

\$4.3M in Federal funding opens door for Gateway Harbor Project

In a Southern culture steeped in hospitality and welcoming openness, evidenced by local homes with wrap-around front porches, it should come as no surprise that leaders with the City of Long Beach have comprised a plan to use the Friendly City's "front door" beach area along Highway 90 to draw more developers, businesses and visitors into the city.

Now, thanks to \$4.3 million in federal funding through a Congressional appropriations request, announced by Long Beach Mayor George Bass and Congressman Steven Palazzo in June, the door is finally open for the Gateway Harbor Project, which aims to draw more developers and visitors into the city by placing signage and landscaping at two major intersections along Highway 90, at Jeff Davis Avenue.

Mayor Bass, who has made several visits to Washington, D.C., since he took office in 2017, has worked tirelessly with the local delegation, including Mississippi's District 120 Representative Richard Bennett and U.S. Congressman Steven Palazzo, to help secure the funding.

Bass says the \$4.3 million will go a long way. Besides placing signage along the popular beachfront thoroughfare, the Gateway Harbor Project includes improved

landscaping, attractive landmarks and even a lighthouse, all of which Bass hopes will light the

way to those "passing through" the area to stop and check out what Long Beach has to offer. Also included in the plan are sidewalks, parking and pathways along the city's beachfront and at the Long Beach Harbor.

City leaders have wasted no time moving forward on this long-anticipated project, approving a motion at the Long Beach Board of Aldermen's meeting on July 5 to advertise for bids to get the initial phase of the overall project off the ground, and time is of the essence, as pointed

out by Alderman-at-Large Donald Frazer at the meeting.

"I know this is going to be a moving target with the new funds out there and everything, whether we call this Phase One or what, but I want to see some progress on this," Frazer said. "We can start here, finish one project and move forward."

"I would note that these funds that are being spent have been designated specifically for this project, and, if we don't spend them on this, this downtown redevelopment gateway, we won't

get to have them at all for anything," said Bass.

As the City moves forward with the Harbor Gateway Project, Long Beach leaders also continue to work to secure separate funding concentrated on the Long Beach Harbor, which still shows signs of damage from storms that made landfall in the area during past hurricane seasons. While several boat ramps have reopened at the harbor and are being used by a steady stream of boaters, there's still a lot that needs to be done to restore the overall harbor and its facilities and to better fortify it during future storms and possible hurricanes.

Adopt a Grandparent Day, which is observed the Saturday before National Grandparents Day each year, is a day set aside for community volunteers to visit and honor those who are often neglected during a time in their lives when they should be appreciated the most.

Statistics show fifty percent of nursing home residents have no close relatives, forty-six percent have no living children, and sixty percent have no outside visitors.

About twenty percent of nursing home residents suffer from major depression, triggered by a lack of social interaction and isolation.

When Kathy Rogers had to move her mother into a nurs-

ing home for thirty days, she experienced the reality of the emotional hardships the residents often face. Many seniors are dropped off and forgotten, left longing for interaction and attention.

Moved by what they had witnessed, Kathy and her husband Lee founded Adopt a Grandparent in 2014, with the mission to recognize and honor the life and value of

the elderly in society.

Adopt a Grandparent currently serves over 2,300 seniors in forty facilities across the Gulf Coast, including Senior Oaks Nursing Home in Long Beach.



LBSD begins new school year on August 4

The Long Beach School District will begin its 2022-23 school year on August 4.

Ahead of the start of school, the district will hold sessions for students and parents to meet teachers, and high school freshmen and new students will have an orientation session.

July 29 will kick off the sessions, with preschooler Meet the Teacher sessions open for students with last names beginning with A-L from 10 until 11:30 a.m. and 1:45 to 3:15 p.m. Last names beginning with M-Z will have the option of sessions from 12 to 1:30 p.m. or 3:30 to 5 p.m.

Also on July 29, Long Beach High School students can pick up their schedules and arrange their parking. Seniors can stop by the school from noon until 1 p.m., juniors from 1:15 to 2:15 p.m., and sophomores from 2:30 until 3:30 p.m. Ahead of that, from 9 until 11 a.m., freshmen and new students will have orientation.

August 1, from 5 until 6:30 p.m., Harper McCaughan Elementary will have their sixth grade Meet the Teacher event.

Quarles and Reeves Elementary will both hold their Meet the Teacher sessions on August 2, with kindergarten and third grade from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. at both schools, and first and second grade from 5:45 to 6:45 p.m. at both schools.

Also on August 2, from 3 until 6 p.m., all fully-registered Long Beach Middle School students can pick up their schedules in the school's gym.

Harper McCaughan Elementary will have Meet the Teacher for fourth and fifth graders on August 3, from 5 until 6:30 p.m.

Open Houses have been planned for each school, as well. The Long Beach High School Grand Opening and Community Open House will be on August 13 at a time

Harper McCaughan Elementary's Open House is set for August 29 from 5:30 until 7 p.m., Quarles and Reeves Elementary will both have their Open Houses at 5:30 p.m. on August 30, and the Long Beach Middle School Open House will be set at a later date.

Looking ahead from Levens:

On July 11, contractors began installing and performing the tie-in of the new HCUA sewer pipes along Pineville Road. The major parts of the project that are expected to be completed by the end of 2022 include Royal Drive to Nicholson, which are scheduled to be completed in the fall of 2022. Progress is coming along nicely, considering the magnitude of the project. There have been some delays, as with any construction project. The entire project replaces almost 23,000 feet of large sewer transmission lines that carry the entire City of Long Beach's sewer. Most delays have been related to unforeseen underground conditions and the instability of nationwide manufacturing in 2021. The next area of work to take place is on Menge Avenue. Drivers need to plan for traffic delays during the entire construction effort in all areas.

Meet Your Neighbor: Helen Zito

In 2005, Helen Zito retired after twelve years working in a director position for BellSouth in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. She made the decision to retire after the telecommunications company merged with AT&T, but Zito quickly decided she was too young to be retiring. She began a second career with Ochsner Health doing some part time work at first before being named Ochsner's Director of Alumni Affairs ten years ago. Shortly after settling into this position, Zito and her husband moved from their hometown of New Orleans to Long Beach, where Zito has continued to work for Ochsner while setting out to pursue her dream to be an artist.

"I've always been a crafty, artsy person," Zito said. "I love my painting. I paint on silk, and that's sort of my passion."

Zito first decided to pursue silk painting fifteen years ago and traveled to Mendocino, California, to take lessons. The process of silk painting involves stretching out a piece of white silk and painting on it with dyes. The piece of silk is steamed to let the dyes set, and then it is washed several times with several different iterations. The final product can be anything from a scarf to a pillow to a piece of wall art.

Zito frequented art shows throughout Louisiana and the Gulf Coast for a number of years, and her artwork is displayed at Gallery 782 in Biloxi and The Shops at Century Hall in Bay St. Louis. Zito also creates art pieces such as scarves and shawls by using painted silk and fusing wool fibers together, a process known as Nuno felting.

Zito and her husband moved to Long Beach in 2017, with the hopes of retiring in the community. While neither have retired yet, Zito was drawn to the friendliness and tranquility that Long Beach had to offer.

"It's quieter than most of the Gulf communities," Zito said. "The people are so friendly, and it's always felt like

Zito says she loves living in Long Beach and watching the growth of the community, as well as being on the beach and in close proximity to all the amenities the Gulf Coast has to offer.

LBSD Mission Acceleration program lauded

The Long Beach School District (LBSD) recently had some summer visitors who showed up to observe and celebrate the success of the district's Mission Acceleration program, which is designed to address the need for learning recovery that was necessitated by the loss of in-person and synchronous learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Representatives Richard Bennett, Kevin Felsher and Kent McCarty, along

with Holly Spivey, Mississippi Governor Tate Reeves' Education Policy Advisor, stopped in Long Beach to see the program in action. The pilot program, funded through the Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund, seeks to accelerate reading achievement for children in Mississippi

LBSD participated in the Mississippi Campaign for Grade-Level Reading and was selected to join in the pilot project with the Center for Excellence in Literacy Instruction and the University of Mississippi. The program provides a combination of highdose tutoring using evidence-based reading interventions, a vast digital library, and meaningful academic and social connections with a college role model.

The program has significantly im-

pacted the achievements of participating students, according to LBSD project coordinator Jennifer Gordon.

"I wholeheartedly believe the Mission Acceleration program is golden in our district," Gordon said. "I have seen students make meaningful connections with a role model, improve in literacy skills, and get excited to read! I have students who hated to read, never wanted to volunteer, and honestly acted out because they were embarrassed that they could not read. Now, I have those students wearing glasses and coming to me to borrow new books to read."

"This is a chance for struggling readers to catch up – to accelerate – and they do! I feel this program is a huge success and will only get better. It is vital that we continue services to accelerate our future Mississippians."

Continued funding is crucial for schools to be able to maintain programs that are providing the tools to bridge the learning-loss gaps created during COVID-19, says LBSD Assistant Superintendent Kelleigh Reynolds-Brous-

sard, who was instrumental in bringing Mission Acceleration to Long Beach. "It is most appreciated that our legislators visited onsite to see the impact on our students by way of the implementation of Mission Acceleration within Long Beach School District," Reynolds-Broussard said. "Funding for programs addressing educational gaps is critical to continuing growth from the learning losses due to COVID-19 and to work toward preparing students to become proficient readers."

House Education Chairman Richard Bennett was happy to see students

engaged and excited to be learning.

"It's a great program. It really gives the kids who are falling behind a chance to catch up with their peers. I think once you fall behind, you never catch up without this type of help, and I think this is a great thing for those students and for the state of Mississippi," Bennett said.

"I was impressed by the students'

"I was impressed by the students' enthusiasm and the enthusiasm of the people teaching them. It was fun for them, and I think going to summer school sometimes is a dreaded thing to do. The kids were having fun, and they were enjoying their summer; so, it was great. Whenever you can have fun learning, it's a great situation."

The excitement of students being tutored was also impressive to House Education Committee Vice-Chairman Kent McCarty.

"I think all the students who were here today really seemed engaged; they seemed excited to be here. They seemed genuinely to be enjoying the whole experience," said McCarty. "That was surprising to someone who doesn't remember fourth or fifth grade very fondly. To see these kids with a smile on their face, spending their summer back at school and enjoying it, was really impressive to see."

Representative Felsher, who was also among the program's visitors in Long Beach, was also impressed by Mission Acceleration.

"To see the impact it is having on children, especially the children who most need it, is really heart-warming, and it makes me a believer of the program," Felsher said. "I loved watching the tutors with the children. You could see them responding, and having that one-on-one relationship seemed to really be impactful for them."

Boy Scouts of America High Adventure Troop 321 from Long Beach recently traveled to California and hiked in the tallest living objects on Earth. The first day of the trip after traveling included visits to the Father Crowley overlook in Death Valley National Forest, the Airplane Graveyard at Mohave, Red Rock Canyon State Recreation Area and Mount Whitney, the highest mountain in the contiguous U.S. They then drove through the Sierra Nevada Mountain Range and stopped at the Ancient Bristlecone Pine Forest Visitor Center, where they explored and gathered data for merit badges among the oldest living creatures on Earth. The trees that the scouts were exploring aged to over 5,000 years!

The following day, the troop traveled to Lake Tahoe, the largest alpine lake in the world, which was surrounded by snow-covered mountains. The scouts enjoyed a chilly swim, then left to travel up the Volcanic Legacy Scenic Byway to the lowlands below Mt. Shasta.

As the troop traveled the north, they enjoyed experiencing the extreme environmental shift, from the arid heat of Death Valley to the cool-dry of the Sierras to the cold damp of the Pacific Northwest. Traveling north, the troop saw the height of the trees increase along with the weather change. Upon arriving at Redwood State Park, home

of the Coastal Redwoods, the size of the trees was just difficult to comprehend.

The troop set up camp at Elk Prairie Campground and enjoyed hiking through the area's trails. The trails that the scouts hiked on, the Cathedral Trail, the Foothills Trail, the Rotary Memorial Trail and Big Tree Loop, all provided views that created awe for each of the hikers. To better grasp the size of the trees, the troop encircled a few different trees with everyone on the hike just to see if they could ... and just barely did!

The trip included a visit to Camp Tamarancho, a Scout Camp with over 400 acres of redwood canyons and scenic knolls, which also overlooks the San Francisco Bay. The scouts also travelled to the base of the Golden Gate Bridge and hiked across into San Francisco.

From San Francisco, the group went south to Big Sur National Forest and set up camp at Hearst San-Simeon State Park. A morning beach hike down to the local tourist village of Cambria allowed them to see giant fronds of sea kelp and seals basking on the rocks. The trip itinerary concluded with a stay at the Knott's Berry Farm Resort Hotel, where they enjoyed some restaurant food and the Knott's Berry Farm Amusement Park.



Hope and help available for those who need it

Life is a struggle, but perhaps more so now, as gas prices and food costs hit an all-time high.

"There are people hanging on by a thread right now," says Glenda Hull, as she multi-tasks, sorting and distributing food and other essentials to homeless and needy people in the area at Open Table Ministry's recent monthly give-away.

"We don't just feed the homeless," Hull said. "We serve those who may have shelter, an apartment, but they're just having a hard time making ends meet. Maybe somebody lost their job a month ago, or maybe they just need a meal. Maybe they haven't gotten a pair of socks in God knows how long. Anybody is welcome. It may not seem like much, but you can see the need, the suffering through the smiles," Hull said.

Needs Glenda, her husband Terry Hull, and their church, First United Methodist in Long Beach, feel called to fill - something they've been doing since 2015.

"We happened [into this] by divine serendipity," Hull said. "We had all this food prepared for an event that fell through, so instead we decided to try to find some homeless camps. When we did, we saw the need, and so we started Open Table Ministry. We started out feeding ten or fifteen people, and we ended up serving one hundred to one hundred twenty-five people every month.

"We want to show the love of God, the love of Jesus. We want to be the hands and feet of Jesus, and ease some suffering," Hull said.

According to Patter Johnson, they're doing just that.

"I've been coming out here for about four years," Johnson said. "I once had my own dog, my own business, was about to start a second business...but then I had a nervous breakdown. I ended up on the street with my duffel bag.

I struggled and struggled, but now I've been off the streets for two years."

Johnson said years ago she volunteered with other non-profits who help the homeless and needy in the area. She never thought she'd be on the receiving end one day.

"It was hard, but I'm off the streets now," Johnson say,s as her voice cracks and tears well up in her eyes. But now, things are looking up, and she credits the Hulls and all those associated with Open Table ministry with this new, exciting chapter in her life, reflected by the gleam in her eyes as she holds her young son, thankful they have an apartment now. She's even rebooting old dreams.

"You should have seen her [Johnson] five years ago," Hull said. "She looks so

much better. She's really trying hard. She's come a long way."

"Like they say, always walk by faith," Johnson said. "God is what got me through this. She [Glenda Hull and Open Table Ministry] helped get me through this. Every time Ms. Glenda saw me, I was pregnant, and she helped me, gave

me a blanket, the things I needed."

And according to Hull, a little divine intervention goes a long way.

"Basically, God has blessed this ministry," she said. "We don't advertise for donations. It just comes in to the church office. We have an account at the church, so donations can be made through First United Methodist Church in Long Beach. We use these donations to buy food, supplies and other things."

to buy food, supplies and other things."

"We are all really, truly created equal, but we are not treated equal. Social injustice has just slayed the human race. I've had far more opportunities in my lifetime than the people here today, and that hurts me. It hurts me to know they didn't have the same opportunities," Hull said.

But everybody has the same opportunity to give, and members of other cities, faiths, churches and denominations, all pitch in to help, whether it's manning the monthly donations site at the 19th Street Park in Gulfport, or collecting food, clothing and other needs at local churches for distribution.

Hull says year-round, there is a constant need for food, socks and underwear, men's, women's and children's clothing, as well as personal hygiene items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner and even Q-tips and clothes pins.

"It's these 'little things' we love to provide for them that people often don't think about," Hull said. "They like clothes pins. They use them to hang their clothes up on the branches."

Open Table Ministry has an opendoor policy – anyone in need is welcome to attend their monthly give-away, which takes place the second Saturday of each month at the 19th Street Park in Gulfport, and anyone can give.







New Long Beach football coach looking for improvements this season

The high school football season is right around the corner. This August will not only feature the start of the Mississippi high school foot-

ball season, it will signal the start of the Jacob Massey era at Long Beach High School.

Massey was named the head coach of the Bearcats in January. He was most recently the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Class 6A powerhouse Petal High School. He also spent time at Amory High School and Desoto

Central High School.

"I am extremely excited about this opportunity," Massey said. "When I started coaching, I always knew that I wanted to become a head football coach, and I am so grateful to the administration and community for giving me a chance to fulfill my dream of running a football program."

The Bearcats finished the 2021 season with a 1-9 record. The only way for the team to go is up, and the team has been making improvements under Massey since spring practices began. This summer, the team has been playing 7-on-7 games against top Class 6A competition (such as Gulfport and Petal), as well as practicing multiple times per week

Generating offense will be key for a team that only averaged just over ten points per game last year. Massey, who was a triple option quarterback in high school, will look for his team to do that by running the ball. Football games are won in the trenches, and the Bearcats will look to be efficient there. This will allow the team to keep possession for longer periods of time, while also keeping the defense fresh.

Massey also played quarterback at Louisiana College, where the team ran the air raid offense. His college experience has influenced him in his coaching career, so fans can also expect to see some air raid concepts in the team's offense.

Offensive players to watch out for are junior running back Edjuan Trautman, junior athlete Colt Busby, senior wide receiver Exavier Johnson, and sophomore quarterback Will Brady. Taking the reigns of the offense will be an important task for the young Brady, and Massey is expecting him to be a key figure in the offense.

"In our offense, we will only be as good as our quarterback will allow

us to be, so his development is going to be paramount to our success on the field," he said.

"We also have a good group of skill players that will facilitate his growth and development."

Defensively, the Bearcats will look to be disciplined. This specifically entails lining up correctly in formations and tackling. Doing these fundamental skills consistently at a high level will help the Bearcats limit their mistakes on the defensive side of the football this season.

Having great athletes doesn't hurt, either. Ac-

cording to Massey, the Bearcat line-backers have stepped up and been leaders on defense and in the weight room. It's no wonder that two key defensive players to watch for are sophomore linebacker Taj Aubert and junior linebacker Jahari Mitchell. Sophomore safety Andre Windham will also be a player to watch out for in the defensive secondary.

But, at the end of the day, assistant coaches are just as important as the head coach in implementing these offensive and defensive concepts. Massey's staff consists of Benji Foreman, defensive coordinator; Jamie Arms, quarterbacks/running backs; Cody Finley, offensive line; Max Crawford, wide receivers; Shane Pollan, H backs/tight ends/outside linebackers); Horace Fortenberry, defensive line; and Cedric Antwine, defensive backs.

"Every head coach in any sport is only going to be as good as his assistants," Massey stated.

"I have been very fortunate to keep some really good football coaches from the previous staff and also add some new coaches that have brought a lot to the table. Without a doubt, I am excited to see what our coaches will do to transform our team for this upcoming season."

As the Bearcats head towards the start of the season, Massey isn't looking for his team to look like world beaters from day one. Rome wasn't built in a day. However, he is looking for gradual improvements as the season moves forward.

"At the end of the day, I want our guys to focus on Long Beach," Massey said.

"The number one thing I want us to focus on is getting better as a team."

"If we can focus on the little things, like giving max effort and eliminating mistakes, the outcomes will take care of themselves."

"Our theme for the season is W.I.N (What's Important Now), so, as a head coach, I have tried to live by our theme every day," Massey added.

"For Long Beach, we have tried to focus on taking care of the little things and making sure we get one percent better every day."

The Bearcats will play at St. Martin in a jamboree on August 19 before officially opening the season against Pass Christian at home on Friday, August 26. Kickoff against Pass Christian is set for 7 p.m. that night.

By a narrow margin of just more than 3,000 votes, long-time South Mississippi lawman and current Jackson County Sheriff Mike Ezell edged out incumbent Congressman Steven Palazzo for the Republican nomination for Mississippi's 4th Congressional District Seat in U.S. Congress.

Ezell will go on to face Democratic candidate and former Hattiesburg mayor Johnny DuPree and Libertarian Alden Johnson in the race to be Mississippi's next 4th District Congressman.

Ezell secured 30,849 votes to Palazzo's 26,685 votes in the June 28 runoff, with 53.6-percent of the vote going to Ezell, and 46.4-percent of votes going to Palazzo, a six-term incumbent Congressman.

Palazzo will continue to serve in Washington, D.C., until the winner of the November 8 General Election is sworn in January of 2023.

The district represents twelve counties in South Mississippi, including Harrison County, which includes Long Beach.






