# Online map aids in locating pets



Long Beach Animal Control Officer (ACO) Quentin Denney uses his extensive training in technology and biological sciences, along with his love for animals, to help residents reconnect with "man's best friend."

By combining Google Maps services and social media, ACO Denney has created a program that allows neighbors to learn about each other's pets and aids the Long Beach Police Department (LBPD) in reuniting animals and their owners in a timely manner. ACO Denney said there is a problem with animals wandering within the city, but it probably differs from how the public perceives it.

Long Beach doesn't so much have an issue with discarding unwanted pets onto the streets, and it is not the case that people purposely open their doors and let their animals roam and run.

"It's just that we have a big popu-

lation of animals, and they tend to simply get out. They go through fencing holes or hurry out the door when no one is looking. They get excited and flee when we have thunderstorms or events with loud noises like fireworks going off," the new Animal Control Officer explained.

Using Facebook as a tool, Animal Control can make posts letting residents know which loose animals are spotted in a particular area.

"People say, 'Oh, that's my dog. I'll come to get it.' Our residents should know that we don't charge a fee for the pickup of their animals," said Denney. "They just come and pick up their pet from our animal care facility. At the time of being reunited, we ask if they want to be included on the Resident Pet Map."

Pet owners are asked to contact the Animal Control Officer and provide a photo and a brief description of their pet.

The custom map link will open a view that shows the entire city and the included animals' addresses and photos in a searchable format. Using the map, ACO Denney, the LBPD officers or residents with access can type in an




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### Residents take to the streets to save trees

The drive to save live oak trees situated on the corner of 4th Street and Jeff Davis Avenue continues.

On Saturday, March 4, those in favor of saving two aged oak trees perched at the site of a proposed boutique hotel development at the corner of 4th Street and Jeff Davis Avenue in downtown Long Beach took to the streets to collect more signatures for a petition to save the trees, both of which are estimated to be more than a century old.

As of press time, nearly 2,000 signatures had been obtained for the petition.

The potential removal of the trees has been a flash point in Long Beach, with hundreds of residents in support of saving the trees showing up in standing-room-only crowds during the last several meetings of the Long Beach Board of Aldermen.

At press time mid-month, the fate of the trees was still in limbo, as no official decisions have yet to be made public.



More than two hundred people turned out for a Meet & Greet with the hockey team at Coastal Daiquiri Bar & Grill in Long Beach in early March.


Young and old alike lined up for autographs and pictures with members of the hockey team and mascot Hook. There were plenty of fist bumps and food and drinks to go around,



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
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# All-star line-up ready for Buddy Ball baseball's 2023 spring season

On Wednesday, March 15, more than one hundred forty players took to the base-ball fields at the Gulfport Sportsplex to open the fourteenth year of Buddy Ball base-

ball on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. This year's spring season has grown to record participation, and leaders with the non-profit host, Mississippi Gulf Coast Buddy Sports, say they are excited about what's to come. "After initially starting Buddy Ball in 2010 with

"After initially starting Buddy Ball in 2010 with twenty players and a handful of volunteers, we have grown to having one hundred forty players and over one hudnred volunteers participating with us each spring," said Mike Crawford, founder and executive director of Mississippi Gulf Coast Buddy Sports. "We played for nine years on one field in Long Beach before expanding to play on two fields at the Gulfport Sportsplex."

Volunteers and droves of fans, including the Long Beach High School dance team and Hook, the mascot for the Mississippi Sea Wolves, were on the sidelines to cheer players on opening night. The oldest group of adult players took to the field for the first game that afternoon at 5 p.m., followed by opening ceremonies for all of the league's players, along with the regularly-scheduled 6 p.m. games for Buddy Baseball's youngest players and then young adults.

A lot of effort went into the league's pre-game warm up as family, friends and participants lined up

at the Gulfport Sportsplex on March 9 to pick up jerseys for this year's players. Training was also held for Buddy Ball coaches and volunteers, who were also given league T-shirts

Crawford says the Sportsplex is ideal for Buddy Ball baseball games and players.

"The synthetic turf fields we play on allows individuals that use wheelchairs and walkers an easier surface to move around on, and the fields dry out quickly in the event of rain," Crawford said.

The spring season of Buddy Ball baseball has only just begun. Games will run through the month of May, as outlined by Crawford.

"We play one game with our older adults [on these dates] at 5 p.m.," Crawford said. "Then we play two games with our youngest players at 6 p.m., and one game with our young adults at 7 p.m. on Wednesday nights. We have an eight-game season."

The remainder of this season's games will take place on March 29, on April 5, 19 and 26, and May 3 and 10.

There are two Buddy Ball baseball seasons annually on the Gulf Coast, held in the spring and fall, thanks to the efforts of Mississippi Gulf Coast Buddy Sports, a non-profit public charity organization that provides rec-


A 40th Anniversary Celebration was held by the Chapter at their meeting on March 8 at the

animal's color, breed and size to find the home of that animal highlighted with a pin point on the city map. This also helps to view the location of sightings of animals roaming to link back to all the houses where that dog has lived or currently resides. This connection helps the police department notify the owner that their missing pet has been located.

ACO Denney added there is also a second map that only the police department can access.

"This version of the map flags pets who have shown aggression in the past or who have previously bitten someone," said Denney. "Included with the location on the map will be the bite letter issued and any home restrictions noted."

Long Beach is the only city on the Coast - and possibly in the state - Denney said, that has its own mechanism for maintaining, reuniting, rehoming and performing adoptions aside from the Humane Society.

The Long Beach Police Department runs LBPD Animals Needing Care and Adoption on Facebook. Their Dog Shed and Cat Shed can house fifteen cats and twelve dogs comfortably, are climate controlled, and staffed primarily by volunteers. The volunteers feed, walk, and water the animals; playtime occurs in a large fenced-in yard. When dogs are found within Long Beach, their information and photos are posted on social media to reunite them with their family. If they are not claimed within five days, vetting begins, and the dogs or cats are prepared for adoption. Vetting includes ensuring the animals are good with other pets, children, loud noises and car rides. They are also given their first round of shots and updated on other vaccines.

"We provide a pathway to create healthy, adjusted, adoptable animals within the city, and it's all free. We do not charge an adoption fee and keep records of all adoptions," said Denney.

ACO Denney stressed that their adoption is done separately from the Humane Society.

"If we take an animal to the Humane Society, it costs \$150 to turn it over to them to introduce that animal into their system. Last year, the City of Long Beach spent \$1,500 taking animals to the Humane Society."

The officer, replacing upcoming retiree Kerry Hall, noted that the animal care facility always accepts donations. Those items on their wish list include dog and cat food, old rags for cleaning, paper towels, antibacterial cleaning supplies, used towels for bedding, and scoopable cat litter. Items can be dropped off at the LBPD or the drop box on Jeff Davis Avenue in front of the barbershop.

ACO Denney added that a fundraiser/supply collection drive for the LBPD Animal Control Division was held in mid-March. These events are usually scheduled to be held at least once a month at various local city locations.



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
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# Bartlett honored by Parents' Campaign

#### PCHS grad selected for National Geographic scholarship

National Geographic has selected Alcorn State University journalism student and Pass Christian High School graduate Joy Thornton as one of its scholarship program recipients.

Thornton, a junior mass communi-

cations major, is one of seven students selected as *National Geographic* Content HBCU Media Scholarship Program recipients. Now in its second year, the program grants \$10,000 to qualified students interested in factual storytelling and filmmaking careers who attend Alcorn, Grambling State University, Howard University, Spelman College, Texas Southern University and Virginia State University.

Each recipient will participate in the *National Geographic* Media Scholars Immersive Experi-

ence Program, a two-week immersion program at *National Geographic* headquarters in Washington, D.C., from May 30 to June 7.

Thornton says she is proud of being selected for the program and earning an opportunity of this magnitude during her college journey.

"It honestly doesn't feel

real yet," said Thornton.
"I don't think it will hit me until I'm in D.C. this summer. But I am proud of myself for rising to the occasion, and I feel honored to represent Alcorn."

The recipients, who will receive an executive mentor for at least six months, will also learn about different lines of businesses, from traditional media to experiences that bring the *National Geographic* brand to consumers worldwide. Howard University

alumna Lauren Jackson, a senior line producer at *National Geographic* and

a Daytime EMMY-nominated media professional, will be Thornton's mentor.

Thornton anticipates shadowing Jackson, experiencing campus life at *National Geographic*, and exploring Washington, D.C. for the first time.

"I am most excited about visiting the *National Geographic* campus and seeing everything they offer. I am excited to meet my mentor, the executives, and the staff at *National Geographic*. I know they will immerse us in all things media, so I am excited to see their facilities. I have never been to Washington, D.C., so I am excited to see it for the first time."

The opportunity puts Thornton with other bright young journalism majors, which motivates her to enhance her current abilities while adding new tools to her skillset.

The event, which will be held rain or shine, is free and open to the public. It will be held under the portico near the library, which is located at 111 Hiern Avenue.


