The Long Beach School District has been ranked number one in the state of Mississippi. The good news came on the heels of an education Q&A session hosted by the Long Beach Chamber of Commerce, an interactive community meeting headed up by Long Beach School District Superintendent Dr. Talia Lock at the Long Beach Senior Center the morning of Tuesday, September 27.

"I feel so proud of everything this district has accomplished," said Dr. Lock. "We had come in second in the state years ago, so to be the first in the state for the first time after coming off a pandemic - I know how hard everyone has worked closing those gaps.³

"They grew our students tremendously, and, for the hard work that our students and teachers put in, as well as our administrators, there just aren't enough words to say how proud I am."

The Mississippi Schools Board As-

sociation officiated the Long Beach School District's (LBSD's) number one ranking and schools' accountability grades during its monthly board meeting on Thursday, September 29,

confirming the LBSD as the number one school district in the entire state based on accountability results. There are 145 total school districts in Mississippi.

LBSD also earned an "A" under this year's scores, the highest possible academic rating. LBSD's overall score is 803, up 107 points over the district's 2019 total of 696. The min-

imum score districts must reach for A status is 668.

Preparations are already underway in Long Beach to celebrate this milestone.

"This is something our whole city and community needs to celebrate,' said Lock. "This has been a feat accomplished because of the parents, the community and businesses, too. If everyone had not supported what we

Voters to cast ballots Nov. 8th for District 4 Congressman

South Mississippians will soon be casting their votes to determine who will be the next District 4 United States Congressman, replacing six-term incumbent Republican Congressman Steven Palazzo. On the ballot for the race are Democrat Johnny DuPree and Republican Mike Ezell.

Democratic candidate Johnny DuPree is a former mayor of Hattiesburg and won the Democratic nomination in the June 7 primary race earlier this year.

Long-time South Mississippi lawman and current Jackson County Sheriff Mike Ezell pulled off a narrow win in a June 28 runoff race against the incumbent, Steven Palazzo, for the 4th Congressional District Republican nomination.

The district represents twelve counties in

South Mississippi, including Harrison County and the cities of Long Beach and Pass Christian.

General election polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, November 8. If neither candidate receives a majority of the vote on election day, a runoff will be held.

All voters will be asked to show a valid photo ID to vote in the November 8 election.



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and the Long Beach Harper McCaughan Town Green pavilion has gone pink as a reminder.

Banners with photos of local residents who have struggled with the disease are draped across the entry to the pavilion. Pink lights are also wrapped around light poles to highlight the importance of the month and the need to educate everyone about breast cancer and timely breast cancer checks, especially considering early detection saves lives.

In 2022, an estimated 287,850 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in women in the

United States, along with 51,200 new cases of non-invasive breast cancer.

Throughout the month of October, the City of Long Beach has been holding breast cancer awareness and fundraising events.

Many factors influence breast cancer risk, including family history, lifestyle habits and advancing age.

Thanks to research advances and improved methods of early detection, most women will have an excellent prognosis when diagnosed with breast cancer.

A mammogram is a non-invasive X-ray used to check breasts for breast cancer and other abnormalities. It is the only test shown to reduce breast cancer

deaths. Mammograms can detect cancer early – when most treatable – long before it can be felt. This improves odds of survival and can help avoid more extensive treatment.

It is recommended that women who are ages 40-44 should have the choice to start annual breast cancer screening with mammograms, if they wish to do so. Women ages 45-54 should get mammograms every year, and those 55 and older should get mammograms at least every two years.

To help further reduce the chance of developing breast cancer, it is recommended to eat a healthy diet and exercise regularly, avoid alcohol and (if applicable) quit smoking.

Long Beach neighborhood rolls out its own pre-Cruisin' party

Everyone is familiar with Cruisin' the Coast, America's largest block party, but one neighborhood in Long Beach has a block party of its own before the annual classic car show even officially revs up.

Jim and Carly Shloegel's home on Magnolia Street has been the hub for four years now for a pre-Cruisin' neighborhood block party. It takes place in their neighborhood, affectionately dubbed "Magnolia Village" by the locals, located just a few blocks away from the beach, and rolls out each year on the Saturday before the official Cruisin' kick off.

"We moved into the neighborhood a few years ago, and my husband Jim loves Cruisin' the Coast and he loves to

"He's come two years in a row now," Carly added with a laugh.

Some things do change, though. Jim sold his 1956 Chevy pickup truck last year, but now he's looking for something new – well, sort of.

"I'm on the hunt for something else," Jim said. "I have two grandsons, and I need something with a back seat. I couldn't put them in the front seat of a '56 Chevy truck with an iron dashboard and no airbags.²

Those grandsons, a one-and-a-halfyear-old and three-year-old, were at this

LBSD buses rolled after hours in the parade

Buses were rolling down the streets of the Long Beach after hours on Wednesday, October 5, in the Friendly City's second parade of the week. Teachers, administrators, faculty and students with the Long Beach School District were among those in a city-wide parade celebrating the Long Beach School District's latest success and benchmark achievement - being named as the Number 1 school district in the state of Mississippi.

Family, friends, business and community leaders were among those who lined the parade route, which wound from Long Beach High School to the Harper McCaughan Town Green Pavilion on Jeff Davis Avenue, where Long Beach High School cheerleaders, the school's band and others put on a performance after the celebration on the streets. Long Beach Mayor George Bass and Alderman-at-Large Donald Frazer read and presented Long Beach School District leaders with a proclamation from the City of Long Beach in honor of this first-time designation for the Long Beach School District, which edged out 145 schools for this top spot in education in the Magnolia State.

Two Levens cousins will reign as king and queen of the upcoming 2023 Carnival Association of Long Beach's (CALB's) Royal Court. Michael Levens will serve as King Scott 63rd. His cousin Jenny Levens will reign by his side as Queen Rosalie 2023.

Jenny Levens is a familiar face in the Friendly City, as she was frequently seen speaking on behalf of the City in her past post as Community Affairs Director or as the past director of the Long Beach and Pass Christian Chambers of Commerce. A lifelong resident of Long Beach - and not yet forty - Jenny has been recognized locally and throughout the state for her community and business endeavors, including being named the *Mississippi Business Journal*'s Top 50 Under 40 in 2018.

Her new role as Queen(-elect) Rosalie is unchartered territory, but she has quite the supporting cast beside her, including her husband Scott Brown, their two children and several family members who have served as royalty and as CALB queen in the past.

King(-elect) Scott 63rd and Queen(elect) Rosalie 2023 are already off to an impressive start. More than two hundred people turned out to show their support and make donations to a local cause at a September 17 gathering and kickoff party for the Carnival season. Jenny's Aunt Margaret Levens made sure she hit up every attendee that night to purchase raffle tickets for the charitable cause.

"I enjoy doing whatever I can for the children, and I am good at asking for money for that reason," Margaret Levens says. "Anything and any time for a good cause, especially for children and a great education."

The Levens matriarch, Mary Levens, also a past queen, was also on hand at the event to show support.

"Mary Levens (known as Grandma Levens to mostly everyone in town and all our friends) is our Queen," Jenny says. "She is the matriarch of the Levens family - her original nine children and their spouses, grandchildren plus their spouses and her great-grandchildren. Our Grandma was born and raised in Long Beach. Our Grandfather grew up in Gulfport. They moved away for a couple of years, but Long Beach was always home."

Past Queen (Grandma) Mary Levens was joined by other relatives and past CALB royalty, including King Earl Levens and Queen Margaret Levens, to show their support at the kickoff party. Photos of them, as well as Queen Bernadette Levens Tolson, were on display. Though Bernadette's life was not a very long one, her impact on the family as a whole is long-lasting and far-reaching. "Bernadette is our aunt," Jenny says.

ty-one when she reigned. We younger ones wish we had been around for Aunt Bernadette's reign as Queen, but we weren't born yet. She truly was one of the most beautiful Queens."

"Aunt Bernadette leaves behind a huge legacy with her three children Tricia, Tyler, Zachary, her loving husband Uncle Jimie T. and her favorite grandson Hayden," continues Jenny. "She was very involved in CALB over the years from donating, sponsoring and helping at events. She was a CPA and had a practice with our Grandma - she was very loved and respected. We miss her dearly and are honored to carry on the tradition she started."

Jenny will carry out that tradition this year alongside her cousin Michael Levens, King Scott 63rd.

"No one else I would rather have this experience with," Jenny says. "It is fun to share this with our spouses and kids."

The feeling is mutual, says Michael.

"It is a great honor to be chosen and have the opportunity to be King(-elect) Scott 63rd," Michael says. "It is awesome to work side-by-side with my cousin [Jenny] to raise money for local charities and be able to carry on the family legacy. It's going to be fun to have my son and daughter serve as pages around the same age that I was the page for my dad when he was the king. These are special family memories that we'll remember forever."

Michael is also a familiar face in the Friendly City. A lifelong resident of Long Beach, he, too, has garnered some impressive awards over the years, including the title of NAVO Civilian of the Year in 2019.

Michael began his career as a federal civil servant for the Naval Oceanographic Office at Stennis Space Center in 2008. He currently serves as a commissioner on the Long Beach City Planning and Development Commission. He and his wife, Briana Travelbee Levens, live in Long Beach with their two children.

While the Levens family was not involved with CALB until the 1980s, Michael is well aware of the group's history and mission.

"Even though Long Beach did not have its first official Mardi Gras celebration until 1961, the spirit of the season was always present in the area," Michael says. "In 1960, a small group of mothers whose children attended St. Thomas Elementary School recognized a need for a source of continuing funds to finance the betterment of the quality of education for their children, so they undertook the task of sponsoring an annual Carnival Ball to coincide with Mardi Gras Season."

That's how the Carnival Association of Long Beach started, and the Levens are actively continuing that mission, crediting a great team of supporters as they carry out the tradition of fundraising for the local community.

"I would like to reiterate that while we may be the royalty elect for 2022-2023, there are a lot of people supporting us and the CALB organization throughout the year, including our Team Captain, Ashleigh Seal, and the many people that make up Team Levens," Michael says. "We have a great team and look forward to working toward a great Carnival Season. Anyone who wants to come support CALB is welcome, and it's for a great cause."

"I am thrilled that our family is big enough and strong enough to carry on this tradition for King and Queen, but to have both in the same year is wonderful," Margaret Levens says. "I just wish that our biggest supporter of CALB in the family, Queen Rosalie Bernadette 1983, was here to see it in person; but I know she is watching from heaven."

"As King(-elect) and Queen(-elect), we [Michael and I] are looking forward to working with our team to complete the CALB mission of fundraising, but also to taking the time out to enjoy the many events we have planned and working to grow the organization," Jenny says.

Among these upcoming events are a Winter Tea Party, scheduled for Sunday, November 6, from 10 a.m. to noon at the St. Thomas Parrish Life Center, and a Fallin' for Fun Fest, set for Monday, November 14, along with 2023 events that include the CALB Ball on Friday, February 10, and the CALB Parade, set for Saturday, February 11. While there will be a theme and parade marshal, mum's the word, at least for now.

"Yes, there is a theme, but it is CALB's tradition to release that information until the day of the ball, so we are sworn to secrecy."

The two Long Beach students were among the more than 16,000 Semifinalists named in the National Merit Scholarship Corporation's (NMSC) 68th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists represents less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors. They will now continue to compete for some 7,250 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million that will be offered in the spring of 2023.

High school juniors entered the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2021 Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). The nationwide pool of Semifinalists includes the highest-scoring entrants from each state.

From our coast to Florida's: Gift card drive continues to help Hurricane lan victims

Those of us who lived in South Mississippi when Hurricane Katrina struck back on August 29, 2005, know just how long and difficult it will be for those hardest-hit by Hurricane Ian to recover and rebuild.

I remember, as a sophomore reporter at a local TV news station, reporting on a major hurricane for the first time in my life, saying, "This storm is far from being over." That was in the wee hours of the morning of August 29, 2005, just before all of us local journalists sought cover at the television studio as Katrina unleashed her fury on us. Little did I know, at age 29, just how true these words would be.

Fast-forward seventeen years, and now it's our neighbors, primarily in southwest Florida, faced with the monumental and difficult challenge of trying to pick up the pieces of their shattered lives, homes and property to rebuild after Ian made landfall on Wednesday, September 28, 2022, a date that will forever be etched in their minds, as August 29, 2005, is in ours.

Long Beach Mayor George Bass remembers Katrina well. Bass was serving as Long Beach's Fire Chief when Hurricane Katrina hit. He says Central Fire Station was the only building left standing that could be used as a hub for emergency, rescue and recovery operations in the city in Katrina's aftermath. It was a

heart-breaking, border-line hopeless situation, but Florida's first-responders and emergency workers brought our area a ray of light and committed themselves to providing us with much-needed help in our recovery.

"Everybody that was here for Katrina realizes the devastation we faced, the lost hope that we had," says Mayor Bass. "About five days after Katrina, I had a group come in from South Florida. They came in and offered their help to us here in the City of Long Beach. Their first question was, 'What can we do to help you?'"

"I sat down, a little overwhelmed with everything that had gone on, and I told them what our immediate needs at that time were, and they said, 'We can meet those needs for you,' - and they did."

"This group that had come in from Florida - they were from the same area where Ian hit - I am talking about Punta

Gorda, Fort Myers, Port Charlotte and several other little towns right there that have been devastated, and we certainly know what devastation looks like when we recall Katrina," Mayor Bass said. "We need to pay this back for what was paid forward for us."

That's just what the City of Long Beach is doing, and you can help.

Mayor Bass, a few other City leaders and a firefighter made a trip to Fort My-

ers and Punta Gorda, Florida, in early October, shortly after Ian's landfall, to assess the damage and needs there.

"Hopefully, we will be able to assist them and help them in their recovery, making it happen for them, as they made it happen for us," Mayor Bass said. The City of Long Beach is collecting

The City of Long Beach is collecting gift cards at the City's police and fire stations for those in Fort Myers, Punta Gorda and other devastated areas in southwest Florida to assist in their recovery.

"What we're asking is \$25, whether it be a card to them or \$25 to Walmart. Sure, they're going to have to drive away from there to probably get to Walmart, just like we did, but those cards will help them to buy what their essentials are, what they really need. It will allow them to really catch their breath, and say, 'I've got hope,'" Mayor Bass says. "It's up to us to raise these funds and gift cards to go

down there and give them these stacks of cards. We had I don't how many different organizations come in with stacks of gift cards that we handed out to people after Katrina. They would come in and tell us what their needs were, and we'd say, 'Here, take this, these gift cards.' The goodness of somebody else's heart is provided by somebody else, and I think it's incumbent upon us to try to do this same thing."

Mayor Bass and other local leaders plan to make another trip to southwest Florida to deliver the donated gift cards.

"We'll be making other trips," Mayor Bass says. "We're hoping to be able to put together a coalition of our Coast workers here to maybe send them down there and reach out to these cities. They were here for the duration during our time of need; now it's our turn to give back and pay it forward."

did, this would not have happened. Our teachers work very hard, but they need that support, and they have had it throughout - and for that we are very thankful."

Long Beach Alderman-at-Large Donald Frazer praised the hard work of the city's education workers and leaders on the day of the announcement, saying, "It's a great day to be a Bearcat! I couldn't be more proud of our schools. Under the leadership of Dr. Lock, all her teachers and staff, from the top to bottom - what a great team effort! Congratulations on being the top school district in the state - just another reason Long Beach is such a great place to live.'

In the Mississippi Department of Education's (MDE's) 2019 Accountability Results, the last ranking of school districts across the state prior to the pandemic, the LBSD had an "A" ranking and was thirteenth in the state.

Because traditional, in-person learning was suspended in March 2020, statewide assessments were not administered for the 2019-2020 school year. During the 2020-2021 school year, state tests were administered, but assessments did not result in accountability rankings for districts. LBSD has been rated an "A" for five consecutive years of accountability - 2016,

2017, 2018, 2019 and 2022.

As for the most recent rankings, all five of LBSD schools received an "A" rating

Mississippi's school grading system considers several indicators, including how well students perform on state tests, whether students are showing improvement on those tests from year to year and whether students graduate in four years.

The system also factors in how well schools are helping their lowest achieving students and English learners make progress toward proficiency; whether students are participating in and performing well in accelerated coursework, such as Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB) classes, and dual credit college courses; how students perform on the ACT; whether there are large differences between the achievement levels among students, especially students who receive additional educational services; and whether a school is performing above expectations.

The grades do not measure how well an individual student or teacher is doing or take into consideration other things the school may be doing well, such as meeting students' emotional/social or health needs or how well students are performing in other subject areas.

It's often said during the worst of times, the best leaders emerge. The unprecedented struggles and challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic proved no exception.

"Everybody knew we had to work hard," said Dr. Lock. "They did not let any distractions get in their way. We were a team. As a district, we were heading in the same direction, which is to move students and to grow students. The pandemic did present a lot of challenges – teachers were in their rooms, trying to teach the current skills, and they were constantly having to go back and see (in regards to the students' virtual learning) what did they need to do or make up, what they needed to get caught up on. They were constantly doing that, and then, when we had a little bit of normalcy, they just continued to push hard, even harder, to close those gaps. It paid off in a big way for them, for us." Dr. Lock shares the credit with not only the school district's teachers, faculty

and administrators, but also praises the community as a whole. In 2018, Long Beach voters approved \$20 million in bond money to be invested in the district, including a new and improved cafeteria, gym and Performing Arts Center at the high school and district-wide security upgrades at Long Beach schools.


Dr. Lock says she knows the bar has been raised high, and these additions, plus those on the way, will better equip the district to maintain their standard of excellence.

"The students take pride in our new facilities," Dr. Lock said. "Our teachers, our faculty and staff also have so much pride in these facilities, and now we know after our recent grand opening, our community is very proud of the investment they've made, and what we've spent the money on. We're looking forward to doing more great things - in the Performing Arts Center, in the new gym, in the classroom spaces and the new science labs, and maximizing what we can do for our students' continued success."

Programs in the district continue to grow and expand. Reeves Elementary School launched a pre-K program this year. While a small fee is charged for students to sign up, district leaders are hoping to get to the point where the pre-K program can be offered for free.



"Every day, if you do what's right by the students, at the end of the day, you can say you did the best you know how to do, and you can lay your head on the pillow every night, knowing you did the best for the kids and the district," Dr. Lock said.

Pass Christian sea turtle eggs not viable

IMMS workers assessed the nest in mid-October to check on the status of the sea turtle eggs.

After more than two months of anticipation, crews with the Institute for Marine Mammal Studies (IMMS) say they are saddened over the failure of one hundred thirty-two sea turtle eggs to provide new life, but they remain positive about what the nest means overall for the area and environment.

"Sea turtle eggs typically incubate fifty to sixty days before hatching," says Theresa Madrigal, IMMS's stranding coordinator. "As that time came and went, our staff became concerned that the nest in Pass Christian was not viable, as there were no signs of hatching during that critical period."

After Harrison County Sand Beach workers discovered and reported mainland Mississippi's first sea turtle nest since 2018, IMMS workers guarded the nest and monitored its progress until the decision was made in mid-October to excavate it.

"Following our permit guidelines with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, our staff had to wait until at least seventy days after the eggs were laid before digging into the nest," Madrigal says. "As such, we conducted what is called an excavation. The purpose of this is to determine how many eggs were laid and what occurred during the development of the eggs. We determined there were one hundred thirty-two eggs, and none of them showed any signs of embryonic development. As we suspected, the eggs were not viable."

IMMS will complete a genetics study to determine the species of eggs, which they initially believe to be loggerhead.

But it's not all bad news.

"Though it is a sad outcome for our staff and the community, it is important to note the implications of having a sea turtle nest on our mainland beaches," Madrigal says. "Sea turtles maintain site fidelity to where they hatched. This means that the turtle that nested here was likely born here and will continue to nest in the future. Also of importance is that an individual sea turtle will typically lay multiple nests in one season. As such, this turtle may very well have nested somewhere else in Mississippi."

"IMMS was involved in monitoring some nests on the barrier islands in partnership with National Park Service, Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and Vittor and Associates," Madrigal says. "Our efforts were part of an ongoing study looking at the restoration efforts done by these groups to reconnect East Ship and West Ship Islands. During our efforts this summer, we located five nests. One of these was an endangered Kemp's Ridley, which is extremely rare and exciting. Three nests were successful."

And there's still much to be learned.

"IMMS will be conducting a genetics study from all of these nests to determine a variety of factors that will contribute to the overall understanding of how sea turtles utilize Mississippi coastlines to nest and the overall conservation of sea turtles in our area," Madrigal says.
