Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast sanctuary works toward community engagement

KEWAUNEE COUNTY - Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary is working toward community engagement for its region on Wisconsin's shore of Lake Michigan.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) designated the area as a national marine sanctuary in 2021.

It is the nation's 15th designation of its kind, joining the Florida Keys, Monterey Bay, the Olympic Coast and others.

The 962-square-mile sanctuary protects and celebrates 36 historically-significant shipwrecks - 21 that are listed on the

National Register of Historic Places - and is co-managed by the state of Wisconsin.

"Well-preserved by Lake Michigan's cold, fresh water, several of the known shipwrecks are essentially intact and look much like they did when they sank. The area also includes Wisconsin's two oldest known shipwrecks, and archival research suggests there may be dozens more yet to be discovered," a NOAA release stated.

"Spanning the early 1800s through the 20th century, the shipwrecks represent a cross-section of vessel types that played critical roles in transforming the Great Lakes from a

New plaque honors historic Tarlton Theatre

GREEN BAY – A new plaque was unveiled March 29 at the Tarlton Theatre in honor of the building’s inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places by the United States Department of the Interior.

The building, which stands at 405 W. Walnut St., Green Bay, was designed and constructed nearly a century ago between 1924-25.

Green Bay Mayor Eric Genrich was in attendance at the unveiling and acknowledged the significance of the building in the city’s history — and not just for its architecture.

“The theater is obviously such an important landmark in our city’s architectural history, which is why we’re seeing this designation made by the Department of the Interior,” he said. “But it’s also become such an important community resource.”

The theatre has been known by several names, restored and reopened most recently as The Tarlton Theatre by owners Tarl Knight and Mark Mariucci.

“This opened as the West Theater, which was a streamlined modern single-screen cinema,” Knight said. “Something really notable about the space now is that it still carries the original

single screen that existed in 1941. Known throughout the years as the West Pitcher Show and the Historic West Theatre, its doors reopened on December 15, 2018, as the Tarlton Theatre. It was restored as an art deco cinema and performing arts venue with a bar and a restaurant.

“And now we’re the downtown home of over a dozen feature programs on our own but also really nice cultural community partnerships with folks at the Green Bay Jazz Festival, the Green Bay Film Festival, the Weidner and UW-Green Bay... All of those things together really mean something significant... 98 years after the construction of this beautiful historic monument here in downtown Green Bay, I’m very proud to reveal to you this commemorative historic plaque that officially commemorates this building as being on the National Register of Historic Places.”

State Representative Kristina Shelton said the building has not only been important in shaping the city’s history, but also in shaping its future.

“What you’re building here is so beautiful,” she said. “I think about the future of our city, and it’s really important that we reflect on the history of our city and sort of where we’ve been and what we’ve been and who we’ve served, but also what that’s going to

look like in the next generation of people. The art, the culture, the music that you have is a direct connection to where we’re going and where we’ve been.”

In that 98-year history, Knight’s partner, Mariucci, is the only person to have owned the building twice.

“This is my second stint in this building,” Mariucci said. “I needed to find a new home for a bar that I had in 2000, and I looked at this building and walked inside, and my heart just sank at the condition that it was in. I popped a ceiling tile and I looked at some architecture, mainly the curved wall, and knew that this was a space that was going to get redone and it was going to be done by me.”

Mariucci parted ways with the building in 2005, but returned more than a decade later with Knight.

“I met Tarl Knight, and Tarl, I realized, has the wherewithal to make sure we can achieve the dreams that we originally had for this building,” Mariucci said. “So we went into business together and it has been an uphill battle with great success.”

Knight said he is certain the historic theater will be around for many years to come.

“We’re going on five years, but this theater is going on 100,” he said. “We’ll make it 100 more.”

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Green Bay Metro marks 50 years in service

GREEN BAY – On April 3, the Green Bay Metro (GBM) celebrated 50 years of service at its “Cheers to 50 Years!” event.

Service began when the city bought the metro from the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation (WPS) in 1972.

And the metro has come a long way in these past 50 years, said Metro Transit Director Patricia Kiewiz.

“The past 50 years have seen great things happen to transit,” she said. “It’s exciting to see what this service, especially, has done in 50 years, and where it could go in 50 years.”

Along with routes, vehicles and other services that have become more accessible to those with disabilities and the elderly, one of the most significant changes to have come to the GBM in recent years has been the launch of “GBM On Demand,” an on-demand transportation service that Kiewiz said was developed

to especially help those working third shift when the Metro’s main routes are closed.

First launched in August 2021, GBM On Demand allows its users to travel different routes throughout the Greater Green Bay area, explained Kiewiz, emphasizing the importance of offering additional opportunities to third shift employees and employers.

Kiewiz also explained how GBM On Demand allows the GBM more flexibility with their routes, hours and schedules.

“GBM On Demand has

allowed us more chances to expand. Now we can adjust and make decisions quicker and more efficiently. Where you’d have a bus route take about 30 minutes, you can now have an on-demand transport that takes you 15 minutes. That’s an average that we’re excited to see,” she explained.

GBM On Demand also has wheelchair-accessible vehicles available for use, and its app is available to download on iOS and Android devices.

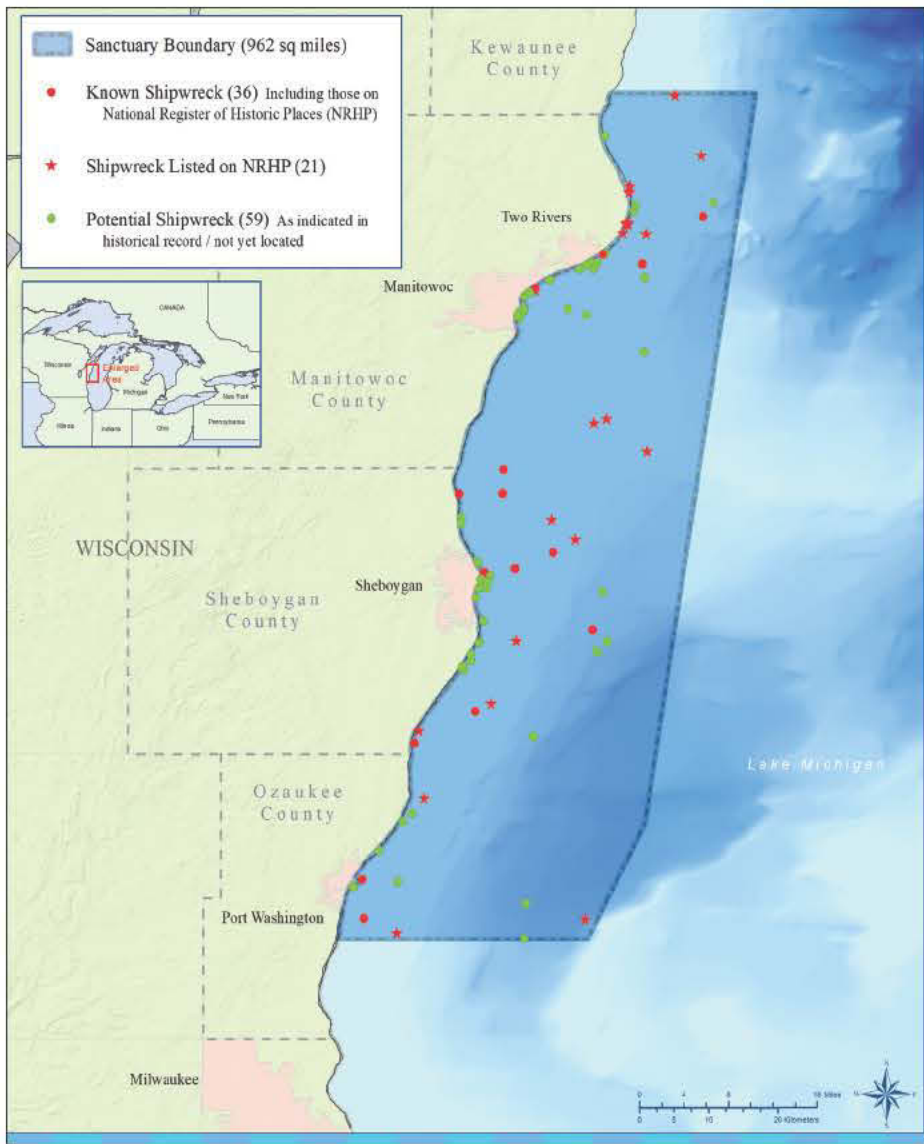
When asked about where she sees GBM going within the next 50 years, Kiewiz

shared how GBM is hoping to expand their services and service hours, as well as potentially investing in autonomous vehicles and greener forms of transport in the forms of electric and hybrid buses.

From now until December 2023, GBM will offer reduced fares on 30-day bus passes, with adult passes costing \$29 and elderly/disabled costing \$9.

“We want to encourage people to try the Metro,” said Kiewiz. “There are people here that don’t know about this great service, and are a little hesitant about public transport, especially following COVID. We hope that this will be that little nudge that gets them to try it, because they won’t be disappointed.”

maritime frontier into the nation's busiest waterway. The ships carried grain and raw materials east as other vessels traveled west loaded with coal, manufactured goods and settlers."

"This sanctuary began with a community-based nomination, so the idea of engaging the communities is really baked into sanctuary management," added Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary Superintendent Russ Green, who works on the UW-Green Bay Sheboygan campus.

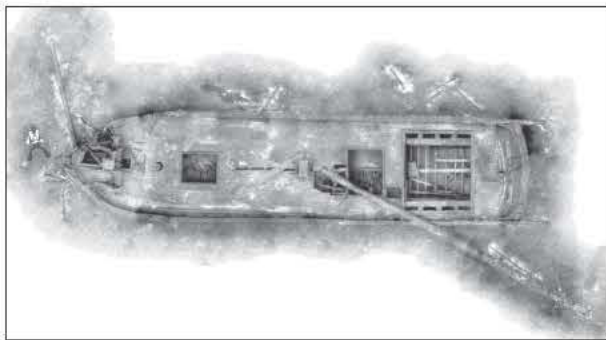
"For example, we're currently working on a facility strategy — where would our offices go, visitor experiences, venues, research and operations, etc... — and have had several working groups with about 60 stakeholders from city leadership to nonprofit to state and university partners."

The sanctuary's tagline: Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast NMS provides stewardship for our national maritime heritage in Lake Michigan and promotes Great Lakes conservation through research, education and public engagement.

Creating a ripple effect

"They are incredible historic sites, and they give us an opportunity to share those stories with the public, but also manage them creatively to find ways that we can use those sites to make impacts assure tourism, recreation, impacts and education, so we get creative with the way we manage this place," Green explained.

At the sanctuary, teachers and scientists work together to further understand the Great Lakes and increase stewardship of Lake Michigan.

Part of the initiative involves bringing teachers on-site for a full-emersion program.

"We hope they take some of this into the classroom and begin to use it to enhance their teaching. But what we really want to do is circle back with them after they've had a chance to think about this experience," Green explained.

"And let us know how could we do this sustainably can we create a 'teacher at sea' program? So every year we're having more and more educators on board and make that a tailored and a sustainable experience that's meaningful, that really gets at the kinds of things they need. So we're looking forward to these teachers telling us what we can do to set that path to create a really great education program at the sanctuary."

However, the sanctuary serves a variety of other education roles as well.

"In between that is the entire story of westward expansion and immigration and settlement innovation technology all captured in the shipwrecks that are in the sanctuary," Green added.

New recreational opportunities and tourism options are also arising out of the mission.

"Some of them you can see through paddleboard, particularly up in Two Rivers. Diving is a great way to do it; there's actu-

ally a new dive shop in the sanctuary. There are now two," he said.

"And then there's this whole third dimension that's really evolved over the last couple of years, which is virtual experiences. And folks that may not come to the lake shore. Can we deliver messages about conservation and our national maritime heritage to those folks."

Advisory council

The sanctuary is also working on community interaction through the development of an advisory council.

"The advisory council brings members of the local community together to provide advice to NOAA and help guide sanctuary management. Council members also act as liaisons to their communities, building a strong connection between the sanctuary and stakeholders," Green explained.

The council held its first meeting on March 16, but is currently seeking applicants for six vacant alternate seats.

The seats include: diving/dive clubs/archaeology, K-12 education, higher education, fishing, history/heritage/public interpretation and recreation.

Green Bay receives funding to create office of violence prevention

GREEN BAY – The City of Green Bay was recently awarded a \$1 million grant from the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) - Wisconsin Community Safety Fund (WCSF) in partnership with the state of Wisconsin.

The funds will be used for creating and sustaining an office of violence prevention (OVP).

“For too long, our communities have been asked to do more with less as public safety costs over the last decade have increased while state aid to local communities has been cut or held flat. Folks, that’s not safe or sustainable,” said Governor Tony Evers. “Our communities should be able to meet unique and basic needs alike, including investing in public safety.”

The OVP will be incorporated into the Department of Community & Economic Development.

“Under the leadership

of a program director, the office will focus on neighborhoods to address disruption caused by crime through deterrence, tracking underlying contributing factors, researching incidents with high likelihood of retaliation, developing reduction strategies, identifying at-risk individuals, conducting street outreach, and increasing resiliency in residents,” a release from the Green Bay Police Department stated.

“We are grateful to Governor Evers for understanding the need for this kind of support in communities across the state of Wisconsin,” said Green Bay Mayor Eric Genrich. “With these resources we will be able to address the root causes of community violence, ease the burden borne by our police officers and enhance the safety of all Green Bay’s neighborhoods.”

“In recent years, Green Bay and communities

around the country have seen an uptick in anti-social behaviors and some violent crimes. In response, the City of Green Bay retained the National Institute for Criminal Justice Reform (NICJR) to provide an analysis of violent crime in the community,” the police department release added.

The NICJR report recommended several strategies, including the need for greater investment in community-based services often provided by an OVP.

“We are committed to stopping gun violence in our community. The OVP approach is an emerging best practice for interrupting the cycle of violence and preventing the harm caused by violent crime. This grant is a tremendous opportunity for the City of Green Bay,” said Green Bay Police Chief Chris Davis.

The grant is expected to fund the OVP during its first three years.

Hobart breaks ground for new fire station

Among the recipients of this year’s awards is UW-Green Bay’s First Nations Education Doctorate program.

The program is the first of its kind in Wisconsin and is housed within UW-Green Bay’s College of Health, Education, and Social Welfare.

A collaborative effort between UW-Green Bay and Tribal Nations in Wisconsin, the program is centered on indigenous knowledge systems and offers a holistic approach to education led by four full-time faculty members and elders and oral scholars from the First Nations community representing a variety of nations, including Oneida, Menominee, Lac du Flambeau, Cherokee and Delaware.

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WBAY 70: The early days

Part IV in our series on WBAY’s history

The station went on the air on March 17, 1953, to serve an area that was considered both heavily industrialized and a rich dairy land.

WBAY was the first television station in Green Bay and second in the state – second only to Milwaukee’s WTMJ.

A July 1953 *Oshkosh Northwestern* article states that the station operated “in an area which had as of May 1, 1953, more than 60,000 television sets.”

“When the station goes to 100,000-watt power soon, it is expected at a conservative estimate that there will be more than 200,000 sets in eastern and central Wisconsin and in upper and lower Michigan,” WBAY-TV officials speculated.

In December 1953, a 750-foot antenna began operations at 100,000 watts from the top of Scray Hill.

Area music and appliance stores quickly picked up WBAY’s presence and power in its marketing of television sets and TV antennas.

Broadcasting in those earlier days ran from 2:30 p.m. to midnight, before signing off.

“We had five-minute weather casts; we had 10-minute sportscasts. Part of the reason that is, is because sports would supply us with film. We could get NFL films; we could get Wisconsin Badgers films, and

they were supplied a couple of days after the game,” explained WBAY web manager/digital director and station historian, Ted Miller.

“Whereas, with local news, we didn’t have the cameras.

“We had newscasts, not like today; they’d be like 5-10-15 minutes of news.”

One year after going on air, plans came together for a 17-hour telethon called the “Celebrity Parade for Cerebral Palsy.”

The event was to be broadcast over both WBAY-TV and WBAY Radio for the first time May 22-23, 1954.

“This telethon, they call it a grassroots telethon. The United Cerebral Palsy had offices all over to take care of CP (cerebral palsy). They had offices in one of the hospitals here. There wasn’t a CP building at the time, but they had offices and so they would go from state to state,

city to city that had TV stations,” explained Miller.

“They would bring stars. At the time, TV was very young so the networks were like, ‘You’re going. You’re going to travel the country; you’re going to meet the people; you’re going to sell TV sets. More people watch TV; more people watch ads.

“So, they would come with these big stars to town. They’d come to the WBAY building — it was still called the Columbus Building at

the time — and people got to meet them.

“The first telethon in 1954, Tommy Bartlett was one of the masters of ceremonies, along with a Capitol Records recording artist, Helen O’Connell.”

The show originated from a remote studio set up on the stage of the Central Catholic High School auditorium in Green Bay.

“They started at 10 p.m. on a Saturday night and continued until 3 a.m. on Sunday morning. On Sunday morning, anyone could come to the auditorium and watch the telethon live in person and every kid that showed up would receive a plastic space-ship bottle,” Miller said.

Funds were collected and brought to the studio, where those fundraising were able to meet the stars.

Viewers were also able to phone in donations.

“That was 1954, a year after we went on the air, and we’ve had a telethon on WBAY every year ever since,” he added.

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Suamico approves new development

SUAMICO – The Suamico Village Board approved a new development and tabled a project for Calavera Springs Park during its April 3 meeting.

In a 5-2 vote, the board approved a 22-lot preliminary plat for a 29-acre parcel at the southeast corner of Westline Road and Westpoint Road, near the village's western edge.

The vote came after a 6-1 decision to rezone the property from agricultural farmland preservation to rural residential.

Village Administrator Alex Kaker noted that the development is in line with Suamico's comprehensive plan since the area immediately to the south of the parcel is also rural residential.

Michelle Eckert was the lone dissenting vote on the rezoning, saying that she thought the lot sizes on the plat were too small to be con-

sidered rural residential.

Per the village's comprehensive plan, lots zoned rural residential must be at least 50,000 square feet, unless they are in the northeast corner of the village.

Fifteen of the 18 lots in the plat are between 50,000 and 51,000 square feet, leading one member of the public to comment that it felt like developer Big Sky Real Estate was trying to fit as many lots in as they could.

Concerns about maintaining Suamico's "country feel" came to light with the lots positioned substantially closer together than lots immediately to the south.

Other members of the public also spoke against a possible extension of sewer and water services into the potential new development, citing high-quality well water that can be extracted in the area.

However, they did not care one way or the other for the actual construction of the de-

velopment.

Kaker said that he does not envision sewer or water servicing the surrounding areas in the near- or long-term.

In the end, most board members did not foresee any major issues with the development.

Tabled Calavera Park project

Construction of new soccer fields at Calavera Springs Park will have to wait.

In the village's parks master plan, the 11 soccer fields at Calavera are moved from the south side of the park to the north side.

Village staff bid out a project for seven new fields, with McKeefry and Sons of Pulaski submitting the low bid at \$278,857.

That is more than the 2022 estimated cost of \$153,200 in 2022.

The project had about \$178,000 in funding, meaning the board would have to come up with an additional \$100,000 for the project.

Multiple board members expressed disappointment that more sponsor funding was not found for the project.

It was also pointed out that the project is being considered as part of the parks master plan, and not because of any particular group who needed the fields.

The Wisconsin Loons soccer team currently utilizes fields at Idlewild Community Park.

Multiple funding options were discussed, including using the last \$25,000 of excess stadium district tax money.

Drawing money from the park impact fund was also examined.

Additionally, an idea was brought up to draw most of the funding from the trail development fund.

An alternate bid was also looked at, which included the village performing some functions and then contracting with Michels Construction for the rest.

That plan would cost about \$231,000 in total.

Ultimately, board members sought further clarification on what kind of park impact fees they had to work with, and a motion to send that matter to staff and to table action on the soccer fields passed unanimously.

Promissory notes approved

In other business, the board approved the issuance of \$1.26 million in promissory notes.

The notes will be used to pay for the East Deerfield Road sewer extension project.

Ehlers Public Finance Advisors of Waukesha recommended eight-year notes, and said that the bid process will be similar to that of a public works project.

Urban Forestry Grant launches Pulaski tree initiative

PULASKI – The Village of Pulaski will receive a 2023 Urban Forestry Start Up grant in the amount of \$5,000 — matched by local contributions from the Pulaski Lions Club, Pulaski United Foundation and the Tri-County Optimist Club.

The grant will provide funding for activities supporting the gradual replanting of shade trees in village parks, replacing those lost in recent storms.

Bluestem Forestry Consulting will complete a tree inventory, cataloging each current tree's species, health, location and other features.

Following the tree inventory, Bluestem will prepare a forestry operations plan to be considered by the Pulaski Park and Recreation Commission and other village entities.

The Pulaski Department of Public Works will develop a budget for future tree planting and the ongoing care of those trees.

The Department of Public Works will also construct a gravel bed nursery — which allows for rapid expansion of tree roots and easy extraction of trees for planting — at the Pulaski Community Garden, where inexpensive bare root stock trees will be able to reach planting size in just one growing season.

"It's given students who aren't in any other activity a chance to participate in the school community," he explained.

"In addition, I try my best to attend school sporting events to show support to the students of our school."

In the math department, Belter meets regularly with grade-level teams on teaching strategies.

"In these meetings, we

analyze student assessment data, align curriculum to the essential standards and discuss interventions to help student learning," he added.

"I am also leading a committee to purchase new AP (advanced placement) calculus books for the district next year."

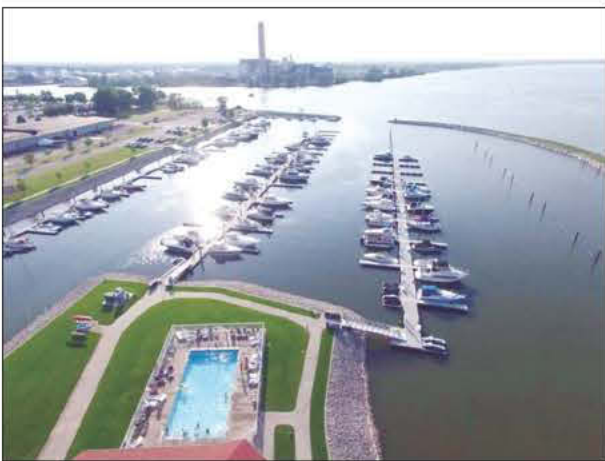

High Cliff State Park Marina, South Bay Marina projects receive funding

GREEN BAY – On March 28, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced that two projects in Wisconsin were awarded U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Boating Infrastructure Grant (BIG) funding for renovations.

This includes projects at the High Cliff State Park Marina and South Bay Marina.

"The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service awarded more than \$20 million to assist 22 states and territories in the construction, renovation and maintenance of marinas and other boating facilities for outdoor recreation. Wisconsin was one of only eight states that received both a Tier 1 and Tier 2 Boating Infrastructure Grant in 2023," a DNR release stated.

"Boating Infrastructure Grants are administered in two tiers. In Tier 1, federal funding provides a maximum of \$200,000 per recipient annually. Tier 2 is nationally competitive, typically for larger-scale projects and provides a

maximum federal funding of \$1.5 million per application.

"Wisconsin's Tier 1 project focuses on the High Cliff State Park Marina culvert replacement and was awarded \$200,000. With a capacity for about 100 vessels, this marina is exceptionally popular. An existing culvert delivering runoff from Butterfly Pond into the boat basin at the marina has degraded over time, leading to sedimentation and a decrease in draft depth and water clarity."

The DNR will use the Boating Infrastructure Grant Tier 1 funds to replace the culvert and replace outdated marina navigational lighting with more efficient fixtures.

Boating Infrastructure Grant Tier 2 project funding will be a sub-award from the DNR to the South Bay Marina in Green Bay.

The South Bay Marina Transient Docks project was awarded \$1.2 million and will focus on several improvements.

Time ravages the body. No matter how much we fight its assault on bones and sinews, eventually the battle is lost and we succumb to the inevitable.

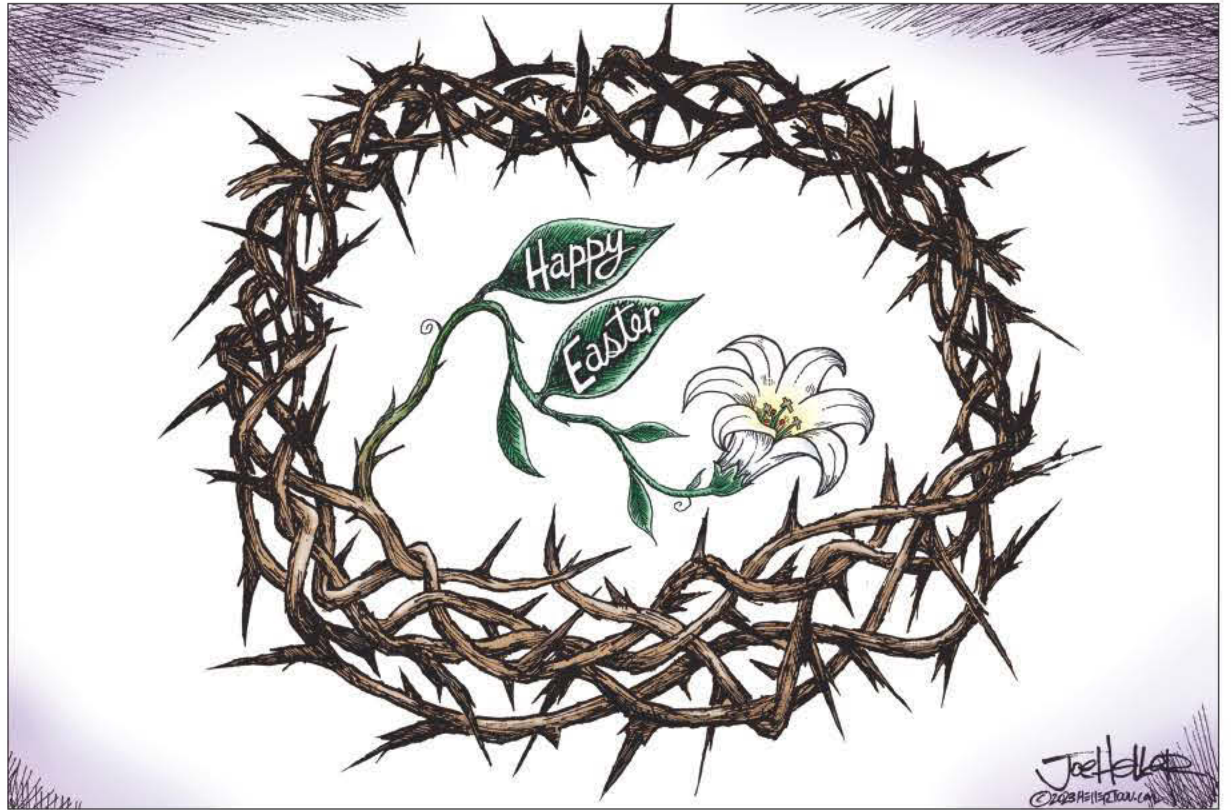

Considering amendments to the short-term rental ordinance

TO THE RESIDENTS OF THE VILLAGE OF ASHWAUBENON,

Recently, the Ashwaubenon Village Board indicated a desire to consider limits on short-term rentals, seemingly in response to the recent sale and improvement of homes adjacent to Lambeau Field that are rented on game day.

I own one of the houses that this change would impact.

I grew up in Ashwaubenon, and in 2020, with two friends who also grew up in town and are also in their mid-20s, we pooled our resources, took a considerable risk and purchased a home adjacent to the stadium.

The house was abandoned when we bought it, an eyesore in the neighborhood.

While the previous owner cared little about neighbors and the community, and grass on the property often grew to be more than a foot high, we have taken great pride in it.

We love the neighborhood and are proud to know we have improved it.

The village collects thousands in occupancy taxes whenever we rent to guests, primarily out-of-town families and organizations who gather on game days.

South Bay Marina is located at the mouth of the Fox River and the waters of Lake Michigan.

The location of the facility puts the marina at the ideal location to service the

popular cruising routes of boaters navigating Sturgeon Bay and the pristine waters of Door County.

The proposed project responds to the need for an increased number of dedicated transient slips in the Green Bay region of Lake Michigan in response to

market demand.

The proposed project includes 52 transient boat slips arranged to accept a wide variety of vessels 26 inches and longer, break-water improvements to protect the marina and a toilet/shower building dedicated to transient boaters.

Boris The Sprinkler 'Bits O' Boris' and 'Vespa To Venus'

Both on Beer City Records, both have a rating of 14 of 14

This month, for the same low price, I'll be reviewing two albums instead of one, and one of these albums I'll be reviewing not only on vinyl, but also compact disc.

Green Bay is the home to longtime Green Bay punk legend Boris the Sprinkler.

I'm not throwing "legend" around lightly. Their shows at the Concert Cafe here in Green Bay are talked about worldwide and the amount of compact discs they sold at The Exclusive Company was staggering when you factor in that they are a local band.

Boris The Sprinkler moved units not just in Green Bay, but literally all over the world and a number of different record labels when you consider 45 releases, split releases with other bands and appearances on numerous compilation albums.

Boris the Sprinkler toured the United States far and wide and even went to Europe.

Boris the Sprinkler got their fair share of press in all the finest newspapers, magazines and fanzines, so their legacy is pretty airtight.

What else could they do to further legitimize their career? Well, they didn't need to do anything, but they ended up getting two more gold stars by releasing a comeback album and a compilation album of a- and b-sides of 7" releases, songs from split singles, compilation tracks and I believe previously unreleased material.

The comeback album is *Vespa To Venus*, which ended a roughly 19-year gap between new Boris the Sprinkler studio albums (yes Boris the Sprinkler has released a live album).

Now, the most important thing about a comeback album is that it's good or — even more preferred — great. Too many comeback albums are just destination Cutout Bin City (younger folks, please ask an older record shopper what a cutout bin is).

I'm happy to report that Boris the Sprinkler went with the option of really great.

Vespa to Venus is so great that in my personal rankings of Boris the Sprinkler albums, I put it right behind my favorite, *Saucer to Saturn*.

Songs that get my toes tapping are "I Tell Ya! Tonight! Tonight!," "Bibby," "Gamma Ray Girl," "Rock N Roll Tangerine," "Bang Shang-A-Lang-RI-La" and "[It Should Be Noted I've Been] Stayin' On The 13th Floor."

Boris the Sprinkler thrilled Green Bay last summer at Badger State Brewing Company, playing songs off *Vespa to Venus* in a very well-attended event (the place was packed).

Vespa To Venus — when it was first released — was only on vinyl, which I always thought was a mistake since a whole generation of fans grew up listening to Boris the Sprinkler on compact disc, and personally that is my preferred way to listen to Boris the Sprinkler.

This problem is being corrected, and



on Friday, April 14, Beer City Records is not only releasing *Bits O' Boris* (their other gold star for releasing a compilation of rarities and unreleased material) on vinyl, but the compact disc of *Bits O' Boris* which also includes *Vespa to Venus*.

The Green Bay UFO Museum Gift Shop and Records is so excited for this Boris the Sprinkler release that they will be having their first ever midnight opening on the evening of Thursday, April 13. When the clock hits 12:01am and it's technically April 14 they will open their doors.

This will be also a midnight opening for the new Metallica. (Coincidentally when both Rev. Norb — the singer of Boris the Sprinkler — and I worked for WGBW, we interviewed Jason Newsted of Metallica at the Brown County Arena.)

Songs that get my toes tapping on *Bits O' Boris* are "Can't Controllit," "Little Yellow Box" (which might be my favorite song by Boris the Sprinkler), "(I've been hitting on a) Russia Robot," "Ultimatum," "Kill the Sex Pistols," "Turn that TV Off" and "I'm Gonna Perforate You."

Both of these Boris the Sprinkler releases are essential to anyone's Boris the Sprinkler collection. **GP**

Titlefrown: Anonymous masked rapper's goal to inspire artists of Green Bay

Like many artists, rapper Toedrag, of Green Bay, found an interest forming for the rap genre from a young age.

From his first introduction to the genre around 2000 — at the age of five — when he got a millennium hip hop party CD from his grandparents, to learning how to form lyrics in middle school thanks to artists like Kid Rock, Aesop Rock, Wu-Tang Clan and even Jakprogresso — who is producing his latest album.

Most artists have their own stage names from rappers like Ice-T, Slim Shady/Eminem, Lil Wayne, Drake and even Toedrag himself.

"Toedrag originated as a skatepark nickname," Toedrag said. "Due to my size 15 shoes, my toe would drag when landing kickflips most of the time. Being a common skateboarding term, it quickly became a nickname which I later brought into rap music because I loved that it was a nod to skateboarding culture."

His path as an artist didn't start at the same time as his love for the genre, though.

"My trajectory started with my dad buying a real guitar due to inspiration from Guitar Hero when it was released, closely followed by a drum set with the success of Rock Band," he said. "Come high school, I was a replacement drummer for a band and ended up recording all sorts of music from varying genres. Eventually, I got the idea in my head that making my own beats and rapping would be easier than rounding up bandmates and afford me the creative freedom I desired."

And that's just what he did.

Toedrag made music under various defunct pseudonyms before settling and taking Toedrag seriously 4-5 years ago.

"I had always had trouble with a name and the desire to do music anonymously in an interesting way," he added.

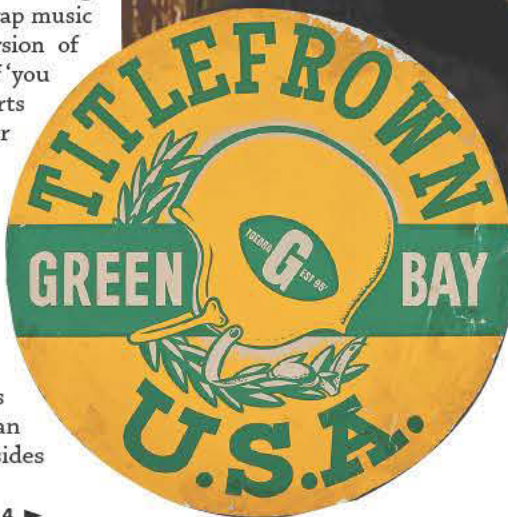
Many people may wonder the reasoning behind being an anonymous masked rapper and what it's like to step into those shoes.

"Kiss was my favorite band as a child and later came Slipknot — and MF Doom in rap music," Toedrag said. "My mask itself, being the same base mask used by Clown of Slipknot, although heavily modified and used in a different context. I really liked how it not only entertained, but kept the focus on the music and off the real life of the individual. Being an anonymous character allows me to say all sorts of fantastical things for the sake of interesting music. I play up all the tropes of rap music and operate in a cartoonish version of reality. Nowadays the argument of 'you aren't a gangster in real life' hurts the art form and possibilities for interesting writing."

And with the decision to stay anonymous also comes the pitfalls of attempting to hide your identity under a mask.

"It can be a bit like being a superhero," Toedrag added. "I'm private about it and very few people are aware of what is essentially my whole life. It can be very isolating sometimes. Besides

New local brewery spreads its wings

COCOON BREWING COMPANY OPEN NOW IN LEDGEVIEW

Just two months ago, a new brewery opened its doors at 2233 Kaftan Way in Ledgeview, owned and operated by Matt Walters and his brother Mike.

Walters said his interest in brewing beer actually began several years before the idea of opening a brewery came to him and his brother.

"I was kind of a homebrewer for five or six years and I got more and more serious about it as time went by and talked to my brother and ended up with the idea of starting up a brewery together," he said. "It's just been a process of building on the ideas and coming up with a concept and finding the land and building and construction and all of the stuff that COVID threw at us in the middle of all that."

Despite the long process, Walters said the brewery dream became a reality.

"We made it through, I guess," he said, "And now we have a 10-barrel brewing system and brick-fired pizza. We serve pizza and beer and we're on four acres in Ledgeview."

When it came to naming their new brewery, Walters said he and his brother turned to a personal experience which has now shaped their whole brand.

"My brother and I used to collect butterflies when we were seven, eight, nine, ten growing up on the lakes around northern Wisconsin," he said. "It was just kind of hard to come up with a name in general when 10,000 breweries already have a lot of names taken, so we just drew on something personal and built it from there. It really personifies our brand pretty

well at this point."

Sticking with the butterfly theme, Walters said Cocoon Brewing's beers will likely have butterfly-themed names — although that may be easier said than done as time goes on.

"We're trying to, as much as possible," he said. "It might get a little tricky as we go on if we continue to every time come up with a good idea... We actually have a Mexican lager coming out that we're actually going to name after a geographical region in Mexico where the Monarch butterflies go over the winter and hang out, so we'll be able to pull some other loosely associated butterfly names into that. It'll get trickier but I think that is something we try to plan and we'll do a little education piece or a natural conservancy-type spin on some things, I'm sure."

One unique feature of Cocoon Brewing are the small cabins on the property — called cocoons to stick with the butterfly branding — which groups can reserve to hang out in.

"We have four of these outdoor little cabins, basically, that are just off the main taproom space," Walters said. "They are reservable for small groups and they're heated and cooled and have tvs and sound systems and are a place for smaller groups to hang out semi-privately."

The cocoons, Walters said, are a Wisconsin adaptation of something

that, it's just more difficult to do photoshoots and make music videos when there's a realistic clown mask involved. There's always the possibility of a terrified civilian/police involvement, which wouldn't be an issue with a cheap silly mask."

New music, new album

For new listeners of Toedrag, expect a genre in the realm of post hip hop with writing that is punchline based and

comparable to one liners in stand up comedy.

As Toedrag put it, "[It's] rapping for the sake of rapping without a large emphasis on storytelling."

With Jakprogresso covering production on the new album, Toedrag had the opportunity to really push himself to new levels of writing and find beats that hit hard and are varied.

He added, "throughout the album are various samples that evoke the vibes of a vintage Packers documentary and capture the flavor of Green Bay."

The album will be releasing in May and the title, *Titlefrown*, speaks for itself.

"Most of the money in the city is dedicated to the Packers and renovating the west side while large areas of the city are broken down and dreary besides the cold and gross weather a majority of the year," Toedrag said. "As a skateboarder I see more of the sad gritty side of that city than most and the title is meant to represent that."

Toedrag also added what he hopes people take away from the album.

"I hope it distracts them from the real world and takes them on a journey, makes them crack a smile or run it back," he said. "I hope Titlefrown inspires artists in the city to take rap music more seriously and push the artform forward to set an example for the kids growing up here now."

"I really love our city and hope to bring something unique to the area that people can enjoy and call their own."

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he and his brother saw at a brewery in Minnesota.

"Before COVID, we were at a brewery in Minneapolis that had set up a place for people to do saunas at the back of their grounds and people were coming in and doing saunas, and we were like 'that's the weirdest thing I've ever seen,'" he said. "Originally, we were thinking about doing that sort of thing and then we thought that might be a little too far out there for our community, so we transitioned to sort of the stereotypical northern Wisconsin cabin-style idea and just have like little cabins for people to hang out. If they couldn't go up to their cabins on the weekend or didn't have one or whatever, they could come to our spots and still hang out with a small group of friends and have a pretty nice experience."

In addition to the cocoons and indoor brewery space, Walters said there is plenty of room at Cocoon Brewing for outdoor

games, activities and eventually live performances.

"We have almost four acres, so we have kind of a designated area for a more yard game-type situation and then a little more open area between the cocoons with a stage space at the far end," he said. "We already have booked a few live music acts for the summer and we're working with the town to approve what we would like to do for a stage-type area. So we really just have a kind of wide open space for people and families to spread out and enjoy what we can of the nice weather when it finally arrives."

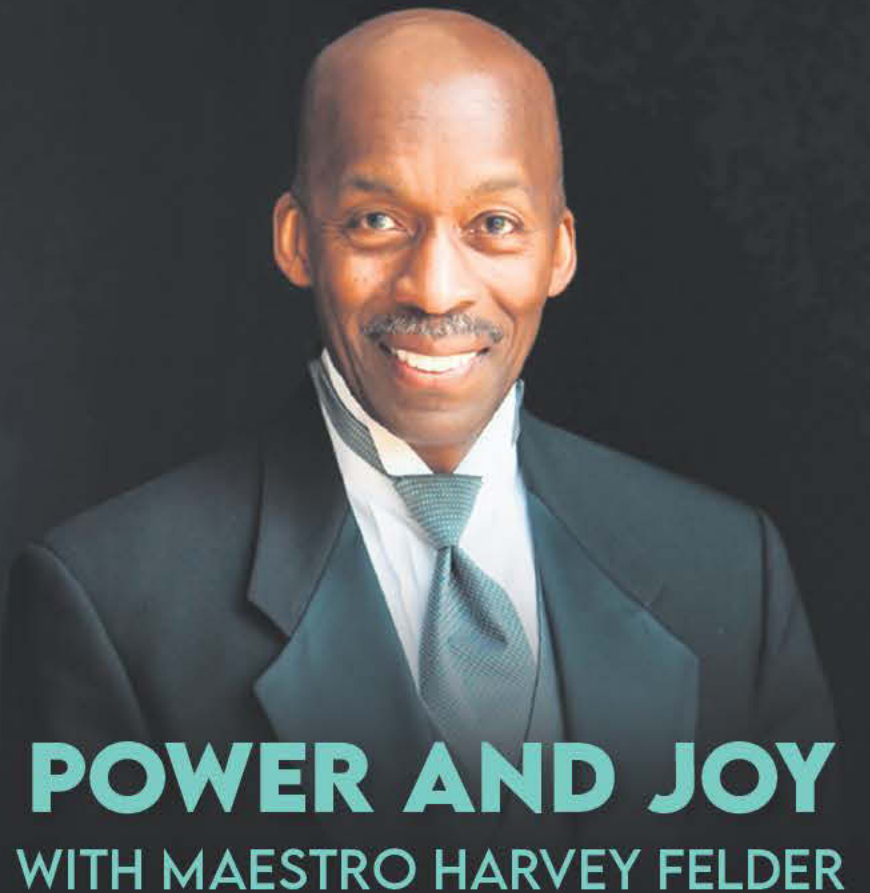

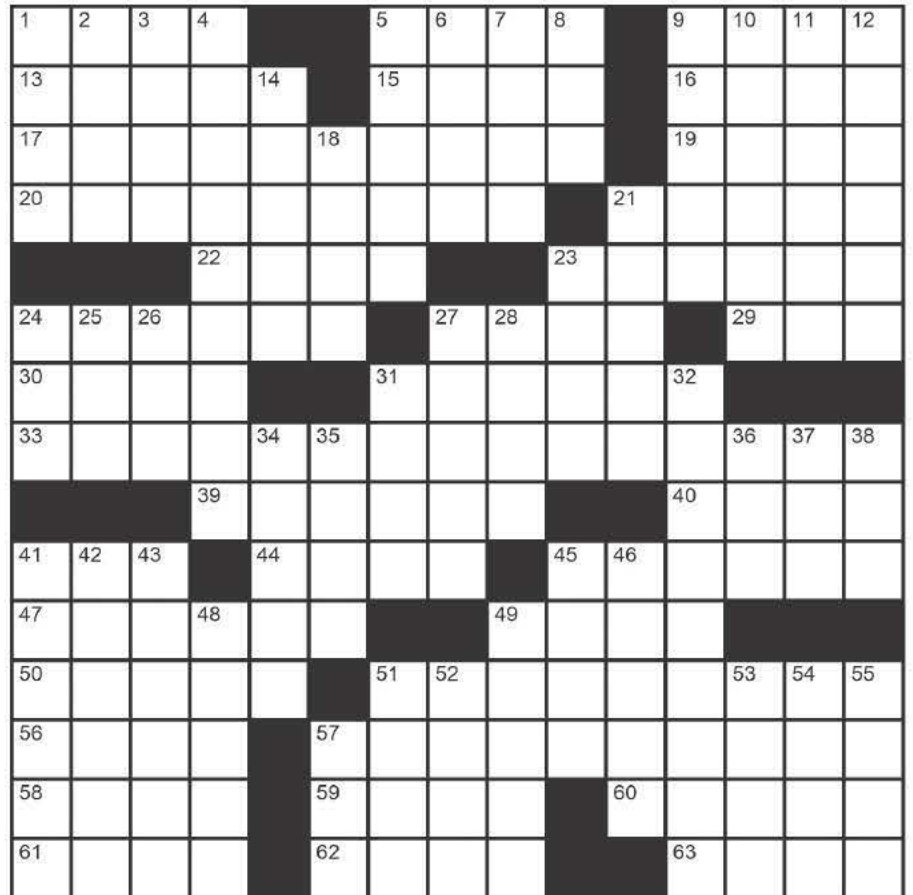

A few months after starting to pursue the opportunity, which can be completed online, Chan got a call to be on the show and then began the training process.

"I had an amazing training buddy — Greg Shihade — a world-class chess player who has gotten into trivia. (He) made sure I prepared well. I played a few hundred practice games using the database of old Jeopardy! episodes at j-archive.com and made a ton of flashcards on my phone — over 2,500," Chan stated.

Chan said that he enjoyed the experience and emphasized the importance of luck while competing.

"The most unexpected thing was that I wasn't at all nervous during the game. It was so fun, and it goes by so fast. I don't remember 95% of the clues that I saw," he said.

"There is a ton of luck involved in the results, so you need to love everything else about it — the studying, meeting other contestants, representing your commu-

nity, being invited into millions of living rooms around the country — to have a good experience."

He is now looking forward to sharing the results of his time on the show, which he is not permitted to divulge before it airs.

"It's been a few months since I taped, and I am so excited to be able to finally share my experience with my neighbors. Green Bay has been so good to me, and I hope I make y'all proud," he said.

The show will air Wednesday, April 12 at 6 p.m. on FOX 11.

A watch party will be held for St. Norbert students, faculty and staff in the Mulva Library, 310 College Ave., De Pere, in the first-floor flex space, with Chan present.

What's next for Chan?

"The producers of Jeopardy! are placing a lot of importance on the post-season tournaments now — Second Chance, Tournament of Champions, etc. — and I think it would be extra special to be able to play in one of those," he said.

Annual spring hearing vote online only

Anyone can weigh in on state fish, wildlife questions

If you want a chance to help shape future fish and wildlife rules, remember to vote next week.

For the fourth straight year, the annual Department of Natural Resources and Wisconsin Conservation Congress spring fish and wildlife hearings will be an online-only process with a 72-hour voting window beginning at noon on April 10.

Some citizens have asked for a return to an in-person spring hearing, citing the agency opening the online vote to non-residents the past three years and the lack of educational opportunities to explain the issue to those in attendance.

For the first time since 2019, the DNR did offer a return to in-person voting for local Conservation Congress representatives. That took place earlier this week at open houses across the state.

Citizens can provide input on dozens of questions next week, or simply vote on issues important to them.

There's an option to answer "no opinion" on most. While the results are advisory-only and non-binding, they sometimes lead to rule changes.

Youth turkey hunt

Wisconsin's annual youth turkey hunt runs April 15-16, a chance for those age 15 and under to try out their spring permit before the regular season begins.

The rules are pretty simple: eligible youths must have a license, stamp and harvest authorization for any spring 2023 period.

If they are successful, that permit is no longer valid. If not, they can try again during the week it is designated for.

Youths who haven't completed hunter education must be accompanied by a qualified adult and fol-

low all the mentored hunting program rules.

Millions for fish, wildlife

The Wisconsin DNR is slated to receive a record \$46.8 million in sport fish and wildlife restoration funding from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service this year.

Money comes from grant programs funded by excise taxes on firearms, bows, ammunition, fishing tackle, import duties on tackle and pleasure boats, and a portion of the gasoline fuel tax attributable to small engines and motorboats.

The funding includes \$33.7 million in wildlife restoration dollars (with \$6 million earmarked for hunter education) and \$13.1 million in fish restoration funds. The DNR uses the money for programs and projects that support fish and wildlife management and research, habitat improvement, public access, hunter and aquatic education, and the development and management of public shooting ranges.

The federal programs began in 1937 with the Pittman-Robertson Act for wildlife, in 1950 with the Dingell-Johnson Act for fish, and in 1984 with the Wallop-Breaux Amendment for the boating industry.

The Baileys Harbor Brown Trout Tournament, with fishing allowed on Green Bay and Lake Michigan off Kewaunee and Door counties, runs April 13-16.

Tickets are \$25, and all anglers need one to participate.

What's the balance like between being an elite sprinter and an elite pole vaulter?

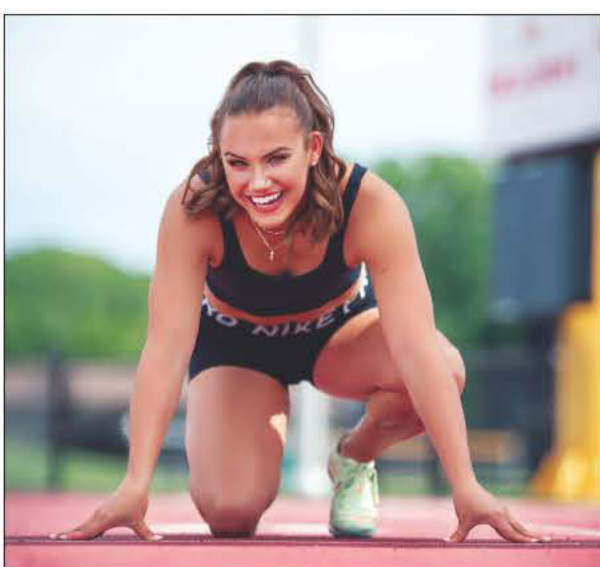
"For me, I always want

"I was that kick-out shooter on the three-point line," Meulemans said. "I was also responsible for guarding one of the best players on the opposing team."

Because she was one of the main outside shooters on the team, Meulemans didn't get a chance to drive to the bucket much like she did in high school.

"I only shot four free throws all season," she laughed. "That's not who I am as a player, so hopefully next season I will get to the line more. We had two or three main players who drove the lane, and I was that shooter on the outside they kicked the ball to."

With classes ending at Butler in a few weeks, Meulemans said she'll head home to the Green Bay area to enjoy some family and friend time.

"I'll be back home until about the middle of June," she said. "Our strength coach will give us workouts to complete, but I'll do some relaxing, too."

Changing of the guard

After Butler finished 1-27 during the 2021-22 season, the school parted ways with then-head coach Kurt Godlevske — the same coach who had recruited Meulemans out of high school.

In April 2022, the Bulldogs hired Austin Parkinson to take over the program.

In a nice turnaround, Butler finished 11-19 under Parkinson during his first season on the bench.

"When I got the call from

the athletic director, my stomach dropped," Meulemans said after Godlevske was let go. "That's your worst nightmare — having the same coach who recruited you get fired. You never know what a first-year coach is going to do with recruits — I was super nervous."

Meulemans said after Parkinson was hired, it was a wait-and-see game.

"I'm super happy I stayed," she said. "Coach P and his staff are amazing. They push me daily to be a better player and person in a positive way. I think Coach P is on his way to building that winning culture here."

Before taking the Butler job, Parkinson led the IU-PUI women's program for 12 seasons, posting a 224-141 record.

"When I got the job (at Butler), I liked Jordan's game," Parkinson said. "I was thrilled she stayed. I tell people, 'Jordan was the smartest freshman I ever coached in my career.' She got a lot of credit in high school for scoring, but she was our best wing defender and picked things up quickly."

Parkinson said he expects Meulemans to take big steps in the next few seasons.

"She's spent a year in the Big East and knows what

are 85 scholarship players, but there are 125 kids on the roster."

Rader said during the Badgers' spring practice session, which runs until the end of April, he's been taking reps at offensive tackle — like he did at NDSU.

"The big thing I have

to work on is putting on healthy weight and gaining strength," he said. "When I was at Notre Dame, I weighed 240 pounds, so since I graduated (in 2022), I've gained about 30 pounds. I think I can comfortably get to 305 or 310. I'm still a pretty thin 270."

Rader said his dad was influential in his decision to transfer to Wisconsin.

"I think deep down, my dad always wanted me to be a Badger," he said. "His thinking was, 'If you can be a Badger, let's see what we can do.' When I was younger, I'd wear his old Wisconsin helmet and play around with it. He wanted me to make the right choice, and as long as this was the right choice, he's happy about it."

that's like," he said. "I always joked with her that she had the greenest light of any freshman I've ever coached. Sometimes she would even pass up open shots. Now we need to work on expanding her game... getting to the rim and her mid-range game."

Parkinson said there were a few Big East games that were eye-openers for Meulemans.

"When Jordan got into those games, I think she thought to herself, 'I can play at this level,'" he said. "It was a confidence boost for her. She missed a few games due to injury during

the season but came back and was really good."

Parkinson said because the program went through such a turnover with the roster, it wasn't easy for incoming freshmen to mesh with the veterans.

"That wasn't an issue for Jordan — she fit in great," he said. "It's rare to rely on a freshman, but yet there were oftentimes I was using Jordan as an example — that was pretty neat. She exemplifies what it means to be a college basketball player and student."

Meulemans said she still

thinks about her De Pere days and playing for coach Jeremy Boileau.

"I miss those days, but I'm also excited for my future at Butler," she said. "Claire Borge (a junior on this year's De Pere squad) was always sending me the Germantown game (from my senior year)."

Borge missed the entire season due to a knee injury, but the Redbirds still finished second in the Fox River Classic Conference behind Notre Dame Academy.

"I was super proud of the team," Meulemans said. "With Claire out, the rest of the team had to step up."

With a 4-0 lead entering the top of the seventh inning, Geydoshek was cruising along until Pulaski made things interesting.

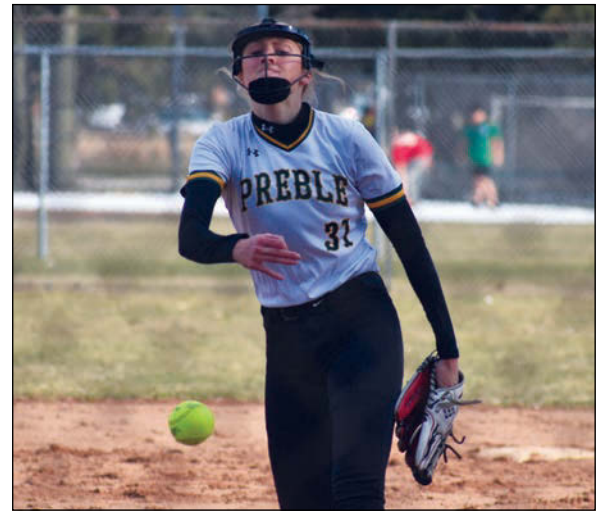
The Red Raiders parlayed three hits and a pair of walks in scoring their two runs, but Geydoshek stranded the bases loaded by getting a strikeout to end the game.

Rader walks on at Wisconsin

GREEN BAY – Despite being part of a national runner-up squad at North Dakota State University (NDSU) for the 2022 football season, former Notre Dame Academy standout Max Rader said it was in his best interest to enter the transfer portal at year's end.

A few months later, the former Triton landed as a walk-on at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

"Football at NDSU is done a specific way," Rader said. "I learned a lot there — probably more in the first two weeks I was there than all my years leading up to it. I took it all in and eventually played in a few games late in the season (at offensive tackle). I played in the last home game of the regular season and then the first postseason game (against Montana)."

The Bison won their next two postseason games before falling to South Dakota State in the Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) title game, 45-21.

"It was a special year," Rader said. "NDSU expects to get there every year, and I thought we got better as the season went on. Anytime you get to play in the national championship

game, that's pretty special." Rader said one of the main reasons he entered the transfer portal was to be closer to home.

"I'll admit, I was struggling a bit being eight hours from home," he said. "I knew it was eight hours away (when I committed to NDSU), but I thought I'd be able to handle it better than I did. With my dad (Mike) being the coach at Notre Dame, it was tough for him and my family to get to Fargo for a 1 p.m. Saturday game after playing Friday night."

Rader said that led to him entering the transfer portal.

"I wasn't sure where I'd end up, but I wanted to get closer to home to give my family a better opportunity to come to my games," he said.

Enter Wisconsin. "My dad played at Wisconsin in the 90s, my family has season tickets and it was always a dream of mine to go to Madison and be a Badger," Rader said. "With COVID and getting hurt in high school, the opportunity never came about."

Rader tore the labrum in his left shoulder during the last game of the 2020 alternate fall season, which was played in spring 2021.

After being out for five

months, he managed to come back late in the fall 2021 season but didn't get many reps.

"I played a few snaps on senior night and then a couple of drives in the next two playoff games," Rader said.

He said even up to a few months ago, he never thought playing at Wisconsin was possible.

"I played five snaps all year at NDSU, I'm not the biggest offensive lineman there is and I didn't have any new film out there," the 6-foot-6, 270-pound Rader said. "Once I put my name in the portal, I got a call from (Wisconsin's offensive line) coach (Jack) Bicknell. He said to me, 'If this is something you want to do, let's see what we can do.' After some meetings, I decided it was what I wanted to do."

After former coach Paul Chryst was fired early in the 2022 season after a 2-3 start, Wisconsin eventually settled on former Ohio State coach Luke Fickell to take over the program.

"I think with a new coaching staff, there might be some turnover with the roster," Rader said. "With Wisconsin bringing me in, I have high hopes I'll eventually be a contributor. There

Domask was one of only four freshmen in the nation to average at least 13.5

points, five rebounds and 2.5 steals.

Prior to Southern Illinois, Monaghan spent two seasons (2017-19) at Milwaukee.

The Panthers were among just a handful of teams to beat nationally ranked Loyola in 2017-18, topping the eventual Final Four-bound Ramblers by 17 points in non-conference play.

Before his stop in the Cream City, Monaghan was an assistant for six seasons at Division II powerhouse Minnesota State (2011-17), where he helped the Mavericks to four NCAA Tournament appearances and a pair of Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference titles.

He was also the recruiting coordinator for the Mavericks, and 13 players earned All-NSIC honors during his tenure.

A native of Chicago, Monaghan served as the director of basketball operations at Loyola (2010-11) and two years as an assistant
