#### Long Beach ready to roll with Mardi Gras ball and night parade

Carnival season is here, and the Carnival Association of Long Beach (CALB) is preparing for the official unveiling of this year's royal court and the annual Mardi

Gras Night Parade.

The 2024 CALB 63rd Annual Coronation Ball is set to take place on Friday, February 2, where King Scott (King-candidate Junior Husband) and Queen Rosalie 2024 (Queen-candidate Lisa Frazer) will be crowned, and this year's CALB Mardi Gras theme will be revealed.

Thousands of people are expected

to line the streets of downtown Long Beach for the CALB annual Mardi Gras Night Parade, scheduled for Saturday, February 3. Brightly-decorated floats will roll down the same parade

route as last year at 6 p.m.

The parade will start at Long Beach High School, heading south until turning west on Railroad Street to Jeff Davis Avenue, where the procession will continue to Highway 90 and head east, then turn north at Cleveland Avenue at the east end of the harbor, con-

tinue north on Cleveland and then turn east on East 1st Street,

#### Long Beach could become next site for casino resort on Mississippi Gulf Coast

After years of hurdles, the wager on bringing a casino resort development to Long Beach is one step closer to becoming a reality.

Following a Special Session of the Long Beach Board of Alder-men on December 13, 2023, the City of Long Beach announced the commencement of lease negotiations with a casino developer for a portion of land in the Long Beach Harbor, which could be part of an overall proposed casino resort site.

The developer was not named in the City's announcement or in the meeting minutes from the Special Session. The approval for City officials and the City attorney to enter into negotiations was unanimously approved by all aldermen present, which included Aldermen Donald Frazer, Patrick Bennett, Bernie Parker, Angie Johnson, Timothy McCaffrey, Jr., and Mike Brown. Alderman Pete McGoey was absent from the meeting.



When asked to comment on the potential developer following the announcement of negotiations, Mayor George Bass said, "We have nothing new to add on the prospective developer. We are awaiting word from them on their questions and concerns with the State Gam-

ing Commission."

While City leaders say this marks the initial stage of discussions, they also emphasize that no agreements have yet been finalized.

An official statement released by the City of Long Beach reads: "We value community input and trans-

parency throughout the process. Stay tuned for updates as we work collaboratively to explore potential opportunities.

The Mississippi Gaming Commission approved a potential casino site in Long Beach back in 2019. In the fall of 2022, the Mississippi Supreme Court ruled in favor of developers in a Tidelands dispute with the Mississippi Secretary of

The Mayor's office would not comment on the identity of the current potential developer, so it is unknown whether the developer the City is negotiating with is the same developer who was part of the Tidelands dispute.

City officials would also not elaborate on what land is involved in the negotiations. Currently, on the corner of South Burke Avenue and Beach Boulevard, a "For Sale" sign is present, advertising a "potential casino hotel site." In a previous rendering prepared for a casino

# LARGEST TURNOUT YET FOR JEEP-A-GRAS PARADE

Mardi Gras season is here, and the streets of downtown Long Beach transformed into a sea of purple, gold and green as dozens of Jeeps rolled out for the 3rd Annual Jeep-a-Gras Parade on Saturday, January 13.

A record number of parade-goers also turned out for this "warm-up" Mardi Gras event, despite temperatures dipping into the forties the night of the parade, which started at the Long Beach High School stadium parking lot, wound down Railroad Street, turned on Jeff Davis Avenue and wrapped up at Coastal Daiquiri, where live entertainment provided the perfect finishing touch for this now-annual event. More than one-hundred Jeeps pre-registered to roll in the parade procession, with Jeepers coming from other states to take part in the festivities.

The two-day event launched at Coastal Daquiri on Friday, January 12, where

Jeepers attended a Jeep-A-Greet and picked up their pre-registration packets and T-shirts.

People of all ages and from all walks of life lined the parade-route, competing to catch coveted throws, which included signature Jeeper toy ducks.

Hot food was also available to warm the crowd, including barbeque from a local vendor set up on the route.

This is the third year the Friendly City has hosted the Jeep-A-Gras parade, attracting Jeepers and visitors from throughout the region. Jeep-A-Gras is the only all-Jeep Mardi Gras parade on the Mississippi Gulf Coast and was sponsored this year by the Carnival Association of Long Beach and Team Husband-Frazer (Junior Husband, 2024 CALB king candidate and Lisa Frazer, 2024 CALB queen candidate).

The first medical cannabis cultivation facility in Long Beach, Sweet Life Canna Co., recently held a ceremonial groundbreaking event to celebrate the completion of the shell of their 10,000 square foot facility, located at 5030 A Avenue.

"We are thrilled to celebrate this pivotal moment for our company and for Mississippi," said Courtney Paolillo, chief executive officer of Sweet Life Canna Co. "The next phase of development for Sweet Life Canna Co. will be the buildout of the facility, incorporating state-of-the-art infrastructure, that will enable grow operation to commence as early as possible."

Sweet Life Canna Co. was granted a medical cannabis cultivation license by the state of Mississippi on July 31, 2023. The license allowed the company to begin construction of their cultivation facility. ## Long Beach could become next site for casino resort on Mississippi Gulf Coast

project in Long Beach, the waterfront property across Beach Boulevard, adjacent to the Long Beach Yacht Club and Parrish's Restaurant, was included in the casino development project.

One obvious opportunity for the City is the additional revenue a casino development would flush into City coffers. Casino developments, which began as far back as more than thirty years ago, have proven to be big money-makers and sources of much-needed revenue for cities across the Coast.

The new casino resort would create additional jobs in the area, could diversify the economy and is projected to boost local tax revenues, in particular pumping up revenues by the millions yearly for Long Beach public schools. The casino resort would also be one of the few located on Mississippi's west coast, with Hollywood Casino and the Silver Slipper in Hancock County to the west of Long Beach and the Island View Casino located just east in Gulfport

In the past, Long Beach residents have voted in favor of a new casino in the Friendly City. Back in a special election in 2006, fifty-five percent of voters voted in favor of a casino development, then planned to be located north of Highway 90. While those plans fell through, the City of Long Beach is now one step closer to becoming the site of South Mississippi's next casino, making it the thirteenth casino situated on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

During the initial hearings in 2018, most Long Beach homeowners expressed support for the possibility of a casino in their town. However, several Long Beach homeowners say they are concerned that the Gulf Coast is already saturated with casinos and fear the development will spark an increase in crime.

Meanwhile, proposed casino developments at other locations have recently been approved and are moving forward. In March of last year (2023), the Mississippi Gaming Commission approved an "onshore gaming establishment to be located in Clermont Harbor" in Bay St. Louis. The development, known as South Beach Casino, had an initial blueprint that includes a 40,000-square foot casino, complete with 1,100 slot machines, twenty-five table games and six poker tables.

#### Science Café to feature black bears

The January Gulf Coach Research Laboratory (GCRL) Science Cafe will be held on Monday, January 29, and will focus on black bears.

Historically, black bears have been an abundant and valuable native game species in the state of Mississippi. Anthony Ballard, black bear program leader with the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, will give a presentation about black bears.

Ballard's presentation will outline the decline of black bear numbers around the turn of the twentieth century, detail their natural rebound and describe the growing abundance that the state is currently experiencing. Attendees will also hear about the research being conducted on black bears, such as GPS collaring, reproductive success and genetic data collection.

The evening will also include exploration of the future of the black bear program, program goals, and how residents can take steps to avoid conflict with bears through public engagement.

The Science Café will be held both in-person and virtually from 6 until 7 p.m. In-person participation will be at the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory,

in room 104 of the Caylor Building at 703 East Beach Drive in Ocean Springs. Cookies, coffee and other complimentary treats will be available.

In the spirit of Carnival season, Winn-Dixie will offer local specialties and a free communi-





While many spent the week before Christmas mailing holiday cards and shopping for those on their gift list, more than a hundred people rallied together at the Long Beach City Cemetery on Girard Avenue on December 16 for the city's 5th Annual Wreaths Across America program, honoring late members of the military and those still listed as Prisoners of War (POWs) or considered Missing in Action (MIA).

The ceremony opened with a moment of silence in memory and reverence of those who have served in the U.S. Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard, as well as the more than 81,000 servicemen and women who are still considered POWs or MIA.

After the moment of silence, the American Legion Post 1995 Color Guard carried out the Posting of the Colors, followed by the National Anthem, sung by Long Beach High School's Women's Trio: Riley Sanders, Renn Newman and Maddie Cripple.

Alderman-at-Large Donald Frazer shared opening remarks, expressing appreciation for military men and women who gave their life for their country and Americans' freedom.

Memorial wreaths were then presented publicly for all branches of the U.S. Military by Marty Goodman, Sergeant Major, USA (retired) and Private Kervin Martinez, who presented for the Army; Gold Star Mother Margaret Levens and Corporal Justin Hurley, who presented for the Marine Corps; Petty Officer 2nd Class Colton Wilson and Keith Hieser, former Petty Officer 2nd Class, who presented for the Navy; Gravis Suber, Master Sergeant (retired) and Airman Noah Lima, who presented for the Air Force; Tom Pointe, Chief Warrant Officer-4 (retired) and Constructionman Dabner Maldonado-Montalvo, who presented for the Navy; and Wendy Griffioen, Donnie Levens American Legion Post 1995 Vice Commander and Petty Officer 2nd Class (retired) and Manny Segura, Eddy Blake VFW Post 3937 Vice Commander and Chief Petty Officer (retired), who presented for the POWs and MIA.

During the closing ceremony, Gulfport's Naval Construction Battalion Center (Seabees) Chaplain Jason Gregory conducted the benediction. Ms. Adrienne Cocco played "Taps" to wrap up the ceremony.

People from all walks of life, including local politicians, children, dozens of local Seabees and members from all branches of the military were on hand for this annual event.

"We need to recognize the men and women who have served in our military, to protect our country. We can't do enough for them. We can't thank them enough," said Bernie Parker, Long Beach Alderman for Ward 6.

More than two hundred fresh balsam wreaths, which were purchased and donated by local businesses and members of the community, were laid on the graves of all veterans laid to rest in the cemetery, some of whom still have family members and descendants living in the area who were on hand for the honorary ceremony.

Wreaths Across America began in 1992 with a trailerload of wreaths decorated by volunteers and laid on the graves of veterans buried at Arlington National Cemetery. The event has since spread throughout the nation and takes place annually throughout cities in South Mississippi, including Long Beach, but the purpose remains the same, to honor and remember those who have served the country.

This marked the 5th year Wreaths Across America has been held in Long Beach. It's now become an annual event in the Friendly City, during which memorial wreaths are also laid on the graves of late veterans laid to rest in nearby cemeteries, as well.

Wreaths Across America is hosted locally by Eddie Blake VFW Post 3937 and Donnie Levens American Legion Post 1995.

The new fire station replaces the old, mold-ridden one that was previously located at the Johnson Road site. Demolition of the old facility began in the summer of 2022 to make way for the new and improved fire station.

Coffee and pastries will also be complementary for first responders in the Pass who attend. This event is also free, and the public is invited to attend.





Floats who wish to be judged must have a float and riders who conform to the parade theme, with all riders in costumes and in their assigned position by 11 a.m.

A mandatory captain meeting will be held on February 1 at 6 p.m. at the Pass Christian Police Department at 525 Espy Avenue.

The parade will start at the corner of Davis Avenue and Second Street and proceed to Scenic Drive. From there, it will turn west to Henderson Avenue, north to St. Louis, east to Church Street, south to

Second Street, and then east on Second to Davis Avenue.

Parade-goers are encouraged to follow all instructions from police and follow signs for parking. Cars on the parade route in "No Parking" areas may be towed. No parking will be allowed in the median of Highway 90.

On parade day, Davis Avenue east to Courtenay Avenue will close at 9 a.m. to serve as the parade float staging area. Traffic will not be allowed on Second Street between Davis and Courtenay, south of railroad tracks on Fleitas Avenue, or on Davis Avenue after 9 a.m. that Sunday morning.




