Marshfield Chamber announces Crystal Apple award winners

MARSHFIELD - The Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce Foundation has announced its four Crystal Apple Award winners for 2023, as part of the 20th annual recognition program. The winners were announced March 1, with surprise visits to their classrooms.

This year's winners include Kendra Haessly Grant Elementary in Marshfield, just the third two-time winner of the award. Haessly is a kindergarten teacher, and is in her final year. She will retire from teaching in June, after 21 years, including the past 14 at Grant. Haessly earned a degree in Early Childhood Education from UW-Stout in 1988 and a Master's Degree in Education from UW-River Falls in 2010.

After being nominated years ago while teaching at Marshfield High School, Taylor Varsho is winning her first Crystal Apple.

"It's exciting to feel appreciated," Varsho said, after the surprise announcement in her thirdfloor Marshfield Middle School classroom. "I'm surprised. I'm excited. I'm excited to represent Marshfield Middle School," Varsho added.

Varsho has been teaching since 2017 and is in her second year as a seventhgrade Health instructor at Marshfield Middle School. She is a graduate of the University of Sioux Falls, with Bachelor of Arts degrees in Elementary and Special Education, Varsho is currently enrolled in the Masters program at UW-River Falls.

Jake Scheppler has seven years of experience and is

in his fifth year of teaching Physical Education and Health courses at Marshfield High School. He is a 2012 graduate of UW- Marshfield/Wood County and a 2016 graduate of UW-Eau Claire.

Elementary, where is now serving as Dean of Students. He has also taught second and third grade and served as Math Interventionist last November. Klein is a 1997 graduate of UW-Marshfield/Wood County and a 2001 graduate of UW-Stevens Point, with a Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education.

\$99.5 million referendum is successful on April 4, there are areas of Marshfield High School that - aside regular routine from maintenance - would get upgraded for the first time since being constructed more than 55 years ago. As our series on the proposed improvements continues, we take a closer look in this edition at the kitchen and Commons areas of MHS.

The proposed improvements were identified by the district's Community-Based Facility Planning Committee, a group of school officials and residents who have been working since May 2022 to create a new longrange facility plan for the district.

"The high school quickly took on a big component to the focus of the work and the interest that the planning committee narrowed in on," said Superintendent Dr. Ryan Christianson, during a recent program Hub City Times produced, in conjunction with Marshfield Broadcasting. "That's why such a big portion of the work for the facility referendum does focus on the high school," he added.

"The high school staff identified the Commons as the top overall facility need that we have at the high school," according Christianson. Commons is the hardestworking area of any large high school facility, like a Marshfield High School. It is used every period of the day," he noted. "Kids come in and out or are constantly flowing through that. It is regularly used for activities outside of the school day. When it comes to community members and other visitors, the Commons is the mostvisited space anywhere within a high school facility."

The biggest job the Commons area has during any given school day is serving as a cafeteria for the building's 1,254 students.

Terry Frankland, who served on the Community-Based Facility Planning Committee which came up with the referendum package, toured Commons when it was in full operation during several lunch periods last May.

"I was astounded about what was going on there," Frankland said of his visit. "It's well organized, don't get me wrong, but the congestion is unbelievable.

We had students still waiting in line for lunch with less than 10 minutes of their lunch period to go," Frankland recalled. "And they still needed to get their lunch, eat their lunch and go to class. Now I don't know if they take some food and carry it to class. They do a good job trying to get the students through, but with that mass of people it's hard."

"It's important to keep in mind that the Commons and kitchen area of Marshfield High School continues to be the same footprint of the 1968 construction." Christianson pointed out. "When the building was constructed in 1968 we had three grades and it was built for about 800-900 students. We now have four grades with the ninth grade having moved to the high school, and about 1,200 students in the facility. When the '94 addition was put on the building to accommodate the ninth grade moving there, there was no expansion to the Commons or kitchen area. It's still the original space when the building was first constructed. We've actually operated a master schedule at Marshfield High School for almost thirty years now, driven by the fact that we have a Commons and kitchen that's too small," Christianson added.

"It's also important to note that this proposed improvement to the kitchen and Commons area not only expands the square footage space of the Commons it's the original kitchen that was built back in '68, we can't use that original serving area in the kitchen. We actually have mobile server units that we have to roll out and roll back in on a daily basis. So, that's really what contributes to that congestion issue that we've had for going on thirty years now."

Average participation in the hot lunch program at the high school is about 400 kids, along with the 125 students who are served breakfast each day. Also generating a steady crowd is the alacarte line, which sells roughly \$1,100 worth of food items each day.

But those aren't the only students served by the high school kitchen staff. The MHS kitchen is also preparing more than a thousand lunches for the district's five elementary schools.

"So, we're talking in the range of 1,400-1,500 hot lunches that are prepared in the Marshfield High School kitchen every school day," Christianson noted. "So, when we're talking about that number of meals, and the fact that we're running the hot lunches for the elementary buildings out of that same kitchen, our hot lunch program could certainly benefit from an improvement to the facilities in the kitchen at Marshfield High School."

Christianson also dispels a common misconception bigger Commons and kitchen spaces are not needed because of a dwindling high school

Empty Bowls: Raising needed funds, increasing awareness

MARSHFIELD -- Empty Bowls is fully back for 2023 and from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, March 11 at Hotel Marshfield you can try at least one of more than 20 soups dine-in or carryout.

"After several years of carryout-only because of Covid, we're so excited to welcome friends of Soup or Socks (SOS) back in person to our 12th annual event to support the food pantry while enjoying soups donated by supportive businesses and restaurants," said SOS Director Cheryl Lewis Hartl.

Empty Bowls started international an grassroots movement by artists and crafts people to raise money for foodrelated charities to care for and feed the hungry in their communities.

In 2011, a Marshfield team including local artists and schools came together to plan the first Empty Bowls locally. This year, besides SOS, artists and an army of volunteers, students at Marshfield High School, Columbus Catholic High School, Grant Elementary School, Granton and Auburndale schools are participating.

The event's timing is so important, Lewis Hartl said. Inflation is rising and wages aren't keeping up. Add in a pandemicera food benefit through the FoodShare program expired last week. That action is expected to have a huge impact on many in central Wisconsin, some who could lose hundreds of dollars each month.

"We are concerned with what's happening because some people may not have

enough to eat," Lewis Hartl said. "We recently did a survey of our clients and found 35 percent of those responding skipped meals to save money.

"We know a family in our area that will have a \$700 decrease in FoodShare benefits beginning this month. For some families, heaven forbid, they could have an emergency and no money to pay basic bills or buy food. So there are legitimate reasons to be concerned.'

Also, helping families helps children.

"It's especially important for children to have food since they can't learn, can't sleep, can't pay attention in school when their stomachs are growling," Hartl said. "As adults we know what that's

Everyone is experiencing increasing costs of food and another consideration is basic items that cannot be purchased with FoodShare like shampoo, dish soap, personal hygiene products, cleaning products and toilet paper.

Empty Bowls is the only fundraiser for SOS and as important as the event is, it's also about education, pantry needs and highlighting hunger awareness in general.

Empty Bowls is also about community.

"We pull together a whole team of volunteers from the community to make the event successful," she said. "So, it's about the community coming together.

"Also, to hear the hotel ballroom filled with people having a simple meal together is heartwarming," Lewis Hartl added. "You might still be hungry when you leave, but that's some people's reality, to still be

Vintage House celebrates 20 years

MARSHFIELD - Area diners have known the structure at 10150 Highway 10 West as The Vintage House for 20 years now, but the history of the building itself dates back nearly a hundred years. Owner Ron Weis is celebrating that history this week, as he reflects on two decades of being back in his hometown.

"We have a nice customer base, and we still have some of the traditional supper club people, and then we also have those people that tour supper clubs," Weis told Hub City Times, as he reflected on what keeps him going.

Ron was born and raised in Marshfield, one of 13 children of Ervin and Marcella Weis. He studied to be a chef in California and Germany, before settling in Lodi, CA, where he worked as a chef in a five-star resort for 28 years. It was during a trip back to Marshfield to celebrate a family occasion that Ron looked at the Vintage House property, which was up for sale at the time. He closed on the property March 3, 2003.

"We opened it in May," Weis recalls. "We opened up right after Mother's Day. We took the carpet and tile off the floor, all the way down to a really nice wood floor, and had that professionally sanded and stained," he added. "Brought in a baby grand piano and did some remodeling - new windows, new siding."

What is now The Vintage House has a colorful past, so much so that Ron highlights that history on the backs of his menus. The structure was built as a roadhouse in the early 1900s, and became a popular stage coach and Pony Express stop because of its proximity to the nearest Yellow River crossing.

During the 1930s, the facility went from a roadhouse to a speakeasy, brothel and gaming house. During the time of prohibition, notorious

gangsters Al Capone and Dillinger Johnny said to have frequented the establishment, while running moonshine up and down the Yellow River.

In the late 1930s, the

first floor was converted

into a dance hall, while

the upstairs became dining space. By the early 1940s the Yellow River Inn had opened up. Another change came about in 1945, when Slim Slim's Ward opened Steakhouse. The opening was short-lived, however,

the widening of Highway 10 forced Slim's to be jacked up and moved 50 feet back, to where The Vintage House sits today. The road project kept Slim's closed for nearly a vear.

Slim's Steakhouse became Baumer's for a few years in the 1960s before it was sold to Shorty Bloczynski and became Shorty's Supper Club. He eventually sold to Bob and Sharon Geldernick, who brought back the Yellow River Inn name.

In 1982, Jerry and Darleen Southern bought the establishment and began a 17-year run as Country Pines Supper Club.

After the building sat empty and idle for almost four years, Weis brought his taste for great food and wine from northern California.

"The new chefs are taught, 'Less is best' because it's your dinner meal. It's the meal before you're gonna go to bed," Weis says. "Us older chefs were always taught to fill the plate and make it look good."

PUBLISHER'S LETTER



Marshfield 150 for 150: Caroline Hartl Allen

NOMINATED BY THE NORTH WOOD COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Caroline Hartl Allen spent a lifetime sharing time and talent with the community of Marshfield. As a member of the school board, she assured children of a quality education by meeting their needs, and those of the teachers, staff and community, as she liked to say, "without extravagance." Willing to roll up her sleeves, she earned a reputation for getting things done. In business, long before women received recognition for leadership skills, she was successfully managing the Hartl family businesses and real estate holdings.

Caroline was born Nov. 20, 1912, in Marshfield, the daughter of Louis A. and Theckla (Backus) Hartl. She attended local grade schools and graduated from McKinley High School in 1929 at the age of sixteen. She then attended Stephens Columbia, in College Missouri, earning an Associate Degree in 1931. She went to the University Wisconsin-Madison next, where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in 1934.

Caroline went on to complete an administrative dietetic internship at the Women's Educational and Industrial Union at Boston, where she later served as dietitian for the C.F. Hovey Department Store. When she left Boston, she accepted a position as manager of the College Club of Chicago and later served as assistant director of residence halls for UW-Madison.

Returning to Marshfield in 1944, Caroline joined organizations such as Parent-Teachers Association, the Marshfield Woman's Club, Marshfield Business and Professional Woman's Club and the Marshfield Girl Scouts. Not one to stand

quietly on the sideline, she was soon filling leadership positions in these organizations.

Feeling that her education, business experience and interest in children might benefit the school board, Caroline ran unsuccessfully in her first attempt for a seat on the Board of Education in 1953. Five years later she won, not only her first threeyear term, but also the election itself, outpacing the other six candidates. She successfully ran for her place on the school board ten more times before retiring in 1991.

During her 33-year tenure as a school board member, Caroline made district children received the best education possible. She supported the teaching staff and was open to new, innovative teaching strategies and equipment. She understood that students sometimes have family or social issues to contend with, so she spearheaded the hiring of the first social workers in the Marshfield School District. At the same time, she maintained her stance that all children be treated equal educationally, and that the district's expenses be kept on a budget.

As a member of the Board she saw the completion of a new Grant Elementary School at 605 W. Kalsched Street in 1963, a Madison Elementary School addition that same vear, the new Marshfield Senior High School in 1968, additions to the former Lincoln and Washington elementary schools in 1968, remodeling and an addition to Junior High in 1969, the new Board office building in 1970, and the new Grant School, at 425 W. Upham Street, in 1992.

While the new high school was still under Caroline construction visited Al Bitzer's basement workshop to pick up a duck carving and mentioned to him that it would be nice if the high school had one of his works. When he told her that the Class of 1959 had given the school a carving as a class gift, she replied, "I mean, they should have a big one." And that's how the idea of Al's tiger originated. Al's tiger, the 16-foot carved Bengal tiger on the west wall of the high school commons area, was dedicated in January 1970.

Caroline represented Marshfield School the District for the Cooperative Education Service Agency No. 7 for years, and in 1964 was the first to head the agency's Board of Control. She continued as chairwoman for more than a decade. The district is now part of CESA No. 5. She also served for 12 years on the Wood County Human Services Board, with a focus on the Department of Developmental Disabled.

Believing that it's never too early to think about a child's reading skills, the Right to Read effort in the Marshfield public schools was established in the late 1970s. That program, with the cooperation of Caroline and a local bank, gave every newborn baby at St. Joseph's Hospital a colorful picture book, and encouraged parents to stress reading for instruction, entertainment, enrichment, satisfaction. and fulfillment.

Community involvement extended beyond Caroline's efforts on behalf of school children. About 1950, when conversations around town turned to the city's lack of a historical society, or any means of preserving some of the worthwhile relics of the pioneer days, she took a stand. At a Woman's Club meeting in April 1952, Caroline cited Marshfield's need for a museum, and suggested that it could be made into a community project sponsored by the club.

Five months later a meeting to consider

historical society was held. Those attending voted unanimously to organize a group to be known as the "Marshfield Historical Society." Caroline was one of just five individuals signing the articles of incorporation officially forming the society in October 1952. At the society's organizational meeting a month later, she was elected a member of its first board of directors. The society's name changed to North Wood County

Historical Society in 1956. As the city prepared commemorate 75th anniversary of the 1887 Marshfield Fire in 1962 Caroline donated an antique horse-drawn hose cart to the Marshfield Fire Department in memory of her father. He had purchased the cart to preserve a piece of Marshfield history when the department bought its first gasoline-powered fire truck years earlier.

Likely remembered best as a dedicated community volunteer, Caroline should also be remembered as a successful businesswoman. She was the owner and manager of the Hartl Manor apartment buildings on North Central Avenue and the Marshfield Brewing Company. She had the distinction of owning the only Wood County brewery, the smallest brewery in the United States, and at one time was one of only two women in the nation operating breweries. Like her father, who had founded the former Citizens National Bank, Caroline was a founder of Tri-County State Bank (later M&I Bank and BMO).

Caroline Hartl Allen was a true community leader, consistently demonstrating keen interest in the Marshfield welfare of citizens, both young and old. She helped make Marshfield a better place.



A new course at MHS, Advanced Manufacturing, taught by Mr. Behling (MHS Technology Education teacher), students introduces

high-tech CNC equipment. Students appreciate the hands-on curriculum in Metal Technology courses, whether they're learning about welding theory, machining, manufacturing processes, or design.

In the senior level course, Metal Technology Will's Capstone. Mr. students network with human resources and industry professionals from many local manufacturing businesses. student population.

"We do not have declining enrollment at the high school level," he says. "The school district as a whole, and certainly at the high school level, has benefitted from open enrollment. It is pretty common for students from surrounding communities and other districts when they get to the high school level, because of the wide variety and diversity of course offerings that we have, to transfer into our high school. Our high school enrollment numbers are quite healthy. But again, it's important to keep in mind that the issue that we're talking about

here has been an issue for thirty years. This isn't a new issue."

Along with a relocated main office and secure entrance, the Commons area would be expanded to the south, and would fill in the concreted space that currently exists between the fieldhouse and music area on either side. A new high school main office would also be added adjacent to the secure entrance, just to the west.

"There's not a clearlyidentifiable single main entrance into the building," Christianson noted.

The plan also calls for a reconfigured circle drive for improved traffic flow and more efficient student pickup and dropoff activities. "That is another

common concern that we hear regularly from parents," Christianson said.

Another noticeable change would reconfigure the current teacher/visitor parking lot that's within the circle drive, to allow for entry from the south, along with an additional driveway into and out of that lot from Becker Road.

District officials will hold a community informational meeting on the proposed improvements on Monday, March 20 at 6 p.m. in the Marshfield High School library, with an optional building tour to follow. The district also has information related to the referendum on its website at www.marshfieldschools. org/referendum.

Craft distillery to open in Knowlton

KNOWLTON -- A family-owned and operated distillery, named Knowlton House Distillery, will be opening soon. Offering distillery tours, classes, craft cocktails, and food, the distillery will be located across from Mullins Cheese.

The distillery's flagship product line, called TenHead, includes vodka and gin crafted from milk sugar (whey), a byproduct of making cheese.

Founded by Luke and Heather Mullins, the distillery is a marriage of their respective professions and passions. As a fourth-generation cheesemaker with Mullins Cheese, Luke comes from a long line of dairy farmers and cheesemakers. Heather, educated in distilling with a master's degree in brewing science, has worked as a product development scientist aiding other distilleries and breweries.

"We're not the first to distill spirits from milk sugar," says co-founder and head distiller, Heather Mullins. "There is a handful of distilleries that do it worldwide. But it just feels right that we distill from milk in Wisconsin. We're confident that nobody is more committed to showcasing these spirits at their best," she adds. "After all, dairy isn't just the pride of our state. It's the pride of our family."

While the concept of distilling vodka and gin from milk sugar may seem novel, Heather points out that it's a concept dating back nearly a thousand years and produces traditional-tasting spirits.

"Just like potato vodka doesn't taste like potatoes, milk vodka doesn't taste like milk. It's still a very traditional vodka. However, it has a smoother, more velvety texture due to its source," says Heather.

Knowlton House teamed up with local Logan Erikson of Paper City Studios to assist in the design along with Marawood Construction of Marshfield to bring it to life.

"We are humbled to be selected as the general contractor for Knowlton House Distillery," said Marawood co-owner, Ben Vance. "The Mullins have been a long-time client of Marawood, so to see their dream of owning and operating a craft distillery come to fruition and being part of that is an honor."

"We're excited to be working with Marawood Construction on this project," said co-founder, Luke Mullins. "It's always great to work with another local, family-owned business. Keeping both the design and construction local helps us to create a space that feels authentically Wisconsin while still meeting our unique needs."

Construction on the distillery began in September 2022, with an anticipated opening of spring 2023.
