





Where can people find your work?



fine arts festival returns to Green Bay for its 33rd year

A wide range of art including pottery, jewelry, fabrics, paintings and wood workings will be on display from dozens of artist vendors from across the midwest.

In addition to all of the work created by professional artists, Artigras patrons will have the chance to make their own artwork with woodworking at the family-friendly activity area.

Music and dance will be performed throughout the event with acts such as a jazz quartet and belly dancers.

For fans of the summer fine arts festival, Artstreet, Artigras is an opportunity for the community to continue supporting artists year round and to provide a bit of color and inspiration in the dreary months of winter.

The festival's patrons are not the only ones who may draw inspiration from the event.

"Just seeing the other art always adds to what we can do with our own art," said painter Debra Lee Hellwig. "It's confirming, it helps to get our art out there and get feedback from other people because it's hard to work in a vacuum. When we get feedback from other people, we get encouraged to do more of our art because most people are very positive and encouraging."

Lee Hellwig, who has participated in Artigras for many years, said that winter can be isolating for artists and that Artigras can be a social outlet for artists to get together and talk to the public. She looks forward to sharing her paintings, pieces that layer watercolors, acrylics and materials such as lace and flowers — integrating natural and man-made media.

Howard Ogden, an artist who also blends the natural and man-made in his work, uses homemade plant dyes on his scarves, shawls and wall hangings.

The dyes he uses are reliant upon which

plants are available to be harvested during each season. This past fall he collected walnuts and acorns that produce a range of colors depending on which part of the plant is used.

Ogden's process combines alchemy with self-taught lessons on his area's native plants and historical dyeing practices.

"It's a real pleasure to share the experience with people," said Ogden. "Some take a piece home with them and some people walk away with some knowledge that they may try to experience nature the way I'm experiencing nature. That's the real reward."

For Adrienne Brebrick, sharing her creative outlet with the public is intimidating but fun.

"I think [people] are very generous with their compliments and very encouraging to the artists."

Brebrick is a ceramicist who predominantly throws stoneware clay to create functional-ware such as mugs, plates, pitchers and bowls. She also creates decorative pots using raku firing.

"That's an exciting process; it's outside and it involves removing the pots from a red-hot kiln, putting it in a bin and smothering the flame."

In addition to using different firing processes, Brebrick loves color. She uses a variety of glazes, layering them to develop unique colors and create distinctive textures.

For those looking to support these artists and more, or just seeking a source of entertainment and inspiration, Artigras will be hosted at the Resch Expo from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on March 4 and 5. General admission is \$6 and \$4 for patrons 12 and under.



Outdoor Winter
Beer Festival invites
attendees to pour
another round, embrace
Wisconsin weather

We have a passion for travel along with a passion for beer. We have both in our professional lives made connections with breweries...

The pandemic sparked new hobbies for many people all across the country. Some turned to crafts while others, like Cameron Teske and Jonathan Eckelberg, discovered a passion for craft beer — a passion that has since evolved into a podcast.

"We launched in January of 2021," he said. "It was a byproduct of needing a creative outlet during the pandemic, drinking a lot of beer and needing to do something productive with all the beer we were drinking."

"Cameron and I met through the tourism industry — we both have been a part of the tourism industry in Wisconsin for going on like 10 years — and were looking for a creative outlet to do something," he said. "Cameron had written a book, Green Bay Beer: A History of the Craft, and that kind of excited him about learning the stories behind the craft beverage scene — breweries, distilleries, etc. He called me up one day and said, 'I have this thought and I'm wondering if you want to be a part of it' and that was when the Pour Another Round podcast was born."

Now, just over two years later, Teske and Eckelberg will soon produce their 100th episode of *Pour Another Round* and have covered breweries and distilleries both close to home and around the world.

"The end of March will bring our 100th episode, which we're really, really excited about," Eckelberg said. "And it's not just Wisconsin breweries or distilleries either. We've featured a lot of them — a lot of the Green Bay area breweries, I live down by Madison so a lot of the breweries down there, over to La Crosse and up to Stevens Point and Milwaukee. A lot of Wisconsin Breweries have been on the show, but we've also reached Alaska and Kansas City and even had our first international episode a couple of months ago with 4 Hearts Brewing in Australia."

With professional backgrounds in the tourism industry Teske said both he and Eckelberg enjoy the opportunities *Pour Another Round* provides them to travel to new places and make connections with new people and breweries.

"We have this tourism background for both of us," he said. "We have a passion for travel along with a passion for beer. We have both in our professional lives made connections with breweries...but then also on a personal level as we travel, exploring whatever breweries are in the destination we're in. We've made great relationships with brewers all over the state. We have episodes of conversations with breweries from North Dakota to Georgia to South Carolina, we just talked to a brewery in Australia... It's one of those things where it's all about the relationships that you



have... People are more than willing and generous with their time to tell that story and we're here to just hang out and get to know them better."

Guided by their shared desire to connect with brewers and breweries, Teske said episodes of the Pour Another Round podcast are centered around those stories behind the breweries and the beer they make.

"We are a podcast that really talks to breweries to find out their stories," he said. "A lot of people, when they do podcasting or beer blogging, they want to dissect the beer — almost treat it like wine and dive into the ingredients and the notes and the flavor profiles and whatnot. And we're really there to talk to someone from the brewery. Oftentimes it's the owner or the head brewer, sometimes it's a bartender. We just want to understand the story that went into making that brewery."

Teske said that although there is only so much variation possible between beers from brewery to brewery, each one has a story behind it that makes it unique and that's what his and Eckelberg's podcast is all about.

"Green Bay has eight or nine breweries at this point," he said, "Yes, they're all doing something unique and something different, but an IPA is an IPA for the most part. So why would I want to drink Hinterland's beer or why would I want to drink Badger State's or Noble Roots'? Understanding the story behind the brewery, behind the brand and behind the people of the brewery really helps you appreciate the brewery and the beer that you're drinking even more. So that's really what spawned the whole concept."

With so many breweries in Wisconsin, each with something unique to offer, Teske and Eckelberg decided to take their show on the road, so to speak, and host an Outdoor Winter Beer Festival.

Their festival, scheduled to be held Saturday, March 4, at Badger State Brewing is designed to accomplish the same goal as the podcast — to connect people with the breweries behind the beer they're drinking.

"It's going to be a great opportunity to come hang out with the breweries," Teske said. "We've learned throughout our journey and going to different beer festivals having conversations for the podcast ▲ In addition to unlimited tastings of a minimum of 60 beers, the 'Pour Another Round' Outdoor Winter Beer Festival will feature food trucks, fire pits and brewery and podcast merchandise sales.

with different representatives from the breweries that we really wanted someone from each brewery to be at our festival pouring the beers. We've been to beer festivals where maybe it's a distributor, maybe it's a field employee who's just kind of out of the brewery at events all the time and not necessarily connected to the brewery We want someone from the brewery to be at the Outdoor Winter Beer Festival so that the people who are attending and drinking the beer, if they have questions or if they just want to know more or they just want to talk about the beer or the brewery, the person behind the table pouring the beer will be knowledgeable, they'll be friendly and they'll want to talk to the beer drinkers."

With more than 60 beers from 15 different Wisconsin breweries available for unlimited tasting during the event, Eckelberg said the Outdoor Winter Beer Festival is a good opportunity to discover new beers and breweries, and even take home some merchandise from your favorites.


"We've got 15 breweries lined up from across the state of Wisconsin and food trucks and fire barrels," he said. "And a lot of breweries are bringing their merchandise sales too, so you don't have to go to their online shops — you could actually talk to them in person and get some merch from some of your favorite breweries across Wisconsin."

Those aforementioned fire barrels may come in handy for attendees, as Eckelberg said the event will go on as scheduled, unimpeded by whatever weather gets thrown its way.


"That was kind of the whole thought behind an outdoor winter beer festival," he said. "We go to Packer games and drink beer in really cold weather here in Wisconsin, so let's embrace the durability of the Wisconsin people and have an outdoor winter beer festival... As long as the temperatures aren't cold enough to freeze the beer, we'll be okay."

A band in Green Bay brings a new sound that creates a unique blend of rap, soul, hip-hop, R&B and pop with its discography.

Numadik is an independent musical duo consisting of friends Jeffrey Strening (who also performs under the name True Loudy) and Jack Lewaren (also known as Judah), and together they create a style that harkens to musical creators like Jay Cole, Kendrick Lamar, Childish Gambino, Tyler the Creator, Tech N9ne, Tool, Deftones and Nine Inch Nails.

"We met through school last February, so we've known each other for about a year," said Strening, the duo's singer/songwriter. "I was already making music on my own, and at that point in time I had a video production final coming up and I knew people already doing a music video with Judah like 'oh this seems cool.' I've been doing music on and off for about 13 years, so working with Judah was a really cool opportunity."

Having met through a friend of a friend at Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC), the two indie musicians felt like they'd make a truly powerful duo and decided to make music for more than just final projects.

"It all happened so naturally," said Judah, a singer and producer for Numadik that had his creative start in poetry and beatboxing. "We just started chatting in the hallway, [Jeff] said 'What's up? I heard

a lot about you,' and I checked his stuff out on Soundcloud. The reception he had for his final was so positive, and the chemistry we had was so real."

With single songs like "Free My Mind," "Even" and their debut single "Roundabout" (which has a local charm in its lyrics, being about — and even filmed at — numerous roundabout attractions within the city of Green Bay) and having recently released their first album *Of Love and Ego* in 2022, Numadik is starting to sink its teeth into the local musical scene — and they're only just beginning to make a local splash.

"Today's music scene is super diverse," said Judah when asked to describe what it's like being a musician creating in the Green Bay area today. "There are some really talented people here, and I feel like the Green Bay music scene is starting to expand and grow. You don't hear about people from around here hitting hard and going global, but I think that within the next couple years that might change. I think Green Bay has a lot to look forward to with the music scene. It's really cool because local artists want to help local artists. It's so cool to see everyone helping and supporting each other like that. Artists are always looking for recognition from other artists in their city. It is all local, farm-to-table, if you will, and there is some beauty in that."

Having just released an album last year, the duo shows no signs of stopping.

In May, they have plans to release an album that Strening describes as R&B meets hip-hop while being centered on

themes of love, relationships and other related circumstances.

"We are also looking at getting some live shows going in the summer," Strening said. "We are also looking to drop some merch and apparel sometime in the near-future."

"We've got plans, and we are here for the long run," Judah stated enthusiastically. "There is always that itch that needs to be scratched; you never know where it's going to go. I would love for Green Bay to hoist us up — it's so exciting!"



'Greed'



The debut novel of Madison-based author Timothy V. Tousey, Greed draws from real historical documents and accounts to piece together the story behind the sensational 1905 murder of 76-year old Manhattan heiress, Magretta Todd.

The influential Todd's murder, though probably unfamiliar to a reader today, once spawned countless headlines for nearly a decade following her death. To this day, despite popular theories as to the identity (or identities) of the culprit(s), the case has never been solved, and no one was ever formally indicted.

Tousey uses his imagination to fill in the blanks where they exist in the public consensus of the case, looking at the personal lives of some of the key players in this case: Magretta Todd, a wealthy heiress obsessed with her estate; Rosalie Tousey, Todd's daughter; Ingersoll Lockwood, a published author and Todd's lawyer; and George Hastings, a failed actorturned-con artist who would later marry Tousey. Most notably, Tousey fleshes out Hastings' family life, introducing readers to Hastings' beloved daughter, Norma, and his less-beloved wife and infant son. I can only imagine that these are the more liberally portrayed sections of the novel, for reasons which quickly become

Greed is meticulously researched, much of its dialogue drawn directly from letters written by its subjects, court testimony and sensationalist newspaper articles covering the case. This makes for an often fascinating read, with or without any prior knowledge of the case.



With that said, Tousey's pacing leaves something to be desired. The novel has a slow buildup, with large swaths of the novel reading a bit like a history textbook. This makes it interesting from an educational standpoint, but it may not be some people's idea of a fun, breezy read.

If you can get past this, Tousey's myriad of characters and their individual subplots are easy to follow, which is key for a tale that relies so heavily on the interconnectedness of its parts — even if, just like the real case the novel is based upon, the results leave one ultimately unsatisfied. A woman is murdered; the bad guy attains money and fame. The rest, as they say, is history.


