## New mayor stresses economy

Long Beach Mayor George Bass emphasized shortly after taking office that his number one

coastal city is the "economy." The former fire chief, having moved

up the ladder to CEO of Long Beach, Bass said in an interview with news media he aims to actively seek new developments, including retail and residential. And this includes a casino.

"I'm certainly open to looking at it (a casino)," said Bass, stressing that a new casino in Long Beach would have to fit the neighborhood and fit the zoning.

According to Bass, Long Beach is the Friendly City. He said Long Beach can be friendly all day long, but if it does not have good sidewalks, bike paths and other amenities that folks are looking for, then it is going to be hard to sell.

Bass identifies the city's marketing effort as tops on his agenda. He has already shifted part of his mayor's salary to hiring a professional public relations person (Jenny Levens) for the city to aid economic development. The mayor also hopes to stay away from increasing Long Beach property taxes, which are the highest on the coast.

Bass is a lifelong resident of Long Beach, and, as the first new mayor in 12 years (he won by a landslide with 63% of the vote in five-man race), he is devoted to his hometown.

"I'm ready to move forward with Long Beach," Bass said.

### **Bearcats** top Pass

Forrest Williams' Coach offense finally came to life in the second half, and his Bearcats won going away in the Classic match-up at Pass Christian, 27-14, Thursday night, Aug. 17.

In the early-season opener, the Pirates jumped to a 14-7 halftime lead behind the power running of Tionne Frost. But sophomore Bearcat quarter-back Cade Crosby found his groove in the second half and spearheaded the comeback for Long Beach.

In post-game comments, Williams noted that the Bearcats "shot themselves in the foot" in the first half, running only 18 offensive plays. "We upped tempo in the second half, and the defense came on at the end," said the veteran coach.

Crosby hit 11 of 14 passes for 186 yards and 3 touchdowns. He tacked on 82 rushing yards. Running back Dennis Andrews scored on a Crosby pass and a game-tying 8-yard run in the third quarter. A Crosby to Kai VanCourt 60-yard bomb vaulted the Maroon and Gray ahead for good in the third stanza. Williams' defense, led by Eaverson Cisco, put the game on ice after another Crosby TD aerial, a short toss to Logan Matherne. The Bearcats now travel to Bay over the bridge on Sept. 1. Then, the LB home opener is Sept. 8 with Vancleave.

## Sheriff and FBI working cold case

The mysterious and tragic murder of Kimberly Jo Holcomb Watts in her Long Beach

home nearly three years ago remains unsolved. Shortafter Watts' brother-

George Bass took

over as new mayor of Long Beach, the case was trans-

ferred this June from the Long Beach Police Department to the cold case files of the Harrison County Sheriff's Office. Outgoing LB Police Chief Wayne McDowell and Sheriff Troy Peterson, along with County District attorney Joel Smith, all agreed with Bass' request to turn the investigation over to the Sheriff's Office, which has cold case detectives and other resources to investigate the killing of Watts, 48, a nurse at Memorial Hospital and a divorced mother of a teenage son who was away at college at the time of the brutal slaying. Chief McDowell, who is set to retire at the end of September, had also called in the FBI in the case. The feds are continuing their investigation, along with the Harrison County Sheriff's Office.

A person of interest, or a suspect, has been targeted, but no arrest made. Chief McDowell pointed out that "there is no statue of limitations on a murder case." "There has been a person of interest since day one," says Chief McDowell.

### Volunteer for Long Beach Development

#### 1. What is the Long Beach Main Street or Long Beach Community Development Association (LBCDA)?

In 2012, Mayor Skellie asked Shelda Jones to be the volunteer coordinator for Long Beach Main Street. After a meeting with the Mississippi Main Street Association, Main Street arranged for specialists to meet with the volunteer group, and citizens of Long Beach were invited. Specialists worked with the new group on branding, economic studies, and basically what Long Beach could look like.

The Main Street Association Board formed in August 2014. In March of 2015, it was decided that the new group could better serve the whole city of Long Beach if it changed its name to Long Beach Community Development Association (LBCDA). LBCDA is a Mississippi Main Street Association network member and a member of the National Main Street Organization. It benefits from state as well as national media exposure. LBCDA established by-laws and policies and procedures for the Long Beach Community Development Association.

No part of the net earnings of the Program shall inure to the benefit of any of its members or any other individual; and the Program shall not participate in, or intervene in, any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Whether it's classical pirouette dating back to 1700 or hip-hop circa 1980, Long Beach's Diane Desporte knows dancing. Desporte not only knows from her professional experience, but she brings the same passion to teaching dance as she did to her own internationally-acclaimed career as a dancer herself from New Orleans to New York City. "Dance is an education," proclaims Desporte from her heart and soul, while stressing to her dance students, "learn the art." Desporte is an artist who practices what she preaches. She established her Dance Academy in Long Beach some 31 years ago and taught and performed for 24 years prior to opening the well-appointed studio on Beatline Rd. in a quiet, pastoral setting among the piney woods that amplify the Gulf breezes.

Established as a professional dancer since the age of three, studying under modern masters at the Amercan Ballet, the New York City Ballet, the Martha Graham School, and learning jazz dance under the well-known Luigi, Desporte

transitioned from performing to teaching some 55 years ago. According to Desporte, the essence of dance, which she enthusiastically imparts to her younger students at her acade-

my, "is so many things."

"Dance is communication without words," says the expressive, lithe dance instructor who seemingly has sipped at the fountain of youth. "Dance is movement to move the mind of the audience and the heart of the dancer."

The repertoire of classes, conducted by her instructors and herself at the Dance Academy for pre-teens and teens from all over the Coast, includes Ballet, Point, Lyrical, Jazz, Tap, and Hip-Hop.

Her words as graceful as her moves on the dance floor, Desporte elaborates that dance brings the mind and body together, a certain discipline that a dancer requires and, importantly, transfers into everyday life. "Dancing really is about having fun," she says, with a twinkle in her blue eyes, not disregarding her more serious philosophical reflections.







### Dr. Stephens longest-serving pastor at First Baptist

When Dr. LaRue Stephens walked to the pulpit of First Baptist Church Long Beach on the first Sunday this past July and began the morning sermon, Pastor Stephens and the church reached two significant and historical milestones.

Stephens completed in July his twentieth year as church pastor, preaching his first sermon on Sunday, July 6, 1997. Historically, First Baptist Church Long Beach, was established in 1909, and Dr. Stephens has now served longer than any pastor in that 107 years!

"Brother LaRue," as he is often called by church members, grew up on a farm in the small community of Silver Creek in Lawrence County

and graduated from New Hebron High School. After graduating from Clarke College in Newton and Mississippi College at Clinton, he began ministerial studies at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. He earned a Master of Divinity degree in 1986 and his Ph.D. in 1994 from the seminary.

Since being licensed and ordained by Crooked Creek Baptist Church, he has served as Youth Minister, Education Minister, and Pastor in eight Mississippi Churches. His first pastorate was at Strong River Baptist Church in Pinola in Simpson County from 1979-1980. He was serving as Pastor of McDowell Road Baptist Church in Jackson when he was contacted in 1997

by a Pastor Search Committee from First Baptist Church Long Beach.

"After the committee heard me preach at McDowell Road and during a follow-up interview, I explained to them that if I was called by God to Long Beach,
