among the two hundred volunteers on hand for the April 1 food donation packing party at the Lyman Community Center in Gulfport. "Right now, with the rising food prices and other issues in this world, we want to make sure we are at least feeding our people, taking care of our community."

This year marks the Second Annual Coastal March of the Mayors, headed up by the non-profit Extra Table.

"It's bigger and better again this year. We are so excited. We've grown. We have eleven mayors participating, eleven cities and thirteen food pantries benefitting," said Martha Allen, executive director of Extra Table, the non-profit organization that hosts the event each year. The Hattiesburg-based group works year-round to provide new, healthy and shelf-stable food to be delivered monthly to food pantries or soup kitchens throughout the state.

On this day, though, hundreds of volunteers from across the Coast pitched in to pack up thousands of boxes of food donations, after each of the eleven cities spent

the month of March collecting their assigned food item.

"The City of Long Beach brought in our good, green veggies - green beans - for us," Allen said. "We are so appreciative of that. It all goes toward the 2,493 boxes we have packed. We are extremely grateful for the support we have gotten from across the Coast."

This is the second year the City of Long Beach has participated in the event. According to Jenny Levens, the community affairs director for the City of Long Beach, the Friendly City collected more than 1,200 cans of green beans this year, with Harper McCaughan Elementary School's BETA Club rounding up more than 900 cans for this year's drive.

Long Beach resident and Mississippi Power employee Lynette Brown was among those helping out with this labor of love.

"This helps feed not only the community, but it also helps take care of children who don't have meals when they get home," said Brown. "I have a son, and I want to make sure every child gets fed."

"It's a one-Coast cause, because each box has a piece of every city across the Coast. It's a really special event where we all come together to serve."

All of the food collected on the Coast stayed on the Coast, going directly to Extra Table's partner food pantries, including the Long Beach Food Pantry.


