Property taxes due by February 1

The Harrison County Tax Collector's office has mailed property tax statements to property owners in Harrison County. Tax payments must be made or postmarked on or before Wednesday, February 1, 2023, in order to avoid interest charges. After that date, a penalty charge of .5% interest will be added each month.

According to Sharon Nash Barnett, the Harrison County Tax Collector, property owners can make partial payments through June. Payments can be made online at www.DeltaComputerSystems.com under Harrison – real or personal.

Payments will also be accepted by phone by calling 228-865-4039 or 228-865-4040 and selecting option 3.

Those desiring to pay by check must include a phone number, driver's license number, PIN and parcel number on the check. Checks can be dropped off at kiosks located at D'Iberville City Hall, Long Beach City Hall and the Orange Grove Library, or they can be dropped off at one of the Tax Collector's three locations: 1801 23rd Avenue in Gulfport,

730 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard in Biloxi, or 14321 Dedeaux Road in Gulfbort.

Checks can also be mailed to Sharon Nash Barnett, P.O. Box 1270, Gulfport, MS 39502.

The Tax Collector's office will process and mail a receipt for each payment the next business day.

Barnett notes that tax payments often include mistakes that can delay payments. Some common mistakes include forgetting to sign the check, putting a different numerical amount in the check's box than is written on the check's line,

not including a phone number in case additional information is needed, and not specifying the parcel for which the payment is being made.

Residents who purchased property within the last year and a half are encouraged to look up their property online to see if it is still in the previous owner's name. If it is, Barnett asks the new owner to print the information with the previous owner's name and attach it to the payment.

CES parents take over for teachers in support of enrichment for faculty

"It takes a village" was brought to life at Coast Episcopal School (CES) in Long Beach recently, when twenty-five parents volunteered to step into ČES Classrooms while their children's teachers attended the 2022 Mississippi Winter Literacy Conference at the Beau Rivage in Biloxi.

For three days, parents partnered with staff teaching assistants to cover kindergarten through third grades, while each of those class's teachers attended the three-day conference. Prior to leaving for the enrichment conference, the classroom teachers created and provided resources for an in-class activity they dubbed "Reading Ro-

Parent volunteers read five books to the students: Snowy Day, The Legend of the Poinsettia, Owl Moon, The Legend of the Candy Cane, and There was a Cold Lady Who Swallowed Some Snow, and then facilitated hands-on activities to reinforce the reading. Activities included watching the Snowy Day movie, doing art projects, playing games to boost understanding of parts of speech, and completing exercises designed to bolster writing skills.

CES Head of School Jake Winter remained on campus to oversee coordination of the Reading Rodeo.

Watching our parents step into our classrooms to enable our teachers to attend this conference that will have such a positive impact on our students has been heartwarming," said Winter.

"Our school community is very fortunate to see this kind of parental involvement to support our educators. It speaks to the magic that is Coast Episcopal School."

The conference, which attracted educators from all over Mississippi, is an annual event produced by the Mississippi Literacy Association in partnership with the Mississippi Department of Education's Office of Elementary Education and Reading for the purpose of providing literacy instruction for students in kindergarten through eighth grade.

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School's mural serves as reminder of Marine who gave his all

It's been sixteen years since Margaret Levens' son, Marine Staff Sergeant Donnie Levens, lost his life serving his country. The twenty-five-year-old Long Beach native died doing what he loved, flying, a dream Donnie had since he was eight years old. It was a dream he pursued and took to new heights during his honorable service in the United States Marines Corps.

One can only imagine the grief Margaret, and all Donnie Levens' family and friends, bore upon learning of his death in a helicopter crash over Djibouti, Africa, on February 17,

Though short, Donnie's life was a life welllived. Among many honors, Staff Sergeant Donnie Levens received the Good Conduct Medals for 1998-2001 and 2001-2004 from the Commandant of the Marine Corps. He was also awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement by former President George W. Bush, who praised the Long Beach native saying, "In the successful completion of eighty-nine combat sorties over Iraq, he contributed materially to the success of national objectives in the liberation of the Iraqi people."

Donnie Levens was also recognized many times for his volunteer work, which began at age fifteen with his first mission trip to Saltillo, Mexico, when he was a member of the Catholic Youth Organization. He continued volunteering at various places throughout the world until his passing.

Donnie attended St. John's Catholic School in Gulfport until the sixth grade, then attended Catholic school in Long Beach, so his mother said it's only fitting that Staff Sergeant Donnie Levens's service and sacrifice be displayed for all to see, which it is - at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Elementary School's library.

A mural honoring the late Marine keeps Donnie Levens' memory alive, as well as his

legacy.
"This is a CH-35 helicopter, which is what Donnie was flying in when he went down," Margaret Levens says, standing alongside the mural, also pointing out how Levens' name is painted on the mural of the helicopter, as well as the date of the crash, 02/17/06. There is also a star with angel wings to signify he's gone.

The mural was painted by a local artist who works at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Elemen-

'Sandy Salvage painted it for us," Levens says. "Donnie loved to read, so that's the reason we chose to put it in the library," Levens

Levens smiles as she says her late son would be happy about the mural's placement.

"The library was his favorite place to be, besides talking about military or flying. He loved to read," Levens says.

Donnie Levens' photo is also featured on another wall in the hallway of the school, alongside dozens of other local men and women who have served in our nation's military.

His mother, Margaret, hopes the mural will inspire other young people to follow their dreams, just like her son Donnie did.



"These two honorees [Lynch and Roy] continue to pick up extra shifts," said AMR Chief Dana Thrower before the awards presentation.

Chief Thrower also pointed out how the two AMR employees' quick-thinking on one call that was supposed to be a routine transport led to saving four lives.

The Best Costumes prize was awarded to Ronnie and Michelle Savoy on their float "Blue Christmas."

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



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Songs and shopping galore at this year's Christmas on the Avenue



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USM increases key student scholarships

Scholarship awards often play a pivotal role in the decision-making process for prospective college students. At the University of Southern Mississippi, funding for several significant scholarships has been increased to help ease the financial burden on students and their families.

Notable increases include the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Transfer Scholarship, which increased from \$4,500 to \$6,000 annually and the Freshman-Designated Based Scholarships, which increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000 annually.

Dr. Randall Langston, Senior Associate Vice President for Enrollment Management at USM, notes that the PTK Scholarship change will be especially impactful as the award covers more than sixty percent of tuition costs each year.

"This particular increase is being implemented to demonstrate additional institutional commitment and support to transfer stu-

dent populations and to provide affordable tuition to students during these difficult economic times," said Langston. While many of USM's schol-

While many of USM's scholarships are based on academic merit, the Freshman-Designated Based Scholarships are designated specifically to acknowledge student leadership. These include Eagle Scouts, goldaward Girl Scouts, valedictorians, salutatorians, student body presidents and specific Mississippi-related organizations.

"At USM, we want to augment our commitment to student leadership, both inside and outside the classroom," said Langston.

USM awards approximately \$6 million in scholarships to first-time students and approximately \$9 million in institutional aid to continuing students each year. Langston points out that the PTK and freshmen-designated increases are being funded internally as part of the University's overall scholarship budget.

"We feel that the financial support provided by USM is exceptionally worthwhile, given our



public mission and commitment to Mississippi and beyond," he said. "These changes in our scholarship programs demonstrate the University's commitment to students and their success. At a time in which many families are stretched financial-

ly, this is one way we are working to ease the burden on them."


Famous the world over, jazz funerals have origins shrouded in mystery. Filmed over twenty-two years, *City of a Million Dreams* explores race relations at a tearing time in American society. Burial traditions train a lens on the unique and resilient culture of New Orleans. *City of a Million Dreams* draws from the 2018 book of the same title by Jason Berry.

Deb Cotton, an African American and observant Jew, leaves "hard-hearted Hollywood" for New Orleans, where she becomes a chronicler of the parading clubs spawned by 19th century burial societies. Her zeal for the city grows as she becomes a blogger for *Gambit Weekly*, adopting the handle "Big Red Cotton."

As Deb explores her adopted culture, Dr. Michael White, a prolific clarinetist and New Orleans native, plays "the widow's wail" on his clarinet, a cry of lamentation in the funeral marches.

White's transcendent music also includes joyous peals for the soul's cutting-loose, which happens when the band leaves the cemetery, followed by dancers in what New Orleanians call "the second line." Risen in the ranks of brass bands, White, too, is on a journey of self-discovery, seeking clues about his ancestor who played at the dawn of jazz. White says of jazz funerals: "For someone dealing with American racism and trying to figure out your place in this life...you can be transformed into another world that really sets you free." Mr. Berry, who produced the documentary, will be on hand to introduce the film and engage in a question and answer session after the screening.

The public is invited to attend, and the documentary screening is free. Pass Christian Books will have copies of the book available for purchase.
