Long Beach School District gets "A" rating – again

The Long Beach School District was again rated an "A" district in the Mississippi Department of Education's 2019 Accountability Results.

"It is with tremendous excitement that I announce to all of you that the LBSD is rated an 'A' for the fourth consecutive year (2016, 2017, 2018, 2019)!" said Dr. Jay R. Smith, superintendent of Long Beach Public Schools.

The Mississippi Department of Education released letter grade ratings last month, with an A as the highest possible academic rating. LBSD's overall score is 696, up 27 points over last year's total of 669. The minimum score districts must reach

for A-status is 668.

Of all 144 Mississippi school districts, Long Beach's score is the thirteenth highest statewide.

"The LBSD is one of only nine districts in the state and one of only two on the Mississippi Gulf Coast to have earned the distinction of an 'A' rating four years in a row," said Smith.

Students are scored on a fivepoint scale on state tests, with 3 considered a passing score. But schools don't get growth points for students who score 3 one year and then score 3 the following year. Only students scoring 4 or 5 meet growth by maintaining their current levels.

Long Beach Middle School individually received an "A"

rating, and the other schools in the district received "B" ratings.

"I thank each of you for your dedication, hard work, and professionalism in our collective effort to provide a world-class atmosphere of teaching and learning," said Smith.

"We will not rest on our accomplishments, but rather we will celebrate them together while striving to improve year after year," Smith continued. "Congratulations, and, as always, Go Bearcats!"

Street paving | LBSD reveives begins in LB | \$374,834 grant

Earlier this month, the City of Long Beach began the first phase of a street paving effort.

In the first phase, Hanover Drive, Elington Drive, Regency Drive, Windsor Place, Buckingham Place, Watts Lane, Wills Lane, Patton Road, Reeves Street and Saratoga Drive will be paved.

Patch repairs will also take place on Pineville Road and Commission Road

Crews will be moving to other areas of Long Beach as each phase is completed.

Long Beach drivers are encouraged to slow down in paving areas and watch out for work crews.

The Long Beach School District recently received news that the district will be awarded a grant in the amount of \$374,834 in federal funds from the United States Department of Justice (DOJ). The money will be disbursed across a two-year period.

School officials say the grant money will be used to improve security at Long Beach schools and on school grounds through evidence-based school safety programs. The grant award is part of the DOJ 2019 COPS School Violence Prevention Program.

"This grant was awarded to only one hundred school districts across the country," said Long Beach School Superintendent Dr. Jay Smith.

Only two of the grants were awarded in the state, and LBSD was the largest grant recipient in Mississippi.

Backpack Buddies provides weekend meals for kids

When the kids in the Long Beach School District board the buses this Friday, more than a hundred of them will be carrying parcels of food to make sure they don't go hungry over the weekend.

Backpack Buddies launched in 2011 by Lori and John Cripple after they learned about a similar program in Pascagoula. The program provides meals for the weekend to children from underprivileged homes. This covers the gap when these children aren't receiving free breakfast and lunch from the school.

The program started with thirty kids after Lori met with school counselors and nutritionists to determine the need in Long Beach. But, in the last eight years, Backpack Buddies has grown.

"We are currently serving 125 students throughout the five Long Beach schools," says Lori. "The average annual cost to feed

one hundred kids is estimated at \$20,000. It shocks me every time I tell people that, because we have never once run out of money."

More than eleven million children in the U.S. live in homes where there isn't food enough to eat. Twenty-two million children rely on the free or reduced lunch program to get enough food, and of many those eat

breakfast

at school, too. But, during the weekend and summertime, six in seven hungry children won't get the meals they need.

There are some programs that work to provide meals for kids during the summer months.

Backpack Buddies is bridging that gap on the weekends.

Every other week, a group of volunteers gets together to pack the bags that will go home with the kids. Another group of vol-

unteers delivers the bags to the schools every week.

of kids for the program from the school counselors, and that list is kept secret. The program does not receive any other information about the kids, and bags are delivered to them discreetly.


ed Methodist Church in Long Beach, the program has spread to involve a number of churches and organizations around the community.

"Our team consists of people from First United Methodist Church, Christ United Methodist Church, St. Thomas Catholic Church, First Baptist Church and Grace Lutheran Church," says Lori. "We also have the support of local scouting groups and businesses."

Backpack Buddies continues to grow to meet the needs of the community. Lori says they want to continue serving students in Long Beach as long as the need exists.

"Our goal is to provide food for the kids over the weekend so they are ready to learn on Mondays," says Lori.






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Veterans' Day parade is planned for Long Beach



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
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Energy Club celebrates thirty years in Long Beach



Props must be covered or removed during the parade for safety reasons. Boats are allowed (and encouraged) to play Christmas music, but on-board music must be adjusted in volume so as not to overpower the music of other parade participants.

The maximum height, including riders, for a boat in the parade is fourteen feet, and the maximum length (including the tow vehicle) is sixty-five feet. Any second level riders must have adequate railings around them to protect against falling.

Beads may be thrown, but the City has requested that candy not be tossed from floats.

Family activities at the Town Green will include a human snow globe, live music, a game trailer, snow and more. The annual lighting of the Christmas tree will also be held at the Town Green. Awards will be given to boat own-
